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On Heritage

How Does Religion Affect Our Lives?

The series of dramas on Heritage will show the active part played by religious workers in the alleviation of human problems. It will be seen each Sunday on CBC Television

THE PROGRAM *Heritage*, a series of dramas and documentaries on the power of religion, returned to the television network last week. The first program dealt with the problem of juvenile delinquency, in a drama called *The Maybe Kid*.

The second program, *The Flying Angel*, takes viewers to an enormous trailer on the Toronto waterfront. It is the headquarters of Rev. Canon Guy Marshall, the Missions to the Seaman chaplain in Toronto, whose work has opened up since deep-water ships have been going through the Seaway. Canon Marshall appears as himself and also does the narration. "He's a man of great charm and turned out to be an excellent actor," Freeland told us. "He's been doing this sort of ship-and-shore work for years, and speaks several languages fluently. Of course his work in Toronto is restricted to the navigational season."

The trailer includes his office, a chapel and a recreation room equipped with a hi-fi set and a library. Canon Marshall is assisted by the Rev. Clifford Train, a retired policeman who was made a deacon in the Anglican church, and Mrs. Edward Paton, all of whom play themselves in the film. Their job is simply offering a friendly hand to visiting sailors of all denominations, organizing soccer games (nearly every ship has its own team); arranging for dances and bus trips to Niagara Falls; finding people who will invite sailors to their homes or take them driving; and helping them with their shopping.

In the film Marshall visits the port authorities; delivers a message to a seaman that his mother has died in England, and helps the man in his sorrow; visits a Spanish sailor to deliver some Spanish maga-

zines; cooks a late meal for a second mate who wants to quit the sea and raise chickens—and jollies him out of it; spends the day at Niagara Falls with visiting sailors; and arranges help for a bashful sailor who wants to buy a crinoline for his wife.

The title of the show comes from the Flying Angelflag, symbol of a world-wide Anglican service organization devoted to the welfare of sailors in port.

The next two programs are what Freeland describes as "essays in understanding." *The Baptismal Covenant* is intended to show viewers how people in other traditions are baptised and what it means to them. Some of the scenes were filmed in the churches concerned, and others were re-staged in a studio. Freeland hopes that they will give viewers a deeper understanding of Christian baptism and also a better appreciation of their neighbour's faith, so when someone from the Greek Orthodox church, for instance, says, "My baby was baptised on Sunday," viewers will know exactly what happened. Freeland says that although the traditions vary, viewers will be aware of three recurring themes in all of them: the act of faith, the pouring of water, and prayer in the name of the Holy Trinity.

The second of the essays, *The Commemorative Sacrifice*, goes to the heart of a ceremony common to all Christians, the Holy Communion. It examines what Christians do and why they do it when they break the bread, beginning with its Jewish background, then showing how the first Christians used it, and finally looking at how the Supper of the Lord is observed in the Eastern Orthodox, United, Roman Catholic and An-

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"Three's Company" To Explain Stock Market Operations

CBWT viewers will have the opportunity to gain better insight into the workings of the stock market on a series each Monday on *Three's Company*. The first program was telecast Jan. 2.

To most of us, the stock market conjures up strange visions, ranging from slick "con" men—to the "Crash"—to genteel old ladies sipping tea while they clip coupons.

But the fact is that the stock market has enormous economic and political significance for Canadians—that its services are just as available to every Canadian as the services of the corner supermarket. Unfortunately, many of us regard it as a rather terrifying mystery and stay away from it through embarrassment at our own ignorance of its operation—the fear of appearing naive and awkward.

An increasing percentage of Canada's investment capital is in the hands of women, and women are showing increased interest in securities in which they can invest . . . so . . .

In co-operation with the Investment Dealers Association of Canada, *Three's Company* will present a series of lectures by Professor Lloyd Dulmage of the University of Manitoba — "You and the Stock Market" — designed to give the viewer sufficient knowledge of the operations of the stock market that she—or he—will have an understanding of how the market works, how to buy and sell bonds and stocks, and of the basic factors to take into consideration when deciding what type of stock to buy.

This is literally "a course," and it is intended to cover such subjects as: the type of investment *you* should make; bonds (savings, provincial, municipal and corporation); stocks (preferred and common); the mechanics of buying and selling bonds or stocks; assessing the value of common stocks; stock exchange terminology, and other topics.

