

KATE REID stars in "Candida" on Ford Startime

THE trouble with bringing literary heroes and heroines into the world is that you are forever after responsible for them, you are always leaping to their defense, and are constantly being asked to explain their behaviour, particularly if they are as provocative as George Bernard Shaw's *Candida*. Of course she is no angel—no one would remember her if she were—but, said Eric Bentley, "*Candida* is all the sweeter for not being all sugar." "So wholesomely moral is *Candida* in her immorality," wrote another critic, "and so captivatingly immoral in her morality, that she is one of the most fascinating exhibits in the entire Shaw museum."

Candida was Shaw's first big stage success, and has been one of his most frequently performed plays. The title role has been interpreted by a distinguished gallery of actresses, but Shaw was rarely pleased with any performances he saw. When he dropped in to rehearsals in his younger days, he would sometimes pop up on stage and act out *Candida*'s part himself, with elaborate gestures.

Where *Candida* is concerned, his exasperation is understandable, because while she is one of the most appealing figures in modern theatre, she is also one of the most complicated. Before we go any further, perhaps we should refresh your memory of the plot—but no, that's hardly the word to describe it. Once when Shaw was attending a rehearsal he shouted to the stage: "Oh please don't throw my lines away. There is no necessity in my plays of concealing the fact that there is no play." What there is is a witty, starkly revealing glimpse of domesticity in a middle-class English setting: North-East London in October, 1894.

The main characters are the Rev. James Mavor Morell, a 40-year-old Christian Socialist clergyman; his wife, *Candida*; Burgess,

her father, a genial, vulgar businessman who quarrelled with Morell because of the starvation wages he paid his employees; Prossy, Morell's typist; and Eugene Marchbanks, a strange, shy, poetic youth of 18. *Candida* returns from a visit to the country and brings Marchbanks with her; he and her husband have met, and Morell is fond of him in a rather patronizing way.

Marchbanks tells Morell that he loves *Candida*, and when Morell laughs, accuses him of being a windbag, suggests that *Candida*, like David's wife, "despises him in her heart," and insists that Morell is afraid to let *Candida* choose between them. Morell is considerably shaken when he finds that *Candida* seems to share this impression of him, but he arranges for her and Marchbanks to spend the evening alone together while he attends a meeting. *Candida* makes Marchbanks see that loving it its own reward, and he is able to express some of the deep love he has in his heart for people and things in general. When Morell returns he feels that there is still doubt about whether *Candida* will belong to him or Marchbanks.

Then *Candida* says that since she is up for auction, the men must make their bids for her. Morell offers his strength, Marchbanks his weakness. *Candida* then describes Marchbanks' life — rejected, disliked, misunderstood, and compares it with Morell's — petted, praised, adored. She declares she will give herself to the weaker of the two. Her decision is surprising, but logical. Whether viewers will be as satisfied with it as the winner will probably be hotly debated after Tuesday night's performance on CBC-TV's *Ford Startime*.

This is how Shaw explained *Candida* in a letter to American critic James G. Hunn, 1904:

Agon was the sensation of the New York season, and CBC television viewers will have the opportunity this Saturday (March 19) to watch the

evolution in form and content, sight and sound, of the ballet amalgam achieved by choreographer and composer.

On a replica of the stage of the New York City Centre the CBC will present, in a delayed telecast from Montreal, 42 members of the New York City Ballet in *Apollo Musagetes* ("Apollo, Leader of the Muses" 1928), *Orpheus* (1948) and *Agon* (1958).

Apollo Musagetes is a relatively conventional production, neoclassic in form; the costumes and dance vocabulary are in the tradition of the "ballet blanc."

In *Orpheus*, however, Balanchine broke with the long tradition of story-telling in mime, and returned to an earlier tradition of "pure dancing." But his designs are alien to that tradition and foreshadow later developments.

Ten years later *Agon* burst upon the theatrical scene. One critic called it "a definite breaking point in traditional ballet choreography."

"*Agon*," he said, "could initiate a new era in ballet if the challenge which it offers is accepted."

Traditionalists accustomed to narrative mime and set pieces of classical ballet, and devotees of the type of modern dance that is fraught with non-musical symbolism, may find *Agon* baffling — or even outrageous—at first sight. Dissonance in the score is matched by corresponding motions, and there are few, if any, familiar landmarks.

