

RCA Quebec shows brighter gains


The year 1973 was considered a "bumper year" for RCA's Quebec branch and 1974 has shown indications of surpassing these "sales" figures. Distribution alone in 1973 tallied better than 500% and of the twenty-nine singles released, twenty made the Top Thirty charts in Quebec — thirteen of which were number one sellers.

Much of the success of La Compagnie Les Disques RCA Ltée., has been due the "hands off" policy set down by the Record Division's vice-president and general manager, R.F. (Bob) Cook. It was because of this policy that RCA Quebec began to develop regionally — using French Canadian knowledge, and it is now considered one of the most important cogs in the national scene for RCA. It wasn't too long ago that rumours persisted regarding the difficulty that RCA was having in Quebec. Studios, built specifically for RCA, were in trouble on the commercial and label front and there was a lack of quality product on the market.

AUTONOMY BREEDS SUCCESS

The picture has now changed and much of the credit goes to Yvan Deschenes, French A&R manager; Jean Desjardins, French sales and promotion manager and his staff, Loraine Cordeau, Bernard Charron and Denis Beaulé. The anchor man for the whole development stage is studio manager, Roger Belair, and his staff of engineers. It was the studios where the emphasis was placed on quality and out of this evolved the hits.

With the Quebec operation having complete

CAPAC PUBLISHES MILLS' BOOKLET

Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada (CAPAC) have published a guide to composers and publishers, written by John V. Mills, general manager of the Canadian Performance Rights Society. The booklet comprises English and French texts and is available to CAPAC members.

Entitled "You and The Music Business", Mills explains how Performance Rights Societies function, the method of payment by CAPAC to their composers and publishers, and publishers contracts. Also included are samples of songwriter contracts and a reprint of the CRTC AM Radio content regulations.

The booklet is designed to aid the young composer as well as the new publishers. Many of the points covered are answers to questions asked of CAPAC over the past seventeen years. Extra copies are available from CAPAC's Toronto headquarters.

In the foreword, Mills points up "the need for a simplified reference booklet which explains to new songwriters, composers, lyricists, and publishers, their rights — and steps they should take to ensure they receive the maximum financial return from their work and talent".

Mills concludes his foreword with: "This booklet, then, is dedicated to all Canadian songwriters, composers, and lyric writers. Through their talent and inspiration they are winning a world-wide reputation both for themselves and for their homeland".

RCA FIRMED AS TK DISTRIBUTOR

Contrary to reports appearing in the trade, RCA has definitely been established as having distribution rights to Henry Stone's TK label. On getting the final word, RCA rush released the initial single from the pacting, "Rock Your Baby" by George McCrae. The single is already a fast moving U.S. chart item and through early U.S. record service mailing to Canadian radio stations, has become a potentially powerful item in Canada as well.

RCA's pressing plant was busy getting the initial shipping of 50,000 pieces together. Biggest taker was the Quebec branch which accounted for the sale of more than 18,000 singles the first three days of release. A check of the local record stores revealed the single as being the second largest seller in Montreal.

Parts for McCrae's album have now been secured and a rush release situation exists here as well.

WATKINS/BUCK INTO PRODUCTION DEAL

Reg Watkins, well-known step-dancin' country singer, has just completed a studio session with Gary Buck. A single release, "The Badger Moose", written by Watkins and published through Broadland Music, is expected shortly.

Watkins established his country image throughout Ontario through his many bar dates boosted by the release of a single on the Snocan label, "Cam Canuck". He also figured prominently in the recent Newfoundland Toronto Island Festival (16) where he was picked by CBC-TV people for an interview because of his unique high-stepping stage performance. His Newfie day appearance also brought life back into his "Canuck" single which is again experiencing sales.

COLUMBIA SHIPS HARMS SINGLE

Dallas Harms, one of the bright young Canadian country hopefuls, enters the disc race with a new Columbia single, "Ruby's Lips". The Harms original was produced by Gary Buck at RCA's Toronto studios and mixed at Manta Sound.

The budget for this session (five sides) was considerably higher than past tapings with a big vocal background supplied by the Vern Kennedy Singers and some of the top musicians in the business including: Red Shea, John Arpin and Keith McKay.

Harms has just recently learned of the U.S. release of one of his compositions "Going Back To Dallas" by his wife Donna Ramsay. The single was released on the Universal Metromedia label. No release in Canada has been firmed at time of writing. Harms wrote this song over a year ago with Donna taping the session in January. There had been a hold up on the release because of a U.S. release of a record titled "Dalias, I'll Be Coming Home To You" which could have created some confusion.