AROUND CBC . . .

A WOMAN FROM INDIA, wrapped in a sari made of elegant silks and gold-crusted fabric . . . three top government officials, conspicuously but conservatively dressed in deep blue overcoats and black homburgs . . . a popular songstress, flouncing bleached locks and mink coat as she scurried along . . . these are some of the people we have encountered in the rotunda of CBC Building here in Winnipeg this week. If any one of them were to walk down the main street of an average community on the Prairies, traffic would grind to a halt. But they hardly rated a second glance from the blasé switchboard operators who keep an eye on the front entrance of our building, because such uncommon people are commonplace in the world of communications and entertainment. LOVERS OF NATURE feel a kinship that transcends international boundaries, as evidenced by correspondence carried on by naturalist Kerry Wood of Red Deer, Alta. Mr. Wood has frequently spoken on CBC radio, and one of his talks some time ago was heard by a woman in upstate New York, who had turned her radio to CBL, Toronto. She wrote to him, asking that he send a postcard to notify her each time he was to speak thereafter, so that she could listen. For more than two years he has continued to do so, and the U.S. listener has become a steadfast fan of Mr. Wood and the whole CBC.

A BOY SCOUT did a good turn here at the CBC studios recently. Producer Jean MacKay decided that a fire-lighting demonstration would be a suitable and valuable addition to the regular television feature *The Outrider*, part of the *Junior Roundup* program. A call to the Boy Scouts Association brought a smart youngster to the studio for the job.

CBWT VIEWERS who enjoy television movies are in for a treat in the next few months. Film Director Grace Brown reports that she has recently signed two package deals, one with United Artists for post-1948 releases, and another with National Telefilm Association, that will bring some top films to the TV screen. Such shows as "Barefoot Contessa" with Humphrey Bogart and Ava Gardner, "The Grapes of Wrath," starring Henry Fonda, "The Mark of Zorro," with Tyrone Power, and some Shirley Temple favourites are among those to be telecast.

On Countrytime: Chilean Agriculture

Farming Methods Modern, Yet Primitive



Oxen and horses trudge across the fields on a small farm in Chile, a common scene. But a nearby field would be just as apt to contain diesel tractors and power harvesters, in this land of contrast.

In Chile, a country of 7,000,000 population with arable land area about equal to that of Manitoba, huge farms of 5,000 to 10,000 acres are common. But many small holdings occur as well, and the most primitive methods are used alongside the most up-to-date equipment.

A detailed description of these contrasting conditions will be given by Dr. Eric Putt of the Morden, Man., Experimental Farm, on Countrytime (Wed., Jan. 11, on CBWT, Sat., Jan. 14, on the Prairie Network). Dr. Putt was on assignment with the Food and Agricultural Organization of the U.N., as advisor to the Chilean government on sunflower breeding and improvement. He was able to visit Argentina for a week during his South American visit, and will deal briefly with that country's agriculture.

Chile is a long, narrow mountainous country on the southwest coast of South America. The main zone of cultivation consists of a long valley in the central region. Rainfall is low and is confined to the winter months, so that most production depends on irrigation. Wheat, oats, barley, corn, beans, sunflowers, rapeseed and a wide range of vegetables and fruits make up the varied field crops.

The landscape and agriculture of central Argentina is suggestive in many ways of the flat prairie regions of western Canada. As in Chile, contrast occurs but not as great. Agriculture appears to be better developed than in Chile, says Dr. Putt.

Dr. Putt has a selection of snapshots which will illustrate his talk. The program is produced by Gren Bates of CBC Winnipeg.

CBC Revenues

Last year the CBC spent 90 million dollars to maintain the national broadcasting service. Over 40 per cent of that money came from commercial sources and just under 60 per cent from public funds. The cost in public dollars was \$52 million; in commercial dollars, \$38 million.

On Festival '61

Drawing Room Wit Returns

WHAT EVER HAPPENED to scintillating conversation in the living room? The witty, vivid, astute, cleverly gossipy or risqué variety with the brilliant turn of phrase that made the salons of a few decades ago such vibrant affairs?

Duelling sites they were, many of them where words were sharpened and driven home with unerring exactitude, where it took exceptional wit to dodge the fire, and intelligence to know when to return it.

