There's a lot of country in this country and, unfortunately, there's too much country for the country. Geographically-speaking, we're up the creek. Not only with country music but with all the other categories as well. Fortunately, the popsters are putting out productions with some appeal for the world market. Country folk, on the other hand, appear to be content to pump out the same old wah-wah crap that gets played, because of the 30% Canadian content ruling, but sells zilch.

What's Canadian country got that its U.S. counterpart hasn't? Perhaps we try too hard. Our country folk, in an attempt to become known, live a hectic life. They feel if they're playing bars forty-six weeks of the year with a couple of weeks set aside for recording, they stand a chance of becoming a household word across Canada. We are about as unique as sliced bread — and just as common. Sure, we've got Stompin' Tom Connors stompin' his way across the country and apparently making a better than average living. But look what he's got going for him. Press and television coverage, most of which began in a derogatory fashion. Remember when the CBC radio network, through a show hosted by Peter Gzowski, attempted to ridicule Canadian recording

THE FIRST ALBUM

SHERMAN SETS RCA DEAL FOR MYSNER & NEUFELD

Allan Sherman, who heads up the Burbank-based complex of Grit and A/S Records, flew into Toronto to negotiate the Canadian release of Billy Mysner on the Grit label and Rick Neufeld on the A/S label, both to be distributed by RCA Canada. Both Mysner and Neufeld were properties of Astra Records, which was headed up by Bob Hahn. Sherman purchased control of the two Canadian acts from Hahn. His first introduction to Mysner was his single, "Little Old Rock & Roll Band" which made significant gains across Canada and in the U.S.

Mysner's initial release will be "Shadow Song", a self penning from his first album release under title of his own name. Sherman has already released the single across the U.S. with a simultaneous U.S./Canadian release of the album. U.S. reaction to the single has already convinced Sherman he has a winner. Comment cards accompanying the single to programmers realized more than a 50% return the majority tagging "Shadow Song" as having hit potential.

Billy Mysner is one of the original Canadian rock and rollers having started with the Paupers and wrote a couple of their hits, "If I Told My Baby" and "Long Tall

Sally", collaborating with Skip Prokop on "For What I Am". He went from there into a ten piece group and finally ended up in New York looking for a job. Ironically he landed a job through a New York contact with RCA's Dunbar Productions in Toronto. As Creative Director, Mysner produced every RCA act during the years 1970-71 including the successful Quebec group Morse Code Transmission. He was upped to Manager of pop A&R and then moved into his own company, Pig-Weed Productions which is part of his Amaranthem Enterprises Inc.

The Mysner album was produced at Captain Audio Studio and RCA's Toronto Studios by George Semkiw with Ben McPeck looking after the arranging. All selections are Mysner originals.

Sherman, who first bowed the 101 Strings series on the Alshire label in 1954, has had much success in the U.S. with tapes and discs. He is now concentrating on country acts out of the Los Angeles area and is sitting on the edge of a breakout with "Red Mountain Wine" by Gibb Gilbeau who supplied back up guitar and violin for Arlo Guthrie. This release is on the A/S label on which Rick Neufeld's "Highway Child" will be released in the U.S. Sherman will be taking Neufeld to Burbank where he will be produced by Billy Strange, producer of Nancy Sinatra.

LONDON'S BRUCE THOMPSON TOURS B.C.

London recording act, Bruce Thompson, has just wound up a lengthy tour of Vancouver Island and northern British Columbia. Thompson, a former on-air personality, played numerous dates on the tour including Port Alberni, Comox, Quesnel, Prince George and Fort St. John. The tour coincided with airplay on his current single, "I Have Seen the Rain" f/s "My Past Keeps Catching Up With Me". Now back in Vancouver, Thompson is at work on his next London single, expected to be released in the coming months. Thompson is booked through Vancouver's Cherdon Music.

THE BELLS SET FOR TWENTY CITY TOUR

Bruce Davidsen of International Promotion Consultants Ltd (Vancouver) has set up a twenty city tour by The Bells, Polydor recording group. It's expected that a single will be released to coincide with this tour although nothing official has been announced by the label. The Bells have seen much international action with previous releases including "Stay Awhile" and "Fly Little White Dove, Fly" but suffered a slight setback when their lead singer Cliff Edwards split from the group to go solo.

The Bells will kick off their tour in Prince Albert March 8 followed by North Battleford (9), Yorkton (11), Regina (12), Saskatoon (13), Vancouver (14), Edmonton (15), Calgary (16), Victoria (17), Winnipeg (18), Brandon (21), Kamloops (23), Grand Prairie (25), Dawson Creek (26), Prince George (28), Kitimat (29) and ending up in Prince Rupert March 30. Several of the above dates include two shows.

Davidsen is also working on a similar tour for Capitol's Anne Murray.

DIANE LEIGH TO CUT FOR MARATHON

Diane Leigh, voted Canada's Female Country Singer for the years 1965, 1966, 1967, 1968 and 1969, will shortly commence work on her initial album release for Marathon Records. Doug Taylor, A&R Director at Marathon will produce the session.

Back-up for Ms Leigh's session will be supplied by Maple Street, a fast rising country group. They have just been signed for a return engagement at the Horseshoe from March 12th through the 24th. They recently completed four weeks at the Atlanta Hotel in St. Catharines and are currently playing the Benlamond in Toronto (19-24) to be followed by two weeks at the White House in Renfrew.

CHOO TO EXPERIMENT WITH PROGRESSIVE CONTEMPORARY

When CHOO Radio, a small station just east of Toronto (Ajax), first came on the air a few years ago they grabbed listeners from Toronto and Oshawa with a progressive-type underground show which was unfortunately axed. Now they are ready to experiment with a similar type show, "Interphase" hosted by Andrew Plishka to run from 2 to 4PM each Saturday.