Having just completed a date in Kirkland Lake, Ontario, Harms moves south to Thorold, Ontario for two weeks followed by two weeks (July 1-8) at Le Chalet in Galt. He has been tentatively set for a one niter (27) in the Brockville area for a Homeweek celebration and then returns to the Thorold Inn from July 29 through Aug. 5. He will play Toronto at Cousin Don's from Aug. 12 to the 19th.

COLUMBIA'S CHASE INTO COLONIAL

Columbia's Ontario branch hosted an opening night press party for Bill Chase and his group at Toronto's Colonial (17), an excellent showcase for the jazz/rock band that seemingly disappeared for almost two years. Their audience draw is typical of their music delivery. What they have to offer is "straight" down the middle easy to relate to entertainment - good fare for the college or university student who were much in evidence opening night. This was Chase's first Toronto appearance and he was given the red carpet promotion treatment by Columbia's Ontario promo rep, Terry McGee.

Chase is a former lead trumpet with Woody Herman, and he displays many of the Herd qualities. Repertoire for the show included cuts from his recent Epic album release, "Pure Music" as well as several selections to be contained on his next album - his fifth album release. **BM**

MAGGIE McFADZEN TO GRT ONT PROMO

Maggie McFadzen has been appointed to the position of Ontario promotion manager for GRT of Canada.

Prior to joining GRT, McFadzen was employed by CKSO Radio and Television in Sudbury. As well as music programmer for the FM department she also hosted two daily "live" programmes - one for the FM outlet and the other on television.

Moving into the southern Ontario region she joined the staff of CKOC Hamilton as copywriter and assisted music director

Nevin Grant. She was in on the beginning of the Maple Leaf System, giving a hand to Grant who served a term as Chairman.

Joining GRT as promotion co-ordinator just over two years ago McFadzen became a great asset to the promotion of GRT product, resulting in this promotion.

The above announcement was made by Jeff Burns, national promotion and A&R manager for GRT to whom McFadzen will report. The appointment takes effect immediately.

"BODINE" STRONG DECK FOR PROPHET

Latest Columbia single release by Orval Prophet, "Badger Bodine" has become one of his strongest entries in some time. The single, written by Lennie Seibert who released it as a single himself almost twenty years ago, was given the nod by Ted Daigle of CKBY-FM the Ottawa country giant and is showing early indications of catching at many other country stations. The flip, "Eastbound Highway" was written by Dick Damron.

Prophet has just come off the road but returns shortly for a date in North Bay followed by a July 1st appearance at the Formosa Brewery sponsored Festival in Barrie. He then fills dates at Carlton Place, Brockville, and Thunder Bay and joins Tommy Cash and Jean Sheppard for three days: London (18), Kitchener (19) and Ottawa (20). These dates were arranged by Shea Productions of Toronto and Calgary.

Recording the movie theme for "Johnny Canuck" has also been firmed for Prophet. He will tape this session during July. The movie is being scheduled for release late October or mid-November.

Exclusive coverage of Bowie show

It may have been music industry history when David Bowie sold out two shows at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre (16) — with little or no publicity or advertising. Both shows were full houses and scalpers were offering tickets at \$30, \$50 and \$100 outside the theatre. Top ticket price was \$8.80.

Credit should be given where credit is due. Larry Wilson, music news commentator for CHUM-FM was responsible for much of the success at the box office. It was during one of his evening patter on showbiz when he mentioned that Bowie was coming to Toronto. It was just a few days later when the O'Keefe had to post "sold out" notices — a good indication of the power of this station at that particular time.

With practically a full house of U25 (under twenty-five) Bowie fans and curiosity seekers, Bowie's show consisted of a concert production of his hits that flowed from one number to another with no time for applause, no identification of selections

CAPACITY FORUM FOR STAMPEDERS

What must have been the Stampeders' most important Toronto concert was that of the Forum (Ontario Place) June 13. A capacity audience of almost 14,000 jammed the seats and slopes of the Forum to watch and listen to one of the most popular groups in Canada — a popularity that has taken ten years to build.

The Toronto Star's Peter Goddard referred to the audience reaction as "It was like 1964 all over again". Little girls were screaming and wetting their pants, while the older ones were lighting matches, flares and whatever. Wrote Goddard: "It was this innocence about the whole event that made it so appealing".

