Dream Along With Me

From clipping hair to clipping coupons summarizes the career of one-time barber Perry Como, who has risen to the top slot in the entertainment world after beginning with musical haircuts in a small mining town

PERRY COMO, who has achieved about as much success and popularity as any performer ever could wish for, remains a well-adjusted man with down-to-earth values.

The singer-star-host of "Perry Como's Kraft Music Hall" is equally popular with youngsters, teen-agers and adults of both sexes though he makes no special effort to please any particular group. This effortless approach is enhanced by a personal charm and vocal skill which have been among Como's attributes for more than 25 years.

Entering middle-age, Como's close-cropped and formerly all-black hair is sprouting grey. But he refuses to do anything about it.

"They wanted me to paint out the grey for television," Como said and then quipped, "but I can't stand the smell. Besides," he continued, "who am I trying to fool?"

Though Como was not a boy wonder who became an overnight success, he made a phenomenal rise to fame, from a barber's chair in his own shop in 1933, to a hit record, "Till the End of Time," that sold over a million copies in 1945, and to his continued popularity on TV.

Como was born May 18, 1912, to Pietro and Lucia Como in Canonsburg, Pa. At the age of 14 he became an apprentice barber in the small mining town and in a year had his own after-school barber shop, which featured songs by the barber in addition to haircuts and shaves. After graduating from high school, Perry moved into a growing business, added two assistants and made a nice net profit every week.

He unwittingly changed his career during a two-week vacation in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1933. As a concession to the urgings of his friends, he auditioned for Freddy Carlone's band—a popular Ohio group. The change began a few weeks later when, to Perry's surprise, he received an offer from Carlone as a vocalist with the band to the tune of \$28 a week.

It was a difficult choice for the young barber, who thought of the nation's desperate depression, the vagaries of glamorous show business and the quiet security of his barber shop. Besides, on July 31, 1933, he had married his childhood sweetheart, Roselle Belline. But

"New Generation" Plays on Festival '61

MONDAY NIGHT CBC-TV's *Festival '61* presents the North American television premieres of two one-act plays by two "new generation" playwrights: *The Dumb Waiter* by Harold Pinter, who is English, and *The Zoo Story* by Edward Albee, who is American.

Pinter has been on the theatrical scene for only about three years, but has established himself as an expert on the sinister, and writes, says one critic, with "a special brand of muted horror at the beastliness of being alive at all. The effect of his plays is to make the audience feel a good deal older and very tired; to pick up its hat from under the seat at the end with no certainty of what it will find when it digs into the darkness; and at the same time to dissolve into anxious laughter at the extravagant realism of Mr. Pinter's natural eccentricity."

The Zoo Story is Albee's first play, and it was first performed in Berlin, on the same bill with Samuel Beckett's *Krapp's Last Tape*. Its author says the only reason for the German premiere was that a German producer was the first to like the play well enough to produce it. Albee's illuminating, pithy dialogue had the critics' approval when *The Zoo Story* played all over Germany, and its various performances in the States have been highly successful.

Romantic Myth

"In the eighteenth century a lively exchange between the artist and his public was still taken for granted. Hogarth laughed at poets who lived in garrets and pursued their fancies; he ridiculed musicians enraged by the popular music of the streets. The true artist was in contact with his public. The Romantics, however, introduced the fable that the poet dreaming in his garret, who writes only as the spirit moves him, is an image of the true poet; and although we know that the image is largely false, it still lingers in our imagination." — *Edgar Wind, Professor of the History of Art in the University of Oxford and Fellow of Trinity College, in his BBC Reith Lectures on 'Art and Anarchy'.*

WHEN YOU SEE *Riel* on G.M. Presents next April, you can be sure that, besides having considerable dramatic impact, the play will be authentic to the minute detail. Producer George McCowan, noted as a relentless perfectionist, recently spent several days in Winnipeg, searching through historical records in the provincial archives, the museums, and the Archbishop's Palace in St. Boniface. He was checking details in the script, and gathering background information about the leader of the rebellion that churned Western Canada into a turmoil during the pioneer era.

