

HOW DO LABOUR UNIONS AFFECT YOUR LIFE?

THE BEGINNING of trade-union organization in this country, according to H. A. Logan in his book, *Trade Unions in Canada*, dates back to 1833.

In that year, 25 members of a group known as the Journeymen Printers of York, formed a body "similar to societies in other parts of the world, in order to maintain that honourable station and respectability that belongs to the profession. . . ."

Prior to 1850, most unions were confined to the typographical trade and were located primarily in Ontario and Quebec. The oldest society boasting continuous life is that of Toronto, today known as International Typographical Union No. 91. It has been in existence since 1844.

Since those early days, organized labour has expanded tremendously. Today almost every conceivable trade is represented in the 582 unions in Canada. Nearly 1,500,000 Canadians, or a third of the paid workers in non-agricultural industries, belong to the 6,805 locals within these unions.

Affiliates of two central bodies—the Canadian Labour Congress and the Canadian and Catholic Confederation of Labour—account between them for more than 80 per cent of organized labour in Canada. The CLC alone has a membership of more than 1,000,000. Much of the remaining union membership is represented by organizations active on a regional, national or international level but independent of a central labour congress.

Because of public interest in the labour movement, CBC-TV's *Explorations* series is presenting a series of four half-hour programs entitled *The Face of Labour*. Leaders and members of the Canadian Labour movement will give their views on various aspects of organized labour. The series

will be seen Wednesdays, beginning this week.

Throughout the series each participant will be interviewed separately by Prof. William Kilbourn of the department of history, McMaster University. Dr. Kilbourn is author of the book, *The Firebrand*, a biography of William Lyon Mac-



kenzie, and has just completed a history of the Steel Company of Canada called *The Elements Combined*.

In the first program, sub-titled *The Present*, Dr. Kilbourn talks to: Claude Jodoin, CLC president; George Burt, Canadian director, United Autoworkers; Larry Sefton, Director, District 6, United Steelworkers; Huguette Plamondon, Quebec representative, United Packinghouse Workers. The program deals with the position of the labour movement and with the climate of public opinion towards labour.

In the second program, *Union Structures*, labour men will be asked whether there are too many labour unions in Canada, how democratic control of union policy is exercised and whether the presence of large international unions is good.

Taking part will be: Andy Andras, CLC; Bill Dodge, CLC executive vice-president; Fred Dowling, Canadian director, United Packinghouse Workers; Roger

Mathieu, president, Confederation of National Trade Unions.

Union Locals, the third program, deals with the work of the union local. Those interviewed are: John Lisson, president, Bill Powell, chief steward; John Dinning, Bob Walsh and Alec Mitchell, all of Local 1005 of the United Steelworkers, the local at the Steel Company of Canada, Hamilton; Clive Ballentine, president, and Bill Jenoves, secretary, both of Local 2 of the Bricklayers' Union at Toronto.

The final program, entitled *The Future*, tells how today's leaders see the future of the movement. Walter Reuther, president of the United Autoworkers and vice-president of the AFL-CIO, will join Canadian labour leaders in explaining how the labour movement, which seems to have passed its period of great expansion, is to grow; why the trade unions are interested in forming a new political party; what the community, national and international purposes and activities of the labour movement are or should be in the future.

Canadian leaders to be heard are: Mr. Jodoin; Stanley Knowles, CLC executive vice-president; Bill Smith, president, Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers; Jean Marchand, general secretary, Confederation of National Trade Unions.

Prof. H. D. Woods of the Industrial Relations Centre, McGill University, is consultant and adviser for the series, produced for the CBC by Allan Wargon. Program organizer is Reeves Haggan.

Cost of TV Programs

While conditions vary, the cost of an American network television program is generally from two to five times higher than that of a comparable CBC program. CBC programs costs are from one-fifth to one-half those in the United States. BBC television in Great Britain cost about \$39 million in 1958-59. CBC television in the same year cost \$37 million. The BBC provided one TV service of about 50 hours a week, and CBC provided two with total production of 125 hours a week.