Describing *Agon* as "an aesthetic experience for the mind as well as the senses," ballet critic Christina Brundage says the "newness" of *Agon* lies in its contrapuntal ap-

proach — its "vertical" as well as its "horizontal" view. "The body designs," she says, "their arrangements in space and time, may seem to border on the wilfully perverse, the bizarre or grotesque, but this is only because we are not yet ready to understand what we are seeing. . . . *Agon* challenges the traditional balletic concept of beauty."

Challenge has been characteristic of the careers of both composer and choreographer. Stravinsky first scandalized his audience in 1913, with the Paris debut of *The Rite of Spring*. Balanchine, who came to the United States after the death of Serge Diaghilev, ushered in a new era of ballet on Broadway when he staged *Slaughter on Tenth Avenue* for the 1936 Rodgers and Hart musical *On Your Toes*.

That the fusion of their talents culminated in *Agon* seems a logical

extension of Balanchine's "thinking in music" and Stravinsky's "seeing music almost as much as he hears it."

The New York company's permanent musical director, Robert Irving, will conduct the orchestra. The program will be produced by Pierre Mercure, and sets and costumes are by Isamu Noguchi.

Members of the company appearing on the program include Violette Verdy, Diana Adams, Allegra Kent, Jacques d'Ambroise, Nicholas Magallanes, Francisco Moncion, Dorothy Scott, Barbara Walczak, Todd Bolender, Arthur Mitchell, Ray Tobias, Janice Cohen, Diane Consoer, Una Kai, Maria Talichief and Francia Russell.

The program will include a visual review of Stravinsky's career and possibly an interview with Balanchine.

School Telecasts TV Panel Topic

The CBC's National School Telecasts were the subject under discussion recently on *Of Interest to You*, a weekly public service program on CKOS-TV, Yorkton.

A. C. Bowes, superintendent of schools, Yorkton School Unit, expressed the view that both teacher and pupil would benefit from watching the guest experts teach, and he also recommended that parents watch the program and send criticisms and recommendations to their local station or to the CBC.

The TV discussion was moderated by Kristin Olson, CKOS-TV program director. Taking part, in addition to Mr. Bowes, were Sister Geraldine, representing the separate schools, and Harold Miller, principal of Simpson School.

Norman Roebuck, public relations director of the Yorkton station, also made a personal survey of teachers in the district. P. G. Geleta, principal, said he believed that children could actually develop a concept more quickly through a television lesson than from a teacher in the classroom.

The teachers of Melville schools were particularly impressed with the science lessons on the series, but held judgment on the special studies programs until they had seen more of them.

Among the criticisms offered were that too much ground is covered in each lesson and that not enough visual aids were used in the social studies programs.

Most teachers, Mr. Roebuck found, considered that television will eventually play an important role in the school, and that a good start has been made.

Ford Startime Schedule Set

Plays by Bernard Shaw (see page 2), Henrik Ibsen, Dorothy Sayers, and Conrad Aiken, a Rossini opera, and a light orchestral concert are among the forthcoming *Ford Startime* productions.

Of the 11 *Startime* programs still to be seen this season, seven will be produced by the CBC, and four (March 22, 29, April 5, 12) by NBC. Details on the NBC productions will be announced shortly.

Sir Thomas Beecham conducts the program of light orchestral music, entitled *TV Lollipops*, April 19. The 60-minute program will come from Toronto. The following week Norman Campbell, CBC Toronto producer who specializes in light opera, musicals and variety, will produce a 60-minute program of this type.

The next week, on May 3, Franz Kraemer, who has produced most of the operas seen on the CBC's English network, will present a two-hour performance of Rossini's *The Barber of Seville*.

The last three *Startime* programs will be devoted to plays — Ibsen's *Hedda Gabler*, adapted for television by Lister Sinclair and starring Joan Greenwood (90 minutes on May 10; produced by Mario Prizick); Conrad Aiken's *Mr. Arcularis*, adapted by Robert Herridge and starring John Drainie (60 minutes on May 17; produced by Harvey Hart); and Dorothy Sayers' *The Zeal of Thy House* (90 minutes on May 24; produced by Ronald Weyman).

FOCUS ON UGANDA



A RADIO REPORT BY MARJORIE WHITELAW, ON PROJECT '60

THE soft counter-point of two male voices filled Studio E. The melody was like a spiritual; the lyric was simply the repetition of the one word, "Freedom!"

