

London charted the most Canadian singles in '76

London Records of Canada led all Canadian record distributors in the amount of charted Canadian product in 1976, according to a study of the RPM Top 100 Singles charts for the year. Of 133 Canadian records which were listed at any time on the RPM Singles chart, 25, or 18.8 per cent, were distributed by London Records.

Polydor finished second with 17 listed singles, and A&M and CBS tied for third with 14 singles each. GRT placed fifth with 12 Canadian singles, Capitol and RCA tied for sixth with 11 each, and Quality had 10 Canadian singles on the RPM chart, followed by WEA with six and MCA with five.

London placed three Canadian singles in the RPM top five, including Sweeney Todd's Roxy Roller, which listed number one for three consecutive weeks beginning June 26. Also from London were Andre

Gagnon's Wow, which RPM listed number four on March 27, and April Wine's The Whole World's Going Crazy, charted at number five June 19 and 26.

RCA and WEA also had Canadian singles listed number one in 1976. RCA's T.H.P. Orchestra saw their version of the Theme From S.W.A.T. reach number one in the March 20 chart, and Gordon Lightfoot's The Wreck Of The Edmund Fitzgerald, distributed by WEA, hit number one November 30. Burton Cummings' CBS/Portrait single Stand Tall finished the year with three consecutive weeks listed at number four.

London's strong Canadian showing was given a considerable boost from its Canadian subsidiaries Attic, Goldfish and Aquarius. Attic was particularly strong, charting product by Patsy Gallant, Hagood Hardy, Ken Tobias, Shirley Eikhard, Fludd and Ron Nigrini.

WEA the most charted distributor in '76

WEA was the most charted distributor in Canada in 1976, according to a study of the RPM Top 100 Singles charts for the year. WEA singles were charted a total of 967 times in the 51 issues of RPM published in 1976, for an average of almost 19 listings per week.

Capitol was a strong but distant second with 778 listings, or just better than 15 1/2 listings per week. CBS placed third with 611 chart listings, or almost 12 per week.

WEA remained unchallenged throughout 1976, finishing first every month except January, when they and Capitol each placed 59 listings on the RPM charts. Capitol retained a firm grip on second throughout the year, except in October when they were edged by CBS.

CBS, which began slowly and slumped to sixth in April, finished the year with a strong surge, beginning in July, and never placed lower than third through the remainder of the year. Polydor, which started strong, placing third in February and March, also finished strong, placing fourth

from September through December to place fourth for the year with 467 listings. RCA was the fifth most charted distributor with 415 listings, edging out Quality, whose strong months from May onward carried them to 402 listings.

London, strong between March and July, edged out A&M by a single charting, 386 to 385, to finish seventh. A&M had a very strong second quarter, placing third in April and May and fourth in June.

MCA, GRT and Motown placed ninth, tenth, and eleventh respectively with 208, 203 and 142 singles listings on the RPM charts.

WEA's strongest months were July, when they listed 109 times in the five July charts, and December, with 91 listings in four issues. Their strongest week was the last week, December 25, when they placed 24 singles on the chart. Their Warner Brothers single, Tonight's The Night by Rod Stewart, remained number one throughout December.

Attic Records renews London distribution pact

Attic Records has renewed its distribution contract with London Records of Canada. The signing came after rumours of a change in distribution and meetings between Attic and several other companies. London is the only distributor Attic has ever had.

Attic announces forthcoming new product in 1977 from Patsy Gallant, Hagood Hardy, Ken Tobias, Shirley Eikhard, the Les Humphries Singers, Eddie Hardin, Triumph, The Wurzels and Donny Gerrard.

Attic's Tom Williams and Al Mair are looking forward to increased market penetration, particularly in Quebec where a number of Attic artists will soon debut.

T.K. suing over release of Best of KC album

T.K. Records in Florida is filing a lawsuit against their British licensee over the release in England of an album called The Best Of K.C. And The Sunshine Band. The licensee was apparently not authorized by T.K. to record and release a compilation album, according to an official statement from T.K. president Henry Stone's legal council.

T.K. product normally is distributed in the U.S. by a network of distributors and in Canada by RCA. Copies of the unauthorized album have been brought into North America independently and sold as imports. In Canada, the album is imported and distributed by TCD out of Ottawa.

Punk rock bands on rise in UK cause controversy

A controversy has been raging in Britain over the aggressive 'punk-rock' bands and their recent fame. EMI has signed the Sex Pistols band, who made news by appearing on national TV in an interview and spewing obscenities. Variety reports the band's first release, a single called Anarchy In The U.K., has entered the top 50 sales charts and is being stocked everywhere.

