

Music & dancing have healing properties

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Lloyd Percival, a Canadian fitness booster and sponsor of the Olympus group, has found therapeutic values associated with music and dancing. After a close look at his own group he "became interested in determining the physical effort load of each musician while playing different instruments and vocalizing, the nuances in their emotional response to variations in tune tempos as well as evaluating audience reaction while merely listening to the music and the physical effort they expended while dancing". His study entailed the use of sophisticated radio telemetry equipment.

Percival has done similar telemetry studies at the Fitness Institute in Toronto in an effort to assess members stress tolerance and reaction to various kinds of stress. His study on a musical group -- and audience however, is a first.


To accurately record his group's physiological response, which included an electrocardiogram, small electrodes and batteries were attached to their bodies, transmitting radio impulses to a radio receiving monitor.

The results indicated that during heavy drum licks, the drummer reached maximum heart rates of up to 180 per minute -- equivalent to high endurance athletic activity. Next in intensity was piano and organ playing with recorded heart rates of 150.

Long solos by flute and saxophone players resulted in heart rates of 140 with occasional jumps as high as 170.

Guitar players into heavy and prolonged passages registered peaks of 140. It's explained that with a guitar player his heart

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ATTIC LABEL UNVEILED BY MAIR AND WILLIAMS

Al Mair and Tom Williams have jointly announced the formation of their new company, Attic Records Ltd. They are situated at 350 Davenport Rd. in Toronto (416) 922-4114. The company is comprised of Mair as president, Williams as vice-president and Heather Murray, formerly of CFTO-TV as promotion co-ordinator.

Initial signing for the Attic label is Fludd, formerly with the Daffodil group. Their first single, "Brother & Me" is a Brian Pilling original and published through Underwater Music-BMI. The session was co-produced by Pilling and Leo DeCarlo at Toronto's Manta Studios. An album session is now being scheduled with a hoped for fall release. Fludd will be part of a CHUM-AM showcasing at Toronto's City Hall June 23 for an expected turnout of fifty thousand.

Also signed to the new label is Ron Nigrini, a contemporary folk writer/singer who has just completed a CBC transcription and should have a single release by mid to late July. Nigrini, a former member of the Herd and until recently playing the bar circuit with Ken Harris, will be produced by Dennis Murphy. He has also had experience as a studio musician, one session being that of Michel Hasek's Naja album which contains "Horses" a Nigrini composition. Nigrini will be playing the Nag's Head in Toronto for the month of June and moves over to O'Bannion's for the following month.

Attic's approach to the business will be on a small scale, concentrating on the development of from five to six artists. They are currently in talks with established and new artists. Further signings will be announced as they are firmed.

Negotiations for foreign market release of product will be worked separately (for each artist). Attic are presently working on the U.S. release of the Fludd single.

COLUMBIA SPOTLIGHT FOR FRENCH ARTISTS

Columbia Records (Canada) have launched a nationwide promotion of forty albums by French and French Canadian artists. Retailers and rackers are being offered an additional 10% over and above the normal discount.

Although the month long campaign is national in scope, the bulk of sales is expected to come from Quebec province. Included in the promotion is product by Andre Gagnon, Ivan Rebhoff, Monique Leyrac, Joe Dassin, Franck Dervieux, Edith Butler, Michel Dal'Hou, and Patsy Gallant. The latter is currently enjoying good sales with her single, "Reconte" (the French version of "Rock On" by David Essex). The single was Columbia's best selling Canadian single for the month of May and has been released in France to tie-in with her promotion tour of France and Brussels.

CONDOR INTO RECORD PLAY

Condor Records, a new country label distributed by Marathon, is having excellent programmer response with their initial single release, "Standing On The Promises" by the Newman Sisters. Country programmers in eastern Canada were among the first to recognize the potential of the single.

Condor was formed in April of this year and hope to record top names, already established in the business as well as new Canadian talent.

YONGE STREET SQUEEZE FOR STEELE'S TAVERN

One of Toronto's early Canadian music landmarks, Steele's Tavern, has succumbed to the noisy and obscene Yonge Street strip. Steele Basil first opened his doors twenty five years ago and when, in 1960, he brought in live entertainment it was his hope to give Canadian performers a chance for exposure they normally wouldn't get at the clubs bringing in the name foreign acts. One of his first acts was a young folk singer from Orillia — Gordon Lightfoot, who over a period of time, played more than thirty engagements at the club.

Other artists given a chance at Steele's were Alan MacRae, Tom Kelly (CBC-TV's "Singalong Jubilee") and many others including Andy Niccols, who closed the club. The latter has been playing Steele's periodically since 1966.

Basil knew his clientele — Ryerson students. In fact the club became known as Ryerson's watering hole, usually packed to its 180 seat capacity.

Auditioning all the talent himself, Basil was a rare type of club owner — he allowed the performers the freedom of choice of material. They could try their own material on the audience or go for the standards.

Steele's, smack in the centre of Toronto's "record alley" (between Sam's and A&A's) will be replaced by Hip Pocket a chain of stores catering to the clothing needs of performers.

MORE DATES FOR BEE GEES' TOUR

Several more dates have been added to the Canadian tour of the Bee Gees which will now take them from Halifax through to Vancouver. Their Halifax date has been firmed as (August 21) followed by Moncton (22), Saint John (23), Montreal (25), Ottawa (26), Sudbury (27), Hamilton (28-29), Winnipeg (30-31). There will be no concert in Toronto for this tour.

Kicking off September the Bee Gees move into the Centennial Theatre in Saskatoon (2), Regina (3), Calgary (5), Edmonton (6) and close out their tour at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre in Vancouver (8).

Polydor's national promo chief, Allan Katz, leaves this week (13) on a cross-country promotion tour to tie-in a dealer/promoter ticket campaign as well as to tout the latest album from the Bee Gees, "Mr. Natural".

WEA RE-ISSUES LOST DEEP PURPLE ALBUMS

WEA's merchandising manager, Mike Reed, has rushed into release three "thought to be lost" Deep Purple albums. The albums were part of the Tetragrammaton complex which was formed by Bill Cosby and Ron Silver back in 1967. The albums in question were released between that year and 1969.

Re-issued on the Warner Bros. label, the albums are: "Deep Purple" (WS 4514), "Book of Taliesyn" (WS 4515) and "Shades of Deep Purple" (WS 4516). Those stations interested in copies should contact their nearest WEA distributor.

Receiving parts for the albums was a unique happening — they were found in Japan where Warner/Pioneer has been enjoying top sales on all three packages. Tape configurations for all three albums are now in the works.

STAFF CHANGES AT WEA CANADA

As reported in last week's Tribal Drum, Paul Richards has left WEA to host his own talk show at CHIC in Brampton, Ontario. Moving in to the Ontario promotion office is Jon Bojicic (Boy-chich). Bojicic has an impressive list of music and production credits that should prove an asset to the company. Besides being involved with production work with Jack Richardson and Bob Ezrin of Nimbus 9 he has been an active musician, playing (guitar and keyboard) and singing in local groups.


Bojicic will report directly to Larry Green, national promotion manager for WEA.

In the Montreal area there was good news with Roger Desjardins, one of the most aggressive of French Canadian promotion men, moving back into the WEA fold. Desjardins had been associated with Capitol/EMI for a short period of time. He has been appointed Supervisor of Promotion for Eastern Canada and will work out of the Montreal branch reporting directly to Green in Toronto.

