
A new single release by Toronto's Cycle will mark the tenth anniversary of Tamarac Records. Tamarac was formed in May of 1963 by Stan Klees, who had, at that point, some fifteen years of radio and record business experience behind him. The concept of the company was simple: to produce records in Canada. The first four years of Tamarac's existence accomplished exactly that.

The company was responsible for the production of many albums and singles appearing on a variety of labels, RCA, Capitol, Quality, Compo, Columbia and Tamarac's own Red Leaf among them. During this period, Klees also produced a number of commercials using Canadian pop groups, the most noteworthy of which was a series for Coca Cola.

At one time, Klees was producing some fifteen Canadian groups. Among those he produced are the Big Town Boys, Little Caesar and the Consuls, Robbie Lane, Shirley Matthews, Bobby Kris, Greg Hambleton, Larry Lee, the Butterfingers, Dave Mickie, Ronnie White, Dee and the Yeomen, Jayson King, Jack London and the Sparrows, Hugh Scott, Jay Jackson, Jimmy Dybold, Jack Hardin and the Silhouettes, the British Modbeats, Eric Mercury, The Ardels, The Counts, Spec Filter, Lynda Lane, The Rainvilles, The Charmaines, Jay Smith, Tommy Graham, Paul Clinch and the Cycle.

THIRD ANNUAL KIWANIS ROCK FEST

The Kiwanis Music Festival Association has scheduled its third annual rock competition for May 3rd, at Edmonton's Jubilee Auditorium. The festivals were initiated as a result of demand for broadened rock music coverage in the Kiwanis' annual song festival. This year two categories have been established for participating rock groups, "A" which encompasses union bands, and "B" for non-union bands.

The original Edmonton Music Festival was first organized in 1908. It ran for two days and consisted of eleven different classes of music. In 1963 the Edmonton Kiwanis Club took over the festival and has nurtured it to the point that in 1972 over 3,000 entries and 28,000 participants took part in it. All work on the festival is done on a voluntary basis by Kiwanis members and their wives.

The May 3rd event will see the entrants narrowed down to a field of six groups in each of the two categories. Judging will be done on the basis of "rhythmical unity, arrangement, balance, lyrics and presentation". Adjudicator at this year's event will be Walt Grealis, RPM's publisher. Past adjudicators have included Ritchie Yorke and Skip Prokop. Winners of the "A" category will receive three hour's studio time, courtesy of GRT of Canada, winners of class "B" will receive a scholarship, plus the Tommy Banks Trophy. Additional prizes will be awarded to the best individual on guitar, drums, keyboards, bass and vocals.

Assisting in the promotion and presentation of the festival are CHED, Edmonton, and the Edmonton Journal.

FOOTPRINT BEGINS WORK ON STONES DOCU.

Footprint Productions, spurred on by the success of its previous radio documentaries on The Osmonds and The Beatles, has now begun work on an in-depth documentary on The Rolling Stones. The Toronto-based production company experienced substantial orders from both major and breakout stations across Canada for "The Beatles: the Echoes and the Dream" and "The Osmonds: In Touch with Today" and is now firmly established in a profitable position. Footprint first hit the scene approximately one year ago.

Footprint's audio study of the Stones will offer the same elements of professionalism evident in the Beatles and Osmonds features. Staffers are currently engaged in extensive research and the gathering of exclusive interview tapes with the Rolling Stones. Production and marketing of the documentary will begin this fall.

In the meantime, demand is still evident for Footprint's Osmonds tape. Australia and New Zealand stations are now ordering, following sixteen placements at Canadian outlets. Footprint is also about to unleash its publicity forces for the first major U.S. push on the Osmonds documentary, which covers their history up to Donny's voice change with narration by CHUM's Terry Steele



The gentlemen pictured above are in the process of signing an agreement by which the private radio and television stations in Canada will pay an estimated forty million dollars to Canadian composers, authors and publishers. The five year agreement, which became effective January 1st of this year, provides that an overall tariff of three per cent of the gross revenue of privately-owned radio stations and 2.4 per cent of gross revenue of privately-owned television stations will flow to the composers, authors and publishers in compensation for the use of their copyrights, for profit, by the broadcasters.

EASTERN SOUND BUSY WITH CANCON

Toronto's Eastern Sound Studios, responsible for some thirty per cent of the nationally charted singles product now out, "must be doing something right", according to studio manager, Murray Shields. Eastern has been virtually fully booked over the past few months with a profitable assortment of label work, film scores and commercial recording. The studio was responsible for recording all five recently released Avenue of America albums, as well as Anne Murray's "Danny's Song", Tommy Graham's new Capitol LP, an album for John Allan Cameron, and product for Myles and Lenny, Richard, Shannon Two Feathers, Joe Mendelson, Anne Bridgeforth, Alabama, Copper Penny, Humphrey and the Dumptrucks and Johnathon Round. Country recording has played a big part in Eastern's activities with Marathon Music being responsible for sessions with seven country acts under producer, Doug Taylor.

