REMEMBER THE decade of drought, dust and dreariness that was the 1930s? It was a trying, turbulent time for Canadians, particularly those on the Prairies, but it had its simple pleasures, its fun and its fads. *The Hectic '30s* is the title of an hour of recollections of those ten years — the good times and the bad, the significant happenings and the small things that made up life — interspersed with the songs everyone was singing then. The program is heard Wednesday, February 2nd at 8:00 p.m. on radio's *Between Ourselves*.

Personal reminiscences are by such well known Prairie personalities as Chris Higginbotham and W. C. Burke of Regina, and newspaperman Vince Leah of Winnipeg. Singer Reg Gibson, the Neil Harris Singers and an 11-piece orchestra provide the musical segments. Narration is by George Waight, Jean Murray and announcer Bill Guest. Jack Bingham is the producer, with special actuality material gathered by Craig Oliver.

AS EARLY as when he was in the third grade, Dave Brodie knew that acting or performing of some kind was what he liked to do best. Guess whose hand shot up first whenever the teacher asked, "And who'd like to read for us today?"

Now, Dave is host for *Mainly for Women* on CBWT and CBXT when it comes from Winnipeg Mondays and Thursdays at 2:30 p.m. On CBW radio, he is heard regularly on *Brodie's Britain*, Fridays at 11:00 p.m.

During his school days, Dave studied drama and, although he decided on broadcasting as a full-time career, he has been active in amateur theatre.

He began as an announcer at CKBI, Prince Albert, in 1948, and continued in private radio and television in Calgary, Saskatoon and Winnipeg.

While he was with CHCT-TV in Calgary, he performed in amateur theatre with the Buskins. He was given top acting honors for his role as a young drama critic in *Arsenic and Old Lace*, and a lead part in *The Lady's Not for Burning* came his way. In 1962 he started a drama school and professional theatre group, Harlequin Productions Limited, in Calgary and a year later opened a coffee house, *The Vicious Circle*, where young artists working in all art forms could display their talents. And they did, to a highly receptive audience.

After a year and a half with *The Vicious Circle*, Dave returned to Winnipeg to work in private radio and television. Last August he joined the announcer staff at CBC Winnipeg.

Take Thirty in Montreal

Meet French Canada's most interesting people this week on CBC-TV.

Gratien Gelinas



FOUR LEADING LIGHTS of the Quebec theatre, which is enjoying an exciting and lively season, will be guests on *Take Thirty* when the series spends a week in Montreal. On Monday, January 31st, viewers will meet Gratien Gelinas, Denise Pelletier, Alanis Obomsawin, and Robert Charlevois. Gelinas is the droll Tit-coq of the French-Canadian theatre, who first came to the attention of English-speaking Canadians as the sad little hero of his play by the same name, an English version of which played successfully outside Quebec a few years ago. Before that, of course, he had become famous in his own province as writer, actor, director in many revues and plays which made good use of his unique talent for the common touch. In 1957 he founded La Comédie Canadienne in Montreal, where his latest play will be produced in the early spring. His son Michel manages the theatre, and the rest of his family all work there, with the exception of the youngest, who is still at school.

Denise Pelletier, one of the most respected actresses in Canada, will be familiar to English-language viewers who remember her as Cecile Plouffe in Roger Lemelin's long-running series about the Plouffe family on CBC-TV. While *Take Thirty* is based in Montreal, she will be starring at the Théâtre de Nouveau Monde in the demanding role of *Mère Courage* (Bertolt Brecht's *Mother Courage*).

Alanis Obomsawin (who will be the subject of a *Telescope* TV profile on February 10th), was included among outstanding Canadians described in a recent *Maclean's* magazine article. On the program she sings ancient Indian songs collected from her people, accompanying herself on traditional bones or stretched skins, and tells of her attempts to help her

A new series of stories by Paul St. Pierre begins Thursday,
February 3rd on THE SERIAL.

THE FIRST of a new series of nine stories on CBC-TV's *Cariboo Country* (beginning this week on *The Serial*) centres on a very real dilemma in the British Columbia cattle country today—the gradual take-over of the small, independent ranches by the big outfits expanding their cattle empires. Rancher Smith is one such independent, a small rancher with no money and only about 30 head of cattle. He's the smallest rancher in Namko, the mythical community created by Vancouver *Sun* columnist Paul St. Pierre.