Oscar Wilde was one of the keenest duelists, and with few rapier scars to show for his verbal skirmishes in the drawing room. There seemed no one (outside judge and jury) whom he could not charm with his fireworks of words in anecdote, parable and improvisation.

Wilde's well of wit seemed bottomless—sometimes bitter, usually sharp, occasionally sweet. Even on his deathbed, when he was served champagne, he murmured: "Alas, I am dying beyond my means."


While he had no army of gag writers keeping his ammunition coming, he was not reluctant to borrow when it suited his purpose. Often he used to match wits with American painter James McNeil Whistler, whose rapier thrusts kept even Wilde on his toes. Once after Whistler had made some clever remark Wilde told him how much he wished that *he* had said that. Whistler's reply was needle-sharp: "Oh you will, Oscar, you will!"

Hundreds of *bon mots* flocked from his facile tongue:

"Books of poetry by young writers are usually promissory notes that are never met.

"A gentleman is one who never hurts anyone's feelings unintentionally.

"THE GERSHWIN YEARS" LIVE AGAIN

THE WORLD WENT to war in those years; Canadians and Americans gave women the right to vote; they danced the Charleston and shouted "So's your old man!" They drank bathtub gin and wondered if a girl had "It." They made and lost fortunes in the stock market. They stood on bread lines in those years, too, and asked "Brother, can you spare a dime?"

Through all these years people on this continent sang and danced—or just plain listened—to the rhythms and rhapsodies of a small, dark man whose music laughed and cried in tune with the moods of his fellow countrymen. His name was George Gershwin.

It was these years—from 1916, when Gershwin published his first

song, to 1936, when Gershwin died—that can truly be called "The Gershwin Years." And it is these memorable years that will live again, through Gershwin's music, in "The Gershwin Years," a special, 90-minute program, Sunday, Jan. 15.

For "The Gershwin Years," producer Leland Hayward, who was responsible for "The Fabulous Fifties" last season, has assembled a starring cast which includes Richard Rodgers as host, special guest Ethel Merman, Maurice Chevalier, Florence Henderson, Ron Husmann and Julie London. Wrapped in the perennially popular music of Gershwin, they will present a New Year's package of memories

"Murder is always a mistake; one should never do anything that one cannot talk about after dinner.

"Of course, America had often been discovered before Columbus, but it had always been hushed up.

"One should not be too severe on English novels; they are the only relaxation of the intellectually unemployed.

"The world is a stage; but the play is badly cast."

Of course his comedy is artificial—intentionally, refreshingly so, for, as one of Wilde's characters has said, being natural "is such a very difficult pose to keep up." The plots of many of his plays and stories are absurd. But, as he would be sure to point out, so is life.

One of his most amusing short stories is *Lord Arthur Savile's Crime*, a study in frustration in which we can all identify ourselves. It dances with wit and fun-poking at pomposity, and what is nicer than a story where a dragon gets her come-uppance? As always in his farcical situations, Wilde is in complete command, and his sense of humour never gets out of hand.

"Wilde requires a sense of style, and this is what we've aimed at," he says. "I've tried not to make it too artificial. I've seen Wilde's witty plays ruined by too much posturing on the part of actors. The play never takes itself too seriously, but the characters in it do."

"What do you read in my hand?" asks young Lord Arthur Savile.

"Your destiny," replies the reluctant fortune-teller, Mr. Podgers.

"What is the destiny to which I am committed?" insists Lord Arthur.

"Murder!"

And that's what sets the plot off on its hilarious course, as Lord Arthur dutifully sets out to fulfil his destiny *before* marrying the lovely Lady Sybil Merton.

But doing someone in is far more difficult than he first imagines. And not only has he a victim to choose and dispose of, but he has the even more formidable problem of sustaining the barrage of bewildered and increasingly indignant accusations showered on him by his future mother-in-law, Her Grace the Dowager Duchess of Paisley.

The action of the play roams all over the place, from a cafe in Venice to the Thames Embankment and places in between, calling for 12 different sets. And as all of them had to be crammed into a working space of 78 by 68 feet in CBC-TV's Studio 7 in Toronto, this presented quite a problem for designer Robert Lawson.

While the play was being videotaped last summer there was such a conglomeration of sets, equipment, actors (35 of them) and technicians in the studio that frequent traffic jams occurred.