Two feature films, "Slipstream" by Pacific Rim Films, and "Mahoney's Estate" by Topaz Films, have both been soundtracked at Eastern. Larry Trudel, Hagood Hardy and George Kwasniak have been keeping up the jingle end of things for the studio and according to Shields, "business is good ... and will remain so."

MCA TIES IN WITH CJJC REMOTE FOR LYNN PROMO

An interesting example of a record company tie-in with a radio station remote broadcast happened recently when CJJC Langley participated in an MCA Records promotion called "Rated X". Barry Ryman of the MCA office in B.C. arranged the event to push Loretta Lynn product (her most recent single is "Rated X").

The Langley country station was doing an eight-hour remote broadcast for Barry Clark Recreational Vehicles and placed small pieces of cardboard marked with X in various locations in and around the mobile homes and trailers. All through the eight hours, announcers Dave Cash, Gerry Norris and Brian Lord challenged listeners to drop by and see if they could find an X. Those who did could exchange the cardboard for a free Loretta Lynn album.

All in all, the three-way attraction of live CJJC radio, free albums, and displays of recreational vehicles combined to produce a greater reaction in favour of the station, MCA Records, and the sponsor then would have been possible otherwise. Thirty CJJC listeners received complimentary albums in all.

Tamarac was established in May of 1963. It was ten years ago when we launched our first Canadian single.

Since that time, a great many artists have been involved with us and a great many singles and albums have been made available. All product has been Canadian content, and every release qualifies as Canadian content - to this day.

It began in May of '63 with "Stood Up" by Larry Lee. Later came "Big Town Boy" by Shirley Matthews and much later "My Girl Sloopy" by Little Caesar and the Consuls. We should also mention: The Big Town Boys, The Butterfingers, Robbie Lane, Bobby Kris, Dave Mickie, Ronnie White, Dee and the Yeomen, Jayson King, Hugh Scott, Jay Jackson, Greg Hambleton, Jimmy Dybold, Jack Hardin and the Silhouettes, The British Modbeats, Jack London and the Sparrows, Eric Mercury, The Ardels, The Counts, Spec Filter, Lynda Layne, The Rainvilles, The Charmaines, Tommy Graham, Jay Smith, Paul Clinch and the Cycle and many more.

In 1963, the best that Canada could offer in the way of recording facilities were 3-track studios. They were illequipped for record production in the very competitive North American market. As Canadian producers became more prominent, the studios improved over the years, turning out remarkably good product. Today there are studios with 32-tracks and the facilities are regarded as the finest in the world.

It was what happened in those early years of Canadian production that has led to Canada's position in the world music industry, today.

The Canadian recording stars of today were too young to remember that just ten short years ago, the potential of a Canadian artist was dismal.

Today we have a viable, aggressive industry. There is still room to grow, and Tamarac wants to be part of the new adventure of the growing music industry in Canada.

Promotion department feeling sluggish

Promotion department feeling tired and worn out? Record sales sluggish? You could be suffering from overkill. Too many artists and too many promoters are vying for too little money in too many ways. WEA's artist relations man, Bob Krol, summed it up neatly; if a kid takes his girlfriend to a concert, even once a week, there's ten bucks down the drain, ten bucks out of a limited budget which will not be spent on records.

It used to be that when an artist came to town, record sales would jump. Today, in many cases, the opposite is occurring. The two dollar concert is no more, now it's five bucks, six bucks, even ten and twelve. Avaricious promoters? Perhaps. Money crazy stars? Quite often. Regardless of who is responsible for the concert rip-off, and too many times they are a rip-off, it drains money from the record buying public. Several companies in the United States are now entering the concert production field themselves. There is at least one major in this country associated with a well-known

concert producer. Do they sense a new trend? Will the production, manufacture and distribution of records become secondary to some of these companies? That is one possibility, the other is that the public will

tire of paying inflated prices to see acts, and the concert scene will go into recession. There is some indication that this may be happening already.

If it does happen it will be a sad day for all concerned. Live appearances have traditionally been one of the best avenues of promotion for recording artists as well as one of the best revenue grabbers. Along with broadcast and print exposure, concerts and other types of dates have formed a sort of promotional triumvirate. The law of diminishing returns seems to apply however. More and more concerts, more and more spots for those concerts, more and more money being

spent, and yet concert attendance is dropping, record sales are slow and there is no end in sight.

In the long run, concert promoters would be wise to become more conservative. Fewer concerts of higher quality at fairer prices would result in a healthier situation for everyone. But, of course, that will never happen. The competitive urge of promoters prohibits it

The same thing applies to record companies. Less product, more carefully screened would. in the long run result in a healthier profit picture. But that too is an impossibility. Some companies seem hell-bent on signing every guitar player who walks by, not so much because they believe they make him a success, but in fear that if they don't sign him up, somebody else will make him successful.

So we are destined to see a once healthy market for music, both live and recorded. become less and less able to buy what it wants. Only when the well runs dry will concert and record production slow down to a more realistic pace. And, by then, the damage will have been done.

CHUM LTD. SETS UP **NEWS TRAINING PLAN**

CHUM Ltd., in an effort to counter one of the biggest problems facing broadcasters (How to attract new, talented people to TV and radio), has begun a pilot training program for Canadian broadcast journalists. The news came in the company's "CHUM Report".

