Coast spreads the Seeds of Time

Warners cocktail bash to float Nonesuch

Making use of the presence in Toronto of the Hudson's Bay Company's replica of the Nonesuch, Warner Brothers' Tom Williams threw a cocktail party-cum-scenic-tour to underscore the release of five albums on the Warners - distributed Nonesuch label. The journey kicked off at the Marine Museum, located on the CNE grounds, on Toronto's lakeshore. After a casual wander through the museum the group was picked up by a double decker bus and through a series of illegal turns and maneuvers, arrived at the Ontario Government's latest make work effort, Ontario Place.

A half-hour tour of the Nonesuch was concluded and the group shook and rattled their way back to the CNE grounds. Drinks and miniscule ham-

burgers prevailed. The whole thing was in support of five albums; "Ancient Voices of Children", "Piano Rags 1900-1970", "Bach Cantatas", "Dean Dixon conducts the Prague Symphony" and "Hamza El Din's Ou Music from Nubia". All were released June 15th. The albums range, of course, from pure classical, to the growingly-popular piano rag style, to oud music which can only be described as different. In spite of a few minor hangups the affair was one of the most light-hearted and enjoyable promo affairs to take place for some time in Toronto.

Williams drew a small but select group of dealers, press and radio people, all of whom came away favourably impressed with the Nonesuch line.

CHAM moves to push 125th for Hamilton

Hamilton's 125th Birthday Celebrations are underway and radio station CHAM have been doing their bit in presenting some of the top Canadian recording groups. CHAM have set June 28th aside as their big contribution day at the H-AAA Grounds in Hamilton. They'll be presenting, Lighthouse, 5 Man Electrical Band, CHAM Tenderness and several others including Teegarden and Van Winkle.

CHAM recently premiered the new Lisa Garber A&M deck, "Let Me Know", which A&M promotion rep Joe Woodhouse has been successfully touting through the province.

On-air lineup includes: Gil Harris, Don Collins, Steve Shannon, Ike Isaacs, Dick Joseph and Paul Allen.

Belafonte in RCA's Toronto facilities

Harry Belafonte, took time out during his O'Keefe engagement to tape a recording session at RCA's Toronto Studios. Jack Pleis, who has produced Belafonte's last five albums, flew in from Los Angeles to take charge of the session. George Semkiw and Jim Morgan of the Toronto studios handled the engineering chores.

Belafonte has apparently been interested in Canadian compositions for some time and he has listened to several demos from Canadian composers and was particularly interested in material by Rick Neufeld.

The session involved Belafonte and his 10 piece instrumental back-up group as well as a 10 voice choral ensemble.

It was expected that a portion of the session would be taped at the O'Keefe Centre, for which RCA would supply a mobile eight track set-up with inputs for 24 mikes.

CTV's "Nashville North" hot on Cancon

CTV's nation-wide TVer "Nashville North" is rapidly proving to be a prime exposure vehicle for Canadian talent across this country and on a number of syndicated stations in the United States. Latest to benefit from the exposure are the Five Man Electrical Band and Dave Bradstreet. The June 29th version of the Tyson TVer features the well-known group, Bradstreet, Gloria Loring and Conway Twitty.

Ottawa's Five Man Electrical Band is, of course, well known in Canada for "Hello Melinda Goodbye", "Moonshine (Friend of Mine)" and achieved international success with their currently charted "Signs". Their "Goodbyes and Butterflies" album on Polydor is experiencing strong action as a result of "Signs".

David Bradstreet is a young singer who has performed on university campuses throughout Canada and the United States. The road to his success has been a long one, but he now finds that his voice and guitar

An agreement has been reached between Music World Creations and Quality Records whereby Bell Records of the U.S. will release Stampede's product in the U.S. Bell's David Carico jetted into Toronto to finalize the deal with MWC's Mel Shaw.

The group's current Canadian hit, "Sweet City Woman", already showing as a strong chart climber, has been rush released in the U.S. with top priority promotion being assured by Bell's national promotion manager, Steve Wax.

Son of "Hair" slated for Royal Alexandra

In the fine tradition of the entertainment business, the promoters of the rock musical "Hair" are not willing to let it die. A new and revised edition of the spectacularly successful show is due to open at the Royal Alexandra in Toronto on July 6th. The players this time around were chosen from eight leading "Hair" companies who just recently closed record-breaking runs throughout the United States. Dubbed "The First National Company of Hair", the twenty-nine actors are from companies which played Los Angeles, Boston, Chicago, Las Vegas, Miami, Detroit, Seattle and New York.