The publicity has been good for the record's sales, although some live dates have been cancelled, but EMI now faces embarrassment over the band. The company has been criticized for signing and releasing records from a band which promotes violence and anarchy.

EMI chairman Sir John Read has publicly outlined his attitudes on the matter, and said at a stockholders' meeting, "Sex Pistols is the only 'punk rock' group that EMI Records currently has under direct recording contract and whether EMI does in fact release anymore of their records will have to be very carefully considered."

"Our view within EMI is that we should seek to discourage records that are likely to give offence to the majority of people. In this context, changing public attitudes have to be taken into account."

United Artists in the U.K. has shown their support of the new musical movement by signing several of such bands, including The Stranglers.

The so-called punk rock style originated some time ago in New York. It is interesting to note that the New York band The Ramones made British headlines a few months ago when a member of parliament demanded that their records be banned. Bands such as The Ramones, Lou Reed, the Velvet Underground and Iggy Pop became part of the American music scene long ago and have been taken seriously by critics.

Slow year for Cancon on international charts

According to two U.S. trades and their top 100 singles of 1976, it was a slow year for international activity by Canadian artists. Three songs by three different artists qualifying as Canadian show up between the two compilations.

On one of the charts, Gordon Lightfoot's Wreck of The Edmund Fitzgerald appears at number 22, and the belated Magic Man by Heart shows at number 10.

On the other chart, however, neither of these songs appears, but Paul Anka's Times Of Your Life rates the number 54 spot.

Multicultural contest rules announced

Toronto broadcaster Johnny Lombardi and Sam (The Record Man) Sniderman have announced the official rules for the 1976 Canadian Multicultural Songwriting Competition. The winner of the competition receives the Douglas McGowan Award and a prize of \$1,500.00.

The annual competition was established in 1974 to honour the late Douglas McGowan, who was Chief of Programming with the Canadian Radio-Television Commission. Mr. McGowan was noted for his support of multiculturalism and promotion of Canadian talent.

Entries must be postmarked by midnight March 1, and accompanied by a 200-word resume of the applicant's background. It must be submitted on a cassette tape, accompanied by an English translation. Music and lyrics must be composed by a Canadian: a citizen, landed immigrant, or resident for six months in Canada. The entry need not be performed by the applicant.

Lombardi stated, "It is most fitting that the McGowan Award go each year to the writer submitting a song which best fosters a greater understanding and appreciation of a particular culture by all Canadians. The award and its attendant cash prize is to encourage the new Canadian to preserve his native culture while at the same time introducing that culture to his fellow Canadians."

Hardy's single The Homecoming also won him Juno awards for composer of the year and instrumental artist of the year, as well as the producer of the year award for Peter Anastasoff.


Hardy's records are released in the U.S. on Capitol.

After 40 years in radio and television, the industry will finally have the opportunity to pay tribute to this giant of Canadian entertainment.



Ixtlan Records are promoting their new single release with a gorilla armed with bananas. The single, King Kong by Tony Quarrington, was spread among press and broadcasters in Toronto by Quarrington, Ixtlan's Dana Boone and Ron Baumber, and a gorilla who called himself Ping Pong-cousin of the title character.

King Kong was released December 17 to co-incide with the opening of the re-make of the King Kong movie. Movie and single are not related.

Quarrington, a new Ixtlan signee, is a Saskatchewan native and a PhD candidate in English. He also wrote both sides of the single and co-produced it.

Bob Johnson appointed nat'l promotion MCA

Former MCA Montreal/Ottawa branch manager Bob Johnston has been appointed national promotion manager of MCA Records. Johnston's duties will include the supervision of national record promotion and artist tours. He will be working from the Canadian head office in Toronto with Scott Richards, former national promotion manager who was recently appointed vice president of marketing for MCA.

Johnston has been associated with MCA for the past four years.

The Agency expands, adds new offices

Toronto booking firm The Agency, which has primarily booked established recording acts, has opened a second office, The Agency II, to concentrate on the development of new, aspiring talent.

The Agency II, headed by Chris Somerton, is located at 37 Mutual Street in Toronto.

The Agency, through extensive negotiations with foreign management groups SIR Productions and Bill Curbishley, has recently acquired exclusive Canadian booking representation for The Dingoes, The Steve Gibbons Band, Law, Lynyrd Skynyrd, and .38 Special. It has also become part of a Canadian booking network with Atlantic Music in the Maritimes, Frank Wiener in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, Studio City in Alberta and Bruce Allen Talent in British Columbia.