Namko, where most of the stories in the *Cariboo Country* are set, is in the Chilcotin Plateau area of B.C. As Smith tells it, "We are on the 4,500-foot level at the 52nd parallel of latitude. . . . It means that we are too high up and too far north to ever run a good ranch. The summers are too short and so is my life. There have been two bad summers for hay and two long winters in a row. She is a hard country." But Smith—even his wife doesn't know if he has a first name or what it is—is a proud, stubborn man who stands out in a country where rugged individualists abound. Despite his poverty and his lack of formal education, he feels superior to city folk or anyone who is not a rancher. He is fiercely proud of what he has accomplished in his wild range country, and is reluctant to sell because he knows that once he leaves, his house and all trace of his existence there will quickly be erased. Yet the hard facts of simple economics are forcing most of the small ranchers to sell out.

Smith's wife, Norah, wants him to sell, if only for the sake of their son Sherwood. ". . . We can go live in Prince George and we can have a house on a street alongside a whole lot of other houses. And you can work from nine to five like other men, Smith. And Sherwood can go to school instead of taking correspondence from me in the kitchen."

Smith, Norah, and Sherwood are three of the central characters who link the separate stories of *Cariboo Country*, each of which is complete in itself. David Hughes as Smith, Lillian Carlson as Norah, and Alan Cherrier as Sherwood were seen in those roles in the recent *Festival* production, *How to Break a Quarter-horse*. An earlier *Cariboo Country* story, *The Education of Phyllistine* (also telecast on *Festival*) won first prize at the Vancouver Film Festival in 1964, as well as a Canadian Film Award citation as the best television entertainment film of the year. Both *How to Break a Quar-*



THE DESPERATE SEARCH

THE CASE was one of the most bizarre in the annals of Montreal crime. It began in 1958 with a newspaper ad: "Young bachelor with new, heavy car, free for long trip right away. \$700 a month, expenses and bonus. Give car model and year." It sounded promising for a young man with time on his hands. But it spelled murder. François Bouchette, aged 21 and restless, accepted the job of driving a certain M. Charlevois to New York. His mother and Blanche, a boarder at their home who was in love with him, were against his going. But the money and the chance to get out of the rut he was in were too much for François. Ignoring the women's tears he drove off with M. Charlevois.

When days passed and there was no word from him, Mme. Bouchette grew worried. Finally she went to the police. Thinking her just overwrought, they told her that lots of boys left home and probably he'd write before long—there had been too many mothers and wives running in with complaints about lost sons and husbands who turned up hale and hearty next day. But Mme. Bouchette was sure François had been murdered, particularly after Blanche had seen his car being driven by a stranger. First alone, and later joined by Blanche, she set

out to track down his murderer. When she found the man she suspected, a M. Pichon, she hounded him relentlessly, at considerable risk to her life, for he had spent 30 of his 52 years in prison, and would stop at nothing to protect himself.


The story of this strange but true case, dramatized by Len Peterson, will be presented on TV's *Show of the Week*, Monday, January 31st, at 9:00 p.m., with production by Leo Orenstein. The cast features Cosette Lee as Mme. Bouchette; Diana Leblanc as Blanche; and Bernard Behrens as Pichon; with Robert Goodier as Sgt. Collard; Michael Sarrazin as François; Marc Strange as Jacques; Sydney Brown as Detective Sorel; Carl Banas as Detective Laflamme; Francie Strange as a woman; and David Clement as Hébert.

Len Peterson tells us that it was early in 1959, some time after it had made newspaper headlines, that he first heard of the case. Its strong human elements intrigued him in-




A PLACE FOR EVERYTHING

A repeat of this 1964 nature study series is seen beginning Sunday, January 30th.

MAN, BEASTS, birds, and vegetation all have their special places in our vast country in an extraordinary complicated balance of nature. Each affects and is affected by the others, and by the elements and other factors. The study of this complicated relationship, ecology, is the subject of a fascinating TV series, originally seen in the summer of 1964, which will be repeated on Sundays, beginning January 30th.

