Ed Sullivan's Moscow Show

A Ninety-Minute Special on Film

THIS week's *Ed Sullivan Show* will be a filmed program featuring highlights from Sullivan's trip to Moscow. It will include performances by American stars who went to Russia with Sullivan and by five or six top Russian artists.

Sullivan's journey to Russia with a troupe of 24 Americans is part of the cultural exchange program between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. He made the trip after the U.S. State Department requested the *Ed Sullivan Show* to represent the U.S. at the Moscow Trades Fair for a three-week period starting August 3. The show played to capacity crowds in the giant outdoor Green Theatre in Gorky Park and has been described as "one of the biggest hits ever to play the Russian capital."

On opening night more than 12,000 Russians, with a sprinkling of diplomats and tourists, packed the 10,000-seat theatre to applaud the troupe which included such artists as Marge and Gower Champion, mezzo-soprano Rise Stevens, accordionist Dick Contino, the singing Barry Sisters, Hawaiian singer Charles K. L. Davis and harmonicist Eddy Manson.

where their act was filmed, harmonica virtuoso **EDDY MANSON** and dancer **CONRAD BUCKNER** rehearse in front of Moscow's famous St. Basil's.

U.S. Ambassador Llewelyn Thompson, his wife, and top members of the Embassy staff saw the show the first night. But the demand for tickets to the show was so great that the Embassy was permitted to buy only 20 tickets nightly for its own use. Sullivan presented a nightly two-hour show and two matinees a week.

Some members of the troupe studied Russian in the weeks preceding their departure from New York. Russian audiences, it is reported, were flattered and pleased at this mark of courtesy. Marge and Gower Champion explained the background of each of their dances (a minuet, a barn dance, the Charleston, and the cakewalk) in Russian, and Claire and Merna Barry opened their act by singing *Dark Eyes* in Russian.

At the end of each show Rise Stevens led the entire cast in singing *Getting to Know You* from the American musical *The King and I* in Russian. On these occasions the audience streamed down the aisles to wave, cheer and shout *zdorovo*, which is Russian for "terrific."

THE NEW NORTH — A NEW “EXPLORATIONS” SERIES

IN HIS 10,000 years of culture, the code of the Eskimo has always been adapt or die. This key to survival is also the one to progress in the Canadian Arctic. In the last five years tremendous changes have been taking place up there, and the Eskimo is facing his greatest challenge. The old silent, isolated land of the hunter-trapper is fast giving way to a bustling new development. Radar sites dot the landscape, airfields bring distant regions within commuting distance of southern Canada, mining parties explore every corner of the mainland and penetrate far into the Arctic Islands. Cameras, ice-cream cones, nylon lingerie and cake mixes have found their places in polar life. The flow of people in and out of the Arctic has increased a hundred per cent, and the vision of a new north lies before us.

In the next four weeks *Explorations* will examine these changes in four programs called *The New North*, produced by Robert Anderson of Ottawa. Host for the series is Doug Wilkinson, explorer, filmmaker, lecturer, author and flier who has made the Arctic his adopted home. He's one of the few Canadians with a foot in both old and new worlds. Five years ago he was living on the top of Baffin Land, as the adopted son of an Eskimo hunter-

trapper, eating the raw meat of the sea animals he killed, travelling in the dark polar night by dogsled, completely isolated from family and friends in southern Canada. Today he flies his own plane between Ottawa and a dozen points in the Arctic, speeding over thousands of miles with greater ease than the hundreds he formerly travelled by sled. He has learned more about the Eskimo and his transition from the old world to the new than probably any other person in Canada.

In the first program — Polar People — Thursday night, the Eskimos themselves will tell what the change in the Arctic means to them—some who have stayed in the north, and others who have made new lives in the south. Those who adapt are winning, their uncluttered minds soaking up the complex machinery of modern technology and science with surprising facility. Uninhibited by past experience and doubt they learn new ways easily and thoroughly.