The play will be presented in two 60-minute parts, on consecutive weeks. The first part concerns the Red River uprising, and the second, Riel's return to Saskatchewan, his trial and his execution.

Written 12 years ago by John Coulter, "Riel" has been produced successfully in Toronto and London, and was broadcast on CBC Wednesday Night.

George McCowan has been responsible for such successful plays in the G.M. Presents series as *The Big Deal*, *Slipknot*, *Collision*, *The Virtuous Island*, and *Wind From the South*. For *First Person*, he has produced *Venice Libretto*, and *The Heroes*, and in the field of legitimate theatre, he has also been very active; at Stratford, he produced *Henry IV, Part I*, three years ago, *Othello* in 1959, and the contemporary Canadian play, *Blind Man's Bluff*, last year.

WHATEVER HAPPENED to the Gypsies? Canada now has only 400 of the nomads, a small percentage of the 2,000,000 estimated to inhabit the roadways of the world. On *Soundings* Thursday, March 9 (CBC Radio) many of this country's Gypsies will be interviewed, and their rich background of music and folklore will be explored. Some of the reasons for their diminishing numbers will be brought to light, as well.

THE CBC AND television viewers, too, are wishing the best to noted interviewer and personality Joyce Davidson, who is leaving Canada after five years of network telecasting to do a series of programs for Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. in New York.

PROBABLY NOTHING is more encouraging to a young musician than hearing other young artists who have made good telling about themselves and their careers, and demonstrating the technique that brought them success.

That's why CBC-TV's *Junior Magazine* presents a special program every few weeks in which young viewers have a chance to compare their own progress, ambitions, outlook, and opportunities with those of two youthful concert artists.

Guests Saturday, March 11 will be Arthur Ozolins, German-born Toronto pianist just turned 15, for whom a brilliant future is predicted, and Hyman Bress of Montreal, 29-year-old South Africa-born violinist who has made a name for himself in concerts on both sides of the Atlantic.

Arthur Ozolins is a clear-eyed, rosy-cheeked lad with a big grin and enquiring young mind. Born in Lubeck, Germany, of Latvian parents from Riga, he moved with his family to Buenos Aires when he was three, where he was soon fluent in Spanish as well as German and Latvian. Now his English, too, though accented, is fast, idiomatic, and sometimes rather quaint.

His mother, a pianist, died in 1952. When he was seven, Arthur began to study music with his maternal grandmother (who was also a pianist and had emigrated with them), and took to the piano like a duck to water. But two years later his musical education came to a halt when he was sent to a seminary where there was no piano and no interest in music.

After three years there, he and his father and older brother moved to Toronto, where Arthur began to make up for lost time at the piano. He took his Grade 10 exams at the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto and got the highest marks (an average of 97), won a \$500 scholarship and another of the same amount this year.

Walter Susskind, permanent con-

ductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, auditioned Arthur for a TSO children's concert 18 months ago and was so impressed with his ability that he began talking of him. Arthur soon was booked for an appearance at the Stratford Festival with the National Youth Orchestra last summer, for CBC appearances (two on *Music in Miniature* on TV, on CBC radio's *Sunday Morning Recital* and *CBC Talent Festival* last December), and for recitals around Ontario. On February 28 he made his first major appearance as a soloist, with the Toronto Symphony in a school concert, playing *Variations on a Nursery Rhyme* by Dohnanyi, which he will also play on *Junior Magazine*, along with *Toccata*, opus 11, by Prokofieff.

Susskind describes Arthur as "an outstanding and exceptionally gifted boy, with great musical feel-

ing and technical ability far beyond his years. I think it's not only possible but probable that he will reach the top. Of course the competition will be keen—there are so many good pianists—but Arthur is something special."

Arthur is an ingenious lad. He can't practice at home, so, says his teacher, Jacques Abram, "he scurries all over the city like a Mad Hatter, looking for idle pianos. Often he can find one at the Conservatory, but if not he tries the CBC, the Heintzman Company and other music stores.