Through arrangements initiated and completed by the Canadian Contemporary News System, in cooperation with Canada Manpower, six CHUM-Group radio and TV stations have placed recruits in their newsrooms for a 32-week, on-the-job training program. CHUM says the program is "designed to bridge the gap between the skills possessed by community college radio-TV graduates, and the actual requirements of broadcasting station newsrooms."

The CCNS holds the responsibility of administering the actual training program, and hopes to place the trainees in Contemporary News stations after completion. The participating CHUM group newsrooms are: CHUM Toronto, CKPT Peterborough, CFRA Ottawa, CJCH Halifax (radio only), CKVR-TV Barrie and CKCW-TV Moncton.

(Eugene Carl of radio station CFOS in Owen Sound has spent many hours researching the whys and wherefores of country music, both U.S. and Canadian. His look into this market which has never been properly exploited resulted in enough material for a one hour documentary which was aired over CFOS during Carl's weekly two hour country show heard each Sunday evening from 8 to 10PM. Carl's show is heavily Canadian flavoured with more than 40% of his music made up by various Canadian talent. He also hosts a middle of the road airshift from 2 to 6PM Monday through Saturday. Part of his Country Special, an interview with RCA recording artists, the Mercey Brothers, follows, Ed.)

Ray, were you and your brothers exposed to Country Music as kids?

Yes we were. Our father played guitar and sang at dances around the country and mother played a little violin. We were really brought up on Country Music. Country Music really influenced us.

Ray, should Country artists be good businessmen as well as excellent performers?

Not only are we performing but we're booking ourselves. We feel that it is to our benefit because it is more profitable and you can plan your career more. We're also into publishing and recording. We are currently building an eight track recording studio in Elmira.

Ray, is there a difference between Canadian Country Music and the Country Music that's coming out of Nashville?

Yes there is a difference. Nashville really has it's own Sound. There are people who are trying to duplicate it here and they're coming pretty close but actually you don't have to really duplicate it because variety is the spice of life. Canadian Country Music as well as the Nashville sound are both good.

Do you find it different recording someone else's material as opposed to your own, Ray? You can record your own material for a while and sometimes it starts to sound all the same. It's good to do someone else's material occasionally.

Ray, have any singers influenced your career? Probably brother acts like the Everly Brothers

and the Wilburn Brothers, when we first started. When the Beatles came out, we used some of their material because in order to work clubs successfully during that period, We could not sing just Country Music. We've alway's enjoyed the singing style of the Everly Brothers because of their close harmony. We have all liked individual performers as well as groups. Larry liked Marty Robbins, and I was a fan of Don Gibson and Waylon Jennings. Right now I like Mac Davis. I think your likes and dislikes change over the years. It's good to like a variety of artists. Some artists tend to be influenced by one performer and I think that's bad because you begin to sound too much like somebody else.

Larry, what have been the Mercey Brothers biggest hits to date?

There's different ones which have done well for us. Uncle Tom actually got us known the best I think and Hello Mom was real good for us.

Larry, have the Mercey Brothers recorded many of their own compositions? Quite a few on our first album in the earlier days. We wrote six songs on our first album. I have personally written "My Song For You" and "The Day of Love".

Larry, was the first part of your career frustrating?

You always have your ups and downs I think; that goes for any business really. But

I remember, in the early part of our career, we went down to Nashville to do a record and we paid for the session down there ourselves. We had Charlie McCoy and other fantastic musicians on the session. We recorded Uncle Tom and Whistle On the River as well as the two B sides of the records. We went around down there for a couple of days knocking on doors to see if we could get somebody to listen to our records and golly you couldn't get your foot in the door. Well, we came back to Canada and we were depressed. We had spent over \$1,000 and we didn't know if we were ever going to get a record out. After we got back to Canada, we were playing in Kingston, and we played the records for a disc jockey there and he liked them and he called up a friend at Columbia Records and an appointment was set up. The secret of the whole thing is that you have to keep plugging away.

Larry, what is the best way to get in the business as an entertainer? It generally starts out as a hobby, that's how we started out anyway. A friend of yours gets a guitar and you fool around and learn some songs and then you meet someone who plays the drums. It starts out as a basic little hobby group. Some go on and some don't. But the ones who have the desire to go into show business will find a way.

Do all three of you write, and, whom is your favorite writer?

We all pretty well write ourselves, and, one of my favorite writers would have to be Tom T. Hall.

Lloyd, does the group spend much time on the road?

We used to spend close to 52 weeks of the year on the road working clubs, however, last year we were on the road only about 17 weeks. The rest of the time we were involved with television and recording. We've been pretty lucky as far as being home with our families.

Lloyd, do you and your brothers do much session work individually or as a group? A few times individually, but mostly as a group. We are producing people now, and since all three of us are musicians we can play on the session.

Lloyd, have the Mercey Brothers ever performed outside of Canada? We were over to England last year, and, that was about as far out of Canada that we've been. I would very much enjoy performing overseas again.

Lloyd, do you think more young people are identifying with Country Music today because of its simplicity?

