

MIDEM spawns Canadian business

MIDEM is over for another year and the reports from those participating has been encouraging. Those who didn't participate and who are holding the Government responsible are apparently preparing to do battle.

For those who were there it was a busy scheduling of time which centred around the Government (Canada) booth flying the banner MUSICAL CANADA. Gil DesBecquets, Trade Publicity Officer of Industry, Trade and Commerce, reports that much business was done over the few days of MIDEM which makes next year's event high on the list of Government approved out-of-country events.

Recent statistics indicate that the Canadian music industry has experienced phenomenal growth over the past couple of years. Canada is now rated sixth among record producing countries - in terms of production value and per capita sales and, if the resultant flurry of business at MIDEM is an indication, the door is even wider for Canada to become a top contender on the world record scene.

Finalizing of deals and strong communication with other countries shaped up as follows:

Ross Reynolds, president GRT (Canada), reports that he has contracted with Victor Musical Industries of Japan and Festival of MIDEM continued on page 6

COLUMBIA'S RICE LAUNCHES "SOUNDS OF CANADA '74"

Julian Rice, ad and promo chief of Columbia Records has mapped out a hefty promotion campaign introducing never-before-used methods of marketing album product. The promotion will centre around the label's adopted theme, "Sounds of Canada '74".

A good portion of the ad support will concentrate on newly released album product by Tom Middleton/"It Wouldn't Have Made Any Difference" (ES 90261), Patsy Gallant/"Power" (ES 90246), Danny McBride/"Morningside" (KE 32576) and Ptarmigan (ES 90257). Large artist photos of the above have now been distributed to retailers across Canada. The albums have been enclosed in colourful press kits (for distribution to radio and the press).

Rice has also set up multi-product trade and consumer advertising covering the months of March and April as well as taggable multi-product radio spots for field distribution. These spots will be run locally (through label's branch offices) with appropriate account tie-ins. Customized retail ad layouts are also being made available for field distribution.

AXE SETS HEAVY SCHEDULE OF RELEASES

Axe Records has indicated a heavy concentration on single releases, which they hope will supply company to the successful Gary & Dave single, "I Fell In Love With You Sometime". The deck is charted this week at CHUM at No. 29, with playlist additions at CFTR and CKGH. Also play-listing the single are CFUN Vancouver, CJME Regina, CFRW Winnipeg, CHAM Hamilton, CKPT Peterboro, CFGO Ottawa, CFRA Ottawa and chart berths at CKXL Calgary (12), CKCK Regina (19), CKOM Saskatoon (11), CKLC Kingston (17), CKWS Kingston (8), CJBK London (20), CKGM Montreal (24), CJCH Halifax (23), CJMS Montreal (15), VOXM St. John's (22), CJON St. John's (25). There has also been heavy airplay with "pop" stations.

Newest addition to Axe, Steel River, are off with a single this week, "Just Remember". Axe, in conjunction with London Records, are mapping out a national campaign to get this group back to the charts after several months absence.

Thundermug have a U.S. release on Epic entitled "Orbit". A heavy promotion campaign is apparently being launched behind the group, who are currently in New York City putting the finishing touches to a new album.

Axe President Greg Hambleton is also in New York with Jay Telfer mixing the latter's new album, "Time Has Tied Me". The album release has been set to coincide with Telfer's opening at Egerton's in Toronto.

Doug Goodeves, newly signed to Axe will enter the singles race shortly with "Back In The City Again".

ing ideas from Rice is a four-page full tab multi-product four colour supplement flying the banner The Holiday Record Sale Of The Year. A half-million copies of the colourful supplement will be printed up for a weekend edition of the Toronto Star (test market) with an over-run to be made available to retailers. The supplement will also be supplied to interested retailers, using their store name and their own discount prices. Should the promotion be successful in the Toronto market, it is expected to become national in scope. One of the first retailers to take advantage of the product supplement will be Music World who will open their new store in downtown Toronto early in April.

Part of the new promotion thrust by Columbia will be a concentration on youth-oriented television shows. Spots have already been filmed for "Music Shoppe" (CBC-TV), "Midnite Special" and "In Concert". These tags will focus on Canadian product as well as that from Dylan, Chicago and other internationally-known Columbia and Epic artists.

KUSHMIER BOWS KANGI LABEL

Hank Kushmier enters the Canadian wax race with two single releases on his newly formed KANGI label.

Jeff Addams is off with a rhythm and blues offering, "Where Did The Good Times Go" an Arons & Ackley penning with production duties by Chuck Gibson. The session was produced at Toronto's Thunder Sound with Keith Jollimore being featured on the sax. Gibson and Reg Wilkins gave Ackley a hand at the arranging. Publishing is through Gateau/Kangi Music-CAPAC.

Kushmier has also moved into the contemporary rock scene with a single, "Isn't It Amazing" by Art Braun, a native of Niagara Falls. Producer for this session also done at Thunder was Irving Spice of New York City. A country session featuring twenty one year old new discovery Tim Daniels, is now being readied.

National distribution is being set up by Pindoff Record Sales who will themselves look after the Ontario and Quebec markets. Kushmier and Kris Pindoff firmed the distrib deal with the latter tie-ing in the rest of the country with existing distributors.

Kushmier comes to the business after twenty years as a commercial pilot. Part of this time was spent servicing the DEW Line in Northern Canada. It was almost twenty years ago when he was involved in a mercy flight with a pregnant native woman.

The baby was delivered aboard and the Eskimo child was named IGNAK. Kushmier reversed the letters and, now bows his label, KANGI which also utilizes the first initial of the names of his five children. It's interesting to note that IGNAK has graduated from Carleton University and is considered a potential leader of his people.

Kushmier's company, of which he is sole owner, is based in Toronto.

GOOD NOISE STRETCHING FOR NAT'L RECOGNITION

The Montreal-based Good Noise label distributed by Polydor, is suffering from growing pains which could create a solid national image for their artists. Initial release group was Man Made and their single "Country Company" (GN 1001). With several stations showing an interest in the deck, Bill Horan, Good Noise promo, has reserved the single bolstered by telephone calls to programmers coast to coast. The designated "B" side, "Keep On Moving", a rocker, was picked up by Quebec stations and quickly made it to No. 1 at CKLM Montreal. Listener reaction to the group has been so intense, the station will go with the "Country" side shortly. Man Made's album, has now been released in Belgium/Dureco, Australia/Good Thyme, and in Japan/Nippon. As well the album is receiving airplay on the BBC in London, Radio Luxembourg, Japan and the Far East Network.

New album product will include the label's salute to the big bands. The set, "The Hotel Orchestra" (GN 5003) is being previewed through special singles which have been mailed to Polydor salesmen, retail stores and radio stations across Canada. Horan reports good initial response from MOR programmers.

Also on tap is an album from Tim Ryan, "The Runner" (GN 5002). A native of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, singer/songwriter Ryan represented Canada last year at the Tokyo Song Festival with "Sweet December". He also picked up two Yamaha Canada song-writing Awards in Ottawa, the latter part of the year, for "Great Northern Road". Both compositions are included on the album.

The "December" cut was culled as a single and is being released in Japanese, French, Spanish and German versions. The Ryan version is expected to be released in Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, Australia, New Zealand and England. Unfortunately Canadian programmers have turned "thumbs down" on the single.