Mel Shaw, manager of the Stampeders, must have had a feeling about the concert, their last date before going into studios for their next album session. He arranged for a "live" recording of segments of the concert which will be worked into their album, to be released mid-August to coincide with the group's major U.S. tour.

Most recent single release by the Stampeders, "Me & My Stone" which is included on their "From The Fire" album, made good chart gains in Canada and secured a fair rating among the FM progressives in the U.S. Stampeders' product is released in the U.S. on the Capitol label.

MCA PUSHES ANDERSON DURING CAVE SHOWING

MCA Records, distributors of the soundtrack "Jesus Christ Superstar", pulled all stops during the recent Vancouver appearance of Carl Anderson who played Judas in the long-running movie. Anderson was originally booked into the downtown Cave for a two week stint, but was held over for an additional week in response to very heavy attendance.

MCA's Barry Ryman arranged for a variety of interviews and public appearances by Anderson, including a CBC TV spot with Chuck Davis, a phone interview with Len Theusen of CHED, Edmonton, interviews on local rocker CKLG, a special appearance at a performance of "Jesus Christ Superstar" and an appearance at Children's Day at the Pacific National Exhibition.

POLYDOR OFF WITH "SHANG" COVER

Frank Gould, director of A&R for Polydor, has rush released "Shang-A-Lang" (Polydor 2065 234) by the Montreal-based Tinker's Moon. The single, by the Bay City Rollers, is currently a runaway hit in the UK and Polydor is confident that their cover version, produced by Ben Kaye and qualifying as two parts Canadian content, will become a major contender for the charts in Canada. Says Gould: "This should be a very big hit, and to me this version is far more suited to the North American market than the original".

Polydor's promotion and sales team are now preparing a major nationwide campaign to bring the Moon single home.

coloured as were many of their faces. But Bowie stole the show with a package that not too many in the audience expected to see. Lighting was abundant, and the sets were unusual for a rock show — hopefully a beginning. The sets consisted of a catwalk, five stories above the O'Keefe stage which lowered Bowie to stage level while singing "Sweet Things". Another effective set was a giant crane, topped with a plush chair that swung Bowie down and out over the first row, while he was singing "Space Oddity" through a telephone mike. One of the most dazzling sets was the Bowie space capsule. He first appeared on top of the capsule singing "Big Brother" and then disappeared inside to emerge from the capsule which opened out into a mirrored room, complete with black lighting and a ramp, in the shape of a hand, bordered with flashing lights, that folded out onto the stage.

Dazzling???? — yes. In this, his comeback, after a short retirement, Bowie will either stay to become a legend of the music business or die off quickly. There is every indication however, that Bowie and his kind will bring performance back to the music industry. His success in the U.K. could very well be repeated here and create the right bandwagon to snowball him into being one of the brightest new stars in the business.

One disturbing note — it was a tired Bowie, suffering from throat discomfort and with such a hectic tour, just beginning, he could fall prey to fatigue — a disaster on such an important tour.

In view of the fact that most of the audience was not used to the O'Keefe Centre, it should be said that the sets, lighting and production were not up to the usual calibre expected at this theatre. The sets were somewhat spit and pasty, the lighting was a lot to do about nothing and the gimmicks were tired and not well done. The choreography was amateurish, giving Bowie a gawky unprofessional appearance although we understand he had the best of professional assistance at his command. The show wouldn't pass for theatregoers but for Bowie fans — the show was well worth the money. Interesting though, Bowie alone on stage accompanying himself on guitar would have kept this audience happy.

Bowie is following in the footsteps of the Beatles and Presley and his current chart action could be a contributing factor to his success. Airplay for a great deal of his material is another question. — W.G.

No one can argue with the fact that there are many records produced in Canada, and that many of them sell well over 100,000 copies. Record companies ARE spending a great deal on Canadian record production.

One company can quote astonishing figures to you, but the fact is they are talking

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production money of record companies is being funneled into that area.

You can't argue with the fact that foreign-owned record companies have the right to pick and choose where their monies should be invested and the French-Canadian market is both successful, a money maker and a chance for foreign companies to show their corporative citizenship.

So, as much as the nationalistic argument is eliminated by this, so is the argument by radio stations that more product should be released in Canada. The record company can say they would do as much in English Canada if they saw the same results. Budgets would increase if the sale and the success of records equalled that of the French-Canadian market.

Is there a solution or any means by which some light could be shed on the problem? Eighty years ago, the United States got a head start on the record business. Until

ten years ago, there was little done in Canada to catch up. English language hits come from the U.K. and United States, and English Canada must compete with the hits and the information that comes into Canada as part of the great international star system. England was able to conquer the music world ten years ago, and is still taking their share.