One of Plishka's first efforts will be a special on Christmas, a Daffodil recording unit who make their home in Oshawa. The group, comprised of Bob Bryden, Preston, Robert Bulger, Tyler Reizanne and Rich Richter, have just completed a recording session at Toronto's Manta Sound.

ATLANTIC EXPANDING COUNTRY INVOLVEMENT

Atlantic Records, long noted for its prestigious position in the rhythm and blues and blues rock markets, is in the midst of a campaign to tap the extensive North American country market. Kicker for the country program is the opening of an Atlantic office in Nashville, Tennessee. Almost as soon as the office had been opened, Atlantic's Rick Sanjek signed two new artists, Troy Seals and Willie Nelson.

At the present time, Atlantic is represented over the airwaves with two country artists, Danny O'Keefe and Bobby Austin. WEA Music of Canada is represented by country product, too, on the new Elektra label, Countryside. In addition, Reprise artist, Gordon Lightfoot, is making a strong showing on country radio with his "You Are What I Am".

WARNER BROS CELEBRATES FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Warner Bros, the picture people, are celebrating their fiftieth anniversary throughout 1973. In 1923 the original Warner brothers, Harry, Albert, Sam and Jack started Warner Brothers Pictures Inc., which was to grow, through various acquisitions to become Warner Communications, a huge conglomerate with interests in records, cable, book publishing, music publishing, television productions, films and other areas.

To celebrate the half-century birthday, all Warner Communications subsidiaries will be participating in a variety of projects involving the use of records, films and books.

COHEN QUITTING MUSIC SAYS MELODY MAKER

The British music consumer publication Melody Maker last week reported that Canadian folk singer Leonard Cohen has quit the music business. The announcement came as the 39-year-old Montrealese visited London to receive a Gold Album Award from Melody Maker.

After the presentations commemorating 250,000 sales of his first album "Songs of Leonard Cohen", he said he was dropping his musical interests "because I just cannot stand to remain part of the business". According to the paper, Cohen decided to quit ten months ago when he entered a California monastery to "get it all out of my system". He found he was "disillusioned with the state of music at the moment and I no longer want to be tangled up in all the mechanisms".

Cohen plans to continue writing poetry and novels, and "I also plan to pen songs if I feel they are good and when I feel I have something worthwhile to sing about". Cohen has not had album or single product in the RPM charts for over a year.

of press releases, which was understandable being as there just weren't professional people available to put a press release together. Add to this the poor state of cover art and graphics and we have a period of time that is probably better forgotten.

The seventies saw the dawning of promotion - good and bad. But at least there were those who were beginning to care about the image of Canadian artists and

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the Canadian industry. RPM bowed the Gold Leaf Awards which made it possible for those companies attempting to build an industry, to certify albums and singles as having "outstanding sales". The monies realized by these certifications were deposited in a trust fund set up by RPM which would, it was hoped, defray the cost of an annual Gold Leaf Award (Juno) Presentation.

In an attempt to assist the record dealer in tracking down labels, RPM introduced distributor codes - picked up by traders south of the border. It was also found that a need for identification of Canadian content records existed, for which RPM designed the MAPL logo. In nine years, a lot of water has gone under the bridge and fortunately it has eroded some of the Mickey Mouse thinking that was holding back our industry. Change has been slow but nevertheless there has been a change. It has become easier to program and promote and sell records in Canada.

For RPM it has been a fight to make many of these innovations possible. We banked a great deal on the Juno Awards and, to our great relief, they have become very important to the trade.

There have been many who have contributed to the changes in the Juno Awards - the ballots, the categories, the presentations themselves and the Special Awards that will reach yet another stage on March 12th of this year. Suggestions for improving and changing the Awards have been received by telephone calls and by letters. We have implemented as many as possible. Fortunately, each year we have been able to afford changes. Next year's change will call for the mailing of the Juno Awards ballots directly to an accounting firm, with the tabulation and results to be certified and sent to RPM. Not that anyone in the industry has ever questioned the counting of the ballots, but each year it becomes possible to invest a little more to make the Juno Awards that much better.

RPM has, throughout the years, set aside funds for institutional events. It is our desire to contribute a great deal more to the industry, above and beyond our week to week operation of a profitmaking organization. There are many ways in which we can use our means in bringing people together in an endeavour to help and develop the industry. We have been indeed fortunate to have had on our staff, innovators who have displayed a great deal of sincere feeling toward the industry and people with only one goal to improve the state of the industry.

Perhaps it shouldn't be our function to pressure for change and development. We simply took on a task we felt was necessary to improve our lot. There were those whose intentions were honourable and who perhaps could have done a much better job, but they just couldn't get it together. When these people do manage to come up with a satisfactory formula we will gladly step aside and function as we were perhaps intended - as observers of the industry.

There have been many changes in the Juno Awards and we expect there to be more. This editorial is a plea for more official comments and suggestions as to how the Junos could be a more successful industry event. The Awards belong to the industry and we welcome your comments. Your letters will be carefully considered and any changes possible, will be introduced. Above all we would like to avoid any embarrassing criticisms that could mar what we have endeavoured to construct as a salute to the industry generally. There are winners, and there are those waiting in the wings. One change we can't make, and that's the winners. We aren't even allowed to vote.

LEROY DECK TO BE RELEASED ON MAM

The James Leroy GRT deck, "Touch Of Magic" has been set for release on the MAM label in the UK and in Europe. Ross Reynolds, President of GRT Canada finalized the deal in London with Geoffrey Everett, Managing Director for MAM.

In making the above announcement, Reynolds noted: "We are anxious to work with a company such as MAM who believe in concentrating promotion on a limited number of releases."

Apparently MAM was impressed with the writing talents shown by Leroy and the growing success the group has been experiencing in Canada both with radio airplay and with club engagements. (RPM No. 49).

MAM, who have been noted for their success with Tom Jones, Engelbert Humperdinck and most recently, Gilbert O'Sullivan, are preparing a concentrated promotion for the Leroy single.