That could be part of it and Country Music is sort of a telling about the times isn't it? Folk Music and Country Music I think are very closely associated. They tell a story about something. I think people are now more lyric conscious then maybe a few years ago.

Lloyd, from a musical viewpoint, what are your future ambitions? I don't think it's wanting to make a lot of money. I think everyone in the music busi-

ness wants recognition. To be known and to be liked is part of being successful.

COUNTRY FM RADIO COMES TO S. ONTARIO

A new giant country sound is booming through these days on FM tuners in Southern Ontario. The radio station is CHYM-FM, which recently upped its power to 50,000 watts and completed final programming adjustments to mark the changeover from "wall-to-wall background MOR" to modern country music.

The radio station is now in the process of divorcing itself from its AM sister, CHYM. A request for new call letters is now in the hands of the CRTC, and separate sales and programming departments have already been established.

CHYM-FM thus becomes the only FMer in the Toronto-Hamilton-London-Kitchener belt to program country as the primary format. Management claims the format switch has already reaped substantial rewards, namely an audience climb of over 1000% in the first year of implementation.

CHYM-FM has several other unique features in its operation, according to general manager John Larke. The station has the largest automation unit in Canada, which is so sophisticated that operations manager Keith Sterling can computer program the entire broadcast day in one sitting. The only live programs heard are the major news and sportscasts of the day, and a limited amount of morning and late evening programming. The news operation is moving toward a semisplit operation which would give a different news treatment on the FM side. The auto-

mation being used incorporates time and temperature checks throughout the daily programming, and these checks are dropped in automatically.

With the tremendous recent acceptance of country music, and the growing number of FM receivers, with their superior sound quality, CHYM-FM feels their audience and revenues will show sharp increases over the next few years.

The station is carried on a number of cable TV systems in Southern Ontario, and with the increased power, now puts a good signal out: as far east as Toronto and even Pickering; as far north as Collingwood and Owen Sound; as far west as London and farther; and as far south as Lake Ontario, including Hamilton, St. Catharines and Niagara Falls.

The "heart" of the service area is seen as Kitchener-Waterloo-Guelph-Cambridge-Stratford-Woodstock-Brampton-Brantford. The station is currently laying heavy promotion on the theme of "20 hours daily of contemporary country sounds", mentioning that it stars the likes of Anne Murray, Glen Campbell, Johnny Cash, Charlie Pride, Jerry Reed and also runs special country features from time to time.

Their last trip into Toronto was less than three months ago when they played the Riverboat - and may be they were just too soon in returning. Those who were there however, enjoyed the group which offered a variety of instruments, some strange - recorder, flute and clarinet, along with a dulicmer and organ. Not strange in the sense of talent but just a strange collection of instruments that would attract a hard-bitten rock and roll fan - as most Torontonians are.

What the String Band did offer was original material, spiced with that subtle British delivery that makes everything sound so unpolished yet professional. Vocally, we've seen better, but they do communicate. It must be disappointing playing to a dismal looking house but the incredible was accomplished they had the audience up in the aisles and doing what most Toronto audiences rarely do - participate in the proceedings which must have made up for the empty seats staring at them.

One of the most successful releases to come out of the Tamarac camp was "My Girl Sloopy", an early sixties hit by Little Caesar and the Consuls, which launched the Sloopy sound which swept the world.

Recording in Canada in the sixties wasn't easy. The studio equipment available to the few active Canadian producers was barely adequate to compete with the equipment




available to American producers. In spite of the technical disadvantages of recording in Canada at that time, much of the product that did come out was of international calibre.

Throughout the years, Tamarac has been totally Canadian. Every production by the firm to date has qualified as domestic programming material under the CRTC regulations.

In spite of a hectic production schedule, Klees has, throughout the years, maintained a variety of interests. Among them are MusicAd&Art, an art firm specializing in the music industry. MusicAd&Art has been responsible for the design of the Juno Award and the MAPL logo. Stan Klees Ltd. has acted as consultant and co-ordinator for the Communications meetings as well as the Annual Juno Awards Presentations.

To commemorate ten years in the business, Tamarac this week released the latest single and album product from Cycle, both entitled "Magic Music". The group has established itself in Canada with a series of singles successes including "Wait For The Miracle" and "Groovy Things". To tie in with the single and album release, the group is appearing this week at Granny's in Toronto. Both single and album were pro-



duced by group leader, Paul Clinch, who has worked with Klees for seven years.

Ten years may not be a long time, but in terms of independent Canadian production, it is an accomplishment, if not a first.

CHUM-FM TORONTO ADDS MORE JAZZ

Progressive rock station CHUM-FM has recently instituted a policy of airing more jazz records, and early indications are that the added jazz flavour is being accepted by the Toronto audience. The announcement came in a press release from station manager Bob Laine.

A new section has been added to the CHUM-FM playlist entitled "Recommended Jazz Albums", consisting of 22 albums in its first week. Laine said "this list is not necessarily sales exposure in the same manner our top LP section is done, but rather an expansion of our list, due to acceptance and interest in jazz in this city." The jazz section mixes some of the top sellers of the week with older product getting concentrated airplay that week.


