ISRAEL — Not Yet a Nation

Michael Maclear, writer and commentator for CBC's documentary series, BACKGROUND, recently spent several weeks in Israel preparing the two-part film study that will be seen March 19 and 26. Here he gives his impressions of a country "caught between changing values and changing times"

IN ISRAEL the Jews have created a political state but they have yet to create a nation.

Essentially the problem is one of assimilation; specifically, the type of immigrant Israel is getting.

In the mirror of Israel are the faces of 80 nations, but though broad in range, the population is small in scale, a mere 2,000,000, or about 15 per cent of world Jewry.

Today the 2,000,000 divide equally between occidental and oriental. This also means a division, largely, of skilled and unskilled. And here is the danger — if the qualitative division continues, the Jews in Israel will, ultimately, also divide socially and idealistically.

This is the latest and, as yet, I believe, little known chapter that *Background* explores in the long Jewish struggle for survival. It is a unique chapter because this struggle, world politics and pressures aside, is among the Jews themselves.

In any other fledgling state there would be a simple answer to Israel's problems — selective immigration. But in a country whose unwritten constitution is the Law of Return (the guarantee of admittance to any Jew who wishes to come) the adoption of discriminatory measures would defeat the basic motivation.

The only answer lies in Israel's urgent appeal for the services of the skilled, educated Diaspora Jew to help speed the process of assimilation and to help equate the differences in the time that remains.

It is a matter of urgency for Jewry at large. If the state fails, then so has Jewry outside; each thus depends on the other for its survival.

Background borrows the words of Ecclesiastes, "A Generation Comes" and "A Generation Goes," for the respective titles of its two-part series on Israel, portraying on the one hand the Jew in Israel and on the other his relationship to the Jew outside.

Appropriately, our first glimpse of Israel is that of a shipload of immigrants arriving from Rumania, symbolizing the generation that has come and is still coming to the national homeland. These immigrants are largely uneducated, unskilled, o p p r e s s e d, penniless, lacking knowledge of the state language — Hebrew, lacking often the inner conviction in their faith and future that suffering has bred. They are a generation of the city that must integrate in a land still 60 per cent arid desert, and they must find common cause with a product equally unknown, the native born Israeli or Sabra—young men who in their fight against old ideals are somewhat illogically prejudiced against the newcomer and even more so against the Jews who have stayed away.

The people, their problems, their ideas, their needs, are expressed in their own narrative against the equally changing nature of the country itself, sweeping from Biblical Galilee where past settlers came in a messianic vision, to the Negev, the vast southern desert, where the lonely arduous life is endured not for spiritual values but the opportunity of quick rewards that spell family, home, security; a home above all, and a sense of belonging and possession. The old religious asceticism is giving way to a growing materialism dictated by the changing average of the people themselves. The

The Musical Mind

**Acclaimed TV Series
Now Heard on Radio**

A RADIO ADAPTATION of Helmut Blume's recent Music to See series which was presented by *Explorations* on CBC-TV will begin Tuesday, March 28, on the Trans-Canada network at 9:45 a.m.

The series, to be titled *The Musical Mind*, will be extended from three parts to four, the additional program dealing with the part the music critic plays in the creation of music.

This week's program will deal with the composer. In the following weeks, Blume, an associate professor of music at McGill University and a frequent contributor to CBC radio and television, will also talk about the performer and listener and what their roles are in the writing of musical works.

Herbert Steinhouse is producer and Lew Miller program organizer for the radio series.

**Crucifixion Theme
Good Friday Drama**

The Man Born to be King, originally written for radio by Dorothy L. Sayers, is being produced for television for the first time and will be seen Good Friday on CBC-TV.

The 90-minute program, adapted for TV by Mavor Moore and produced by Norman Campbell, is a dramatization of the events leading up to the Crucifixion.

It is based on the Gospels but spoken in colloquial language. Christ is portrayed by Canadian actor John Colicos.

Chamber Music

Chamber music programs are presented regularly on the CBC's national networks. Examples are the Dirk Keetbaas Players (Wind Quintet) of Winnipeg, the Montreal and Vancouver String Quartets, the Halifax and Baroque Trios.