STATLER BROTHERS MAKE RARE CANADIAN TOUR

It's been a long time between visits by the popular Mercury recording unit, The Statler Brothers, and many hits since they last appeared in Toronto with Johnny Cash.

Polydor's ad and promo rep, Richard Glanville-Brown, reveals the following Canadian dates for the popular country/gospel act: Centennial Concert Hall/Winnipeg (Feb. 28), Centre Of The Arts/Regina (Mar. 1), Centennial Auditorium/Saskatoon (2), Jubilee Auditorium/Calgary (3), Jubilee Auditorium/Edmonton (5) and the Victoria Arena (9).

Timing for the tour couldn't be better what with their current country chart success on "Whatever Happened to Randolph Scott", in at No. 33 on the RPM Country Playlist this week.

Their Upper Canada dates were Toronto's Massey Hall Feb. 15 and Hamilton Place, Feb. 16.

CBC UNDER ATTACK AT CRTC LICENSE RENEWAL HEARING

Monday, Feb. 18, marked the first day of the CRTC hearings on the renewal of the CBC's licenses and the people's watchdogs were really howling this time around. Many people felt sorry for the poor conglomerate with the constant barrage of criticism that seems to hound it. But, when something is designed to perform such an important function as the CBC was, and when the monster is gobbling up as many tax dollars as it does (120 million worth), criticism is not only understandable but also necessary. In private enterprise, competition helps keep things efficient but in government, public pressure is the tool. The big critic that had been making all the waves came in the form of the Committee on Television, a voluntary group of seven members involved in the arts and media. The attack on the CBC was functional in that the public and the CRTC were forced to stand back a little farther and take a good look at the operation but,

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as it turned out, more critics seemed to be rising against the COT than the CBC.

Jack Miller of the Toronto Star, one such critic, pointed out that the COT, in criticizing the cheap appearance of many CBC productions, "ignored the fact that a lot of the shows are done on the cheap because the CRTC has ordered the CBC to push network expansion, an order that has seen the CBC spend more money on hardware that it would have preferred to put into program budgets." And on the CBC-TV public affairs programs being unadventurous, the COT "ignores the fact that the same man (in charge of CBC-TV public affairs) is head of the English radio network where

OVERDRIVE'S "RIDE" GAINS ACROSS BOARD

The Ontario tour of Bachman-Turner Overdrive has proved to be a convenient vehicle for the pushing of their latest Mercury single, "Let It Ride". The deck has now broken nationally and would appear to be heading for the top of the national chart. Every major market across the country has now playlisted or charted the single with a strong supporting action from the break-out markets. Polydor's Richard Glanville-Brown sees more potential in this single than in their "Blue Collar" deck and is of the opinion that "Ride" will "establish them as a major chart single group".

It had been reported in last week's RPM that the BTO album "II" had sold in excess of 150,000 copies with their first album now topping the 250,000 units sold mark. These are U.S. figures.

public affairs has become so wildly adventurous that he will be in court over the way one of his radio shows responded to a recent court order". Miller also commented on the COT suggestion to place all CBC production and broadcasting facilities under the control of a government department to minimize Ottawa political intimidation, stating that the move would only make the CBC subject to far more political pressure. Eugene Hallman, vice-president for TV public affairs and former president George Davidson seemed to be taking the brunt of the flack from the COT, but Miller pointed out that Davidson has been long gone and Hallman is soon going.

Knowiton Nash, director of CBC-TV information programs made an impressive comeback to COT criticism: "We are accused of having in the National News a vast number of news items taken from the American networks. The fact is, we carry perhaps two minutes or sometimes two and a half minutes on the average of such material every night. The CBC is attacked for being dominated by American programs. That's an almost unbelievable imbecility. Our programming is about 70% Canadian and in the information category it is 95% Canadian. Some say we do too much programming from Toronto and ignore the rest of the country. Again this is simply not true. The CBC is perhaps the most decentralized broadcasting organization in the world. Of all our television production, two thirds is produced in the regions. The CBC is criticized for not giving enough opportunities to Canadian actors or performers or writers or filmmakers. The CBC spends something like \$8 million a year on commentators, actors, and performers. I believe private stations in Canada put together spend well under \$1 million."

Certainly much attention has been drawn to the CBC through these criticisms and certainly the CBC deserves criticism but it is unfortunate the main critics this time around didn't research the matter as well as they might have.



Australia for the handling of the complete GRT label in those two countries and the immediate release of Ian Thomas' album, "Painted Ladies".

John Williams, A&R for Columbia (Canada), has reached agreement for the immediate release of several albums and singles throughout Europe and Japan. Murray McLauchlan's "Day To Day Dust" has been set for release in the UK, Holland and Japan. Bruce Cockburn, another True North artist, will have his "Night Vision" album released in the UK along with McLauchlan's "Hurricane Of Change" single and the Columbia album "Power" by Patsy Gallant. Crowbar, who release on Epic in Canada and the U.S. will have an album and single release in the UK, France, Holland, Germany, Switzerland, Japan and the Scandinavian countries. Danny McBride's "Morningside" set will also be released in the above countries.

Quebec's popular twelve year old Rene Simard will bow the French scene in April. The deal was contracted by Guy Cloutier, president of Karol Music and Norbert Allemmand, manager of several top names on the French music scene.

Jury Krytiuk, president of Morning Music, has reached agreements with some ten firms during the MIDEM meet. In Italy, the Bixio Group will represent Morning Music and Boot Records with the Group's Canadian business being handled by Krytiuk's firm. Krytiuk will also represent Ariston Music, another Italian firm. The South Africa market has tied-in with Morning Music through Patric Van Blerk of the Impact Group of Publishing Companies. A mutual deal has been pacted.

On the UK front, Creole Records and Music will handle the Morning Music/Boot Records record and publishing interest under a new reciprocal agreement. A similar deal was signed with John McDonald of Image Music of Australia and New Zealand.

Mel Shaw of Mel Shaw Productions Ltd., manager and producer of The Stampeders, has made arrangements with publishers in the UK, Germany and Scandinavia for the

release of the group's new material. Shaw also gained much recognition for his group through the showing of the Stampeders' made-for-television film release, shown in Canada over the CBC-TV Network prior to MIDEM. The Stampeders product is already well-known throughout Europe, the UK and Japan. On the last day of MIDEM, Shaw

sold the Stampeders film to the Belgian and Dutch television networks for broadcast in the near future. While in Europe he signed a four year contract with Philips Phonogram Records which guarantees the group a third tour of Europe.

Greg Hambleton of Axe Records, finalized arrangements for the release in Europe of Gary & Dave's "Could You Ever Love Me Again". The deck is to be released in the UK, Germany, Austria, Switzerland and France. A promotion tour to meet the press radio and television has been laid on for March.

Bob Hahn, General Manager of the Music Division, Champlain Productions/Montreal, reports that he placed several copyrights in Germany, Australia and the UK. Meetings had also been arranged in the UK to bring attention to the Canadian rock musical "Hamlet".

Daniel Lazure, of Editions Gamma, firmed agreements with Teldec Schallplatten of Germany and Decca in the UK for the re-

lease in those two countries of an album of the Moonquake group. Their album has just been released in Canada.