The balance of the CHUM-FM playlist consists this week of forty-five songs under "Significant Singles", nineteen "New LPs" and sixty "Top LPs: Current Section" listings.

Roger's record is an automatic FMer, but I know most AM rock formats could handle it if they audition seriously ('Rog' is singer with The Who).

Hit Re-cap: What can I say? Elton and Dobie are going steady (up the charts). May 5th - Elton "Daniel" - 14* BB, 20* CB, 22*RW, 36* RPM; May 5th - Dobie "Drift Away" - 6*BB, 10*CB, 9*RW, 10RPM. Thanks to all the believers in "Drift Away".



Richard Bonynge's direction of the London Symphony Orchestra and the Ambrosian Opera Chorus is masterful and shows him to be the top opera conductor of the day. A truly great release in every way.













MOZART "Haffner" Serenade KV 250 Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Karl Bohm DGG 2530 290

The "Haffner" is the seventh of Mozart's dozen works titled "Serenade" and it is one of the most extended, containing in the midst of its eight movements a miniature Violin Concerto, the solo part here performed by Thomas Brandis. The Berlin Philharmonic under Karl Bohm give the work its full measure of substance and charm. The same conductor and orchestra have previously recorded Mozart's Serenades nos. 6, 9 and 10 so perhaps a complete series is planned.

SCHUBERT Sonata in C Minor, D.958 Four Impromptus, D.899

Alfred Brendel - Pianist PHILIPS 655 415

The crowning achievement among Schubert's vast output of Piano Sonatas is the group of three Sonatas which he composed for dedication to Hummel. This disc completes the three gargantuan works as performed by Alfred Brendel. The Sonata in A is contained on Philips 6500 284 while the B b sonata shares Philips 6500 285 with the great "Wanderer" Fantasia. The C minor Sonata here recorded is the most brilliant and extrovert of the three works. Side two of the disc contains the Four Impromptus Opus 90 which are Schubert's most popular keyboard works. It is to be hoped that Brendel will continue with other major works by Schubert.

TEBALDI IN CONCERT

Renata Tebaldi - Soprano; Richard Bonynge - Pianist LONDON OS 26303

It is rare that we get the opportunity to hear Italian Opera stars in recordings where the voice is not blanketed by orchestral accompaniment. This lovely recital consists of songs for voice and pianoforte written mainly in the 19th century in Italian by such composers as Donizetti, Tosti, Gluck, Bellini and Puccini. The programme was selected by Richard Bonynge and his accompaniments are a joy. Tebaldi fans will be interested to hear this subtle and intimate example of her artistry.

EDGARD VARESE

The Contemporary Chamber Ensemble directed by Arthur Weisberg NONESUCH H-71269

French born avant-garde composer Edgard Varese spent the latter part of his life in the United States where he died in 1965. The four works presented on this disc which is manufactured and distributed in Canada by WEA Music of Canada Ltd. are an excellent and inexpensive introduction to his work. "Integrales" and "Octandre" are purely instrumental, calling for standard wind, brass and percussion instruments. "Offrandes" consists of two songs for Soprano, piccolo, flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, horn, trumpet, trombone, harp, strings and percussion. The final selection, composed in 1934, is "Ecuatorial" for bass voice, 4 trumpets, 4 trombones, piano, organ, 2 Ondes Martenot, and 5 percussion. The clear, authoritative performances are enhanced by the fine Dolby-system recording.

The label has flown in industry and press representatives to witness the concerts, among them Walt Grealis, RPM's publisher.

The Los Angeles concerts come after the success Columbia met with their "Keyboard Colossus" concerts at Radio City Music Hall, New York and the David Bromberg-Loudon Wainright concert at Philharmonic Hall.

U.S. AND EUROPEAN RELEASE FOR LEROY

"Touch of Magic" the James Leroy single debut on GRT, will be released in both Europe and the United States this month. The European release will occur on the MAM label, home of Gilbert O'Sullivan, Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck. In the United States, the single will appear on the New York-based Janus Records label.

"Touch of Magic" gained top ten status in many Canadian markets and is now being followed-up in Canada by "You Look Good in Denim". Both tracks will be included in Leroy's first album for GRT, now being produced at Toronto's Manta Sound by Adam Mitchell. Album release is set for mid-May.

Hodges was responsible for the design of the Smile logo, which won a "Standard of Excellence Award" from the Printing Industries of America. He also designed the promotion kits for the two debut Smile recording acts. Tony Kosinec and Alabama.

With no recorded product available, Bonnie LeClair, recently signed to WEA Music of Canada, Ltd., is maintaining a hectic schedule of television guest shots and personal appearances. At the end of April, Miss LeClair was in Toronto taping four of her own compositions for inclusion in Peter Gzowski's CBC Radio program, "This Country in the Morning". June 1st, Miss LeClair is again in Toronto taping a guest spot on the Tommy Hunter TVer. A July taping is scheduled for "Country Roads", the summer replacement for the Hunter show.

On the live performance front, Miss LeClair is slated for a May 19th appearance at Charlottetown's Confederation Centre for a Retarded Children's Association benefit. In addition, the singer-songwriter will be performing throughout Prince Edward Island as part of a special Centennial celebration package. 



