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COMEDY ON TELEVISION

JACKIE GLEASON, television comedian, has a contract with a U.S. TV network that pays him a reported \$100,000 a year for 20 years, even if he doesn't do a show. And he does very few.

Milton Berle, Mr. Television himself for eight years, has no show either, with an even fatter contract. Not too many years ago *Time* and *Newsweek* put this millionaire on their covers for the same week, a coincidence which occurred only twice before—once with Sir Winston Churchill, once with President Roosevelt.

Comic Sid Caesar shot to the top as a TV comedian, playing to an audience of tens of millions. Today he works the night-club circuit.

Everybody knows, of course, that the Western has squeezed comedy off the air with but few exceptions. The question is: why were most comics squeezed off? and again, what is the secret of those who remain?

Many reasons have been offered for the disappearance of the comedians. Most popular is their over-exposure on the TV screens, the burning up of men and material. This probably did reduce the number of comics on air, but it does not explain how those who remain—Red Skelton, Jack Benny, Bob Hope, for instance—do so.

Robert Webb in *Liberty* some years ago suggested that off screen over-exposure of comedians and

their psyches, was equally important in contributing to their TV demise. He lists Gleason, Caesar, Martha Raye and others whose tussles with psycho-analysts hit the headlines. This, he suggested, helped spoil the on-air illusion, as did the firings by Red Buttons of his writers and by Arthur Godfrey of his co-artists.

George Gobel, who has now lost his own show, has a different reason. "Vaudeville used to have seven basic jokes," he once wrote, when he still had his weekly program. "Now on television there's only one. That's my wife Alice. If my next show comes up with no jokes, it's because I've lost Alice."—Example of an Alice-joke: "I always refer to Alice in public as my *first* wife. It keeps her on her toes."

The other six vaudeville jokes had to be dropped from use on TV. Gobel suggests, because they might offend some individual or group. He quotes Jackie Gleason who once, during rehearsal of a skit involving a schoolteacher, replaced the rather drab actress playing the teacher by a glamorous blonde. "The P.T.A. would hop down my throat for discouraging girls from becoming school teachers," he explained.

The fear of social pressure has allegedly led to the elimination of social satire on TV, to the detriment of all humor. Said Mort Sahl: "I'm very intolerant of my con-

temporaries (that is contemporary comedians). I can't think of three I really laugh at as a member of the audience. They lack a point of view."

And someone has remarked that TV variety and humor have become so soft and syrupy that this year it is a case of the bland leading the bland.

Some of the greats of ten years ago still survive on TV. For one, there's Jack Benny, now coming back to a weekly show after a two-weekly effort last season. ("Why, Jack, it can't be the money?" ask his friends. To which Jack replied, "My friends have a wonderful naïveté." According to a CBS press release.)

Benny, of course, has built up a characterization over many years. "He's brought so much good will with him from radio where his programs were adult and funny," says Toronto *Star* critic, Dennis Braithwaite.

"I've evolved to where I am somewhere between a situation comedy and a stand-up comedian," says Benny himself.

Braithwaite and many other critics see lasting humor as based on good characterization. Braithwaite, for instance, is not an avid fan of Wayne and Shuster: "Their verbal wit is not as sharp as, say Bob Newhart or Shelley Berman, and their clowning hasn't the solid ability of Skelton or Lucy—their

mixture of wit and clowning is not always to my taste." Nevertheless he sees some of their material as "brilliant," particularly when they provide a satiric characterization in their sketches.

New York critic John Crosby has also been critical of Wayne and Shuster. But he says, "This pair

of comics, when they get hold of an idea, elaborate it in all directions, with plot and settings, a beginning, and middle, and end."

And as long ago as 1953 New York Times critic Jack Gould argued that the comedians' excessive use of "sight-laugh," what he calls the "squirt of the seltzer bottle"

was destroying good TV comedy: "Such visual tricks can never take the place of a well-constructed plot, be it a half-hour show or a sketch; nor are they a substitute for the spoken line with the point-of-view that provides a laugh."

Bob McGall, head of CBC variety, is not at all worried about over-exposed comic psyches, or TV taboos, or any of the usual reasons given for the current lack of comics. However much these may be the problems in the U.S., McGall's problem is simply a shortage of good comic material in Canada; in particular, good writers.

"Reams of junk comes in here and all of it gets read," he said wryly. "We want good comic material, we certainly need it, and we can't get it."