The lead roles are as follows: Berger: Doug Rowell, Las Vegas; Claude: John Herzog, Los Angeles, New York; Sheila: Jo Ann Harris, Seattle; Hud: Tyrone Mills, Seattle; Woof: Johnathon Johnson, Seattle; Crissy: Linda Compton, New York; and Jeannie: Gayle Riffle, Detroit.

The "first national company" was originally organized in Chicago and opened in Louisville, Kentucky. Since then it has played Kansas City, Milwaukee, Chicago, Cleveland and Pittsburg. The company opens in Toronto directly after a Baltimore run. After four weeks at the Royal Alex, "Hair" moves on to New Orleans.

There will be a number of differences over the original Canadian productions. Some of the staging will be completely new. In addition, tickets will be slightly cheaper, ranging from \$2.50 to \$9.00. Reasons for the exclusion of Canadian performers from the company were not given.

Seeds of Time growing throughout Canada

Success in the Canadian recording industry comes to those with the determination to stick it out and win — even if they lose. Vancouver's Seeds of Time can chalk up an "A" for effort. They've been together for five years and would appear to be resigned to the fact that if you're going to make it — they'll make it. If not with this release — maybe the next one.

This dynamic young Coast recording unit got themselves together in 1966. There didn't appear to be any particular reason for forming a group other than to pick up extra bread in their spare time. The Canadian recording industry hadn't been born yet. Producers were on the scene doing what they thought would break the barrier but the time wasn't ripe.

However, the Seeds of Time were laying down some pretty fair sounds and they were picking up a sizeable following throughout British Columbia. They finally broke through the apathy of their Province's critical music population and gained solid recognition — if not for their musicianship, for their endurance. After all, they had outguessed and outlived all their competition.

Their first Coast release, "My Home Town", didn't set any records but it did establish the Seeds of Time as a

recording group. It also beefed up their gig scene. So, where they didn't benefit from royalties, they did become in demand for appearances.

It was a long time coming but the Seeds have finally moved back on the scene with their new single, "Cryin' The Blues" penned by Geoff Edington, lead singer. The flip, "Baby Doll" was written by lead guitarist

Family Brown set for "Performers" showing

MCA country recording group, The Family Brown, has been skedded for a July 17th appearance on the new CBC-TV weekly variety series, "The Performers". The group will perform their most recent hit single, "R.R.#2" and "Proud Mary".

The Family Brown have just completed a tour through Ontario, appearing with a package which included "Country-time" stars, Myma Lorrie and Vic Mullen.

Besides their single, now resting lightly at the No.8 position on the RPM Country Fifty, the Brown's have released an album, reportedly picking up good national sales. There has been strong MOR jock reaction to the "Loving Her Is So Easy" cut, which features Barry Brown, who penned both this cut and their single release.

Brown, who is 19 years old, lives

US trade vetoes promo soirees

There was a writeup in one of the U.S. trade sheets recently about the rules for disc jockeys and music directors in regard to cocktail parties promoting

records. The writeup indicated that radio people are past attending such functions and it isn't the job of the radio types to be there and allow themselves to be "hyped".

Fine! Just one thing that should be made clear. In the area that we operate, you can throw a cocktail party to promote a new Canadian artist and chances are you will have a high press attendance and a near nil attendance from the radio people. But just throw a party for an established recording

"STAR" and the radio people will not only attend, but they will humble themselves at the altar.

My personal feeling about cocktail parties is that they serve a purpose other than "hyping" the act in question. The gathering is really meant to maintain a rapport between the two media. The artist or the record is the immediate excuse for the party. The radio people would find their knowledge of the business much enhanced by the mingling with the record people and the press at these functions. Indeed it would benefit the station and the staff, a great deal, to meet the record people and the artist on a common ground. If the U.S. version of a cocktail party puts the attending radio people under an obligation, then that is a problem that exists only in the U.S. In Canada, I doubt if the gathering puts anyone under any obligation. It does however equip the radio people to go before their audience, the next day, a little better informed — and it does get them away from their own element.