AROUND CBC . . .

● IF YOU HAVE NEVER HEARD of the viola d'amore, a musical instrument, then you share our ignorance in this regard. We were rather taken by surprise when Dr. Lislea Kocsis, well known for his chamber music recitals over CBC radio, suggested he could perform a concerto for the viola d'amore by the composer Vivaldi.

We have since learned that the instrument resembles a conventional violin, but that it has 14 strings—seven to play upon, and seven to set up sympathetic vibrations. Difficult to play, it was more commonly in use during the 15th century.

The concerto will be performed with the Winnipeg Chamber Orchestra for broadcast January 16. Dr. Kocsis believes this will be the first time the instrument has been featured on a broadcast in Canada.

Dr. Kocsis, since coming here three years ago from Hungary, has been featured in more than 150 chamber music solos.

JULIETTE recently invited the public to watch her TV show on the understanding each guest would bring a toy for a needy child. When the counting was over there were 292 toys—good for at least 292 children's smiles.

BRITISH BROADCASTING CORPORATION is involved in a global cable-laying scheme that could lead to a world-wide TV network. Canada and Britain will be linked coaxially next year. Officially the BBC say there are no TV implications in the \$224,000,000 cable-laying scheme—but that's just for the record. With very few refinements the TV transmission potential is there.

When ALFRED HITCHCOCK released his new film "Psycho" he decreed no one—but NO ONE—would be seated after the performance began. Fine, but how about Telemeter, that system of pay TV in Toronto's suburban Etobicoke? The same rule applied. Home viewers who plunked a dollar into the meter found no film—but the amount was credited towards their future viewing.

On University of the Air**WHY DO WE BEHAVE AS WE DO?**

TRYING TO understand the social nature of human behaviour and reconciling order with freedom is a king-size job that the fairly new science of sociology is tackling with increasing vigour. An introduction to the many facets of sociology will be presented on *University of the Air* in six lectures by Dr. Frank E. Jones, chairman of the department of sociology at McMaster University, Hamilton. They will be heard on CBC radio in a series which began January 2.

In his first lecture Dr. Jones will discuss general conditions pertaining to social organization which must be established if a social group or relationship is to function adequately. He will consider the connection in human groups between co-operative activity and the development and persistence of a common outlook or interpretation of experience among the participants.

On January 9 Dr. Jones will compare the nature of the predominant family form in our society with the various familial and kinship groups known to us, discuss

relationships within the family, variations in marriage customs, and the societal purposes the family fulfills.

Dr. Jones' third talk will emphasize the social organization of work in modern society, where a person's self-image derives in considerable measure from his occupational role.

"In large-scale organizations," he says, "the way work is carried out is partly determined by a formal arrangement of personnel and by rules set forth by management, and partly by arrangements and practices which emerge through contacts between workers at all levels in their daily dealings with one another. The relationship between the formal aspect of the organization and that which arises through inter-personal contacts has important consequences for the total organization."

Dr. Jones will show how such group phenomena have an important bearing on productivity and morale.

Next, Dr. Jones discusses the sociology of religion, reporting on variations in religious belief and social organization observed in human societies, and arguing that religion can contribute to social solidarity or provoke social conflict.

Are social classes an inevitable feature of human society? Can they be identified, and how is the distribution of the population among the classes to be determined? Are there any uniformities in the behaviour

of persons identified as members of the same social class? Does the presence of social classes lead inevitably to conflict in the society? Dr. Jones answers questions like these on January 30.

In his final lecture he describes what interests the sociologist in the behaviour involved in rearing children, or when newcomers join an established group; reviews some of the mechanisms which aim at maintaining conformity; and offers some explanations of deviant behaviour.

Dr. Jones is a graduate of McGill and Harvard. From 1953 to 1955 he was chief of the research division, Canadian Citizenship Branch, of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration.

In the spring he and his wife and two children will go to Australia, where Dr. Jones will take up the position of Visiting Fellow in the department of demography at the Australian National University in Canberra. After six months there he will make a tour of England, France and other European countries, studying mental hospitals, and will return to Canada in the fall of 1962.