What we can do and must do to catch up is still a mystery to Canadians. Unfortunately we compete in the same language as the Americans. The French-Canadian industry is insulated against both the English hits and the trade propaganda that crosses the border. In a similar situation, English Canada would probably enjoy the same results.

If there is a solution to this problem, it lies in the hands of programmers to come up with an answer. We doubt very much if the programmers across Canada would program French-Canadian hits, and the lack of English Canadian records is a genuine one... with no relief in sight.

MORE FOR THE AUDIENCE — PROGRAMMERS!!!

There are three ingredients of successful programmers (in my not so humble opinion).

1. A good mechanic. Mapping out and over-seeing a strong format. The placement of ingredients if you wish.

2. Some creative ability in a general sense. Even one who recognizes and uses his staff creativity fits this category.

3. An administrator.

In this huge country with its uncluttered radio scene, we have too little creativity. Creativity isn't necessarily a constant stream of witty bits — or announcers who announce the lovely weather in a different manner six times per hour, or a music director who picks the hits creatively by reading Billboard, Cash Box, Record World, The Radio Report and RPM (not necessarily in that order). Creativity is working on an Idea. Reconstructing the idea of your station and market.

Eastern programmers look at Vancouver as the Talk radio centre of Canada. Maybe so, but is it creative talk radio. Someone, sometime decided to have a talk show. It worked and was worked on, until honed. Then others got into the act, some won, some lost that rating battle in the sky. What happened in our beautiful west coast city? One programmer stole the other's host, and then another programmer stole him and so on. Creativity, NUTS!

But let's not single out the west, or the east.

Let's single out radio. Radio is to blame. Sell time, play music, make money (hopefully) read news and talk about the school play that's coming up. You really want to know who the most creative group of radio people are — salesmen. What creativity they have to put into their pitches to sell the very valuable time.

It's time we got off our butts and gave our audiences more. We are all fighting the rating battle and the time sales battle. We all must move forward with caution, but not blind faith in the machine.

I am not in accord with the CRTC on many, many points. But maybe we should read between the lines. What are we doing as individual stations for our community. Not how good that layover was.

Programmers go to another city, listen to the radio, copy down the format (mechanics) and go away feeling they have solved the puzzle. How many listen to the jock? What's he saying, even if he says it in six seconds? What's the makeup of the news, (local, national and international) and I could go on.

If it's only the mechanical movement of the hour that really matters — I'll help solve your wishes. Drop a note and I'll send the clocks for loads of biggies. I'll even enclose a "Lots of Luck" card.

It's going to take time, you can't do it overnight, but we in radio can create a super sound that entertains and informs. A sound that can't be transplanted overnight in another city — because it's your city.

'Nuff said, keep those cards and letters comin'!



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

**MUCH MORE MUSIC
NEWS IN REVAMPING RPM**

Over the past three weeks, RPM has been slowly revamped to contain more news. Our 24 page format has been tightened considerably and the revamping will continue.

Elton John has renewed his recording contract with MCA. The firming took place in London and was negotiated with the artist's manager John Redd.

John's five years with MCA has seen him achieve six Gold and four Platinum albums in the U.S. and three Gold and four Platinum in Canada.

He is currently represented on the U.S. charts with two gold albums "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" and "Don't Shoot Me I'm Only The Piano Player" as well as a gold single "Benjie And The Jets".



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

Distribution for the Atlantic Provinces is now being negotiated. ACA will look after promotion for the province of Ontario.

BIG WHEEL SINGLE FOR BILLY STOLTZ

The big country voice of Billy Stoltz is getting into gear once again. This time his vehicle is a Stoltz original, "I'm Hurting Inside" published by Intersong Music-CAPAC.

Stoltz is no stranger to the recording scene. In fact it was because of his record activity that he decided to get into the production business himself flying the banner of Big

Wheel Records. He formed his company while living in Montreal but decided, a few years ago, to settle in Calgary.

A self-taught musician from Kelowna, B.C. Stoltz hit the country road at the age of fourteen, playing dates in the interior of B.C. and parts of Alberta. His lengthy stand at the Calgary Stampede (each year from 1951 through 1957) brought him into prominence as a country star resulting in him being coupled with shows starring some of the big U.S. country names including Patsy Cline, Porter Wagoner, Ferlin Husky and Canada's Hank Snow.