This week's program shows the Eskimo as he sees himself, and as he sees the white man, an interloper in his homeland. Most of the filming was done on actual locations in the Arctic. All the Eskimos taking part speak (Please turn to page 11)

"The Man of Kintail"

The story of Dr. Robert Tait McKenzie, Canadian physician, sculptor and pioneer physical educationist

A YEAR ago last April, a hush fell over Franklin Field stadium at the University of Pennsylvania just before the running of the annual Penn Relay. The huge crowd stood in silence to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the

death of a great Canadian who had left an indelible mark on that campus and its activities for more than 30 years—Robert Tait McKenzie.

A few months later, in September, 1958, the Historic Sites Board of Ontario unveiled a plaque hon-

ouring this renowned doctor, sculptor and pioneer physical educationist at the Mill of Kintail, about 35 miles from Ottawa. The old mill, bought by McKenzie for use as a summer home and studio in 1930, lies on the same road as his birthplace on the eighth concession line of Ramsay Township. Today it serves as a museum keeping alive the memory of a unique and gifted personality.

Robert Tait McKenzie belonged to the lofty, humanist tradition of Canadian medicine, which includes the honoured names of Osler, Grenfell, Banting. In his lifetime of 70 years, he not only gave of himself to heal the sick and wounded in peace and war, but also achieved an international reputation as a sculptor, a creator of many memorials, and a talented and inspired contributor to physical education and recreation.

McKenzie's boyhood was spent in the Ramsay countryside, and later in the town of Almonte. After completing his high school education in Ottawa, he went on to McGill University, where he graduated in medicine in 1892. At McGill he was a champion gymnast and high jumper, developing a strong physique by sheer dint of effort. A favourite tumbling team partner of McKenzie's was the Almonte native, Dr. James Naismith, who later became famous as the inventor of basketball.

As a practising surgeon in Montreal, Dr. McKenzie made important contributions to the treatment of scoliosis, or curvature of the spine, and specialized in children's deformities. Before long, he was back at McGill, as an instructor in anatomy, and medical director of physical education.

The modelling of masks for his anatomy classes, showing athletes undergoing great stress, led the doctor into the field of sculpture. Before long, his early works such as *The Athlete* and *The Sprinter*, were exhibited in London and Paris, and later athletic figures were shown at Rome, New York and other cities. "The Sculptor of Youth" as he became known, found beauty in the Greek ideal of "the



New Network Programs



“Four Just Men”

A modernized version of the Edgar Wallace classic starring four famous actors

WHAT would you do if you needed help desperately but had no money to buy it, and were unable to request the aid of normal law enforcement? That's the sort of situation that keeps excitement at a high pitch in a new drama series beginning Friday night on CBC-TV.

The Four Just Men is the story of four men acting together to fight injustice on a world scale. Although based on the 1906 characters Edgar Wallace established in his sensational mystery story, the plot has been brought up to date. Working from their headquarters in London, Rome, Paris and New York, unhindered by money troubles and aided by modern communication services, the four men are able to help people involved in strange situations outside the realm of ordinary police protection. The result is a series of tales rich in suspense, intrigue and romance.

Giving brilliant performances as the four just men are England's Jack Hawkins as Ben Manfred, British M.P.; Italy's Vittorio de Sica as Ricco Poccari, a wealthy Roman hotelier; Dan Dailey as Tim Collyer, American journalist in Paris; and Richard Conte as Jeff Ryder, a clever New York lawyer. Most of the filming was done on location all over the world.



G.M. Presents

"The New Men," adapted by Jacqueline Rosenfeld from the novel by British author C. P. Snow. Luke Richardson (John Colicos), a brilliant but head-strong scientist, and Martin Williams (Donald Harron), his tough-minded assistant, are running the first British atomic reactor at Barford, England, toward the end of the second world war. They are pushing forward desperately hoping that they, not the Germans, will be the first to produce a nuclear bomb. Failure and delay on the project antagonizes government officials and in the hurry and confusion Luke suffers serious radiation burns and almost dies. The whole operation is stopped, apprehensive about the effects of radiation, the scientists wonder if the bomb should be produced now that the Germans are beaten. Then they learn that the Americans have the bomb and intend to drop it on Japan. The British scientists protest to the Americans, insisting that to drop the bomb would be barbaric. human form in perfect health seen in graceful movement."