MARK ROBBINS JOINS CHAMPLAIN PROD'TNS.

Mark Robbins has been appointed to the music division of Champlain Productions. He will be responsible for record promotion and artist management.

Robbins is well known in the record community having been a former promotion rep for Quality Records and also involved

in management on the group level, and in particular with Edward, Harding & MacLean.

Robbins will be located in Toronto for the Montreal based firm and will concentrate on promotion for The Lady and The Gentlemen, Cal Dodd, Rick Neufeld, Lisa and Edward, Harding & MacLean.

GALLO TO PRODUCE BEARFOOT ALBUM

Columbia's Bearfoot will shortly enter studios to begin work on a new album to be produced by Bob Gallo. In the meantime Columbia are releasing the group's follow-up single to "Molly" — "Sweet Virginia", both of which are included on their current album. The new single has been edited down to under three minutes.

Bearfoot have also undergone a title change in their album — from "Bearfoot & Friends" to "Bearfoot". There had been some confusion in the title with reviewers in Canada and the U.S. referring to the group as Friends.

MUCH MORE MUSIC NEWS IN REVAMPING RPM

Over the past three weeks, RPM has been slowly revamped to contain more news. Our 24 page format has been tightened considerably and the revamping will continue.

As well, RPM will tighten up on lockup time and soon will be in the mails earlier to compensate for the time lost in postal handling.

In the weeks to come, RPM will continue to methodically change the format of RPM and the systems of chart computation and programming information.

As well as conserving newsprint, the new concept will speed up news and information to radio stations and record dealers who now command the largest block of subscriptions in the history of RPM.

Readers will only notice slight changes as we progress, but ultimately, RPM will be of more service to the industry and will arrive earlier to most subscribers.

BEECHWOOD CANADA ACTIVE AT HOME AND ABROAD

Beechwood Canada's general manager Joey Frechette has been busy keeping up with the worldwide success of writers within their fold. Up front is the developments surrounding composer/artist Karl Erikson. His United Artists album has been released in Germany and France with a possible release in Holland, England. To tie-in with this activity, Erikson is planning a tour of these countries during the summer months. His most recent single release, "It's Gonna Be Alright", was well accepted by Canadian pop and country programmers and has been released on U.A. in the U.S.

Lisle, a Bronco recording unit who had a hit with their initial single release, "Shelly Made Me Smile", negotiated a release in the U.S. on the Bell label.

Back home in Canada, Donna Moon's new single, "Baby & Me" and "Does She Love You Like I Do", has shown early indications of becoming a Canadian country hit. The single was culled from Moon's album, "Bittersweet". Both sides are published by Central Songs, a division of Beechwood.

Shirley Eikhard and Beechwood recently received BMI Certificates of Achievement for "Keep On Believing", one of Eikhard's last country-oriented compositions before switching to her new "blues" image.

COLUMBIA TOUTING "WOMBLING SONG"

British television viewers are now familiar with The Womblers through their BBC-TV weekly show (a "Sesame Street" type of show) as well as through their single "The Wombling Song" and Columbia are convinced the group could become known on this side of the pond.

National sales manager, Bert Dunseith, and Charlie Camilleri, national promotion manager, are launching a nationwide campaign to bring the Womblers' single home. Advance mailing has already indicated that pop programmers are interested in the four members of a rock group, disguised in animal costumes.

The Womblers began as a fan promotion — the British groups are known for their animal and mime antics particularly during the Easter and Christmas seasons, and developed it into a stage presentation that interested the BBC.

BLACK & COUNTRY MUSIC TOP COLUMBIA'S SELLERS

Top sellers in Columbia's catalogue and new product are by country and black artists. Leading the way is Charlie Rich — with his first album, "Behind Closed Doors" almost topping the 100,000 units sold mark. His single "The Most Beautiful Girl" has just passed the 150,000 units sold mark.

Black music has also taken a surprising jump with MFSB's "Love Is The Message" album listed as one of the best sellers for the month of May. Top selling new single is "For The Love Of Money" by the O'Jays.

Columbia is finally bringing home the Mac Davis single, "One Hell of A Woman", which has been kicking around the pop and country charts since its release in February. Another top seller from the country fold is Tanya Tucker's "Would You Lay With Me".

A&M DISTRIBUTION FOR HARRISON'S LABEL

George "Beatle" Harrison's new label, Dark Horde, with him supplying exclusive services as a producer, is to be distributed world-wide by A&M Records. Firmed by Harrison and A&M president Jerry Moss, the latter announced that the custom label will hit the market in August with a rock album (untitled at press time) to be followed by an album by Ravi Shanker and Friends.

Harrison's next solo album on the Beatles' Apple label is expected to be released in September.

WEA SIGNING FOR MUDLARK/MATERICK

WEA's manager of A&R, Gary Muth, has firmed the signing of Canadian acts, Mudlark and solo artist Ray Materick. Studio sessions are now being scheduled.

Mudlark comprises: Michael McKenna (guitar), Peter Wm. James McGraw (lead vocals), Rick Love (percussion), Scott Cushnie (keyboards) and Howie Smith (bass).

Materick has been off the scene for some time but was well known on the club circuit and is no stranger to the recording business. His releases, original material, will lean towards the contemporary folk sounds.

MOOD JGA JGA PREPARING 2ND LP

Winnipeg's Mood Jga Jga is currently arranging material for its second album, to be recorded this fall, possibly at Winnipeg's Century 21 Studios. In addition to preparing the material, the group is playing a number of concert dates throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Dates in Ontario for late August and September are currently being booked by Tom Wilson of Concept 376.

Plans are underway for the Ontario dates to be the kicker for a proposed Canada-wide tour with emphasis on university dates. James Millican of Mood Jga Jga or Concept's Wilson should be contacted by interested bookers and promoters.

From those wonderful folk who gave you drugs, riots and the sub-culture . . . now comes . . . bi-sexuality

In 1964, the Beatles conquered the music world. In 1974, the music industry is looking for a new happening. Like the Beatles, who quietly crept up on North America, a new phenomenon may be in the making.



The Toronto David Bowie concerts sold out in hours with little or no advance notice or advertising and without a good hit to his name. Line-ups formed for tickets and Bowie looks like he could be the new Messiah of the music industry.

As the Beatles progressed, they brought into focus the drug culture, student riots and revolution (you did your own thing) and a sub-culture was born. Sex became more popular among young people and a new generation was growing up faster and with many new ideas.

The record business was its biggest promoter and, after all, you produce what the people want and the sixties and seventies rapidly advanced the thinking of the world.

This is an electronic age and records play a big part in the molding of the thinking of youth.

Bowie has been quoted as being a married bi-sexual and it stands to reason that his followers are also his believers. In view of this, the record industry may be taking part in the greatest sex revolution in history.

No promotional campaign could be better planned and yet the Bowie success and the success of the glitter groups came about slowly but methodically. The sellout of his concerts would seem to indicate there is a new acceptance and a new sexual freedom that will come from the man, his music and his records.

Slow to start, there are other followers of Bowie and even a few predecessors. Mick Jagger and Alice Cooper were pioneers of the glitter and costuming that was "camp rock" and Lou Reed and Gary Glitter are more recent stars that are part of the new trend in records.