\$3 MILLION YEAR FOR STEREODYNE

With 1972 safely under their belt and boasting a \$3 million year, Stereodyne president Ron Newman, called his first national sales meeting to better acquaint his branch managers and sales staff with the operation of the company. Located in a brand new and spacious office/warehouse complex in the west end of Toronto, the Stereodyne operation was a surprise to those who thought of the company as just a tape racker.

In the two and a half years that Newman has been associated with Stereodyne, it suddenly emerged as the leading tape service with custom duplicating facilities, second to none. Newman will readily admit that much of his success is due the moral and financial support supplied him by Jim Daigle and Bob Jackson, two U.S. experts on the tape business. Now, with more than 6000 square feet, branch offices from coast to coast, more than one hundred employees and with fifteen service trucks on the road, Newman and company are hopeful of becoming a total music company over the next few months. Stereodyne already has licensing agreements with international companies and are anxious to put out their own licensed music.

On the accessory side, Stereodyne has made a large buck on the LeBo line and are showing early indications of becoming a threat to the hardware business with the Lear Jet line.

Newman and his Vice-President Bob Kerr took their group on a tour of the plant which revealed the latest in equipment — dolbyized systems, assembly line, packaging etc., after which they were bussed over to the Valhalla Inn for a general meeting. Newman explained the workings of the company, before and after he took command and then Kerr moved in for the pep talk and introduction of Stereodyne execs.

These included Bob Lovell, formerly with Capitol and now looking after profit control; Jim McNaul, credit manager and a graduate of GRT; Ron Castro, chief accountant; and Clyde McGregor, one of the most valuable assets to Stereodyne having served in executive capacities with Warner Bros, Astra, and most recently with the Playboy label. Kerr used the "Stereodyne heartbeat" theme and punched home the importance of tapes and the potential for Stereodyne in a market that has never really been worked by the majors.

Stereodyne's success in the past year has been because their sales people are tuned in entirely to the tape market. Because of this overall knowledge of the market, one of their better clients accounted for more than a million dollars worth of product for the year 1972.

Workshops were set up for the afternoon with emphasis on the company's rack program, their existing tape merchandising program, LeBo Accessories and the importance of the Lear Jet line. The latter was represented by John Barry, who flew in from the company's Tucson plant and unveiled new product from the 8-track hardware leader, originators of the 8-track system.

It's obvious that Newman has been playing a cat and mouse game with the industry. When custom duplicating became very competitive he went into rack jobbing and eased his way into less than half a dozen accounts — offering service without the discount. After establishing his credit and receiving a discount from record companies he passed this along to his customers and built from there. He kept the lid on his movements and picked the time and place to reveal an aggressive and totally aware tape operation — from tape duplicating, the latest in assembly lines and packaging, and a fleet of "factory to you" service shops on wheels.

OTTAWA CEREMONY FOR LIGHTHOUSE GOLD LP

GRT's Lighthouse received their fourth Canadian Gold Album in a unique but rather mixed up Ottawa ceremony. Unique in it being the first time that Pierre Juneau, Chairman of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission, has made such a presentation, and mixed up because their Canadian Gold Album was fogged in at Toronto's International Airport.

Realizing the fix he was in, GRT's Ontario promo rep, Brian Ayres, arranged for Mr. Juneau to present Lighthouse group members Skip Prokop and Don Dinova with a large framed photo of their appearance at the CRTC hearings of two years ago. In return, Prokop presented Juneau with an autographed group photo bearing an inscription thanking the CRTC for their contribution in furthering the growth of the Canadian Music Industry. Juneau's three children were also presented with an autographed set of Lighthouse albums.

Ayres and the label's sales rep, Jim Corbett hosted the reception which received extensive Ottawa press coverage as well as CTV Network exposure on the IIPM news.

Lighthouse are the first Canadian group to receive four gold albums in succession. The fourth was for "Sunny Days".

ANNIE A BREATH OF FRESH AIR AT MIDEM

Canada's Anne Murray, currently riding high with her "Danny's Song", was, according to the European press, a "breath of fresh air" at the recent Midem Festival in Cannes, France. Some five thousand representatives from music producing countries around the world were on hand in Cannes to witness Miss Murray's performance as part of the live entertainment package at Midem. While in Europe Miss Murray taped four television programmes including a BBC "Anne Murray Special".

FIVETAKE COMPLETES TWO NEW ALBUMS

Oshawa and Halifax-based independent production company, Fivetake Group Productions Limited, has announced that work has been completed on releases for the Columbia and Audat labels.

The Maritime-based Audat label is the outlet for the centennial song commissioned by the Prince Edward Island Centennial Commission entitled "In Love With An Island". Fivetake Group Productions produced the single, performed by the Atlantic Symphony Orchestra and the Centennial Singers. Jerry Toth handled arrangements; recording was done at Audio Atlantic Studio in Halifax. After a couple of weeks of release the record has massive Maritime airplay with a sprinkling elsewhere.

Fivetake recently wrapped up work on the "Oak Island Treasury Department Number 2" album. It follows up the debut release "Oak Island Treasury Department" which created a moderate splash for Columbia. "Number 2" is part of the Columbia February release schedule and features many of Canada's top musicians and singers in arrangements by Jerry Toth and Eric Robertson.

POLYDOR BOWS HYPE ALONG SHEET


Montreal-based Polydor Records has made a move towards improving its communications with a new weekly promo sheet devoted exclusively to country product. The "Hype-Along" sheet, cunningly emblazoned with a hypodermic needle in a holster, is basically a rundown of radio and trade chart activity on Polydor-distributed product. Two lines recently acquired by Polydor Canada, MGM and Mercury, are heavily laden with potent country product. The sheet is put together by John Turner and Barry Paine, label managers for Mercury and MGM Records respectively.