In 1904 McKenzie accepted an invitation from the University of Pennsylvania to become director of its new department of physical education. He remained a faculty

member of the school until his death in 1938. Here he continued his sculpture while directing the manifold activities of his department. He introduced intramural athletics at the school, set up training courses for teachers in physical culture, and campaigned with others for a broad network of children's playgrounds in Philadelphia.


He also dotted the university campus and the city with numerous and imposing monuments.

An ardent advocate of amateurism in sports, and a strong supporter of the Olympics, McKenzie's advice was often sought by Baron de Coubertin, who revived the modern Games. McKenzie travelled to Stockholm, Paris, Rome and Amsterdam to attend the Games, and his athletic figures were often on display at these contests. In 1912, his plaque, *The Joy of Effort*, was imbedded into the wall of the Stockholm Olympic Stadium.

The First World War found McKenzie hastening to Britain to join the Royal Army Medical Corps. During those tempestuous years he helped set up mass rehabilitation of wounded soldiers through remedial exercises, and devised special masks of thin copper for the faces which had been distorted by the violence of war.

In the years following the conflict, McKenzie designed war memorials in his native Almonte and Ottawa, in Edinburgh and Cambridge, and in several American cities. He also created historical statues of Benjamin Franklin (Philadelphia), General James Wolfe

English. Wilkinson's function is to point up their experiences and draw out their backgrounds. There are few groups who haven't felt the impact of the white man's culture. Eskimos who were hunter-trappers a few years ago, living in snow houses and skin tents, are now driving bull-dozers and trucks and living in compact wooden houses heated by modern oil stoves. Their stories are fascinating accounts of primitive people seeking a new life in old surroundings. "But strange as it may seem," points out Doug Wilkinson, "many Eskimos never have lived what we think of as an Eskimo life." For instance, one of the characters on the first program is Berthe, a tinsmith formerly of Fort Chimo, now of Churchill. Although he had lived as an Eskimo until a year ago, he had never built or even stayed in an igloo! With him on the program is the other side of the picture, his old friend Jasper, an Eskimo carver. Jasper complains that he used to be able to build an igloo in an hour. But he's getting old and now it takes him at least two hours, so he feels he's just as well off in a house in Churchill. (The type of work Jasper does is bought largely by the Hudson's Bay Company under supervision of the Department of Northern Af-

fairs, the company receiving no profit on any of the transactions).

Husky, handsome Simonie, cat operator, carpenter, interpreter, and labor boss, is one of the new generation of Eskimos, who without any schooling, have taken the leap across centuries in their lifetime. Raised as a hunter, son of a nomad Eskimo father in one of the Arctic's most primitive bands, Simonie has had more varied experience than generations of his family before him could have accumulated between them. Honorary Aide-de-Camp to Governor-General Massey on his first tour of the Arctic, Simonie was also a delegate to the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth, and has the Coronation Medal. Now he's acquired sophistication, dresses well in business suits and handles a large cigar with ease. He has a most attractive wife and two small girls. You'll meet them all on *Explorations*, and hear Simonie discussing aspects of his new life. "We never have the starving," he says. "When hunting bad, they have the starving. Now get job. Can buy things they need."

Attractive Minnie Aodla is worried about the Eskimo girls and their problems with white men at bases in the Canadian north. As interpreter and assistant to the Welfare Officer at Frobisher Bay on Baffin Land, she's in a position to see both sides of the problem

and others that arise as the Eskimo moves from the nomad hunting camp to a settled town life. Anne Witaltuk is another Eskimo pin-up girl, petite and charming. Hers is a success story which she tells most appealingly. Born on the east coast of Hudson Bay, she first became a Nurse's aid at Moose Factory, then came south to work in a hospital in Hamilton, Ontario, and after perfecting her English decided to become an airline hostess, which she did. Now she's with Trans-Air Ltd., on the Winnipeg-Churchill run, and doing well. Another Eskimo taking the transition in stride is Bill Ooonahan, who may be proprietor of the first polar restaurant to serve authentic Eskimo dishes like muktuk, seal and ptarmigan. "You never taste them, but you like!" says Bill, who has another two years to go before he can put his plans into action. Meanwhile he's assistant cook in the Northern Affairs Rehabilitation Centre in Frobisher Bay, and learning fast.

