

## 300 MILLION EUROPEANS AWARE OF CANUCK SCENE

Maple Music Inc. recently undertook a special study of the aftermath of the recent Maple Music Junket and have come up with an amazing revelation that the total potential audience (reader and listener) reach of the MMJ guests was 290,616,000. The 92 junketeers contribute to hundreds of newspapers and magazines as well as several broadcast networks, including the giant BBC world-wide service.

Reporters/columnists were present from newspapers representing the largest circulation in the world. These included: England's News of the World ( 18 million) The Daily Mirror (14 million); and The Sun (10 million).
The Maple Music Junket, which received a grant of $\$ 35,000$ from the Federal Government, contributions from CAPAC and BMI Canada Ltd., the two Canadian performance rights societies and the bulk of the monies from the Canadian Recording Manufacturers' Association (more than $\$ 70,000$ ) flew the European media guests to Canada on a specially chartered aircraft for a sampling of Canada's best in folk, middle of the road, country and music of today recording units. Concerts took place in Montreal and Toronto between June 2 and 8.
The junketeers, who apparently influence the opinions of more than 300 million Europeans on a regular basis, were hand picked from 15 nations. These included the U.K., France, Germany, Spain, Switzerland, Australia, Italy, The Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and Finland.

## GALT MacDERMOT LECTURES AT MacMILLAN THEATRE

Galt MacDermot, composer of the music for "Hair" and "Two Gentlemen Of Verona", was chosen to be this year's CAPAC lecturer for the Lecture and Recital Series for 1972, sponsored by The Summer School of the Royal Conservatory of Music. MacDermot's first date at the MacMillan Theatre (July 27) of the Edward Johnson Building of the University of Toronto consisted of a live performance of excerpts from his two musicals as well as from a new work he is currently putting together. Performing artists for this session included: Salome Bey; drummer, Bernard Purdie; Gordon Edwards, bass; and guitarist Billy Nichols.

The second evening (28) consisted of a short lecture and a question and answer period on music and theatre.

CAPAC's Jan Matejcek hosted an informal get together after the Thursday lecture at Zeev's Tavern and a special press conference the following evening in the French Room of the Park Plaza Hotel.

The MacMillan Lectures were established in 1963 and are sponsored by the Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada (CAPAC) and were named in honour of CAPAC's long standing President, Sir Ernest MacMillan.
The Lectures were instituted in collabora-

Prior to the Junket, Canadian music was thought to be part of "America". Even the Guess Who were regarded as Americans. Since the return of the MMJ guests, press and radio mentions have brought Canadian music to the forefront. Stampeders' manager, Mel Shaw, received so many requests for his group that he enplaned for Europe (July 19) for talks with promoters, bookers and record execs throughout Europe. A date at the Olympia in Paris has already been tentatively set. Anne Murray, already an established name in the UK and Europe, returns to England and an EMI sponsored tour of the major centres.

The Canadian Government Travel Bureau, who have restricted their "sounding off" to historical and mundane Canadian attractions i.e. The Rockies, Calgary Stampede, Toronto Fair etc.) have now recognized the potential of the Canadian music industry. They have arranged to send Canadian posters to each of the journalists and broadcasters who came to Canada.

Future events to capitalize on the Maple Music Junket, which actually represented the largest gathering of foreign press on Canadian soil in our history, have been underway between the Board of Directors of Maple Music Inc. and Federal officials. There are no definite plans, at time of writing, but one spokesman noted: "There isn't much question about whether we will continue to promote Canadian music to the world as a united industry - the only questions are exactly which ways it will be done."

## MORNING MUSIC'S KRYTIUK CONCLUDES SEVERAL DEALS

Jury Krytiuk of Morning Music Toronto has concluded several deals recently one with Clyde Otis of Eden Music Corp and Prentice Music Corp. of Englewood, N.J.

This agreement gives Morning Music the right to represent Prentice and Eden in Canada and the West Indies and covers more than 1600 compositions including standards: "It's Just a Matter of Time", "The Boll Weevil Song", "A Lover's Question" and others including the Isley Brothers current release, "Pop That Thang".

Krytiuk also finalized negotiations for a sub-publishing deal with Charlie Boy Music and the Harbot Music catalogues.

Charlie Boy's recent releases included Ray Price's "That's What Leavin's About" and from the Harbot catalogue, Crystal Chandeliers" by Charley Pride.

## POPPY FAMILY/STAMPEDERS IN FOR CBC FORUM TAPING

The fourth concert in its Summerfest '72 series, sees the CBC tape a "live" concert featuring the Poppy Family and Stampeders from the Ontario Place Forum, Friday July 28th at 8 PM. Unfortunately the CBC press release was dated July 21 st and this issue doesn't hit the Toronto streets until the very day of the concert. Fortunately however, the show is being taped for broadcast at a later date on the entire CBC radio AM and FM network.
The Poppy Family, Terry and Susan Jacks (Terry is subject of this week's RPM cover), first broke into the national disc race with a budget produced session in Vancouver. The song, "Which Way You Goin' Billy?", a Terry Jacks penning, went on to become an international hit and catapulted the Poppy Family into the top of London's roster of stars. Their "Billy" single certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) as did their follow-up album. They have become one of the few sustaining successes on the Canadian disc front. Terry and Susan have just recently split - not divorced, but are now releasing solo singles and albums because of the success each had with experimental solo singles over the past couple of years. Terry is currently making good headway up the RPM 100 with
"Concrete Sea", another composition out of his Gone Fishin' - BMI publishing house.