The new Stoltz single, a ballady effort, reveals a "new sound" and one that will be promoted to pop programmers as well as country. Distribution for Big Wheel is handled by the Vancouver-based Rada Pressing. The record qualifies as Canadian content (MAPL).

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Pity the poor man with Weltschmerz

LONDON

I have been stricken with Weltschmerz. It is a most unpleasant malady which affects the mind, the body and the spirit. I've been suffering from it, in varying intensities, for several years but it was only the other day that I finally discovered the word which

amply describes the condition. Weltschmerz; I like the gutsy sound of it. Onomatopoeia, I believe, is the technical tag for words which sound like they mean, the multi-media barrage like crisp, crackle, pop, hush, piss.

London, we have fiercely believed through those most recent years, was the only liveable city around. It was calm, civilized, a trifle less ugly than its various contemporaries, a slice or two above the abominable urban norm. It just depends on your perspective — some people love cities, some people hate them. The tragedy of our great society is that only a handful of people have any choice in the matter.

We have long felt the pulse of rural blood in our veins but the city was where the action was. So there we were, not infrequently wondering what were the advantages which prompted our encampment on the slopes of the urban ruin. There really isn't a lot of good vibes in the city for people who don't like to drive autos; who detest supermarkets, bars, bowling alleys, high-rises and the neon jungle; whose hearts often ponder visions of other, pre-Industrial times when quality was a word which had no connection with quantity. It's all a matter of taste I suppose . . . sensitivity being a rare and precious possession in this plastic, Plutonian world of ours.

But there was always dear old London. She was different, a bit dignified if you like, a haven in the soul-soaking storm, some semblance of tranquillity for those inflicted by the dreaded Weltschmerz. Times have changed, haven't they? That's the way London used to be but sadly, is no longer. Although it may still be some sort of Utopia when compared with New York, most of the old charm has gone. We all seem to be learning that nothing remains the same: it simply keeps on getting worse and the only real question that remains is just how long it will all hold together. When a town like London hits the bottom, you begin to realize that the answer is not much longer.

It's not just the superficial aspects of contemporary London — the daily bomb attacks on stores, bars and cinemas, the tanks surrounding Heathrow Airport, the recent power cuts and the shocking state of regularity in the public transport system. Those irritations are more than sufficient to invoke one's wrath but worse still is this horrible oppressiveness, a weird feeling of tightening claustrophobia compounded by filthy, petrol-fumed air, rampant contagious diseases, footpaths clogged with huge guard-dog turds and a media shrivelled into a vision of World War II nostalgia.

This is a country which was once great but is no longer, and simply cannot get to grips with the fact. It hurts me to have to point that out but it's a reality — as, indeed, is the continuing, disastrous pre-occupation with economic progress at any cost. The politicians here are mentally unable to grasp the indisputable evidence that what has already happened to North America is also well underway on home soil. North Sea oil will save all is their creed. It isn't even funny anymore.

The evidence is all around you. Our daughter Samantha, not yet three, a sturdy young lady of forceful temperament and an iron constitution, has not stopped coughing since our arrival here in November. There have been nights in recent memory of uncontrollable coughing bouts which persisted for several hours.

Samantha attends a nearby West Hampstead nursery school (the clientele of which is predominantly the offspring of Embassy staff) where she has learnt how to punch, bit and pinch, fire imaginary guns, and spit on the floor. Great stuff.

In the past week or so, all of us have been down with the flu, an especially vicious virus now circulating freely in the subways and buses.

Poor old Annie, flu-bound and unable to shake a nagging cough, went to hospital to have a baby (just for the record, it was a boy named Christie Amadeus Carter). At least that event was comparative smooth-sailing — now though I'm wondering when the baby's lungs will be poisoned by this London air.

Other friends with young children report the same nightly coughing sessions, and they too are told by their doctors that it's all quite normal and nothing to worry about. It happens to every kid — if they happen to live in these urban disaster areas of the mid-70's. Increasingly larger amounts of news-

paper space and broadcast time are being given over to the widely-held scientific view that ours will be the last generation to live out a natural life span on what remains of this Earth. Our children must suffer — just as we are now suffering — the excesses and indulgences of previous generations which have set this society on a collision course with Doomsday. The only difference between us and our children is that the new generation is getting an earlier dose of the industrial suicide reality that surrounds us.

George Orwell's 1984 has been and gone and anyone who doubts it should simply peruse the last 50 issues of Time magazine.