This spring a book which he edited jointly with three other sociologists will be published by Macmillan of Canada under the title *Canadian Society: An Anthology*. The book is a collection of research studies on various aspects of Canadian society.

On Festival '61

HOME OF THE BRAVE

EVERY TIME Arthur Laurents writes a new play he mutters to himself: "Oh, there's that same damned idea of mine again." He can't help it, whether he, the critics or theatre-goers like it or not. But he doesn't claim to be unique in this respect. It's an occupational hazard with any serious playwright.

The one idea in various masks which Laurents keeps throwing at people is this: Have the guts to be yourself, to say what you really think, to do what you feel you should do. "I think people are more interesting when what they really are is close to the surface," he says. He has taken a long, close look at conformity in all its guises, particularly at people who either accept it whole-hog or claim outward non-conformity (but are really conformists) because they are afraid to be themselves.

Although Laurents urges us to stand up against the forces that try to cast us from one mold, he does not think we should all rush out and raise eyebrows at our "real selves." You can carry non-conformity too far—he points to the so-called non-conforming beatniks. "They've turned into a tight little conformist group. Instead of wearing grey flannels they have leotards and beards."

"There's too little individualism," he laments. "Everybody wants to be right. People are afraid to dare; they're afraid to fall on their faces. In the arts and in the livingroom. You hear all sorts of ideas these days that are only quotations from pamphlets."

This might sound as if Laurents were more than browned off with North Americans. On the contrary. "I think people are terribly nice," he said recently in the *New York Herald Tribune*. "If you don't have faith in people you might as well jump out the window."

The first time he urged us timid souls to rub off the tarnish of mass conformity and step out as newly

minted coins was in *The Home of the Brave*, his first stage play, produced on Broadway in 1946. Many people missed the point, thought it was a plea against anti-semitism, and it closed after 69 performances. But either people are getting a little shrewder or Laurents' subsequent successes have given them the courage to approve the play, because lately *Home of the Brave*

has come into its own — Laurents says it is always being done somewhere these days.

The newest production (90 minutes) is scheduled for *Festival '61* Monday night at 9 on CBC-TV. It tells of an American Jew, an army private first class, who suffers a traumatic shock when he sees his



On Project '61

What's Wrong With Canada's Movie Industry?

IN MORE THAN 50 years of motion-picture production, Canada has only been able to project a flickering image on the screen. A full image has yet to be cast.

Each year hundreds of thousands of Canadians visit movie theatres

have tried their hand at motion-picture production in Canada.

They will discuss the difficulties they encountered, the reasons for financial and critical failure and what is needed to stimulate production in this country.

Narrator for *The Flickering Image* will be Bill Davidson, producer of the 1959 movie *Now that April's Here*, based on four short stories by Morley Callaghan. Davidson and Lloyd Chester, who is producing the program, collaborated on the script. Davidson will also talk about the trials and tribulations he faced in producing *Now that April's Here*, which was a financial flop.

Bruce Bairnsfather, creator of the First World War cartoon character, Old Bill, will be interviewed on the program. He'll discuss his role as director of *Carry On, Sergeant*, Canada's first so-called "spectacular," which was filmed at Trenton, Ontario, in 1927 and cost the then high price of \$500,000. The film failed to recover the cost.

Also on the program will be Roy Tash, now one of Canada's best-known newsreel film men, who produced a full-length film about the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto in 1918. The picture was entitled *Polly at the Circus*.

If any Canadian picture was a success internationally, it would probably have to be *Bush Pilot*. Shot by Sterling Campbell, the movie starred Austin Willis and Lash Larue. It still is seen occasionally on television's late movies. Campbell, now a CBC producer who was adviser for CBC-TV series *Cannonball*, will talk about the difficulties he encountered while making *Bush Pilot*.

While English-speaking films have failed to gain much success, there have been some profitable French-language films produced in Canada.

Among them were *Un Homme et son peche* and *Tit-coq*, both produced several years ago by Paul L'Anglais of Montreal.

