RPM's Communication Nine meet (C9) gathered together more than 200 people in Vancouver for the two day meet. This is how it all took place.

On Thursday and Friday, Vancouver's hotels were getting the message. By Saturday morning, the Bayshore Inn was fully booked and there were no further accommodations. Even at other hotels, rooms were at a premium.

Many of the C9 registrants were invited to a showcasing at the Regency Hyatt that was part of a two day Columbia Records Sales meeting. Columbia showcased Myles and Lenny, Bond, Murray McLauchlan and Lick 'n' Stick. The showcase ended at 1:30AM.

Saturday morning at 9AM RPM served coffee in the foyer of the Bayshore Inn's Thompson MacKenzie Room. Registrants lined up to pick up their name tags and to finalize late registrations. At 10AM Walt Grealis brought the meeting to order and announced that in view of the Canadian-Russian hockey game, the meeting would break early for lunch at 11 o'clock and resume at 2PM at which time the speakers would work through with no interruptions. The meeting opened with John Mills of CAPAC who spoke on the importance of copyright and performance rights.

After his speech, the meeting adjourned for the early lunch break (and hockey game) and resumed at 2 o'clock. Record World publisher Bob Austin spoke on charts and how they are compiled.

THE WEST IS GETTING EVEN WILDER!

APRIL WINE'S "LIVE" GAINS NATIONALLY

An initial shipping of over 25,000 units of "April Wine Live" (AQR 505), followed by a steady flow of re-orders has resulted in the fastest selling product yet in the history of Aquarius Records. National reports from retailers affirm reports of across-the-board success.

Much Productions granted permission to Aquarius Records to proceed with the "Live" session, taken from the Electric Adventure Tour in 1974. Gene Cornish and Dino Danelli, formerly of The Raspals, directed the recording in Halifax at the Q.E.H. Auditorium and Dave Palmer of Electric Lady Studios in New York, engineered the session. Fedco Studios provided a mobile recording unit that had been used on remotes for the Filmore Theatre. The album's master was taken to New York for mixing at Electric Lady Studios.

In keeping with the mutual promotion of the album and trans Canada tour, Electric Adventure, the "Live" album cover was taken from a full colour poster used to promote the concert appearances. Radio ads for the tour dates were coupled with simultaneous record ads and retailers found that album stock was clearing in spite of heavy advance orders even before the group arrived in town. Television and radio spots were also produced to follow

SLAIGHT JOINS WEA'S ARTISTS RELATIONS

WEA Music Canada's national promotion manager, Larry Green, has announced the appointment of Gary Slaight to the label's promotion department at head office in Toronto. Slaight leaves Quality Records of Canada for his new position which will include responsibility for all artist relations duties in Ontario as well as the servicing of product and liaison with the print media.

In formalizing the appointment, Green, who will be Slaight's immediate supervisor, said: "We are most happy to have as talented a person as Gary join us at WEA. He has made major gains in the Canadian music industry to date, and I see both he and WEA Music benefiting from this appointment".

CHRISTENSON BROTHERS TO SHAW'S ORION LABEL

Stamperders' manager, Mel Shaw, has firmed a recording contract between his Orion label and the Christenson Brothers. The single, to be released within the next few weeks, will be distributed by Quality. Both sides of the single, "Goodbye Old Man" and "In Peaceful Times", were penned by Terry Christenson, leader of the group.

The country rock band has just completed an appearance with Tommy Cash and Jeannie Shepherd on a country package that played several dates in Ontario.

Shaw is presently negotiating dates for the Ian Tyson and George Hamilton IV TVers and has already scheduled important engagements for the upcoming months.

The Christenson Brothers comprise Terry and Peter with backing supplied by Paul Armstrong on electric bass and Mike Blackwell on percussion. The brothers each play acoustic and electric guitars with Peter doubling on piano, slide guitar, mandolin and harmonica. Both the brothers have been writing for some time and, along with well-established compositions by other artists, are including their own original material in performances.

CBC TO TELEVISION JUNO AWARDS IN MARCH '75

The Juno Awards are to be televised by the CBC in March of 1975, marking the first time these industry Awards have been televised.

The above announcement was made by Stan Klees, of Stan Klees Ltd., a consultant firm acting on behalf of the Juno Awards. Klees has been working with the CBC's Jim Guthro and John Barnes of CBC Variety since June of this year.

The original concept of the show, consisting of the Awards' presentations and performances by the winning artists, was approved by the Juno Awards' Committee, shortly after the last Juno Awards' presentation. The Committee comprises: Leonard Rambeau of the Personal Managers' Association, Mel Shaw of the Producers' Association, Ross Reynolds of the Canadian Recording Industry Association, Nancy Gyokeres of BMI and John Mills of CAPAC.

Production for the CBC will be handled by John Thompson.