WHAT CAN WE EXPECT TO see on CBC Television in the future? This week we asked Michael Sadlier, programming director for the English network, this question, and he answered:

More Music. Now that video tape recording is available, more co-operation between the CBC's French and English networks is possible, especially in the production of large-scale musical programs. "Starting this fall," said Mr. Sadlier, "the French and English networks each will produce 26 classical music programs. These will range from opera, to smaller concerts, and even children's concerts. They will be viewed on both networks."

Before the advent of video tape recording, it was not practical to televise programs for both networks, explained the programming director. Live productions would not take place at a suitable time for viewing in all parts of Canada.

One of the first programs to be taped for both networks was the performance of the Peking Opera, shown last fall on the English network, and just recently telecast for French viewers. The Camera Canada production about the Quebec Winter Carnival also was seen on both networks, although French audiences saw a more condensed version.

The chief benefits of the two networks' co-operation, said Mr. Sadlier, will be more music on television, and more elaborate productions than could otherwise be managed.

More Sports. Sports fans can look forward to an exciting two-hour sports package every Saturday afternoon throughout the year, starting on April 8, said Mr. Sadlier. "Included in the sports events to be seen will be the Canadian Triple Crown and the U.S. Triple Crown of horse racing, Major League baseball games, and U.S. National Football League games." Other events to be included: the Rodeo of Champions from Winnipeg; The Football Association Cup Final; and the International Soccer Match between England and Mexico. Once again, plans are being made to broadcast these programs on the French television network as well.

RADIO SERIALS did not vanish with the soap opera's demise—a fact of which the thousands of followers of the daily doings of *The Archers* are well aware. On April 3, another serial will come to the network, written by Winnipeg author Marion Waldman (co-author of the recent television presentation, *Have One on Sam*). The daily 15-minute drama will replace the Dominic Andrews serial on the CBC Trans-Canada Network. Full details were not available at press time, but will be carried in next week's issue. Listen for the full story of *Kapitan's Fortune*, based on a sensational murder.

Her Career Spans Five Decades

The face that inspired immortal lines from the pen of poet Rupert Brooke will appear on CBC Television Monday, March 27, in the FESTIVAL '61 production of "Great Expectations"

SHE WEARS her beauty like a crown, but as comfortably as an old kid glove. Even munching a sandwich hungrily in a CBC can- teen Cathleen Nesbitt looks elegant. She is certainly not the *grande dame* of the theatre you might

expect, judging by her experience. She is eager, her smile beguiling, and her brown eyes are so bright with humour and love of life, so young, that you feel the fine wrinkles inevitable in a woman of 71 are only make-believe, that in a moment she will ship them off and you'll see that the lovely young Irish girl of half a century ago has been there all the time—the girl English poet Rupert Brooke fell in love with at first sight, and wrote those tragically true lines to: "Oh death will find me long before I tire of watching you."

They were engaged in 1915, the year he died of blood poisoning.

We asked her how they met. She puffed at a cigarette quietly for a moment, a soft, faraway look in her eyes, and then she said in her low, velvet voice: "It was all so long ago. We met at a party and liked each other on sight." They were both rather shy — he blond and handsome, she dark and beautiful. They started talking about poetry. A few of his first poems had just been published. She quoted one as being especially lovely, not knowing it was his. He laughed and said: "I see you have excellent taste." So a famous romance began.

"Later," she told us, "he signed a contract with a newspaper to represent it in America and was

HOCKEY HOLDS THE SPOTLIGHT

Hockey fans are in for a feast of entertainment on radio and television for the next two or three weeks, as the CBC brings coverage of all games in the semi-final and final series to decide the winners of the Stanley Cup

ON TUESDAY MARCH 21st Canada's top TV and radio serial, the Stanley Cup hockey playoffs, takes over the nation's screen for a limited run of not less than ten games nor more than twenty-one.

Last season the NHL play-offs commanded the largest one-program television audience ever achieved in Canada, its 7,000,000 eager viewers surpassing the vast numbers which saw last year's Grey Cup Game, (6,000,000) and the Royal Tour, (over 5,000,000).