The Stampeders, who just recently scored four firsts in their hometown of Calgary, (being accepted in Calgary was their biggest coup) are also big winners with Canadian Gold. With eight years of many disappointments, rejections and everything else that usually made groups split, they finally hit with "Sweet City Woman" which went on to become one of the biggest selling singles in the world with releases in more than 22 countries. Their follow-up album,
"Against The Grain" chalked up surprising sales and certified for Canadian Gold only a few weeks after release. They are back on the charts once again, this time with "Wild Eyes" which is receiving strong support from the broadcast medium. Last year they picked up an RPM J uno Award as Canada's best Vocal/Instrumental Group, with group member Rich Dodson receiving a Special RPM Award as Composer of The Year (for penning "Sweet City Woman"). They have also received Awards from BMI Canada and the Moffat Broadcasting chain.
Hosting the CBC Radio's Summerfest '72 is Alex Trebek. Airing dates will be announced later.

# PITY THE POOR AND RIGHTEOUS PROGRAMMERS 

Well, we are in the middle of something of a controversy.
Apparently, we are being too tough on the programmers. It has been brought to our attention by both record companies and

radio people that the problems of the domestic industry lay at the feet of two radio stations, and RPM isn't making this clear. We seem to editorialize and include all programmers in our criticism.
Two things. Are too many programmers experiencing a guilt complex? And are a few record companies starting to cop out on

the domestic production movement (if it ever could have been called a movement)?
If there are two stations that hold the key to a music industry in Canada, or if there are a dozen that hold the key, or if there are even more, then isn't it the responsibility of the OTHER broadcasters to police the offenders who are causing the trouble? If the percentage of Canadian content is increased because of a few offenders, RPM should be the last to blame. Obviously the CRTC has more people in the field checking on the spirit of the legislation than RPM, and it's obvious that RPM is merely reading the writing on the wall.

## VANCOUVER'S STUDIO 3 WOOS WEST COAST CLIENTELE

Studio 3, the first to introduce 8 then 16 track systems to the West Coast, have recently undergone renovations including a new board. Taking advantage of the newsworthy event, Studio 3 invited Vancouver and area record people to look in on their new board, 16 track system - and new paint job. Hosting the six hour reception was Studio 3's Ralph Harding. Guests included BMI Canada personnel, artists, managers, radio and television personalities, members of the press, producers and even their competition.

Studio 3 have put a lot of sound under their belt over the past few months including the soundtrack for the "Tall Ships" score as well as the laying down of sound for David Greenfield's "New York Is Closed Tonight".

The latter was a Doell-Lungren Production and is released in Canada and the U.S. on the Laurie label. Jake Doell has just completed taping sessions for Ken Stolz and Pat MacDonnel.

The Irish Rovers' CBC-TV "live" set, taped during one of their television shows has been scrapped because of sound problems. Studio 3 was asked to create a "live" situation for their recording. A beer and food bash was arranged and the doors thrown open, resulting in a fun packed studio and a successful recording by the Irish Rovers. Their album, to be released on their own potato label, is expected shortly.

Ready for the studios again are Sunshyne and Jason Hoover. The latter achieved some success in Ontario and Quebec with their Phonodisc distributed single, "Everything Is Alright" but failed to get sufficient numbers across the country to break nationally. Both Sunshyne and Jason Hoover release on the New Syndrome label. Just completed is an album session by recently discovered Bev Gore Langton from Victoria, and an album by Joy, produced by Merv Buchanan.

How nice it would be for RPM to believe that we hold the reins and call the shots when it comes to percentages or new regulations. We really don't think we are that important.
As for the record companies, we would like to know why some of them take the side of the broadcasters when things are going well for their Canadian content records, and then cry bloody murder when their records receive the usual "garbage" rejection!
Well friends, we just aren't sure which way to turn. We are damned if we do, and we are damned if we don't. Could the whole bunch of you get together and let us know exactly which way the wind is blowing?
Now if all you Pollyannas out there want to believe that everything is cool and that waves shouldn't be made, then let me know officially. I would like to have it on file that the industry is happy (that week) because a week later, I don't want to receive phone calls telling me the industry is all up in arms about two radio stations.
On the other hand, have the record companies ever made their problems known to the CRTC and the other governing bodies that are interested in records? Or have the radio stations come out against the other radio stations that aren't doing their part in maintaining the regulations?
One other thing. We still maintain an open door policy for comments from anyone in the trade who has a comment. Letters to the editor will be printed without the names of the writer if this request is made within the body of the comment. We would no more ask writers to identify themselves than radio stations ask callers to identify themselves on their phone-in shows.