As for comedians, says McGall, "Last summer we put on two series in which young comedians had a chance. *While We're Young* used young comics and that'll be back next year almost certainly. And Pam Hyatt made some good scores in *Swing Gently*. This season we planned to use Pam on *Fancy Free* just as often as we could get good material for her."

But whatever success the CBC may have had in exposing young comedians in special spots within a variety format, the fact remains that Wayne and Shuster are the only team that have had continuing success in the straight comedy program on CBC-TV. It may be that in future, on both CBC and U.S. networks, we can expect to find humour more and more allocated to spots within variety programs.

Braithwaite, for instance, sees no real shortage of comedy: "There is still plenty of comedy on variety shows like the *Ed Sullivan Show*," he suggests. And insofar as there is an apparent shortage, probably it is just a corrective swing from the "excessive" amounts of comedy shows, full hour and half-hour, which flooded TV before the west-erns.

Danny Thomas who achieved his night-club reputation as a stand-up comedian but made TV fame as a family man, has said: "In 10 or 15 years the public won't

Sunday TV**Dr. Steacie**

talks to Nathan Cohen on CBC-TV's "Encounter" about his favourite subject, science and the gulf there seems to be between it and the humanities

They tell a story about a man who said to a scientific friend: "Look at the brown cow." To which the friend replied: "Well, it's brown on *this* side. . ."

Probably the main reason why science and the humanities are often at loggerheads is this reluctance of the scientist to leap to conclusions, his suspiciousness of past beliefs. But, says one of the world's leading physical chemists, Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, "this attitude is essential to scientific observation—even if it is infuriating to wives and relations when carried over to general life."

Dr. Steacie, president of the National Research Council, will appear on CBC-TV's *Encounter* Sunday to talk to Nathan Cohen about his favourite subject, science, and the gulf there seems to be between it and the humanities. About the frightening fact that human wisdom is not keeping pace with scientific progress. About where Canadian science is headed, how it stacks up against progress in other countries. About what advances are being made in university, industrial and government laboratories.

For his work in pure and applied science in Canada and the Commonwealth, particularly in the field of photochemistry and gas reactions, Dr. Steacie recently won the R. B. Bennett Commonwealth Prize (£105), awarded every three years for an outstanding contribution to the arts, agriculture, industry and commerce. The award is in memory of Viscount Bennett, former Canadian Prime Minister who died in 1947.

Dr. Steacie has written seven books on science, one of which is used as a textbook in the Soviet Union, and over 200 scientific papers. A year ago he led a five-man Canadian scientific delegation to

Russia, where his work is much admired. In June, 1958, he and Dr. Wilder Penfield, noted Canadian neuro-surgeon and author, were elected the first Canadian members of Russia's most exclusive science fraternity, the Academy of Sciences of the USSR. Ten years earlier Dr. Steacie had been honoured by being elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of London, the world's leading scientific academy.

He was born on Christmas Day, 1900, in Westmount, Quebec. In 1923 he graduated from McGill University with first class honours in chemical engineering. Then, having been greatly impressed by the work of the internationally-known Canadian chemist, Dr. Otto Maass of McGill, decided to continue his education in chemistry rather than engineering, and won his doctorate in physical chemistry in 1926. He lectured in chemistry at McGill until 1939, with time off for study and work abroad. He worked in Leipzig on gas reactions with a fellowship from the Royal Society of Canada, spent a short while in Frankfurt, and then did

research in photochemistry at King's College, London.

In 1939 the National Research Council in Ottawa appointed him director of its chemistry division, which became known around the world through his guidance. During the Second World War he was active in organizing Canadian chemistry on a wartime basis, and in stepping up research in explosives technology. For this work he was made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire in 1946. The Royal Society of Canada awarded him the Marshall Tory Medal in 1955, and he has received more than a dozen other awards and honorary degrees. He is a quiet modest man, but where science is concerned he doesn't pull his punches, as you will hear on Sunday night.

program will attempt to explain the basic assumptions on which present defence decisions are made, and to place these assumptions in their historical perspective.

"Policy for Defence." In the second program of the series, General Foulkes faces three critics and discusses with them Canada's commitment to nuclear weapons, the security of deterrents, and whether we should withdraw from NATO and NORAD. The Nature of Things

The story is based on Enid Bagnold's novel and the MGM movie of the same title but the locale has been moved from England to an American dairy farm region. 