The second programs, *Patterns in Flight*, examines the problem of transportation in the Canadian north—overland, by air and water. Although Wilkinson recognizes that nothing significant happened to change the north until the ad-



THE time is 1944. The place is an atomic research centre in Britain. Scientists Luke Richardson and Martin Williams hear the Americans are about to drop an atom bomb on Japan. Doubts, fears

weapons must be faced by scientists, by politicians, and indirectly—in our democratic society—by the public. Thus does *The New Men*, opening drama in this season's hour long CBC-TV series, *G.M. Presents*, characterize the new series.

"We want the plays to be entertaining," says Michael Sadlier, supervising producer, "and we also want them to treat themes familiar to Canadians. Hence, most plays will be contemporary." Lee Peterson, Jeanette Newton, and Hilda Shubert, all of Montreal.


Established writers include Arthur Hailey, Jacqueline Rosenfeld, Mac Shoub, Lester Powell, Mavor Moore, Bernard Slade, Len Peterson, George Salverson, and others.

Canadian actors at home, as well as others returning from New York and elsewhere, will play in *G.M. Presents*. Back in Canada prior to rehearsals for New York productions are actors John Colicos and Donald Harron who will co-star with Barry Morse in *The New Men*. Harron will leave for New York shortly to star in *The Tenth Man*, a new play by Paddy Chayefsky while Colicos will play in an off-Broadway production of Marlowe's *Edward II*.

This year, too, *G.M. Presents* will include some of the dramas from what Michael Sadlier calls "the Golden Age of television drama"—for instance, *Murder Story* originally adapted by Leslie Duncan of Toronto for a CBC-TV production in 1954, and *The Incredible World of Horace Ford*, by American playwright, Reginald Rose.

Regular producers of *G.M. Presents* will be Ronald Weyman, Leo Orenstein, Melwyn Breen and Basil Coleman. Guest producers will include Paul Almond and Henry Kaplan.



(Greenwich), and others, and completed the Confederation Memorial in the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa.

Although he lived in Philadelphia for nearly half of his life, he was and remained a frequent visitor to his homeland, to work on commissioned sculpture, to give talks and lectures, to visit old friends and, from 1931 until his death, to spend his summers at the Mill of Kintail.

McKenzie's *The Sprinter*, in trophy form, is awarded each year by the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union to the top athlete in this endeavour, and his football study, *The Onslaught*, goes to the winning team in that sport in the Ivy League, across the border. Many of McKenzie's works are on display today at McGill University and the University of Pennsylvania.

The efforts of many people were brought together to create a half-hour documentary film on Robert Tait McKenzie for the *Here and There* series. Old friends in Ottawa, venerable colleagues in Philadelphia, staff at the University of Pennsylvania and at the National Gallery in Ottawa, all helped to create the composite picture of McKenzie's life for the program. Shooting was done in Greenwich and Edinburgh, Philadelphia, Montreal, Ottawa, Almonte and the surrounding countryside. Film direction is by Robert Barclay, of Chetwynd Films, and narration by J. Frank Willis.

Winnipeg writer-actress MARIAN WALDMAN introduces the personalities in her new daily serial "The Dancers of Dancers' Acres" which starts a 13-week run on Trans-Canada Matinee this week

TO GET to Dancers' Acres, you follow the main highway north from the city for about fifteen miles. Keep a look-out on the river side for the sign . . . and beside it, a smaller sign in the shape of the traditional bee-hive. Follow the road through the trees and you will find yourself on the Dancers' wilow-hedged four acres.