GRIFFITH SOUNDS UP UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN

As a result of a series of recordings including his own compositions, "The Badger Song" and "You Can't Get It All" and TV appearances on the Lawrence Welk Show, The Norm Crosby Show and Elwood Glover's Luncheon Date, the singer from St. Boniface, Manitoba is enjoying great popularity in entertainment circles in the U.S. and Canada.

DEBBIE FLEMING SIGNS WITH ATTIC RECORDS

Attic Records' president Al Mair has announced the signing of the label's third artist, Debbie Fleming. Other artists signed to Attic are Fludd and Ron Nigrini.

Miss Fleming is a Toronto singer/songwriter and is well-known in the city's recording studios where she is in constant demand as a singer for background vocals. Initial single release will be "Long Gone", with advance radio station mailing arranged to coincide with RPM's C9 meeting in Vancouver. The label's national promotion manager and vice-president, Tom Williams, used the C9 meet to launch the single and to work the single in the major centres on his return east.

Corporation (Canada) spoke on a variety of subjects that ranged from broadcasting to free enterprise, economics, philosophy and the Kennedy assassination.

Paul Drew, the Vice-President of RKO Radio was the next to speak and gave a history of the evolution of pop radio and the progress of the sounds of rock and radio.

After dinner, RPM held a cocktail party for the registrants and registered guests in the Stanley Park Ballroom. The party began at 8:30PM and approximately 350 people attended. The guests had ample opportunity to discuss the events of the day's session, the hockey game, Vancouver's beautiful and unusual weather, the western industry and the Vancouver hotel room shortage. The party broke up at midnight.

At 10AM on Sunday morning, Leo Records

held a breakfast in the Stanley Park Ballroom for those interested and the breakfast was followed by a tour of Little Mountain Studios.

At noon, hospitality suites opened throughout the Bayshore Inn. From noon until approximately 6PM 13 rooms were in full swing.

Because of the shortage of suites, RPM found itself in the International Suite of the Bayshore Inn, which was like having breakfast for six in the middle of Maple Leaf Gardens.

At 6PM, most of the hospitality suites closed and the guests embarked on their return flights, met with friends and business associates or broke up into smaller crowds to see Vancouver.

The weather of the Friday to Monday period was sunny and clear with temperatures in the high seventies and no rain or clouds. Really, a delightful way to meet with the industry and see the paradise of Canada.

Was C9 a success? In this issue we get the views of Canada's trade media writers. In the weeks to come we will feature the highlights of many of the speakers.

We would like to thank everyone who attended and everyone who cooperated in making our job easier.

WALT GREALIS' OPENING REMARKS AT COMMUNICATION NINE

In view of the fact there has been some discussion and controversy about the tone and "bitterness" of my opening remarks at C9, I felt it would be useful to the industry to see the text in print. Anything else that may have been said at the opening was incidental to the schedule of the meeting. The following is the body of my opening remarks.

Eight Communication Meetings ago, which would have made it C1, there were thirty people in attendance. We have come a long way since then. It wasn't too long ago when we held a communication meeting here in Vancouver.

I can remember it well, because the times were turbulent for the radio and record business. One thing that came from that meeting was the fact that there were problems.

Many of them have been solved since then, and today we have new problems.

This is C9, and since RPM brought this meeting about, I thought I would like to welcome you to Vancouver, or if you are from Vancouver, welcome you to this meeting of easterners.

I could say the music industry in Canada is working like clockwork and we could all go home. But, like any industry, we have our problems.

Ten and a half years ago, RPM weekly was launched. The idea behind a weekly trade publication to the music and record industry in Canada was to develop and further the industry. We were anxious to create an industry in Canada that would be more reflective of what Canadians were doing and what Canadians wanted. We wished to bring the industry together by creating dialogue from east to west. We wanted to open the door to Canadians who had talent so that they could grow in Canada and not have to look to sup-

posed greener pastures. We were hopeful that we could bring the industry together to work for one cause.....a bigger and better industry and a distinctive Canadian attitude toward the industry.

In that ten and a half years, we can now say that we have failed dismally in doing any of these things.

Over the past year, it has become obvious to me that the industry is even more divided today than it has ever been.

If the east and the west were brought any closer by RPM, it has only served the purpose of making it even more evident that the two distant sections of the country have become more aware of their differences and more bitter about what is happening in each end of the country.

I have the feeling that RPM is moving backward, and with it the industry is becoming embroiled in problems and controversy that has little to do with getting down to the business we profess to command.

I say all this because over the next two days the industry has an opportunity to get together and form an alliance based on understanding and co-operation that could take us on to bigger and better things.

For 363 days of the year, we all do business. I hope these two days can be spent in getting together and discovering the problems and resolving them in this setting and in an atmosphere that can be more productive than any sales meeting or any sales pitch that might normally be expected at an event like this.

