Music Brings Pleasure



The 'Looking Glass World' of a Ballet Dancer

One moment it's a world filled with glamour, the next it's a world of hard reality. CAMERA CANADA explores it Monday

WITH SANDWICHES and sweat they create an image in their looking-glass world. It's always there before them, taunting, beckoning them to a magic world, the only one they want, where muscles and music blend in enchanting, whirling action, where every squeezed toe and penny, every aching leg and supperless night that paid for it seem a small price.

And then, after many dream castles have risen and fallen, the looking-glass world suddenly becomes the real one, and instead of just a mirror looking back there is a sea of faces, and above the music the heady thunder of applause. It's a powerful, unbelievable world for a moment, straight out of a fairy tale, but just as gossamer—for, poof! it's gone as suddenly as it came. The velvet curtains drop over the real world, and the looking glass people take off their false eyelashes, think about their stomachs, and start all over to seek the real world, and win, and lose it again.

These two worlds of ballet dancers, the one of meat-and-potatoes and practice, and the one of tinsel and footlights, are the subject of an hour-long vignette, *The Looking-Glass People*, featuring members of the National Ballet of Canada, to be seen on CBC TV's *Camera Canada* on Monday night, December 10th. Produced and directed by Norman Campbell, it was filmed at the National Ballet School in Toronto, at the company's home base at Toronto's St. Lawrence Market, and on the first leg of a tour last winter. The cameras move freely and often candidly through the everyday world of the company, at rehearsals, in backstage dressing-rooms, and at classes at the School, and also through the magic world of the stage, in scenes from performances of ballets like *The Nutcracker*.

The Company's artistic director, Celia Franca, its prima ballerina, Lois Smith, and other members of the company are seen discussing their art; Miss



Progress in Treating an Ages-Old Scourge

Close-Up examines Sunday the modern treatments that alleviate suffering of many arthritics, making their plight more bearable while scientists press on in search of a cure

DINOSAURS and other vertebrate creatures that roamed the earth long before man arrived had something in common with modern man: they suffered from arthritis.

In ancient Greece, Socrates listed arthritis first among the common diseases of his time. It was so prevalent in Rome that the Emperor Diocletian issued an edict exempting those most severely afflicted from the payment of taxes.

Today, science has begun to make significant headway in the centuries-old war on arthritis. While the ailment is ancient, the scientific quest for its cause, and a method of prevention or cure, is a story of the 20th century.

In the words of Dr. Philip S. Hench, a Nobel Prize-winner: "Greater advances have been made in the last 10 or 20 years than in the preceding 10 centuries." This does not mean that the long-sought "cure" for arthritis has been discovered; but today, a better understanding of the disease has made possible effective treatment whereby the task of preventing disability and rehabilitating the patient can be accomplished successfully in an increasing number of instances.

Arthritis is not a single disease; the term applies to many different disorders that affect the joints. The various types of arthritis differ widely in cause, severity, the degree of disability which may result,

and the type of treatment that may be required. Rheumatoid arthritis, osteo-arthritis, and ankylosing spondylitis (fusion of the joints in the spine and limbs) are some of the common types; others include gout, and non-articular rheumatism such as neuralgia, lumbago, bursitis and fibrositis.

Rheumatoid arthritis usually affects young adults and, according to figures issued by the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society, it strikes women three times as often as men. As with many other diseases, rheumatoid arthritis may be mild, moderate or severe. It may involve any or all of the body's joints, but it most commonly affects fingers, wrists, elbows, knees and feet. Most victims of crippling rheumatoid arthritis, says the Society, are women between 20 and 50 years of age at the time of onset; but even four-month-old infants have been known to suffer from the disease. Ankylosing spondylitis most often attacks men, usually young men.

Only some 30 years ago, most forms of arthritis and rheumatism were thought to be due directly to infections. Now it is believed that this is rarely true, but they do have another common basis: they all affect or inflame connective tissues. These are the substances found in all body structures—holding them together, giving them their shape, strength and elasticity. Much re-

search now centres on the nature of these tissues in an attempt to discover the role connective tissues play in the processes by which the body becomes subject to and protects itself from disease. With the close observation made possible by the development and introduction of the electron microscope, progress is being made in these research projects into the chemical nature and fine structure of connective tissues.

'Met' Opera Broadcasts Return

Grand opera from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York returns this week to CBC Radio. First broadcast is 2:00 p.m. Saturday, December 8.