It was at cocktail parties where I discovered that many of the radio types were really genuine people, doing their job. I saw no attempt to bribe or influence them. In the end, the sound in the grooves will determine whether

the record is played — not a couple of drinks and a dry sandwich. That is the Canadian approach and it seems to be a little more grown up than the U.S. philosophy. The cocktail party goers are the music industry "jet set" and the active Canadian radio people are the ones who will "go to the trouble" as opposed to the "star struck" types who show only when guaranteed a ringside with a known artist.

Unique phone-in promotion by Capitol

Capitol Records are experimenting with a unique method of tying in a telephone line with a personal ad placed in a Toronto daily. The promotion gimmick, devised by Roland Legault, national advertising, and promotion, has resulted in over 200 calls being placed to the one line between 9 AM and 5 PM. There is no record kept after this time. The ad in the personal column simply reads: What's the Sound? Call 677-4444 anytime. When the caller makes contact, a recorded message from one of the label's promotion men introduces him to a couple of cuts from a new album, Cancon and others, plus fast breaking singles.

Should the experiment prove to be successful in the Toronto area, Capitol will increase the number of lines available and will extend the service to major cities across Canada.



CBC ready for fifth annual "Festival"

Three Ottawa area CBC radio outlets are once again in the midst of planning their annual "Festival". For the fifth year, CBO, CBOF and CBO FM are presenting numerous live acts in free concert throughout the summer months at Camp Fortune, located in the Gatineau Hills just outside Ottawa. In addition, segments of "Festival" will occur in the Opera House and Studio of the National Arts Centre, the country fairs of the Ottawa Valley, Hull, and the Sparks Street Mall in downtown Ottawa.

As usual the CBC Summer Festival offers a wide and varied range of entertainment. The biggest part of the festival, at Camp Fortune, runs from July 5th through to the 31st. The acts being presented include MWC's the Stampeders, the Woody Herman Orchestra, the Weight, Dionysos, Jacques Michel, O.P. Ferland, the Festival Orchestra, Bruce Cockburn, Murray McLauchlan, the Ottawa Civic Symphony and others. The entertainment ranges from rock with the Stampeders and Weight, to heavy rock with Dionysos, classical and choral with the orchestras, to some of the best in Canadian folk with Cockburn and McLauchlan.

One of the highlights of the series will be the performance of Beethoven's

"Wellington's Victory". The performance of the piece was rained out on both scheduled occasions at last year's festival and the producers are hoping to get it off the ground this year by the CBC Summer Festival Orchestra. Included in the performance are a contingent of rifles, an artillery unit, fireworks experts, trumpeters, and drummers. If it doesn't rain, "Wellington's Victory" promises to be a dramatic musical event.

In Ottawa's prestigious National Arts Centre, the proceedings will take on a different atmosphere. The "Tommy Hunter Show" kicks off the Arts Centre scheduling on July 7th. On the 15th, the CBC will present the National Arts Centre Orchestra and Phyllis Mailing in the first performance of a new work by Canadian composer Barbara Pentland. The next night, Ravi Shankar explores the sitar followed by Rob McConnell and the Boss Brass on the 21st backed up by Hagood Hardy and the Montage.

Additional concerts will be heard on the Opera Stage of the Arts Centre by the finalists in the CBC's 12th Radio Talent Festival. Those performing include Lynne Cantlon, lyric soprano; James Campbell, clarinetist; William Tritt, pianist; Paul Halley, organist and Ed Honeywell, guitarist.

In addition to such exclusively CBC ventures, "Festival" will also take part in a number of community events including Le Festival des Raftmen in Hull, an old-tyme fiddlers' contest, the Central Canada Exhibition, country fairs and daily broadcasts from the Sparks Street Mall.

All concerts and events forming part of the CBC Summer Festival will be recorded and used over the three outlets, CBO, CBOF and CBO FM. Other CBC outlets also make use of the festival for broadcast purposes.

Van's Siegel forms own promo firm

Sheldon Siegel, formerly in charge of promotion for Bruce Allen Talent Promotion, Vancouver, has gone solo and formed his own SOS promotion firm.

Siegel was involved with national promotion for Tom Northcott and Crosstown Bus, both of which were particularly successful in Eastern Canada.

Headquartering in Vancouver, Siegel has launched a promotion campaign to pick up clients for national and regional touting.