Many other business transactions, too numerous to mention, took place and convinced Canada's publishing and recording communities that MIDEM is a worthwhile venture and fully deserving of Government support.

KOSINEC SIGNS SOLO CONTRACT WITH GRT

Tony Kosinec, no stranger to the Canadian charts, has signed a solo recording contract with GRT Canada. The signing was firmed by Kosinec's manager Wayne Thompson of Celebration Music and GRT's President Ross Reynolds - with Kosinec doing the signing.

Kosinec will tape four sides at Manta Sound (Toronto) this month with an initial single release the first part of April. The session will be co-produced by Kosinec and Syd Kessler.

Backup instrumentation will be supplied by Kosinec's group comprised of Peter Alves, percussionist; Kerry Crawford, guitar; and string player Ben Mink.

Kosinec came into national prominence with his "All Things Come From God" single which was released on the Smile label. He also picked up good sales and airplay on his album.

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MONTREAL CREATES MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH FOR COCKBURN

Considered as a major breakthrough for Bruce Cockburn, his Feb. 19 concert at Montreal's Maisonneuve Theatre was completely sold out. The concert was arranged through Roy Cooper (Premier Promotions).

The Cockburn concert was a major coup for the Ottawa area singer -- his first concert in the province of Quebec. The 1450 seat theatre is one of the most up-to-date and intimate theatres in the province, which lent itself nicely to Cockburn's easy going and quiet approach. Appearing as second guitar on the gig was Cockburn's producer Gene Martynec, who also produces Edward Bear. The local press was also sold on Cockburn with the Gazette's Dave Billington comparing the True North artist with Paul Simon.

Bernie Finkelstein, who worked closely with Cooper and Columbia's promo rep, Gil Audi, was impressed with the Montreal acceptance of Cockburn. The house, with ticket prices at \$5.00, \$4.00, and \$3.00 was made up of 50% Quebecois, making Cockburn one of the first Canadian acts to

AUSSIE'S SISTER MEAD DOING IT WITH "PRAYER"

A rock-bible thumping single, "The Lord's Prayer" by Australia's Sister Janet Mead, has taken the North American continent by storm. The A&M deck was tagged "a smash hit" at KMPC Los Angeles after an airing created a switchboard fiasco. Several callers registered complaints, a sure fire sign of a hit, while others wanted to know more about the record. Local retailers couldn't be happier as their cash registers jingled and A&M were convinced of their test marketing success.

A&M's network of promotion people in Canada were quick to set a promo campaign in motion with a rush release of the single, a couple of days after the U.S. release. CKLW brought the single home in their Canada/U.S. market while major and break-out stations across Canada completed the chain of events.

Sister Janet, a former music student, entered an Australian convent at the age of seventeen, continuing her music studios and majoring in piano performance. A chance meeting with the Van Der Sman family led to a five year musical association, with Sister Janet and the family working together on the full circle of music -- Opera through rock. It was through Sister Janet's concern for the youth of Australia that she became involved with the Cathedral Youth Rock Masses which were held in Adelaide last year, drawing upwards of two thousand young people to each Mass.

A Rock Mass for television is now in the making with Sister Janet working in conjunction with the ABC Television Network. The young Nun is also expected to commence a two month overseas tour of colleges and convents. Dates for the European tour are now being set.

boast such an audience. Finkelstein and Cooper are now working on concerts for Quebec City, Trois Rivieres and other major Quebec centres.

Cockburn's tour of the west is also shaping up for "sold out" notices. His Edmonton date (10) has been sold out with a second show now selling briskly. Other dates include: Saskatoon (7), Calgary (14) and five days (19-23) at the Egress Club in Vancouver. This is the first club date for the Vancouver area and Egress owner Buz Wright, predicts that Cockburn will break all house records.

The Montreal success for Cockburn has resulted in Cooper taking a similar approach -- and theatre for an April 12 date for Murray McLachlan.

RICHARD GRESKO READIES CLASSICAL SET FOR GOOD NOISE LABEL

With their finger in the pop, rock and country pie, Good Noise are ready to make overtures to the classical buff. They recently signed classical pianist Richard Gresco and he is currently selecting repertoire for his first recording session.

Gresco received excellent notices last year from New York critics for his Carnegie Hall recital. This was followed by a series of concerts and interviews on Canadian radio. Plans are now being formulated for a European recital tour for late spring.

IAN THOMAS RETURNS TO CHART PICTURE

It's back to the charts once more for GRT's Ian Thomas. His latest single, "Come The Son", a Thomas original through Corinth Music-BMI and produced by John Lombardo, made good chart moves first week of release. Several programmers had recognized the album cut of "Son" as having single potential and were programming the cut as a single -- keeping the Thomas sound up front after his first single, "Painted Ladies" had dropped off the charts. One of the first majors to go on the single was CHUM in Toronto. The picture is almost complete, nationally.

Thomas came close to breaking the U.S. barrier with his "Ladies" deck, released on the Janus label. The New York-based company is waiting for positive Canadian action before implementing a U.S. release.

Trident Studios in London, England is the setting for the next album session by Thomas.

He is currently laying down tracks with his producer Adam Mitchell. The latter was recently signed to a recording contract by GRT. Engineer on the session is David Hentschell of Trident who performed board duties for Elton John's most recent success "Yellow Brick Road". Supplying backup for the Thomas session are his sidemen from the first album: Steve Hogg, bass; John Capek, keyboards; and Barry Keane, drums. Milan Kymlica is the arranger on the session. Also sitting in on the session was Ross Reynolds, GRT President and executive producer on the album.

IRISH ROVERS HOME FROM AUSTRALIA

The Irish Rovers have returned home to Vancouver after a highly successful tour of Australia and New Zealand. The four week tour included twenty-seven concerts, many of which posted "sold out" notices days before show time.

The tour was also an excellent sounding board for negotiations on the group's CBC-TV series. Their manager, Les Weinstein, is reportedly close to firming a deal with ABC-TV in Australia and NZBC in New Zealand.

A Rovers' single, "The Road To Gundagay" was released down under to coincide with their tour and within a few days of release was showing indications of becoming a major chart item.

Back in Canada their "Gypsy" deck, released on their own Potato label, has captured the fancy of "pop" programmers, moving into No. 41 this week on the RPM Pop Playlist.

UNITED STATES CONSIDERS X-RATED MOVIES FOR TV

Americans might one day be able to watch skin flicks on their home television set according to government communications policymaker Clay Whitehead, director of the White House Office of Telecommunications. He said that he could conceive of a time when x-rated movies would be shown on cable television, if they are not banned outright by law and when technology comes up with a way to block out the program for those not interested in it. Whitehead also said congress should require that professional football games on CATV be shown free, mandated by congress because sports are an exceptional form of entertainment as shown by their immunity from antitrust laws. Here in Canada, at least in Toronto, citizens are able to sit down and relax with a blue movie on television (CITY-TV) although that Saturday combination of football and beer on the screen will probably be with us for quite some time.