## COAST TO COAST

It seems that only five or six media monsters in Canada are capable of running a radio station, and the CRTC are hellbent on making sure that all the available AM licences eventually land in the same hands.. or are they. We will watch with great interest. (Pub: See you in Vancouver at the cesspool.)


You've heard of . . . MUCH MORE
MUSIC. Play around with those words and you'll find a line that is closer to the truth. The odds are that you will find the winning arrangement. Somebody already has. (Pub: Oh! Now! Aren't we being a little direct???)
On the Toronto radio scene . . . one radio station is losing its importance with the record companies. The listeners may react the same way. (Pub: That's right pal!)
NO MATTER . . . how you look at it, the Maple Music Junket was a great success. It's about time someone said that arid meant it. It is true.

The union concerts in the park netted one rock concert of the many dozens that are taking place in Toronto. One might ask the union where most of the money that is handed to the musicians really comes from.

## FIVE MAN ELEC BAND CANCEL ONTARIO PLACE

What was expected to be one of the highlights of the CBC radio network "live"" broadcasts from Ontario Place has turned into a large sized disappointment. Polydor's Five Man Electrical Band, scheduled for an appearance at the multi-million dollar Ontario Government showplace, have apparently cancelled out their concert.
There have been many rumours circulating throughout the trade on both sides of the border that the highly successful Ottawa group were splitting. These rumours had been denied but this sudden cancellation has strengthened the rumours. Their current single "The Devil and Miss Lucy" hasn't been their fastest mover, with only regional action keeping it active.

The answer is rock records. The other question is whether there was a rock musician represented on the committee that picked the bands that will play in the parks of Toronto. (Pub: I TRUST you have all the facts!)
The Vancouver booking scene is the talk of Toronto, and none of it is very good. We thought the Toronto booking scene was the cesspool of Canadian entertainment, but the honour must go to Vancouver and one of the "big boys" there. This casts the same shadow of doubt on the Vancouver union as the doubt that the Toronto union is really policing what is happening to their members.

Rumour has it . . . that a Toronto sign painter is being kept very busy painting the call letters of a Toronto station, reversing them and a few signs that aren't complimentary to the CRTC. A laxative may be in order.

## TROIANO'S MERCURY SET BECOMES HOT CHART ITEM

Mercury's first big Canadian content acquisition, Dom Troiano, has become an item of national interest by both programmers and consumers. His initial album release "Domenic Troiano", is already picking up preferred play across the country and is on its way to becoming a top seller for Mercury.
It's interesting to note that although Troiano plays lead guitar for the James Gang, a Capitol recording unit, he has signed a solo recording agreement with Mercury. The album was given an even greater Canadian content value (it qualifies for three parts MAL) with back-up musicians from Mandala and Bush and vocals by Shawn Jackson. One of the most requested selections on the album is "Writings On The Wall" which has been included on the next, Three Dog Night album.
Taking part in the signing and overseeing of Troiano's set were Stan Bly, National Director of Promotion for Mercury; Denny Rosencrantz, West Coast A\&R, who convinced Troiano to join Mercury; and Mike Gormley, Director of Publicity and Canadian Ambassador to Mercury and Chicago, in general.

Canadian record production is on the increase. Country music has never been put out so often and in such great QUANTITY. Howdy partner. Aren't you proud to be a Canadian in Canadian country, but what about the other forms of music. (Pub: You mean it's a country country!!!)
RPM is planning a move into bigger quarters sometime at the end of August. The new address will be announced in RPM shortly. The new building is only a stones-throw from the present location, but don't throw stones.

## MARIPOSA WET BUT AHEAD ON PROFIT

Centre Island just across the water from Toronto was the setting for the 12 th annual Mariposa Folk Festival held on July 14, 15, and 16. Helping to organize the festival were Buzz Chertkoff, festival administrator, Estelle Klein, Leigh Cline, Richard Flohil, public relations/publicity and Isla Adelson along with the many who did volunteer work to get it all together.

The first two days of the festival were very wet due to the rains that fell and fell. By Sunday the sun was up, the ground was slippery and soggy but the 14,000 people who showed up to a sold out day came to enjoy the various concerts, the craftsmen and the ethnic groups displaying their dances and music.

Among those performing for the three-day festival were Murray McLauchlan, Bruce Cockburn, Edith Butler, John Prine, Leon Redbone and Bukka White to name a few.

The music ranged from rustic blues to religious tunes to sing-along familiar folk tunes. Special guest appearances were made by Joni Mitchell, Neil Young and Bob Dylan who reportedly was not on the Island but those who were clapping along to his songs would strongly disagree with that statement.

The diversified crafts included weaving, painting, carving, jewellery and leather goods which were being made and sold by the craftsmen who were from all parts of the country. Mariposa, the only annual folk festival is a place to meet friends, sing songs, clap along and feel the music and activity around you and being part of it all.