The smaller house—the one with the bright pink roof—is the home of Val Dancer, his wife Natalie and their daughter Elsa. Val is the bee-keeper; he does this for a living—not as good a living as he might like. Natalie augments the family income by writing verse for greeting cards. Elsa is five years old; she came to the Dancers on an

father and mother, Frank and Greta Dancer, live here with the two children still, at home—Angela and Carl. MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH

THE human mind is a peculiarly accommodating mechanism. It, or some specimens of it, anyway, can accept opposing and inconsistent qualities in a work without apparent distress—without even appearing to notice them—and can go on accepting them for years and years and years. It can, for example, accept such glaring inconsistencies as splendid music indissolubly wedded to stories of such monumental silliness as to make you blush for the "writers" who concocted them—as Mozart's music is to Da Ponte's libretto in the opera *Così fan tutte* (to be given on CBC Wednesday Night this week, in a performance recorded at the Opera Festival at Glyndebourne, England), and it can continue to accept them after attention has been repeatedly drawn to them, and despite all the efforts of subsequent reformers—half a century separated the careers of Mozart and Wagner, and nearly a century has rolled by since.

In the musical history books, you frequently come across references to now-forgotten operas which failed because of the feebleness of their librettos. If they were feebler than this story of women so stupid that they failed to recognize (at close quarters) disguised lovers to whom they had just pledged eter-



nal fidelity, and even their own maid when she was dressed as a man—they must have been feeble indeed. Yet *Così fan tutte* is by no means forgotten; it still holds the stage. The most obvious explanation, of course, is that people tolerate the absurd story for the sake of the glorious music—which conjures up a vision of starry-eyed opera "fans" entranced by the stream of lovely sound, and oblivious of all else.

Well, maybe. But it is a curious commentary on this devotion that confirmed opera addicts so rarely discussed the music of opera. They will busily compare the performances of various international celebrities in the leading roles, but the music itself they hardly ever mention. One has an uncomfortable suspicion, sometimes, that they don't listen to the music, but only to the singers—just as so many theatregoers don't watch plays, but only actors. (At the moment of

writing I have no information about who sings in this performance [Editor's note: for cast see page 27] but I can assure you that the opera contains some delightful music.)

Music for strings is again much to the fore this week. The Vancouver String Quartet is to be heard twice; in the *Sunday Morning Chamber Music* concert it will play Mozart's *Quartet in D Minor* (K. 421), and in the *Western Artists* concert on Monday evening the *String Quartet No. 2*, by Robert Turner, of Vancouver.

Montreal producer Herbert Steinhouse talks about RAOUL ENGEL and his popular program which will be heard on the network Thursday nights during October

"WHAT IS TRUTH?" asked jesting Pilate, and would not stay for an answer. For the past two years I have watched (and dispatched) free-lance broadcaster Raoul Engel as he rushed around Montreal with his portable tape-recorder, searching for bits and pieces of truth on behalf of *Contact*, a local radio program on CBM, Montreal. Sometimes he was terribly earnest in his probing questions, sometimes tongue-in-cheek. And sometimes he was indeed a jesting Pilate. But always, at least, *he* stayed for his answers.

Month after month we recorded, edited and juxtaposed Montrealers' replies to the big and little questions of the week. Did they believe in a life after death? Does the H-Bomb scare them? Isn't the earth really flat? (that was for a provocative feature on censorship).

Here are the four "Contact" programs to be heard on the Trans-Canada Network during October:

October 1—What Is Eve Better Than?—which plunges brazenly into the battle of the sexes and the problems of women in a competitive industrial society;

October 8—The High Cost of Dying—an examination of current funeral practices and people's attitudes to them;


October 15—Jewish Humour;

What, precisely, he tried to learn, is the sporting mentality? He interviewed informed spokesmen and men and women in the street, rich and poor, young and old, social scientists and illiterates, men of distinction and Stanley Street beatniks. And to the resultant brew of replies we usually added the seasoning of impudently relevant music, and perhaps the yeast of a quotation or two from Voltaire, or Samuel Johnson, H. L. Mencken or George Bernard Shaw. Or, if we felt like it, a more or less apt verse from some obscure Afghan bard or the sauce of a Mort Sahl.

Everything was grist for *Contact's* mill. Engel tackled the issues of snobbery, Montreal's metropolitan government, whether the Night People are better or worse than



Sometimes it approached, we thought, hilarity—as when it visited a "butterfly hatchery" (which is an Engelism for a leading Montreal charm-school for aspiring and quite lovely models), or when it sat in Montreal's Dominion Square straight-facedly asking passers-by just what this country really needs.