CANADIANS IN ON LOU REED SESSION

Canadians Whitey Glann, former drummer with Mandala, and Prakash John, who played bass with Bush, were among the sidemen used for Lou Reed's new RCA album release, "Rock & Roll Animal Live". The session, a Steve Katz production, was produced at New York's Howard Stein's Academy of Music.


Other members on the session were Steve Hunter, lead guitar who was formerly with the Detroit Wheels, and Dick Wagoner, lead guitar.

There was also an old western style cook-out which consisted of hot-dogs or a plate of beans and pop.

The second show began early, artists for the second show were Joyce Seamone, Donna Moon, Con Archer, Roy McCaull, and Joe Firth. Winston James was unable to appear.

There was some really great music heard on this show today and plans are under way for another wing ding, hopefully with better weather on hand. Movie Land Ranch will now be opened to the public so if you are up around the Kleinburg area be sure to drop in for a visit.

Why did so many show up today for this event? Because it was all free? Or because everyone who attended were real country music fans? Let's hope it was for the latter reason. Let's turn out like this all the time to support our Canadian artists who work so hard to please us the public.

**STORY OF THE
BOUZOUKI FLOOKIE**

Feb. 9/74

In the last issue of RPM Weekly, in "the Programmers, there was an article about Vicky Leandros and the bouzouki. Well . . . I thought I'd take the time to tell you about the history of the popularity of the bouzouki in Europe. It all started with Nana Mouskouri's recording of "Weisse Rosen Aus Athen" in Germany, which was later recorded in English, as "The White Rose of Athens", in French, "Roses Blanches De Corfoue", and in Italian as "Rosa En Athena". It was composed by Manos Hadjidakis, the man who wrote the music to "Never On Sunday", "Topkapi", and many other scores.

If you really want to hear some good bouzouki music, listen to the following recordings by Nana Mouskouri and her group The Athenians:

the song "Children of the Stars" on the album "Presenting Nana Mouskouri . . . Songs from her TV series" Fontana 6312 036;

the song "Je Finirai Par L'Oublier" on the album "Une Voix . . ." on Fontana 6399 007;

the album "Chante La Grece", which features accompaniments on the bouzouki in several of the selections!!! (sung in Greek) Fontana 6325 303;

and, the song "Telalima" on the album "A L'Olympia" (sung in Greek) Fontana 885 527.

If you've ever seen a Nana Mouskouri concert, you'd know what I mean. If you had heard some of the above selections, you'd also know, that if more people knew that Nana Mouskouri existed, she'd be a bigger hit than Vicky Leandros.

**CAMPUS DISCS COSTS
HURT PROGRAMMING**

Feb. 6/74

Usually in this envelope you receive the weekly NOCTURNE playlist additions from CFRC, but this last week we have received no singles which I feel are worthy of airplay on our station's rock programmes. Usually when this happens, I pull a couple of album cuts to add to the playlist, but this week we have also received absolutely no rock albums whatsoever, so I would like to take this opportunity to say something that has been building up inside of me for quite a while.

CFRC is entirely non-profit and non-commercial. We have no affiliations with any profit making organizations, such as record stores; so we have always been heavily dependent on complimentary (i.e.

free) copies of albums and singles to provide material for this station's programming. Early in 1973, most record companies cut back on free copies of material to us (or cut us off completely), which hurt us but it was not crucial. We were still able to order albums for one dollar from most labels, and although our budget was small, there was enough to keep our material current. Since September, when I took over as director of rock programming at CFRC, my orders have averaged about twenty albums per month total, split up among the various companies. Out of all the major labels, only WEA, Columbia and Capitol ever responded; these companies supplying about 50% of what we ordered from them. We got absolutely no response from the other record companies, even after re-ordering.

Now, almost all our records are dealer's list prices, which will not affect us for a couple of months because ALL our orders have been suspended, due to lack of funds, until the new budget comes down in May.

I personally find all this business very frustrating. We do our best to try and provide a service to our community with, what seems to us to be, no help from anybody at the record companies except a very few. I have tried to find out what is needed from us by the companies to improve our service. Every week you receive a copy of our playlist additions, and once a month a copy of the complete playlist, but most representatives seem to be more impressed with little stickers and T-shirts. We cannot afford to promote the station in this manner (assuming we even wanted to). We also cannot afford to phone each company regularly just to "keep in touch", because we are not located in south western Ontario and it is a long distance call from Kingston. However, I have tried to do the next best thing, by drawing a map showing exactly how to get here, and enclosing a list of the people currently in charge of running CFRC.

Even before the cutbacks and price increases, it was a fact that the best shows at CFRC were done by people who depended heavily on their own, personal collections, simply because of the difficulty in getting the records we wanted. Now the freebies have all but stopped so even this way out has been cut off. Students cannot afford to buy enough to do justice to current material. Why were such major price increases necessary anyway? We are aware of the shortage of plastic, but can this justify an increase of 150%, when the plastic in an album is

HOUKAH'S PAPP & STEPHENS RECEIVE NOD FROM PER-CEPTION

Canadian programmers are having another listen to Houkah recording artists James Papp and Paul Stephens. The Vancouver-based label released a single by the pair, "Country Lady", written by Papp and Stephens, a few months ago but it wasn't even given time to stiff. Chief of the Houkah complex, Ross St. John, took their troubles to Per-ception, a Dallas, Texas firm that had come up with a novel research methodology involving recorded sound.

Accordingly, "Country Lady" was one of twelve selections contained on a tape. Six of these selections were current hits with six being test selections. Subjects used for the sound test have been well-schooled on the physiographic testing procedures. These subjects are fitted with finger electrodes, connected to a polygraph which measures several bodily functions including heartbeat, pulse and galvanic skin response. Subjects listen to the selections and their physiological responses are monitored and recorded by means of a continuous graph.

The technique used by Per-ception has been developed from over five years of research. The response, recorded on the continuous graph, is measured, resulting in individual as well as group scores being compiled for each selection on a scale from one to fifty. Capper to the whole experiment is the assistance of three radio station program directors from the largest markets in the U.S. They evaluate and score each test selection. Canadian programmers are now being used. Per-ception recently bowed Canadian offices in Toronto headed up by Peter Bains of CKEY.

A combination of the physiological response scores of the test subjects and the evaluation and score of the radio station program directors results in a composite score for each test selection.

Back to Houkah and "Country Lady", which came up with a score of 33 out of 50. Demographics listed the single weak with

PROVINCIAL LEADERS PROVE THEY ARE STOMPIN' TOM FANS

Canada's energy problems were shoved aside at the recent conference of provincial leaders, to honour Boot's Stompin' Tom Connors. New Brunswick Premier Richard Hatfield, a long-time admirer of Stompin' Tom Connors, borrowed one of Tom's stompin' boards, and returned the next day with the board, autographed by all ten of Canada's premiers.

Inscribed at the top of the board in Hatfield's handwriting was the message "Keep on Stompin' for Canada". Hatfield was quoted as saying he wanted to do this for Connors because he and the other Premiers really appreciated what Tom has done for Canada through his music.

Per-ception records the results of the emotional response in terms of a Reaction Rating Scale, assigning a value to each record cut on a scale of 1 to 30. As well, the three program directors use a scale of 1 to 5. Based on Per-ception's previous studios, a composite reading of 27 to 28 is borderline with 29 or more indicating the record a potential hit. The range of the composite score is 1 to 50.