A firm in Quebec, called Quebec Productions, formed by L'Anglais and John Pratt, once made a bilingual film, *Whispering City*, but it was a financial failure. Pratt, who was an actor, set designer and dialogue director in the movie, will discuss that film on *Flickering Image*.

In the last few years there have been several feature movies produced in Canada but, again none were successful. Among these were *Forbidden Journey*, starring Susan Douglas and Jan Rubes and directed by Richard Jarvis in 1955; *The Little Canadian*, filmed by Mel Turner in 1956; *Wolf Dog* and *Flaming Frontier*, financed by 20th Century Fox and directed by Sam Neufield, a few years ago.

One young man who is considered the "boy genius" of Canadian film production, Syd Furie, made two films on his own—*Dangerous Age* and *A Cool Sound from Hell*, both playing in London. Herb Alpert, Furie's cameraman, will discuss Furie's technique.

Also to be heard on the program will be some of the men who have financed Canadian movies, men such as Paul Firestone, an investment broker in Toronto, and Julian Roffman of Meridian Films in Toronto. They'll discuss what lies ahead for Canadian films and why people in the industry think a Hollywood-type setup might become a reality in Canada within 20 or 30 years.

but seldom do they see a picture about Canada and even less often do they watch a Canadian-produced full-length picture.

What is wrong with the industry in this country? What hope is there for the future?

A complete look at Canada's movie industry will be taken on CBC radio's *Project '61* this Sunday on CBC Trans-Canada. Entitled *The Flickering Image*, the program will include interviews of several producers and people who

Is the Marriage Institution Disintegrating?

On January 8, *Citizens' Forum* presents a study of two opposing family types—the traditional, which looks on the man as undisputed head of the household, and the developmental, where husband and wife are equal partners.

A hundred years ago, the family was large, and included grandparents and other relatives. It was static, physically and morally, bolstered by strong, clear moral values and enduring ties with the church and community. The husband exercised supreme authority; the wife was his lieutenant. Each followed a distinct set of obligations.

Today the family is a smaller unit. It is mobile, detached from relatives and comparatively unknown to neighbours. There are no rigid, accepted rules to follow. The wife often works outside the home; the husband helps out with household tasks. It's a partnership where the roles can be exchanged to suit the individuals.

Law and convention no longer have the influence to hold marriages together; divorce is acceptable. Families stay together simply to fulfil emotional needs.

The question is: which type of family organization best meets these emotional needs in our present society? Betty Shapiro, Montreal broadcaster and writer, interviewed two families. The William Abbots have lived in one neighbourhood for many years. Mrs. Abbott, President of the Montreal Council of Women, says, "I like my husband being very positive. Then I know where I stand." In contrast, Mrs. Thomas Hanson is a wife and mother who has a job outside her home. Questioned about her husband's positiveness, Mrs. Hanson replied, "I wish I knew as well who I am . . . as he knows who he is."

Following the interviews, Dr. William Westley, Chairman of the Department of Sociology at McGill University, will give his views on the two types of families. Dr.

Westley has made studies of the Canadian family for a number of years.

On January 15, *Citizens' Forum* extends its study to the subject of child rearing. The program will present two attitudes toward raising children—the authoritarian and the permissive.

Since John Dewey published his monumental works on education, new ideas have arisen on the needs and growth of the child. Dr. Spock incorporated these ideas into his book, which has become a bible for young mothers. Dewey asked for "expression and the cultivation of the individuality" instead of the traditional "external discipline."

But there is a recognized necessity to teach children some controls and a sense of values, and the means to attain them. Authoritarian parents describe a "good" child as one who is respectful, reliable, honest and kind. Developmental families think of a "good" child as one who is happy, emotionally well adjusted, eager to learn and express himself. It seems then, that the traditional family is concerned primarily with a child's conduct, while the developmental family is

concerned with a child's feeling and responses.