During the two years, the program became a habit for a few thousand or more Montrealers, perturbing and irritating a few (if the many letters CBC received are a criterion) and startling and impressing others. Engel and his candid mike became faintly notorious around St. Catherine Street. Finally, desperately, he locked up his recording machine temporarily last June and skimmed off across the Lake St. Louis horizon west of Montreal in a tiny sail-boat. One more edition of *Contact*, he said gloomily at the time, and his many enemies might well have strung him from his own cross-brace before his many friends could have managed to save him.

vent of the bush plane, he feels that flight conditions up there leave much to be desired. He acknowledges the enormous job conventional aircraft have done in supplying defence and other installations to the north, but he looks to a future which will free flight from the need of landing fields and make full development of the north a reality. Obviously adaptability is the clue. He asks: "How can you put landing strips where there is no flat ground? Most of the eastern and western Arctic is mountainous, and lakes and muskeg cover an enormous region of the northland." What is wanted, he suggests, is a kind of flight that can go straight up without runways, and then go along like a normal plane for long distances and carry heavy loads. The program shows many forms of vertical flight being developed in different countries and the conditions in the north they must be built to overcome. Why not use dirigibles to develop the Arctic? someone has asked. They don't need expensive landing fields, they can land or take off almost anywhere. They can carry great loads immense distances. It's true that some early dirigibles broke up, but now we can calculate for stress, modern metals are lighter, engines more efficient, and helium doesn't

burn as hydrogen did in the Hindenburg. Is this fantastic? The October 7th program investigates the practicability of the idea.

Next to transportation, communication is a major problem of the northland. The third program, **Voices in Space**, points up research going on here to conquer the peculiarly Canadian problems of distance and the aurora, which has produced innovations making Canada a world leader in this field. Long range communications systems, unaffected by the solar disturbances that black out radio in the north, now cover the Arctic in a criss-cross of networks that make it possible for almost any place in the north to communicate with the rest of Canada. While a film crew was gathering material for the program in Frobisher Bay in June, the first civilian long distance 'phone call went out from a former Hudson Bay factor to his wife in Ottawa. The call went by one circuit of a long-range scatter link, part of the defence system which the military can now spare for civilian use. And the next day in the Eskimo shack town down by the sea, and in the new Northern Affairs townsite, Johnny Ilksinark, the interpreter, took 80 subscriptions from Eskimos for telephones in their houses, huts and tents! When bush flying began in the north, pilots flew blind, with no navigational aids. Now things are better, but when the Dew Line and Mid Canada Line become available for civilian use, flying should be a hundred per cent safer, says Wilkinson, and you'll see the north go ahead in a way it has never done before."

The fourth program, *Russia and Canada*, is a comparison of the Russian and Canadian norths, prepared with the help of the McGill University Northern Studies Group; generally considered the most important Arctic research outfit on the continent. Among those taking part are Dr. Sven Orvig and Dr. Max Dunbar of McGill; Dean Fisher of the Fisheries Research Group; Superintendent Henry Larsen of the RCMP, who took the

Ste. Roche on her famous year-long trip through the Northwest Passage; and Michael Marsden, assistant director of the Arctic Institute of Canada. The film includes some spectacular footage on a recently-opened Russian floating ice-island research station in the Polar Sea. Differences in the two Arctic regions are examined. The Russian Arctic was far less affected by the glacial age than ours, and so has more arable land. We in southern Canada are sitting on our Arctic soil, which was shoved back by the glaciers. Among remedial experiments underway is one for killing surface moss and giving Nature the opportunity of building up a new layer of soil. Russia's Arctic economy is based on her six north-flowing rivers which start in the bush country. We have just one big Arctic river, the **McKenzie**, but our northern sea is more easily navigated than Russia's. Both Arctic's were first explored for the same reason . . . the search for fur. Now Russia has major manufacturing and several large cities in her northland. We are just beginning to open up ours, but its untapped resources and possibilities are exciting forward-looking Canadian everywhere. Making full use of its potential calls for bold ideas, even crazy ideas, say the scientists interviewed on the program. Some of their hopes are still only fantastic pipe dreams, but their vision of our northern future is a thrilling one.
