# THE ASTOUNDING WORLD OF THE BEE

*A bee's-eye view of life in the hive*

**H**OW do you look at the honey-bee? Well, firstly, approach her to the face, because the back is where the stinger is.

But why look at all? Simply for the fascination. The bee and her hive are part of an astounding world, where social organization is on a basis completely different from man's.

So let's take a tour inside the bee-hive. And for a good look, let's enlarge the bee up to our size, and his hive accordingly, and take a bee-stroll through this remarkable insect world.

In man-sized terms, this enclosed bee-city is on a fifty-acre, flat site, walled and roofed of wood and sealed in every corner but a main entrance. It is sixty or seventy storeys tall, but with no windows to relieve the towering monotony—rather severe architecture, even by modern standards. But the form is classically ancient, certainly over five million years old.

Step into the hive, past a patrolling platoon of guards and on into the square. It is semi-dark; a translucent glow filters in from the entrance, rises upwards and disappears before it reaches the top.

And there is a distinct odor—a peculiar odor of ripening honey, not over-sweet, but clean and pleasant.

And there is not a speck of dust anywhere on the fifty-acre square.

The square is without any obstruction, not a building, not a foundation, not a structure of any sort has its feet on the ground. The huge square is a level, spotless, completely free area. The buildings of this town seem upside down. Their foundations are somewhere above—sixty storeys above, with all the structures dropped from the roof to within ten feet

above the square. This is a pendant city—a hanging city.

The square is busy any time of the day or night. These bee creatures scurry in haphazard patterns, some going to the entrance and flying out, some entering, rudely brushing their sisters on the way. Inside, some bees take raw nectar from the heavily-breathing field workers, scurry up the tall buildings with their drop, and disappear into the upper darkness. Others clean and barber those creatures who have paused long enough for a beauty treatment.

In the corners by the entrance, platoons of bees buzz their wings


to the air, with their feet firmly stuck to the floor.

And there is a bee frantically pulling sticky gum from the pollen baskets of an over-worked worker—*propolis*, which was hours in collecting, and which will be used to double seal every crack in the outer walls of the city.

There's another bee just coming in, his hind baskets stuffed with a bright orange dandelion pollen—the pabulum of Beeville, basic food for the growing bees. This load is also being transferred to a carrier who disappears up into the darkness to stuff it into some empty warehouse room.

There are streets in this insect world, but they are all vertical, leading upwards from the square below. The base of each street is ten feet above the square and as

### Long View of Canadian History

Professor Donald Creighton and Professor Frank Underhill have both been members of the history department of the University of Toronto. And as historians they would both agree on the date of the British North America Act, the name of the first Canadian Prime Minister, and the 1959 population of Canada.

But somewhere not far above this level of history the two professors would begin to disagree. For while both accept certain basic facts, they differ on the significance and interpretation of those facts and, consequently, on the analysis of current and future events in Canadian social, economic and political life.

schools of academic thought when they watch a four-program series on consecutive *Explorations*, starting this Wednesday.

A *Long View on Canadian History* begins with two programs in which Professor Underhill, formerly curator of Laurier House, Ottawa, author of *Canadian Forces in the War*, co-author of *Social Planning in Canada*, and one of the organizers of the C.C.F., discusses Canadian history (right down to today, and even tomorrow) with Dr. Paul Fox, of the political science department of the University of Toronto.

The last two programs in the series are a replay of a similar discussion between Dr. Fox and Professor Creighton, first heard last June. Professor Creighton has written a number of books including *Dominion of the North*, *Commercial Empire of the St. Lawrence* and his famous two-volume biography of Sir John A. Macdonald.

We can here mention but two differences in approach that the two men take to one topic: the so-called "frontier theory." This theory, taken over from certain U.S. historians, suggests that the frontier was the essential factor in Canadian evolution. According to the frontier theory, from the frontier comes the equalitarian impulse and dynamism for instance, which characterized North American growth. This may have been valid in the United States, says Professor Creighton, but is much less so in Canada. For Canada owes much more to European influences than it does to the frontier.

Professor Underhill differs markedly. The Canadian radical movements, which he feels have had great influence in Canada, sprang from agrarian backgrounds. Again, Jacksonian democracy, deriving in both name and nature from the American frontier, and exemplified today in, for instance, the party conventions, has been assimilated into Canadian political life. And in many other ways, the frontier has been the basic characteristic.

Despite all this, of course, the differences between the two his-

torians should not be exaggerated. As Professor Underhill says of the frontier theory, which he supports, "Well, it's like all great theses, it's one-sided." And Professor Creighton would certainly not deny the importance of the frontier, if only in its shaping of European modes of thought and ways of life.

