

Juno Awards...establishing a tradition

In February of 1970 RPM presented its first annual Gold Leaf Awards Presentation. Some of the four hundred or so people who made it to Toronto's St. Lawrence Hall on that cold, icy night, are no longer in the industry. Several have passed away, others have taken their talents to other businesses. That night several traditions were established. For the first time Canadian performers and businessmen were honoured for their contributions to the music field on a national basis, and secondly it was established that on the night of the presentation there would be freezing rain. Both traditions have survived intact until today. Hopefully, we'll break the freezing rain tradition this year.

March 12th, 1973. A date for many to look at their year's work with pride and for others to resolve to push it a little harder this year.

Marci MacDonald, as I recall, described last year's event as a "glittering affair". It's a description with which I'd have to concur and it is deliberately so. More than anything else the Gold Leaf Awards, or the Junos as

MCA (CANADA) OPENS BRANCH OFFICES

Richard Bibby, Vice-President and National Sales Manager for MCA Records (Canada), announces that MCA is now a total branch operation across Canada. Prior to March 1/73, MCA had branches in Ontario and Quebec but the remainder of the country was serviced by distributors.

Bibby has set up sales offices in Vancouver and Winnipeg with warehousing facilities in Calgary. This stocking branch will service the four Western Provinces while the company's central warehouse in Cornwall, now shipping to Ontario and Quebec on a direct basis, will service the Atlantic Provinces.

In making the above announcement, Bibby stated "The decision to go direct terminates a relationship with some distributors which goes back thirty years. However, I felt that to realize our goal and our growth in 1973, this decision had to be made. We have increased upon the number of people involved in sales and promotion. Promotion was one area in which I felt we were weak in the past, but with Scott Richards directing our promotion activities, I feel we can build an enviable promotion team across Canada."

In spite of any changes which might be made, and there are many being studied, it should be borne in mind always that the Awards are financed by the Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund, a non-profit trust established to provide a standardized and authoritative method of certifying outstanding record sales. Much of the credit for the success of the Awards Presentation must go to those companies which have actively participated in the Trust Fund by certifying their record sales. In the final analysis, it is these companies which are providing the necessary drive and impetus for a successful Awards program.

in the company which included Jack Williams moving from Ontario Sales Manager to Western District Sales Manager to be headquartered in Calgary. Barry Ryman will look after promotion for the provinces of British Columbia and Alberta with Bill Taft taking on duties as Sales Manager for British Columbia. Jack Skelly moves into sales and promotion for Manitoba and Saskatchewan and will be backed up by Dave Stempnick. MCA's Atlantic Provinces operation will be represented by Jim Morrissey.

MCA product has made impressive gains over the past few weeks to coincide with the label's move to become a total branch operation across Canada. Among these are: Elton John's "Crocodile Rock" single, which recently certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) and held the no. 1 position on the RPM 100 for three weeks straight (Feb 17, 24 and Mar 3). His album "Don't Shoot Me" is no. 1 this week on the RPM 100 Albums chart, with a similar listing in Billboard. Neil Diamond has also shown excellent sales returns and chart listings with his "Hot August Night" album, No. 3 this week on the RPM 100 Albums chart as well as being No. 1 in Cash Box.

DKD HANDS BOOKING OVER TO CONCEPT

Donald K. Donald Productions is retiring its booking licence agreement, according to president, Donald Tarlton. The Montreal-based agency's client list has been sold to Toronto's Concept 376 Ltd. The changes affect only the booking operations of DKD.

Tarlton stated that the company's future lies in promoting concert dates across Canada, "with the advent of legislated radio, the Canadian entertainer needs strong full time coast to coast representation and these efforts would not have been feasible before." All acts signed to the DKD agency division have been given unconditional releases, according to Tarlton. Plans for major coast to coast tours involving several Canadian acts will be announced shortly. Donald K. Donald Productions will function as promoter.



Juno Winners 1972

Anne Murray/Capitol Female Vocalist of the Year

For the third consecutive time Anne Murray has been voted Canada's top female vocalist. Few would argue with her wins. Although without a major international hit until the latter part of the year, Miss Murray has



maintained one of the most hectic personal appearance records of any Canadian artist. Not only has she, with her backing group, Richard, appeared in most major Canadian cities in concert, but she has been prominent internationally, with many appearances on European and American television to her credit. For many, the release of the "Annie" album, which too won a Juno Award this year, was the high point of an exciting year. The album indicated new directions for the first lady of Canadian song, and the move into very contemporary material paid off handsomely with increased recognition from the media who had previously considered her a country phenomenon.