Country Hoedown

With host Gordie Tapp—a program of country and western-style music. Regulars are Tommy Common, Tommy Hunter, the Hames Sisters, the Singing Swinging Eight square dance group, and square dance coach and caller Johnny Davidson.

Danger Man

This new series stars Patrick McGoohan as special U.S. security agent John Drake—a lone wolf in a post war world of international tension and intrigue.

This week—"The Blue Veil." Agent Drake flies to the Arabian Desert to investigate charges of slavery and finds himself involved with a stranded American showgirl.

Have Gun, Will Travel

This week—"Crowbait." Paladin is hired to save an old prospector from death at the hands of Piute Indians, whose secret silver lode the old man is seeking.

CBWT—Men Into Space

A "bon voyage" party is given for Colonel McCauley, Captain Harvey Sparkman and Lieutenant Johnny Baker before they take off on a lunar geological expedition. On the moon, a mining explosion damages their oxygen tanks and they take off for earth short of oxygen for the 48-hour trip. They are apparently lifeless when rendezvous is made with the space station.

know what a solo performer is. They'll have become adjusted to different standards of quality."

And Desi Arnez once said: "The comedian who has developed a character in a situation comedy format hasn't been hurt by the so-called dearth of comedy."

I Love Lucy was of course the most famous of situation comedies. "There is ample reason for the success of *I Love Lucy*," wrote Jack Gould, "a reason which seems to escape its hordes of imitators. There is a basic and recognizable validity to both the setting and situation to each (*I Love Lucy*) show, and this endows them with the stamp of genuine farce, as opposed to crude slapstick dressed up with puns and other pretences to dialogue."

Nevertheless, the widely popular situation comedy shows are comedy, whether good or bad. And so long as they are on the screen it cannot be said that comedy is lacking.

Is there a new type of comedy which can be called TV comedy. Braithwaite thinks not: "Good general comedians like Phil Silvers are good on TV too. Stand up comedians are certainly not new. About 25 years ago in radio we were laughing at monologues like those of Lou Holtz and Walter O'Keefe. Maybe situation comedy is new in the way it builds up a family over a long period but even these probably have their roots in the old-time two reelers, though they may have been more ridiculous. As for the Paar-type shows, their appeal is not so much comedy as the relaxed atmosphere."

So there it is. Are we losing the ability to laugh? Have we run out of funny material and funny men to use it? Are we limited to one of the seven basic jokes or do we still have available Mr. Berle's one million jokes reputedly insured for \$350,000 and kept on microfilm in an underground safe.

In a later article in *CBC Times* we'll ask Wayne and Shuster what they think about comedy on television.

The Clergyman

Ten clergymen discuss how the clergy is meeting the increasing dilemma of modern man, and state their views on the moral outlook of the future

How are our ethical standards holding up against the social and economic pressures of the technological revolution of the last 15 years? Many people are convinced that they have slipped — badly. There is a diminishing respect for truth, fostered particularly by advertising practices which place feeling ahead of ideas. The vast extension of credit, they say, has induced people to go into debt, has made time payments an absolute way of life. Has ambition left self-respect behind? The list goes on and on. Modern man is faced with the dilemma of trying to reconcile the teachings of his youth with the way of life thrust upon him by contemporary commercial practices, by the up-tempo rat-race he is caught in, by a hundred little problems that can become big issues because he is too confused to nip them in the bud.

How are the clergy meeting this increasing dilemma of modern man—from the pulpit or through private guidance? What do they think the moral outlook is for the future?

This Sunday afternoon, *Project '61* continues its 13-part series about the "frightening '60's" and the men and women who most influence our way of life, with a program about the clergyman. It has been prepared by James Bannerman, well-known playwright and radio personality, in collaboration with actor-producer Henry Comor.

They invited 10 clergymen — Roman Catholics, Jews and Protestants — to discuss the modern ethical situation privately and in-

formally, and wound up with 10 hours of stimulating, controversial opinions about whether the clergyman is or is not *intended* to be one of the key men in society, and whether he is filling this role or not. Then came the difficult job of editing all this material down to 50 minutes. "We felt we were trustees of the points they had made," Bannerman says, "and so we tried to be as just as possible and not let our cutting distort what they had said."