EVER SINCE LIVE broadcasts from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera in New York began 31 years ago, Canadian listeners coast to coast have been able to enjoy the thrill of fine music, well known or seldom heard, performed by some of the world's leading artists.

Once again the CBC Radio network will relay the Met's Saturday matinee performances to Canadians, beginning with the December 8 twin-bill production of *Cavalleria Rusticana* by Pietro Mascagni, and *I Pagliacci* by Leoncavallo. It will be heard from 2:00 to 5:30 p.m. (approx.).

In *Cavalleria Rusticana* Eileen Farrell will be heard as Santuzza, Rosalind Elias as Lola, and Barry Morell as Turiddu. In *I Pagliacci* Raina Kabaiwanska will be heard as Nedda, Carlo Bergonzi as Canio, and Mario Sereni as Tonio.

Fourteen singers will make their Met debuts this season. Only three of the 21 operas being broadcast were in the schedule last year. Included is the first Met performance (February 16) of Richard Strauss's one-act opera *Ariadne auf Naxos*, with Lisa Della Casa and Roberta Peters in leading roles; and the first Met broadcast of Francesco Cilea's *Adrienne Lecouvreur* (February 9), with renowned Italian soprano Renata Tebaldi singing the title role—her first Met appearance in two seasons. These two operas have been part of the standard repertoire for many years. *Adrienne Lecouvreur* was first heard in 1902, in Milan, and the Strauss opera had its premiere in Stuttgart, Germany, in 1912. Other operas to be broadcast are listed on our back cover.

Once again the host will be Milton Cross, who offers commentary on the operas, outlines their stories, and describes the sets for the radio audience. Cross began his radio career as a ballad singer in Newark, New Jersey, in 1922, and announced classical and popular music on the side. One of his duties was presiding over the microphone between 4:30 and 10:30 p.m. each day. "I would fill in the time by playing the phonograph or the player piano," he recalls. "Sometimes I'd put a song roll on the piano and then dash over to the 'tomato can,' as we called the early microphone, and sing. I even read *Uncle Wiggly* to the kiddies."

As a boy Cross had been so eager to see a "real live" performance at the Met. that he wangled a walk-on role in a performance of *Carmen*, "as one of the marching picadors or matadors, I don't remember which. I tried to listen to the opera from the wings, but was ordered downstairs." Now he sees enough opera to satisfy the most enthusiastic opera buff. He hasn't missed a Saturday matinee at the Met since the radio broadcasts began.

During the two or three intermissions in each broadcast, while the singers are resting and changing costumes, the stage is being re-set for the next act, and the theatre audience is strolling in the lobby or enjoying refreshments in the Louis Sherry Restaurant, the radio audience will as in previous years, be entertained with special intermission features; *Opera News on the Air*, *Opera Quiz*, and, if there is a third intermission, *Biographies in Music*.

RADIO SIGNALS

From Seven Billion Light-Years Away!

A FEW MILES outside Manchester, England, at Jodrell Bank, stands a huge eerie-looking steel monster, with a gigantic ear the size of a football field, suspended 180 feet above the ground between two towers which creep around a circular track. As the monster moves, its ear tilts slowly up or down, listening to the secrets murmured from the the unimaginable distances of outer space. A few years ago it began one of the most awesome adventures of all time: picking up radio signals emitted by the stars millions of years ago.

This great radio telescope is best known for its activities in tracking space probes, satellites and rockets orbiting through cosmic suburbia. But more important is its constant search for radio waves from the depths of space. Recently it reached the farthest into space and time ever attained by man — seven billion light-years away.

A dizzying thought for even sober scientific brains is the possibility of the telescope's establishing radio communication with some of the 100,000 million stars in our galaxy. If only one in a million of them has a planetary system like ours, the laws of chance allow for 100,000 of them being inhabited by some sort of intelligence. A fascinating problem for linguistic philosophers is the question of how the game of correspondence could be worked out between us and the intelligence at the other end of the signal.

This modern scientific wonder at Jodrell Bank, and some of the activities and problems of radio astronomy will be discussed on CBC Radio Tuesday night, December 11, at 10:30 on *Science Review*. Speakers will be Sir Bernard Lovell, director of the Jodrell Bank Experimental Station and Professor of Radio Astronomy at the University of Manchester, and Donald Crowdis of the Nova Scotia Museum of Science.