But there's not much use merely complaining about it. Action is what matters. We know from the ghastly experiences of the last decade that we are absolutely unable to change it. You either accept it or escape it. We've chosen the latter path, principally because we've finally arrived at the conclusion that nothing is worth the nightmare of big-city living in this age.

In a few days we're off to Switzerland for at least a couple of months. We've rented a chalet 5,000 feet up in the Alps, miles from where the roads end and where the world as it's used to be, begins. We want some pure air, fresh food, clear unpolluted vision, a little peace and quiet. I've got this book to write on Van Morrison and we'd like to choke off the coughs. I know now it's going to be hard to ever return to any city for more than a brief stay. And so be it. There's no point in flogging a dead horse. No more can the few rare joys of big city life outweigh the staggering mass of urban ugliness. London, our last bastion of acceptable city living, has gone down the drain and we're moving out.

So it must be for all of us stricken with Weltschmerz. Not too much longer now before this Wanderjahre draw to a close.

autonomy with recording, production, pressing, promotion, distribution, sales etc., it was only natural that RCA's publishing houses (Sunbury/Dunbar) should receive a shot in the arm. A heavy concentration by this division has resulted into its development as one of the leading publishing companies in Quebec province.

ARTIST ROSTER INCREASES

Some of the artists involved in the development of 1973 continue to grow in 1974. Michel Pagliaro was the leader in his field in 1973 and made it with "J'entends Frapper" which was tagged "Quebec's hit of the year". This single also made good gains in English Canada with Gary Parr of CKLC Kingston (now of CFOM Quebec) being the first to break the single in a "breakout market". Pagliaro's follow-up, "Fou De Toi" was another big hit and this was followed by the release of his album, "Pag". Pagliaro writes his own material. He is also involved with The Rockers, a rock group that topped the Quebec charts with their RCA single "Miss Ann".

A voice from the past, Pierre Lalonde, and one most respected in English Canada as well as in Quebec, signed an exclusive contract with RCA in 1973 and marked his return to the recording scene with two chart items, "Honey, Honey" and "Amoureux" as well as an album.

Regarded as "Quebec's phenomenon" for the year 1973 was Patrick Norman — "a new chanteur with a fine, powerful voice". He released three singles — all of which became number one hits. They were: "Mon Coeur est a Toi", "D'ou tu Viennes" and "Pou un Instant D'amour". His album gained even new followers with his experimenting with the country field. As well as the Quebec market, Norman has had an eye on the international market. He recorded the theme from "Papillon" in French, English, Italian and Spanish, all showing good returns.

Francois Vaillant is another writer/stylist from Quebec that brought attention to RCA. His contract renewal in 1973 resulted in

GRT'S NAT'L PROMO ORGANIZED BY BURNS

Jeff Burns, national promotion manager and A&R manager for GRT of Canada, has recently completed the organizing of several national promotion systems with their distributors across western Canada.

As well, he called on many of the major centres across Canada touting GRT's latest Canadian content releases by: Ian Thomas, Lighthouse, and the recently released Everyday People album.

Burns also set up a system whereby radio station and press people would be supplied with record product and bio material of GRT artists directly through their local distributor rather than through head office.

GRT product is handled through the west by Emerson Sales/Vancouver (Jean Leskiw, Monica Netpusky), Taylor, Pearson & Carson/Calgary (Peter Morch), and Laurel Record Distributors/Winnipeg (Glen Gore-Smith).

Burns will be setting up a similar system for the province of Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces. The latter through Ted Evans in Amherst, Nova Scotia and in Montreal through Ken Dion and Danielle Yvon.

his "C'est Aujourd'hui" becoming a top chart item and seller in Quebec.

FRENCH INT'L IMAGE GROWS

RCA's French International artists also figured prominently in the development of the RCA image in Quebec. Probably one of the most important of these artists was Vicky. She also became a giant with pop programmers in English Canada, much of this success came about through the efforts of CFRB's music director Arthur Collins. In Quebec, Vicky topped the popularity polls with both AM and FM programmers with "Chante Bouzouki", chalking up impressive sales with her album, under the same title, which followed.

Joe Dassin was another big name that fared well in Quebec. He made it with "Le Moustique", a hot summer hit followed by his album, "Joe" and another hit single, "Salut Les Amoureux".

Roger Whittaker also entered the winner's circle. His vehicle was a number one song, "Une Rose Pour Isabelle".