With all the dirty laundry that passes through the doors of RPM, and how much of it can we ignore and conceal, it distresses me to read about all this in foreign publications - for the whole world to see.

It would seem to me that the industry can progress by very positive moves in the seventies. The sixties endured many changes, and they should quickly be dismissed as being behind us.

I hope the industry isn't manufacturing new problems for the seventies.

Take the next two days to get away from what are called the "politics" of the industry, and spend your time thinking progressively about how good things could be, in the Canadian radio, record and music industries - if we put our minds to getting down to business.

Instead of being used as a vehicle, RPM seems to be used as the whipping boy of the industry.

Starting here and now, the industry can turn over a new leaf. We can leave the west feeling that there is a new camaraderie and a new understanding of the problems unique to this part of Canada. We can return home with a new and positive view of the west.

Given this unique opportunity, we can listen, learn, discuss and understand what is happening in the west and work toward making the west a greater part of what we do in the east.

Tonight, at a cocktail party here at the Bayshore, all of you will have the opportunity to look for answers. Tomorrow, all through the day, you will be able to tour the hospitality rooms throughout the hotel and get to know each other. In a few minutes, you will have the opportunity to listen to four gentlemen who have achieved success and respect in







I hope this meeting, with all of its events, will also contribute to narrowing that gap, and any other gaps that lead to a lack of communication and understanding.

Someone said to me last week: "You aren't going to make one of those hail fellow, well met speeches in Vancouver". I guess I've developed a reputation of being too much of a pussy cat.....well.....no more mister nice guy.

If you weren't here to learn more about the business, you'd find that Vancouver has a great deal more to offer than a crowded hotel meeting room.

I feel like an amateur in comparison to the four speakers you are going to hear today. You have already paid them a great tribute by gathering here.

I can honestly say that I have learned much from these past eight meetings, and the concept of being able to gather you here to listen to them is outstanding and unique. Over the next few hours, they will share with all of us their knowledge, experience and thoughts.

Tonight we will all have time to discuss the events of the day. We can only benefit from the years of experience that is about to appear before you.

For those who couldn't attend C9, we commissioned Canada's leading media writers to give you a true picture of the proceedings. We gave them license to write anything about the events at C9, with a promise not to edit their remarks beyond the limits of legality and good taste. They appear here with no editing.

GREALIS IN A CRIPPLED ROLE

Flying back to Toronto from Vancouver last weekend, following RPM Weekly's C9 meet, I tried to collect my thoughts on the magazine's latest attempt at producing meaningful dialogue within the Canadian record industry. I couldn't - and can't - come up with any solid conclusions because, as in past communication meetings, C9 did not bring out any form of across-the-board unification and quite often visibly divided those participating. But, it had its interesting moments.

A bitter disillusioned Walt Grealis telling of his unhappiness with current Canadian record business practices and sadly admitting that RPM has been unable to cope with some of the problems dividing the industry was a bit of a shocker. He also noted a failure of the CRIC's 30% content ruling to create a stronger domestic industry and called for a study to look into the possibilities for a percentage adjustment in the content's quota.

It's easy to understand Grealis' bitterness and tiredness. RPM magazine, once a centre of attention and dialogue within the trade, has been somewhat outgrown these past few years by an industry it did much

to create. The magazine has sadly become a source of industry ridicule. Grealis, though strongly and evenly respected in the business, seems to be deprived of necessary advertising revenue to run a strong book. Without that Grealis is unable to turn the tide of opinion or improve the quality of the magazine which has deteriorated badly in recent years. Boxed in by his own good intentions, a lack of journalistic grounding and a form of homegrown smugness, Grealis finds himself in a crippled role and the industry itself, divided for years, is unable to come to terms with helping or killing off RPM.

My opinion on the magazine and the meets runs hot-and-cold. Before the meetings start I'm usually depressed and dissatisfied with many of the problems about to be discussed. After the speeches I generally leave in an air of excitement. It's sort of a "Win One For The Gipper". C9 was no exception. The speakers made the day for me.....as usual.

Publishing before a general audience is a very difficult subject. Most of the room don't know and don't care about its fine points and the speaker usually ends up talking down to those who deal daily with the subject. That was the case of the speech by John Mills, Q.C. Before a small workshop Mills would have been ideal. In this large meeting, with people preparing to charge out to watch the Russian-Canadian hockey series, it was all ho-hum. The most interesting points were covered in his breakdown of the costs of operating CAPAC.

Record World publisher Bob Austin is likely covered in other parts of this book so I'd like to skip over his speech.

The most interesting speaker of any of the communication meetings was Geoff Stirling. He was outstanding.....touching on every aspect of the Canadian music business and anything else that you might have questions about. Why he talked for close to two hours - or was allowed to - is a bit puzzling. It was a bit much after an hour and I wondered if Stirling was a bit different from some of the Canadian politicians he repeatedly ridiculed during his rambling, without notes, speech.