One of man's principal preoccupations and greatest challenges to his intellect through the ages has been searching for the answer to how the universe began. And some of the answers he has proposed have formed the basis of his art, literature, poetry and, in particular, his religious beliefs.


The first revolution in astronomy came in past centuries with the work of men like Copernicus, Kepler, Galileo, and Newton. Then came the development of radio astronomy, one of the youngest of the sciences. Back in 1931 J. G. Jansky, an American engineer, discovered that radio waves from beyond the solar system were reaching the earth. Astronomers tried to find out where they came from, but had no equipment powerful enough to give them a certain answer.

By a strange twist of fate, it was new techniques developed during wartime work on radar which provided the means. One of the most distinguished wartime radio scientists was Sir Bernard Lovell, who exploited the use of microwaves to give greater precision to aircraft and ship detection and for navigation. After the war he used old army radar equipment to form the nucleus of what developed into the Jodrell Bank Station. With the data it is collecting about the mysteries of and beyond the stars, scientists may soon be able to speak with more confidence about the origin of the universe.

"If the universe was created at a finite time in the past, then the conception that the creation of the primeval material was a divine act can never be attacked by scientific investigation," says Sir Bernard. "A set of conditions which existed over 20 thousand million years ago, and which can never return again, is forever beyond investigation . . . But if the theory that creation of matter is taking place continuously is correct, then the primeval gas is being created now, at this moment, and hence is open to human investigation. The tools of science can probe the regions of space when this creation is occurring." Sir Bernard's telescope may be able to determine, more closely than was ever before possible, which conception of creation is the likelier.

But he points out that there is a clear limit to the extent to which his radio telescope or any other now comprehended could ever reach—about 10,000

million light years, at which point the galaxies will retreat from us and from each other, with the speed of light, so that their own light will never reach us, because "light is like a runner on an expanding track with the winning post receding faster than he can run." The universe beyond that point, says Sir Bernard, belongs to the realm of metaphysics and theology. But, he says, "I am no more surprised or distressed at the limitation of science when faced with this great probe of creation than I am at the limitation of the spectroscope in describing the radiance of a sunset or at the theory of counterpoint in describing the beauty of the fugue."

"It is helpful to remember," he points out, "that at any moment we see the sun as it existed eight minutes ago, the nearest star as it existed four years ago, and that for our nearer neighbours in extragalactic space the light and radio waves by which we study them have been travelling for millions of years and our information is that much out of date. At the limit of present-day observations our information is a few thousand million years out of date."

With the great ear at Jodrell listening the clock and the year round, the whispers from beyond our ken may one day answer some of the questions that have been plaguing scientist and philosopher for aeons. Meanwhile, on Earth, a small star in an insignificant galaxy, we set our course by the Dominion Observatory Time Signal, beeping the seconds away. . . .







Prominent men and women in the music world discuss the day's opera, clarifying many of the more difficult aspects with piano and vocal illustrations. Such carefully documented musical and dramatic analyses are particularly helpful to new opera listeners who may be confused by intricate plots, foreign-language lyrics, or by what the composer is trying to say at various points in his opera.

Listeners can try to stump the experts on *Opera Quiz*, by submitting questions about opera and opera

TED HEATH'S BAND FEATURED ON PARADE


JUST AFTER the end of the First World War, musicians in Britain found themselves a drug on the market. Employment was scarce, and to keep from starving, many instrumentalists played on the streets outside London theatres and restaurants, picking up a shilling here and there by passing the hat.

One day in 1920, a young trombonist was thus occupied when a prominent orchestra leader, Jack Hylton, heard him play. The trombonist was hired on the spot—which happened to be the sidewalk in front of a London hotel—and was

launched into what proved to be one of the most successful careers in the popular music business.

Today the trombone player, Ted Heath, heads one of the most

popular dance bands in the world (and one of the few big bands remaining on the scene nowadays); he has a sumptuous, 10-bedroom (Please turn to page 31)

National Schools Telecast

The last in a series of five 30-minute programs, each one featuring an outstanding writer.

Today, *Dylan Thomas*. "Although his tongue was English, and although he knew only the necessary few words (polite and impolite) of his country's language, his heart and fancy were Welsh." Thus did Gilbert Highet in *The Powers of Poetry* epitomize the poet Dylan Thomas, who was born at Swansea, Wales, in 1914, and died in New York in 1953 while on a lecture tour of the United States.