When his Grade 10 classes are through at Jarvis Collegiate every afternoon at four, he puts in three or four hours of practice, then goes home and spends the late evening tuning the second-hand pianos his father (who practiced law in Europe) re-conditions for sale. To save car fare Arthur does all this travelling about the city on foot, loping along through all kinds







centration on music. He goes to school dances occasionally, but, he told us firmly, "just to watch."

"During the summer holidays," he says, "I study at the Conservatory and practice and practice. I'd like to go to camp if I had the chance."

Hyman Bress held his first violin when he was six, and made his debut three years later with the Capetown Municipal Orchestra.

In his early teens he won a five-year scholarship to the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. To make it possible for him to accept, the people of Capetown started a fund to cover his living expenses in the States.

By the time he graduated in 1951 his parents had settled in Montreal, where he joined them and began taking an active part in Canadian musical life—concerts, recitals, broadcasts. He became concert master of the Montreal Symphony and, more recently, leader of the Montreal String Quartet.

Bress tells us that he strongly recommends the discipline of group work for any young artist contemplating a solo career. In 1957 he won both the Heifetz Prize and the Concert Artists' Guild Award, which included a debut at New York's Town Hall. He has given two Town Hall recitals this winter, in which he has used a new technique: having the pages of the score projected on a giant screen behind him onstage as he plays, so the audience can follow along and, as he says, be convinced that "they are not being hoodwinked and that the artist is not getting away with murder."

Bress left the Montreal Symphony a couple of years ago to devote more time to concert work. His tours have taken him to London, Berlin, Vienna, Paris, and through North America, and he leaves soon on another European tour. In the summer he often takes part in the various music festivals around Montreal—Otter Lake, Mt. Orford, etc., and hopes to organize a festival in Ottawa soon.

Today, a space ship comes across orbiting pieces of metal of mysterious origin. Colonel McCauley is sent on a mission to recover samples for investigation.


The "Brains" Behind Huckleberry And Quick-Draw

Who'll Win the 'Hockey War'?

Like the Olympics, the World Amateur Hockey Tournament has become another scene of East-West struggle to prove the superiority of one way of life over the other. Deplorable as this international tension is, it has created new interest in the tournament, no longer solely dominated by Canada. The CBC Dominion Network will take Canadians to the playoffs this week, March 6 to 11, with broadcasts carried by the CBC's private station facilities

Canadians playing the Russians. All the Toronto team needed was a tie to win the title.

The result, however, stunned Canadian fans both in Europe and across this country. The Russians walloped Lyndhursts 7-2 and for days headlines across Canada bore the sad news and reasons for the defeat.

Reports of the World Amateur Hockey Tournament will be carried on CBW, CBK and CBX 6:45 p.m. Wednesday; on Saturday at 6:45 p.m. on CBW and 12:30 noon on CBK and CBX.

Compared to the days before 1954 when little attention was given the world tournaments, this year's championship, to be held at Geneva and Lausanne, Switzerland, March 2 to 12, will attract the attention of many Canadians. Twenty nations will compete and Canada will play seven games.

The Trail Smoke Eaters, who will represent Canada this year, are made up mostly of players in the Western International and Okanagan Senior leagues in British Columbia. The Smoke Eaters were runners-up to Chatham Maroons in Canadian senior hockey last spring. They lost to the Maroons in five games for the Canadian championship but got the European trip because the Maroons chose an exhibition tour of Russia and Sweden last November instead of the world tournament.

In the 1960-61 WIHL season, the Smoke Eaters won 28 of 32 games and outscored the opposition 224-99 before leaving for Europe less than a month ago.

UNTIL 1954 CANADIANS seldom bothered to get excited about the annual world amateur hockey tournaments. Usually, Canada's representatives would attend the events, soundly trounce the opposition and then return home with little fanfare.