The last speaker Paul Drew, unfortunately, said little of any importance and can be dismissed quickly for his contribution to the meeting. His speech has been covered many times in numerous books dealing with music and radio.

The 1st day of speeches and the subsequent cocktail party that evening have always played an important role in the success of the RPM meets. And, for me, they've been successful. I've been able to listen to a wide number of outstanding speakers in the past few years, make new business contacts, and re-establish ties with old friends. RPM is only offering the chance of industry communication, setting the stage. The success of the meets is an individual success. No two people feel the same about what was done last weekend in Vancouver. Just the same, they had the chance to talk it over among themselves.

The future of upcoming communication meets - and RPM itself - is up in the air. C meets are expensive for companies participating and entrants themselves are questioning the importance of the dialogues. The magazine will continue and I'd like to see it pick up the role as an industry forum that Grealis keeps establishing for himself each meet and losing afterwards. The magazine could be an extension of the meetings.

This track record is not one RPM short of superb

LAKEFIELD, Ont. "Elton John", insists Ronnie Hawkins, "is going to surpass anything that's happened so far in rock music... the Beatles, the Stones, Dylan, anybody. Elton is going to



end up above them all, you just mark my words."

And that good friends is not yer average line of rock 'n' roll hype. Rompin' Ron has been to the mountaintop and listened to the lion enough times to understand exactly where it's at. He knows most of what there is to know about where this music's coming from (a valuable insight in an age riddled with nostalgia). Not only is he one of the shrewdest assessors of talent that I've come across in nearly a decade on the road, he has the added ability of judging potential in its rawest forms. Winners are not that difficult to pick once the seeds are in bloom.

The Hawk specializes in the exertion of influence before the bud is formed, assisting in its fullest expression. Witness The Band, of which one need say no more. Hawkins put that particular crew together in 1963 and Bob Dylan should be forever grateful. Ron is a talent tout par excellence.

In his 22-year hip-hillbilly career, the Hawk has seen a million musicians come and go: understandably with that cunning Arkansas blood rushing through his treetrunk frame, he possesses the wherewithall to knit quite a few skeins of wisdom on the subject of rock music. In fact I can't think of a single individual who knows more about rock than Rompin' Ron.

Acquaintances and admirers, and even some inner associates, all busting their britches over typical Hawkins' hilarity, often take for granted Ron's unique perception of talent. They're so consumed by their own sense of humor that they fail to recognize

that Hawkins really does know what this music scene is all about.

Up at his rustic Lakefield property the other evening, we were sitting around the mansion fire snorting in those brittle scents of approaching Autumn, pondering and wandering the corridors of tomorrow. John Prine had been pickin' and singing a few songs after a wiener roast by the lake and we were feeling damn well mellow. The Hawk had his blue-jeaned leg firmly astride a marble table, looking as laid back as I've ever seen him.

The name of Elton John was raised among the crusts of conversation and Hawkins chomped on it like a hen uncovering a June bug. "Now there is what I call a super star. Elton John is one of the greatest talents I've ever heard. I reckon that right now he has as many fans as the Beatles, the Stones, Led Zeppelin — maybe more than them all put together. To my ear, he and that lyric writer of his (Bernie Taupin) have as much talent or more as anything that rock 'n' roll has ever produced. A lot of people might not like hearing the sacred name of the Beatles in that context, but I think that Elton has proved himself to be every bit as good as they were. And don't forget that he's just starting." There were no signs of disagreement as the Hawk paused to pump a shot of Bourbon into his tea. Audio flashes of "Your Song", "The King Must Die", "Where To Now St. Peter", "Friends", "Madman", "Indian Sunset", "Rocket Man", "Mona Lisas and Mad Hatters", "Have Mercy on the Criminal", "Blues For My Baby And Me", "Danny Bailey", "I've Seen That Movie Too", and so much more. The track record is not one rpm short of superb.

"I saw a TV documentary on Elton a few weeks back", Hawkins continues. "His statements in the interview demonstrated to me that he's certainly not the typical rock 'n' roller out to slap young ladies with wet fish or indulge in the noble art of black magic.

"He appears to treat his friends very well which is rare for a young entertainer. All

the people I know who've met Elton say he's a magnificent person. John Prine here says that Elton is beautiful and fantastic. I mean the guy is such a rarity these days in the entertainment field. He's about as professional as you can get. He has his head screwed on his shoulders properly, not like most of these young whippersnappers. Elton John is a real super star in a stadium filled with pretenders."