CHAPPELL NY ACQUIRES HINDE CATALOGUES

New York-based Chappell Music has acquired the rights to the Hindsight (CAPAC) and Ole Colony (BMIC) music publishing catalogues, in a long term agreement signed recently, according to Chappell's Vivian Friedman. The agreement was negotiated by owner of the two pubberies, Harry Hinde, and Chappell's Buddy Robbins.

The deal means that Chappell now has the right to "You're Still the One", through its Unichappell (BMI) publishing house. The Copper Penny single, produced by Hinde, has now been released in the U.S. on the Big Tree label in the wake of extensive Canadian action.

HAUGEN GIVES HAMILTON IV RCA RED CARPET TREATMENT

Barry Haugen, Canada's first and only major label national country promotion manager, has wrapped up a successful round of promotion for George Hamilton IV and his recently released RCA album, "Out West Country" which was produced by Bob Ferguson. Much pressure has been brought to bear on RCA Canada to release the "Dirty Old Man" cut as a single, and it's expected that this Bob Ruzicka penning will now be receiving the blessing from the powers that be.

Hamilton's tour of western Canada was exceptional with interviews by Dennis Corry and Barbara Kelly at CFAC-TV Calgary, radio interviews with CFCN's Wayne Gregory, which marked the first live interview for the station in over two years; as well as interviews with CBC radio's Don Hudson and Dennis Ethier and with Wally Hild and Bill McGee of CKRD Red Deer. Local Calgary Herald columnist Jim Gibson pointed up that Hamilton's music is "The common peoples' music", a Hamilton tag, and that "people understand this music, because they've lived it." Capper to the Calgary trip was a "live" show at CFAC where they featured every cut on his new album with interviews between cuts.

Hamilton and Haugen then enplaned for Edmonton and another round of radio and television interviews. He met first with CJCA's Harry Boone and discussed the proposed CJCA-FM "All Day Sunday" country show, which should now be on the air. A stop at Melody Lane (Record Shop) and a buss for Marg Hewer and then on to the Tommy Banks CBC sound rehearsal. Ed Kay was in for CFRN-TV for a "Canada AM" taping as well as interviews with Curley Gurlock and Bev Munro of CFCW which were used on a Special "George Hamilton IV Day". Donna Harvey of the Edmonton Journal did an interview bit for the entertainment section with Colin McLean of CBX doing the wrap-up.

RCA's promo rep for the west coast, John Ford, met Hamilton and Haugen and immediately took him to Tom Peacock of CKWX where Hamilton's album will be featured although the station is non-country. North to Langley and an interview at a remote (Gilford Mall) with CJJC's Barry Kay. Back in Vancouver, jazz expert Bob Smith, who writes for the Vancouver Sun and hosts one of the most popular jazz shows on the west coast (CBC Radio) got the Hamilton bug which he followed up with Sun coverage.

Hamilton's trip to Victoria and CJVI was timely being that 'VI is Canada's newest country station. A "phone-in" interview with Jim Schrier ran thirty minutes overtime due the enthusiastic listener response. Although CFAX isn't into country the station's Gord Cruse expressed strong interest in the set.

Back to Vancouver and an interview with Jack Cullen of KKNW which lasted almost sixty minutes along with an interview with Bob McClelland of Country Music News.

Saskatoon's activities included a wine and cheese party at the Sheraton Cavalier Hotel for dealers and media VIPs which also included a taped half hour show for CFQC-TV. Ned Powers of the Saskatoon Star Phoenix grabbed a few minutes before Hamilton and Haugen were off to Regina and another wine and cheese party. Hamilton was able to squeeze off interviews with the CBC, Rony Chipman of CHAB Moosejaw and Ron Waddell of CJGX Yorkton. He also did a listener phone-in show with Lorne Harrison as well as "Nightmare Show" with John Sanderson both of CKCK. A co-hosting with Doug Burkmaier of CKRM and the flight to Winnipeg and an open-line show with Peter Warren at CJOB. Warren displayed a bit of antagonism towards Hamilton and his "milking Canadian content syndrome" but Hamilton won Warren over after a very few minutes. Peter Grant came in from CJOB-FM for an interview and then it was over to the CBC and a taping of Lee Major's "Four Corners Show". Lunch with Gene Helpner of the Winnipeg Tribune, a taping

at CJAY-TV with Bob Burns, another wine and cheese party and back to Toronto for an Ian Tyson CTV taping.

Haugen has kept up a hectic pace, not only with George Hamilton IV product but with all releases including the Arpeggio line which has added much importance to Canadian country releases - the RCA variety.

ISLAND MONTH AT CAPITOL

Capitol Records is in the middle of a major promotion of the prestigious Island Records line this month. The English rock line is the subject of intensive merchandising with the aid of easels, posters, mobiles, window display units and floor merchandisers. Subject of the push are the six Island albums released this month: "Shoot Out at the Fantasy Factory"/Traffic, "Heartbreaker"/Free, "England"/Amazing Blondel, "Smokestack Lightning"/Mike Harrison, "Solid Air"/John Martyn and "Catch a Fire" by the Wailers.

To provide further incentive to retailers, Capitol has arranged a display contest for the company's sales force.

WEA/CKOC PROMOTE DION AND BELMONTS

WEA Music and Hamilton outlet, CKOC, teamed up recently on a special "Dion and the Belmonts" promotion, to give a sales push to the "Reunion" album, recently released on the Warner Brothers label. The album, recorded live at Madison Square Garden, was aired in its entirety over 'OC without commercial interruption on the Gord James Show.

During the show, a copy of the album was given away every minute. Advance promotion of the show and contest began a week prior to air date and intensified during the day of the show. The promotion was set up by WEA's Bob Krol.

artists with a rather tasteless commentary on Connors' "Bud The Spud"? Connors has never looked back since "Bud The Spud". His releases haven't been blockbusters but his personal appearances have drawn exceptional crowds with "sold out" notices being posted in many areas, days before showtime. That's Stompin' Tom. He's making it and he's making it the hard way. But what about the rest of the country flock?