Gordon Lightfoot/WEA Male Vocalist of the Year


Gordon Lightfoot is the most long-lived attraction in Canadian music. With the breakout of "If You Could Read My Mind" in 1971, Lightfoot expanded his audience considerably and is now a bona-



fide international success story. Although Lightfoot didn't come up with a single as big as "If You Could Read My Mind" in 1972, he did release "Old Dan's Records", his first recorded-in-Canada album for many years; an album which many labelled his best ever. In addition to being named the year's male vocalist in the Juno balloting, Lightfoot received the coveted "Composer of the Year" award, in recognition of his long and regular contribution to the fabric of Canadian songwriting.

Lighthouse/GRT Vocal - Instrumental Group of the Year

Lighthouse has roots that go back to the days of Toronto's heyday of local music. Although personnel have come and gone, Lighthouse has remained one of the most successful groups in the country, both



on record and in person. 1972 was for Lighthouse their most impressive year of all. The group came up with a series of hit singles in rapid succession, the most memorable of which was "Sunny Days". At the time of writing, another single "You Girl", is bubbling under in the United States. Lighthouse has been increasingly active on the concert trail and smashed the house record at an Ontario Place Forum appearance. By all indications, 1973 could be an even bigger year for GRT's pride and joy.

Bruce Cockburn/True North Folk Singer of the Year

A three time winner of the "Folk Singer of the Year" award, Bruce Cockburn is one of the prime forces in developing a distinctly Canadian musical form. In addition to the success of his album releases for True North, most notably, "Sunwheel Dance", Cockburn is widely represented on the albums of other artists. Two of the compositions which have done the most to spread the Cockburn gospel are "Goin' To The Country"

and "Musical Friends". His career has been well organized, he plays selected dates across the country, drawing on a growing



following. In many ways, Cockburn is representative of the new directions in which our music is heading, and for this he has been named "Folk Singer of the Year".

Stompin' Tom Connors/Boot Male Country Singer of the Year

The impossible just takes longer. Tom Connors is the living proof. In an age of Alice Coopers and David Bowies, there should be no room for the likes of Tom Connors. But there is. Connors has struck a



responsive chord in many people from college students to old age pensioners. Again this year, Stompin' Tom has been named "Male Country Singer of the Year". The results of the voting came as no surprise to anyone. Connors has worked his way into the hearts of thousands with "Bud the Spud", "The Consumer", "The Hockey Song" and others. If there was anything left about Connors to surprise anyone, it was his sold out performance at Toronto's prestigious Massey Hall. The successful Massey Hall appearance was one of the highlights of a career which has taken him from the bars of Sudbury and Wawa to countless national and international television appearances, radio shows, international tours and other accomplishments too numerous to mention.



Shirley Eikhard/Capitol Female Country Singer of the Year

Oshawa, Ontario is known for three things: General Motors, skater Don Jackson, and Shirley Eikhard. From what must have been fairly quiet beginnings in the area just east of Toronto, Shirley Eikhard has captured



the imagination, and the votes, of country fans everywhere. A large step on the road towards being named "Female Country Singer of the Year" was taken when another Capitol songstress, Anne Murray, recorded a little ditty called "It Takes Time". Immediately the composition drew raves from the critics. Shirley Eikhard was on her way. Later Capitol released Miss Eikhard's own version of "It Takes Time", and it went on to become one of the best-liked country songs of the year. An album and numerous concert and club dates later Shirley Eikhard has now received the acknowledgment of the industry, a Juno Award.

Ginette Reno/Parrott Outstanding Performance of the Year - Female Vocalist

Miss Reno's second Juno Award for "Outstanding Performance" comes at a



time when she is riding the success of a new album and a hit single. She is undoubtedly one of the best-known and certainly one of the most durable female vocalists in the country. Miss Reno has a reputation of playing some of the most prestigious concert halls in the world, including the Paris Olympia, London's Savoy Hotel and Place des Arts, Montreal. Television has also played a major part in the establishment of Miss Reno, and recently she wound up an eight week-long series of appearances on Roger Whittaker's BBC television series.

Bob McBride/Capitol Outstanding Performance of the Year - Male Vocalist

In his first year as a solo artist, Bob McBride has been rewarded for his efforts with a Juno for "Outstanding Performance". As lead vocalist for Lighthouse, who too won a Juno this year, McBride is an accomplished



stage performer. His first album for Capitol, "Butterfly Days", was released to instant approval from the critics, and contained "Pretty City Lady", a record which served to establish him with both the public and radio. With such a successful first year as a solo artist behind him, McBride is in a position to break out internationally in 1973.