"When you put someone in front of a microphone and ask them to start talking," Comor told us, "they immediately say to themselves: 'Oh-oh, I'm on the air, I must be careful.' So we decided to settle our guest in an easy chair and give him a neck microphone so he could forget about the fact that we were recording, and speak naturally and openly. It paid off. The clergymen's remarks were entirely impromptu. Of course they all knew what they had been invited there to discuss, but that was all. Each was recorded separately, and none knew what the others had said."

"My position," Bannerman told us, "was just to bring up certain points and then hear their selected comments — it was not a series of questions and answers, and not an


A poignant story of the people of Newfoundland by Ted Russell, produced by J. Frank Willis

J. Frank Willis will bring to life the wry humour and salty conversation of the Newfoundland outposts Sunday night on CBC radio at 8:00 p.m. when he produces Ted Russell's play *The Holdin' Ground* on *CBC Stage*. It is the second time round for this warm-hearted drama. Willis produced its premiere on CBC Wednesday Night over five years ago with a Newfoundland cast in a broadcast from St. John's. This time he will use Toronto performers, but R. S. (Jimmie) James, assistant CBC supervisor of drama, who is a Newfoundlander, says that this should in no way affect the impact of the story. By using an approximation of the musical Newfoundland ac-

cent in key words, the full flavour of *The Holdin' Ground* will be retained.

The play grew from Russell's *Chronicles of Uncle Mose*, a series of monologues which James persuaded him to write for the *CBC Fisheries Broadcast* in Newfoundland and the Maritimes, and which have been a regular twice-weekly feature for close to 10 years. The setting of *The Holdin' Ground* and the main character are the same as those in the monologues. The scene is Pigeon Inlet, a small settlement on the northeast coast of Newfoundland. The time is now, or nearly now. The main

MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM

A BBC Transcription of the premiere performance of Benjamin Britten's 11th opera. Introduction and descriptive narration by Frank Phillips

In recent years English composer Benjamin Britten has arranged for the world premieres of his operas and other works to be held in Aldeburgh, the little Suffolk coastal town where he lives. His 11th opera, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, a major work written especially as the centrepiece of the 1960 Aldeburgh Festival, and considered by many critics to be his best opera so far (libretto by Britten and Peter Pears), was first performed on June 11th. A BBC transcription of the premiere will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night at 7:30 p.m. The composer conducts the English Opera Group Orchestra and a cast including such distinguished names as Alfred Deller (as Oberon, King of the Fairies), Jennifer Vyvyan (as Tytania, Queen of the Fairies), Owen Brannigan (as Bottom, a weaver), and Peter Pears (as

Flute, a bellows-mender). An introduction and descriptive narration are given by Frank Phillips, who also sets the scenes.

There are some unusual features about the production. The fairies are played by impish little boys—a distinct change from the usual pale bits of fluff in stage productions, and Puck, “who,” says one critic, “Britten regards as absolutely amoral and yet at the same time innocent,” speaks his lines instead of singing them, and tumbles about the stage in bursts of high good humour. He is played by Leonide Massine II, son of the famous dancer.

“I have always loved the *Midsummer Night's Dream*,” says Britten. “As I get older, I find that I increasingly prefer the work either of the very young or of the very old. I always feel the *Midsummer Night's Dream* to be by a very

young man, whatever Shakespeare's actual age when he wrote it. Operatically, it is especially exciting because there are three quite separate groups—the Lovers, the Rustics, and the Fairies—which nevertheless interact. Thus in writing the opera I have used a different kind of texture and orchestral ‘color’ for each section—Peter Pears and I had endless trouble with the references and the proportions of the play.

“We stuck faithfully to Shakespeare's words, actually adding only one line: ‘Compelling thee to marry with Demetrius.’ We worked from many texts, but principally from the facsimiles of the First Folio and the First Quarto.” And he adds: “I do not feel in the least guilty at having cut the play in half. The original Shakespeare will survive. . . .”

Writing in the BBC magazine *The Listener* George Malcolm, until recently Master of the Cathedral Music at Westminster Cathedral, said “It is a tribute to the skill and patience of Peter Pears and Benjamin Britten . . . that the resulting text is so successful. It is spacious, despite the compression; it embraces every essential element of the original; and in the few places where the order of scenes or incidents has been altered, no dramatic hiatus or confusion is perceptible. It would have been easy to retain all the favourite quotations and neglect the dramatic coherence of the whole; or, alternatively, to have concentrated on structure and proportion at the expense of favourite but inessential scenes or lines. But to have met both claims without detriment to either is a considerable achievement.”