A number of rock stars have claimed their bi-sexuality publically and there is no getting away from the fact that all this will influence the record buyer.

It isn't a popular subject and it has been shied away from until recently. Both Time

and Newsweek have reported on the new trend toward bi-sexuality among young people. It seems to be the kind of thing that would sneak up on the industry.

There are a number of new acts being groomed in this area and don't be surprised if the next big thing will be bi-sexual rock and all the trimmings that come with it.

It isn't a case of being for it or against it, but it is a case of being aware of it.

After all, the Rolling Stones were banned from the airwaves on some stations when they first came on the scene. Few of us even remember that far back.

The record and radio industry will continue to give the public what it wants, but meanwhile we should be prepared for the long range results.

Who would have dreamed ten years ago that bi-sexuality would be touted as the "coming thing"???

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HUD CONTINUES WITH STAMPEDE

So successful was Lorence Hud's eastern Canadian junket with the Stampede that Mel Shaw, manager of the group, has asked the young A&M recording artist to become a part of the western Canadian leg of the tour. Prior to their kick-off date in Calgary (24) Hud played a successful week at the Chimney in Toronto.

The Calgary date will be followed by Red Deer (25), Edmonton (26), Lethbridge (27), Sparwood (28), Medicine Hat (29), and Moose Jaw (30) to take the month of June out.

The tour has also been an excellent springboard for Hud's latest single, "Sweet Janie Malone" taken from his A&M album, "Dancing In My Head".

Continuing into July the Stampede/Hud package open in Estevan (1), followed by Saskatoon (2), North Battleford (3), Prince Albert (4), Regina (5), Swift Current (6), Grand Prairie (10), Fort St. John (11), Prince George (12), Prince Rupert (13), Port Albernie (15), Victoria (16), Vancouver (18), Kamloops (19), Vernon (30), Kelowna (21), Penticton (22) and winds up in Trail, B.C. July 23.

The national tour was arranged through Donald K. Donald Productions (Don Tarlton) of Montreal. The western dates were arranged in conjunction with Dave Warren (Saskatchewan), Ron Sakamoto (Alberta) and Bruce Streigler (IPC - Vancouver).

POLYDOR PUSH FOR NEW YORK DOLLS

Polydor, in preparation for the Massey Hall/Toronto appearance of the New York Dolls (15) prepared a hefty promotion that included the rush release of their second album, "Too Much, Too Soon". In view of their image being established with their first album as well as successful appearances, Polydor's national press officer, Richard Glanville-Brown, expects the new album to do even better.

POLYDOR & CHAPPELL INTO CANCON SEARCH

Polydor Records and Chappell Music have reached an informal agreement whereby both companies will join in searching out and developing new Canadian recording acts. Allan Katz, director of advertising and promotion for Polydor, in making the above announcement, noted: "This should enable us to be far more competitive in the Cancon market, and because of it we expect to be far more involved in developing Canadian talent than has been the case to date".

The first artist to benefit from the above is Quebec born Harry Marx who is now living in Toronto. His initial single for Polydor is expected to be released the latter part of June. Jerry Renewych acted on behalf of Chappell in formulating the Polydor/Chappell agreement.

ALPERT SUPPORT FOR VANNELLI'S ALBUM

A&M's Herb Alpert has given assistance to the initial A&M album release by Montreal's Gino Vannelli. The album, "Powerful People" was produced by Vannelli and contains nine of his own original compositions, published through Almo and Gemo Music-ASCAP. All selections qualify as three parts Cancon. The Vannelli styling is referred to as "rock with an ample helping of jazz". A heavy concentration will be made by A&M on pop and contemporary rock programmers.

Vannelli will shortly play MGM's Grand Hotel in Las Vegas as well as dates in Lake Tahoe and San Francisco.

Over the years I have often heard many Canadians state, "What's the matter with Canadian Talent! It's every bit as good as American Talent!" That is what they say, but, the trouble is that they don't really believe, or I should say, they won't let themselves really believe it. If they really believed what they are saying, the Canadian Government wouldn't have had to pass legislation to force radio stations to play Canadian records, made in Canada, by Canadian talent. There are, of course, many Canadians who do believe it and are doing everything in their power to see that Canadians get an even break in the record industry. But, there are many, many more who will just talk, but if they could help a struggling Canadian artist to get recognition in a tough business, they wouldn't lift a finger. Why? Jealousy mainly. Most Canadians hate to see another person get ahead of them in anything, even if that person has more talent.

Lately more and more people, the same people who wouldn't help a fellow Canadian, are crying loud and clear, "Damn Yankees", or "Damn Yankee so-and-so's, they think they are better than everybody else, always bragging. Why don't they stay where they belong?" I have even heard some say that we should kick them out of Canada. True, maybe a lot of them do brag a lot and think they are better than everybody else. But did you ever stop to think that maybe they have something to brag about? At least they look after their own. Maybe the reason that Canadians don't brag as much as these "Damn Yankee so-and-so's", is because when it comes right down to it, most Canadians don't have anything to brag about. It is my contention that if the Americans had stayed where they belong, Canada, at least most of it, would still be a wilderness. You, the reader of this article, may not like what I have written here, you might even become "enraged". But if you'll stop and think about it for a minute, honestly and seriously, you'll have to admit that what I have written is true. I wonder how many of those who are "outraged", can say that they have even one record album or tape in their home that is done by a Canadian artist. doesn't include other fields or arts. The same people who are "outraged" at this article, are the same people who didn't or wouldn't help them when they were struggling in Canada. But, as soon as they left, they got mad at them for leaving, and now that they have "made it big" in the States, these same people will say "He's a Canadian, I knew he could do it all the time."

Yes, Canada's artists are every bit as good as the American artists, or any other country in the world for that matter, and in some cases, many are better. It's about time though, that we, the Canadian public, and especially those in a position to be able to help our artists, started to forget our petty jealousies and began to realize it!!

Wake up Canada!!! Give a fellow Canadian artist the same recognition and support that you give an American artist!! Let him know that you are behind him, and that you are glad that he is representing Canada in a world-wide business. Don't force him to leave for Greener Pastures!!

CANADIAN SONGS BEING
SHUNNED BY TV NETWORKS

I've been a country music fan for years but only just recently have I been paying close attention to the growth of Canadian country music. It seems to me that within the past couple of years the quality of Canadian produced country recordings has improved greatly and I guess this is due largely to the CRTC's content law.

But I'm wondering how serious the big recording companies and the big name Canadian artists are in promoting the growth of the industry as well as the newcomers in it. What I'm basically trying to say is that occasionally I'll hear a Canadian produced country song I really like so I'll go to the local record store and try to buy it. More often than not they've never heard of the song (or the artist) nor can they find any information so that I can order it. I then watch Ian Tyson, Tommy Hunter, Country-time, etc., in hopes that maybe I'll see the artist perform his song or hear the song done by the show regulars — but no dice. What's even more frustrating is that the local country DJ's keep telling me that many of these songs I like are big "hits" on the national charts.

I think that Tyson and Hunter should do more of these chart "hits" on their programs rather than stick almost entirely to the Nashville hits. I can think of so many songs on the charts in the last few months that would be suitable. Can't you hear Ian Tyson doing Bruce Miller's "Anna Marie" or Tommy Hunter doing David Boire's

"Country Girl" or the Rhythm Pals doing Dave Baker's "Walk That Endless Highway".