Music educators view pop culture

The recent Ontario Music Educator's Association Conference (Geneva Park) revealed the concern today's Music Educators have over what radio and popular music are doing to the young student. Coordinated by James Maben and Jimmy Brown, the Conference was a three day excitement packed mill of thought provoking revelations. The music teachers, representing the length and breadth of the province, were obviously not restricted, in taste, to any one bag. They were not only aware of the masters but of today's young composers including the Canadian variety. They listened attentively to three days of speech making and the performances of young students in an effort to evaluate the part that today's pop culture plays in the lives of public and high school students.

Dr. D.R. Burke, of the Department of Philosophy (Althouse College) University of Western Ontario, spoke Friday evening on the role played by popular music in today's culture. Dr. Burke picked up on the theme of the Conference, "Who pays the piper?" and took his audience back, on a word trip, to the Pied Piper of Hamelin, which appeared to relate very well with today's situation. Needless to say Dr. Burke's speech was the high point of the Conference.

Saturday morning was taken up with a

panel discussion by Andrew Held, ex-disc jockey (presently a music educator); John Bird, of the Gordon V. Thompson (Music Publisher); and Walt Grealis (RPM). Delegates had an opportunity to toss questions at the panel members.

An interesting aspect of the three day conference was the array of young musicians and singers, all students, who appeared before the music educators and laid on their interpretation of pop culture. From London, a school band, The Hunters, blasted their own music of today at the teachers with obvious effect. With each instrument amplified, the educators were front and centre in what was happening at pop festivals and a sound that would jar those over thirty. Even some of the swingers paled. As a contrast, the Fresh Outlook Singers, an Ottawa group of fifty singers and musicians organized by Bob Boulanger, a forward thinking music educator, presented selections that were closer to the middle of the road concept of music programming. Folk rock was also represented with performances by Two Plus from London.

To further introduce the music educators to today's pop culture, a light show was programmed for Saturday evening.


The Ontario Government has led the way in attempting to communicate with the younger generation and it was

interesting to note the concern this Association of Ontario Music Educators had for the same subject. They were genuinely attempting to relate with the young student and how they were being influenced by radio and popular music. They are sincerely involved in bridging the music gap and some have even found the solution -- student involvement. It was revealed, during the various discussion sessions, that the music educators were prepared to take a broader look at this new culture -- inflicted on us by radio. It was obvious, as the Conference gathered steam that there was a place in education for, not only the masters but, the music of the 60's and 70's.

Steel River winding up American tour

Tuesday recording unit Steel River, wind up their American tour July 4th. The fourteen state tour included venues with Three Dog Night, Steppenwolf and the James Gang. The group's Canadian manager, Bob Beames, is already preparing a steady pace of Canadian concerts throughout the month of July, with the group returning to the United States in August.

The group's disc effort, "Southbound Train", received picks in the foreign trades and won a vote of confidence from the Maple Leaf System.

"Reincarnate" is one hundred percent ours

Advance copies of the Summus single "The Reincarnate" indicated that only the Artist and Production was Canadian content. However, Mr. R.A. (Al) Allbutt, professional and promotion manager, Leeds Music (Canada) Ltd. has informed RPM that the single is 100% Canadian and should display a full MAPL logo. London Records has advised that succeeding pressings have been amended accordingly.

Allbutt also reports the movie, from which the single was taken, is breaking attendance records across Canada. Negotiations for a U.S. release are

being finalized with a hoped-for late summer release. UK and France releases are expected to follow.

There has been early indication that this Summus single could be a chart item. Notes Allbutt: "It looks very possible that the song 'No One ever Dies' from 'The Reincarnate' will be the first Canadian movie song to make it on the charts in Canada, as well as in the rest of the world."

The single has also been released in French.

Polydor acts into Canada for shows

The Bells, fresh from their million-selling "Stay Awhile", are booked

into Andre Perry Studios in Montreal in the first part of July to begin work on their second album for Polydor. Their current "Lady Dawn" is now charted world-wide.

Mariposa announces final talent list

Dick Flohil, of the Mariposa Festival, has announced completion of the talent list for this year's festival, to be held July 9, 10 and 11 at the Toronto Islands. In addition to those already announced such as Ramblin' Jack Elliot, Seals & Crofts, Bruce Cockburn, John Hartford, Harry Hibbs, Tom Connors and Pauline Julien, Mariposa has arranged for Liam Clancy, Lou Killen, the South Happiness Street Skiffle Band, Leon Redbone, Dave Essig, Delaney, Jo and Taylor, Don Audet, Bill Stevenson and a number of others.