But that was all changed in 1954 when Toronto East York Lyndhursts, as the Canadian team, went to the championships at Stock-

holm. That year was the first time a Russian team had been entered in the tournament and the Soviets were considered to be a powerful club by European standards. Canada, however, continued to be odds-on favourites to win the title.

Lyndhursts won their first six games while Russia won five and tied Sweden in another, thus setting the scene for the final game in the tournament which had the

Project '61

Four Midgets Among Nations

IN A WORLD racked by strife there are four small European countries which are free of such mundane problems as military forces and foreign alliances. They are Liechtenstein, San Marino, Monaco and Andorra, the four smallest countries in Europe.

Tony Thomas and Jed Adams, Toronto freelance broadcasters, made a tour of these four countries last fall. Their recollections and observances of this journey will be heard Sunday on CBC radio's *Project '61*. The program, entitled *The Little Four*, will be broadcast on CBC Trans-Canada.

"We made the tour as a deliberation to find out if the countries are

anything more than a convenience for tax-evading corporations and sanctuaries for off-beat cosmopolitans," says Thomas.

"If we started out with the tongue-in-cheek attitude, we returned with the tongues slightly scared. There is a kind of happy insignificance.

"It seems that last October, the heads of state from San Marino, Liechtenstein, Monaco and Andorra called a summit conference. These titans gathered in the breakfast room of a motel in Liechtenstein and thrashed out their problems: those of producing more attractive

"The Pause That Depresses"

"MENOPAUSE, or the change if that's what you're determined to call it, begins at 45, but, believe me, life begins at 50," is the advice the late Dr. Marion Hilliard used to hand out.

When an unmarried career girl once complained bitterly to Dr. Hilliard, Canada's best-known woman doctor, that life had passed her by and it wasn't fair, Dr. Hilliard, a spinster all her life, passed on her own personal philosophy of inevitability:

"Live happily and vigorously with what you've got; accept with courage and good humour what you haven't got. Then, you'll see that life comes back into focus at 40, and once the menopause is over, you'll feel wonderful."

Dr. Hilliard used to tell her patients that many of the hazards of the menopause would be cut to a minimum if every woman was well equipped with information about what to expect and how to protect herself.

"The modern woman, the same girl who can tell you when the second-year molars are formed in a foetus or the psychiatric terms for submerged memory, has surmounted the inevitable process of menopause with doom and gloom," advised Dr. Hilliard. "She nervously refers to it by a phrase seemingly drummed up in some voodoo seance—"the change'."

Because the menopause is a natural thing which happens to all women, it is a common subject of interest. For this reason, *Trans-Canada Matinee* is presenting a special 30-minute discussion on the menopause. It will be heard this Thursday on Trans-Canada radio.

"Menopause is a subject surrounded by virulent old wives' tales," says Helen Carscallen, program organizer for *Trans-Canada Matinee*. "We aim to throw light on the subject and what it can mean to women by asking two

women who have just experienced the 'change of life' to question three doctors and a psychiatrist about it."

The panelists will be: Dr. F. S. Hobbs, president of the Canadian Medical Association, British Columbia division; Dr. Josephine Mallek, endocrinologist; Dr. F. E. Bryans, professor of obstetrics, Vancouver General Hospital; Dr. Frank McNair, director of the

Mental Health Centre, Burnaby, B.C.; Mrs. Eileen Laurie, CBC morning commentator, Pacific region; Mrs. Sally Creighton freelance broadcaster and writer.

"The menopause is an unavoidable process of the human female body," explained Dr. Hilliard. "It is the counterpart to adolescence, which introduces a woman to the cycle life of menstruation and fer-

Pestalozzi Village. Most people will have heard of the Pestalozzi Children's Village in Switzerland, but how many of them know that there is also one in Sussex, England? The Village is patterned after the Swiss original and its aim is to help displaced children of all nationalities, most of them from refugee camps in Europe. James McLean visited Britain's Pestalozzi Children's Village, where he talked with the chairman, Dr. H. J. Alexander; warden Eric Bourne; the founder of its Swiss counterpart, Walter Corti; and with one of the children. Mr. McLean is a Canadian freelance broadcaster who was born in Edmonton and now lives near London with his wife and family. (Repeated from Trans-Canada Matinee Feb. 2, 1961.)