Jackson Hawke to Epic for U.S. distribution



Record sales in 1976: A mixture of reaction

1976 has seen a very mixed year in record sales, with a wide variety of seasonal and regional movement. Alberta chalked up a booming year, but other areas seem to be somewhat flat, with only minor advances over the 1975 figures.

People in record sales reported to RPM on a wide variety of different experiences and theories about the sales situation, and a wild group of varied summations.

Some things were agreed upon by general consensus. There were no super albums this year. As Record Barn owner Eric Johnson stated, "There are a lot of strong secondary sellers, but no individual giant albums." Rack jobber Taylor Campbell of Pindoff Record Sales reported a wider variety of titles among top movers. This thought was echoed by Jacques Gagne of All Records.

From the distributors, reaction to this year's sales situation was mixed. A&M's Doug Chappell reports a great year, with sales particularly high in Alberta, and a strong prediction for Christmas sales, particularly in Ontario. Chappell attributes A&M's growth to better distribution in the market place and better timing.

RCA marketing services manager John Stephenson reported a strong year despite RCA's loss of the ABC label this year. Sales were particularly strong in the west, with Toronto slightly flat and Ontario down slightly. RCA had a very strong November, and Stephenson expected good action for December.

At MCA, national sales manager Alan Reid reports a soft year, with the prairies strong but B.C., Ontario and the Maritimes slow compared to last year. Reid feels the slowdown in big hits for MCA is the cause.

At the rack jobber level people are for the most part happy with sales throughout the year. Tony Frank, president of Aldisc Distributors, noted a good year with strong chart sales, although catalogue sales were a little sluggish.

Other rackers reporting a good year were Jan Bell of Handleman, Herb Taylor of Taylor's Record Sales, and Jacques Gagne of All Records. Gagne, who reported an approximate 20 per cent sales increase for the year, noted a strong spring, a soft summer and a pick-up in the fall with exceptional sales from October through December. This sales pattern was later to be repeated by some of the retailers.

Taylor, whose company deals basically in Ontario outside of Toronto, also reported an exceptional October and November, with substantial growth over last year. Taylor also noted the wide variety of chart sellers, primarily from established acts.

Taylor Campbell, managing director of Pindoff reported a good but not exceptional growth for the year, with Alberta very strong, Toronto and Quebec quite good, and B.C. on a par with last year.

Several reasons for the tremendous growth in the prairies were offered by the rack jobbers. Some, including Ms. Bell of

Handleman's, attributed the growth to the general economic conditions, which are favourable in the west - there is simply more money. Others, such as Gagne of ARS, say that new availability is responsible for the western growth. Gagne noted that improved service in the smaller towns, where new releases are now available within a week, is one factor. Others attributed the growth to an increase in the number of outlets, the expansion of the distributors into the west, and an interest being generated in the west for regular buying of records by a public which had previously bought records only on trips to the big cities.

Retailers have found a wide variety of joys and woes through the year. Sam "The Record Man" Sniderman, whose chain consists of 46 stores, reports excellent sales for the year and that he plans to continue expansion throughout Canada. Peter Parrish, eastern marketing manager at A&A Records and Tapes, reports the west thriving with record sales up an average of 25 per cent, with some stores reporting gains up to 100 per cent, but that the east is softer, with gains averaging about 25 per cent, with some stores reporting gains up to 100 per cent, but that the east is softer, with gains averaging about five per cent. There is, however, a large expansion of A&A stores in the Toronto and Montreal areas.

Sylvia Harding of Music World reports a basically good year compared to last year. The Music World chain consists of 11 stores. Shirley Harrison of Eaton's reported a good, if sporadic, year for the record departments in the chain. Ms. Harrison noted that the trend of a good spring, soft summer and strong comeback in the fall applied to Eaton's.

Much of the confusion about sales was found at the individual outlet level. Lou Cooper, who owns three Sam The Record Man franchises in the Toronto area, reports that his stores are keeping at a par with last year, despite fierce competition. Eric Johnson of Record Barn reports a slow year in his two Toronto outlets, although his London, Ontario store has been busier. One of his store managers, Gary Campbell, reports trouble stocking the top albums.

Lon Appleby, who owns three A&A franchises, reports that his Newmarket, Ontario outlet is gaining nicely, but that his Bridlewood Mall, Toronto branch is at a par and his Newtonbrook store on Yonge Street is down from last year. Appleby has also experienced difficulty with product availability, and cited the level of competition in the city of Toronto as one of his major problems. He noted that the malls are tending to do continually better business, while street outlets seem to be sluggish.