"The theme for the program comes from something told me by a young Uganda student named Okot," said Miss Whitelaw. "He said: 'If it is because you misunderstand each other that you fight, and not because you disagree on some fundamental point, then it will be a waste of life.'"

The song from the tape-recorder gave way to the sound of a small voice in the distance crying, "Freedom!" The stress fell equally on both syllables.

"I wanted to record the sounds of a political rally in Kampala," said Miss Whitelaw. "But emergency restrictions in Uganda had outlawed political meetings. All I could get was that little boy crying 'Freedom!'"

Tape recorders are not always popular in Uganda anyway. Police use them frequently to tape political speakers—when political meetings are allowed.

Uganda has between six and seven million people. The largest number of them are peasant farmers. Their leaders say they want political freedom, nationhood. At their first elections last year, 90 per cent of the franchise, men and women, voted.

The British colonial administration agree as a long term plan. But "the situation is not yet ripe for complete political independence."

"What do they think we are?" asked one man. "A bunch of bananas?"

"We tend to think of anyone who is black, doesn't speak English, and lives in a mud hut as too primitive to vote," said Miss Whitelaw.

"I wonder if we translated that into terms of European peasant farmers whether it would put the matter in a different light.

"I have taken great delight in taping the views of some of these 'primitive' people who have degrees from the best universities in Britain and the United States," she added.

The young law student, Okot, is quite brilliant in his classes. He has also written a novel in his native tongue. It sold 5,000 copies. Okot's parents are "primitive." But he uses another word to describe them. "My parents are quite unspoiled," he told Miss Whitelaw.

The tape in Studio E started again. It was Okot singing in a pleasant baritone. The melody was familiar, *All Through the Night*. But the words were strange: a translation from Welsh into the African language of Luo.

"I sing in the choir at the University of Aberystwyth," Okot told Miss Whitelaw. He attends the University in North Wales, was back in Uganda on holiday. "When the rest of the choir is singing in Welsh I amuse myself translating the songs into African languages."

"There's quite a link between Wales and Uganda," said Miss Whitelaw. "I was at a party in Kampala one occasion when an African barrister and a turbaned Indian engineer fell on one another's necks and greeted each other in Welsh. Both had attended Aberystwyth."

In Uganda there are few white settlers. Perhaps that is why "The Africans in Uganda have great dignity and confidence. In Kenya with many white settlers it is quite different; the native African seems apologetic, wary about the nature of his reception from whites."

The old and the new mingle strangely in Uganda as elsewhere in Africa. Miss Whitelaw interviews a high ranking chief named Kisisonkole. He is father-in-law of the Kabaka of Buganda; that is, King of the province of Buganda, an hereditary title that goes back six or seven hundred years. Another interview is with Godfrey Binaisa, a barrister later banned from Kampala to a northern province for sedition. His father was a canon of the Church of England in Africa.

G.B.S. ON MARRIAGE


“Don’t ask me conundrums about that very immoral female, Candida. . . . Candida is as unscrupulous as Siegfried; Morell himself sees that “no law will bind her.” She seduces Eugene just as far as it is worth her while to seduce him. She is a woman without character in the conventional sense. Without brains and strength of mind she would be a wretched slattern and voluptuary. She is straight for natural reasons, not for conventional, ethical ones.”

The play is like Ibsen’s *A Doll’s House* reversed. Candida sees her husband as he is. She treats him like a doll, with happy results. “She regards him,” wrote G. K. Chesterton, “in some strange fashion at once as a warrior who might make his way, and as an infant who is sure to lose his way. The man has emotions which exactly correspond, sometimes looking down at his wife, and sometimes up at her; for marriage is like a splendid game of see-saw.”

Shaw said that of every 1,000 persons classified according to their attitude to marriage, there are 700 philistines, 299 idealists and one realist. Candida he said, is a philistine, on the whole content with the modern system of matrimony, a system which Shaw tagged as petty bourgeois, but within its framework she is a realist, sharp as a tack and commanding the situation. Morell is an idealist, recognizing that the system has flaws, but not having the courage to face up to them, wears an elaborate set of blinkers. Marchbanks is the realist. Immature and unsure of himself, he alone of the trio has the courage to look life full in the face.