That would appear to be a hell of a poor lead-in for our cover girl, Carroll Baker, but let's not fancy up something that just isn't. Ms Baker has picked a career that is strewn with broken dreams. Her efforts have been commendable and the people behind her, Don Grashey and Chuck Williams, are determined to break through with their pretty young talent. How are they doing it? Strictly through perseverance. With seven releases to her credit, the latest being "Wichita", Grashey and Williams, through their own Gaiety label, must have sent out a box car of propaganda. Each release, sent to a programmer, is accompanied by a form asking for his comments. The Gaiety pair have been encouraged by the favourable comments they have received. Ms Baker's records have received heavy airplay but Gaiety is not distributed nationally — a problem existing with many small country labels. Consequently, when a Baker single is receiving airplay in Middleton, Nova Scotia or Prince Rupert, British Columbia, it's quite likely there is no product available. But that's not solely a criticism of Grashey and Williams — it happens with country product from all labels. When the final tally of one of the top country singles of the

year (U.S. product) was made, it was found that less than 3000 copies were sold in Canada. The single was No. 1 in the U.S. and Canada and received top airplay yet the company was unable, or just didn't want to supply product. However, when there is a cross-over hit i.e. "Funny Face" by Donna Fargo or "Baby Don't Get Hooked On Me", the MOT and Adult Contemporary stations add that necessary value to the artist and his or her record — and voila — you have a big seller.

Grashey and Williams are now attempting to bridge this country/adult contemporary gap with Carroll Baker's "Wichita" single. It's a nice try and a good move. Ms Baker has a very warm delivery and she could make it. Unfortunately, time will have to be on her side. It's a cruel business and those who survive won't lock themselves in a room counting their shekels they'll be nursing the bumps and knocks of the industry. Success is not a crowded, smoke-filled booze bin where you play for peanuts while the hotel operator gets rich on your sweat. Newspaper, magazine, television, and radio exposure will help — but talent is the key.

Ms Baker is front and centre. She's taking the knocks and lumps and she is hanging on. Remember — "Mem'ries Of Home", "Love Now and Pay Later", "A Hit In Any Language", "It's Late And I Have To Go", "That's How My Heart Beats For You", and now "Wichita"? That's a pretty hefty package of releases for this native of Bridgewater, Nova Scotia and in two years she has overcome many of the obstacles that would frighten off most. Put yourself in Carroll Baker's shoes. Could you do better?

Contemporary music has been getting a lot of attention lately. Time Magazine, the New York-based newsweekly, recently ran a lengthy, and surprisingly lucid account of the record industry, its moguls, its superstars and its behind-the-scenes machinations.

INCREDIBLE

NBC is three weeks into its "Midnight Special" series, a ninety minute rock program airing at late night with a new music personality hosting each week. Emcees to date: Helen Reddy, Johnny Rivers, and coming soon, dear old Annie. The live performance scene in Canada seems to have picked up considerably with some worthwhile act opening almost every night of the week in most major cities.

But in the midst of all this activity, there is surprisingly little to read, see or hear about it via the Canadian media. On those rare occasions when the coverage does occur, it is usually provided by someone more suited to covering a cake-bake contest than a music event.

Particularly off-hand in their contemporary music coverage, coming in second only to the CBC in terms of Rip Van Winkle-ism, are the big city dailies. For the most part

these worthy tabloids, which reap an incredible amount of revenue from entertainment advertising, totally ignore all that is contemporary in music. Many such papers have a full time movie critic, a full time book reviewer, a full time ballet critic (usually with some absurd eastern European name to ensure authenticity) and a serious music critic. Meanwhile, contemporary music, which is undoubtedly the most vital and explosive force in entertainment today, is looked after by either an unemployed dope dealer or the former road manager of Moby Grape.

These of course are generalizations. In a week I may be swamped by clippings from some paper or other which has done a competent job of covering contemporary music. But I must maintain that for the most part, the daily press has done a disservice to both a vital young industry and an interested and aware public.

If the current Edward Bear single goes over the million mark, and by all indications it may do just that, what will the Canadian daily press do to commemorate so significant event? Well, let me surmise. If Capitol doesn't have a contact at Canadian Press, Moby Grape's road manager may drop in one sentence at the bottom of his bi-annual column (no photos please, they cut in on the ballet stories) and that will be the end of





ANNIE AT MASSEY HALL

"Underneath this beautiful facade, this image, my body is a mass of hickkeys!" Last Sunday, at Toronto's Massey Hall, Anne Murray playfully put to rest her "girl next door" image and brought the house down. The quip was only one highlight of one of the slickest, most polished shows the venerable old hall has ever seen. It was a night of surprises for the skeptical.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of all was the opening act, John Allen Cameron. John Allen is managed by Balmur Investments, and, as such, it is not surprising to see him as an opening act to Annie. When in a position of influence, it is wise, and expedient, to take advantage of the situation. In Balmur's case, that means getting John Allen to the thousands in Annie's audience. But the Massey show was no cheap exploitation of the situation. Cameron proved, to the shock of some and the delight of others, to be a witty and competent performer who can easily hold his own on any stage. Backed by Miss Murray's group, Richard, Cameron had the old Hall shaking with foot stomping and hand clapping to a pleasing amalgam of folk and down east music.

Yet another surprise was Richard. Although many names in the group are familiar to the initiated, Skip Beckwith, Andy Cree and Lenny Breau, for starters, not many people in the Massey audience could have been prepared for the incredibly fine back-up they provided. Judging by the way they worked Sunday night, Richard can do anything on a first take. On stage, you get only one chance per song and the group brought it home every time.

The show was a production in the full sense of the term. In addition to Richard, there was a string section, a horn section and a three-voice female mini-choir. The sixteen musicians and singers were supplemented at

one point by Dianne Brooks who made a surprise appearance during the beautiful "Robbie's Song For Jesus" and added her rich voice to the soaring rendition of the song.