Producer Norman Campbell admits that 12 sets is an unusually large number for a one-hour TV play, but they were all essential to the fast-moving story. They and countless props were all moved into the studio overnight.

for older viewers, and, for younger members of the audience, glimpses of the exciting era in which their parents grew up.

From his vantage point in what is called the "Sights and Sounds Room," composer Richard Rodgers will lead viewers through "The Gershwin Years." Paraphernalia such as player pianos, ostrich feather wraps, beautiful show girls, and theatre posters with the faces of Rudolph Valentino, Gertrude Lawrence and Clara Bow, will assist Rodgers in visualizing that era.

Gershwin's "The Man I Love," one of the composer's most popular songs, will illustrate the pitfalls of the world of show business, a world the composer loved so well. The song, in ragtime tempo, was cut from three successive shows which Gershwin wrote, even though he changed it to "The Gal I Love" at one point in hopes of hearing it sung from a Broadway stage. The song never made Broadway, but it became a hit in the bistros of Paris, and then floated melodically back to the States where it became a pop tune as a slow ballad. The history of "The Man I Love" will be part of "The Gershwin Years."

The vital, early days of Gershwin, when he was a rehearsal pianist in Tin Pan Alley, will be part of the program also, as well as his early songs such as "Tee-Oodle-Um - Bum - Bo," "Katinkitschka," "Mah Jongg" and "Tum on and Tiss Me."

In Gershwin's hit show, "Girl Crazy," Ethel Merman began her fabulous career. After singing "I Got Rhythm" on opening night of that show, Ethel Merman was a star. She'll repeat that performance on "The Gershwin Years," and add her own special touch to a segment of political satire based on songs from Gershwin's "Of Thee I Sing" and "Strike Up the Band."

George Gershwin was in touch with his time. His rapport was not limited to what he saw and heard in America. America was reacting to the intellectual developments in Paris, where Gershwin went to observe. He met such people as Hemingway, Koussevitzky, Stravinsky, Picasso, Pound and Fitzgerald. He reacted with "An American in Paris." Maurice Chevalier was in Paris then, too, and he crooned—for the composer—Gershwin's "I Was So Young, and You Were So Beautiful." Gershwin's Paris sojourn also is part of "The Gershwin Years" which viewers will see on television.

During the 90-minute program, Gershwin's unbounded talent for stringing memorable musical notes together—notes that plead for "Someone To Watch Over Me," admit "I've Got a Crush on You," remember "A Foggy Day," wonder "How Long Has This Been Going On?"—will recall the romantic moments of "The Gershwin Years."

A "Porgy and Bess" ballet will portray Gershwin's greatest musical accomplishment. Always socially conscious, Gershwin wrote "Porgy and Bess"—he called it a "folk opera"—in the 1930's and it stands today as a monument in the American musical theatre.

One thing we didn't—couldn't—do in "The Gershwin Years" was watch television. But now, with television, we will be able to watch "The Gershwin Years" pass musically in review to the melodies of George Gershwin.

On CBC Wednesday Night

A SAMPLING OF CANADIAN MUSIC

IT HAS TAKEN Canadian composers a while to become known and appreciated at home and abroad, but gradually they are building a solid reputation in music-hungry countries for stimulating and often exciting new ideas and forms of expression.

This week *CBC Wednesday Night* offers a sampling from four of our leading composers. A one-hour program will be devoted to the music of Murray Adaskin, Harry Somers, Jean Papineau-Couture, and Godfrey Ridout.

The CBC orchestra will be conducted by Walter Susskind, with pianist Mario Bernardi and harpist Judy Loman as soloists.

The program includes *Serenade Concertante* by Adaskin; *Suite for Harp* by Somers; *Piece Concertante No. 1* by Papineau-Couture; and *Two Etudes* by Godfrey Ridout.

Murray Adaskin has earned his living through music since he was 14. He well remembers his first pair of long trousers, because he got them to play violin with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. A year ago this orchestra paid tribute to its former alumnus with a performance of his urbane and ingenious *Serenade Concertante*, which listeners will hear Wednesday night. Since he began composing about 13 years ago his works have been performed by leading orchestras and on CBC programs.

Adaskin deplores the fact that many composers die before their works are known and respected. "But," he says, "in all my experience with creative artists I have never heard of even one hinting that Canada 'owed him a living.' Rather they feel that they owe something to Canada.