This year the CBC plans complete TV coverage of both the semi-

final and final series. All semi-final games will be seen live on the network with the telecasts beginning one hour after the opening face-off. Seventh or other deciding games in a semi-final will be televised in their entirety as will every game in the final best-of-seven round. When both A (first versus third) and B (second versus fourth) series semi-finals are played on the same nights, the CBC will select the game to be televised on an alternative basis.

On radio, the Trans-Canada network will broadcast all Saturday night semi-final games plus all deciding games (ones in which a team might be eliminated from the series) from one-half hour after the opening faceoff. All games of the best-of-seven final series will be broadcast in their entirety.

Regardless of whether Montreal finishes first or second, the play-off schedule calls for their first two games on Tuesday, March 21st and Thursday, March 23rd in the Montreal Forum. Their opposition in these televised encounters will be either the Chicago Black Hawks or Detroit Red Wings.

Toronto's first two games will be played in Maple Leaf Gardens and televised to the network on Wednesday, March 22nd and Saturday, March 25th. If Toronto finishes first they will meet Chicago; if the Leafs wind up second, they will meet Detroit.

The third and fourth games in both the A and B series will be played in the American cities on the same nights, Sunday, March 26th and Tuesday, March 28th. One game will be televised on each of these dates but the choice of game will be a last-minute program decision. Further scheduling will depend on the outcome of the

first four contests in each semi-final.

Nothing is certain in sports, but it seems unlikely that the teams will follow last year's script although the semi-finals will probably (Please turn to page 13)





away a year. We wrote back and forth." She has a box of his letters in her New York apartment, including a postcard on which he scribbled one of his last poems: "Safe shall be my going. Secretly armed against all death's endeavour; Safe though all safety's lost; safe where men fall; And, if these poor limbs die, safest of all."

When we met Miss Nesbitt she had been rehearsing steadily for three weeks as special guest star in a two-hour *Festival '61* production of Dickens' *Great Expectations* for CBC-TV. She plays the eccentric Miss Havisham—Monday night. "You have much pleasanter facilities here at the CBC than they have in New York television," she told us, "and you're doing much better things, too. In New York I often rehearse in a big, barn-like place that's used as a dance-hall at night, and when we arrive in the morning the smell of stale beer, smoke and perspiration nearly knocks us cold."

After Miss Nesbitt became an actress her brother Thomas de-

ably feature the same opponents. Last year the Montreal Canadiens won the Stanley Cup with eight straight play-off victories against Chicago and Toronto. The Leafs had defeated Detroit in six games before running into the Montreal road block.

Hockey interest is at a long-time peak now that there seems a possibility that the Montreal Canadiens could be beaten for the first time in six years. The Montrealers, who finished 13 points ahead of the pack in 1959-60, will have to go to the final week-end in a battle for first place this season. They still rate as favorites for Lord Stanley's mug although they're entering the play-offs without Maurice Richard, a clutch-game scorer without equal.

They still have great scoring power, as represented by their team total of 246 goals in 67 games. And they have more than their share of super stars: Geoffrion, at least 49 goals and 93 points (both close to record figures which he may have broken by the time you read this); Beliveau, 37 goals and 55 assists and Dickie Moore, who had 35 goals and 34 assists, despite injuries which reduced his season to 57 games. A fourth trigger man is Henri Richard, who also will finish with over 20 goals for his 1960-61 efforts.

Several of the Canadian's lesser forwards are down in goal production from previous years, a fact which seems to indicate just a little less balance. They're Phil Goyette, Marcel Bonin, Claude Provost, Ralph Backstrom and Donnie Marshall.

The Canadiens are obviously weaker defensively with goaler Jacques Plante giving up the Vezina trophy for the first time in six years. Doug Harvey, at 36 is still considered the game's best defenceman but his supporting cast of Tom Johnson, Jean-Guy Talbot, J. C. Tremblay and Junior Langlois can be matched by the other contenders.

cided he would like to act, too, and she says he was very successful. He came to North America one time as leading man to Ruth Chatterton, and then died suddenly after the First World War.