Seaweed Scientists. Miss Constance McFarlane is a woman with an unusual occupation — she is the only woman research scientist working with commercial seaweeds in Canada. to deep exhaustion and bursts of energy; she finds herself weeping forlornly because no one understands her. When she is lonely, which happens often, she eats. Her menstrual periods are unpredictable.

"Throw in a few hot flushes and you have the menopause."

Dr. Hilliard had many other thoughts and theories on menopause.

It is sometimes accompanied by some of the most infuriating symptoms a woman can possibly experience. It can rob her of her memory, so that she stops in the midst of introducing her best friends because she has forgotten both their names. It can unexpectedly decrease her normal energy to a point where she doesn't want to do a thing. It can cause such an upheaval of personality that a serene and competent woman office manager will turn and scream at a younger woman.

And one of the strangest mysteries of the menopause process is that all these symptoms can disappear overnight and not return again for a week, a month, maybe a year, or maybe never.

The average menopause begins at 45, reaches its peak at 47, and is gone at 50. There are exceptions to this pattern, however. Dr. Hilliard had a patient who started her menopause at 39 and another who ended hers when she was 59.

How does the Canadian team feel about its chances?

"Western Canada teams have never lost a world tournament," says coach Bob Kromm, at 31 the oldest player on the team. "We won't spoil the record.

"We play because we love the game. It takes a lot of time and work to get in condition for such a trip to Europe. But it will be worth it."

This is the second time Trail has represented Canada in the tournament. In 1939 the Smoke Eaters won the title with comparative ease, recording eight wins without a loss and outscoring their opponents 38-1.

Because of the interest in the world tournament, CBC radio will provide comprehensive coverage of this year's championship direct from Geneva and Lausanne. Bill Stephenson and Russ Taylor will be in Switzerland and for five nights, beginning this Monday, will broadcast half-hour reports of the tournament on the Dominion network (private stations only — see list, page 33). On Saturday, March 11, Stephenson will describe the play-by-play action of the Canada-Finland game, on Dominion.

The final game of the tournament, between Russia and Canada, will also be described, live, by Stephenson. It will be heard Sunday on Dominion.

Canada's record in the world tournament is 12 titles in 16 attempts. This country did not take part in the 1953 and 1957 tournaments. The Canadian losses were to the United States in 1933, to Czechoslovakia in 1947 and 1949 and to Russia in 1954.

The world tournament is not held during Olympic years but there is hockey competition in the Olympics and Canada also dominates the list, winning six championships and losing three — to Great Britain in 1936, to Russia in 1956 and to the U.S. last year.

Canadian and Russian teams have met six times in international competition with the count 4-2 for Canada.

Since their first win in 1954 over Canada, the Russians have won only one game, with Canada defeating Kitchener - Waterloo Dutchmen 2-0 in the final game of the 1956 Olympics at Cortina, Italy. The U.S. also beat the Dutchmen that year, 4-1, to take second place in the tournament. Canada finished third.

In the last world tournament, held in 1959 at Prague, Belleville McFarlands beat Russia 3-1 but lost to Czechoslovakia 5-3 in the final game. Canada, however, won the title because, although tied in points with Russia, she had a better goal average.

While the Smoke Easters are confident of winning the championship this year, they don't expect to duplicate the feat performed in 1949 when Sudbury Wolves walloped Denmark 47-0 in a preliminary-round game. In the final round, however, the Wolves finished second behind Czechoslovakia.

named Jean Boyer. Jean Boyer it seems, has saved and saved for years in order to acquire a second-hand car, with which he dreams of becoming an independent taxi driver. The car, of course, is unpaid for! But Jean doesn't mind stretching the dollars . . . until one day his son is badly hurt during a hockey game. Medical and hospital bills pile up . . . the car payments stop . . . and the car dealer threatens repossession. Jean finds himself a prisoner of the dollar world. In this drama, however, are mixed the tender sentiments of love and loyalty from a wife and understanding work companions, which account for the quite unusual ending! Jean Duceppe and Yolande Roy star.