Edward Bear/Capitol Outstanding Performance - Vocal - Instrumental Group

When "You, Me and Mexico" hit, everyone said Edward Bear had arrived. Unfortunately, that single wasn't as successful internationally




as it could have been. However, it did serve as the introduction to a series of highly commercial recordings, "Fly Across the Sea" and "Masquerade" among them, which

served to pave the way for one of the biggest Canadian records of all time, "Last Song". To say that the group deserved the success of "Last Song" is an understatement. It is a tribute to both Edward Bear and Capitol Records that the group was able to survive the ups and downs over the years. "Last Song" is irrefutable proof that hard work and perseverance pay off in the long run. "Last Song" has been named "Best Produced Single of the Year", and its creators, Edward Bear have been voted by the industry as recipients of a Juno Award for "Outstanding Performance of the Year by a Vocal Instrumental Group".

Valdy/Haida Outstanding Performance - Folk Singer

One of the most pleasant and productive results of 1972 has been the emergence of Valdy, Haida Records' very own success story. "Rock and Roll Song", taken from the artist's "Country Man" album, was a run-



away smash. It has since been followed up by a record of even greater strength, "A Good Song". One of Valdy's outstanding traits is his distressing (for other artists) ability to steal shows from some of the biggest names in the business. Buckwheat, Delaney and Bonnie and others have come out second best to the Valdy magic, according to numerous critics. As winner of a Juno for "Outstanding Performance - Folk Singer" for 1972, Valdy received recognition for a truly outstanding first year. 1973 promises to be even better.

Mercy Brothers/RCA Country Vocal-Instrumental Group of the Year

A genuine pillar of the country recording and performing scene, the Mercy Brothers, from Elmira, Ontario, have won their fourth Juno Award as country vocal instrumental group of the year. The three brothers, Ray, Lloyd and Larry, are well known to the Canadian audience through their many television appearances and club dates. Since




Randy Bachman signs with Mercury

Randy Bachman of Brave Belt has terminated a three month record deal search by landing a contract with Mercury for two years with two one-year options. The deal, signed February 28, is reportedly a lucrative one although figures are not being released by Bachman or manager Bruce Allen. It calls for two albums a year from the group.

Tom Northcott's new single, his first under his recently signed Warner Brothers contract, is "Ask Me No Questions" f/s "The Last Thing On My Mind" and is being

released early in March, coinciding with a bout of touring in the east. Just back from a February of college dates in Ontario, Northcott returns for more concert and club engagements there starting March 6 and continuing til mid April.

Terry McManus, whose singles "Sunshower" and "Love Is Wine" and "Carolyn" have earned him fairly strong Canadian MOR support over the last two years. He has obtained a release from his contract with A&M. He prefers not to discuss details of the separation, but has formed his own publishing and production company, Looking West Music, and has entered into an agreement with Tommy Banks' Record Company, Century II, for which national distribution has recently been arranged. After one and a half years in Vancouver, McManus will start work at the new quarter million dollar Edmonton studio in mid March, producing for his own company and administering the publishing for Century II.

Sounds Of The World, the Vancouver-based company that came into existence two years ago as tour promoters for the Irish Rovers and have since diversified their energies to include a variety of artists from Theodorakis to Kenny Rogers and the First Edition, has struck up what may be a continuing alliance with Terry and Susan Jacks and the Poppy Family based on the unprecedented success of the Poppy Family's recent western Canada tour. The dates, which included Red Deer, Edmonton, Regina and Calgary, were completely sold out with the exception of one performance in Edmonton, and drew enthusiastic standing ovations from every audience. Terry and Susan, who are still negotiating for a new recording contract as their London deal comes to a close, will also launch an Ontario charity tour for The World Wildlife Organization, April 8.

Chilliwack, with new rhythm guitarist/key-

board man Howard Froese and with bassist Glenn Miller returning to the fold, finished off a tremendously well-received western Canada tour in Vancouver in February at the PNE Gardens. The room was packed to the rafters for the event. Chilliwack, who have always had a surprisingly strong home town following, hadn't played Vancouver in almost two years. The present lineup is tighter than ever and the material culled mainly from their new highly commercial album.

They follow this up with an eastern tour currently in progress and an appearance on CFCF's Musical Friends.

Rock concerts have been few and far between

in Vancouver over the last few months with shows being cancelled almost as often as they actually happen. Of the handful that have come off well, one in particular was the return of the inimitable Captain Beefheart March 2 and 3. In the Commodore Ballroom, a dance and banquet hall turned experimentally over to the freaks for the weekend, Beefheart and his crew put on incredibly loud, uncharacteristically commercial performances that left little doubt he is heading where he figures the money is: the happy dancing grounds where you can boogie all night long. A sad passing of the old Beefheart, but what he has now is still funky and fine, with all-round good playing. A very raunchy time was had by all.