What is this study of history that allows such a wide divergence of opinion among practitioners? Aren't historical facts historical facts, and that's all there is to it?

"Well I become a little suspicious of that word factual," says Professor Underhill. "(A history) will be facts as seen through his (the historian's) imaginative and intuitive power. He may see them in an ironical way, as Gibbon did, and write a great essay in irony on the *Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire* owing to the triumph of barbarism and the Christian religion. Or he may see the past as a great tragedy as Lucidides did, and really write a tragic drama about the fall of Athenian democracy. I think he's got to understand the past not merely with his reason but with his imagination."

## Sacred Music

• I have noted with interest Dr. Boyd Neel's remarks regarding "sacred" music and the definition thereof (if any). I must take exception to Dr. Neel's remarks regarding Gounod's *Nazareth*, which he cannot imagine as being acceptable to "any deity, or to any musician for that matter." I wish he had set out just what his objections to this song were. They would be interesting. I have always thought that Gounod was ranked among the greatest masters of musical


composition; and if he had not considered his *Nazareth* as being acceptable to musicians at least, he would surely not have permitted its publication. Dr. Neel states that his dictionary (the Oxford) defines the word "sacred" as being something "especially dear or acceptable to a deity." Mine defines it as "dedicated to God." I am curious to know how Dr. Neel regards the Negro spirituals. Certainly the words of many of them seem to be simply doggerel, and many of the tunes to which they are set would undoubtedly fall short of perfection. Yet, when one hears them sung by Marian Anderson, for instance, there is undoubtedly "sacredness" in them, and sincere worship of the Deity, and therefore would certainly be acceptable to Him.—P.G.L., Winnipeg.

## MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

VERY mixed bag this week, and there should be something to please everybody. The Beethoven Overture to *The Ruins of Athens* can be heard Sunday evening from Winnipeg. This is part of the incidental music Beethoven was commissioned to write for two plays by a well known dramatist of the time, called Kotzebue. One of the overtures resulting from this was that now known as *King Stephen* and the other was an overture on a fantastic and far-fetched subject entitled *The Ruins of Athens*. The listener who is not acquainted with this piece will be surprised to hear music in a far lighter vein than in any other of Beethoven overtures. We know the great composer himself did not regard it very seriously, because in a letter to his brother concerning the music for *The Consecration of the House*, he says: "Tell them (the publishers) that the old overture will not do, because in Hungary the play given was *only an afterpiece*, but here the theatre is to be opened with it." Liszt used a theme from *The Ruins of Athens* for his *Fantasia for Piano and Orchestra* of the same name and this, incidentally, is a work which could do with a few more hearings these days. Maybe the CBC will give it to us soon?

On Tuesday evening on the Dominion network we can hear another overture — this time by Peter Cornelius, the overture to his opera *Barber of Bagdad*. Here is one of the world's most delightful comic operas which seems to have suffered an eclipse during the last twenty years or so. At one time it was enormously popular. Based on a story from the Arabian Nights, it was given its premiere at Weimar with Liszt conducting. This was an unfortunate occasion,

because there was a feud between Liszt and the manager of the theatre, so that the first night of the "Barber" developed into a brawl between their rival adherents and the opera was a fiasco; with the result that Liszt resigned his position and the work was not given again during the composer's lifetime. This episode rather recalls the ill-fated first French performance of *Tannhauser* in Paris some ten years later.

The person who really put the Cornelius opera back into circulation was the famous conductor, Felix Mottl, who revised and re-orchestrated parts of it in the 1880's, and gave it at many German opera theatres. The Metropolitan saw it in 1890 with Damrosch conducting and it had another revival there in 1925 when Elizabeth Rethberg took the leading soprano role.

The Overture has rather a curious history. After the fiasco of the premiere, Liszt persuaded the composer to rewrite it using actual themes which occur during the opera. The original overture was apparently a light introductory piece having no connection with the following music. Cornelius, however, died before he could orchestrate the new overture, which was completed by Liszt, so that several people who have had a hand in the work as we know it today. The wonder is that it hangs together so well and sounds so homogeneous.

At the same concert on Tuesday evening, the Symphonic Poem for piano and orchestra by Cesar Franck, called *Les Djinns*, can be heard. The word "Djinns" signifies in the Arabian and Mohammedan myths good or evil genii, supposed to be the children of fire, and able to assume new forms at will. This particular work is based on a wonderful poem by

made at the time by the late Matthew Halton, dean of Canadian war correspondents.