## TERRY JACKS INTO SOLO DISC SCENE

Well - the story's out. Terry and Susan Jacks have split. Hang onto your turntables it's not what you think and if you make a pass at Susan you'll still have to answer to Terry. The big fisherman has gone solo and he's made fast inroads with his first single, "Concrete Sea" on the London label.
Now - what makes Terry run? Success in the songwriting and recording field, is the answer. Let's go back to the year 1969.
Terry and Susan were just a couple of love birds - up to their nest in hock. They were trying to break through the disc jungle but weren't having much success. An old warehouse, housing a makeshift sound system was one of their hangouts and they played around, overdubbed, played around a bit more and finally had the nerve to release "Which Way You Goin' Billy?" Needless to say the hardhearted industry, generally, said get lost - Poppy who?
Where there's smoke there's fire and Terry who wrote "Billy" was sizzling. He knew he had a hit and he was going to prove it. Alice Koury and Fraser Jamieson, the latter treating Terry like a son, also believed that this west coast duo could supply the 1969 answer for a Canadian happening. Promotion, hype, and more promotion and finally the London network of promotion people began to click. Susan and Terry were picking up strong numbers in principal and breakout markets across Canada. Then the Americans
discovered the Jacks and it wasn't long before "Billy" became a national U.S. hit with Europe following. The Poppy Family were the Canadian happening for 1969 they received the honours of being voted by the industry (RPM) Juno Awards) as having produced the best single of the year. The single also certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) once its direction was established.

Release after release seemed to click for the handsome couple from Vancouver. They tried their hand at solo bits and Susan came out ahead, several times. They conferred with Fraser and Alice and decided to hit the disc trail, singly. Susan has proven her point before but she was still tagged Poppy Family featuring Susan Jacks. Now however, they have decided to remain man and wife but go their separate record ways, which doesn't really mean they'll never record together again. After all, it gets pretty lonely being just a solo artist. A Gold Record is a poor substitute for keeping you warm at night. Anyway Terry bust out first and a look at the charts will show just what he is doing.
There's more to the success story of Susan and Terry Jacks than that which meets the eye or, for that matter, is public record. It was mentioned that back in 1969 they were in hock. Like most married couples, they owed a few bucks and really didn't have much of a future cut out for them. Terry liked to fish and Susan was just a homebody.

But what happened to them after they hi. with "Billy" should serve as an example of
what can happen to Canadian talent - if they believe and are masters of their own destiny

The Jacks aren't spooked by agents or publishers. They work when they want to and how they want to. They demand and if their demands aren't met, Terry goes fishing and Susan remains a homebody. Their demands are usually met however, but Terry manages to get in a lot of fishing from his yatch, which is docked, down the cliff, from their $\$ 125,000$ home on the Pacific coast. If the water is too rough for docking he usually ties-up in a small inlet not far from their home - but they can make this in no time in their expensive Italian sports car.
Can you make money in the Canadian music industry? There's one who has, or our front cover this week - Terry Jacks.

# IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE MAPLE MUSIC JUNKET 

Well the Maple Music Junket seems to have done its job. According to the non-profit Maple Music Inc. the number of consumers who will eventually have been reached by Maple Music hype is close to three hundred million. Already, thousands of inches of

type have told the story of Canadian music to the European people. The reach of some of the journalists who took part in the Junket is little short of incredible. Three British papers have staggering circulations: the News of the World, eighteen million, the Daily Mirror, fourteen million and the Sun, ten million. These three papers alone, have exposed our music, in a positive way, to an audience which is larger than the entire population of Canada.

A few quotes, selected by Maple Music Inc. tell the story: "I believe that Canada could become a leading force in world music." Tony Norman, New Musical Express; "Canadian pop has plenty to be proud of." Michael Cable, Daily Mail; "the most ambitious governmentindustry sponsored music festival ever", Gordon Reed, Scottish Daily Express; "beautifully organized", Peter Jones, Record Mirror.

These quotes tell the story but of course everything was not roses, there were a few put downs, and Maple Music of course ignores these, but it is impossible to deny that the opinions expressed have been overwhelmingly favourable. Thus the Junket has achieved its stated goal, Canadian artists have been written about in Europe. Many of the artists will be appearing in Europe shortly. Singles and albums have been, or are being, released. For this we must thank the originators and the organizers of the Junket as well as the guests.

In case you're beginning to think that this little column has broken with tradition and is not going to gripe and bellyache, you're wrong. I will gripe and bellyache in the approved manner but for once I am prepared to offer some constructive, although probably soon to be shot down, advice. Gripe Department: I would be willing to bet my album collection that more has been written about Canadian music in the foreign press in the last two months than has been written in the Canadian daily press in

[^1]the last ten years. Constructive Advice Department: Although it should not be needed, organize a junket in Canada, along similar lines to MMJ I for the exclusive edification of the Canadian media.
Instead of Montreal and Toronto as showplaces, it would be perhaps advisable to select one western and one eastern site. In the aftermath of this domestic Junket, follow-up immediately with a full scale cross Canada tour by all the artists on the bill, hitting fifteen or so major centres.