U.S. INDUSTRY FIGHTS BEATLES PIRATES

The emergence of a "Story of the Beatles" bootleg album containing sixty Beatles selections in New York state has forced Apple Records to take action in two fields to try to protect its revenue. The company has filed a request for an injunction against the pirates and also plans a rush release of a set of two double "History of the Beatles" albums to push the pirated product off the market.

The injunction seeking to have the activities of the pirates stopped was filed by Allen Klein in the Supreme Court of the County of New York. Klein's affidavit seeks, on behalf of Abkco Industries, Apple Records, Capitol Records, and George Harrison, to have the court order a stop to the manufacture and advertising of the pirate records.

Separate suits were laid against broadcasters who ran ads for the pirate album. WPIX-TV was charged, as was the ABC network. ABC, before the court could even consider the matter, provided Klein with a consent that it would never in future sell or advertise Beatles records or tapes without getting written permission from Apple Records.

The final disposition of the suit will set a precedent for American law on pirate records, which have had an unclear status in law. Previous pirate actions have revolved around music publishing because it is represented in the copyright laws. This is the first suit to contain a claim for damages by the actual recording artist. Harrison's claim is for \$15 million damages for the unauthorized use of his name and picture by the pirates.

In the meantime, Apple/Abkco/Capitol are acting to hit back in the marketplace against the collection of big Beatles hits. Old Beatles product sells in excess of two million albums yearly and represents a very

The suggested American retail price will be \$9.98 each.

The large profitability of the bootleg Beatles album was shown by the massive advertising done for it. Radio and television announcements were purchased on NYC-area media, as well as print ads in *Oui*, *Motor Trend*, *Penthouse*, *Car & Driver* and *signature*.

SMILE MAKING GAINS WITH ALABAMA DECK

Smile Records, a Toronto-based label, have been quietly grooming their initial entry into the disc field, Alabama, and it would appear that independent promotion by the group's manager John Watt and Smile's Dave Coultis is beginning to pay off. Their single, "Song Of Love", which was co-written by group members Buster Fykwa and Rick Knight, is now showing strength with the Adult Contemporary stations. Other members of the group are Len Sembaluk and Hector McLean. Their single was produced by Hilly Leopold at Toronto's Eastern Sound and has a lush background comprised of members of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Vocal backup is supplied by Diane Brooks, Patty Van Evera and Colina Phillips.

Alabama has also been active on the gig scene with their biggest coup being their performance at the Liberal's giant Toronto rally for Prime Minister Trudeau just prior to last year's election.

Smile is distributed in Canada by London Records.

CABLE'S "OUT-A-SPACE" GETS NEW SUPPORT

"Out a Space", the weekly music program, produced by Metro Cable in Toronto, and hosted by Rick Deegan has gained two new supporters. A&A Records, the downtown Toronto record retailer and GRT have pitched in with support for the show's second thirteen segment series. The list of supporters now includes WEA, Columbia, RCA, GRT and A&A.

According to Deegan, discussions regarding national distribution of the half-hour show are now underway. Deegan has on hand a complete set of tapes of the first thirteen weeks of "Out a Space". Paul Hoffert, acting on behalf of HP & Bell, has purchased a tape of the segment featuring the story of Lighthouse for promotional purposes.

Artists who have appeared on the show's second run include Keith Hampshire, Jack Shectman, Paul Hoffert, John Allan Cameron and Ray Materick. Upcoming are interviews with Jimmy Castor, George Hamilton IV, Bob McBride/Dr. Music among others.

CRAIG RUHNKE OPENS WEA'S PUBBERY DOOR

John Pozer, professional manager of WEA Canada's publishing arm Don Valley Music-BMI, has put together an impressive promotional folio on their first exclusive Canadian writer - Craig Ruhnke. Pozer has been working with the twenty-two year old Ruhnke for the past twelve months in a development program that led to his cautious entry into the songwriting field.

Pozer is confident of the potential of the young writer and revealed that "To date, we have turned down over sixty writers, possibly based on the fact that it is useless to sign a writer and throw his songs in a file and hope someday they are put to use."

Don Valley Music have made an extensive mailing to industry people across Canada as well as to WEA's world-wide affiliates. Response has been encouraging with several songs already being considered for recording sessions - one being by Michael Campbell who will shortly leave his Vancouver home for a recording session with his manager Gary Cape in Montreal.

Ruhnke's publisher demo, which accompanied Pozer's press release, contains six compositions: "My World", "The Key", "Movie Theme", "Midday Misty Moonlight", "I'll Always Love You", and "Come On Down".


DUMPTRUCKS WIND UP RCA SESSION

CFRS SIMCOE GOING TO 10,000 WATTS

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has come to a decision over which of five competing applications for a frequency vacated last year by CJRN Niagara Falls should be approved. It awarded a change of frequency, extension of hours, and power boost to CFRS Simcoe, while denying four other applications.