Although the play sharply attacks conventional views of marriage, it is one of the least offensive of Shaw’s plays. It looks at married life candidly, but it does it wittily and warmly, with no long lectures.

John Mason Brown calls *Candida* “the wisest, tenderest, and most perceptive of all the realistic plays that have come from Shaw’s active pen.”

CBC-TV producer Mario Prizek calls it: “An ironic turnabout of the sentimental marriage-go-round. While apparently vindicating the middle-class ideals of domesticity, Shaw impishly shows how far they fall short of the most important things in life. *Candida* is a complex and demanding role because most of her important qualities are the hidden ones. It’s a prize role for a woman—much as Hamlet is for a man.” And Prizek has awarded it to Kate Reid, “because she has the great strength and subtlety required for so difficult a part. I’ve used her before in period roles—*Ivanov* and *A Month in the Country*, when she exhibited much the same combination of qualities as *Candida* has.” Prizek told us that although the setting is English Miss Reid won’t modify her Canadian accent because she’ll be playing opposite another Canadian — Arthur Hill as Morell, so she will speak in a neutral stage accent, somewhere between English and Canadian. There will be some colourful contrasts in accents in the play, because Tony Van Bridge, who plays Burgess, will speak in a ripe Cockney-like voice, while Australian-born William Job, as Marchbanks, will use an upper-class English voice. This should give the production an interesting depth in sound, complimented by the visual attraction of Nicolai Soloviov’s Victorian sets.

One story takes place in a western frontier town in the 19th century and deals with a magic potion;

another takes place on an asteroid where a man has been condemned to a lifetime of solitary confinement.

Among stars in the series are such prominent persons as Ed Wynn, Dan Duryea, Richard Conte, Ida Lupino and Gig Young.

MUSIC ON RADIO

IT LOOKS as though we shall get another good laugh his Thursday afternoon from the program of arrangements on *CBC Concert Hall*. You may remember that recently we had one which proved to be excellent entertainment, and at that time I implored the CBC to let us hear the famous arrangement for two flutes of Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus*. I see that on Thursday we are to have it in a version for violin, flute and piano, which should turn out to be just as amusing. I think we could do with a lot more light entertainment of this kind in our musical programs. The great trouble with these things is, of course, that if you do not know the original you cannot appreciate the joke. I have seen pieces that I thought were excruciatingly funny fall completely flat when played to an unsophisticated audience.

How much of the music of Smetana do we ever hear besides

The Bartered Bride and one or two movements from *Ma Vlast?* His early symphonic poems, *Richard III* and *Wallenstein's Camp*, are very seldom heard, so it is with much pleasure that I note *Richard III* will be played on the Ottawa Philharmonic's Thursday afternoon broadcast. Smetana's "program" follows the the story of Shakespeare's play fairly closely. The composer himself has told us that the opening theme in the basses is the motif of the hunchback king, and that Richard's dream in his tent before the battle, when the spectres of all his victims pass before him, occurs just before the final pages, which express the end of the tyrant in graphic terms. Perhaps Mr. Mayer will let us hear *Wallenstein's Camp* on some other occasion.

It would be nice to think that Sunday morning's performance of Dvorak's E Flat String Quartet was the beginning of a complete survey of the Czech master's chamber music. There are two beautiful string quartets which are never heard, and both the piano quartets are just as good as the often heard piano quintet; yet nobody ever seems to play them. In some ways Dvorak put his best music into his chamber works, but they have been rather overshadowed by the enormous popularity of the New World Symphony and the Slavonic Dances.

The T.S.O. Pop Concert this Sunday starts with Mendelssohn's Overture to Ruy Blas, one of his best orchestral works and a composition of some dramatic power.

Producer Tom Taylor will record all of the most important final competitions for presentation on the air the same day or the following day. Commentary will be by the well-known Winnipeg musician Filmer Hubble, conductor of The Choristers, who is himself an experienced festival adjudicator.

Out of the 47 million people in Britain who are over the age of five years, 34 million (nearly three out of four) watched television at some time on last Christmas Day. The majority (28½ million) watched the BBC—and of the programs with the largest audiences, the first six were BBC programs. These facts emerged from an analysis of Christmas Day viewing prepared by the BBC's Audience Research Department. The report also showed that there has been a swing back to viewing BBC programs instead of the alternative commercial television networks.—*BBC London Letter*.