You can't take such accolades lightly. I'll confess I've felt the same way about Elton's presence for a couple of years now. It always amuses me to hear endless explorations of the nonsensical ten-year theory, i.e. Presley in '54, the Beatles in '64, something's going to explode in '74. It definitely does not go down that way. There will not be the long-awaited new sensation in 1974 because the next international super star has already been around for three or four years and his name is Elton John. The theory is down the drain.

What surprises me is the media's reluctance to shed its unflinching affection for the memory of the Beatles and to celebrate the new ruler. After all the output of Elton and Bernie has been quite simply staggering, from whatever viewpoint. Elton John's production people have brought an entirely new sound dimension to music for which they are still relatively unrecognized. His live concert sound also is at least the equal of any of his contemporaries.

I appreciate that many of us are unable to see the wood for the trees, but this case is particularly convincing. What else does the man need to do to prove his worth?

One can only hope that the ten-week North American tour which Elton has recently begun will serve to bring home the truth about his real standing in the hall of rock greats. We're just going to have to get used to the fact that although Led Zeppelin may be the biggest group since the Beatles, Elton John is the most glowing ***s*t*a*r***.

Ronnie Hawkins doesn't think his ranking is likely to subside in the near future either. "In the long run, Elton John will still be there when the rest are retired, dead from an OD, or admitted to the crazy farm. He hasn't been trapped in the same bag. Every new tune has something different.

"I think that he'll be able to play just as long as he wants to. And you can't say that about many of these dudes running around calling themselves stars these days."

Now there is a riff worth getting into.

Morris Abraham produces and directs the show, Don Forsythe is executive producer and Kevin Hunter of New Directions is talent coordinator for the series.

Upcoming guest artists for this season include Melba Montgomery, Chad Allen (former lead singer for group "The Guess Who"), Gary Buck, Valdy, Kathy Stewart and Susan Jacks.

NO ONE REALLY HAS THE BALLS TO TELL RPM

Communication 9 held in Vancouver this year intended initially as a confrontation with some of the problems facing the Western Canada music scene deteriorated gradually into a continuation of isolated and behind the scenes discussions of the worth of RPM to the Canadian music industry as a whole. There is a genuine hostility felt against the Canadian music weekly in many sectors of the industry and though many murmurings and grumbings are heard over the clink of ice in drink glasses in hospitality suites and over lunches and dinners in posh restaurants no one really has had the balls to come out and tell RPM exactly where they feel the publication is going wrong. If you are a subscriber or an advertiser you have a basic right to voice your opinion forthrightly and openly, and conversely, it is the publication's obligation to listen and to effect any changes requested by a reasonable majority of its critics.

The problem here is, and this is a back handed compliment to Walt Grealis' stature in this business, most people don't like to say anything for fear that RPM may not be kindly disposed to giving them equal space in the magazine from that time on. Who says RPM is dead? The fact that it has the power to silence its critics without a word is certainly evidence enough of the publication's continuing influence in the Canadian music industry.

Before I go on I would like to make my stance on RPM very clear.:

(a) Editorializing, I feel, is one of the major sins of a trade publication and RPM is the only trade book that I have ever run across that devotes so much of its editorial space to lecturing the industry on how to run its business. It is an affront to the competent sector of the industry to be tutored by people whose major function is publishing.

(b) The RPM chart has proven time and time again to be inaccurate and therefore potentially damaging to the industry as a whole. In defence of RPM though, they have done an incredible job given the amount of money and personnel that they have at their disposal to handle this tedious chore.

(c) Stan Klees' association with RPM has been a constant topic of conversation by people in the industry. Many do not believe that his relation to the publication is only on a freelance basis. It might be helpful if his status was explained fully to the industry so as to once and for all put an end to the conjecture and behind-the-back jibes that have arisen from this situation.

Those I feel are the main issues involved here. They are certainly the ones that I have heard spoken of most often in the security of the places I listed above.

Alright, now what about Western Canada and its unique problems?

Well, I can only state the obvious here. There have been two major international acts emerge from this area in the last year Bachman-Turner Overdrive and Terry Jacks. Both acts were conspicuous by their absence from most of the proceedings at C9. True, Terry Jacks spent some time watching the speakers on the opening day but it's really hard to interest someone who has had multiple international hits in a discus-

sion on the 30 percent Canadian content legislation. Of course, BTO and Jacks were out taking care of business rather than chugging a drink or glad-handing it at a hospitality suite.

For those registrants who came with business in mind it was a good opportunity to size up for themselves the stature of the industry in Western Canada cutting through the hype to concrete sales figures and achievements. Those people might have actually come back with a clear picture of what their tact will be with that particular market in the coming year rather than a hazy remembrance of an X-rated boat cruise of the Vancouver shore-line.