This idea is not based on the principle that the artists on the bill will become acclaimed throughout the land and their records will therefore make money in this country. It is based rather on the idea that we cannot fairly expect to establish stars in England, Germany, the United States, or Tasmania, until they are bonafide stars here. Every producer has come up against the age old question, "Well, what's it doing in Canada?" when trying to make a deal elsewhere or to secure a release date if a deal has already been made. Who knows, perhaps the tour part of this domestic Junket could become an annual event, featuring Canada's biggest stars, along with a few lesser lights. Such an annual happening could develop into the highlight of the year's concerts in each centre it plays and there is no reason on earth why it could not make money, after a teething period, to pay the artists a substantial fee with any profit accruing to Maple Music Inc., or a similar body set up to promote the affair.
In conjunction with this, I suggest some form of service to provide news of this star building to the media and record people in other countries. For too long, people in other countries, particularly the United States, have been under the illusion that one or two radio stations in this country fairly and accurately reflect what is going on here. This myth must be shattered. It has already been the undoing of too many good artists and is currently killing one of our biggest hits. I don't like to harp on this one, but to indicate that my harping is done in good faith I will state that I have never received a colour television from the group in question, I have never gone on an expense paid trip with them, I don't have part of the publishing and I don't book them. The group is the Stampeders, and the hit is "Wild Eyes". This particular record has sold almost fifty thousand copies in Canada OUTSIDE ONTARIO. The sales in Ontario are negligible due to the refusal of one station, CHUM, I331 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario owned by CHUM Limited, to play it, except for spotty and useless play during the two weeks required by the MLS laws.

For many American stations, CHUM is
considered to be the great white god of Canadian recordom. If CH UM doesn't like it, you can pretty well write off the hopes of a Canadian-signed group making it in the U.S. What the Americans don't seem to know is that CHUM does not come close to reflecting what is really |happening here. Taking a quick glance at the CHUM Chart would convince unknowing American programmers and record people that Pagliaro's "Some Sing, Some Dance" and April Wine's "Bad Side of the Moon" are bigger hits than "Wild Eyes". What these people couldn't be expected to know is that both Pagliaro and April Wine are produced by Much Productions which co-incidentally happens to be owned by CHUM Limited and that the publishing of both sides of the Pagliaro and the flip side of the April Wine are owned by Summerlea/Winterlea, which again coincidentally, is owned by CHUM Limited. They are both excellent records, there is no question of that, and they do deserve airplay on CHUM, the CHUM owned stations across Canada, and on any other station for which the sound is suitable. But they do not deserve airplay on CHUM to the exclusion of "Wild Eyes" or any other record which has almost reached the point of being certified gold in Canada with virtually no sales in Ontario, a market which usually accounts for half of the total national sales.
It's an incredibly ludicrous situation, and if the CRTC or any other government body is scared to take steps, then the industry itself must make it clear to the world that CHUM is not representative of the Canadian music scene, and that other sources of information must be considered. Without this educational process, any domestic junket would be valueless as far as international impact goes.

## DALLAS HARMS HITS WITH COLUMBIA DECK

Columbia's newest country acquisition, Dallas Harms, is proving to be one of the label's strongest contenders for a national breakout. His initial single release, "In The Loving Arms Of My Marie" which he wrote, has made good moves up the RPM Country Playlist - much of it due to the readiness of country programmers to lean on what several term "a bitch of a record". The single was produced by Gary Buck for Arpeggio Productions but there is no indication of publisher or where the single was taped.
Harms, born in Drake, Saskatchewan, fronts a group known as Shiloh which also features a couple of other top flight recording artists - Donna Ramsay and Lee Roy Anderson. Miss Ramsay previously released on the Astra label and created a national image for herself with her single, "Something In Your Face". She will be seen shortly on Cy True's CBC-TVer "Countrytime" out of Halifax.
Anderson, who goes under the name of Lee Roy and releases on the RCA label, is perhaps one of Canada's most under-rated pop
country artists. A native of Calgary, Lee Roy has been kicking around the industry for many years and has released exceptionally well produced singles and albums but has never bent enough programmer ears to catch on. His most recent release, "My Soul Sings Out", received token play but not enough to establish him nationally. His next release, "Hold On To A Little Bit Of Love" is expected shortly. Lee Roy plays lead guitar and five string banjo in the Shiloh group.

Other members of Shiloh are Ken Scott, bass player and singer who hails from Stavely Alberta; and drummer Ian Clark of Hamilton.
Shiloh are into the commercial pop/country and blue grass music and deliver a very tight and hard driving four part harmony. Much of their success on the night club circuit, booked by Harold Kudlets of Hamilton, is their ability to play their audience. They are equally at home with pop as they are with country.
After playing several dates throughout Ontario they head for Prince Edward Island for three weeks.

## STONES PASS THROUGH WITHOUT INCIDENT

The famous Rolling Stones currently on a North American tour were into Toronto for two shows on July 15 th. Over 30,000 attended the concerts. There were 400 additional police on duty at Maple Leaf Gardens in anticipation of trouble from the crowds but there were no incidents either before or after the concerts.

Opening the Rolling Stones show was Stevie Wonder who was very well received. Although the temperature in the Gardens was 105 degrees it didn't affect the enthusiasm of the crowd with the appearance of Mick Jagger on stage. The Stones' latest LP "Exile on Main Street" on the Kinney label is currently listed at No. 1 on the RPM chart.