Miss Nesbitt was educated in Ireland and at Lisieux and the Sorbonne in France, and took her teaching degree at Victoria College, Belfast. "But," she told us, "I wasn't happy about the prospect of teaching. I decided I would rather be an unsuccessful actress than a successful teacher. One's very lucky if one's work is what one likes."

When the family moved to London she enrolled in a drama school and made her professional stage debut in 1910 in *The Cabinet Minister*. Then the Irish Players came to London, and Miss Nesbitt spent every sixpence she could spare for standing room at their performances.

"I knew just about all their plays by heart. One day I was invited to a luncheon party at the home of Lady Gregory—the famous Irish playwright who had just founded the Abbey Theatre—and was terribly excited when I arrived and found all sorts of celebrities there, including Henry James and Mrs. Bernard Shaw—he couldn't come for some reason.

"During lunch the conversation got around to the Irish Players' coming tour of North America. Some of them were worried because they would have to have understudies—in the States, they said, the show must go on if a cast member became ill.

"I had never even heard of understudies, but after lunch I rushed up to Lady Gregory and said: 'I know all your plays by heart. Do let me be an understudy.' 'Can you talk Irish?' she demanded. I assured her I could, having listened to the Irish Players on stage so often, and I was hired."


They sailed for New York in 1911 with Synge's *The Playboy of the Western World* and other Irish dramas. She recalls that some Irish

members of their audiences in New York and Philadelphia rioted because they felt *Playboy* insulted Irish life. They pelted stage and performers with rotten fruit and vegetables. The Schuberts, who were sponsoring the tour, called in hasty police protection, and the publicity didn't do the tour any harm.


Now, 50 years and more than 100 roles later, Miss Nesbitt is as contented in the theatre as she was then, just as busy, and far more secure as one of the stage's most distinguished performers. Her expression is neither anxious nor resigned. In repose she sometimes gives the impression that she is quietly refreshing herself with glances down some of the long, exciting vistas of her memory . . . but not living in the past. She seems to have the capacity for squeezing the greatest possible enjoyment out of all the little things of the present, and looking into the future happily, with all sorts of plans for work and leisure.

She made her screen debut in 1932 in an Edgar Wallace thriller called *The Case of the Frightened Lady*, which she also played on the stage, and in radio and TV. Her best-known films have been *Nicholas Nickleby*, *Three Coins in the Fountain*, and *An Affair to Remember*.

"I hate seeing myself in films," she says. "I'm suddenly conscious of certain angles of myself, and struck with horror. My voice sounds strange to me, too. I always blame it on the mike! I remember one time I was deputized to try to get Shaw to allow the BBC to broadcast his plays. I persuaded him to come and listen to a BBC drama production on a really good set to hear what a fine job they could do. But he said emphatically that he didn't approve of what the microphone did to voices. 'Why, I have the most perfect accent in the world' (Miss Nesbitt related this with an Irish lilt) 'and when I hear myself on the air I always have an Irish brogue.'"

Nursery School Time

Hoppy brings two visitors, a boy and a girl, to the nursery school. They all have fun playing games, and later they have an Easter egg hunt.

Open House

Discovery of a Landscape. Film of the English Lake District, tracing the steps of a long line of poets, artists and travellers who have gained inspiration from the beautiful scenery. The film shows scenes described by many famous poets and painters between the 17th and 19th centuries.

The Ancient Art of Arranging Flowers. Mrs. Victor Murray, who recently spent three months in Japan where she attended the Ikinobo School of Flower Arranging, in Kyoto, talks about the history of the school and demonstrates the skill she acquired there. The school is the oldest of its kind in the world, having had its beginnings in the fourth century.

Two Worlds of Song

A half-hour of songs to reflect Good Friday atmosphere — songs of the old and new worlds. On the first portion will be European songs and folk songs, in a Tudor Hall setting: *In Silent Night, Of Thee I Sing, The Prince of Sleep, Sweet Day, So Cool, and Dvorak's The Fugitive.* The second portion will feature such songs of the new world as *Let Us Break Bread, She's Like the Swallow, Steal Away and The Star,* against a setting of a New England church.