If you're confused, make sure you attend C8. The doctor who originated the research on this method of mind and body evaluation of sound, will be on hand to explain.

Meanwhile, give "Country Lady" by James Papp and Paul Stephens another spin. Papp will soon release as a solo artist with "Sunshine Of Your Mind" while the pair will be on release with their Houkah album, "Comox & Friend". Their sessions were produced at Vancouver's New Creative Production Centre by Bob Brooks for Ross/Wolf Productions.

Polydor has 10% of the RPM Country Playlist with several more listings ready to break through. Powerhouse releases by Tom T. Hall and Johnny Rodriguez have set the pace for the Statler Bros., Billy Walker, Gary Sargeants, Mel Tillis and Eddy Arnold.

The film was a province-wide success and will shortly be translated into English for distribution across English Canada.



Dynamic concentrates on non-record product as well, but are obviously gaining much ground with their current record bonanza — a two record set by Eddy Arnold. Upcoming is a two record set of the "Greatest Hits" by Nat King Cole.

EX-WACKER BISHOP TO BOW SOLO ACT

Randy Bishop, ex-songwriter/singer/guitarist for the Montreal-based Wackers, has decided to go solo. His first date was at Montreal's Rainbow Bar (Feb. 4), and his first public appearance since splitting his former group last September.



Bishop has taken on a new sound and appearance. Sporting a head of turquoise hair, Bishop warns: "Those of you who remember me in The Wackers should prepare for something completely different.

Following his Rainbow gig Bishop will introduce his new group on a series of dates now being set up for March. No recording information available at press time, but it has been reported that he is currently rehearsing with Jeff "Stick" Davis, formerly with Jessie Winchester, and jazz percussionist John Rudel. The latter worked closely with Richard Sasnow.

MORE GOLD AND EXPANSION FOR GRT'S CANADIAN FIRM

One of the leaders in acquiring Canadian Gold Leaf Awards this past year has been GRT of Canada Limited. Most rewarding has been the Gold success of Lighthouse. The three albums and two singles released during 1973 all qualified for Gold with "Lighthouse Live" certifying for a Platinum Award, the first Canadian group to receive such an Award. This was a two-record set recorded during their Carnegie Hall concert in New York City.

GRT have also been Gold-minded with foreign product. Out of the 20th Century camp, a Los Angeles-based label bossed by Russ Regan, came a string of hits including Gold makers Maureen McGovern ("The Morning After") and the DeFranco Family ("Heartbeat It's A Lovebeat"). Reaching Gold fever is the Love Unlimited Orchestra's hit, "Love Unlimited".

It was GRT who first struck Gold with Neil Diamond. His "Diamonds Diamonds", released first in Canada and later in the U.S. under title of "Double Gold", brought much attention to the Canadian company.

GRT also picked up a Gold Leaf Award for the original soundtrack of "American Graffiti".

An open door policy has brought new Canadian labels as well as those from south of the border to GRT. Special Records made headway across Canada with their single and album releases by Downchild Blues Band. Their "Flip, Flop and Fly" single is still reaching into regional areas although GRT is now concentrating on breaking their follow-up deck, "(I've Got Everything I Need) Almost". Canadian performers looking for a "Canadian talent" tag have found Ross Reynolds/Neill Dixon GRT team ready to promote them on a national scale. Not all have been winners but one who stands out is Ian Thomas who gained national recognition and a foot in the international door with his initial single release, "Painted Ladies". He is back now with his follow-up, "Come The Son" The single is expected to be released in the U.S. by Janus within the next couple of weeks. Adam Mitchell, producer and artist is ready to go with Chad Allan already capturing "pop" and country markets with his single, "Dunrobin's Gone".

The Greaseball Boogie Band will shortly bow on the GRT label joining Moe Koffman, well-known Canadian jazz man now enjoying success with his third album, "Master Session". His first two album releases enjoyed much success in Japan and Europe.

The country scene has also been looked into by GRT Canada. New labels into the fold include Granite and Cinnamon. New product is now being packaged for the Canadian market. A British group, Turkey Buzzard will have its Canadian release on the New York-based Passport label joining product releases from Brunswick including that from the Chi Lites and Lionel Hampton. GRT's long-time distribution deal with Bang has been renewed which should see product by T.B. Sheets released shortly as well as never-before-released Van Morrison material.

War children weaned on Motown music

LONDON, Eng.

Though these past few years of roaming about the rock music globe, I've frequently wondered why Motown's contribution to rock 'n' roll has not been duly accredited.

After all, Motown has produced more classic single recordings than any other record company; and indeed, they've been doing so since the days of Chuck Berry. That, I

hardly need remind you, is a long, long time. Motown has been around long enough to see and hear the birth and the demise of the Beatles — in fact, during the Liverpool lads' American invasion of 1964, Motown was the only label able to keep on coming up with chart-toppers amidst the Pommy onslaught. I strongly suspect they will outlive the Rolling Stones.

What I mean is that Motown was making records in the fifties when most of us were just listening to them. We, "the war children", (Van Morrison's description of those of us born during and soon after World War II) were weaned on Motown music.

My heart really does skip a beat when I think back over that neverending stream of classics that came out of the Detroit studios. If I had to name a dozen of my favorites from that first generation of what came to be called the Motown sound, I'd be likely to include the Miracles' "You've Really Got A Hold On Me" (next to this,

ARPEGGIO OFF WITH SEVERAL SINGLES

Arpeggio Records have scheduled the latter part of February for the release of several singles. Included are: Lynn Jones with a Tony Hatch penning of "I Love Your Kind Of Loving"; the Family Brown with "Kids In The Kitchen", and "What Used To Be A River".

Arpeggio's producer Gary Buck will shortly release a Dick Damron composition, "Knowing That She's Leaving". This session was produced at RCA's Toronto studios with John Arpin looking after the arrangements as well as keyboard duties. Giving an assist on the session were Al Briscoe, steel; Ollie Strong, guitar; Keith MacKay, guitar; Red Shea, guitar; Ian MacDonald, drums; Paul Fortier, bass and Zeke Shepherd, harmonica. Buck has just returned from several dates across Canada including a television appearance on the Gaby Haas show in Edmonton (CFCN-TV). He also appeared on a CKRM Regina special. Buck has been the voice behind the Mountain Dew commercials and is scheduled for several studio sessions for the new Mountain Dew commercial. He will be touring Canada this year in conjunction with Mountain Dew.

the Beatles' version was honestly nauseating), "Heat Wave" by Martha and the Vandellas (and probably "Quicksand"), Marvin Gaye's "Pride and Joy" (and who could forget "You're A Wonderful One", the definitive Memphis, Tennessee trip), "Every Little Bit Hurts" by Brenda Holloway, Jr. Walker and the All Stars' "Shotgun" (Let alone "Roadrunner"), "You Beat Me to the Punch" by Mary Wells, the Marvelettes' "Please Mr. Postman", "It's Growing" by the Temps, the Miracles' "Tracks Of My Tears" or "Ooh Baby Baby" and two Stevie Wonder ravers, "Fingertips Part 2", and "I Call It Pretty Music (But The Old Folks Call It the Blues)" — the last-mentioned being my personal theme song throughout my various teenage trials and tribulations. And, to throw in a couple of unknown classics for my list: Eddie Holland's "Leaving Here" and "A Love She Can Count On" by the Miracles.