During many of his 39 years, Thomas seemed to fit the public image of the poet as a bohemian—bursting with vitality, restless, given to periods of dissipation, remorseful, volatile. But he himself suggested we should not confuse the legend or public personality of a poet, or even the critics' tabulation of him, with the essence of his work—his poetry.

Take Thirty

Crucial Game on N.F.L. Football

FOOTBALL FANS and those of you especially interested in the NFL will be treated to the first really "crooshal" game of the season this Sunday when the first place New York Giants are at home to the second-place Cleveland Browns, who defeated the Giants in the opening game of the season. (That game was carried on the CBC Trans-Canada network and viewers watched a really fine defensive battle as the Browns edged the Giants 17-7, largely on the power running of fullback Jimmy Brown and halfback Tom Wilson, who has almost faded into total obscurity since.) A victory for the Giants in this very important game would clinch the Eastern Division title for the boys of Ex-Winnipeg coach Allie Sherman and send them into the all-pro final for the second year in a row.

With the Green Bay Packers almost a shoo-in for the western title, there's nothing the Giants would like better than to get at least one more shot at the Packers, who humiliated them to the tune of 35-0 in last year's final at Green Bay. The Packers aren't — in spite of a 10-game winning streak—going to be able to clinch the western title unless they win over the Los

Turiddu takes a moving farewell of his mother, pretending that he has been called to duty as a soldier, and asks her to care for the unhappy Santuzza, whom he has so deeply wronged. After a short pause a woman rushes on the scene crying "Alfio has killed Turiddu" and Santuzza faints into the arms of Lucia.

I Pagliacci. Opera in two acts and a prologue by Leoncavallo.

Cast: Raina Kabaiwanska as Nedda, Carlo Bergonzi as Canio and Mario Sereni as Tonio.

Act I. Near the village. The primitive theatre of the village comedians is erected and the actors parade in theatre costumes to the great delight of the villagers. Canio and Beppe drink with the peasants while Tonio remains near Nedda. Amid the good-natured raillery of the villagers, Canio declares solemnly that as a clown he will take part in any joke, but will resent any insult to his honour as a husband.

The angelus is heard and Nedda is left alone with Tonio. She finds his attentions offensive and strikes him with a whip. He departs, swearing revenge. Silvio, Nedda's former lover approaches and induces her to go away with him that night. Tonio tells Canio who pursues Silvio. Canio is furious and demands from Nedda the name of her lover. She will not tell him and in

Craft Conducts Schoenberg

THE CBC SYMPHONY, which earlier this year made a recording of music by Schoenberg and Stravinsky, is about to make a second recording of works by the two composers, again under the direction of Robert Craft and Igor Stravinsky.

During his visit to Toronto, Craft also is conducting the orchestra in two programs of its regular broadcast season. The first of these, consisting of music by Stravinsky, was heard November 25; the second, an all-Schoenberg concert, will be broadcast Sunday, December 9 at 2:30 p.m.

The concert will be made up of three works—*Orchestral Variations*, opus 31, *Chamber Symphony No. 2*, opus 38, and Schoenberg's orchestral arrangement of Bach's *St. Anne Prelude and Fugue*.

At press time it was expected that Stravinsky would arrive in Toronto to conduct the orchestra and the Festival Singers in recording certain of his works. Stravinsky will be involved only in the recordings—he will not appear in public, nor will he take part in the CBC broadcasts.

Two of the Schoenberg works to be heard Sunday date from 1928, while the third—the *Chamber Symphony No. 2*—was completed in 1940.

The *Variations for Orchestra* is a large-scale composition, generally considered to be Schoenberg's most important work of its period. In it, all the possibilities of the 12-tone technique are said to be exploited for the first time.

The orchestral arrangement of Bach's *St. Anne Prelude and Fugue* is one of about a dozen such arrangements done by Schoenberg of works by Bach, Handel and other composers, including, of all people, Johann Strauss. English writer Colin Mason states that Schoenberg's orchestral settings of some of the Bach fugues "may be taken as comparable in intention, though not in character, with Stravinsky's *Pulcinella* and *Baiser de la Fee*."

The *Second Chamber Symphony* represents, in a way, some 35 years of the composer's life. First conceived as early as 1906, it did not reach completion until 1940, and in the meantime Schoenberg had gone through many stages in his development as a leading figure in 20th century music.

home in fashionable Wimbledon, drives an expensive automobile, and doesn't have to worry too much about where the next shilling is coming from.