Developmental families may tend to become child-centred, and give the child a distorted sense of his importance, so that he fails to mature and accept responsibility. Nevertheless, they can produce people who are less inclined to psychic stress and depressed feelings. Authoritarian families, on the other hand, may instill qualities of self-control and self-denial in children, but suppressed desires could burst forth impulsively at a later time. On the credit side, however, these people usually have high moral values and standards of excellence.

Two average Montreal mothers told Betty Shapiro why they bring up their children as they do. Mrs. Ian MacKinnon, a traditional mother, says, "I think it's important that a child should respect the furniture, because by the time he's ten years old, it'll be too late." In contrast, Mrs. Peter Golick does not impose standards of behaviour on her children she says, "why bother teaching a child table manners . . . when he's old enough, he'll imitate his elders anyway."

buddy killed on a reconnaissance party on a Japanese-held Pacific island. It leads to a mental breakdown, and as the play opens he is being treated by an army psychiatrist. His story unfolds in flashbacks.

Laurents writes with a cool power that hits you bang on the emotions when you aren't looking.

"I think the theatre is finally shaking off the Ibsen influence," he says, "leaning more toward Chekhov and heading straighter toward what must be its next phase of development: technically freer, more inwardly emotional and less outwardly naturalistic."

Laurents doesn't give a fig for the "Method" school of acting. In fact, he considers it a blight. In a recent New York Times interview with Thomas Lask he said: "The only thing the actors excel in today is violence and grubbiness. People seem to think that if they see a heavyminded, slow-thinking, matter-of-fact action they are partaking of reality. An audience sees two people shaking hands on stage and believes that they must therefore know each other. Not so. The theatre should be a land of magic. When the curtain goes up the audience should be in fairyland. The stage possesses a theatrical reality that includes the reality of the outer world."

As for Laurents' own private world, or what he calls his "careerist laundry list"—He was born July 14, 1918, in Brooklyn, the son of a lawyer and a former teacher. "We were middle-middle-class," he says, "the differentiating factor being the humor and intelligence of both parents." He loved going to plays put on by a local stock company, and on special occasions his father's secretary took him to a Broadway show.

When he was 11 or 12 he turned out his first short story, entirely in dialogue, and found he had a strong flair for writing realistic conversation. He studied playwriting at Cornell University, where, he

tells us, "I learned one generalization—the way to learn to write is to write—and one specific: never begin a play with the telephone ringing—why, I don't know."

After graduating from Cornell he wound up in the linen department of a large New York department store, from which he was fired soon after for sleeping behind the counter. He recovered from this indignity by taking a night course in radio writing at New York University. Evidently he didn't sleep through that, for he soon wrote an original half-hour radio play, *Now Playing Tomorrow*, which the Columbia Workshop snapped up immediately for the price of his playwriting course: \$30. He sold one or two more radio plays and then wrote a night club act for six "new faces," including his own. It was booked into Leon and Eddie's night spot, but the customers disliked it so much that they insisted on throwing butter at Laurents and his five buddies, and his career as a performer ended abruptly.

Off he went to Hollywood next to write for dramatic shows. About six months later he escaped gratefully.

fully into the army, where, he says, "for four years I had a varied career, ranging from truckdriver to, finally, propagandist." He wrote *Assignment Home*, a radio series which won the Variety Radio Award for 1945, and *Home of the Brave*, which was produced after his army discharge, and won the Sidney Howard Award and one from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. After that he wrote *Heartsong*, which, he says, "died out of town after overly-extended death rattles," and got into his stride as a successful screen writer. His film credits include *The Snake Pit*, *Rope*, *Anastasia*, and *Bonjour Tristesse*.

In his next play, *The Bird Cage*, Laurents got off the non-conformity kick briefly to point out that very often when you give up everything worthwhile in the pursuit of power, you end up with absolutely nothing. Probably his most successful play was *The Time of the Cuckoo*, a gentle romance about a middle-aged American spinster who found love in Italy, which he later adapted for the film *Summertime*. Next he wrote an experimental drama, *A Clearing in the Woods*, which got the critics all confused because it was a psychological fantasy about a girl with three alter egos, and it didn't last long. Even Laurents was a bit confused by the way the production turned out. It was presented successfully on CBC-TV's *Startime* just over a year ago.