ABDUCTION FROM THE HAREM

Mozart's opera "Abduction from the Seraglio" (L'enlèvement au Sérail) will be featured this week on the Thursday evening Heure du Concert, March 9th at 9:30 p.m. It will star among others, the famous Canadian duet singers, Pierrette Alarie and Léopold Simoneau.

Produced in Vienna in 1782, "Abduction from the Seraglio" preceded Mozart's more famous works by about four years—and was, so to speak, the beginning of his operatic career. The libretto, by Stephanie, was inspired from Bretzner's "Belmont and Constance."

In the plot, Constance, a Spanish lady, has been carried off with her lively English maid, Blonda (Blondine) to the palace of a Turkish Pasha, Selim, who hopes the lady may come to love him. She, however, loves Belmont, whose servant, Pedrillo, loves Blonda. The two men are seeking their opportunity to run off with the ladies.

Belmont (tenor) sings of his love. He cautiously tries Selim's overseer Osmin (bass) but gets little out of the suspicious guardian of the palace. Pedrillo (tenor) in turn is introduced. He has obtained a post under the Pasha, and proposes to get Belmont into the palace under pretence of his being an architect. Now Selim (speaking part) brings in Constance (soprano) asking why she is sad. Belmont is introduced, and Selim welcomes him, but Osmin is doubtful.

In the second act, the maid Blonda (soprano) is wooed, but is not to be won by Osmin. When they have gone out, the Pasha, becoming impatient, threatens Constance with torture if

she will not marry him. Once more the stage is clear, and Pedrillo whispers to Blonda of a midnight rescue. After several airs have been sung, Pedrillo proceeds to make Osmin drunk and packs him off to bed, leaving the stage for the two pairs of lovers, who join in a quartet.

Beginning of Act III: Belmont and Pedrillo appear ready for the escape. As Constance is about to flee with Blonda, Osmin, who has been warned by a Negro mute, intercepts them, and in a scene of excitement, guards arrest the two pair of lovers. Osmin sings a song of triumph.

The next scene takes us back before the Pasha, where the lovers have been carried. Selim, finding that Belmont is the son of his bitter enemy, sentences him to torture. The lovers' grief, however, moves him to relent. He magnanimously declares that he will not treat an enemy of his as he was treated by Belmont's father; and so he sets the four lovers free. In the finale, the lovers sing the Pasha's praises, while Osmin grumbles at his clemency.

The production, staged by Jacques Létourneau, will star Pierrette Alarie in the role of Constance, with Marguerite Gignac as Blondine, Léopold Simoneau as Belmonte, Jean-Louis Pellerin as Pedrillo, Jan Rubes as Osmin, and George Bloomfield as Pasha Selim. Producer is Roland Leduc, who will conduct the orchestra.

It is interesting to note that Léopold Simoneau, Pierrette Alarie and Jan Rubes are three international celebrities; the two former being the regular Mozart singers at the Salzburg and Aix-en-Provence opera houses; the latter having made numerous appearances in Germany as Osmin.

postage stamps and bringing more tourists into their countries."

Liechtenstein, wedged in the Alps between Switzerland and Austria, has an area of only 59 square miles and a population of about 15,000. The chief occupations are agricultural, including vine cultivation. The state has a constitutional monarchy, with a legislative assembly of 15 members, elected by universal suffrage. The prince and princess, unpaid monarchs, live in an old castle, atop a cliff right behind Vaduz, the capital city.