FM policy a bonus for on-air staff.

There are several interesting things in the CRTC's recent "Proposals for an FM policy" that point to 1974 being a very good year for announcers but a very bad year for program directors. To capsulize the situation, there will be an acute shortage of good announcers; PD's will have to pay more to get qualified jocks and will have to sharply increase the salaries of their present staffers to hold them at the station; and experienced announcers will find they are being hit with a flood of golden job offers.

For the last few years in Canada, the employment situation for on-air staff hasn't been very good. There haven't been great numbers of radio stations going on the air . . . the CRTC was preoccupied with establishing itself, and with a Canadian TV policy. You could count the number of new radio stations on one hand, and the increase in announcing jobs yearly ran about one per cent, while other industries showed increases of up to five times that annual rate.

Then along came the Canadian Radio-Television Commission with its FM policy. Though it is now in the "proposal and discussion" stage, the CRTC obviously wants simulcasting to end and new, innovative programming to be introduced on FM. There are 80 FM stations in Canada, and over half of them do substantial simulcasting. When this practice is banned by the CRTC (which appears very likely) there will immediately be a need for (on the average) three additional announcers at each station doing substantial simulcasting.

There is already an acute shortage of on-air

talent in Canada, and the FM policy will immediately make the situation much more serious. Generally, salaries in radio have not kept pace with those in Canadian industry generally, and it has been hard to attract talented people to radio (such as those with university training). So on-air staffs at the smaller stations are nearly all composed of

young, under-25 people who will work "relatively cheaply". The larger stations, for their staff, simply entice announcers from the smaller operations.

However, even "raiding" doesn't completely fill the gap because many young, upcoming announcers are all tuned in to "Drake Top 40" and are often pitifully unaware how to present an adult-oriented program. Yet, the CRTC wants professional, adult announcers to go on the FM airwaves. Quote: "The Commission will expect on-air personnel dealing with music programming to demonstrate a high level of professional knowledge with regard to the subject matter of music." Where will they come from? There is an acute shortage of this type of specialized onair guy and the money will have to be increased drastically if the station wishes to employ such a man.

Who is going to suffer most? The small stations. Their staffs will be raided as never before to fill the demand created by the new programming on 80 Canadian FM stations.

Already, some stations in small markets (CKEC New Glasgow is one) are fighting back by giving their jocks a five-day week. But then of course there is the extra cost of a couple of swing shift men to make up the lost airtime.

But look at the new emphasis on quality of the on-air staff. The CRTC had accolades for announcers as they, in the FM proposals, wrote: "Hosting a music program is an exacting profession that demands competence and a developed personal taste and knowledge. The Commission is persuaded that such professionalism exists and is determined to encourage it to flourish."

What a contrast to the old idea of radio management that "we can replace any jock at a moment's notice and our sound will be unchanged". There will be a general upgrading of on-air talent, and salaries will soar as the quality of the station's announcers comes under detailed CRTC scrutiny.

Another thing that will go with the "new age of FM" will be an increase in time needed to prepare your show. Instead of just random music, the CRTC wants FM stations to use structured, prepared programs that have a definite theme running through them. So the announcer will probably have to spend three hours in preparation for his three-hour airshift.

All in all, these developments point to big increases in station spending on announcers. This will make 1974 one of the best years in the last few decades in terms of new opportunities for on-air people both in creativity and in salary.

CJRT SAVED, ONTARIO IMPOSES CONDITIONS

The FM station of Toronto's Ryerson Polytechnical Institute, CJRT, last week received word that Ontario was proposing a \$75,000 grant to keep it on the air, but with certain conditions attached. Though some Ryerson officials expressed reservations over the conditions, no one else seems likely to put up the money, and the officials will likely be forced to swallow their pride.

The news came in an announcement from Jack McNie, Minister of Colleges and Universities. McNie offered Ryerson the grant under condition that his ministry participate in any discussions of the station's future, and that his department have access to the station's financial accounts. McNie said the grant would carry the FM station for about six months and would give Ontario time to

assess the future of CJRT in the context of a larger review now under way of all educational broadcasting.

John Twomey, CIRT station manager, expressed concern about some of the conditions to be imposed, but indicated that he hoped to resolve the problems in his discussions with Ontario. Twomey was not worried so much about provincial control of CIRT, which is prohibited by the Broadcast Act, because the present administration will be retained (for the present at least). But Twomey expressed concern over the requirement to retain all programming unchanged if CJRT wants the money. "We make certain programming adjustments in summer," Twomey said. "Are these to be prohibited? What if I wanted to expand my news programming? Am I bound to the present limits?" CIRT cont'd on 20

ACTRA AWARDS: SWEEP FOR CBC RADIO PEOPLE

The annual awards of the Canadian radio-TV performers' union, ACTRA, were announced last week and five out of seven of them were for achievements on CBC radio. Television performers were conspicuous by their absence.

The only TV star to get acknowledgment from ACTRA was Anne Murray, who was named the top variety performer of 1972. The only other award that didn't involve CBC radio was the Earl Greye Award, which goes to the best dramatic actor of the year. Gordon Pinsent won that citation for his film the Rowdyman. (Earl Greye, Canadian Shakespeare pioneer, was on hand to present his namesake award.)