Two of the applicants were seeking to operate new radio stations on 1590 kHz (next to CJRN's former 1600 frequency). E.E. Hallman sought a licence for a second Guelph radio station while Gerald P. Moser wanted a licence for a third AM station in Waterloo. The other two applicants were CKOT Tillsonburg and CHSC St. Catharines who wanted to move onto 1600 with increased power.

Denial of the new-station applications came because "the Commission considers that Guelph and Kitchener-Waterloo are adequately served by existing AM stations". Since the other applications were mutually exclusive and only one could be approved, the CRTC opted for the plan which would convert CFRS from a 250-watt daytimer to a 10,000 watt fulltimer, saying "the community of Simcoe... is entitled to full-time service". CHSC is already full-time, and CKOT, though a daytimer, has a full-time FM station. The Simcoe Broadcasting Company will receive its licence for 1600 after it has satisfied Department of Communications technical requirements.

One paragraph of the announcement seems to indicate that the CRTC's upcoming FM radio policy will contain permission for present FM stations to increase power. To quote: "Because of the unavailability of satisfactory AM frequencies in this area, the Commission encourages FM licencees to give consideration to improvement of their coverage".

CHIN FORMING NETWORK FOR SHOWS FROM ISRAEL

CHIN, the Toronto multi-language radio station, is now well along with plans to mark the 25th anniversary of the State of Israel with five live radio broadcasts from that country during Easter week. Application has been made to the CRTC for the formation of a four-station Ontario network to relay the program throughout the province, with approval expected any day now.

The series, which will air live from 9.05 to 9.30AM April 16 to 20th, offers a non-political, Christian look at the Holy Land through the eyes of broadcaster-journalist-author Doug Hall. Hall is well versed on this subject, having visited the Middle East a year ago to produce twelve half-hour interviews with prominent Middle East figures for the CAB Program Exchange. He is heard daily on CHIN's "Open Mike" as well as on a syndicated TV show "Fiction or Fact".

Subject to CRTC approval, CKNX Wingham, CHOW Welland, CJOY Guelph and CJBQ Belleville will air the programs, which are to be originated for CHIN and the network through the facilities of Israeli Radio. Costs for satellite transmission to Toronto are being borne by a national advertiser who will receive only opening and closing commercial credits.

APRIL HEARINGS AGENDA RELEASED BY CRTC

The agenda for the April hearings of the CRTC has now been released. It will be held in the same place as the March hearings (Ottawa's Skyline Hotel) and begins April tenth. Among the numerous cable TV and CBC applications are requests for power increases from five Ontario radio stations.

CKKW in Kitchener is looking to abandon its 1320 kHz operation of 1000 watts day and night for 10,000 watts day and night power on 1090 kHz. Though the application has not even been heard yet, CFTJ in Cambridge (formerly Galt, Ontario) has already applied for the 1320 frequency that would be vacated by CKKW. CFTJ is now licensed for day-time broadcasting only, with 250 watts power on 1110 kHz. They would go to 1000 watts day and night if the application gets CRTC blessing.

The licence of CFGO Ottawa, the Baton Broadcasting station which took over the former CKPM frequency last year, is now up for renewal. The CRTC will consider this application along with another submitted by CFGO to increase power from 10,000 watts day and night to 50,000 day and night on the same 1440 frequency.

Also applying for power boosts are CKLC Kingston and CHRL Roberval. CKLC would leave daytime power unchanged at 10,000 watts but wants to increase night power from 5000 to 10,000. The CHRL application would boost day power from 1000 to 10,000 watts and would up the night power to 2500 from 1000. Both stations would remain on their current frequencies.

Miss Divine, described as "a lovely head without a body" will be on hand to liven up the "looking for a body" contest. Various other acts of intrigue have been set for the "Hellzopppin" showcase including magician Ron Leonard and the previewing of a mysterious new artist and his local waxed goodie.



This recording gives us a sonic glimpse into the vast interior of the Cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris and performances of four major Toccatas by Bach, performed by Pierre Cochereau. The sound is massive and rich. Every pipe organ buff dreams of "getting at" a mass of keyboards and stops to play the popular



Toccata and Fugue in D minor full out. Perhaps it is better to sit back comfortably and let an artist like Pierre Cochereau make musical sense of it.

BERLIOZ - TCHAIKOVSKY - PROKOFIEV Romeo and Juliet
 The San Francisco Symphony Orchestra conducted by Seiji Ozawa
 DGG 2530 308

Torontonians have a special affection for Japanese conductor Seiji Ozawa who conducted the Toronto Symphony Orchestra for a number of seasons prior to the appointment of Mr. Ancerl. After his appointment as Director of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, he was contracted to make several recordings for Deutsche Grammophon and this disc is one of their first releases. It features three views of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. The Tchaikovsky tone poem is the most familiar, while the Prokofiev Ballet on the subject is a popular favorite with fans of the Canadian National Ballet Company's production. The Berlioz work is called a Dramatic Symphony and features singers, chorus and large orchestra. Performances are a knock-out and the sound thrilling.