"I say this in spite of the corny jokes made by some thoughtless musicians when they speak of the budding Canadian composer. . . .

"There are a handful of Canadians who courageously perform new works—not for the sake of a first performance but who continue to give second, third and fourth hearings of the same work. A first performance means nothing if the work is then put back on the shelves and the composer's struggles forgotten. . . .

"In my opinion the CBC has been the most influential element, so far, in the development of talented Canadian composers."

Adaskin is a charter member of the Canadian League of Composers. He studied composition with John Weinzwieg and French composer Darius Milhaud. He was born into a distinguished Canadian

musical family. Three of the five brothers became well-known musicians, and all three married musicians or singers, "and," says Adaskin, "it wasn't coincidence that the girls are all good cooks, too."

He studied violin in Toronto with Kathleen Parlow and also with the late Marcel Chailley in Paris. He played with theatre orchestras until 1927, then was musical director of the Empire Theatre stock company until 1930, when he became musical director of the Banff Springs Hotel in Alberta during the summers. It was there he met his wife, soprano Frances James.

He spent his winters playing in radio orchestras in Toronto, and for 10 years was in the first violin section of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. He became musical di-

Distinguished Artists

Top Talent to Perform

IN THE NEXT three months 13 more top Canadian and international singers and instrumentalists will join the ranks of the hundreds of world-famous performers who have appeared over the years in the *Distinguished Artists* series (CBC radio, Tuesday nights).

The recitalist on January 10 will be Ronald Turini, young Montreal pianist and a winner, last May, of the coveted Queen Elisabeth of Belgium International Competition.

Turini is the only pupil of the renowned Vladimir Horowitz. He made his debut on CBC radio, has appeared frequently with the Montreal Symphony, and with various leading orchestras in the States and Europe. He has many interests outside music—is an ardent sportsman, likes to tinker with engines, and collects automotive magazines. He will play Sonata in A major by Scarlatti and Sonata in G minor, opus 22, by Schumann.

rector for Toronto's Royal York Hotel in 1938, and in 1952 was appointed professor of music at the University of Saskatchewan.

Like Adaskin, Harry Somers was born in Toronto and studied under Weinzwieg and Milhaud. He is a pianist of distinction, occasionally giving recitals, but it is as a composer that he is known best.

He studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and 11 years ago spent a year in Paris working with Milhaud on a Canadian Amateur Hockey Association scholarship, and also studied under Robert Schmit in San Francisco.

He began composing when he was 14, but it was not until after two years' service in the RCAF and Canadian Army (1943-45) that he turned actively to composing. He was awarded Royal Conservatory scholarships in composition in 1947 and 1948, and in the symposia of students from conservatories of the eastern United States and Canada inaugurated in 1948, his work was regarded as a highlight by both conductors and fellow students.

Since then his compositions have been heard in nearly every corner of the world (frequently in CBC broadcasts) and have covered every phase of musical expression, from song to chamber music, ballet, opera and symphony.

Three years ago he won the \$1,000 Canadian Composers competition sponsored by the Junior Committee of the Montreal Symphony.

A few seasons ago Somers met American conductor Howard Shanet at the Tanglewood Music Festival in the Berkshires. The conductor was so impressed by the young composer that he asked to see some of his work and chose a *Passacaglia and Fugue* (written in 1954) for performance last March by an all-professional New York orchestra, before an unusually musically adventurous audience.

The occasion was a program in the *Music in the Making* series of contemporary works being pre-

sented in the great hall of historic Cooper Union.

This was the first New York performance of a Somers work, and it was a great success. Said critic Elmer Wiener: "He writes with a flair and feeling for the dramatic. Unlike many present-day composers, he knows how to write and tune, and he also knows how to embellish it in an effective orchestral dress. . . . He is a sound craftsman and injects pungency into his music that makes it readily acceptable to an audience."

Jean Papineau-Couture is on the staff of the Quebec Provincial Conservatory and he is head of the music department at the University of Montreal.

A native Montrealer, he began piano study at seven and won numerous prizes before going to the New England Conservatory on a Quebec Government scholarship at the age of 24, where he studied composition with Quincy Porter and piano with Beveridge Webster. Then he studied for two years in Boston with Nadia Boulanger.