Looking back on it now, Motown's monuments were many and mostly magnificent (as is, it seems, my alliteration); they put the bass in rock 'n' roll, they showed what to do with strings, they pioneered multi-instrument innovation (remember the time they threw in an anvil for the Temps' "It's Growing?"), and their vocal sounds were inevitably sizzling. Not to mention the raw song material, which has never been equalled in the 45 rpm frame of reference and I don't write that lightly.

So, when you get right down there with it, you cannot help but wonder why media accolades for the Motown music-makers have been so limited. Some clues might be forthcoming herein

A few weeks back, we were thrilled to learn that Stevie Wonder was coming over for the MIDEM circus and would play one gig at the Rainbow Theatre.

I've never seen Mr. Wonder live, although my ties with his music go back to his and my beginnings. You may now find this incredible, but I was once fired from a radio station in all-white Australia for playing Stevie Wonder's "Fingertips Part 2" when it was the no. 1 single in the States. The program manager

said" "Now look here son, that's not the right sort of music for our listeners — don't you let me hear that crap on my radio station again or you're out on your arse, understand me."

So, burning from the pangs of 18-year old rebellion, I went right on and played it first up. The guy pulled me right off the air before I could even say "Get stuffed".

I've followed Stevie's career closely since those grim times, in countries where things are a little more together. Through the years, I suppose I've written as much favorable coverage of the Motown era in major U.S. and British rock journals as any rock journalist still active or alive.

It has delighted me to see Stevie Wonder's recent acceptance in the mainly white-oriented rock media. They're finally realizing that this dude is a genius — some of us knew it back in 1962.

It was really beautiful to read Stevie's comments in the New York Times on his latest album "Innervisions". "Innervisions gives my own perspective of what's happening in my world, to my people, to all people. That's why it took me seven months to get together — I did all the lyrics — and that's why I think it is my most personal album. I don't care if it sells only five copies — this is the way I feel."

It really isn't very hard to get right behind a trip like that. And as we all know, the album and various tracks therefrom have been monster hits. Great.

So anyway, I called the Motown office in London, presented my credentials, and asked for both concert tickets and an opportunity to rap with Stevie. Some boid with a New York accent promised to get back to me within a day or two. When I still hadn't heard anything about 48 hours before the concert, I called again and spoke to a Mr. Phil Symes, who is the Motown main man in Britain.

Mr. Symes was very understanding, yes he'd get back to me on the tickets although they were tight — and, he mentioned, there would probably be a press conference the next day. He took my number and said he'd get back to me.

Never having been turned down or ignored for press tickets anywhere in the world, I didn't give it another thought. Yet here I am putting down these words and Stevie Wonder is down there doing 'em in at the Rainbow. Of Mr. Symes, there was no sign.

We should be sad, I suppose. But I feel sadder for Stevie Wonder and the Motown cause. After all, herein you just might find some of the reason for the media's general lack of due interest in Motown activities. Their press relations are abominable.


Here I am, overwhelmed with tickets for countless other concerts, and I can't even get into see Stevie Wonder. Little wonder then that such a miserable job has been done in spreading the word about Motown in soul-starved Britain.

(He also wrote seven Symphonies, a Clarinet Concerto, two Violin Concerti, and three piano Concerti, the second of which was in the repertoire of Benno Moiseiwitsch and Harold Bauer). His Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in C major for choir and organ opens the programme and is followed by Three Motets for Unaccompanied Chorus. The side concludes with a setting of The Lord is My Shepherd. Side two features choral works by Stanford's pupil, Charles Wood who died in 1926. He is represented by the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, and anthems Hail, gladdening light, Glory and honour and laud, and 'Tis the Day of Resurrection. Good recording and attractive packaging should make this a popular item with those devoted to English Church music.

It is understandable that as the years go by, you will probably spend as much on records as you will on equipment. We will give you a few easy steps to provide you with longer record life. Dust will always be a problem so the best thing to do is to clean your records before and after each use. Many products are available such as "Parastst" and "Watt's Preener" both of these have proven to be very effective. You can also get brushes that will clean while you play such as "Bib's Groove-Kleen" and "Watt's Dust Bug". Specially treated cleaning cloths are available but not as effective as the brushes.

A damaged record can often be partially restored, even if it seems to be hopeless. Generally a good cleaning with one of the solutions from a record shop will make a great difference. A few shops actually have a machine that will clean and dry discs to perfection. You can also clean them with a weak dishwashing solution in luke warm water. Be careful that the water is not too hot as it could warp and deform your discs. Drying them requires great care. The best way is to lay it on a clean, lint-free towel on a flat surface, then let it air to dry.

"Buckling" the jacket can also help, this keeps the record from scratching on the sides of the jacket. If the record has a liner, put it into the jacket backwards and lock the dust out. Keeping your fingers off the playing surface will help to reduce the oily build-up.

Of course, sooner or later normal wear will come into the picture. All we can do is try to slow it down.

For a few weeks now, we have been working on the premise that you must have good equipment to get good sound. In most cases this holds true, but no matter how good your equipment is, you can't get good sound from worn or dirty recordings. We have a

few hints that may help to preserve your records.

First, a look at the problems and their respective causes. Dust and dirt can finish a record's life in a very short time. Dust gets into the micro-grooves and causes the stylus to jump, creating an audible clicking sound. If this dust is not removed it can become permanently embedded in the vinyl. Today's records are made of a fairly soft vinyl, which is easily damaged and deformed. One speck of dust can only mean that there is more. This dust does the most damage when the record is slipped in and out of the jacket.

Another of the big problems is a gummy build-up from smoke and cooking etc. These substances can shorten the life of both the

record and your cartridge.

Keeping your records covered is the most important factor in protecting them. The dust cover on your turntable was named after its function, keep it on and keep the dust out. Static is the main attraction for dust. You can use an anti static spray to get rid of it, but it will make the recording surface tacky and make dust harder to get rid of.

Storing your records on their sides will expose less surface to dust and can make quite a difference to their life. One of the very basic rules is never to stack records on the turntable. This in itself will ruin a record faster than all the dust in the world.

Stompin' Tom Connors will star in a weekly half hour prime time show on the full CBC-TV network next season, (fall-winter, 1974-5). The contract was signed by Stompin Tom and, for the CBC, Thom Benson, director of TV entertainment programming, English Services Division.

"From coast to coast, the people of Canada are identifying with Tom Connors, demonstrating their appreciation of his special appeal and talents by flocking to see him wherever he appears," said Benson. "Now we can look forward to an extremely successful TV association".

The 26-week series will be produced at CBC Edmonton by Don McRae and will include studio shows and programs filmed on location across the country in virtually every province. Tailored to Stompin' Tom's own popular and spontaneous style, the series will feature many of his own songs including new material that he will write for the show.

The shows will include guests from specific regions featured each week with content related to that particular local. Tom will be working with script writer Colin MacLean and his two regular side men, Bill Lewis and Gary Empey.