The main problem at other concerts have been scalpers selling unsolicited tickets causing fans to be turned away at the door. This problem occured in Montreal where more than 3,000 people were unable to get in to see the group at the Forum. This caused a riot with breaking of windows soon quelled by the riot squad brought in to settle the crowd. Another incident that occurred in Montreal was a bomb placed in one of the trucks carrying the group's equipment.

## KARL ERIKSON SIGNED TO BEECHWOOD

Willi Morrison, of Beechwood-Capitol Music, has announced the signing of an exclusive writing contract with Karl Erikson, Erikson has been writing and performing for some years, and has, amongst other things, had an album released in Australia.
As a result of his demos for BeechwoodCapitol, Erikson has generated considerable interest among record companies. A recording-contract signing is expected to be announced shortly.

## RECORDING SESSION SET FOR EDWARD, GEORGE, HARDING

Celebration recording artists, Edward, George \& Harding, have returned to Toronto from a successful tour of the Atlantic Provinces and will shortly move into Eastern Studios for an album session. Their manager, Mark Robbins, will look after production chores.

The trio, who have had much success on the U.S. college circuit, open at George's in Toronto from July 31st to August 5th. They return to the east coast and a date at the Black Knight Lounge, in Halifax, from Aug 21 through Sept. 9.

## VALADE/DIRT BAND GO FOR QUEBEC

UA's Quebec promotion manager, Keith Patten can take a bow for the phenomenal action being given the left fielder hit "Jambalaya" by the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. It is currently the strongest selling single in the province being on every major Quebec radio station chart. The single experienced only limited success in Anglo Canada and the U.S.

Patten is moving in on UA's latest Canadian acquisition, Claudia Valade. Her initial single release, "Pour Un Homme" is now beginning to show early indications of a breakout across the province. Miss Valade has lent herself to Patten who has escorted her on a successful province-wide tour of radio and television stations.

Another UA Canadian signing, Peter Thom, is showing early promise with his single "Letter To Jacksonville" and the album from which it was culled. Thom played Montreal's Karma Coffee House and toured Montreal radio and television stations which accounted for wide acceptance of his record product.

## QUALITY'S MAMA LION CONTEST BRINGS LION CUB TO NEW ZOO

Quality's Ontario Promotion Manager Bob Morten recently put together a contest that brought much attention to Toronto's new zoo (soon to open) and to Mama Lion (Lyne Carey) who appeared recently at the Colonial Tavern. It also resulted in Mr. Walter Gray, Director of Puhlic Affairs for the New Metro Zoo, being presented with a cheque for $\$ 300$ from Quality for the purchase of a lion cub. The contest was held in conjunction with CKFH, Sherman's Music Centre and Quality Records Limited.

Contest entrants were asked to submit a name for the lion cub to CKFH and were also asked to support the "New Metro Toronto Zoo". Quality arranged for Mama Lion preserve wildlife bumper stickers, which were available at CKFH, Shermans and the Colonial along with posters and photos.
Prizes consisted of: First prize: a juke box filled with top 40 hits plus selected golden goodies (not all Quality); Second prize: $\$ 150$ retail value of Quality Record albums (approximately 25 albums); and 5 runners up who were treated to a dinner at the Colonial Tavern.
Winning entrant was from Kent Chmilar of Mississauga who named the cub Torzo. Second prize went to Kelly Lynch of Toronto for the name Roarmus.

In appreciation for the efforts of CKFH, Miss Carey, Shermans, the Colonial Tavern and Quality Records, Mr. Gray presented each organization with a certificate of appreciation from the New Metro Zoo. The cheque for $\$ 300$ was turned over to Gray by Miss Carey.
Duff Roman presented the contest winners with their prizes at Shermans Music Centre (July 7).
Other events that led to the success of the contest were spots purchased on CKFH along with the station's own public service announcements to promote the zoo and the contest; thirty second spots to promote "Mama Lion" at the Colonial; a taped interview with "Mama Lion" on CFTR along with visits to CHUM-FM, CKFH and CKOC; and a press/radio reception at the Colonial Tavern in conjunction with Ampex, tape distributors.

## DECCA'S WISHBONE ASH INTOTORONTO'S VARSITY

Decca recording artists, Wishbone Ash, are into Toronto's Varsity Stadium for a July 31 st engagement. Wishbone Ash will be sharing the bill with Black Sabbath and Argent. The English group recently had their third album released by Decca, "Argus".

The album gained immediate reaction in Britain and is now enjoying strong initial acceptance from campus and progressive radio.
MCA, the distributor of Decca product in Canada, is preparing for the group's appearance with a full schedule of in-store display work, radio spots and interviews.


## SKYLARK PUTS VANCOUVER INTO NATIONAL DISC RACE

The latest and most legitimate Vancouver discovery, Skylark, have brought Western Canada into the national record race. Their initial album release was somewhat unique being released in the U.S. first with copies being rushed into their hometown of Vancouver before Canadian release, handled by Capitol. In view of the strong regional acceptance of the album, Bill Bannon, national promotion manager for the label, has scheduled a "pull all stops" promotion for the set.

Skylark is comprised of four Vancouver musicians, David Foster, keyboards; Donny Gerrard, male vocalist and bass player; Duris Maxwell, drummer; and B.J. Cook.