I also think that the record companies should at least ensure their releases are available by mail order if not readily available in the stores.

I guess I sound like a Westerner but though Sam the Record Man may have the best selection of Canadian country albums and singles not all country fans live within 50 miles of Toronto.

PEER-SOUTHERN'S HEFT
WORKING ON CANCON

Matt Heft who heads the Peer-Southern organization in Canada has been journeying to New York for conferences with Ralph Peer of the parent company. Peer-Southern will soon be announcing plans to expand their policy and involvement in Canadian content in both publishing and recording.

Heft reports a growing interest in Canadian recordings, compositions and composers in the United States and plans are afoot to involve Peer-Southern internationally in boosting Canadian talent resources.

The company has most recently been involved in a recording featuring Tommy Common which is being released on Spark Records and distributed by London Records of Canada.

The "A" side is "One Has My Name and the Other Has My Heart". The record is presently in the hands of programmers and airplay should result for Common who is well-known across Canada for his many television appearances.

HEAVY CONCENTRATION
ON BASF RELEASES

BASF Canada is currently stepping up promotion on releases included in their Spring catalogue. Special concentration is being made on "Second Step", an album release by Karthago, a German group fast becoming popular in Europe.

BASF has also released a second album by Don Ellis. The album is titled "Haiku" which is the "ancient Japanese art of evoking the emotional content of a past moment through a tightly structured poem — written in three lines and seventeen syllables (5-7-5). The moment described usually takes place in nature and often works as a metaphor for a situation in human life".

Jazz releases are also high on the promotion list for BASF. Releases by Ella Fitzgerald: "Watch What Happens", Oscar Peterson: "Motions and Emotions" and "Trisetzeza on Piano" as well as a teaming up of Peterson and Herb Ellis: "Hello Herbie" and a "Special Tribute To Duke" by the Newport All Stars, present a fairly comprehensive picture of what BASF has available.

Classical recordings include Handel's "Royal Fireworks Music" and "Water Music" performed by the Collegium Aureum who also perform Bach's "4 Secular Cantatas", and "Four Overtures".

RCA'S FEENEY UNVEILS NEW HAMILTON IV ALBUM

After a triumphant tour of countries behind the Iron Curtain (the first for a country artist) George Hamilton IV is back to this side of the world and ready to start promoting his new RCA album, "Back To Down East Country". Produced by Jack Feeny and A&R'd by Barry Haugen, the album was taped at RCA's Toronto studios with Hayward Parrott looking after engineering duties. All selections on the album are by Canadian composers with the exception of "Cape Breton Lullabye", "Fiddler's Green" and "Peter Amberlay", which are public domain and were arranged for the session by Feeny. Included on the album are: the title song which was written by Tom Gallant, "Pictou County Jail"/Jim & Don Haggart; "Where The Blue Waters Foam"/Roy Payne; "T.C. Carry Me"/Allan Capson; "Shores Of P.E.I."/Ray MacCaull and others.

Feeny and Hamilton began collecting songs for this album last fall. Says Feeny: "I thought we would have difficulty topping our first 'Down East' LP but I believe we didn't". The musicians were hand picked for the session with arrangements by John Arpin.

WELCOMED IN PRAGUE

After a successful four week tour of the UK including a date at the London Palladium, Hamilton and his friend Mervyn Conn, British folk and country impresario, flew to Prague, Czechoslovakia for a series of concerts at Prague's Sports Hall Stadium. Back-up was supplied by Jiri Brabec and the Country Beat. This group came into prominence with the western style of country when they appeared at the Wembley Festival of Country Music last year as well as in Nashville at the DJ Convention. So successful were the Prague concerts that Conn is now negotiating an "Eastern Europe Country Music Festival" to be held in Prague next year. The Festival will feature, British, American and Eastern European groups.

A FIRST IN SOVIET

From Prague, Hamilton flew into Moscow - this time as the invited guest of the U.S. Embassy and the Soviet Government. It was just Hamilton and his guitar performing a





"one man lecture concert" which outlined the history of country music - with songs. Hamilton was armed with BBC tapes of early broadcasts of "The Grand Ole Opry" (Jim Reeves, Johnny Cash, etc.) which he mixed in with "live" songs to illustrate the history and growth of country music.

This was another first for Hamilton - the first time an American country singer had been allowed to perform in the Soviet Union, let alone into Moscow University for a face to face - give and take discussion with the students. Hamilton also spoke at the Institute of Foreign Languages - and sang to an audience of students - all of whom spoke English. This session ended up with Hamilton joining their choir, which specialized in American and English folk songs, to sing "When The Saints Go Marching In". Says Hamilton: "That's the sort of trip it was and I'm more convinced than ever that country music is 'people music' wherever they are and country music is the international language".

GUESS WHO SHED WINTER/McDOUGALL

In a move that caught the industry by surprise, the Guess Who have returned to a four man group. Kurt Winter and Don McDougall left the fold after the group's Houston date and Don Troiano now joins Burton Cummings, Gary Peterson and Bill Wallace.

Business manager Don Hunter advises that the Guess Who will now go into rehearsals with Troiano to prepare for their next album session to take place in July at Nimbus 9's Toronto studios. They hit the road again in August with dates at the Mid South Coliseum in Memphis (4), Wisconsin State Fair/Milwaukee (9), California State Fair/Sacramento (23), the Pacific National Exposition/Vancouver (25), Salt Palace/Salt Lake City (27), and the CNE/Toronto (31).

In view of the heavy radio play on the "Clap For The Wolfman" cut from the group's "Road Food" album, RCA have rush released the single with the title song on the flip. However, the single is unique in that there is no "A" side. Promotion will push for both sides.

FULL HOUSE OF ALBUM & SINGLE ACTIVITY FOR POLYDOR

Mark Hodes, national singles promotion for Polydor, reports strong radio/dealer action on several recent single releases including Jim Stafford's "My Girl Bill", "Werewolf" by the Five Man Electrical Band, and Don Goodwin's "Time To Cry".

On the album front, Max Gregor's "In The Mood For Hits Vol. II" and The Hotel Orchestra have picked up heavy pop radio play with resulting sales and more hope for the revival of the big band sounds.

Allan Katz, national director of advertising and promotion, begins a tour of the country with a bundle of hits under his arm. Already off and gaining market after market is the Bachman-Turner Overdrive single, "Takin' Care Of Business". Numbers are already registered on the charts at CKLW/Windsor, CKLC/Kingston, CHUM/Toronto, CKPT/Peterboro to name a few. Katz will be meeting with the GWG people in western Canada for a possible tie-in of a merchandise offer with BTO's recorded product.

Katz is also armed with a "just released" Canadian cover version of "Shang-A-Lang" by Tinker's Moon. The single is now topping the national chart in the UK. The Polydor single was produced in Montreal.

variances depend on his movement — the more he moves, the greater the heart rate.

For a night's performance Olympus averaged a recorded heart rate of from 140 to 150 "rising and falling according to the tempo and emotion of the tunes played". Of course, the more emotional the tune, the more heart response with quieter and softer tunes reducing the heart rates considerably.