Twomey indicated the Ryerson-Ontario discussions would most likely lead to written acceptance of the offer of aid. "We're happy to be getting the money. The government wants to make sure Ryerson doesn't use it for other purposes, and has set up conditions. But the CRTC, the public and the Ontario government all want us to stay on the air and that's of course what we want too."

None of the money allocated can be used for a new antenna, which CJRT needs because of the high-rises now blocking its short on-campus tower. However, there is a possibility that money may be found from another source in the broadcasting business, to accommodate the Ryerson FMer on the new Metro Centre antenna being built for the other Toronto FM outlets.

The other crisis that CIRT must overcome is the fact that its licence expires on March 31, 1974 and will not be renewed by the CRTC in its present form. The station has a vague connection with the provincial government under its present ill-defined setup that was created long before the CRTC was. The federal government wants a "duly constituted authority" that will clearly show CIRT's independence. The Ontario Educational Communications Authority, though funded by Ontario, is nominally independent of the provincial government and thus can hold a broadcast licence (CICA-TV, channel 19 in Toronto). OECA is run by a board which is cabinet-appointed but purports to have only a handful of government representatives among the other members, who are from the general public sector. It seems possible that CJRT may eventually end up as part of OECA, and it appears as if the CRTC could approve this transfer under law.

At RPM's press time, CJRT had not yet accepted in writing the offer made by Mr. McNie. The station has enough money under present arrangements to stay on the air until September first.

Peter Gzowski picked up the ACTRA statuette for best public affairs broadcaster. Some people attending felt that Alex Frame (the producer of Gzowski's nine-to-noon CBC radio show "This Country in the Morning") should have shared in the honours, since Frame represents the creative force behind the scenes.

This year's John Drainie Award was given to Rupert Caplan, a veteran Montreal radio producer. The award is named after the late actor and goes to a person making distinguished contribution to broadcasting. The winner is picked by previous recipients, which include Lister Sinclair of the CBC, Harry Boyle of the CRTC, writer W.O. Mitchell and director Andrew Allan.

ACTRA's Gordon Sinclair Award went to CBC Radio's Max Ferguson. It honours outspoken opinion and integrity in broadcasting. The other two awards, both for writing excellence, went to Neil Copeland in the documentary class and Len Peterson in the drama class. Copeland wrote "The Titanic, Six Decades of Controversy" and Peterson was the author of "Trouble With Giants", about the Baltic peoples. Both were CBC radio programs.

The Programmers TRIBAL DRUM

Some interesting comments from programmers coming in these days following last month's release of the FM policy proposals. "What the hell does the CRTC want, for every radio station to sound like the CBC?" was the reaction of one programmer who wanted to remain anonymous. Several others have said that, whether the CRTC likes it or not, music is the main constituent of FM programming. Spoken word . . . okay if it is kept short and can go in with the music. But it it becomes a huge 4-hour block, goodbye audience! I can

understand why these radio people want their names kept out . . . they are paranoid of the CRTC. But the CRTC has said that now is the discussion time on the proposals (which affect both AM and FM). So do your thing . . . write in those letters (the CRTC won't read them unless you sign your name). If you don't complain to Juneau, when the summer's over you could be staring a bunch of ridiculous rules in the face, and you won't be able to change them because the time has passed. If you want to make some comments but would still like anonymity, send them to The Programmers at RPM, and we won't print your name. But one way or the other, get going! Summer is here, and when it is over over we are going to have a whole new set of rules and regulations in the radio industry. Summer is a time of hassles for radio people, vacations, shift changes and heavy heavy logs, but don't let this interfere with your RIGHT OF PROTEST over what the CRTC is about to impose.

Some interesting trends in the March BBM just out. The "format 40" stations in a couple of markets are continuing to expand their audiences. CKGM is first in Montreal weekly circulation and CKOC the same in Hamilton. These two stations first passed their MOR rivals in the January BBM, so it's good to see that it wasn't just a fluke. Of course, in listeners per quarter hour (daytime, Monday to Friday) the traditional MOR's (CJAD Montreal and CHML Hamilton) beat out the rockers. The MOR audience is smaller, but leaves the dial at the station for longer periods. The rock audience tunes in and out so that, even though there are more rock fans than MOR, at a certain point in time the MOR's usually have more people tuned than the Top 40 operations. However, "average quarter hour" counts are improving bit by bit for the rock stations, as the audience for contemporary music spreads into older age groups. In contrast, the huge mass of adults who like traditional MOR is not growing at the same rate.

Toronto's CBL-FM is into the "marathon broadcast" business. Last month they featured 13 hours of the BBC's "The Beatles Story" on Saturday afternoon. And over Easter they did the same with 12 episodes of the BBC Radio program "Born To Be King" and added music appropriate to the Easter weekend.

Congrats to CHUB Nanaimo on getting the CRTC nod last week. The 10,000 watt radio station will expand into Parksville-Qualicum Beach by way of a 1000 watt rebroadcaster which will carry the CHUB signal on 1370 KHz.