Cameron, Richard, the strings, the horns,

the choir and Dianne Brooks were the icing on the cake. At the centre of it all was Anne Murray, prettier than ever and in top voice, albeit wearing shoes. "It Takes Time", "Danny's Song", "I Like Your Music" and the venerable "Snowbird" flowed one after another, broken only long enough for Annie to snap a picture of the audience with her Instamatic or to autograph a photo for the little four-year-old, who toddled up to the stage at the beginning of a number, photo and pen at the ready.

It was a delightful evening, an evening that one won't easily forget and, for the paying public, one of the best entertainment bargains of the year.

For those whose image of Annie is that of hicktown country picker made good, a visit to your nearest concert hall next time she plays is in order. —John Watts



Following a highly successful recording which included the Scriabin Sonatas Nos. 3, 4, 7 and 9, Soviet pianist Igor Zhukov presents his second album in a series which will cover the complete sonatas of Scriabin. The Sonatas Nos. 1 and 2 and the great Fantasia in B minor are all early works which show Scriabin to be very much under the influence of Chopin and Liszt. Their poetic lyricism and tempestuous virtuosity have greater appeal to the average listener than the eerie, mystical later works. Zhukov has the virility and sensitivity to produce gripping performances.



BEETHOVEN Symphony No. 6 "Pastoral"

This disc is a re-issue recorded in 1962 and is Colin Davis' second recording of a Beethoven Symphony, the first being the Symphony No. 7, recorded for EMI in 1961. This beautifully controlled performance might move forward a little too quickly for some tastes, but none can deny the careful attention to detail and sense of style that Davis brings to the work, or the tonal richness of the London Symphony Orchestra. As a bonus, we are treated to a lively account of Beethoven's "Prometheus" Overture Op. 43.

Ignaz Brull was born in 1846 and died in 1907. A close personal friend of Brahms, his considerable output, now completely forgotten, included nearly a dozen operas and ballets, a Symphony, Two Piano Concertos, a Violin Concerto, and chamber music. His Macbeth Overture was written in 1884 and the Second Piano Concerto is an earlier work dating from 1866. If you have a love for the music of Brahms and Schumann then this recording will come as a satisfying find. The Genesis label is distributed in Canada by Almadia.

BEETHOVEN Concerto No. 5 in Eb major Op. 73 (Emperor)

The Select label, distributed by London Records features this brilliant and powerful account of Beethoven's "Emperor" Concerto by the young Rumanian pianist Radu Lupu who is touring Canada for the first time this spring and will be performing the Schumann Concerto with the Toronto Symphony in May. This makes a fine companion disc to his performance of the Beethoven Piano Concerto No. 3 in C minor on London CS 6715. A fine performer worth getting to know.

RAVEL Daphnis et Chloe - Suites Nos. 1 & 2

The world famous Amsterdam Concertgebouw orchestra presents two of Ravel's greatest ballet scores with silky playing and flawless recording. Ravel divided the score of Daphnis et Chloe into two orchestral suites for symphony concerts and they are presented in this form excluding the wordless voices which are prominently featured in the complete work. The excellent flautist here is Hubert Barwahser. Ma Mere L'Oye is presented in its original complete ballet form rather than the customary orchestral suite. Its closing section "Le jardin feerique" must surely be Ravel's most touching inspiration.

it. If Capitol gets after Canadian Press, the same story will appear, word for word in twenty or thirty papers, whose entertainment editors are too lazy or too blithely unaware of the state of the entertainment industry to bother following up and enlarging on such a story.

It's sad but true, and I'm not sure just where the solution lies. Several months ago, this column was filled with another epic, whining about the shortcomings of the dailies and suggesting that high key PR and information was the answer. Today, I'm not sure. Perhaps you have the answer.

IRISH ROVERS CAP ONTARIO CONCERTS

The Irish Rovers complete their tour through Ontario with a High School date at the Collegiate Institute in Owen Sound (24). Previous dates included Kingston (20), Hamilton (21), Massey Hall in Toronto (22), and Peterboro (23).

This tour is just the beginning of road action after more than four months of taping shows for their weekly CBC-TV series which is produced in Vancouver by Ken Gibson. They are currently making strong gains on the Adult Contemporary chart with their Potato single, "Morningtown Ride".

DAVID CLAYTON THOMAS IN RECORD DEAL WITH RCA

David Clayton Thomas, responsible for the success of Blood, Sweat & Tears and who recently soloed on Columbia, has signed a recording agreement with RCA (New York).

Thomas, one of the original Canadian hitmakers: "Brainwashed", "Walk That Walk" and many others, has consistently brought attention to Canada with his many international successes - the latest being his winning of top honours at the Rio Song Festival. He has also been asked to present one of the coveted Grammy Awards at the Nashville event on March 3rd.

There is nothing official on product release but it is expected that Thomas will tape a session at RCA's Los Angeles studios with Gabriel Mekler looking after the production chores. Mekler has seventeen gold records to his credit, having produced Steppenwolf, Donovan and Three Dog Night among others.

Thomas will be in Toronto from March 27 to the 29th taping three half hour television shows for the CBC. Out of this will come a one hour special, "Soul Singer". Accompanying him as part of his backup group will be Ken Marco, former lead with Dr. Music and William Dee Smith, former lead with Motherlode. Athan Katsos will produce the CBC TV sessions.

Ryerson's CRFM radio just completed a 41-minute interview/music tape with the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. Will be available on Canadian Campus Radio program exchange.

In the February 3rd issue of RPM we carried an erroneous report on changes at CJGX Yorkton. Actually, 15-year morning man Ed Laurence has NOT left the station; he has been appointed general manager. For the present he is also handling PD chores, not Gary Wood as reported. Ron Waddell is doing the morning show along with his country music in the afternoon. The music format has not changed from the MOR/MOT blend used previously, and the all-night show is still country. Record companies are asked to continue the great service and CJGX says its open policy toward promotions will continue. Scott Aver is the 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. man, not the MD (who is Ron Waddell).