It's also interesting to note that "as the time approached for any of the musicians to play a solo, the anticipatory reaction caused a notable heart rate acceleration — settling during the solo and receding sharply following it".

Group vocalising revealed very little stress. In fact their heart rates were close to normal when the group switched from an up-tempo tune to a soft country or blues number — indicating perhaps, the soothing effects of the tune itself.

Lead singer for Olympus, Connie Graham, is very active during her numbers and frequently reached heart rates of 170 to 180 dropping to 100 to 120 when she got into ballads and blues numbers. Percival points out that during Graham's rendition of "Me and Bobby McGee", she reached her maximum heart rate and held it for approximately 4½ minutes — the duration of the song. Her treatment of the song includes a scream resulting in a marked reaction on the electrocardiogram — "attributed to a combination of emotional involvement and physical effort".

Following the study on Olympus, Percival noted: "Because of the rather surprising but very apparent physical effort load, musicians can be classified as musical athletes. Therefore, their fitness levels, especially the condition of their heart/circulatory and oxygen supply systems, play an extremely important role in avoiding fatigue". He also has a plug for physical fitness — discovering that when members of Olympus became involved in fitness programs, they became less fatigued and reported having more zest and energy — used to advantage for rehearsals and actual performances. There was more of a relaxed feeling and less tension during performances.

A study of dancers — between the ages of eighteen and thirty, male and female, revealed that dancing to upbeat numbers resulted in heart rates as high as 180 or more but more within the 160 rate. Percival has been critical of young people and their one bad habit — no exercise. However, his study indicated that if dancers danced enough and with reasonable vigour, "they will get fit".

Moderate tempo numbers developed heart rates in the 120-130 range with slow blues or ballads creating heart rates in the 100-110 range. Following the dancing to the latter, heart rates made a notable drop "indicating the relaxing effect of moving to this kind of music". Dancing could prove beneficial to overweight people. Vigorous dancing indicated a stressful experience and, according to Percival "if done regularly, would be a painless way to get rid of excess weight".

Just listening also revealed that with upbeat music, listeners were physiologically stimulated. This indicated that listening to exciting and up tempo music "can be beneficial activity". Slow tunes produced low heart rates indicating the relaxing effects of this type of music.

Says Percival: "Parents who criticize their children for having the radio on when they're studying are perhaps making a mistake. This study indicates the relaxing and stimulating effects of music might be helpful. In fact,

parents should take this to heart and not only spend more time listening to music but do more dancing themselves".

Bagpipes and military bands were obviously used to inspire soldiers and would now appear to have a scientific basis. Says Percival: "I am currently investigating the various kinds of music which might be used in association with the conditioning of athletes for competition in order to fully motivate and activate them psychologically. On the other hand, the use of music which has proven to be relaxing could be used to soothe overly-anxious athletes before competitions".

Mixing music with exercise, Percival has created an exercise/dance program he has tagged "Rhythmics". A single, "Stop It Draggin'" and "Hippocrates", utilizing this theory (dance) will be released by Olympus shortly. Percival wrote the lyrics for both sides.

COLUMBIA LAUNCHES EXTENSIVE SALES & MERCHANDISING PRGM.

Columbia Records (Canada) will shortly launch a month-long contemporary music program tagged "Our Best Sellers Are Your Best Buys". Put together by the label's national merchandising director, Julian Rice, the program will focus on the current forty best sellers from Columbia and Epic — in album and tape format. Included in the campaign will be product from Loggins & Messina, King Biscuit Boy, Edgar Winter, The Hollies, Patsy Gallant and others.

A boost from the merchandising angle will come in the way of a special dealer incentive plan, illustrated dealer announcement mailings, large artist photos, customized multi-product radio spots, retail ad layouts, price-oriented wall posters as well as product inclusion in Columbia's newspaper supplements. There will also be multi-product television spots for local placement and national and trade print advertising.

It's expected that because of this highly concentrated campaign at the dealer level, sales for Columbia product could more than double that of the same time period a year ago.

NEW MacLELLAN MATERIAL AVAILABLE — BEECHWOOD

Gene MacLellan has been off the press scene for some time but, according to Beechwood's general manager, Joey Frechette, "Gene is alive, well and composing".

The publishing company has just recently received six new MacLellan compositions which Frechette is making available on a world scale. These are: "One With You", "Song To A Young Seagull", "I Believe In You", "When You're Not Around" and "Natural Born Friend". Of the six songs submitted, five are available to all artists for future recordings. However the sixth is being held for a possible future MacLellan recording.

MacLellan, this year, received a Special Award from BMI (Canada) for attaining one million performances of his "Put Your Hand In The Hand". The composition is now considered a gospel standard. This is the second such Award received by MacLellan from BMI. His first being "Snowbird", which launched Anne Murray into stardom.

The role of the promo man is changing

Ten or fifteen years ago, radio stations fought for exclusives and wanted to be the first of the lot to play a hit. The station that was the hitmaker (or breaker) was then usually the top station in the market. The

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make it or break it features on radio stations were the most popular and talked about.

In that strange system that is formula radio, the theory has changed (as it will change again in six months or a year) and newer more interesting theories will sweep radio-land like an epidemic.

Today, the tight playlist is being advocated and the followers of this system play only "proven hits". They often concentrate on the Top Ten (or fifteen) and their programming is based on sales and a sound that compliments the flow of the programming that is so sacred to the programmer.

PETERS' PRINCIPLE PROMOTION

This created a problem for the promo head who has been promoting records to CXYZ for years and isn't anxious to tell his men that the hits 'YZ are playing, and will play, are practically pre-determined by other markets. He, being a graduate of the Peters' Principle of Company Promotion (take that anyway you wish) tells his crew that CXYZ sells eighty percent of the singles in his region and the promo man MUST call on them every day or every hour or at least once a week.

CXYZ hasn't the heart to tell the record industry, for the thousandth time, that they don't break hits anymore and that promo men are routinely processed into the music director's office and out — effect, none.

If you've read this far, you are starting to wonder if we still need promotion managers and promo men. Well, WE DO. The job of the promotion man is even more important today than it has ever been.

CHAUFFEUR AND GO-FER

Aside from being the chauffeur for every foreign act that hits town (and a go-fer) the promo man has many other important things that he SHOULD do. He has to concern himself with the breaking of hits in the areas and then with the stations where the sales aren't as big, but the ultimate

reward is bigger. His is the job of finding those stations that will take a chance on a new record and give it a number. Now, it's his job to break records where the action starts so that CXYZ will eventually have to program the record.

WHERE THE SALES ARE

With the twenty or thirty authoritative charts at his disposal, the promo man knows exactly what records are breaking into the top one hundred. Believe it or not, many promo people in Canada, ignore chart entries because they are too busy working established hits — "That's where the sales are!"

I would like to see a record company STOP the sales of an established hit. Once it is going, you can practically sit back and watch the sales roll in.

If the promo people would study the chart and playlist adds in RPM carefully, they would find a great deal of initial action coming from smaller stations. Often, a hit is in the making and the promo people wait to see what will happen.

Before I go any further, I want to repeat what I wrote last week in this column. This series of columns is based on conversations with both promotion managers and promotion men.