The posters in the kit will be of The Allman Brothers Band, Wet Willie, and The Marshall Tucker Band. On the T-shirt is a reproduction of the cover of the "Peaches" album, an LP which is unavailable except to winners of the kits. This album is considered a collector's item, and includes cuts by such artists as The Allman Brothers Band, as well as Greg and Dwayne Allman, Captain Beyond, Percy Sledge, The Elvin Bishop Group, and many more outstanding musicians. Other albums in the kit are by great artists performing on the Capricorn label.

Personnel changes at CFRW/Winnipeg' Ron Abel, formerly of CFUN/Vancouver is the new morning man at CFRW/Winnipeg, handling the 5-9AM slot. Native Winnipegger, Pat Holliday, until recently at CKOC/Hamilton, returns to the city and CFRW to take over the Noon - 3PM shift from Steve Kelly, who has now assumed the duties of Music Director. Judy Casey, formerly of CJCH/Halifax, takes over as Creative Director of CFRW AM & FM.

ROFFMAN DEVELOPS PROJECTS FOR CBC-TV

CBC-TV drama producer Julian Roffman is working with five young writers to develop projects for the coming season.

Writer-actor, Lou Del Grande, of "Maybe We Could Get Some Bach", and "So Who's Goldberg" fame has been contracted to do an original hour of comedy. Roffman has purchased Polish Filmmaker Tad Jaworski's outline for Nocturne, a half-hour drama, and Jaworski is now preparing the first draft. Patrick Conlon is currently working on a script based on his seriocomic story "All My Days Here" which deals with an old man made so unhappy by living with his children in their high-rise apartment, he moves into their locker room. Montreal writer, Alvin Goldman, is working on an original script for a one-hour drama concerning a successful young woman lawyer who is suddenly crippled.

Roffman has also purchased "Ada", a short story by Toronto author Margaret Gibson Gilboord, which will be published in the 1974 Oberon Press collection of short stories, and deals with women in a mental hospital.

CROSS-COUNTRY CHECKUP RETURNS TO CBC RADIO

"Cross-Country Checkup", Canada's only national open-line, phone-in program, returned to the air for its eight consecutive season on the CBC Radio network, beginning Sunday, September 8. The program will continue to be aired in its 5:10-7PM EDT spot, with Harry Elton returning as Host and Moderator, and John Grant as Announcer. George Lewinski, the researcher on Checkup last season, takes over the role of Program Producer from Tony Burman.

Originating live from Montreal, Checkup invites listeners across Canada to reverse the charges when phoning the show to air their views on a topic selected for its universality. A guest knowledgeable on the chosen topic will assist Elton in fielding the phone-in comments of listeners. Lewinski hopes to do some remotes during the season, possibly from the Arctic, the Maritimes, and a company town program from the west coast. He also hopes to do a program linking Canada with England and France in an attempt to find out what we, as Canadians, owe these two countries.

Montreal's Lewinski, a graduate of McGill University and currently studying for an M.A. in Canadian history at Sir George Williams University, was a researcher on Checkup last season, and for several years prior to that worked in news or research for Montreal radio and TV. Elton, returning for his second season on the show, has had extensive TV and radio experience in Canada, England and the U.S. He joined CBC/Montreal in 1972 and has since hosted several popular local radio programs. He was recently named co-host of CBMT Montreal's City At Six.

CBC-TV SPECIALS AIRING THIS FALL

General Motors of Canada Ltd. will solely sponsor three individual 60-minute music-variety specials on CBC-TV this fall. Starting in the three specials will be Paul Anka, Harry Belafonte, and Wayne & Shuster.

The Paul Anka program, scheduled for airing Wednesday, September 25 at 8PM, will be taped live before a studio audience in the singer's old hometown, Ottawa. The show, a co-production of CBC and Yonge Street Productions Inc. of Los Angeles, will be recorded by producer Paddy Sampson.

"Belafonte Canada", slated for Friday, September 27 at 9PM, was captured on camera by producer Sampson during the Belafonte cross-Canada tour this summer. Occasionally the entertainer will share the spotlight with two other remarkable talents, South African singer Letta Mbulu, and Brazilian multi-instrumentalist, Sivuca. The show is a co-production of CBC and Harry Belafonte Enterprises Inc.

The Wayne & Shuster special, "The Gypsy Drop-Out", Sunday, September 29 at 8PM, is a spoof of all the Viennese operettas ever written. Johnny plays an incognito student prince summoned from college to become king of "Schnitzelvania, while Frank is the Grand Chancellor of the Imperial Court, whose job it is to groom the young prince for his new crown.

CRTC REPLIES TO "RED TAPE" CHARGE

The Canadian Radio Television Commission has dismissed claims by CJAZ Radio, a group of handicapped people attempting to get into radio, that the North Vancouver group has become enmeshed in the Commission's "red tape". In a letter to Jack Banford, general manager of CJAZ, the Commission's Guy Lefebvre points out that formal application has not been made to the CRTC by Canadian Wirevision Limited, the cable company which expected to carry the CJAZ programming. While Banford admits that no such formal application has been made, he makes reference to a number of oral submissions made to the CRTC by Canadian Wirevision in the past.