Many of Canada's finest wildlife cameramen contributed to the nine-part series, the overall consultant for which is Dr. William W. H. Gunn, distinguished Canadian biologist and ornithologist, whose recordings of outdoor sounds are world-famous. Budd Knapp is the narrator; production is by Denny Spence, with assistance on three programs by Tom Connachie of Vancouver; John Livingston is program organizer; film editing is by Lucie Robin; and the background musical scores in several programs are by Ricky Hyslop.

ter-horse and *The Education of Phyllistine* featured Chilcotin Indian Chief Dan George in the role of Ol' Antoine, who figures prominently in forthcoming *Cariboo Country* stories.

Philip Keatley, producer of the *Cariboo Country* series, says, "I would be quite happy if viewers were not quite sure whether what they had seen was a play or a documentary. This is the sort of quality we are aiming for. Some Cariboo old-timers may think they recognize some of the stories and characters, but although Paul St. Pierre has borrowed from life and from history, all the characters are fictional and none of the incidents fits its original context."

St. Pierre, a transplanted Nova Scotian who has spent most of his vacations for the past 20 years in

the Chilcotin country, says that the Cariboo is the only place in the world where white settlers have assumed the mannerisms and characteristics of the original natives, rather than changing the Indians to the white man's way of life—probably because the Indians have found a way of coping with this land and its climate.

The story next week (Thursday, February 10th) is sub-titled *The Strong People* and takes place in the Namko of 50 years ago. Told in flashback, it concerns a rancher named James and his bride from the East. Before the arrival of his bride James must put his house in order, meaning he has to get rid of his Indian mistress. A further complication is the result of this liaison—their son, 16-year-old Peter. Tom Hill plays James, Susan Ringwood the bride, and Frank Bouchie is Peter. Ronald Weyman is the executive producer of *The Serial*.

By the end of January in the following year all the 60-odd Air Canada centres spread over their 39,000 miles of air routes were filling reservations by computer. Two immediate effects resulted: The complicated business of passenger-reservations was streamlined for greater efficiency, making for faster and more accurate bookings; and there was an inevitable reduction in staff handling reservations. Passport to Adventure:

Film Classics for Children

THE THREE events most responsible for establishing and sustaining the widespread serious interest in movies during the last decade have been the growth of film societies, the commercial success of the "art film" theatres, and the daily availability of movies on television.

Movies have played a key role in TV programming since its inception, but only recently have films of quality been available in good number to prime time audiences. Now all four major North American TV networks offer a weekly movie in prime time to add to the films available on most

local stations on the "early (afternoon) show," at dinner time, and on the "late show."

However, with the exception of the feature films of Walt Disney, those of Britain's Children's Film Foundation (seen on CBC's *Time for Adventure* each summer) and the occasional presentation of a children's classic such as *The Wizard of Oz*, movies on television have never been presented with children in mind. And yet many of the great movies of the '30s and '40s stand as classic film productions unsurpassed by most of today's television programming

tensely, particularly the moving story of the mother's deep involvement, so he rang up the CBC in Toronto, and asked if the drama department would be interested in a play about the case. "I was a little apprehensive," he recalls, "because I felt sure someone else would have suggested it earlier. I felt it was a tremendous subject for a drama. The whole thing had hit me strongly, and I was delighted when the CBC told me to go ahead with a script. I went to Montreal and interviewed the people concerned with the case—detectives, the girl friend, and the mother. In writing the drama I didn't follow all the details of the situation down to the letter — I had to take liberties with the characters. I was interested mainly in ideas, in the spirit of the people involved. The play was presented on CBC-TV in the fall of 1959, and was repeated the following year.

A Look at Night People

IN John Milton's masque, *Comus*, there occurs the line "What hath night to do with sleep?" What, indeed. For many people, night is not necessarily synonymous with sleep, hence the reason for *Telescope* adopting Milton's line as the title of this week's program. But whereas Milton was writing about chastity, *Telescope* focuses, Thursday on another kind of virtue—work, and the people who do labor while others sleep.