TYSON/CHEECH & CHONG PULL CANADIAN CROWDS



New Albums

BILLY JOEL — Piano Man — Columbia KC 32544-H

Joel could be the discovery of the year. Title song has already established artist as a contemporary rock-cum pop artist. Much of his strength has come from the pop programmers which created an almost immediate crossover situation. Not too much information on Joel although we suspect the piano stylings are his own. He did write all the material on the set. Producer was Michael Stewart.

REDBONE — Wovoka — Epic KE 32462-H

Already established with their single hit, "Come And Get Your Love", Redbone won't be a flash in the pan. This album will ensure a long stay with the contemporary rock crowd. The "Chant Wovoka" cut is an excellent builder, levelling out with "Clouds In My Sunshine". The set finishes with a wild rock scrambling "23rd And Mad".

STRAWBS — Hero and Heroine — A&M SP-3607-W

They've been a long time between releases but this one makes up for any lost prestige. The subtle and intricate styling of Dave Cousins adds tenderness throughout the set. Composing eight and vocalizing on nine of the ten cuts, Cousins upfrontness and the band's tight excellence combine to form one of the most beautiful sounding albums in some time. Take extra listening time for "Autumn", the instrumental intro by John Hawken sets you up for Cousin's "Summer Sleep" and "Winter Long". The Strawbs are a unit of poetry and action — lots of good listening.

DAVID ESSEX — Rock On — Columbia KC 32560-H




Production and arranging by Jeff Wayne is obviously tuned down to make the voice of Essex front and centre. It's a light and easy set, dwelling on romanticism, which may be the reason his "Rock On" single has had such a difficult time breaking. Essex is a new product of the UK sound and the timing could be right for this type of approach. There's nothing spectacular about Essex. He just has a clean hint of today's rock and that's where he shines.

OLIVIA — Polydor 2310 316-Q

This album gives a very interesting cross-section of material with such writers as Dylan, Lightfoot and Kristofferson. Olivia gives it her best and comes out with true "Easy Listening" in her unmistakable style. Basically she could be classed as a soft rock artist, yet in some instances she very nearly puts out ballads. Side one features the hit single "Let Me Be There" followed by a well known but differently approached "Me And Bobby McGee". Side two is tough to pick because all the material is excellent. Two cuts on the flip side of special interest are "If I Could Read Your Mind" (Cancon) and "Angel Of The Morning".

ANNE MURRAY — Love Song — Capitol ST 6409-F

Once again Anne puts out another outstanding album. Her lyrics and tunes are very easy to understand and enjoy. "Love Song" of course is the hit single on the album but another cut on the A Side of the album with hit potential is "Real Emotion". It seems that all the songs flow together in a story book style, each one telling its own tale from start to finish. The B side really lets Anne's voice steal the show, the light background accents her talent rather than covering it. This side has three interesting numbers, beginning



with "Watching The River Run" then "Son Of A Rotten Gambler" and last but not least "Send A Little Love My Way".

WEDNESDAY — Last Kiss — Ampex AC10152-V

We can see the approach of this disc is to reach two markets. The nostalgia freaks should be very interested due to its contents, also the younger market should like it for the same reasons that these songs were so big when they first hit the market. Some of the harmonizing is backed up by a five piece string section which seems to add feeling to the material. The album opens with the title song "Last Kiss" which is followed by its sequel "Teen Angel" with the lyrics altered slightly. Side two shows the groups talent for writing as well as performing. Mike O'Neil puts together four of the cuts such as "Ride" and "Take Me Home". This is the first time the group has used a banjo and we find the results appealing.

Profits could come from country too

With today's country hits shaking up the pop and contemporary rock surveys and indications of more and more crossover hits, country could become a money maker for the programmer who can measure his market properly and make the 100% switch into country. CJVI Victoria, as we pointed out a few weeks ago, took a winning country formula into what was considered a conservative market and they haven't looked back since.

CJCJ Langley, B.C. which isn't too far from the giant metropolis of Vancouver, has greatly influenced the lower mainland of B.C. Under music director Dave Chesney they have remained a small town station, and would appear content to remain so — with a profit. The station personnel like what they're doing and Langley obviously likes what the station is doing.

The Langley station has been country for the past six years. Dave Chesney took over the post of music director a year and a half ago, making few changes but maintaining a heavy twenty-four country format.

Chesney displays a humbleness — rare in the radio business. He knows that his station does influence the Vancouver market but he plays this down:

CHESNEY: "We're still in the position where the valley outside Vancouver and the surrounding area of Metro Vancouver is growing at such a rate that it has made us a very community-minded radio station and sometimes a lot of people who work here get very frustrated because the big market is right there but we're not in the programming of it. We're not really trying to come in through the back door, like a lot of people think. The salesmen would like it but we're content to be a community radio station.

ARE YOU A COUNTRY FAN YOURSELF?

Very much so. My home was originally in Surrey, just down the road a few miles, and I think I've been brought up with country music.

YOU'VE OBVIOUSLY SEEN CHANGES IN COUNTRY MUSIC?

Yes, there's a new breed of country music coming up that is attracting the younger listener.

WHAT ABOUT THE COUNTRY PERFORMERS THEMSELVES?

Sometimes there is almost an insincerity in some of the artists that I have met and I couldn't understand why they were in it. But the Jennings, the Willie Nelsons and

the Billie Joe Shavers and the Tompalls represent a whole new breed coming up in country music and should make it very big.

HOW DO YOU FIND THE CANADIAN COUNTRY MUSIC SCENE? I HEARD YOU PLAYING "LONELY CAB DRIVER" BY MIKE GRAHAM ON MY WAY IN.

That's a very good record. More and more I see, and I'm glad to see it that Canadian record companies are taking a good strong stand with country music. From their concept I can totally realize how they want to get the crossover play for the sales and yet spread it pretty thin. They've got the steel and the violins and the productions are getting better all the time. They are getting that crossover play to MOR and even in the smaller markets are getting Top Forty play.

YOU MENTIONED THE YOUNGER CROWD THAT SEEMS TO BE LEANING TOWARDS COUNTRY?

There are a lot of young groups that are into country — like the New Riders of the Purple Sage. There was a time when country programmers steered away from groups like the Flying Burrito Brothers, because it was a common thought that these people were very insincere in their country outlook — like messing with motherhood. But more and more we seem to be catching on to this new breed. When Doug Kershaw was in town, it was a total rock audience, but Kershaw just gave out with that gut-bucket cajun music and the people really got off on it. It seems to me that a lot of people are searching for that magic chord — and I think it's country.

DO YOU GET MANY COUNTRY ARTISTS COMING INTO THE STATION?

We have a regular deal we work with the Jack Roberts Agency out of Seattle. We rotate on a six to eight week basis and bring in some of the big names. As far as Canadian groups and artists — we just don't have anyone come over the Rockies. We did have Dick Damron drop in to see us but we would like to see more participation by Canadian recording artists. I could see shows like The Tommy Hunter Show being successful out here, by that I mean the Queen Elizabeth Theatre in Vancouver. I think that's what is holding the whole Canadian music scene back — Canadian artists just don't promote themselves outside the Ontario market.

HAS THE 30% CANADIAN CONTENT CREATED MANY PROBLEMS WITH YOUR STATION?