Monaco is, of course, most famous to North Americans because of the storybook marriage between Prince Rainier, the only absolute monarch in the western world, and Grace Patricia Kelly of Philadelphia in 1956. But Monaco is also the smallest state in the world, being about two miles long and from 150 to 1,000 yards wide. It has an area of about 375 acres and a population of about 20,000. It is located near the Franco-Italian border on the southern coast of France.

Andorra is the biggest of the four countries. It has 199 square miles as far as can be determined. The Andorrans, apparently, are not entirely sure about anything.

This national insouciance toward facts, figures, loyalties, administration, business practises and foreign policy is brought about by 700 years of not knowing in which direction to turn — toward France or Spain. Andorra comes under the joint protection of both countries, but as Thomas observed, it is the kind of protection received by a child whose parents have separated and both left the child's interests in the hands of the other.

This lack of interest from the French and the Spaniards, however, gives the Andorrans their

formula for living—a freedom from many of the restrictions which hamstring some of the better organized nations.

"Due to the glorious fact that Andorra has no taxation on imports and exports, it has become a large-scale, cut-price super market," says Thomas.

Andorra is permanently neutral and its citizens are not liable to military service. It is located in the central Pyrenees between the French departments of Aiege and Pyrenees-Orientals on the north and east. It has a population of about 5,000.

San Marino is also an independent republic, situated wholly within peninsular Italy about seven miles southwest of Rimini on the Adriatic Sea. The area is 38 square miles with a population of approximately 13,000.

Agriculture is the principal occupation. Wheat, maize, vines, mulberries, fodder and fruits are the chief crops and cattle and pigs are reared. The needs of the republic in wheat are met by local production.

Perry's parents persuaded him to make the change when they reasoned that he could always return to barbering if the singing business failed—and Perry was on his way.

Early in 1936, after two years with Carlone, the singer joined the Ted Weems band—at a staggering \$50 a week. With Weems, Perry began the gruelling grind of cross-country one-night stands and marked his first tentative steps toward the top. He made his radio debut, had his name listed on record labels as "vocalist" and played Broadway's presentation houses.


The Weems group broke up in 1942 and the singer, weary of travelling and ready to return to a barber shop, was happy for the excuse to return to Canonsburg where his wife had remained since the birth of their son Ronnie in 1940.

Perry refused deals from various booking agents and managers and was negotiating a lease for a new shop when General Artists Corporation made him an offer which he had to consider—a sustaining network radio show at \$100 a week, nightclub bookings and an RCA Victor recording contract, which would make him a solo singer and not a front for a band.

The barber resumed work as a singer, stopped the show nightly at New York's Versailles and Copacabana nightclubs and caused traffic jams in Times Square when he played the Paramount Theatre. Perry's first RCA Victor record, "Goodbye Sue," was cut in 1943. Two years later he made his first big hit, "Till the End of Time," one of 11 Como discs which have topped the million sales mark.

Hollywood beckoned in 1944 and Perry made "Something for the Boys" with Vivian Blaine, Phil Silvers and the late Carmen Miranda. Other Como films included "Doll Face," "If I'm Lucky" and "Words and Music."

The year 1944 also marked the start of Perry's NBC career when

he became star of "The Chesterfield Supper Club" on NBC Radio. The show continued until 1950 (simulcast on NBC-TV and Radio from 1948-50). Then it became a CBS-TV weekly feature until 1955. During that time Perry also made guest appearances on many NBC-TV shows and in the fall of 1955 started his top-rated NBC-TV Saturday night "Perry Como Show."

In the spring of 1959, Como entered into one of television's most important contracts when he signed a two-year deal to star on the current "Perry Como's Kraft Music Hall" Wednesday night series, which premiered September 30, 1959.

At home in a rambling house at Sands Point, Long Island, N.Y., with Roselle and their three children—Ronnie (20), David (14)

and Terri (13)—Perry is a devoted husband and father, who prefers a quiet suburban life where he can indulge in working in a modest garden or cooking on an outdoor grill.

The 5'9½" tall singing star has dark brown eyes and weighs 165 pounds. His chief hobbies are golf, which he plays as well as a professional, and watching television.