I know RPM's C6 meeting falls during ratings, but if you can get away, the \$25 registration is well worth it. An impressive lineup of speakers of interest to broadcasters including major North American figures in radio. Hurry, the places are going fast.

Now there are two hype sheets weekly from the Polydor promo offices of Allan Katz. "Hype-along" joins the old established "Poly-hype". Recent addition of MGM and Mercury dumped a hefty load of country product into Polydor's lap and "Hype-along", under the guidance of John Turner and Barry Paine, will give airplay reports on record action at Canada's country stations.

At CRSC (Seneca College) in Toronto, Bill Hunt is succeeding Kim Hesketh as station manager for the remainder of the year. Hesketh is occupied looking for a position in the industry.

Headquarters for the News Radio network are being moved from Ottawa to CKEY's location high atop One Yonge Street; the shift is expected to produce a reduction in overall transmission costs. Bureau chief Taylor Parnaby becomes the managing director in Toronto and the staff in Ottawa increases to four. News Radio now serves 23 Canadian stations, most of them in Ontario.

MCA in the States got super interest for Dobie Gray's current single "Drift Away" when ABC's San Francisco station KSFY played it for 8½ hours straight with only breaks being news and ID's. Huge crowd assembled outside the station with phones jammed; police showed up to see if the station had been hijacked. MCA's phones also jammed the next day with other radio stations requesting the record.

CKKC Nelson PD Earl Seitz reports station staff gave up sleep during the station's sixth annual marathon which raised several thousand dollars for the Kootenay Society for Handicapped Children. Radio auction plus stunts lasted 48 hours. Sales manager Bill Bryan spent a night on a waterbed in a downtown store window while one of the jocks passed the time in a Baker St. garbage can, leaving it only when donations stopped. Two other men participated in a stunt which had them swim the 25-degree waters of Kootenay Lake.

Top eight listener complaints about radio as compiled from a CHUM Report analysis of the "comments" section of BBM ballots. Listeners dislike: excessive music repetition; repetition of news, commercials or jock clichés without re-writing; too much unfamiliar music; too many depressing news items; lack of believability in jocks and commercials; ego-trip editorializing; incorrect pronunciation and sloppy speech; loud and noisy records and commercials. It is worth a PD's time to examine the BBM ballots for his survey area at the Bureau's office you'd be surprised what they can reveal to you. On the subject of repetition, it's a fine line between too many hits per hour and too few. When's the last time you analysed the average repetition time span of your station? You should know this like the back of your hand to be a professional programmer.

Gord Eno at CJDV Drumheller asks why service has deteriorated from all record companies. Improve it please! Also old and new albums are requested for a show featuring LP cuts not normally heard on Top 40 radio. Good phones for the New Potatoes' "Good Morning and Goodbye" this week.

Latest lineup at CJVR Melfort: Leonard Enns mornings, Charles Yeo midmornings & MD, Mark Stevenson afternoons, and Dwayne Meyers evenings.

CKLW Windsor ended "High School of the Year Contest" with over 60 tons of postcards. Winners: St. Anne's High in Tecumseh, Ont. and Bishop Borgess High in Detroit.

Saturday, February 10th, the familiar voice of Milton Cross was missing from the Metropolitan Opera radio broadcast. His absence was due to the death of his wife the night before. The CBC-originated program is in its 41st season, and Cross can boast a record of never missing a show in the last 33 years. The broadcasts from the stage of New York's Metropolitan Opera House are heard on 120 Canadian radio stations and 90 educational stations in the U.S.

CRTC WARNING TO QUEBEC BROADCASTERS

Failure to solve persistent technical and programming problems has resulted in the CRTC giving a minimum one-year licence renewal to two northwestern Quebec broadcasting companies operating four radio and four TV stations. The Commission indicated it was influenced in its decision by the numerous interventions filed in the licence renewal application by area citizens.

Northern Radio Inc. received a one-year licence for CHAD Amos, CKRN Rouyn, CKVD Val D'or, plus TV stations at Rouyn, Ville Marie, Matagami and Lithium Mines. The same term was granted to Radio La Sarre Inc. for radio CKLS in La Sarre.

The stations have been ordered to improve the quality and quantity of their news and public affairs show as a condition of remaining on the air. Citizen complaints of excessive sports programs resulted in an order to the broadcasters to improve "balance in program categories". The stations must also work on overcoming the technical failures that have been complained about by residents.

Both licencees were ordered to "enter into discussions with the CBC without delay concerning their affiliation to the French network". The Commission felt that this would aid them in improving the technical quality of their service as well as strengthening station programming and increasing the amount of CBC national network service available on area radio and TV. Though the stations will have their performance evaluated at renewal applications in less than a year, the CRTC included a strong directive instructing the stations to keep in touch with the Commission regarding their discussions with the CBC.

1972 ENDS WITH DROP IN RECORD PRODUCTION

Although production of Canadian record manufacturers was up in the year 1972 compared to a year earlier, December manufacturing showed a decrease in '72 compared to 1971.

Statistics Canada reported 5.05 million phonograph records were manufactured in December '72, down from 5.33 million a year earlier. Production of pre-recorded cassettes and eight-tracks increased to 830,000 from 563,000 for the same period.

SIX CANCON SINGLES ON CASHBOX TOP 100

Canadian singles are continuing their best performance on U.S. trade charts in some time with six of the February 24 Cashbox Top 100 being CanCon product.

Edward Bear's "Last Song" was eight, Anne Murray's "Danny's Song" twenty-five, Les Emmerson's "Control of Me" thirty-seven, the Canadian-written Alice Cooper single "Hello Hurray" forty-four, Guess Who's "Follow Your Daughter Home" was seventy-five, and Skylark's "Wildflower" eighty-eight.