About one in 40, or roughly half a million, people in Canada are night-workers. Starring Cesare Siepi as the Don; Elisabeth Schwarzkopf as Donna Elvira; Teresa Stitch-Randall as Donna Anna; Rosalind Elias as Zerlina; Jan Peerce as Don Ottavio; Geraint Evans as Leporello; and Theodor Uppman as Masetto. The conductor is Joseph Rosenstock.

The opera takes place in Seville during the 17th century.

Act I. The Garden of Commendatore. Leporello is keeping watch before the house into which Don Giovanni has crept to seduce Donna Anna, the betrothed of Ottavio. She appears, struggling with Don Giovanni, and cries for help. When the Commendatore appears he is stabbed by Don Giovanni, who escapes unrecognized.

Change of Scene: A public square before the palace of Don Giovanni. Elvira, one of the Don's victims, appears and Leporello attempts to console her by unrolling a list of Don Giovanni's amours. Elvira vows vengeance. When she has departed, a marriage procession with Masetto and Zerlina comes upon the scene. Don Giovanni arranges to be alone with Zerlina and immediately applies his seductive arts. Elvira interrupts them as Ottavio and Anna enter. Anna recognizes Don Giovanni as the murderer of her father and Ottavio determines to follow him.

Change of Scene: All the guests of the peasant wedding have arrived. Don Giovanni leads Zerlina and Masetto to the ball chamber which has been gaily decorated, and Leporello also invites three maskers, not knowing that they are Elvira, Ottavio and Anna.

Change of Scene: Ball room. Don Giovanni leads Zerlina away as Leporello engages Masetto's attention. Zerlina cries for help and escapes through the crowd.

Act II. Before Elvira's house. Don Giovanni exchanges cloak and hat with Leporello. Leporello is compelled to deliver a message to Elvira. Meanwhile, Don Giovanni, in Leporello's attire, serenades the maid. Surprised by Masetto and his friends, the false Leporello escapes after thrashing Masetto. Zerlina arrives and cheers Masetto.

Change of Scene: Elvira's room. It is dark. Ottavio, Anna, Masetto and Zerlina unmask Leporello, whom they believed was the Don.

Change of Scene: A graveyard with the statue of the Commendatore. Leporello reads the inscription on the statue's base: "Vengeance here awaits my murderer." Don Giovanni mockingly invites the statue to dine with him at the evening meal. The statue nods its head and answers, "Yes."

Change of Scene: The room of Donna Anna. Ottavio taxes her with cruelty for postponing the wedding.

Last Letters from Stalingrad

"STALINGRAD Jan. 24: Troops without ammunition or food. Contact maintained with elements only of six divisions. Evidence of disintegration on southern, northern, and western fronts. Effective command no longer possible. Little change on eastern front: 18,000 wounded without any supplies or dressings or drugs; 44th, 76th, 100th, 305th, and 384th Infantry Divisions destroyed. Front torn open as a result of strong breakthrough on three sides . . . further defence senseless. Collapse inevitable. Army requests permission to surrender in order to save lives of remaining troops — Paulus." This was the desperate situation described in a wire from German commander Friedrich von Paulus a week before the five-month Battle of Stalingrad ended in 1943. Hitler replied to von Paulus: "Capitulation . . . impossible and ordered the German Sixth Army to stand until the last man dropped. When the battle began in September, 1942, Stalin had given his troops similar instructions "Not another step backward . . . The Volga has now only one bank."

The Battle of Stalingrad was the *Rattenkrieg* of the Eastern Front — the rat war, fought hand to hand in alleyways, the cellars of what was left of the houses, the

sewers, the remaining bunkers, anywhere that afforded some small degree of protection in a gutted city.

Field Marshal von Paulus eventually disobeyed the *Führer* and on January 31st Sixth Army headquarters sent its last message: "The Russians stand at the door of our bunker. We are destroying our equipment." By February 2nd it was all over; von Paulus and 23 generals, some 2,500 officers, 90,000 other ranks, and an unknown number of German non-combatants were in Russian hands.