This brings the total number of performers and craftsmen scheduled for Mariposa to more than two hundred. The festival is flying in fifty Indian craftsmen to display their skills in booths set up for that purpose on the Islands.

In order to cut costs, Mariposa has, this year, dropped the traditional evening concerts in favour of expanded daytime activities. Each day's activities will end at about nine in the evening.

Astra's Neufeld to tour cross-Canada

Astra recording artists and well-known composer, Rick Neufeld, is set to tour Canada during the months of June and July. The tour will take Neufeld from coast to coast with his wife in a newly-bought trailer. Neufeld hopes to visit virtually every radio station in Canada during the coming months, ending up in Toronto in mid-July for a stint at the Mariposa Festival.

Neufeld's current Astra single, "Country Princess" is currently picking up airplay and chart listings on over fifteen stations across the country. His first album is skedded for release shortly.

Ahed signs pact with Air London

Phil G. Anderson, president of Ahed Music Corporation of Toronto, has announced the signing of an agreement with AIR, London for the setting-up of a joint international company for the management of talent recorded by AIR. AIR is a record production firm including prominent producers such as George Martin and Peter Sullivan.

Four of Ahed's acts will be produced in London; Terry Black, Laurel Ward, and Debbie Lori Kaye by Sullivan and Parrish and Gurvit by Martin. The agreement was pacted by Bill Gilliland for Ahed and Barry Authors for AIR.

London promo push for Phase 4 month

London Records has put a concentrated push on its Phase 4 stereo line. The promotion, lasting from April 26 through May 26th, utilized impressive dealer displays, Phase 4 racks and Phase 4 prepacks. Sayers Music Stores did heavy display work at their three stores in Toronto as well as their Brampton outlet.

Rack jobber Handleman ran fifty Phase 4 pre packs to all K-Mart and Sayvette stores in Ontario. The product was placed in separate bunks with displays and in/store demos on some of the LP's.

Other Ontario dealers who participated in the promo were: Sam the Record Man (throughout Ontario), Paikin (Hamilton), All Records, Pindoff Record Sales, Hannover Centre (Toronto), House of Sounds (Kingston), Sherman's (Hamilton), and One Stop Record Distributing.

In Alberta the Phase 4 push was handled by London's Jim Carey. Adrian Bilodeau of London reports that the month-long promo was very successful in the west. One of the most extensive promos was at Lorins Records and Tapes in Edmonton, where extensive displays and racks were set up.

Griff headlines A Boot Jamboree

The Locarno Ballroom, Home of Canadian Country Music, brought Ray Griff in for their June 13th show and another successful evening for Dave and Irene Ralston, originators of this unique method of promoting Canadian talent.

Griff, now living in Nashville, was born in Calgary and has become a successful writer/performer in both Canada and the U.S. He penned "Canadian Pacific" for George Hamilton IV. Sharing the bill with Griff were Marie Babin, Jimmy Simms and Sam McKee.

The following Sunday (20) Johnny and The Jokers and Denny Ray and Johnny Ian took over the Boot Jamboree stage, courtesy of The Hamilton Entertainment Agency.

This is the second year the Ralstons have been running their Sunday evening Boot Jamborees. Canadian talent given the Sunday night treatment include both record and non-recording groups and soloists. Some of these were: Stompin' Tom Connors, Roy Payne, Gary Hooper, Honey West, Bob MacQuaid, Johnny Edwards, Fern Dauth, Gerry Doucette and many others.

Some very strange Canadian Customs

Toronto's Customs and-Excise Building is located in the bleak side of town...Front Street between Bay and Yonge, to be precise.

If you've been unfortunate enough to miss the area, let me hasten to explain that this section of Yonge Street is littered with dirty grey Government buildings full of fools, and quickie lunch places full of indigestion sufferers. There's also a couple of parking lots in the rubble remains of some fine old early 20th Century colonial construction.

Across Yonge Street is the O'Keefe Centre, and you wonder which side (and sight) is worse--the noble neo-Gothic monoliths now smeared with pigeon crap and exhaust fumes, or the concrete aircraft shelter-entertainment hall.