RESERVICING & ADVERTISING

How often I have seen a record start in the smaller markets and work itself into bigger markets. Several times I have seen a record enter the RPM 100 and the promo man is dazed by the entry. Seldom do we hear that the record is being reservised, but we often ask the record company why they don't advertise the record because it is showing potential.

Over the years, RPM has too often been rebuked for suggesting that early action on a single deserves a reservice or an ad.

The blame certainly doesn't lie with the promo man who is "doing his job". It lies with the system which originates from the top of the record company and, unfortunately, in many cases, the problem is the thinking that was valid ten and fifteen years ago, but isn't worth a pinch of shit in the mid-seventies.

SUBSCRIBING FOR STATUS

It is my understanding that the RPM 100 means nothing to the radio stations and the record dealers. This, I am told, is the feeling of many in the record companies. Then, I would suggest to you that the record dealers who are paying the subscrip-

tion rate to RPM (and often the first class rate) are doing it for status reasons. I would also suggest that radio stations contributing to The Programmers section of RPM are doing it for nationalistic reasons.

Obviously there is room for improvement in the promotional attitude of the record companies and I can only refer back to what one of the most successful hitmakers of all times told me — "Everything helps". I was referring to a record that had started to get small station airplay in Canada. It went on to become a giant hit — internationally.

"Everything helps!"

YORKES RELOCATE IN SWITZERLAND

Ritchie Yorke, rock author and commentator, has completed his biography of Led Zeppelin and has moved to Switzerland with his family to begin work on a book on Van Morrison.

The Led Zeppelin Biography will be published this summer in the U.K. by Charisma Books and by various publishers in other markets. Yorke is credited with having been the first journalist to publicly predict the spectacular North American success of Zeppelin, and of another prominent British band, Yes.

The 90,000 word Zeppelin book will have a jacket designed by the highly-acclaimed English art director/designer, John Kosh, whose work includes the almost legendary Beatles' "Let It Be" package. Kosh is also designing the jacket for the Van Morrison book to be published later this year in Britain by Charisma.

Yorke said that The Led Zeppelin Biography may be the "authorized" version, "but not necessarily so." He said that the group and its management had co-operated in the researching of the book, and they are now examining the manuscript.

Yorke and his wife Annette, recently celebrated the birth of their second child, a boy named Christie Amadeus Carter Yorke. Prior to relocating in the U.K., the Yorkes had been based in Toronto.

Australian-born, Yorke has contributed to virtually every major rock publication during the past eight years. He was at one time a feature writer for Rolling Stone magazine, and has been a frequent contributor to the New Musical Express for the past seven years. Yorke is the subject of a forthcoming National Film Board documentary tentatively titled The Confessions of a Canadian Cultural Revolutionary.

A tribute to a very real visionary

WENGEN, Switzerland

Have you ever discovered within the contents of a book, a film, a play, a record, a TV program or even a conversation, certain facts or ideas which absolutely enthralled you beyond belief? I've had the good fortune to stumble upon a book which

literally blows my mind into new dimensions. Its influence has been so profound and so pervasive that I can scarcely believe it. I'm almost positive I'll never be the same again. I really mean it.

This incredible book was written by Francois Marie Arouet Voltaire and is entitled Philosophical Dictionary. It was first published in France 210 years ago in 1764 and is presently available as a paperback in the Penguin Classics series. Dare I suggest that it should not be missed at any cost, which to me was a mere 55 P. in London. It's quite likely the wisest 55 P. I've ever spent.

In our present usage (and if you'll pardon the observation, abuse) of the English language, the book's title is something of a misnomer. Philosophical Dictionary is not a dictionary according to contemporary meaning; it is rather a collection of superbly researched and composed essays on a wide-ranging spectrum of subjects. More than anything else I suppose, the book is about life and what it might ultimately mean and what a bogus conundrum the Christian and Jewish religions actually turn out to be in the cold glare of reason.

Some of you may be fortunate enough to have previously encountered the remarkable visionary writing of Voltaire and if so, I think you might consider yourselves among the blessed of this world. I must confess somewhat sadly that my own education was limited by the state's despicable desire to instill lies and propaganda into the minds and hearts of young children. But as George Orwell noted in 1984: "He who controls the past also controls the future". Our "free" society has long paid homage to that notion. So while we were flogged if we couldn't recall dubious allegorical incidents from The Bible, we were kept away from "dangerous and seditious" literature like Voltaire. Now I've read both works and there is no doubt which I find the most relevant and perceptive. You can guess for yourself.

According to its Penguin translator, Theodore Besterman, Philosophical Dictionary was "deliberately planned as a revolutionary book" which is a considerable understatement.

In those enlightened days when men were murdered for not bowing down to the church of love, it was not profitable to profess atheism or humanism. You believed in the Holy Ghost baby or you became wholly ghost yourself. Voltaire therefore was restricted from making any outright statements denouncing the possible myth of the trinity but nonetheless he carried the art of intellectual examination to some suitably delicate extremes.

Voltaire was virtually banished from France after two jail terms and when Philosophical Dictionary was published, he was exiled in Switzerland, a land which I am immensely proud to call our own present home. The mere presence of this little book among the possessions of a certain French chevalier Mr. La Barre contributed to his execution. Even the public prosecutor of Geneva (where Voltaire resided) when called upon by the city council to give his opinion of the book, described it as a "deplorable monument of the extent to which intelligence and erudition can be abused." The prosecutor also summoned up such comments as "baneful paradoxes", "indiscreet researches", "audacious criticism", "errors, malignity and indecency", "contagious poison", "temerarious, impious, scandalous, destructive of revelation". It came as no surprise to Voltaire — long a scathing commentator upon the often horrific history of the Catholic Church — that Philosophical Dictionary was duly included in the Holy Roman Empire's list of forbidden books.

Prior to the publication of the work in question, Voltaire had already secured for himself a permanent place in the history of mankind with three brilliant observations: "If God did not exist, it would be necessary to invent Him"; "The history of the great events of this world is scarcely more than the history of crimes" and "I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it."

Of course Voltaire is absolutely correct: nothing is more vital to the survival of our species than the freedom of every individual to say and write what he thinks. Voltaire could have worked wonders with a piece on Richard Nixon.

Within the pages of Philosophical Dictionary there are countless gems of perception guaranteed to astonish one. And although nothing can compare with your reading the

unexpurgated Penguin edition in toto, I'd like to throw a few brief excerpts in your path.

"For 2,000 years, people have declaimed in verse and prose against luxury, and have always loved it." (from the essay entitled *Luxury*).

"Human sacrifice was established among nearly all peoples, but was very seldom practised. Human sacrifice is very rare among the ancient Romans. In a word, very little blood was shed by the pagan religion, and ours has covered the earth with it. Ours is no doubt the only good, the only true one; but we have done so much evil by means of it that we should be modest when we talk about other religions." (*Religion*).

"So it is the human condition that to wish for the greatness of one's fatherland is to wish evil to one's neighbors. The citizen of the universe would be the man who wishes his country never to be either greater or smaller, richer or poorer." (*Fatherland*).

"Of all religions the Christian is undoubtedly that which should instill the greatest toleration, although so far the Christians have been the most intolerant of all men". (*Toleration*).