"You would be surprised at the number of plays that have had trouble getting produced or never get into production at all because there is something new in them," he says. He deplors the fact that "people never make a judgment about a play until they see what the general reaction is. Then they go along with the accepted opinion. Any ingredient they haven't come across before, any element that isn't traditional makes them uneasy."

That's one of the reasons Laurents branched out into musical theatre. (The other is money.) "We are a literal-minded people," he says. "We always want all the facts, even

to explain the spirit. We prefer the photograph to the painting; partly, too, because we are afraid of our taste and because we delight in the familiar. This holds for the theatre where we dearly love real, live ice cubes, stenographic dialogue, concentration-on-a-wart acting. It is all familiar, recognizable, safe . . . But the easiest way for audiences to journey the farthest from the conventional reproduction of naturalism to the unconventional illusions of theatricality is to introduce music, song and dance. Today's audiences will completely accept in a musical what they are loath to accept in a straight play."

His latest effort, *Invitation to a March*, opened at New York's Music Box October 29. It is about conformity again, but it's meant to be a laugh riot. The author's formula: "First you give the audience a laugh, then you kick it in the belly." Laurents also directed this one—realizing an ambition he developed in the days of *Home of the Brave*. *Invitation to a March* tells of a delightful free-liver (played by Celeste Holm), who doesn't try to hide the fact that she has an illegitimate son, and has a heck of a good time being her honest self; and another delightful creature (played by Eileen Hackart), who lets *Vogue* magazine set her standards, and who conforms to such a degree that she drowns in dullness. The title evolves from the fact that "most people march through life in the ranks of conformity." Laurents is on a one-man crusade to break up those long columns of sleep-walkers.




MAT'S CREAMY CHOCOLATE FUDGE

3 cups white sugar
½ cup light corn syrup
1 cup evaporated milk
3 squares unsweetened chocolate
4 tbsp. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup broken nut meats

Combine first four ingredients. Place on low heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Increase heat and bring to a rolling boil. Cook for 5 minutes. Drop a bit of the mixture into very cold water and if it forms a soft ball immediately, take off stove and stir in vanilla. Drop butter on top and let stand until lukewarm. Beat until it will stand alone. Mix in nuts then put into a buttered 8 x 8 pan.

SPICED NUTS

One egg white beaten until frothy. Dip in desired nuts then roll into mixture of 3 teaspoons white sugar and ½ tsp. cinnamon. Place in 300-degree oven for about ½ hour. Cool.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT CLUSTERS

Melt semi sweet chocolate bar in top of double boiler. Add 1 tsp. paraffin. Add spanish peanuts. Drop by spoon on waxed paper and let set. Keep in dry cool place until used.

Snow in the Sub-Tropics?

• The CBC has conducted its Christmas carol programs this year with dignity and restraint, and I want to assure you of the gratitude of at least one listener. Our old friend, *The First Nowell*, while not neglected, has not been quite too persistent. Because of its warmth and simplicity, it will always be one of my favourites, but there is one line in it which I regard with the darkest suspicion. Perhaps you remember the opening stanza:

The first Nowell the angel did say
Was to certain poor shepherds in
fields as they lay;

In fields as they lay, a-keeping their
sheep,

On a cold winter's night that was
so deep.

"That was so deep"—surely it must be obvious that this is desperately jejune! My suspicion is that when the old 17th century carollers sang it, it was "a cold winter's night when *snow lay deep*." But you can just see some woodenheaded precisian coming along and insisting, "Snow couldn't lie deep around Bethlehem! It's a sub-tropical country." And so they had to change it.

It emphasizes again, no matter what churchmen may say, that a good half of the charm of Christmas is pure pagan—a feast of winter solstice, springing from nature itself. It's a northern festival, having really very little to do with Bethlehem and the Middle East. The church adopted it, but the "turn of the year" has a much older and deeper significance in human hearts.—L. C., *St. James, Man.*