Marathon country artist Honey West recently did the deejay promotion thing for her latest release "The Locket". Visited VOCM's Johnny Murphy and CKCM's Larry Steacey as well as covering several other markets. A CBC-TV taping of "Country Time" in Halifax brought her out east.

With a conservative administration and FCC, sex talk have now virtually vanished in the States. KGBS Los Angeles cancelled the "Feminine Forum" hosted by Bill Ballance. In its place is "The Bill Balance Show" which took as its subject the rising price of meat. The KGBS move was the first of nearly one hundred such cancellations.

CFTR Toronto into some interesting programming on the Sunday night (Monday morning) program called "Category Ten". It runs from midnight to 2 AM and features just what the name would imply, Arts Letters & Sciences programming (Cat. 10 under CRTC rules), Recent edition featured Randy Newman's "Sail Away" album (right after his Massey Hall concert) and Horn's new Special Records LP "On The People's Side". (The Horn record is surprisingly good as progressive rock/jazz programming . . . make sure GRT gets you a copy.) "Category Ten" runs just before Monday morning sign-off (the only day CFTR does it) and for the last fifteen minutes featured relaxing sounds of spring from the Environments series. And that's something you don't hear often on AM radio! Another recent show was built around a local meeting to be held on the James Bay Power Project. Keith Elshaw, CFTR's MD built a sound portrait of the area using narration and sound inserts to tell the story of the Indian and his ecological relation to the area, and how the white man's plans will disrupt this balance.

Jim Thompson has moved from CKSO Sudbury into the music director's chair at CHOW Welland. Thompson also does a 1-6:30 PM airshift. The other music programmer is the 6:30-midnight rock jock, Norman B. Balance of on-air staff consists of PD Jay Jackson, Gerry Clifford and Dave Forrester.

Steve Shannon has left CJME Regina and will use his real name of Frank Kearney in a return to old St. John's, Nfld. stamping grounds. Kearney (cousin of Capitol artist Chris Kearney) will be doing VOCM jock work.

CKLW contest: "CKLW Beefs It Up". Five freezers full of beef to be given away. Phone in and give the exact lock combination to win; CKLW jocks give clues hourly.

Kirk Sisson featured the Canadian blues record just out on his CKRD—FM progressive rock segment in Red Deer. This is the first CanCon LP in the blues category . . . it is the London release "Walter Shakey Horton With Hot Cottage" and telephone response was heavily in favour. Sisson's show is called "Something In The Air".

syndicate it to individual stations,





Two new acts that have never been heard before on Top 40 radio blasted their way onto charts across the country this week. One is a crossover from country and one a crossover from R&B. The artists are Jud Strunk, with "Daisy A Day" and Sylvia, with "Pillow Talk".

Jud Strunk was charted at CJBK, CHED, CJME and CKXL this week, joining the previous chart numbers at CKLG, CKLW, CFGO, CKOC and CKRC (where it jumped from 4 to 2 this week). Meantime, Sylvia was given chart numbers this week by CKOC, CKGM, CJME and CKRC. These stations join previous Sylvia charts from CFGO and CKLW. To show just how hot Sylvia is this week, check the "New On Playlists - Principal Markets" and you'll find five more majors who jumped on the record this week to point to a total smash for the sexy R&B disc.

Paul McCartney's disc was charted at CKRC, CFRW and CKLW this week, after CJME, CHUM, CKOC and CKLG had given it berths. Many playlists too. And the Guess Who look pretty good with CKOC and CFRW adding "Orly" this week. Previous charting stations were CKRC, CJCH, CKXL, CJBK, CHED and CHUM.

Flying Circus were charted by CFRW and CKGM this week after CKOC and CHUM did so in previous weeks. The group also has playlistings from CJBK, CJME, CKLG, CFCF, CKY, CHLO and CKCK. Meantime the Rolling Stones' new oldie hit CFGO and CKRC charts to accompany CKOC from last week.

Clint Holmes continues a slow process of spreading to charts with CFGO this week. CHUM, CKOC, CKLW and CKLG charted him in earlier weeks and he also has a big pile of playlistings. This magically beautiful record has fantastic production that lays down track over track in a way that is clear and true. It sounds a bit "cluttered" the first time you hear it because there is so much happening but is complex enough to become superinteresting and stand up to repeated play. Even the lyrics seem hard to understand the first time but then it all becomes clear. The Doobie Brothers are one of today's hottest sellers of albums and this single will be top ten. This week CHED, CKLW, CKXL and CFGO added it to playlists, following CKOM who playlisted it last week. And CKLG put it onto the chart this week.

Sylvia's "Pillow Talk" erupted onto charts this week (see "New On Charts") but also added five majors on the playlist side. They were CJBK, CHED, CKCK, CKXL and CHAM. Going all the way, it seems.

A couple of Canadian records being accepted at the big stations. They are Bob Ruzicka, added to CHED and CKLW this week, and MCA reports three other big-city format-40 operations have added it too, which would indicate unusually quick response for Ruzicka's disc "Lately Love The Laughter Don't Come Easy".

And Paul Anka's new "My Girl" side hit the air this week at CKGM and CFGO.