The heyday of the large-scale dance band was the 1930s and early '40s; today, an orchestra carrying the full complement of earlier times (four or five each of saxophones, trumpets, and trombones,

plus a rhythm section and a couple of vocalists) is a rarity. In North America particularly, social customs have changed radically and rapidly in the past decade or so, and dancing has been on a decline, with a consequent lack of demand for dance bands.

This week, the band will be seen in a half-hour, BBC-produced program on CBC-TV's *Parade* (Wednesday, December 12). In addition to numbers by the band alone, the show will feature singers Carole Carr and Anita Harris, instrumentalists Tubby Hayes on tenor sax, marimba and vibraphone, and Kenny Baker on trumpet; and the Irving Davies Dancers, in colourful production numbers.

It was in 1942 that Heath first led his own band, a group organized by the BBC for a series of broadcasts. After the series was over, the musicians decided to stay together and became widely known through a series of weekly sessions at the London Palladium, where they attracted upwards of 3,000 fans every Sunday night.

In 1945, Heath re-organized his band and included some of the top instrumental stars in Britain. This group has appeared in many European countries, has toured Australia, New Zealand, and North America, given a number of Royal Command performances, and made records selling in the millions.

Although the most obvious features of rheumatoid arthritis are its action on the joints, it is a general disease whose effects are to be seen in other structures such as the nerves and muscles. Osteo-arthritis is a degenerative disease, often the outcome of excessive wear and tear or minor injuries. The cartilaginous covering of the ends of the bones becomes gradually worn and fissured and may be completely destroyed. Small bony projections form, chiefly at the points of attachment to muscles and tendons.

Ankylosing spondylitis, which occurs most often in late adolescence or early adulthood, begins with inflammation of the joints of the pelvis and vertebral column. Eventually the whole spine and the large joints of the limbs may be affected, with the ligaments and capsules of the joints being converted into solid bone, resulting in the spine becoming a bar of bone, without flexibility.

In all types of arthritis, there is pain—varying from occasional mild twinges to incessant, blinding torture.

The pain factor has made the treatment of arthritis and rheumatism a fertile field for quacks and charlatans. In an attempt to obtain relief from recurrent pain, some sufferers will grasp at so-called "remedies" that they would otherwise discard as obviously worthless. Uranium dirt, vibrating devices, alfalfa tea and copper bracelets are some of the nostrums that are cited by the Canadian Arthritis Society as being used by quacks. The Society advises that there is no drug, diet, nor other remedy that will cure—that is, wipe out com-

pletely and permanently—all evidence of arthritis in any of its more common and serious forms. Occasionally, substance is given to the claims of the practitioners of these odd forms of treatment when a patient seems to respond to their ministrations. But the Society points out that, in the main, these "cures" result from a peculiar phenomenon associated with the disease—a condition known as "spontaneous remission," under which the symptoms and pain disappear completely for a time, only to recur later. One aspect of research into arthritis is an attempt to discover the causes for the phenomenon, and then to induce a sustained remission artificially.

This week, CBC-TV's *Close-Up* (Sunday, December 9), will examine the subject of arthritis. Story editor George Ronald will interview doctors, sufferers from the disease, and others. Among those taking part will be Dr. J. N. Swanson of Toronto, medical director of the Ontario division of the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society, Dr. Ronald W. Lamont-Havers, medical director of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation in the United States, and Dr. Joseph Saine of Montreal, president of the International Association of Apitherapy (the use of bee venom in the treatment of arthritis).

Evolution of the BLUES

*"They heard the breeze in the trees
Singing weird melodies,
And they made that the start of the blues."*

THAT, in the words of the song *Birth of the Blues*, was the genesis of the blues. But the song, though popular in fact as well as in form, is hardly accurate, historically speaking. (Incidentally, it is not a blues, either.)

No great amount of academic investigation has been applied to the subject, but nevertheless considerably more is known about the origin of the blues than is mentioned in the fanciful lyrics of the song.

First, of course, one has to identify what one means by the term, for it has more meanings than

one might imagine. To the layman, the term refers to a mood — one of despondency or melancholy. To a jazz musician, it describes a specific musical form (12 bars long, in three four-bar phrases) that is just as formal and technical as, say, sonata-form; in this context, the name doesn't necessarily imply sadness, and one finds the seeming contradiction in terms, a "happy blues". To the old-time jazz-folk-blues singers, the term includes both of the previous meanings; they wailed their laments in the blues form (the words being a rhymed couplet with the first line repeated), and in an elegaic mood.