If you're getting the idea that Toronto has more charming areas than this one sparse region, you are right. Consequently, a trip to the Customs and Excise Building is a real music industry bumper.

Participants in the record business are fully aware of the tedium and tragedy in going to Customs. It's incredibly hard for U.S. records to elude the Customs blanket which seems to attach itself to every parcel which arrives from the southern climes.

No matter what you say, they slug you for every record or tape that comes from outside the Canadian borders. This, I suppose, is something of a boon for local record makers who can send their wares through the domestic mails, unhindered. Nevertheless, the people at Customs often take the whole number a little too far.

For example. No. That sounds a little harsh. Try this. Just as an instance, I happened to receive two of those yellow greeting cards from Customs which contained things which I needed. Usually I can't be bothered going to Customs just to pick up records, sight unseen. Canadian record companies are not that far behind with their release schedules.

Anyway, I was forced to make two trips into no-man's land recently to collect U.S. parcels. That in itself being a depressant, I found myself really brought down by the reasons for the trips.

Let us pause briefly to examine the

contents of the two aforementioned parcels.

One parcel was from Billboard magazine in New York and it contained five Trendsetter plaques to be pre-

sented to the Guess Who in Winnipeg. You will probably recall that in its year end issue, Billboard made its Trendsetter award to the Guess Who by virtue of the fact that they were the first Canadian group to break through in the U.S. album market.

Billboard desired a photo presentation of the awards, but Customs saw fit to slap an \$8 hit on these tributes to Canadian culture.

The second parcel was from RCA in New York. It contained a rush dub of the first Leigh Ashford album, which was produced in Toronto at RCA's Mutual St. studios. RCA had requested, a few days earlier, liner notes for this album to be compiled by me. The dub was for me to audition in order to lay down notes on this Toronto group's effort.

I was therefore receiving a pressing of a Canadian tape made by Canadian musicians, which had been sent to

the U.S. some weeks earlier. Presumably, customs had been paid to get the tape into the U.S. -- why then, should it be ripped off on its return? Especially in view of the contents thereon.

Unfortunately, Customs and Excise takes no interest in what is on records and tapes. They really couldn't care less. A master tape of the Beatles' new album costs the same to import into Canada as a tape of the Guess Who's greatest hits.

There are a great many anomalies in the present Customs laws regarding the music industry. The CRTC has given us a face by legislating for Canadian content. Now we need action on other fronts, to bring the whole picture into line.

Canadian recording studios find it difficult to compete with U.S. studios because of enormous Customs costs in importing equipment from England, Germany or the U.S. It's difficult to see Canada competing with Ampex or Scully or any other tape recorder manufacturers in the near future.

We desperately need revisions to the present Customs laws in their relationship to the record business. We need to clamor to our MP's and influential friends.

We need to make noise wherever we can. Explanatory letters to the CRTC (c/o Doug McGowan) will be of much assistance -- there is continual interdepartmental action within the

been courting some of New York's most impoverished creative talents. Rumour has it that they were to fulfill all of the commitments they seem to have made, they'd be very busy indeed. Or is this just a case of celebrity "slumming"?

David Peel, by the way, is into something interesting. The originator of the "Have A Marijuana" record on **Elektra**, **David** is now planning to record another album live in the streets and then distribute it totally by himself. He will have about a thousand albums pressed, and bring them around to head shops, record stores and the like himself.

Carole King is an incredibly big star. Now, both her album and single are number one on the charts this week, and Friday she will have her first solo concert at New York's Carnegie Hall. **Carole** doesn't plan on giving any interviews, however. (Perhaps she doesn't want the same thing to happen to her success as did to her friend **James Taylor**...a bit of overkill...)

The **Beatles** took eight days to sell out Shea Stadium, and **Grand Funk** did it in three. Over 21,000 kids were on hand on the morning the tickets went on sale - at least 12,000 of them slept out-side all night. Promoter **Sid Bernstein**, who also produced the **Beatles'** concert said, "My god, I've just never seen anything like this in my life. And they say rock is dead."

Aretha Franklin broke all records at the Apollo Theater last week when she

performed there. Lines stretched around the block for every performance, and by mid-afternoon each day, the evening performances were entirely sold out. This was her first appearance at the Apollo in five years, and the coverage on it was tremendous.