Exclusive signings to RCA Quebec included those by Michel Polnareff and a new French star Christian Delagrangé. The latter toured Quebec for twelve days and pulled capacity houses. Dick Rivers released both a single and album. "Si elle te disait oui" which was the result of his signing to RCA the latter part of last year.

A VERY UNIQUE MARKET

How unique is Quebec? Most English Canadian producers and record companies are envious of the success pattern by that of Quebec artists. Their culture, one they are striving to retain, allows for the development of their own stars. Quebec does have its own "star system" which evolved from a successful recording industry — probably the only industry in which they have been successful. They guard their industry against outsiders. French is the recognized language. They want to run their industry as their own — and who can argue with success? RCA's Cook became aware of this Quebecois attitude — granted RCA Quebec complete autonomy and now reads a healthy bottom line.

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Window display will sell

Any time a poorly produced but nicely packaged album came into RPM, it would be referred to as "Window display will sell".

In other words, you would buy it if you

saw it, but don't listen to it.

The problem of promoting albums has confronted the promo group for years and there have been many schemes and attempts made to introduce a new sound or a new album to the public. Every means has been used and in some cases . . . there has been success.

NO FORMULA FOR AIRING LPs

During a Communication meeting in Toronto, Bill Gavin brought up the subject at lunch. He mentioned that format radio had never come up with a format for programming albums and album cuts that had proven successful.

This still seems to be a challenge to programmers.

In years gone by, a hit would motivate an album into the top of the LP charts. The album that followed up the hit brought in new buyers and extra sales came from purchasers of the single who also wanted the album.

ALBUM FOLLOWS HIT SINGLE

This process was practically automatic and the consumer expected the album to follow the hit single.

With the advent of the sub-culture and underground radio in the late sixties FM play could sell albums and personal appearances created cults that bought albums by artists who weren't nationally known by a hit but were being bought by followers of the sound, the philosophy or the reputation of the group or artist.

FREE FORM ON FM

FM radio still continues to play albums by unknowns because the free form of FM allows disc jockeys to search out new and interesting sounds for their audiences and followers, and record sales can result.

What can the promo man do to bring an album to the attention of the public?

GETTING TO THE CONSUMER

Consumer publications are being used to bring the release of an album to the attention

of the public. Usually the artist is known and the buyer is waiting for the album. Television and radio advertisements for new product can be used in the same situation.

Ultimately the promo team want airplay on the album, on-air mentions of the album, good newspaper reviews of the album . . . in other words exposure from the media that the album is available and a good product and the play of some of the better cuts on the air. The sound goes out right to the potential buyer . . . the radio listener . . . a select audience which has been created by a radio station and their format.

Promo copies are sold to radio stations at a promotional rate. Some are sent out free to important radio stations and newspaper reviewers. The promo team's list of who can do what for the album is very important.

PROMO COPIES A BARGAIN

Many stations can't understand why they can't get a copy of every album free. Forgetting the cost of the product, the shipping costs alone practically eat up the nominal charge that most record companies place on their album product. The charge might really be there as a safeguard to find out who really wants the album. The record company sees little if any profit from selling a promo copy to a radio station at \$1.50. In other words, "Do you really want it?"

Thinking about the programming value of

H.P. RIOT READING CANCON PRODUCTION

H.P. Riot, originally from San Francisco and now residing in Vancouver, will shortly enter Century 21 Studios in Winnipeg to tape a session using Canadian compositions. An expected "A" side is "You Were Made For Me", written by Paul Gross. An old Motherlode single, "When I Die" will also be recorded for use as a possible flip side. Brian Young will produce.

ten albums (really wanted) which constitute 100 selections. The cost would be \$15. Nowhere in the world could you ever experience a better bargain. Strange, that radio stations aren't often made aware of this. Strange, that radio stations will accept free LPs that fill their shelves with useless material and aren't more selective in what they want, and order only what they want to play and can find easily.

2000 WELL CATALOGUED LPs

It would be better for a radio station to have 2000 well catalogued LPs that are programmatic than 10,000 LPs that have very little air value but didn't cost anything. The system of buy what you want is a sound one that is an advantage to all radio stations.

How often a radio station that would seldom program country records, will automatically be shipped every country record, while a station that does program country is being shipped every rock and pop LP.

BUY A BETTER BILLBOARD

Record companies have bought billboards to advertise their wares, but one of the best points of sale is the record store window that can often be had just if the record company will pay to have it decorated tastefully. Too often the record company will throw a lot of covers into a window that have no meaning and walk down the street to rent a billboard that every car driver will see . . . but how many record buyers will turn the car around to stop at the nearest record store and buy the record.