These latter-day *meistersingers* — they devised words and melodies of their songs, as well as performing them — voiced the feelings of their people, the descendants of Negro slaves brought into the southern United States. They looked for their inspiration to the everyday life around them, and a depressing life it was for the average Negro.

The music of their new-found religion, Christianity, had an influence on their songs, particularly those hymns that dealt with the enslavement of

the Israelites, with whom the early American Negroes felt a common bond, and there grew up another, separate Negro art form, the "spiritual".

The blues form, as it developed, was employed for expressing religious as well as secular emotions — gospel singer Mahalia Jackson sings many of these "sacred blues" today — but generally the blues singers dealt with such subjects as work, hardship, tragic love, and bitter comments on man's inhumanity. The origin of the term is obscure.

On CBC-TV's *Quest* this week (Sunday, December 9th,) producer Daryl Duke presents a program entitled *The Evolution of the Blues*. Not intended to be a documentary study of the growth of the blues, the program nevertheless covers much of its history in a general way. The story of birth and development of the blues is told in the form of a long, rhyming narrative poem with spirituals, blues vocals and instrumental numbers interpolated.

The script was written by Jon Hendricks, a well-known jazz singer and researcher, who will also do the narration and will sing some of the numbers. Others taking part are singers Clarence "Big" Miller and Eve Smith, saxophonist "Pony" Poindexter, and the Gildo Mahones Trio.

Buchta Turns Dance Therapy into Full Time Profession

HUNGARIAN - BORN Gunter Buchta, once faced with amputation of his right leg, has turned his rehabilitation therapy into a full-time professional career as a dancer.

During the Second World War, his leg was badly injured and doctors in a German hospital planned to amputate it. Buchta refused to let them, and his condition slowly improved to the point where therapy was practical.

"I had a choice — swimming, bicycling or dancing," he recalls. "Of the three, dancing appealed to me most, but I never dreamed my choice would lead to a new career in Canada."

Now, the Buchta Dancers, directed by him, appear each Monday night on CBC-TV's *Don Messer's Jubilee*.

Before the war, Buchta was a lawyer in Hungary. After the cease-fire, he taught school in Germany and while in that country he turned his dance therapy into a part-time profession by qualifying as a master in ballroom dancing.

He came to Halifax in July, 1950, and, within four weeks, was asked to organize a school for dancing at the Maritime Conservatory of Music. His first class in ballroom dancing was attended by one student—a 65-year-old woman—who was loud in her praise for Gunter Buchta and his new school. Classes soon swelled with adults learning the fox trot, quick step, slow waltz, Viennese waltz, tango, rhumba and samba.

Teen-agers and children did not appear to be interested in this type of dancing, so Buchta extended his courses to include square dancing and folk dancing. In 1952 he formed the Corte Dance Club for persons aged 17 to 24, and later the Corteen Dance Club for teen-agers 13 to 16.

In 1954 four couples from the Corte Club auditioned for the Don Messer show, seen then on the Maritime network, and the Buchta Dancers have appeared on every program since.

On each Messer program, the group perform two dances created

by Buchta — a combination of ballroom, folk and square dance patterns. So far he has created more than 400 dances.

Buchta sketches the dances on paper, and then consults with *Jubilee* producer Bill Langstroth and Don Messer about the music. The rest of his time with the show is taken up with program meetings, rehearsals and working out patterns on the studio floor.

While most of his time is taken up with his school and television, Buchta also lectures on the dance in many Maritime communities. Last summer, he lectured in Los Angeles and in other years has spoken in Chicago and Boston.

He holds a fellowship from the Dance Teachers' Association of Great Britain, and is a member of the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing.

"I derive great satisfaction out of giving dance instruction because my students are getting something they might not otherwise have," he says. "They acquire an appreciation of music and rhythm, develop body balance and discipline and, especially with children, poise, coordination and an appreciation of social etiquette."

SPANISH RICE

- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 4 slices bacon, chopped
- 5 green onions
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 red or green pepper, chopped
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 cup water

Wash rice thoroughly. Saute bacon, then add rice, onions and crushed garlic. Fry about ten minutes, add rest of ingredients. Put into casserole and bake at 300 degrees until done. If water evaporates too much, add a little more, cooking until rice is tender.