Since returning to Montreal he has devoted all his time to teaching and composing, and has a great many compositions to his credit, several of which the CBC has premiered.

He is president of the Canadian League of Composers and of the Montreal section of the Jeunesses Musicales, and is a member of the Canadian Music Council.

Godfrey Ridout lectures in the music department of the University of Toronto. Many of his works

have made their debut on CBC networks, the most recent of which have been *The Dance*, premiered this fall on CBC-TV's *Junior Magazine*, and *Music for a Young Prince*, a 20-minute suite in four parts which CBC Wednesday Night commissioned and presented in June, 1959, as a musical welcome for Queen Elizabeth on her visit to Canada.

Seven years ago the CBC commissioned his *Coronation Ode* for chorus and orchestra for presentation on radio shortly before Queen Elizabeth was crowned. The *Two Etudes* to be heard this Wednesday were composed for and first played by an orchestra conducted by Harold Sumberg in 1945, and Sir Ernest MacMillan conducted them during his tour of Brazil in 1946.

"The composer" Ridout says, "must realize that he needs the CBC more than the CBC needs him. Until the time comes when the listener craves to hear Canadian music and the composer writes music intelligible and convincing enough to cause such a craving, he had best count his blessings and be grateful to the CBC for what it has already done."

Ridout studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto with such outstanding men as Ettore Mazzoleni, Charles Peaker and Healey Willan. He has written many dozen background scores for radio and television plays and for National Film Board productions. He is also widely known as a conductor and authority on Gilbert and Sullivan light operas.

enviable position of having so many contract offers that he couldn't possibly accept them all.

Canadian pianist Margaret Ann Ireland, who took Russia by storm on a concert tour last spring, will be heard February 28.

The reaction in Leningrad was typical of her reception all over the country. She had to give five encores, after which the audience stampeded onto the stage, and she took bows again and again until the lights had to be turned off to discourage her enthusiastic audience.

Miss Ireland accumulated so much new Russian music that she couldn't take it on the plane with her, and it had to follow by sea. It was her fifth European tour. She made her debut with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra at 16, and has since performed all over North America, as well as abroad. When not on tour she keeps house in Saint John, N.B., for her two small children and her lawyer husband.

Toronto violinist Albert Pratz, one of Canada's leading musicians, will be the *Distinguished Artist* on March 7. He will give the première performance of a sonata by Samuel Dolin.

An active performer for 37 years (concert master of the CBC Symphony Orchestra for seven of them) he has played under such

masters as Mitropoulos, Monteux, Cantelli and Ansermet in European and North American tours and under Toscanini in an eight-year engagement with the NBC Symphony. For several years he has been conductor and soloist in the CBC radio series *Stardust*, heard Sunday nights at 9:30 p.m. on the Dominion network.

Young Canadian baritone John Boyden, who has given recitals throughout Eastern Canada and England, will be the March 14 recitalist, accompanied by John Newmark. Boyden grew up in Stratford, Ontario, then spent two years at the Royal Academy of Music in England, and he has studied under a Canada Council grant and a Stratford Shakespearean Festival scholarship. He has appeared with the CBC Symphony and other leading orchestras.

Two Vancouver musicians will be heard next. Organist Hugh McLean will be the March 21 performer. Born in Winnipeg, he studied on scholarship at the Royal College of Music—piano with the late British pianist-composer Arthur Benjamin, and organ with Sir William Harris, organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

In 1951, on another scholarship, he studied at King's College, Cam-

bridge, from which he was graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree, and he is also a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists. He is particularly interested in 17th-century organ music, and collects old music manuscripts.

Arthur Polson, the March 28 recitalist, began to study the violin when he was four, using a small instrument which his father carved out of pine with a jackknife. glican churches. The historical part of the program is presented with a clever use of graphics and still shots, so the viewer is scarcely aware that he is not watching a moving scene.

The author of the script, John Lucarotti, has interpreted the Last Supper along the lines suggested by a famous liturgical scholar, Dom Gregory Dix. Freeland points out that "viewers should not conclude that the Last Supper could only have happened in the way the script says. Dix's line was that it was not a Passover meal, but equally reputable scholars say it was. I think this program is probably the most theological of the whole series, and I feel it is a strong piece of ecumenical TV." One of the interesting things about it is that it shows the different physical ways communion is received in several traditions, as well as explaining its spiritual meaning in each case.