SYMPHONY FIESTA

CBW will broadcast three programs of light music from the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium during "Symphony Fiesta" this Tuesday night. Cowboy Troubadour Stu Davis will be heard in 25 minutes of western songs at 8 p.m.; Jake Park's Polka Party band (currently featured on TV's *Happyland*) will be heard at 12 midnight; and Bob McMullin's orchestra will present a half hour of Music by McMullin at 12:30 a.m. "Symphony Fiesta" is a carnival-dance presented as a fund-raising project of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. Eight dance bands will take part. The guest stars—CBC-TV vocalists Juliette, Wally Koster (both former Winnipeggers) and Joyce Hahn (also a westerner—from Saskatchewan)—will be featured in a live CBWT telecast (Stage Door) from the auditorium.

IN ALBERTA ONLY

CBX will carry two series of programs of special interest to many Alberta viewers this week—the Alberta Curling Association Bonspiel and the annual Alberta Bull Sale.

Glen Bjarnason will report on the bonspiel, one of the largest in the prairies, on his daily sportscasts—7:45 a.m. and 6:20 p.m.—as well as on his Wednesday evening feature, Alberta Curling. He will also report on the event at 7:25 p.m. on Thursday and Friday (March 17 and 18). On Saturday, March 19, Glen will broadcast an end-by-end description of the final game direct from the Shamrock Curling Rink in Edmonton, starting at 10:30 p.m. Approximately 1,100 curlers, mostly from Alberta, but also from Saskatchewan and B.C., will take part in the bonspiel. All 12 Edmonton curling rinks will be in use during the 'spiel.

Reports on trading at the annual Alberta Bull Sale will be given by CBC's Alberta Farm Commentator Al Richardson Monday to Thursday during the Alberta Farm Broadcast (12:15 p.m.). The broadcasts will originate direct from the Calgary Stampede grounds.



Israel Today

A 60-minute actuality prepared for Project '60 by Lloyd Bochner

IN just under 12 years, a cause has become a country, a country that has trebled its population, its agricultural output and its industrial production, and stirred up a tempest of international controversy. Into a jigsaw piece of dry country cut from the Holy Land have gone over a million newcomers from 70 countries who were afraid to stay where they were and had nowhere else to go, and thousands more are expected, for *sholom aleichem* is still on the Israel doormat. Now, speaking a language seldom spoken 80 years ago, they are part of a phenomenal growth that defies comparison with any grown-up country.

"Most people there know why they're alive. They have a purpose in life. They're part of a vibrant whole," says Lloyd Bochner, well-

known Canadian actor and sociology graduate of the University of Toronto, who spent several weeks in Israel last summer with a tape-recorder, gathering a picture of the plans and problems of the country for CBC radio's *Project '60*. He will present it this Tuesday night.

He discovered that not only have these people come from different countries, but from different centuries, as well. Some are from places where they were accustomed to every modern convenience. Others lived in communities that have progressed little beyond the 15th century, and still others have been living in the primitive conditions of the 7th century. For them, moving into one of Israel's teeming modern cities was like stepping right into science fiction.

When Bochner and his wife, Ruth, arrived in Israel he piled his recording machine into a jeep and travelled up and down the country talking to as many people as he could. "In a foreign country," he says, "where the language is not English, you have to search for

people who speak English, are articulate and representative. This wasn't too difficult because a great many people there have a command of English and pretty well every one of them has a story to tell." He talked to Asiatics, Easterners, Nordics, Negroes and others who make up the polyglot state.

"Israel has been explored before from the point of view of her effect on others," Bochner told us. "I wanted to get the inside story, told in terms of the people themselves."

Bochner thinks there are more brains per square foot in Israel than in any other country in the world. Many brilliant industrialists, technicians, engineers and other people with specialized intellectual or professional skills are among the new arrivals each month, and Israel is taking pains to ensure that their skills are not lost.

Israel's veteran president, David Ben-Gurion, says "Israel's future safety lies in numbers." The country has one of the highest birth-rates in the world, and Israel has a standard of living remarkable in a country of newcomers. Some of which came with nothing but the clothes they stood up in, and no skills.