"Some theologians say that the divine emperor Marcus Aurelius was not virtuous, that he was an obstinate Stoic, who, not satisfied with commanding men, wanted also to be esteemed by them; that he benefited himself from the good he did to mankind; that all his life he was just, laborious, beneficent out of vanity, and that his virtues served only to dupe mankind. On which I exclaim: 'Dear God, give us often such rascals!'" (*Virtue*).

"An artist with a great deal of knowledge and taste, without prejudices and without envy, would be an excellent critic. That is hard to find." (*Criticism*).

Led Zeppelin's singer Robert Plant, in many ways a sensitive soul himself, once remarked that despite all the absurd hysteria surrounding the War Is Over campaign, John Lennon would have succeeded if he had convinced one person of the truth. I might draw a similar parallel myself. Of course I'd like to turn you on to Voltaire's Philosophical Dictionary, if only for the enlightenment it may bring you. And if I succeed in motivating a single individual to take such a step, my efforts have been most magnificently rewarded. Let me know.

I must strongly caution people who are either devout or orthodox Jewish that this book will probably provoke an angry reaction. Reason, reality and truth have always cut deepest. And in closing, a few words of Voltaire from an essay on Literature and Writers.

"The greatest misfortune of a writer is not perhaps to be the object of his colleagues' jealousy, the victim of intrigue, to be despised by the powerful of this world — it is to be judged by fools. Fools sometimes go far, especially when ineptitude is added to fanaticism, and vengefulness to ineptitude. It is also the great misfortune of writers that they usually stand alone.

"Every man in the public eye pays tribute to malignity, but he is compensated by cash and honors. The writer pays the same tribute without receiving anything; he has descended into the arena for his pleasure, he has condemned himself to the beasts."

BISHOP & GOOD NOISE LAUNCH SINGLE ACTION

MONTREAL — In ex-Wacker Randy Bishop, Good Noise may have found themselves a one way ticket to the top of the charts. Bishop, from the short exposure that I have had to his work in writing, producing and performing, is cut from the same mold as fellow Canadian residents Terry Jacks, Larry Evoy et al who have that uncanny knack of putting just enough syrup on the pancake to make it palatable to that salivating bottomless pit known as the Top 40 audience. More than anything else, it is a sixth sense for knowing what is going to keep sweaty little fingers away from radio dials while there song is playing.

On the opening night of Bishop's week-long engagement at the Hotel Nelson in Montreal, Good Noise held what has to be one of the most attended press receptions that I have seen in that city for quite some time. In fact, a later press release likened the assembled throng to a Saturday evening at Communications Eight.

It was not hard to pick out Bishop from the crowd. He was the one standing by himself off to one side while most of the guests treated the occasion as old home week. Only Juan Rodriguez of the Montreal Star actually made an attempt at cornering Bishop for an impromptu interview. (As a quick aside, the night before, Rodriguez had received an ovation from the capacity audience at the Place des Arts when James Brown stopped in the middle of his show and thanked Juan for his press support. After the show Rodriguez met Brown backstage and was given an inscribed pendant and rather expensive watch by Brown.)

Bishop is causing quite a stir in Montreal music circles at the moment. His new single "Don't You Worry" was added to the CKGM playlist the day that it was released, a rather unusual state of events for that station. The following day when all the playlists had been counted, it was revealed that every other English station in

NEW HAMPSHIRE SINGLE FROM A&M

Off the scene for some months, Keith Hampshire is ready to bounce back with a strong pop/rock ballad, "(Baby I Want To Be Yours) Forever and Ever". The song was written by Peggy Clinger and Johnny Cymbol. The latter had a hit with "Mr. Bass Man". The session was produced by Bill Misener at RCA's Toronto studios. Lyrics on the song were adjusted to fit in with the Canadian scene — a reference to Central Park was changed to park and from Tennessee to Calgary. A haunting mouth harp bit punches home the latter. A&M's director of A&R, Pete Beauchamp and publicity man, Charley Prevost are confident that a "ballady" Hampshire can move easily from pop into contemporary rock with what they feel is a typical offering for balanced programming.

Hampshire is still catching world attention with his "First Cut Is The Deepest" single which has become the number one chart item in South Africa. The single has also been released and found good sales in several other countries.

Initially, Hampshire hit with "Daytime, Night Time" which became a top chart item in Canada and made the U.S. trade charts as well. This single was released in Germany, Japan, South Africa and Australia and created a strong image for his follow-up singles.

At the Hotel Nelson, Bishop is breaking in his new act which consists of both English and French material. Bishop plays acoustic guitar and was supported by Jeff Statner on electric guitar and Marty Harris on electric bass. Bishop is very comfortable on stage and it shows. It was an easy laid back set with much to suggest that he is as proficient as a stage performer as he is on record.

We have covered Bishop's personal career and now it might be worthwhile to note that he plays a key role in the careers of a few other performers.

C'est Pas Le Jeu, co-written and produced by Bishop and sung by ex-CHOM-FM announcer Doug Pringle is currently very high on the powerful Radio-Mutuel chart in Quebec. Bishop's second French production entitled Romeo and Julianne sung by Anne Anderssen is also in the top five of the Radio-Mutuel and is scheduled for release in France, Japan and Italy. Ms. Anderssen plans on recording a new vocal in Italian for the latter country.

Collaborating with Bishop, she has another single ready plus she has finished her first English single, "Last Dance" which will be released next week. Both songs were produced by Bishop who has completed session work for several of his own singles and has begun work on his first French single.

A series of live appearances are being arranged across the country but in the meantime Good Noise is preparing a special colour videotape of Bishop which will be used for promotion purposes.

Many of the songs are original and only two by other artists.

Dick "Syncona" Smith, who heads up the firm describes their music as being "meant to be felt rather than analysed, participated in rather than viewed from a distance and be positive rather than focus on the fears and insecurities of the human condition.

Warmth, happiness and enjoyment describe the feelings we are trying to portray."

The Syncona group have been experiencing a full schedule of dates over the past few months including two weeks at Stop 33 of the Sutton Place in Toronto. They have also been successful with their dates with shopping plaza promotions — the most recent being the Don Mills Shopping Centre where they played a full week.

Upcoming is the Rochester Country Club, Rochester, N.Y. (22) and the Commerce Court, in Toronto, July 1st through August 2nd where they will perform during the noon hour. They have also been scheduled for the Caribana "Jump Up" parade (August 3) and that same evening will headline the show in the Ballroom of the King Edward Sheraton in Toronto.

Syncona's first entry into the business was through their single, "Wings Of A Dove" which received good pop programmer acceptance.

POLYDOR PROMOTING THE "LOST MUSIC OF TODAY"

With what many regard as an overabundance of "blah" music, it's interesting to note the concentration by Polydor on South American music. Released on the Barclay label, the series of albums and tapes brings front and centre "The Music of the Inca and the Aztec" which has been tagged as "The Lost Music of Today".

One of the most successful of these releases has been "El Condor Pasa" (40031) featuring the sound of the flute, an ancient South American instrument and found in many forms. These range from the Kena, a single-reed flute of the recorder family, to the Siku which consists of a double row of reed stalks, the first playing the melody, the second providing the tonal resonance. Also heard on many of the South American albums is the Indian harp — not a part of the harp family as we know it.

Now on release are albums by Los Chacos (mentioned above), Los Calchakis (40033), Les Guaranis (40057) and Facio Santillan (40003). The latter has played with both the Moscow and Chicago Symphony Orchestras.