Leader of the group is 22 year old David Foster who arranged and penned all the string parts with the exception of "A Long Way To Go" and "Wildflower" which were arranged by Jimmie Haskell. Foster first entered the business at the age of sixteen and has worked with Chuck Berry and Procol Harum.

The album was produced in the U.S. with its engineer, Eirik Wangberg, taking coproduction credits. Wangberg first made a name for himself with the re-recording and mixing of Paul McCartney's "Ram" album.

Skylark have been scheduled to perform with 3 Dog Night at a concert at Hollywood's Sportatorium in Miami and will tour the U.S. in the Fall.

The group's album drew the following comment in RPM's New Albums (July 29/72): "Although not released in Canada yet, Vancouver-based Skylark are a strong entry. Made up of various elements of nowdefunct groups, Skylark is a group whose main strength is versatility. Moving from soft-rock to up-tempo with ease, Skylark stands out, especially on 'Wildflower'."

## RUZICKA OFF WITH SIGNPOST ALBUM

Bob Ruzicka, Edmonton born performer/ writer, has had July 28th set as release date for his debut album on the Signpost label. Signpost is distributed in Canada by WEA of Canada, Ltd.
Ruzicka made good chart gains in Canada with his initial single release, "Storm Warnings" which broke first on the country charts and moved onto the MOR Playlist and finally established itself on the RPM 100. His album, "What The World's All About" includes his hit single as well as his follow-up single, "Down and Losing ".

Appearing on several CBC-TV network shows, including six guest spots on the Tommy Hunter Show, Ruzicka became a well known personality throughout Western Canada. He also assisted in the production of several CBC-TV documentaries for which he scored the music. It was because of these activities and the sponsorship of The Richmond Organization (TRO) that he came to the attention of the U.S. where his single was first released.

## WHISKEY HOWL MEETS SUCCESS ON CANADIAN TOUR

With their just released "Early In The Morning" deck now showing strong moves towards the charts, WEA's Canadian hopeful, Whiskey Howl, are meeting with good success on their cross-Canada tour. Already under their belts are appearances at Edmonton's Klondike Days (July 25-27) and Chico Bay Resort in Saskatchewan (Aug 3). They move down to Regina for the big western fair (Aug 5) and cap their western trip with an Aug 7 to 19th engagement at Gassy Jack's in Vancouver.
Whiskey Howl return to Toronto for a week at Granny's (Aug 21 through Sept 2). In view of the strong local support for Howl, WEA's Ontario promo rep, Bob Krol is already laying on plans for a heavy company opener for their Granny's trip.


Just prior to their trip west, the group were given a Winnebago housemobile for a two day promotion that centred around the Hamilton/Kitchener area with a capacity house performance at Waterloo University to put the finishing touches on the promotion. The group invaded radio station CKOC and because of the warm reception given them by Nevin Grant and the 'OC staffers, packed the Winnebago with beer and food taking several of the station's on-air staff to Kitchener, for their show. Obviously the promotion was a success with strong airplay being given the single by CKOC and CHYM.

Their single was produced by Johnny Sandlin at Toronto's Eastern Sound Studios.

## MUCH SIGNS AGREEMENT WITH ZIMMERMAN PRODUCER

Brian Chater of the Montreal-based MUCH Productions has announced the signing of an agreement with Ken Ayoub, producer of Lorri Zimmerman for release of product throughout the world through MUCH.
Miss Zimmerman is the first solo girl singer added to MUCH's roster, which falls in line with their policy not to acquire acts conflicting with their present lineup. Past releases of Miss Zimmerman on the Crescent St. label created a national image for the young artist.

The passages in the fourth movement for wordless voice are affectingly sung by soprano Heather Harper.

When the late Dame Edith Sitwell visited America a few years ago to write the scenario for a film, she was asked if she thought that it would take her long to catch on to Hollywood lingo. She replied " $I$ 'll catch on to it a lot fater than they will catch on to mine!
Her poems are read here by Fenella Fielding and Michael Flanders, and Walton's orchestral accompaniment is played to perfection by the Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields conducted by Neville Marriner.

## CAPITOL ARTISTS HEAVY ON RECORDING DATES

Capitol Records have stepped up studio activity for their known artists and will soon announce several new signings that will put them out in front on the domestic scene by mid-September.
Christopher Kearney, who had some success with his "Loosen Up" deck and album, will shortly release another single with a hoped for album release for September. Kearney, who scored well during the recent Maple

Music Junket and who has just returned to Toronto from a highly successful Canadian/ U.S. tour, has been chosen to represent Canada at the coming Brazil Song Festival.
Anne Murray, who finally broke into the Maple Leaf System with "Robbie's Song" after being on the market for several months, has a recording session scheduled for Eastern Sound with Brian Ahern producing. A single release should be ready for the Fall.

One of the new acquisitions Capitol are willing to reveal at time of writing is Montrealer Rennie Robitaille. His initial
single release will be for the Quebec market and was taped at Montreal's Studio Six.