Get 'em where they are . . . right in front of the record store about to walk in. Make sure they see a good window display of your record and walk in and buy it. In that case . . . "Window display WILL sell!"



The power of the on-air personality

While the theory of playing proven records has been established, there is always the chance that today's radio can find a way to bring the audience something new, excit-

ing and unproven. The key to this might be in the presentation.

What can you do to make the audience sit up and listen to what you are about to do or say or even play?

KEEP 'EM HANGING

One of the most successful disc jockeys in the United States once told me that he will promo a new record for two hours before he plays it. The audience would stay with him just to hear what he was talking about. Usually the record was something that had shown early and good action . . . but still wasn't proven. After he played the record, he became very excited with what he had

just done and promised the audience they would be lucky enough to hear it again in the next hour if they stayed tuned.

Not only was he a hitmaker, but the audience was allowed to participate in the adventure of discovering a new sound and a new record.

Participation is very important to radio and a few years ago it was all but non-existent. Today, more and more on-air personalities are asking their audiences for news tips, comments and requests and are creating excitement in listening.

DISCOVERING YOUR AUDIENCE

On-air personalities should be encouraged to find themselves and discover their audience. Let's just consider a radio station that tapes a lot of phone-ins with the personality talking to the audience, using them generously even between each record. The

listener is then brought into the programming to the point where he is sharing the airwaves with the on-air personality. Add to this the communication the jock experiences with the listener and the formula could be very interesting.

The conversation could centre around what the listener likes of the current records. His reaction to a recent personal appearance of a name artist, a topic subject of the day (even a news item) or just the weather outside.

TALK ON RADIO


In my travels, I've heard jocks do just this and some have done it very well. The listener can very often be interesting and bring out a great deal of the jock himself.

At C8 Marshall McLuhan talked about the success of television talk shows. Obviously people like to listen in on other people's conversations. This technique could be modified to fit radio and the telephone could be the medium.

Keep it short, keep it current and keep it interesting. Lead the conversation right into music.

Radio is many things to many people . . . and always a friend.

RADIO/TV AWARDS FOR CONESTOGA STUDENTS

Jack Walker, Bill Kinsman and David Baker, students in the Radio and Television Arts Program at Conestoga College (Kitchener) have each won \$250.00 in awards — supplied by the Canadian radio, cable and television community.

Walker was honoured with the CHYM "Best Announcer" Award, adjudicated by CHYM personnel. He will be working with the CBC (Toronto) over the summer months but will return to Conestoga in September to complete the three year program. Last year's CHYM Award was won by David Wolfe, now a member of the full-time announce staff at CHYM.

The Grand River Cable Television Award for the "Best News Story" went to Kinsman. His subject — Ronald Lippert, of Kitchener, released from a Cuban jail and returned to Canada. The Kinsman material recorded in his interview with Lippert headlined the CTV news — giving it national and international coverage. Kinsman is a graduate from Carlton University. He has just completed a working holiday in Los Angeles, filing stories on the Patty Hearst case.

To Baker, went the Central Ontario Television Broadcaster of the Year Award. He submitted videotape highlights of the CFL game — produced by him as a class activity; audio-tape presentations of his on-air work in radio; and a sales presentation put together for the Student Awards Program at the Doon Centre. Baker was one of six Conestoga students hired by the CBC for summer employment. He will return to Conestoga in the fall. Winner of this Award last year, George Hoff, is now co-ordinator of services for Contemporary News, part of the CHUM Group, supplying voice news clips to radio stations.

Formal presentations of the Awards will be made in September.

CHSR FREDERICTON HOSTS COFY PROJECT

Fredericton's student radio station CHSR will host an Opportunities for Youth Project over the summer months. Known as "Radio COFY", the project will allow for the employment of twelve students during June, July and August. Purpose of the project is to give high school graduates and under-graduates the opportunity to become involved in radio broadcasting — news preparation, sports remotes, on-air techniques, record library organization etc.

Additional funding from an anonymous business firm will allow the participants to "earn while they learn".

Co-ordinator and founder of the project, CHSR summer director Maurice Latouche, has arranged weekly seminars with radio personalities relating some of their experiences in the business. Firmed speaker is Michael A. Plourde, a graduate from a U.S. broadcasting school, who will speak on "Government Red Tape (and control) in Radio Broadcasting".

One of the plus factors for the station will be the extra help, provided by the project, to number, catalogue and computerize their collection of more than 8500 45s.