In making his pitch to programmers, Allan Katz, director, promotion and advertising for Polydor refers to his South American releases as "an incredibly rich source of programming material".

Canadian International Talent in association with Axe Records is presenting a touring show featuring two of Canada's top recording acts, Gary & Dave and Jay Telfer. The tour is being set for September and October.

Everyday People start their east coast tour of the Atlantic Provinces from June 17th till August 17th.

CKFM TORONTO EXPANDS INTO NEW STUDIOS

Toronto radio station CKFM has just completed a \$250,000 expansion which includes new offices, an eight track recording studio and formation of an affiliated production company. The new offices are located at 24 St. Clair Avenue West.

The new affiliated production company, St. Clair Productions Ltd., has been created as a marketing tool for CKFM. In addition to in-house work, the new company will function as an independent production house for radio commercials. Talent for commercial productions will come in part from CKFM's on-air personalities, including Stu Daly, Phil MacKeller, Don Cameron, Russ Thompson, Carl Banas, Fred Napoli, Henry Shannon and Henry Morgan. St. Clair Productions is also producing radio programs for CKFM and for syndication to other stations. Some programs currently in production are: Gene Lees & Friends, Audio Ideas and a documentary series "Hour Toronto". CKFM has built a fully equipped eight-track recording studio called Roundhouse Sound Studio, to accommodate the new production load. To help run these new operations, James Applebaum and Peter Pacini, former owners of Agency Production Service, have been hired as producers. Gerry Bascombe is handling all program syndication.

Johnny Murphy will be leaving CHML on July 5th. He will be going back to VOCM, St. John's, Newfoundland as the Program Director. Taking his place at CHML will be Lynn Latimer. She has been with the station for a number of years, so appointment is well deserved.

Wayne Rostad, music director at Ottawa's country giant, CKBY-FM, always on the lookout for hits, playlisted "Fairytale" from the Pointer Sisters' album almost two months ago. Now, someone at the record company has decided the cut has country potential and is releasing it as a single. Here's another tip from Rostad — he smells hit in Jimmy C. Newman's "Lache Pas La Patate" on the Louisiana label. If you're interested the company is in Lafayette, Louisiana. It's been on the station's playlist for more than a month and is considered a heavy phone item.

Donn Reynolds, one of the original country stars in Canada, is now hosting his own two hour show (6-9AM) Saturdays on CHWO Oakville. The "Donn Reynolds Show" is 100% Canadian content and he would like record companies to make sure he is on their list to receive Canadian country, gospel, folk and bluegrass releases.

Kevin Kipping to CFOM Quebec City. He was formerly with CHOO Ajax and consid-

ed one of the most aggressive on-air personalities at the station. His bag at that time was — country.

Bill Albert, music director at CHSJ Saint John, N.B., is looking for comedy records.

Mike Godin moves from CFCF Montreal where he was looking after music director duties to CFOM Quebec City. Mike will be on the air during the afternoon drive (lots of rock). He'll also take on duties as music director at this aggressive English speaking station. He had been with CFCF for three years to the day (June 12) when he decided to move on.

CHEX Peterboro has discontinued its mass distribution of their chart for the summer months. A new format and design will be ready for the fall. The station will still continue to issue their Top 30 as compiled by Gary Brooks for interested parties.

CKPT Peterboro, in co-operation with a local store, namely Stop 322, are presenting Greaseball Boogie Band and Downchild Blues Band at the Memorial Centre July 12th. On their weekly phone forum the station is featuring local political candidates to give Peterborough residents a chance to ask questions about the upcoming Federal elections. Al Porteous and Ken Cassavoy are the hosts.

Again CKPT radio has been awarded the broadcast rights for the Peterborough Petes Junior A Hockey Club of the OHA. Sports director, Bill Bennett, will broadcast all home and away games for the fourth consecutive year.

Here's another station lending its power to make a hit out of a record. CKCL Truro, Nova Scotia has, according to a report from Condor Records, "given the no-no" to the Newman Sisters' new single, "Standing On The Promises". It has something to do with the lyrics. Meanwhile the single is becoming a national hit — rare for a country release and, if the word gets around, it could be a smash in Truro as well.

Note to programmers: there's a new 20th Century single just released, "Lord, Protect Me From My Friends" by Rockville Junction with the lyrics written by Vancouverite Joe Fahrni and published by True Confessions Music-BMI of Vancouver and co-published in the U.S. by Hit Brigade Music. Unfortunately the record does not qualify as Canadian (if Fahrni had written both the music and lyrics it would have two points). However, the record could stand on its own. Distribution is by GRT Canada.

The New Birth single, "Wildflower" does qualify for two points Canadian content. The music and lyrics were written by a Canadian. The single hasn't been released by RCA in Canada as yet but U.S. action could force a release.

CJVI WINDS UP VICTORIAN DAYS

CJVI Victoria has completed an extensive promotional campaign tied in to the city of Victoria's annual Victorian Days festivities. The station provided refreshments for participants in the Bikathon, as well as arranging for the giveaway of a Peugeot bicycle. Station staffers Ron Robinson, John Power and Michael Giles all completed the twenty five mile course, raising some three hundred dollars in the process.

CJVI, via its promotion van, eye in the sky plane and marine cruiser, also provided coverage of the Highland Games, Labatt's Bicycle Races and the Swiftsure sailboat race.

PELLETIER URGES DIVERSITY IN RADIO PROGRAMMING

Federal Communications Minister Gerard Pelletier has indicated agreement in practice, if not in principal, with CRTC Chairman Pierre Juneau's CBC policy.

Mr. Juneau has expressed a desire to rid the CBC of mass-audience programming concepts and "the North American merchandising system". In an address to the Canadian Association of Broadcasters annual convention, Mr. Pelletier said that Canadian broadcasters can no longer program to an anonymous, passive mass audience.

The minister felt this change in thinking is necessary due to the increasing number of broadcasting outlets, the advent of cable television and the resulting fragmentation of the audience. Mr. Pelletier said broadcasters are now faced with the challenge of serving smaller audiences with different needs.

As far as the CBC is concerned, the matter of a new policy will be taken to Mr. Pelletier (or successor) and Parliament if an agreement cannot be found between Mr. Juneau and CBC president Laurent Picard.

BARRIE CITIZENS AFTER FM OUTLET

Wilma Blokhuis, a reporter for the Orillia Daily Packet and Times, reports a growing interest in an FM radio station for Barrie. The city, about sixty miles north of Toronto, is considered a growth centre, with more than 100,000 people living within a thirty mile radius of the city — almost double that of ten years ago. It's expected that with the current rate of growth this area could triple in population over the next decade.

According to reporter Blokhuis, wheels have already been set in motion by a company incorporated as Media-Simcoe Ltd. An application has reportedly been submitted to the CRTC for an FM radio licence. The company proposes that "a 24 hour FM radio station be established in Barrie to broadcast programs designed to increase the participation of community citizens in both the present and future of the area".

The proposal has been put together by a steering committee of five: former Mayor, Les Cooke; Dr. Philip Melville, a psychiatrist with extensive experience in community services; David White, a lawyer with a background in community planning; Patricia Moffat, experienced in communications and community organizations; and Patrick O'Toole, a chartered accountant who covers the budgetary and financial fields.