There has been a great deal of Canadian country product released but I have noticed a lessening in releases lately. It seems to be drying up. Even Stompin' Tom Connors product doesn't come in as often as it used to. There are problems — not critical yet, but you remember the RPM CS Meeting in Vancouver when it became evident after a short while why the Canadian industry is in trouble — and that's because we're not working together. Everybody is saying it's everybody else's fault. There's a lot of good talent out there, but they're not being recorded. We have excellent studios in Vancouver but access to them is limited. When they do release a single or an album, the promotion is also limited and there is a lack of distribution. So, there I go putting the blame on someone else, which I shouldn't be doing. We do play a lot of Canadian talent. We would like to play more — but we also have to consider the quality of the product. It is getting better though, but I wish there was more available.

DO YOU THINK WE HAVE A MARKET TO ACCOMMODATE CANADIAN PRODUCT?

I think the Canadian sound should be unique and if it were worked on through managers, and promotion people they could find a hook that could get the support of the public, but they don't seem to care. They put product out and expect the radio stations to sell it for them.

WHAT DO YOU CONSIDER SOME OF THE PROBLEMS FACING OUR MUSIC INDUSTRY?

I think there is a lack of communication. The country has to be tied together somehow. We do feel as though we aren't part of it all. Granted the eastern market is very large and that's where the majority of things are happening but it will never become a national happening if the west coast as well as the east coast aren't recognized. The same thing goes for Canadian artists, as I mentioned before. They must get out and help themselves.

GENERALLY SPEAKING ARE YOU MAKING MONEY ON COUNTRY MUSIC?

Programming-wise, yes. We have hit on a formula that has attracted a very large and loyal listenership. So, naturally if you satisfy your listeners, any programmer can make a profit. The profit factor is important but so is your own feeling about the type of music format you are into. We happen to like


Our challenge simply stated is to provide an input of quality and understanding relative to the importance of the issues that will arise."





MAC McCURDY TAKES HELM OF STANDARD BROADCASTING

Mr. Hollis McCurdy, 54, has replaced the retiring Mr. Thornton Cran as president of the biggest and richest radio concern in Canada — Standard Broadcasting. Standard owns CJAD in Montreal, CFRB and CKFM in Toronto, Standard Broadcasting Sales (representing 15 stations nationally), Canadian SBC (representing 50 stations in New York), the Muzak franchise for Eastern Canada, the Canadian Talent Library (\$1 million trust responsible for producing 175 lps since 1962), and Standard Broadcast News.

Mr. McCurdy was former president of CJAD Ltd., making a spectacular climb from a \$60 a month announcing job in Sault Ste. Marie before the Second World War. He started in Radio at CKLW Windsor in 1937 as a "joe boy . . . reading a station break if they thought no one was listening".

He must have made a favourable impression as he soon had the full time job in Sault Ste. Marie. The war came and went and McCurdy stayed on announcing for the CBC International Service broadcasting to Canadian Troops still in Europe. A few months later, he returned to Canada and a new station, CJAD in Montreal. From there, it was a climb up the ladder as chief announcer from 1948, program director from 1951, station manager from 1958, vice-president and general manager from 1961 and president from 1968.

MAJOR SOUND CHANGES FOR VICTORIA'S CKDA

John Molley, music director at Victoria's CKDA, reports a major facelifting in sound for the station. Known as an easy listening outpost, the station will move gradually into a "smoother, laid back soft rock" pseudo-format, so as not to jolt their listeners too much. The format approach will be experimented with until Molley hits on a sound, conducive to CKDA listeners. Molley is now using the services of Music programming aids and will be contributing to RPM's The Programmers.

Molley has been experimenting with "chicken rock" and has found encouraging listener response. Record product being aired includes: "Seasons In The Sun"/Terry Jacks, "Molly"/Bearfoot, "Virginia"/Bill Amesbury and Joni Mitchell's "Help Me" which Molley carted off the new Mitchell album.

The fifty thousand watter is now "live" twenty-four hours daily. Lineup includes: John Barton 6-10AM, George Sillery 10AM-3PM, Gord Tupper 3-7PM with Mike Gale doing the all-nite gig. Missing time slots are being finalized this week with on-air personalities to be announced.

Molley, who has seen service at CKY/Winnipeg, CJCH/Halifax and CHSJ/Saint John, is looking for Canadian Gold product. Record companies and independent record production houses should make sure that CKDA is placed on their mailing list for product and promo poop.

RADIO PRESENTS UNIQUE TRIBUTE TO A RECORD MAN

In a rare happening indeed, radio actually paid tribute to a record man. Early in February, CFAC Calgary staffers gathered at Smiley's Sandwich Shop around a six foot submarine sandwich to present the CFAC "Golden Mike" Award to John

NEW AM RADIO STATION EXPECTED FOR YORK REGION

A new AM radio station is in store for the York region north of Toronto by the end of the year. The men behind the application, to be filed within a few weeks with the CRTC, are Ken Foss, former news director at CFGM Richmond Hill, and Stephen B. Roman, chairman of Denison Mines Ltd. Foss will be president and general manager.

The station should be on the air by early 1975 at a cost of \$450,000. Foss plans to program the station with emphasis on the York area (pop. 200,000). News from areas outside the York region will be limited, with the bulk comprised of local news and sports. Community service programs will be stressed, utilizing amateur theatre groups etc. Foss, describing the programming as exactly what the CRTC has in mind for FM, said the station will not necessarily conflict with CFGM, also broadcasting for the area, but who's programming is directed more towards Toronto Metro. The transmitter will be located in Markham.

21% BOOST IN FM CAR RADIO RECEIVERS

The Radio Sales Bureau recently released figures tabulated by Statistics Canada showing a 21% boost in FM receivers in cars for the year ended April 1973. The study showed 14.1% of total car households have radio equipped automobiles with FM. As for the percentage of homes with FM, the figures have remained the same for 2 years at 67.2%, even though nearly 400,000 households were added in the 1972-73 period, bringing total FM homes to 4,213,000. Other figures showed 88.6% of car households have car radios — up from 87.2% the previous year.



worth at most 50 cents? Why are extravagant parties carried to ridiculous extremes to announce new signings, and why can promoters get twenty-five free copies of each album released by an artist on the bill, when we can't get one of an album we want to give air-time?

I fear that this last increase may prove to be the straw that broke the camel's back, dooming CFRC and other smaller stations to mediocre programming as long as these conditions continue.

country music ourselves and I think our on-air personalities show this sincerity as well. Our listeners are happy. They put their radio on 800 and they leave it there and will probably leave it there for a long time until the station does something or changes the music so as to annoy them. You have to keep a close contact with the people and the community."

So, there's a typical Canadian operation. The Langley station is small and naturally heavy on community involvement. They enjoy what they are doing which makes for a loose but effective playlist and a general "home-town" attitude. No big city noises — an operation that satisfies their public and the CRTC, and makes money.

Remember — there are 137 stations across Canada now programming at least three hours of country music a day. Thirty-three of these stations program country music anywhere from twelve to twenty-four hours per broadcast day. The frosting on the country music cake is the fact that more than 88% of the stations in Canada program some country music. Now, all we have to do is convince the record companies that country artists are important and if properly stocked, retailers could sell much more country product.

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
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