Just before the Germans surrendered, one lone aircraft left the beleaguered city and escaped to Germany. On board were several sacks of letters, bearing the thoughts and feelings of men who knew they were doomed. *CBC Tuesday Night*, February 1st at 9:15 p.m., presents a reading of some of those letters, which were compiled by Michael Nimchuk from the book *Last Letters From Stalingrad*. The voices heard are those of John Pierce, Leon Pownall, Mike Magee, Vic Cowie, Fred Heywood, Warren Cosford, Cliff Gardner, Meredith Robinson, and Colin Gorrie. The program is produced in Winnipeg by Tony Ross.

Monday Concert:

Music That Played to Boos

A musical entertainment that put its creators into disgrace for a time is performed by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra.

IN 1922 Sir William Walton was only 20 when he wrote his first real success — *Façade Entertainment*, an exuberantly funny musical frolic consisting of 21 racy poems by Edith Sitwell, to be read with a musical accompaniment which impishly parodies popular tunes of his day, from polka to fox-trot. It was while Walton was at Oxford, in 1919, that he first met the literary Sitwells. Sacheverell was an undergraduate of 19, through him Walton got to know the older Osbert and Edith, often holidayed at the brothers' Chelsea flat in London, and on leaving Oxford, when he had no means of earning a living aside from unremunerative composing, was taken in by the Sitwells until he could support himself.

As *Façade* was first conceived, the poems were to be recited through a megaphone, with tongue-in-cheek accompaniment provided by flute, clarinet, saxophone, 'cello, trumpet and percussion. The work was first presented privately in Mayfair drawing rooms with some success. But at its first public performance in 1923, with the 36-year-old Miss Sitwell as reader (speaking through a megaphone protruding from a mask fastened to a curtain hiding both her and the musicians), its jazzy brashness aroused alarming indignation. In his book, *Laughter in the Next Room*, Osbert Sitwell recalls that:

"The press—or rather that section of it now defunct, the gossip crew, which cherished a deadly parasitic hatred and fear of all work, manual or intellectual, but more especially artistic—had been engaged for days past in trying to whip up the public to pretend to feel rage and resort to insult. . . . On this occasion the entertainment took full effect, though not in the manner we had expected, or at least had hoped for: without ap-

parent reason now infuriating a house that, 20 years later, was to wax to the same degree enthusiastic. The front rows, especially, manifested their contempt and rage, and albeit a good deal of applause countered the hissing and indicated interest and enthusiasm in certain quarters, nevertheless the atmosphere was so greatly and so evidently hostile, that at the end of the performance several members of the audience came behind the curtain to warn my sister not to leave the platform until the crowd had dispersed.

"For several weeks subsequently we were obliged to go about London feeling as if we had committed a murder. When we entered a room, there would fall a sudden unpleasing hush. Even friends avoided catching one's eye, and if the very word *Façade* was breathed, there ensued a stampede for other subjects and for safety. In fact, we had created a first-class scandal in literature and music."

But three years later, when Walton arranged five of the members for full orchestra, public taste had broadened, and the *Façade Suite* was, in his words, "a whacking success." Since then it has taken its place as one of the most delightful examples of light music by an English composer.

It will be performed by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra in radio's *Monday Concert* on January 31st, with Meredith Davies conducting. The narrator will be Vera Zorina, internationally known star of ballet, plays, films, musicals, and recording artist. The program will also include Schumann's *Overture, Scherzo and Finale*.

Also of interest this week is a brass concert by the Vancouver Chamber Orchestra, conducted by John Avison, on Sunday, January 30th, at 11:00 a.m.

CBC Tuesday Night:

Jazz and the Modern Composer

THE MUSIC lexicographer Willi Apel, evaluating jazz as a future art form, once made a pronouncement which has since become famous. "Jazz," he said, "shows no signs of becoming the musical art form of the future, despite the interest and stimulation it affords, because: (1) its appeal is too primitive; and (2) its appeal is too immediate." Apel, a German-American, is the author of many reference works, including the *Harvard Dictionary of Music*. He has taught at the Longy School of Music, Harvard, Radcliffe, and Indiana University, where he is now a resident professor.

The Apel dictum is examined in relation to several works to be heard in a three-part program from Winnipeg that begins this week on *CBC Tuesday Night*, at 10:35 p.m. Chester Duncan, pian-

ist, introduces the program and comments on the works to be performed by himself and other artists as he tests the validity of the two points of Apel's statement. On the first program Duncan comments on and performs Constant Lambert's essay into the jazz style of Duke Ellington. The composer titles this work, simply, "Sonata, 1930."