Narrator for the show is Syd Davison. Featured will be the mixed voices of the Cecilia Chamber Choir directed by Leonard Mayoh, accompanied by pianist Peter Hawkins. Mayoh, a baritone, also will take solo parts.

The Face of God

Though there is no description in the Bible of what Christ looked like, numerous artists have recorded their impressions of Him. This program will feature paintings, sculpture, mosaics, drawings and manuscript illustrations of Christ through the ages.

Alan Jarvis, former head of the National Art Gallery in Ottawa, and head of the Society of Art Public-

ations, is commentator. Douglas Rain, stage and television actor, reads background scriptures and poetic excerpts off camera.

Among the artists represented in the graphic study are Rouault, Rembrandt, Bellini, Giotto, Botticelli, Durer, Tintoretto, Michelangelo, Leonardo Da Vinci, Veronese, Van der Weyden, El Greco, Titian, and modern artists Graham Sutherland and Henry Moore.

Narrative is based on the story of the Passion from the Gospels, and prophetic writings from the Old Testament. Illustrating the text will be a mosaic of famous paintings by Flemish, German and Italian masters.


The Man Born to be King

A religious drama by Dorothy Sayers, adapted for television by Mavor Moore. This TV version is based on two of the original 12 dramatic episodes written by Miss Sayers for radio, and first presented by the BBC in England. It dramatizes the events leading up to the arrest of Christ, prior to the Crucifixion. Producer is Norman Campbell.

Cast: Jesus is portrayed by John Colicos; Chris Wiggins is Caiaphas; Peter Brockington plays Judas; William Brydon is Peter; Robin Gammel is John; George Sperdakos is Baruch; Edward Atienza is Annas; Robert Christie plays Shadrach; D r e w Thompson is First Elder; Geoffrey Anderson plays Pilate, and Hilary Vernon is Pilate's wife.



Injuries have hampered the defending champions and could come back to plague them in the playoffs. While they're expected to hit the finals at full strength, a re-injury to Geoffrion, Harvey or Moore could destroy the Canadiens, whose bench strength is not what it once was.

The Toronto Maple Leafs have just completed the regular season

in great fashion. Led by their ageless goal-tender, Johnny Bower, high-scoring Frank Mahovlich, a tough young defence, and a trio of veteran stars playing with all the vitality of rookies, the Leafs have overcome a seemingly endless succession of injuries and battled down to the wire in a game drive for first place.

Three other NHL clubs had given up on Kelly, 33, Olmstead 34, and Stanley 35, but Punch Imlach has coaxed five seasons out of each of the supposed "has-beens." Kelly has a career high of 70 points; Olmstead's 55 points have kept him in the league's top dozen and Stanley earned second

team rating on the first half All-Star selections.

Imlach's crew is a happy blend of age and youth—the youth being supplied by the league's two top rookies, Dave Keon and Bob Nevin and the rough-and-ready defence-team of Bobby Baun and Carl Brewer as well as the game's best left-winger, Frank Mahovlich. It's been a particularly rewarding season for the big "M" and for goalie Johnny Bower, both of whom will earn at least \$2,000 in bonuses for excellence at their respective positions. Bower, with his unorthodox style, seems to break every rule for goaltending, but nevertheless the puck stays out of his net so often he might take home the Vezina trophy for 1960-61.

To top the Canadiens, Toronto must skate with the defending champions and silence the big guns of Geoffrion, Beliveau, Moore and Richard.

The Chicago Black Hawks are the league's tough guys. By far the most penalized team in the NHL, the Hawks play the "rock em" style of game with all their defence-men and most forwards ready and willing to mix it at every opportunity. After 62 games, only six league players had over 100 minutes in penalties and four of the six were Hawks (Pilote, Nesterenko, Fleming and Balfour).

When they're not busy softening up the opposition, the Black Hawks are a fine, young, well-balanced hockey club, led offensively by left-winger Bobby Hull and defensively by the league's most consistent goaler, Glen Hall. Last year's scoring champion, Hull has tapered off somewhat this year.