The crux of the problem is that under present regulations, the owner of a cable license must assume direct responsibility for the programming he carries. Apparently Canadian Wirevision is unable to assume the responsibility and CJAZ doesn't care to relinquish it anyway.

By way of suggesting alternatives to this impasse, Lefebvre suggested that CJAZ might make application for an "over-the-air" AM or FM station in greater Vancouver similar to the set-ups now established by CJVB and Vancouver Co-operative Radio. While Banford sees such an "over-the-air" proposal as attractive, CJAZ has insufficient funding for the costly processes of application and construction.

The Programmers **TRIBAL DRUM**

CKPT/Peterborough commemorated the first anniversary of the death of Jim Croce with a 90-minute special "Hey Tomorrow - The Jim Croce Special", which ran from 9-10:30PM, Saturday, September 21.

In October CFRS/Simcoe will become CHNR at 1600 on the dial, and boost its power to 10,000K. RADIO THE
WORLD OUTSIDE

Most of us, programmers included, tend to think of radio as a diversion; something to be listened to casually as a means of passing the time, or making a task more pleasant. We turn it on without really thinking why and seldom treat it as the technological marvel it really is. Even those of us not over thirty can remember the day when radio was the focal point of an evening at home. Who can forget "Gunsmoke" and "Johnny Dollar"? Who can forget the thrill of sitting around that great big hunk of furniture with the glowing green eye, listening to Silver gallop loudly into the distance.

Television, of course, changed all that. Now we can see Matt and Kitty and Tonto. In the process, radio abdicated its position as entertainer and informer and became a mere whimper in the sounds around us. That goes for those of us in urban centres where movies, television stations, records and concerts fill our minds with sight and sound, but what about those people out in the boonies, those upon whom the god of communications has yet to bestow his bounteous gifts.

Out there, in the remote areas of the Prairies, in the lumber camps of British Columbia, in the great Canadian Arctic, radio is still a vital part of everyday life. The weather report has real down to earth significance, the news may be the only source of quick, accurate information, the music may well be all the entertainment there is.

Out there, away from the electronic over abundance of the cities, radio plays an important part in every day life.

We, who live in the big cities, are prone to chuckle a little at the five hundred watters which dot the map. With our sophisticated program research and huge signals we see little to be admired out there, but the truth of the matter is that those piddly little stations and their hundred dollar a week boys are doing more for the handful of hicks who listen than we do for the tens of thousands who, we are told, tune in faithfully each day.

Out there, progress has not reached the point that, as Marshall McLuhan would have it, the medium has become the message. Out there, the medium and the message are still distinct from one another. While in Vancouver or Calgary or Toronto it is how the news sounds and not what it says that counts, out in Dogpatch and Hogswallow, intros and extros and quick turns of phrase mean little. It is what is being said that counts.

KEITH HAMPSHIRE HOSTS
MUSIC MACHINE - CBC-TV

CBC-TV's show "Music Machine", returns to the air this fall, but with a difference. The show will be called "Keith Hampshire's Music Machine", and will be telecast Wednesday nights at 7:30PM, instead of late Saturday afternoons.

The show is also broadening its appeal, by using more Hit Parade material, performed by the recording artists and groups who made the number a current chart-topper, and by steering away from last year's emphasis on jazz and soul. The show will continue to be produced and written by Garry Ferrier and Aubrey Tadman, with additional material supplied by Peter Mann, and studio direction by Ron Meraska.

As the name of the shows implies, Calgary-born Hampshire will be the singing host of each half-hour edition. Eric Robertson, the keyboard-playing leader of Local 149, the series' new eight-member back-up band, and who has previously played behind Hampshire as a musician on the singer's handful of A&M Records released hit singles, will look after musical arrangements. There'll also be a new six-voice group called Liberation, which includes Roy Kennar, formerly of The James Gang. The producers of the show are introducing a spot called "The Best of . . ." which will have Hampshire singing a medley of golden-oldie hits dating back to 1957.

Scheduled guest line-up for the series include such bands as Lighthouse, Fludd, Greaseball Boogie Band, April Wine.

CONCEPT PROGRAMMING FOR DAUPHIN'S CKDM

Attempting to satisfy the musical tastes of all types of listeners found in a rural environment has been the aim of most, if not all radio stations serving the smaller markets. CKDM Dauphin, Manitoba, however, has decided to change their sound to one of "concept" radio programming for the upcoming fall and winter seasons. The change has been influenced by the station's youthful, and ambitious staff.

