#### CAN FOUR FINE ENTERTAINERS -- MAKE IT?

The history of truly Canadian hits might be of interest to you if you are thinking of heading south to record.

On the basis that a Canadian hit must attain international prominence, and must be cut by a Canadian residing principally in Canada, I can say that of the hundreds of sessions cut in the U.S. and England by Canadian artists only three have attained outstanding positions on the Cash Box and Billboard 100 charts. They were "Fortune Teller" by Bobby Curtola, "Shakin' All Over" by The Guess Who, and "Big Town Boy" by Shirley

The score isn't as high for Canadian produced hits by Canadian artists. The two Canadian productions that climbed the American trade charts were "Twistin' At The Woodchopper's Ball" by Ron Metcalfe and his orchestra, and "My Girl Sloopy" by Little Caesar and The Consuls.

In the past five years, we seem to be able to come up with no more than three Canadian hits at the rate of one a year.

You will note that three were cut in the U.S. Of those, one was cut in New York and one in Nashville and the other in Minneapolis. The two Canadian hits were both cut in Toronto.

By golly, you just can't say from this where you should go to cut a

hit, and you'll have trouble working out any kind of a success formula. Obviously there just isn't a place where you can come up with a hit. Even Detroit has to put out many many records to see one of them climb the charts.

While American trade magazines list various statistics about hits, they don't list the studios where they are cut, and they don't list the number of records the producer had to put out to have one hit. What is the average of releases to have a hit?

Many record companies look like they never miss. Many studios look like they just don't miss, and many artists look like they arrive on the scene and have a hit right away.

While many feel that good management and good publicity make a hit, there also has to be that magic ingredient that says "HIT" when the record is played.

It takes 18 musicians to make up a big session with a big sound, but the average record buyer is used to a four or five man group. It doesn't make sense does it? Why would you go into a studio with so many men when the sound of today is 4 or 5 musicians? I guess the music industry started off like the automobile industry. People wanted four wheels and a motor to get them from one place to another. Today they have added radios, bucket seats, tape recorders, bars, disappearing headlights and it hasn't stopped yet.

The British came up with a winning formula with four guys playing and singing well. They have even had to join the rat race to keep up with the mammoth recording extravaganzas. One thing you can say for some producers, they sure like to do things BIG.

Next time you listen to the Beatles' early records, compare them to the sound the Beatles are recording today. You might find you're hearing more, but enjoying it less than the early Beatles.

You might be surprised to find out that many English productions (although hits in England) had additional instruments overdubbed (added) before they were suitable for release in the U.S.

Maybe the true sound of four guys can't make it, or maybe if it does make it, it will be hard to beat when it comes down to four or five musicians...(PARDON ME...entertainers.)

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New on-air personality at CKDM Dauphin, Manitoba, is Cliff Mulaney, who besides looking after the all night show is captain of the Douphin Kings hockey team. CKDM now has "The Ghost Patrol" prowling Dauphin streets taking down license numbers of safe drivers and awarding them LP records over the air. It's all part of Canada's "Safe Driving Week"

If you tune into CBC's "Action Set" Saturday Dec 23 (10:00 AM to Noon), and you should being as it is the most listened radio show on the North American continent, you'll receive Christmas Greetings from many of the top recording stars and actors of the world. All this in the first half. The second hour will feature Carol Robinson (formerly of The Dirty Shames, Ken Rodger and Al Maitland, who have put together a show describing crazy Christmas gifts as well as a round-up of Christmas buying promotions in Europe.

Frank H. Barnhouse NBBC/CKAV advises that Fred Latremouille, one of the lower mainland's most popular radio personalities in the teen scene, has left his afternoon rock show on CKLG to become co-editor of the Georgia Straight, Vancouver's "underground" newspaper for the younger generation. John Tonner replaces Latremouille on "73"



CFTO-TV's "After Four" Dec. 23rd. edition (4 PM EST) will feature their four hostesses Susan Taylor, Trudy Young, Linda Lowe, and Virginia McEwen in a Special Christmas show. Giving a giant musical assist to the affair will be The Carnival, from Woodstock, Ontario.

The Monkees will also go festive on their CTV outing on Dec. 24th. (7 PM EST) when they bring Christmas joy to a 10 year old non-believer.

CTV's "A Gift Of Music", a Christmas concert by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra with Seiji Ozawa conducting and Lois Marshall as guest soloist will pre-empt "W-5" at 10 PM EST Dec. 24.

The CBC-TV network will present a two-part colour film of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" at 10 AM EST on Dec. 21 and 22. This musical version stars Frederic March as Scrooge and Basil Rathbone as Marley's ghost. The story was adapted by Maxwell Anderson and is set to original music by Bernard Herrmann and a 40 piece orchestra with vocal assist by the 16 voices of the Roger Wagner Chorale.