"The program won't be concerned just with the actual D-day landings," says Bert Powley, himself a war correspondent and producer of *The Road to Normandy*. "We'll be taking listeners from the departure of the first Canadian contingent from Canada, through the phoney war and the build-up of forces in England, the retreat of the British Expeditionary Force and the brief 'visit' of the Canadian Brigade to France before its tragic fall, the Canadian expedition to Spitzbergen and the Dieppe raid, the war in the Atlantic and final assault on Europe. Naturally, the correspondents will be mainly describing the role of the Canadian forces in all this."

Wartime recordings in the program will include the sounds of the blitz during the Battle of Britain recorded by CBC's Art Holmes, and the sound of the pipes of the Seaforth Highlanders at Agira, Sicily, which signalled the very first break in the Continental defences.

Speakers on *The Road to Normandy* are among the finest names in Canadian journalism: Gregory Clark, dean of Canadian columnists; Marcel Ouimet, now general manager of the CBC's French network; Ralph Allen, who recently retired as editor of Macleans; Ross Munro, publisher of the *Winnipeg Tribune*; Peter Stursberg, freelance writer; Charles Bruce, general superintendent of Canadian Press; R. T. Bowman, manager of CFBC, St. John, N.B.; Gillis Purcell, general manager of Canadian Press; Arthur Holmes, technical director of CBC radio.

Victor Hugo which describes the flight of the Djinn over an Eastern city in the dead of night. Hugo's poem begins in short lines, some of them consisting of only one word, swells gradually in each stanza to longer and more forcible measures, and dies down again to a pianissimo, exactly like a piece of music. On the printed page the eye can follow the flight of the storm-fiends from their first appearance on the horizon to their final disappearance in the night. Cesar Franck has captured these sounds of tidal development in a wonderful way and this is a piece that should be heard far more often instead of the over-played Symphonic Variations.

national Service in providing material to national networks through hearing the program, *International Concert*, and other programs, including the Wednesday Night program from time to time, when recorded foreign concerts form part of the program. Listeners to the French network are familiar with some of the works obtained by the International Service through hearing the programs, *Festival Européens*, and *Festival du Mercredi*. Each year, the International Service has been receiving from the external broadcasting organizations it serves, an average of 200 exchange programs for Canadian listening.

The recent inauguration of the CBC Radio Canada FM networks in eastern Canada has provided the International Service with a new opportunity to serve Canadian listeners. One of the prime purposes of the FM network will be to present outstanding musical works from all parts of the world. Through its many contacts abroad, and a result of the work it does in providing others with programs from Canada, the International Service will undoubtedly be the means by which much of the fine recorded music from other countries will be made available to the FM network.

It became evident shortly after the start of the International Service that very little music by Canadians was available in recorded form. Steps were taken immediately, therefore, to correct this lack and this led in the late forties to the establishment of a music transcription service. To date, more than 450 works by Canadian composers have been recorded and distributed to some 300 radio organizations throughout the world.

**I**N Paris, 1827, Hector Berlioz saw Shakespeare's Hamlet, with the beautiful Irish actress, Henrietta Smithson, playing Ophelia. He fell in love with the words of Shakespeare, which struck him like a thunderbolt—and also with Miss Smithson, whom he married five years later after a stormy courtship.

The marriage between Berlioz and his wife lasted only a few years. But the composer's love affair with the plays of Shakespeare yielded the fine dramatic symphony, *Romeo and Juliet*. come Kapellmeister of an established company but I had to form my own. If it hadn't been an operatic group, it might have been an instrumental group."

Operatic conductor, director of Music at Hart House of the University of Toronto, conductor of the Bach Society, conductor of the Toronto Philharmonic—all of these while Mr. Stewart was still a young man. In 1934 he founded the famous Promenade concerts, conducted 250 of them, with audiences going up over the 7,000 mark. He also played a great deal of music on radio during its earliest days.

In 1941 the Peabody Conservatory at Baltimore asked Mr. Stewart to be its director, a position he held for the next 17 years. This conservatory is the oldest endowed conservatory in the U.S., and celebrated its centenary some time ago. From 1942 to 1952 Mr. Stewart

## WORLD OF THE BEE

long as the square itself. All streets run in the same direction — from front to rear, and all streets are narrow—just wide enough for two bees to squeeze past each other with discomfort.

Let's climb up one of these streets and see what goes on above:

The small amount of light that comes in from the entrance is soon lost in the upper darkness. There are no special areas of activity up here. There are vast sections devoted to different processes, but no clean-cut dividing line. But as we climb further into the heights, different things happen.

And the higher we go, the fewer bees we find working; way up on top of this sixty-storey building some bees are sealing cracks in the walls, and that's about all.