The club's balance is indicated by the fact that five other forwards finished around the 20 goal mark. They're Stan Mikita, Murray Balfour, Ron Murphy, Ab MacDonald, and Eric Nesterenko. A big disappointment for Chicago has been the play of Eddie Litzenberger, the big winger who has never regained the form he displayed before the tragic death of his wife

in an auto accident late last season.

Defensively the Hawks don't give Hall all the support he might expect although their corps of defencemen is a pretty steady if unspectacular crew. Pierre Pilote, the fiery little 165-lb. Frenchman is their top rushing defenceman, trailing only Doug Harvey in total points by defensive players. Evans, Vasko, St. Laurent, and Arbour complete the large and rugged brigade.

Like all other contenders, the Hawks will have trouble staying with the fast-skating Montrealers and their rough-house tactics will put a strain on penalty-killer deluxe, Earl Balfour.

The Detroit Red Wings are the series dark horse. The Wings copped the fourth and final playoff berth but finished far behind the two Canadian entries. Still they're greatly improved by the addition of ex-Boston veterans Vic Stasiuk and Leo Labine, who'll toughen up the side even if they don't score too many goals. Direct opposites to their relations in Chicago, the Wings are the league's "nice guys." For six consecutive seasons they've finished the 70 game schedule as the NHL's least penalized team.

The Wings' strong points are Gordie Howe, the great goal scorer and play-maker; Gordie Howe, the power play quarterback, and Gordie Howe, the penalty-killer. Behind Gordie Red Wing are two fine forwards, Norm Ullman and Alex Delvecchio, a 20 goal rookie, Howie Glover, a consistent defenceman, Marcel Pronovost, and a much improved one, Pete Goegan and two net-minders. The wandering Hank Bassen is completely unpredictable and Terry Sawchuck, while not the custodian he once was, is still capable of scaling great heights.

It should be terrific hockey with the closest competition in years. It should make for thrilling TV and radio entertainment—and the only safe bet is that neither Boston nor New York will emerge victorious.

E.S.P. - - - Scientific Fact, or Just Imagination?

by HENRY COMOR

March 26, and repeated March 28, PROJECT '61 will present a program on Extra-Sensory Perception and psychic phenomena. Henry Comor, the well-known Toronto actor and writer who prepared the program, here tells how he uncovered the secrecy that enfolds psychic phenomena in Canada

IN RETROSPECT, it seems almost incredible to us now that a mere half-century ago, Albert Einstein's theory of relativity was a novelty, opposed by most of the eminent physicists of the time; that scientists were agreed that nothing smaller than an atom could exist; that spiral nebulae were regarded, not as distant galaxies, but as comparatively close formations of gases; that the universe as a whole was regarded as a machine governed by the laws of Newtonian mechanics (when the bare suggestion of modern probabilism or quantum physics would have been unthinkable); that the human organism itself was considered a clever mechanism of which the mind was merely a physical function; that those who seriously investigated psychic phenomena were smilingly regarded as being well on the wrong side of the lunatic fringe.

But even in this more enlightened age, when men can contemplate the complete destruction of an entire city with one bomb, when a man-made space ship is now more than half-way on its journey to Venus, when engines can be built of such exquisite minuteness that they can only be seen with the aid of a microscope; even in this educated period of man's development, the thought of perception without the use of the

known senses is relegated, in public anyway, to the silly season of

newspaper publishing. If psychic phenomena occur, they occur to somebody else, and better still, in somebody else's country.

When it was decided to produce a Project '61 on psychic phenomena and extra-sensory perception, these thoughts persisted, and although it was felt that the ideal program would deal solely with





Sunday, March 26th at 8:00 p.m., Music-Hall will give way to a 90-minute spectacular marking the end of this year's "Concurs de la Chanson canadienne" — a contest organized each year to provide popular song composers an opportunity to present new works on radio and television. The jury have now decided on the 12 best songs presented during the season, and these will be sung for the first time on television Sunday, by the artists who created them for the radio broadcasts. The winners will receive their prizes, cheques for \$100 to \$1,200 for the first six, and bronze engraved plaques for the next six. 

E.S.P.—SCIENTIFIC FACT?