North American critics who attended the premiere were equally enthusiastic. Harold Taubman of the *New York Times* feels “the chances are that Mr. Britten's *Dream* will reach many stages of the world. . . . In an age that has produced few operas that are ingratiating for singers, his latest effort should be a winner . . . a captivating blend of Shakespeare's moonlit lyricism and a modern composer's delicate songfulness.”

characters are Ben, the oldest man in the place, his wife, and a mysterious visitor who does not stay long but gives Ben a chance to recall some interesting things.

The Holdin' Ground is an expression for the bond which Newfoundlanders everywhere have with their native soil, its traditions and customs. As old Ben says: "I'm sittin' on my stagehead lookin' out at where Skipper Joe Irwin's schooner is ridin' at her moorin'. And lookin' at her, I've noticed how she's always on the move. Swingin' this way and that with the tide and the baffles of off-shore wind from the hills fallin' back till her chain brings up taut — then shootin' ahead to slacken it. A stranger not knowin' the difference would think she was adrift. . . . And the thought struck me how

much that schooner is like us people along this part of the Newfoundland coast. Oh, we have our little baffles of wind and tide, differences of opinion on a good many things, that swing us different ways. A stranger might think *we* were gone adrift. That is, until he knew about *our* moorin's and *our* holdin' ground."

James describes Russell as "Newfoundland to the backbone. He is a delightful person with a tremendous imagination and a great knowledge and understanding of Newfoundland and her people. A comparison with W. O. Mitchell springs to mind. I think Russell's comedy hasn't been equalled since old W. W. Jacobs. He is one of the great Canadian writers, but he doesn't spend as much time writing as we'd like him to."

James says Russell is "a real outdoorsman. He's a great fisherman, or, as we say in Newfoundland, a troutin' man. We used to go troutin' together a lot."

Russell hails from Coley's Point, Bay Roberts, Conception Bay, Newfoundland. He started his career as a school teacher, then tried his hand as a stipendiary magistrate. Later he was director of the Department of Co-operatives in the pre-Confederation Newfoundland Government, then Minister of Natural Resources, and for a time represented an insurance company in St. John's. Now he's teaching again — maths and classics at Prince of Wales College in Newfoundland.

He has written several scripts for *Summerfallow*, including *Spindrift*, and *Hangashore*, a story of Newfoundland fishermen, which won a first award at Columbus, Ohio. Four years ago Esse Ljungh produced his hour-long play *Ground Swell* in the *Stage* series.

exposition. The speakers are not identified, but their names are read at the end of the program. Neither Henry Comor nor I ever had to do with anything that made us think as much as this program. What these clergymen had to say cleared our minds on a number of points that had been bothering us."

Comor agreed. "And to a certain extent," he said, "they restored our faith in the clergy as a valuable source of ethical guidance. We're both agnostic in our beliefs, so we came to our subject with no prejudices, with receptive minds. Neither we nor the clergy preach sermons on this program. All we offer is a statement of a

problem and each clergyman's attitude to it."

"And," Bannerman added, "we hope the program will help listeners think more deeply about the problems, as we did. It was interesting to hear the different ways these men go about giving ethical guidance. They felt their job was quite categorically in the field of ethics, and they agreed that the pulpit should be a place for disseminating views on ethics as well as theological topics. As to what they thought the ethical pattern would be in the next 10 years — some were more optimistic than others, but most took a practical view, and there were very few platitudes thrown around through the whole 10 hours we recorded."

During an editing session an Indian studying at CBC Toronto as a Colombo Plan trainee, P. V. Krishnamoorthy, dropped in to the studio and got so interested in what he heard that he could hardly tear himself away. Bannerman told us "Krishnamoorthy felt the fact that we were being encouraged to prepare a program as controversial as this was a significant example of the intelligent freedom of the CBC. He was greatly impressed."

Through all this we see the figure of Radisson working first on one side then the other as he seeks fair rewards for his efforts.

A. K. Morrow, director of the CBC's English networks and the Toronto area, announced two Toronto appointments Tuesday.

After newsroom service at Winnipeg, Montreal and Halifax, he joined the press and information services, now information services, in 1946, becoming national supervisor of publications in 1958.

Mr. MacDonald is replacing William G. Dulmage, who is leaving the Corporation on Oct. 31 to take a position with a public-relations firm in Toronto.

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
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