DOHMANYI Piano Concerto No. 1 in E minor Op. 5
 Balint Vazsonyi - Pianist
 The New Philharmonia Orchestra conducted by John Pritchard
 GENESIS GS 1022

Almada Records have done a fine service to Classical music enthusiasts in Canada by making available at domestic prices the Genesis label which is an American based company specializing in neglected 19th century works. Erno Dohnanyi who died in 1960 is best known for his witty Variations on a Nursery Tune for Piano and Orchestra. He composed two Piano Concertos, the first of which was written in 1898. It is given a glittering performance by Balint Vazsonyi who was a pupil of the composer, and he is superbly backed by London's New Philharmonia Orchestra. Future releases on this label will include the Symphony in F major by Hermann Goetz, and the Carl Reinecke Piano Concertos Nos. 1 & 2.

STRAVINSKY Le Sacre du Printemps
 The London Symphony Orchestra conducted by Leonard Bernstein
 Columbia M 31520


Leonard Bernstein puts the London Symphony Orchestra through its very considerable paces in this work which separates the Symphony Orchestras from the Village Bands. They bring it off with professional ease and tonal beauty. Some really thrilling moments from the brass and percussion department. The mint-clear recording handles it all smoothly and brilliantly. It would have been impossible to imagine twenty-five years ago that this work would reach the state of being over-played and over-recorded but I do feel that the moment has arrived

W.A. MOZART Piano Sonatas
 Emil Gilels - Pianist

The cancellation of Russian virtuoso Emil Gilels' appearance with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra this month was a disappointment to his many admirers. They can be partially consoled by turning to one of the several fine recordings he has made recently for Deutsche Grammophon. The Mozart album at hand is a live performance recorded on January 28th, 1970 at the Salzburg Mozarteum. It features the Piano Sonata in BbK. 281, the Six Variations on a theme by Paisiello K.398, the Fantasie in D minor K.397, and the great Sonata in A minor, K 310. Those who prefer the modern de-charmed approach to Mozart will be pleased with Gilels' steely control and dramatic excitement.

GIACOMO CARISSIMI Ezechias
 Soloists, Chorus and Orchestra directed by Michel Corboz
 ERATO STU 70762

The seventeenth century Italian composer Giacomo Carissimi has been rather poorly represented in record catalogues. This lovely disc gives us an opportunity to hear four examples of his beautifully expressive vocal writing. Two Oratorios presented are "Histoire d'Ezechias" and "Histoire d'Abraham et Isaac". The "Tolle Sponsa" is a brief work for soprano, bass, choir and continuo inspired by the Song of Songs, and the programme is completed by Carissimi's Messe a huit voix. The beautifully packaged disc, now distributed by RCA, contains a translation of the text in French and English. A real treat for lovers of fine choral singing.

CKFH INTRODUCES NEW POLICY "NUMBER ONE MUSIC"

In a move described as prompted by lack of growth in young adult demographics, CKFH in Toronto has adopted a music policy that basically consists of oldies plus Canadian music. The station calls the new policy "Number One Music" and uses this phrase on the air along with another spoken logo "Music That's Made It". When The Programmers spoke to program director Duff Roman, he said: "This is it. This is the format that will make CKFH a ratings powerhouse."

The basic concept of the format involves playing a large number of oldies. "The ballads and early rock of the 50's . . . the supergroups of the 60's . . . the soft rock of the 70's. Only the best examples will be played, only the 'Number One Music'. To this we add the future music hits of Canadian performers" was the way the station's press release described it.

The CKFH format has been planned for several months now. The main problem with the oldies format has been locating the records, which are now up to 20 years old. It took several months of scouring a number of diverse sources before sufficient material was on hand, and the process is still continuing.

The establishing of this type of format in the Toronto market comes after several years of a trend to increase play of "gold" or "oldies" on local contemporary stations. Roman also noted the success of WGAR Cleveland and WCBS-FM New York with all-oldies formats, commenting, "other stations who pioneered this way had some very happy accidents with their audience". Because all the music is proven hit material, there is a strong hold on the 18-49 age group.

When The Programmers airchecked the new CKFH format, we found them to be heavy on the 1955 to 1972 oldies already mentioned. However, announcers made no mention of "gold", "oldie", "nostalgia" on air, nor did they give the year of any record, and often left even title and artist to the listener's memory. The music is left to speak for itself without a layer of "hype" surrounding it. Also to be heard were "Canadian gold" and "current Canadian hit singles" along with, very infrequently, an

American or British current hit single. But these other categories were not identified; they occurred naturally within regular "Number One Music" sweeps.