Canadian phenomena, there was little hope that sufficient material could be gathered. An advertisement was placed in the Personal columns of newspapers from Vancouver to Halifax. The advertisement read:

E.S.P.

Have you experienced psychic phenomena? Has anything happened to you that can only be satisfactorily explained on the basis of telepathy, or extra-sensory perception? If so, please write today to Project '61, CBC, Box 500, Terminal A, Toronto, Ontario.

Something in the region of 75 replies was expected. Half of these would probably be cranks, thought the producers.

What actually happened was that somewhere between 800 and 1,000 people wrote, telephoned or came personally to the CBC in Toronto. Of these, less than 30 were recognizably cranks.

Every type of phenomenon was represented: telepathy, the communication of thoughts without the use of any of the known senses; clairvoyance, the knowledge of events that have taken place in the past or are taking place in the present; psychokinesis, the movement of matter by sole use of the mind; and precognition, knowledge of events which are going to take place in the future.

It was decided that every case-history used in the program would be thoroughly checked; that independent, impartial evidence would be required to validate every story. This, of course, was not possible in all cases, but a great many did have sufficient confirmation to lead to the conclusion that psychic phenomena must occur to more than fifty per cent of the population of Canada.

Here are a few cases chosen at random:

An aeroplane returning to Vancouver from a submarine patrol flight, went into a steep dive, out of control. The joint strength of

both the pilot and co-pilot could not bring the stick back and the crew were convinced that their last moments had arrived. The pilot, in his last few seconds of life, prayed to God and as a last forlorn hope placed a gentle pressure on the stick. Miraculously it came back, the plane straightened up out of its dive, and the crew returned to base safely. At the exact time that these events were happening, the pilot's wife, in Toronto, sat up in bed and called out to her daughter, "Your father is in danger. We must pray for him."

A well-known CBC announcer told a story of his childhood. When all the dishes on the shelves of a Welsh dresser in his home fell to the floor—(he explained that this was almost impossible as there was a retaining ledge on each shelf against which the dishes rested)—his mother said, "My sister is dead." They found out later that she had died at the time the dishes fell to the floor.

A lady dreamed that her son was run over and killed by a truck. The following night she had the same dream, and the next night she dreamed it again. The next morning her son was run over and killed by a truck.

In July of this year, will begin a 13-week half-hour series on the same subject . . . and it is hoped that listeners to *Project '61* who have had experiences of psychic phenomena, and who have not yet written to the Toronto office, will do so.

African Churches in London. Dr. Rosey Pool has taken her tape recorder to churches of different denominations in London where the congregations are mainly Negro. Dr. Pool is Dutch by birth and is now on the staff of London University, where she specializes in American literature and has particularly studied Negro poetry. She returned to London last summer after spending a year in the United States on a Fulbright scholarship. During this time, Dr. Pool visited both the northern and southern United States and lectured at Negro colleges in the South.

At the Drop of a Hat. Michael Flanders needs little introduction as co-author and star, with Donald Swann, of "At the Drop of a Hat," and "after-dinner farrago" which opened in London late in 1956 and has had phenomenal success on both sides of the Atlantic ever since. Mr. Flanders has been confined to a wheel chair since he contracted polio in 1943, when he was in the Royal Navy. The critic of "Punch" has described him as "a bluff naval type wearing a huge Antarctic beard and possessed of a sea-shantyish voice." While "At the Drop of a Hat" was playing in Toronto this month, Flanders took time out to talk to Edna May, the CBC's Morning Commentator in Toronto.

Esteemed Order of the White Rose and other awards were made by Haiti, Liberia, France and the Philippines.

Born in Philadelphia, one of three daughters of a modest family, she early showed signs of her extraordinary musical gifts, singing in the church choir and frequently filling in for an absent soprano, tenor or bass! She has a phenomenal range of voice and timbre.

While still in high school a "Fund for Marian Anderson's Future" was started by the church's congregation. This paid for her first lessons. Scholarships from teachers who recognized her future furthered her study until her debut with the New York Philharmonic Symphony in the late 20s.

Becalmed for a time, she went to Europe on a Rosenwald Fellowship. Her first concert in Berlin in 1930 was a modest success. But her initial tour of Scandinavian countries started a chain of concert successes that led to world fame.