What is a nuclear laboratory doing on the campus of a Baptist university that is noted for its divinity faculty? That's the question the February 5 program sets out to answer. It expresses the conviction that all knowledge is a suitable field for the Christian to explore. The story concerns a retired Dean who returns to McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, for the opening of an atomic reactor. He begins to look back on his own student and teaching days, and comes to see that it is right that on one campus the same people should be building a chapel to the glory of God and a nuclear reactor to help unlock the secrets of God's universe.

The Changing House of God on February 12 is set in a strikingly modern Roman Catholic Church in Toronto. The church is round, with the altar in the centre. The visit to the church is the springboard

for an examination of the trends in architecture and worship which are giving new expression to the ever-constant faith.

On February 19 *Appointment With a Bishop* offers those whose church tradition does not include bishops an understanding of the status and function of a bishop in the Anglican communion. Appearing as himself is the Right Rev. Ernest Reed, Bishop of Ottawa, "who," says Freeland, "never acted in his life until he made this program. At the end of the videotaping everyone in the production was wondering what the ecclesiastical equivalent of an Oscar was, because he deserved one."

The story concerns a student in second year journalism at Carlton University, Ottawa, who visits Bishop Reed on a class assignment, and through the Bishop's eyes gets an insight into the pastoral and administration work of a Bishop. Bishop Reed's own study was duplicated exactly on the studio set, even down to the particular type of grate he has in his fireplace, which intrigued him enormously.

The Lutheran confirmation is noted for the prolonged and intensive training its young people undergo beforehand. The quiet and penetrating script on February 26 shows a Lutheran minister during the actual confirmation ceremony. In a series of flashbacks he sees the communicants class as it first assembled — some there because their parents made them come, others with a glib, memorized answer to any of his questions. Through his eyes viewers see how they developed and reached a lively faith.

Youth in Search of Meaning on March 4th shows young people looking for an answer to their problems, spiritual and temporal. Freeland says "it points up the type of answer the church must

avoid giving, and shows how it can help youth to make the eternal answer their personal possession."

A program about the Mennonites, filmed in the Kitchener area, will be seen March 12. Without any patronizing it examines the convictions of the Mennonites and lets viewers see a way of life that is part of our Canadian heritage, but which most people know very little about.

A program dealing with the first and probably the best loved of hymn books, *The Psalms*, will be seen March 19. It will trace the use of the Psalms by the Christian church through the centuries, and will end with psalms played by a jazz combo.

Andrew Allan has written a sophisticated script for the March 26 program, called *The Weekenders*, which examines the retreat movement in the Roman Catholic Church. It was filmed at the Retreat House at Mary Lake in the suburbs of Toronto, where Allan made a weekend retreat and visited several times. "You will see," Freeland says, "that this program pictures people as they really are, not as we imagine them to be."

The series ends April 2 with *The Lay Ferment*, a program dealing with another expression of the retreat movement — weekend conferences for laymen, organized by the United Church of Canada. Men who attend take their spiritual temperature there and through group discussions see how faith can be applied to business. The story concerns a high-pressure salesman who thinks he can get an inside line on the big fish, he's trying to land, by attending a conference with him. But before the weekend is over he has had a good look at himself and is shocked by what he sees. "We believe he'll get the account," says Freeland, "but not in the way he thought he would."

MAT'S ORANGE CAKE

½ cup butter
1¼ cups sugar
2 eggs
Rind of 1 orange
2 cups sifted cake flour
2 tsp. baking powder
½ tsp. salt
½ cup salad cream
½ cup milk

Sift flour. Measure. Sift together with baking powder and salt. Mix milk and salad cream. Add soda. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs. Beat again. Add orange rind and alternate liquid and flour folding in each addition. Put into 8" or 9" layer pans and bake in a 350-degree oven for 25 minutes.

Filling:

1 chocolate custard pudding
2 tbsp. rum flavouring

Fill layers of cake. Beat up 6 egg whites until they hold a peak. Add ½ cup sugar gradually. Spread on cake. Place in 450-degree oven for 5 minutes. While hot, beat brandy and throw over cake. (Put cake on wooden board to bake).

Neil Harris to Blame