Current air lineup at CKFH: Dick Joseph 7-11AM; Jim Weir from CFGM 11-1PM; Mac Lipson with telephone talk 1-3PM; Duff Roman 3-6PM; Mal Faris (plus hockey) 6-midnight; and Steve Harringer, late of CJCA

Edmonton does midnight to six. Religion 6-7AM.

The Programmers hopes to run a further report on the new CKFH programming in an upcoming issue. But already Toronto gossip is saying that the oldies represent the strongest chance in CKFH history for the station to grab substantial young adult listeners, if experience in other markets is any guide.





RPM 10/3/73 featured a story headlined "CBC radio shows win Ohio U awards" which should have mentioned that the award for "Single Child, Aged Parent" of the series "Concern", honoured the producer as much as it did the CBC. The program was the original idea of freelance broadcaster Joan Barberis, who collected and edited the interviews.

After a successful run last year, CKPT is bringing back its two week series "Bringing Back the 50's". Starts with 1950, using top ten hits and local news of that year (from Peterboro Examiner files). Runs 9-10AM with 11PM to midnight repeat. Five hour back-to-back recap runs the following Saturday. Great local reaction once again to the feature.

CKGM Montreal repeating "The Elvis Presley Story". Special to air in six-hour Sunday blocks March 11 & 18.

FOOTPRINT'S LATEST: OSMOND RADIO DOCU.

Toronto syndication firm Footprint Productions Limited, is now engaged in a nationwide promotion to radio programmers for its new music documentary "The Osmonds: In Touch With Today". John Hanlon, marketing man for Footprint's Toronto office, has announced that eight Canadian markets have already contracted to air the hour-long program.

The Osmonds, one of the top teen acts today, have a musical history that stretches back to barbershop quartet singing in 1963 and several years of performing on the Andy Williams show. The documentary traces them from this early stage, through hit-chart status, by way of exclusive interviews and all thirteen Osmond hits. Even Donny Osmond's fateful voice-change is covered.

Production is tight and contemporary, with narration by Terry Steele of CHUM. Research, writing and production were done in Toronto.

The fifty one minute format has four commercial breaks within it to allow up to nine minutes commercial content. Making records, breaking traditions.



The real story behind Avenue of America ???

What makes Avenue of America tick - how long is it going to tick - and how can you turn down an offer you can't refuse? Perhaps we're being a little facetious in asking these questions - but why not. We're in a fast moving business and anyone who makes it is always suspect - particularly if they are a wholly-owned Canadian company, and that's what Avenue of America has going for them. Gary Salter, who heads up this upstart young "public" company is unique to this business. He's aggressive, he wheels and deals and, you have to hand it to him, he pumps that Canadian image from coast to coast in Canada, the U.S. and across the pond. Salter displays the real record-sense that breaks and makes record companies around the world. That's why he's unique to this country, even though he is Canadian born. His specialty is marketing, and promotion whether it's aluminum windows, used cars or, now, records and tapes.

Salter frightens a lot of people in the business. He made his first entry into the disc trade through MTCC. There was lots of spending and everything else that should have laid the foundation for a thriving record business. He was just thirteen months too soon and he was in the wrong country with a bag full of talent destined to go nowhere. MTCC went belly-up and Salter disappeared from the scene for a short time. While he was licking his wounds, others were rubbing salt into them, hoping they had heard the last of Gary Salter.

Well, he came back, in June of 1971 and in January of 1972, Salter and his Avenue of America presented a healthy prospectus and went public. Salter was asked how come his company could arrange to go public so soon. He replied: "We made some money the first quarter - the first part of the business - but we had a concept going - our basic business, and still is. We haven't made a dime on Canadian talent - or developing Canadian,

or on our pop product. It probably cost us money. However, we think the future's good and with what we've got in production and what we've finished producing, I think we have profitable product. Abraham's Children are now on the American charts - we have three or four other things that are very, very strong. We have three or four deals that are at the final stages of placing another three Canadian groups with American record companies, for all-out exploitation. I'm looking forward to the day when Avenue has not one record on the American charts but four or five".

Again, you have to hand it to him. He took his first group, Abraham's Children with their initial single release, "Goodbye Farewell", and began making his move. For starters he literally hired the Toronto Island for one of the biggest promotions of the year. Just on the strength of promotion (Abraham's Children were still a non-entity, hit-wise) he drew more than 30,000 to their concert, creating a problem for the Harbour Commission which found it difficult to supply enough ferries for the gig. The city apparently wants him to set up a similar promotion for this summer.