The Finnish composer, Jean Sibelius, in whose studio she sang said gravely: "The roof of my house is too low for your voice." At the Mozarteum in Salzburg, the late Arturo Toscanini went to her and said: "A voice like yours is heard only once in a hundred years."

It was in the mid '30's in Paris that impresario S. Hurok heard her sing for the first time and next day a contract for her return to the U.S. was signed.

Since her return to the U.S. in December 1935 she has appeared in more than 500 cities before a live audience of more than 5,000,000 persons jammed into 1,450

Her biography "My Lord What a Morning" was published in 1956. Miss Anderson married Orpheus H. Fisher, a New York architect, in 1943.

To Revisit "Unknown Country"

"No one knows my country..." wrote Canadian author Bruce Hutchison in a preface to his book about Canada — The Unknown Country — some 20 years ago.

The Unknown Country Revisited, an hour-long documentary in the CBC-TV Camera Canada series, will give Hutchison and television viewers an up-to-date look at their country. It will be seen Sunday, March 26, on the CBC-TV network.

Filed sequences, linked by Hutchison's on-camera commentary, will feature Canadians in many walks of life, and from many parts of Canada. They will express their opinions about present-day Canada, its progress, problems and prospects.

How has Canada and how have Canadians changed since The Unknown Country was written?

This program will attempt to illuminate the Canadian attitude and character as the country faces the prospects of spring, 1961. The outer look and the inner life of Canada will be brought into focus as Canadians view the country's economic, social and cultural life.

ISRAEL – Not Yet a Nation

average Israelite has changed from the old agricultural pioneer fired by Zionist fervor to the postwar refugee driven by pressure to a land where urban and rural development is now interlocked. Thus the Jews of Israel more and more demand a common standard, and the gap between skilled and unskilled creates an immediate pressure. From kibbutz to city life, *Background* portrays the gap and presents the arguments in a country caught between changing values and the changing times.

The classless society of the early years of old Palestine is disappearing, threatening an extreme swing to class distinction. It is there in the face of the Iraqi Jew separated socially and financially from the European cafe clique of Tel Aviv; there in the words of a woman who fled Egypt but whose husband now wants to leave Israel.

Materialism in turn means a rejection of many old religious precepts, again reflecting a conflict of purpose—there in the Jerusalem talmudists who devote a lifetime to a study of the scriptures, there in the impatient crowds packing a Bardot or Munroe movie the moment the enforced Sabbath is over.

Israel is a confused humanity; the army which moulds the citizen and teaches him Hebrew, history and his first skills, the market which is still a babel of different tongues, the mines of Solomon where a watchmaker must adapt or die. This is the Israel of reality, struggling desperately to find a level – not the romanticised concept of Exodus, but a state urgently calling for an awareness and for help on the part of the Jew outside.

These changes are the theme of the second part of this study, "A Generation Goes," symbolizing the absent generation. The fact that the North American Jew represents less than two per cent of Israel's 2,000,000 settlers provokes debate on the meaning and future of Judaism in the Diaspora. Profes-

sors and philosophers, rabbis, political leaders and students both resident and visiting Israel provide a conflict of opinion. The traditional unity of the Jewish people appears to be called into question. Ironically the very existence of the state of Israel – hitherto the unifying motivation – is the reason. Now an established fact, it calls for realism when previously mere idealism would do.

POTATO MUFFINS

- 3 eggs separated
- 1 tbsp. water
- ½ tsp. salt
- 1½ tsp. sugar
- ½ cup potato flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder

Beat egg white, salt and water until stiff, add sugar. Fold in well beaten egg yolks and then flour and baking powder mixture. Place in greased muffin tins and bake in a 375-degree oven for 20 minutes.

SPICED PEACHES

- 1 box frozen peaches
- Juice of ½ lemon
- ½ cup sugar
- 10 cherries (maraschino—cut up)
- ½ tsp. cinnamon
- ⅛ tsp. cloves

Combine all ingredients and cook slowly until thickened. A few walnuts may be added. Serve hot or cold with potato muffins.