Christmas Day on the CBC-TV network begins at 11:30 PM (Dec. 24) and through the day will present religious specials, an award-winning Russian fairy story, comedy with Wayne and Shuster, a Leonard Bernstein concert, documentary films, a special edition of "Take 30" and a repeat from last year, a 90 minute Christmas Greeting show, starring Juliette, with greetings to Canada from Kate Reid, Max Ferguson, Marg Osburne, Eleanor Collins, The Friendly Giant, The Brassard Family, Ray St. Germain, and The Hootenanny Singers, Angela Antonelli, The Craddock Family and Alex Ticknovitch and his family. Her Majesty The Queen will give her annual Christmas Message at 10:00 AM.

Billy Vera and Judy Clay, well known as single performers are currently on a cross country jaunt to meet with important radio and television personalities in key cities.



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

#### THE BUFFALO SPRINGFIELD

It might be unbelievable but a steam roller gave "birth" to The Buffalo Springfield.

One day, while five young men were rehearsing on a deserted road, a steam roller passed by bearing the name of its manufacturer, Buffalo Springfield. That's how one of the hottest quintets in the record business got their name.

The sound of the Buffalo Springfield is their very own. Meticulous planning, beginning with their first smash record, "For What It's Worth", has culminated in world—wide recognition for the versatile performers. A Buffalo Springfield recording is most assuredly a Buffalo Springfield creation from every aspect. Each ingredient; harmony, lyrics, instrumentation, vocal and production is exclusively the output of the five Springfield.

Perhaps one of the most unique examples of their selectivity was the decision to shelve their second LP in its entirety in favour of a new package. The group simply felt the music was no longer representative of their "current" bag.

Charles Greene and Brian Stone, who previously managed Sonny and Cher, heard the Buffalo Springfield and signed them to a contract. The group was the first group to appear at a rock concert at The Hollywood Bowl without first having a hit record. Three days later, however, the band was hitting the charts with their first "Nowadays Clancy Can't Even Sing".

Three of The Springfield are Canadian. **Neil Young** played with Toronto's **Mynah Birds**, who moved to the states to record. The group encountered some difficulty with the draft and broke up after a short while. Neil started out with a ukele and has since mastered guitar, piano, harmonica and bass. He's an excellent composer writing such songs as "Mr. Soul" and "Expecting To Fly".

Another former Mynah Bird, **Bruce Palmer**, is the bassist for the Springfield. He rarely faces an audience and is extremely camera shy. Bruce is the only non-singer of the group.

Drummer, Dewey Martin, was born in Chesterville, Ontario. He moved to Nashville where he backed Roy Orbison, Carl Perkins and Patsy Cline. During a trip to Southern California he found his country-rock drumming suited The Springfield perfectly.

Steven Stills is the lead vocalist and guitar player. His voice is deep, throaty and strong. He is an intense perfectionist who takes his music very seriously. Steve is an exceptional songwriter and was responsible for writing and singing the group's first national hit "For What It's Worth".

Richie Furay, is probably one of the best rhythm guitarists in the nation. His vocal prowess is another plus factor for the herd. He is a deft songwriter having three of his tunes featured in the group's latest album, "The Buffalo Springfield Again".

I hope I can remember all their names: Gerry Ward and George Semkiw gave a big assist to Bob Gray; George Harrison, vice president of RCA Victor's record division came in from Montreal along with Victor's Montreal studio manager, Ed Traynor; Victor's Ontario sales manager Jack Feeney was there with promotion man Ed Preston, who brought alon, Rich Little, who is currently appearing at the Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel. Gib Kerr, his manager was also there, and of course, Lee Phelps. Kit Morgan, Billboards Canadian correspondent, was also in attendance as were many execs from Capitol Records, including Ed Leetham, vice president and general manager; Gord Edwards, national promo manager: A&R man Paul White; and the two gals who really run things in the Capitol camp, Corrine Peterson and Marlene Bremner. Columbia's vice president Bob Pompe and Peter Westwood were also there along with Vic Parr and Dave Humphries of Parr's Printing. Dick Lewis, publisher of Canadian Broadcaster; BMI's Whitey Haines and Marg Topping; CTL's Lymon Potts; Harold Smith of H.S. Associates; Laurie Hazelton repped Cardinal Records; Stan Klees, RPM's free lance writer; Lester Sill, vice president and general manager, Colgems Records, California and his New York producer Chip Douglas; Jack Richardson of McCann Erickson; Phonodisc's Hal Ross; Allied's Bruce Beatty WERE ALL THERE, and many many more. 