Slowly and methodically, he works each release. Says Salter: "When we release a record, we phone everybody. When we send a record - we send it across the board and phone everybody and make them aware that they've got the record. We don't just send out a record. Our promotional packages are exceptional. I don't know of anybody else who does that with a single. They just throw the record out in the mail. Not with us. We value our records and each one is contained in a promotion package that gets our message across."

Just walking across the threshold of Avenue of America is an experience. There's enough action in the lobby alone to convince one that something is going on in the inner offices that means business. Each office has

its own kind of excitement, right through to the inner brass. Every company needs an image to hang its hat on and there he is, Abe Salter, father of Gary, who sits to his left in their large double-desked office. The elder Salter offers that "father image", and even if things aren't going so great, just seeing him there makes the day go better. The name Abraham's Children came about through Abe Salter.

Gary Salter makes no bones about what he's after - international success. He considers every radio station in Canada as being an important step toward this end. He's even had contact with Inuvik in the North West Territories. Of course, some of these radio stations report to the U.S. trade sheets. Canada, to Salter, is like a sounding board. He claims: "We produce a record in Canada with Canadian kids for world-wide consumption. I never expect to get off the hook here production-wise, for a single - even if I get off production-wise I won't get off what my cost of promotion is."

Avenue doesn't restrict itself to Canadian productions only. They have experimented with single releases from the UK ie. "Natalie" by Robbie Rae and Charlotte's "Slow Love", but they do keep their releases down to a workable minimum, which could be one of the reasons for their success.

What's keeping their pop activity high? The bucks they are making from "cover records" which were produced and licensed in the UK. These three record sets and tapes with "top hits" and "Grammies" concepts brought in a lot of money. The albums sold for \$5.95 with the tapes in for \$9.95. Salter flooded the market and obviously came out of it a winner.

Much of Avenue's pressing is done in their own plant. They bought a pressing plant on Dufferin St. and modernized it, but it

apparently can't keep up with all their own pressing. Their tape duplicating is farmed out.

Salter was asked if he knew he had a lot of enemies within the industry. His reply: "If I have a lot of enemies out there, I don't know exactly who they are. I have an idea of one or two of them, maybe. But, maybe they can't understand why we can be successful. Maybe they feel they know more about the business than we do. And they say, well how can this guy be successful and I'm struggling. How does he do what he's doing? I don't know - I guess I just work harder".

He was also asked about the rumours of the usual type of pay off - broads, booze, dope etc. A cool, but disturbed Salter answered: "First of all, I don't personally get involved with dope myself - of any kind. I don't even smoke cigarettes. I have never paid off a disc jockey. I have never given a disc jockey dope and if I ever caught my guys doing it I would fire them 'cause I don't like that. I'm not into that scene myself. I understand there are people who are. I can't help that - I have three sons.

"As far as booze and broads, I've had my share of parties. Every record company has parties, OK. We're no different than any other record company. We don't do it to get them plied with liquor and play a record when they're drunk. We do it to introduce product. As far as broads - I haven't supplied any radio station people with broads either. I don't think it's necessary. It's all a bunch of bullshit. All the guys who make those accusations are guys who can't get records played. I suggest they take a look at their records, not themselves. Their records are probably not up to standard, because any good record can get played in this country - very easy."

There's more to Avenue of America than what you have just read, promotion men, marketing people, an ad agency, songwriters, producers, everything that makes a record company - a record company. But, Salter is where the excitement begins, and if you're not impressed when you leave Salter and his brain factory - don't be too discouraged. The reason why there are so few record success stories in this country is because of the lack of initiative by small independent companies. Sure, Salter may go bust again, but he's at least trying and he's pulling every "hat trick" conceivable.

their signing with RCA Records several years ago, the trio has become increasingly well accepted on record, "Kentucky Turn



Your Back" was a major breakthrough for the group in 1972. The tune received heavy airplay from the bulk of Canada's many country stations and served to consolidate the group's position at the top of the heap of Canadian country groups.

The Canadian record company that's come a long way

It was almost two years ago when a number of Canadian businessmen created Avenue of America Recording Limited with a nice new concept in the record industry. The skeptical record industry said, "good luck, it's going to be a hard trip."

The businessmen said, "let's record proven songs in the style of the original hits, package them attractively in sets, price them reasonably and then promote the heck out of them . . . sell music . . . not the artist."

"Then let's take the profits and put them into the promotion of good Canadian talent."


And that's exactly what Avenue of America have been doing. They have had successful record set promotions like: "Rock On" (30,000 people came to the "Rock On" concert at Toronto Island); "Love On" (40 great love songs); "50 Top Hits of 72" (still selling strong); "Grammy Awards" (a big seller in Canada and the U.S.)