Of course, says Bochner, you will find a colour bar, a caste system, and discrimination against minorities, as the traditions of 70 countries bubble and steam in the melting-pot. But they are beginning to simmer down, and it is hoped they will quickly jell into a way of life acceptable to most of

that must exist between accompanist and soloist. For the accompanist, Mr. Moore points out, takes fully half the responsibility (but unfortunately, he adds, not half the fee) for putting a song across.

Wednesday night's program will be called *The Unashamed Accompanist*. This is also the title of a book and a recording by Mr. Moore, but the program material will be new.

Working out of London, England, for over 40 years (he began in his teens) he has made his name a trademark of his branch of the musical art—so much so that connoisseurs are said to flock to hear him, rather than the soloist. In fact, one English critic, reviewing a badly-sung recital in which Mr. Moore had taken part, wrote: "the only way to make these concerts attractive to musicians is to announce them as 'Accompanist Recital by Gerald Moore,' and in small type, 'At the Voice — Miss Blank'."

Mr. Moore began satirizing and explaining his art in a highly successful series of lectures a few years ago, liberally sprinkling them with amusing anecdotes and asides. "He holds the audience laughing," wrote *The Scotsman*, "until the tears roll down their cheeks, or spellbound as they listen to his illustrations on the piano."

**Repeat Performance
 Of Canadian Opera**

A YEAR AGO CBC radio pre-
 sented the world premiere of
Night-blooming Cereus, a new
 Canadian one-act opera commis-
 sioned by the CBC, with music by
 John Beckwith and libretto by
 James Reaney. Its reception was so
 enthusiastic, by both professional
 and arm-chair critics, that it will
 be repeated this week on CBC
 Wednesday Night.

The night-blooming cereus is a
 cactus native to the southwestern
 United States, but it is sometimes
 found as an indoor plant else-
 where. It blooms once a year, at
 night. The opera's central charac-
 ter is Mrs. Brown, a simple old
 lady, lonely in her rural Ontario
 community. On a snowy night in
 late March her night-blooming
 cereus is about to put forth its
 delicate, highly-scented blossoms,
 and she has invited some of her
 neighbours in to help celebrate the
 event.

Patricia Ridout will be heard
 again as Mrs. Brown. Others in

The opera's librettist, James

them. In the meantime, immigrants are being introduced to the community gradually, settlers from various countries being grouped around a centre where they can meet and share ideas and hopes—if they want to. Bochner recorded the stories of these people, too.

He told us he discovered that some of the children are ashamed of their parents because the older

folk cling to the old customs, while the children represent the new way of life. The youngsters shrink from bringing parents to school affairs for fear of being embarrassed by bare feet or some other symbol of the life they left behind them. The teen-agers are caught between two cultures, and it will take several years before they sort themselves out.

Bochner says there is very little alcoholism in Israel. The Israelis seem to have reached a level of maturity, rather strange in so young a country, where they can enjoy themselves heartily without false self-confidence. In Tel Aviv Bochner recorded some night club entertainment, which listeners will hear. The Israelis have reached the stage where they can take a look at themselves and laugh. Now it is the Jew who tells the story of a Jew walking into a telephone pole when drunk and hissing "anti-semitic!"

Bochner said: "As I travelled around Israel I was trying to find out what the cement is that binds the state together. I discovered that it isn't just Jewishness. I met a chap there from North Carolina, a Gentile, who is just as enthusiastic about the country as any Jew. There's an adhesive there, alright, but you can't define it in terms of

religion. You can define all its parts, but when you add them up you aren't any wiser. I'd say there's a kind of electricity in the air that gets you there. And as Israel applies it to solving her problems of assimilating a strange hodge-podge of humanity, building new cities almost overnight, creating a green land out of sandy wastes, the lessons she learns have universal applications. For, if you solve the Israeli problems, you've got the world licked."

kind yet to appear. Best of all it gave you that tingling sensation that comes when you recognize a form, a manner, a talent with a future. . . . In this case the right poet found the right composer. Mr. Reaney, along with all his other gifts, can write better verse for music than any other Canadian poet. He has also found the decent uses of sentiment, and a spoken language, and the aura of mystery in familiar things — all these in a way that music finds irresistible. It has some lovely music in it. To write good music nowadays you do have to be awfully clever, but it's far nicer when you don't seem to be awfully clever, and Mr. Beckwith's music was not only the most skilled of his that I have heard, but natural, direct, well-formed, and compassionate to the point of tears."