In my opinion the greatest living cartoonist is **R. Crumb**. He is truly the **Walt Disney** of the seventies, but until now has been mainly underground. But this fall, an animated cartoon of "Fritz The Cat", based on one of the well-known **Crumb** characters, will be seen in movie houses---with an X-rating. Producer **Steve Krantz** and **Ralph Bakshi** believe that "Fritz" will change the face of animation-adding sex, political satire and social comment to entertainment.

Creedence Clearwater will begin a ten-city, two month tour in July. The tour will coincide with the release of the group's latest single. **Tom Fogarty** will not be with the group, and so far, no replacement has been mentioned. **Bo Diddley** will be along for the tour, so will **Tower of Power**.

The Schaefer Music Festival in Central Park this year has some incredible evenings planned. There are 34 nights of rock, folk, soul, jazz and blues-starting next week and lasting throughout the summer. Among the acts featured are **The Band**, **Ravi Shankar**, **Melanie**, **The Supremes**, **Sha-Na-Na**, **Procul Harum**, **Kris Kristofferson**, and two oldies nights with famed disc jockey **Murray the K** and some great old groups.

Miss Murray also placed third in the Newcomer Female album category in the same poll. "This Way Is My Way" and "Straight, Clean and simple" were the contributing factors. They were released in the U.S. as "Snowbird" and "Anne Murray".

Great achievements came easily to Miss Murray over the past year. She topped the RPM poll as Top Female Vocalist of 1970 and received a Juno Award in February. She also became the first Canadian female artist to receive a million-seller award in the U.S. and Canada — for her recording of "Snowbird".

RECORD PEOPLE.....will long remember the big bash that a Toronto radio station threw in a castle full of champagne. In what had to be the biggest bash since the CFRB Inn On



The Park "mob scene" and the Revolution champagne party at St. Lawrence Hall, CHFI-AM changed the name of their station and christened CFTR with 680 magnums of champagne. The fact that any ad agency, record company - or CFTR were operational the next day.....was amazing. Congratulations to Ted Rogers and his staff for the bash to end all bashes!!! (Ed: Those radio people could teach the record companies a thing or two!!!)

GROUPS HAVE HITS.....and no one really cares, but suddenly, one group has a million seller and all hell breaks loose. The trade is buzzing with rumours of radio station involvement, court actions, payola, another court action and all kinds of people making all kinds of claims. One of them claims to be running a very

powerful radio station from his booking agency offices. When he says "jump" this powerful radio station asks "how high?" THAT'S what HE claims. I choose NOT to believe it, and I know his method of operation VERY WELL.

STRONG RUMOUR.....that a number of stations have been DISCOVERED to be SHORT of their 30% Cancon quota, and rumours have it that they will be called before the powers that be and may possibly be charged with violating the Broadcast Act. (Ed: Who starts these rumours?)

IN THAT FAR OFF PRAIRIE PROVINCE.....a radio type is so involved in music industry enterprises, that it is surprising he can find time to do his job at the radio station.

A RADIO GROUP.....is canvassing the "record companies" for submissions to their annual awards for records. They should look around for a list of Canadian record producers to whom they should send their forms - not just the record DISTRIBUTORS. (Ed: You better take a couple more paragraphs to explain that! And I CERTAINLY DON'T KNOW anything about these awards you are talking about!)

Government and you can bet your boots that any practical and persuasive submission regarding the music industry and present import/export restrictions will be passed on with official nods and jokes.

It's a joke that Jack Richardson has to pay import duties on a copy of a new Guess Who single, which he produced. It's ridiculous that Bernie Finkelstein can't get an English pressing of Bruce Cockburn's album sent over without interference.

In fact, it's completely ridiculous that there are any record business-oriented Customs and Excise laws in existence. Rock is an art form, and if it's Canadian, it's going to play an integral role in the future evolution of Canadian nationalism (read also anti-Americanism).

What I'm discussing here are sample copies of records for review purposes — marked as such. I can readily understand why there are tariffs to protect record production in Canada, but my concern is with promotion copies meant to be reviewed — in quantities of one.

The free interchange of ideas, thoughts and dreams (viz. the pop record) should be undertaken throughout the world with the same respect and freedom of access accorded a new shipment from a Geneva blood bank.

Let us put an end to these archaic Customs laws. Let our music scene grow by creative leaps and bounds—not by tying up all our record producers and music directors and rock writers in traffic jams in such a bleak bringdown part of town as Front Street.