For the second program, Duncan is joined by trombonist Dean Werner and trumpeter Wilfred Jones in a performance of Boris Blacher's jazz *Divertimento*; Duncan then plays a sonata by U.S. composer Norman Loyd.

In the third program, a jazz work written for Benny Goodman Bartok's "Contrasts for Violin, Clarinet and Piano"—is performed by Duncan, violinist Marta Hidy and clarinetist Leslie Mann.

CBC Tuesday Night:

Four Concerts for Young People

DURING THE month of February *CBC Tuesday Night* will present, as the first part of each evening's entertainment, a series of four concerts for young people. Two of them will be performed in Montreal by the McGill Chamber Orchestra and two in Toronto by the Hart House Orchestra. The music in the series is varied, ranging from Mozart to Britten, and each will feature one Canadian work. Alexander Brott and Dr. Boyd Neel, the conductors in Montreal and Toronto respectively, will introduce the concerts, given before invited audiences of young people, and comment on the composers and their works.

The first of the concerts, Tuesday, February 1st at 8:05 p.m., comes from Montreal and is subtitled *Accent on Youthful Compositions*. Mozart's *Divertimento No. 1 in D (K. 136)*; Rossini's *Sonata da Camera in C*; Mendelssohn's *Symphony No. 9 in C minor*; and *Circles, Triangles for Squares*, a

new composition by Alexander Brott, being given its Canadian radio premiere, are the works performed.

Next week's program (February 8th) comes from Toronto and includes Benjamin Britten's *Simple Symphony*; *Concerto in B Flat for Harp and Strings*, by Handel; *Variations on a Theme of Tchaikovsky*, by Arensky; and *Suite for Strings*, by Maurice Blackburn. The soloist in the performance of Handel's work will be Erica Goodman, harp.

Montreal's second concert (February 15th) consists of *Concerto Grosso in B minor, op. 6, No. 12*, by Handel; *Concerto for Oboe and Orchestra*, arranged by Arthur Benjamin from works of Cimerosa; *Adagio* from *Concerto No. 1 in B*, by C. P. E. Bach; selected excerpts from parts of *Variations on a Theme of Frank Bridge*, by Benjamin Britten; and *Strings in Motion*, by Jean Vallerand. Jacques Simard, oboist, is the soloist.

itself. To work out a schedule for a fleet of 16 DC-8 aircraft over a six-month period takes only about 3.5 seconds by computer, once it has been programmed with all the necessary data.

The bogie of automation has given rise to widespread fears of increasing unemployment, and in many cases such fears are well-founded. But many companies like Air Canada, absorb personnel displaced by machines into other jobs and re-training schemes are often a corollary of automation. IBM, one of the chief manufacturers of computers, displaced 1,800 of its own workers over an 18-month period when it developed a machine to help build a machine. But none of the displaced workers was laid off. In the United States the Federal government estimates that automation wipes out about 35,000 jobs every week (1,800,000 a year), a somewhat misleading figure arrived at by statisticians relating the growth in productivity and the number of employed. Their figures indicate not the actual number of people eased out by machines but simply that it takes 35,000 fewer workers this week to turn out the same amount of goods and services produced last week.

CBC-TV's series *The Sixties* has examined in previous programs

some of the effects on our daily lives of automation and the possible future results of "the computerized society." On this week's program, *Air Canada and Automation*, writer-director Monroe Scott takes a positive look at computerization in one of the most technically sophisticated companies in Canada and how it is reconciling the need for technological progress in its operations with the human factor. The program was filmed in the two big Air Canada centres at Montreal and Toronto and includes interviews with representatives of both labor and management. Among those discussing the impact of automation on Air Canada are: G. E. Bolton, director of personnel, Air Canada; Michael Pitchford, chairman of the Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers; and John Hayes, chairman of the Association of Airline Employees. This edition of *The Sixties* was filmed by Paul Pegineau and edited by Bob Murphy. Cameron Graham is the producer, Christina McDougall the program organizer for the series.