POLICE CAN'T CENSOR NEWSCASTS SAYS CRTC

After word leaked out of the possibility that 353 radio stations and 65 television stations had agreed to let the police censor their news in times of "crisis", the CRTC last week moved swiftly to express its official displeasure. The little-known document apparently had nearly been forgotten by the CAB since they prepared it last year with the help of the 1500-member Canadian Association of Police Chiefs. A telegram from chairman Pierre Juneau to Don Hamilton (CAB president and station manager at CKLG Vancouver) expressed CRTC surprise that such a document existed and instructed CAB member stations not to implement such an agreement without Commission approval.

The paper had been submitted to the CAB's 19-man board of directors and the chief's association last fall and was approved by both groups. It came to media attention when the CAB's Quebec affiliate (Canadian Association of French-Language Radio and TV) tabled it before the Quebec National Assembly's com-

TURNER CUTS DUTY ON IMPORTED RECORDS

The tax-cutting budget presented in the Commons last week by finance minister John Turner included tariff reductions on two categories of records and tapes.

Educational and instructional sound recordings containing learning material for the arts, sciences, professions, crafts and trades will henceforth enter Canada duty-free. There was previously a fifteen to twenty per cent duty applied.

Other phonograph records and pre-recorded tapes will be subject to a reduced duty of fifteen per cent. The previous duty on these items (imported from the U.S. or Europe) was twenty per cent.

mittee on press freedom. The document describes broadcasters as partners with police in the fight against crime. It says: "The police must have the right to make the decision on release of news for publication . . . crime news requires special treatment". Disciplinary action is suggested for radio and TV employees who fail to contact police and plan "how to co-operate during emergencies". What constitutes an emergency or a crisis situation is not defined.

After news of the document hit the national media, the CAB moved quickly with an announcement that the five-page text was not an agreement, only a working document, and that it didn't infringe on freedom of the press in any way. The CAB's Hamilton was surprised by the sudden reaction to the report which was by then drawing denunciations from Quebec parliamentarians. The CAB confirmed that the printed guidelines were mailed out to all member stations in November 1972 for discussion and changes to be made. "Not a single reply has come in", said T. J. Allard, the CAB's executive director. Said Hamilton: "We had a special general assembly meeting on January 15 on another subject and not one of the 200 members brought this up, although they could have."

The CRTC telegram to Hamilton said the stations would have to consult with the Commission before implementing any changes in newsroom policy. Juneau repeated that the Broadcast Act "imposes on each broadcaster the responsibility for his programming. The CRTC considers the independent dissemination of news as a primary requirement of this responsibility." Any restraint on news broadcasting "would be a matter of most serious concern to the Commission".

The agreement apparently was an offshoot of the October 1970 kidnapping crisis in Quebec. A joint committee of the CAB and police chief's association had met in secret for fifteen months preparing the document.

Playlisted at CKY, CHED and CJME. The Sweet's "Little Willie" had CKOC and CKLW charts last week, adding CJME and CKXL this week. And Valdy's "A Good Song" seems to be catching on as a result of massive "up-to-news-time" play (time 2 minutes). 





LISTENERS OPPOSE CBC TAKEOVER OF CKSB

The Montreal hearings of the CRTC into the CBC application to purchase the French-language radio station in Winnipeg were scarcely under way last week when a number of Winnipeg ethnic groups lodged protests.

Maurice Gauthier and Roger Collet criticized the French network for its high Quebec content. They said plans to drop CKSB's local programming in favour of network service would be a disservice to Manitoba listeners.

Representatives of ethnic groups who have had foreign-language programs aired on CKSB for as long as twenty years attacked the language policies that would go into effect if the sale were finalized. Programs must switch to either English or French or get off the air. The spokesmen said that if CKSB dropped them there would be no other local AM station willing to air ethnic programs. Some of the programs have already been moved to stations such as CFRW-FM or CFRY Portage La Prairie.

The CBC's application for CKSB Winnipeg is part of a drive to improve French service in the west. Applications are also being heard for the purchase of CFRG Gravelbourg and CFNS Saskatoon. Because the stations have been short of money for the last several years, the CBC has provided subsidies (\$300,000 last year).

PELLETIER OFFICIAL OPENING FOR CKQN

The dream of 800 residents of Baker Lake N.W.T. for the last eight years, their own radio station, came true last week with the official opening of CKQN by communications minister Gerard Pelletier. The new Baker Lake station operates on the FM band with 100 watts power.

CKQN broadcasts four hours per day, three of them in Eskimo. 20-year-old David Simailak is station manager, announcer, and operator. In programming, he is borrowing records from the community to supplement the five discs that now comprise the library. He also receives some programming on tapes sent in by the CBC.

The remote location of Baker Lake had meant that residents could only listen to short-wave stations such as Radio Ecuador. The citizens are the licence-holders and are receiving assistance from several interested bodies in running the station.

MIDEM — A BIG MONEY MAKER FOR CANADIAN PUBLISHERS

In spite of bureaucratic attitudes, the Canadian booth at MIDEM apparently turned a healthy buck for Canadian publishing companies who took advantage of the Government sponsored booth. One bright star of the booth was Cannes resident Catherine Roulinant, who was hired by the Canadian Government to act as hostess.

Jack Herschorn, who heads up the Vancouver-based Can-Base Records, estimates more than a quarter of a million dollars worth of business as having been rung up by the Canadian contingent. These included GRT of Canada, Les Disques Gamma, Les Productions S.M.C.L., Love Productions, September Productions, Summerlea Music, Trans-World Records, Ben McPeck Ltd., Les Editions Solset Inc., and Can-Base. Herschorn placed two of his groups, Chief Dan George and Fireweed and The Cascades in Australia, South Africa and the UK. According to Herschorn, the trip to MIDEM is well worth the small expenditure for travelling and living expenses. They are able to contact many of the important international independents and can conceivably pick up the top five European hits through these contacts. It also provided a valuable lesson in international trade.