The new format has been put together by on-air personalities Jerry Agar, Bob Weidman, Robert Ouimet, Les Jankiewicz, Brian Leskiw and Mike Zaplitzny. Included will be one hour musical specials, six nights a week, promoting school activities; a special music and story-time program for children on Saturdays; a revamped series of religious music programming; and the use of quality tapes submitted by previously unknown artists.

Music for evening specials are to be categorized as: Classical (Tues 8-9PM), folk (Wed 8-9PM), instrumentals (Thurs 7-8PM), days gone by/comedy (Thurs 8-9PM), progressive rock (high quality rock music from outside the realm of the Top 40) to be heard Fridays from 7 to 8PM, rhythm and blues/soul (Fri 8-9PM), jazz (Sat 8-9PM), and opera/motion pictures/Musicals (Sun 8-9PM). A minimum of announcer patter will add an FM feeling to the specials. The station's all night show, "Nightfall" will concentrate on easy listening/instrumental offerings.

Obviously aiming their signal at the young listener, CKDM on-air personalities will be plugging school activities throughout the day i.e. dances, sporting events, club meetings etc.

The Saturday morning "kids" special will air songs, stories and characterizations of popular comic strip personalities and will later spawn a jock contest, using top entries on the air.

The religious programming segment hasn't been restricted to Sunday mornings. The station has scheduled "Hymns For The Time" to be used as a daily, early morning

happening "to spiritually and musically uplift our listeners".

CKDM's airwaves will be used to bring local talent to the attention of listeners throughout the area. They will present a series of "Talent Nights" whereby they will air good quality tapes and records submitted by artists. These tapes will be aired during the all night show.

Returning to CKDM are two long-time feature programs: Jack Henderson's "Open Line" and Helen Henderson's "Time For Helen", both aired throughout the week days.

CKDM's regular schedule of MOR (pop) music will continue its regular schedule in the morning with country in the afternoon, contemporary rock in the evenings and the open format all night show. The station proudly maintains a 40% or better Canadian content in musical offerings.

GEORGE BALCAN HOSTS "IT'S YOUR MOVE"/CTV

George Balcan is now handling hosting duties on "It's Your Move", a show based on the game of charades, telecasting weekdays on CTV. Unlike the parlour version, however, there are no standard signs. Players are on their own, and have to transmit a phrase using whatever bizarre antics are found necessary.

Balcan, in the field of broadcasting since the age of eighteen, got his apprenticeship in a local radio station in Dauphin, Manitoba, where he was raised, graduating to larger markets like Winnipeg and Hamilton, and finally Montreal, where he is now with CFCF, and considered to be that city's number one morning man. He formerly hosted "Our Friends, The Flickers", a CBC radio movie trivia panel show, and is presently weekday afternoon host of "Matinee With George Balcan", a two hour feature movie show.

CHAM/HAMILTON IN ROCK CONCERT BATTLE

CHAM/Hamilton recently took on the Hamilton City Fathers in an attempt to bring a free rock concert to the people of that city. Robert W. Wood, Programme Manager of the station, requested permission to stage the concert starring Edward Bear, a Canadian light rock act, in Gage Park. His reply was a flat refusal from the Parks and Recreation Committee, because of the noise factor in neighboring communities. CHAM then approached the authorities in the neighboring community of Stoney Creek, and again received a refusal because "rock concerts attract undesirable elements."

CHAM then resorted to editorializing on the air, pointing out that rock had, in fact, appeared in Gage Park, most recently with the Trudeau Bandwagon (A Foot In Coldwater), and that a recent philharmonic concert, with synchronized cannon for the 1812 Overture, could not exactly be classified as quiet. Listeners were invited to submit their comments, and the phone response was great, with callers asking what they could do to help. CHAM also posed the question "were the city parks for the enjoyment of all the population, or just a select few approved by the City Fathers?"

CHAM then approached Lloyd D. Jackson Square promotion department, since rock concerts had been held there in the past without incident, but found that the city also controlled that area, and would have to be approached again for permission to hold the concert. Finally, after much hassling, Wood was approached by a member of the board, who suggested that he come down to the next sub-committee meeting with a tape of Edward Bear to play, and be available for questions. Wood appeared, permission was granted, and the concert was set for August 29th. An orderly crowd of between 7 and 12 thousand assembled in Gage Park, after only a little over two days of publicity, and a good time was had by all.

CJVI SPECIAL NEAR CAPACITY

CJVI's heavily promoted country special drew a near capacity crowd to Victoria's Royal Theatre recently to see Bob Luman, Freddy Weller, Johnny Duncan and Gunilla Hutton in action. During the week prior to the show, CJVI aired hour long music and interview features on the artists appearing prepared by announcer Jim Shearer. Gary Pigeon's drive show featured phone inter-

views with Duncan and Hutton and in-studio visits by Weller and Luman.