The program next week, subtitled *The Unflagging M. Drapeau*, is a profile of Montreal's Mayor Jean Drapeau prepared by Montreal *Star* columnist Peter Desbarats.

aimed at young viewers.

What TV programs can match the movie *Stanley and Livingston* in its portrayal of sheer adventure? Or equal *Call of The Wild* in capturing the spirit of the wilderness? Or present the mystery and intrigue of *The Scarlet Pimpernel*? Can Fred Flintstone stand to be compared with Tumac (Victor Mature) in *One Million B.C.*, and can Dennis the Menace measure up to *Elephant Boy*? Clearly the cliché "they don't make 'em like that anymore," is relevant here.

Passport to Adventure was created to bring to youngsters of today some of the best adventure films created in the 1930s and '40s. Each film is serialized in four half-hour segments, shown Mondays through Thursdays at 5:00 p.m.

The title is taken from the program's theme that good movies and good books can be passports to real adventure. Books are talked about as well as movies, and young viewers are urged to

seek out the authors from whom the story of the movie first emerged. Rudyard Kipling, H. G. Wells, Jack London, Mary O'Hara, Baroness Orczy and others have been cited by the program's host, Elwy Yost.

Yost has added *Passport* to his already-busy TV life almost as a labor of love. He is an educational television planner for Metropolitan Toronto and a *Flashback* panelist. He's been an avid movie-goer since he was a child, and can claim actual film experience after having played a bit part in the film *Moulin Rouge*.

Producer for the series is Doug Davidson and he, too, is a confirmed movie enthusiast. In addition to his CBC production activities Davidson teaches a course at the Ryerson Technical Institute in Toronto on film and its techniques. Rounding out the *Passport* team is writer Jerry Ross, film editor John Nicholson, and executive producer John Twomey.

Some of the movies to be shown in the weeks ahead are *The Wooden Horse*, *Swordsmen*, *Thunderhead*, *Son of Flicka*, *Ali Baba and The Forty Thieves* and *Here Comes Mr. Jordan*.

A SERIES of new programs designed for use in classrooms across Canada now is underway on CBC-TV's *Canadian School Telecasts*.

Five half-hour programs *Exploring with Poetry* can be seen at 10:00 a.m. each Tuesday. On Thursdays, the series *Face of Freedom* designed to foster an understanding of international co-operation, is presented.

Other programs available before the Easter vacation period are *Your World* (news), *Science Around Us*, *Junior Bookshelf*, *The Constants of Physics*, a new series with Professors Hume and Ivey, and *The Depths Beneath*, on oceanography.


The remainder of this year's schedule of school programs are already on video tape waiting to be aired and action is being taken on programs for the school year 1966-1967.

The accent of educational television in the Centennial year will be strongly Canadian. This is reflected by the schedule of *Canadian School Telecasts* for 1966-1967, recently approved by the CBC and the National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting.

Among the 68 programs now in the early stages of production planning is a series of six half-hours on *Challenges to Canadians*, which will take a realistic look at Canada's problems and some of the short- and long-term solutions.

The Regions of Canada, seven programs in length, is designed to utilize television to dramatize the varying regions of Canada with the emphasis on people and their environment.

The four-program series *Canadian Stories* will seek to promote the habit of reading for pleasure

and in keeping with the theme of the Centenary, books selected will be Canadian in setting and theme.

A series on the *Three Levels of Government* will deal with the interrelationship of governments in Canada and will assist the classroom teacher in breaking down the "we-they" attitude toward the government and establishing that government is the people.

In addition, series are planned on the concepts of history, science, French, social studies, public affairs, theatre, and physics. The physics series will be a repeat of this year's *Constants of Physics* with the ever popular Professors Hume and Ivey.

Recognizing the important role television plays in the lives of Canadian children, a special single half-hour is planned to explain to students the combination of technology and creative skills which make up the TV medium.

The educational programs planned for Centennial year will vary in length from the ten-minute news programs *Your World* to a special two-hour production of Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar*. The programs will be seen in classrooms across Canada on the CBC Television Network every Tuesday and Thursday at 10:00 a.m. from mid-October 1966 through May 1967.