Bill Bannon, national promotion manager for Capitol, has been working hard on the Tommy Graham single, "After The Gold Rush" and was able to pick up strong numbers on principal and breakout stations but the single is now close to stiffing. The Capitol people are watching this single very carefully however, and are not yet prepared to give up on it. Bannon has mustered his promotion team in a last ditch attempt to create a national breakout.

## THE WRITING IS ON THE WALL

Programmers usually aren't ready to accept a change, and if something needs change, the programmer will resist until it becomes absolutely necessary to make the move.

Music is undergoing a change, and very slowly the sound of radio is accommodating the listeners' wants, but because of the

power of radio, the sound continues to remain static while the progression of change takes its normal course.

What makes changes interesting is that a station that sits back and waits may see their complacency reflected in the ratings. The public is much more keen about what it wants to hear than the programmer who can only try to give it to them.
Music is getting better. The four man group that wandered into a recording studio a few years back and played and sang only adequately and depended on the beat and the "sound" is now becoming a thing of the past.
Lyrics are becoming more audible. Even requented love is coming back as the counterculture fades away. Harsh voices are
being replaced by mellow singers who hit most of the notes, and like it or not the ballad is back in slow soft or medium tempo. Format radio hasn't had to experience much of this in the past, and many young programmers are confused and (believe it or not) behind the times. To be extremely hip these days is to be away from "it"!
This may be why the demographics are causing MORers to sound more like the top 40 ers and the top 40ers are looking for the softer sound that sells.

Kid's fare is becoming less than of secondary importance. The hit is something that will suit all ages and all tastes. Make way for the return of the instrumental.

A programmer once said that what you believe today, you must be ready to forget tomorrow as change continues to make music the most exciting business in the world. Be ready for anything, and keep the turntable open for ballad, comedy records and who knows what else that may upset your balanced programming. The listener shows his preference at the record counters with his coin. In rating records or listeners the two theories complement each other. The station that puts no value in record sales, should seek no value in the listener ratings. It's a hard but true fact of life in program-

## CRTC TRIES ON NEW PR IMAGE

The CRTC, who have often been criticized for their lack of public relations with the programmers, took a bold step in getting several of these people together for a coffee clotch in Toronto. Hosting the mid-morning bash, during rating week, were the CRTC's Doug McGowan and Shef Franklin. Some of the programmers present - and the CRTC representatives were of the opinion that this was a move in the right direction and contrary to Toronto press reports, this wasn't a calling on the carpet of Toronto programmers by the CRTC. The aim of the get together was to allow those on the programming level, (rather than management) the opportunity to meet members of the CRTC and raise any questions and air problems that some may be having with the $30 \%$ Canadian content ruling.

Unfortunately a gathering of programmers such as this with some involved in an intense rating battle, would create little or no dialogue, let alone the revealing of
problems. One observer noted: "I realize it would be a momentous chore for the CRTC to meet individual programmers but they should make an effort to single out those programmers of MOT music from the principal markets across Canada and have a one-at-a-time across the table confrontation between them and Pierre Juneau. Then, and only then would the real problems plaguing the programmers come to light."

In any event, McGowan and Franklin are scheduling further talks with programmers in other centres across Canada. Included is a tentative Vancouver date followed by a meeting with Ottawa programmers.

If you believe any of this, bear in mind, that I am not a programmer, but I am a listener and I know what I hear (or like to hear, but maybe that is secondary to balanced programmers. I can always switch off the radio and put my money where the sound is . . . at the record counter and on my stereo set. That certainly won't show up on the ratings. (Not that I've ever been sent one of those booklets, nor have I ever met anyone who has.)

## CHUM PROFITS <br> SHOW INCREASE

CHUM Ltd., who have recently purchased CKVN Vancouver, subject to CRTC approval, have shown an increase in profits for the nine months ending May 31 st. Net profits have been listed at $\$ 1.1$ million representing 36 cents a share as compared with $\$ 724,906$ or 24 cents a share for the same period last year.
It's been reported that sales for the full fiscal year are expected to set a record.

## BROADCAST CANDIDATES TAKEN OFF CRTC HOOK

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has announced that Jim Fleming, a Liberal candidate for the October by-election in Toronto's York-West district, will be allowed to continue his broadcast activities over CFTO TV, in view of the extended waiting period from the announcement of the election (March) to its actually taking place. A CRTC announcement in May of 1968 prohibited candidates for elected office from continuing their broadcasting activities during the campaign period. The Commission has now defined this as being the eight weeks prior to the election, thus allowing Fleming to go back on the air. CFTO had removed Fleming from the airwaves following the announcement of his candidacy.

In Montreal, the CRTC investigated a complaint against Rod Baker, a CJAD on-air personality who is running as the Liberal candidate for Lachine. The Commission ruled that since no federal election has yet been called, that its 1968 announcement had no bearing on the situation. The Commission, did, however, caution CJAD from allowing Baker to make partisan remarks over the air, and warned the station to be prepared to immediately offer equal time to candidates from other parties if he should.

Thompson is apparently attempting to determine the reasons for the termination of "a legally binding contractual agreement" as well as discussing the financial problems arising from the cancellation.
Barco have undertaken the return, by mail, of refunds to those who had sent mail orders to the O'Keefe Centre.