These narrow, hanging buildings are about the width of two bees. Each side is honeycombed with hexagonal niches. Wax separates the inner wall of each niche from its neighbour, so that each building looks out on two streets.

Each wall of the niche, or cell, is a common wall with a neighbouring cell, and the whole structure is hung, or rather pasted, onto a foundation which is, in turn, pasted onto the roof. And there are tens upon tens of thousands of these cells.

Wax is the building material, and despite its thinness, it has unusual strength. The basic enemy of wax is heat; the whole city can melt in a short time. But the wax has a companion quality which is of tremendous value—it is plastic. Wax can be easily worked and moulded, and will stick to itself and to other material with a great deal of ease.

So we have a wax city, narrow buildings dropped from a high, dark foundation, parallel to each other and separated by narrow streets all hanging over a huge, flat square.

And one more quality of this city which is now becoming noticeable is its evenness of temperature

and its gentle circulation of air. Despite the fact that the city is a sealed box, the heat has not collected at the top where it might soften the wax foundation. Those groups of fanning bees which we saw earlier at the entrance corners — now their purpose is clear. One group fans air into the hive; it rises up one side, over the top and down the other side, where the other group fans it out of the hive. The whole city is, in effect, a living lung.

The cells of the upper floors of these wax buildings are all sealed with wax. Break one of the seals and we expose a thick, syrupy, clear liquid honey. But the floor of the niche is slightly inclined and the honey does not flow out.

Travel down now, and we can see some honey in the making — unsealed cells with syrup in various degrees of thickness, until finally, much further below, there is the nectar itself—a thin, watery field product which must have its water evaporated and a mysterious bee quality added before it can become fit food for this city's population.

And so on down the buildings until we finally find empty cells, and cells in the process of being built.

But there is something else: Here and there are cells filled with a different type of food — bright orange and yellow pollen, brought from the fields in the leg baskets of bees and rammed into these niches. Here a bee, grasping the lip of the cell with her feet, will use her head to batter in and compact this pollen, this tender food for baby bees. Pollen is sorted in haphazard cells just surrounding the area where the queen works and where eggs are laid. And in these same cells, bees are born.

The basic six-sided room, designed to hold the maximum amount of honey at the minimum expenditure of wax, also serves as an excellent womb where larva, pre-pupa, pupa, and perfect insect stages are unfolded. And when this process is finished the womb is cleaned for the next egg.

These cells are indistinguishable in shape from the honey storage cells, but they are much darker in colour.

And it is here that the queen has her domain. The area of the brood cells is the lower centre of the hive, surrounded by vast quantities of food, and protected on all sides by the strongest bees. It is the reproductive factory of the city and is located in its very core.

In this area, life centres about the queen-bee, the only true female of the hive. A whole half-length longer than the others, neat and slender, she is constantly on the move in this semi-darkened world. Day and night, for month after month until the harsh cold of winter forces a rest, this total female lays her eggs.

Once, many months ago, this queen was a virgin, newly-born and cared for in the warmth of the hive. Then suddenly, she reached maturity, and with a remarkable burst of passion, she rushed from the hive into the world of sunlight, seeking a mate.

That was a peculiar day for the whole bee-city. All work stopped. Field bees buzzed in a dance at the hive door, old bees rushed over the square in a sudden burst of youth, young bees raced for the entrance to watch the coming marvel.

All waited in anticipation. A new queen was to be mated.

The young queen flew into the strange, bright world, on and up until she became a vanished spot in the sky.

And then the roar of males — those husky, square-shaped stingless drones, in pursuit of the virgin.

Finally, the strongest, fastest drone reached his goal.

And then the mating — far up in the sky. A brutal moment as the queen tears her husband's maleness from his body. And the slim queen is fertile for life.

The drone—king for that moment, tumbles down to earth on a gust of wind—dead.

And the queen returns amid the buzzing greeting of the whole city. Life will continue for this hive.

At the entrance she rests a moment, gathers her retinue of feeders and cell cleaners, and then sets to work to perform her one function in life—reproduction.

Tens of thousands of eggs later, she continues her rounds. Her retinue still surrounds her, some with a drop of food for her royal palate, her ladies-in-waiting inspecting the next cell and polishing and cleaning the womb for the new egg, cleaning her body, combing and barbering her hair.

A passing worker bends low and licks her stomach wall with his outstretched tongue to take a tiny drop of her taste which he will share with other passing bees — a taste that will bind this bee to this queen, and this queen to this hive.

Once a minute a new egg is laid, and once a minute a new bee is born.

There is almost no end to descriptions of mysteries and to speculations about mysteries. Why do bees build their special cells, of which only two per cent are perfect? What life-force takes a bee through her various duties at varying ages? Which bees know