Bloor Street Toronto A&A manager Vito Rocanelli reports a slow year, although sales of top albums continue to boom. Lorne Lichtman, manager of Music World in Scarborough, also reported a somewhat flat year. Cecil Phillips, who manages Music World in Toronto's Fairview Mall, announc-

ed a good year for that branch.

Larry Ellenson of Round Records, who reported a very successful year, noted that some small street outlets were having serious problems. Three downtown Toronto record stores closed during the year. His outlet appeals to a selective crowd of students and young people.

None of the retailers reported any major surprises in specific product. Among the albums mentioned which have sold well are product by Peter Frampton, Rod Stewart, Stevie Wonder and Kiss.

There seems to be a general trend of business from the street outlets to the malls and major shopping centres. A&A franchiser Appleby attributes the success of the malls to warmth, available parking, a variety of shopping, a nice atmosphere and a comparative process between record stores and record departments in department stores.

MCA national sales manager Alan Reid describes the situation: "I think that as an industry we have begun to feel the effects of the forecast demographic change in our market. The post-World War II baby-bulge kids who were 18 to 23 in the early 70's are now 23 to 28. They're married and have kids and mortgages and payments to make on the washing machine. They aren't buying too many records. There is a new crop of kids in the right age group, of course, but nothing like as many of them.

"In retailing, I'd expect downtown locations to experience difficulty in maintaining their sales volume, while suburban locations in big shopping malls do increasingly better business. That's where people live and shop, and therefore that's where you can get the impulse buy."

Jacques Gagne of All Record Supply attributes this success in the malls to a more professional operation all the way around. The distributors are doing a better promotion and stocking job in the suburban outlets. Businessman Rick McGraw, formerly vice-president and general manager of A&A, notes a better selection and fuller expansion into the suburban areas, creating a lesser need for the public to go downtown to the street outlets to buy records.

Some changes in the types of material may have to be made in the future in order for the record sales to be maintained. Sam The Record Man franchiser Lou Cooper notes the success of country, R&B, ethnic music and so forth in areas with large specialized demographic groups. Gagne feels there should be a greater market availability in MOR for adults, as many department store customers are adults.

Reid concludes, "Underground acts just won't get the kind of sales that some of them enjoyed a few years ago. That special market that used to buy them has become too small. I think that the really huge albums from now on are likely to be the ones that have an appeal so broad that a substantial number of adults will buy them, in addition to the 18-to-23's. They're likely to be acts like Elton John and Paul McCartney; and hit singles, providing the necessary exposure to a big audience, will be even more important."

RPM looks back & reviews 1976

JANUARY

The new year, 1976, began with That's The Way I Like It by K.C. and The Sunshine Band in the number one position on the RPM 100 Singles chart. Hagood Hardy hits gold status with his Homecoming album, on the Attic label. The CRTC 30% Cancon ruling celebrates its fifth year. RPM's cover boy, on the wrap-up issue, is the magazine's General Manager, Sammy-Jo. Bruce Murray signs with Quality. Stan Lepka joins Quality in sales-promo position. Axe Records signs Gail Dahms. After the British tour Hamilton will be doing a nine-day tour in Czechoslovakia, followed by appearances in Gothenburg Sweden and Helsinki, Finland. More appearances are being planned for Norway and Sweden during the period of April 14-22. Hamilton's tours are booked by the Mervyn Conn Organization.

Country Style music news tabloid goes bi-weekly

The new U.S. country music news tabloid, Country Style will go bi-weekly in the new year. The four-colour magazine has developed a circulation of over 300,000 in a relatively short eight months, which prompted the decision to make the change from a monthly publication.

An even newer series of Sunday dinner specials in the room, begun in December with the Carlton Showband, followed by the Family Brown, will be continued into the new year. Double, Big Country award winner, Ronnie Prophet has been booked for January 23. The New Year's Eve package at the club stars Carroll Baker with Whiskey River. By the way, beginning January 31, your reporter joins the management team at the Casa Blanca Motor Hotel, to serve as the room's ex-

clusive talent agent. You may rest assured that I'll be keeping it country at the class location, some fifty miles from Toronto on the Queen Elizabeth Way.

Winnipeg's Alec Groshak, boss man of V Records, has released a new album by the Blue Mountain Group. They appear to be one of the stronger country lounge acts in northern Ontario and points west.

In conversation with Bud Wendel, general manager of the Opryland-Grand Ole Opry complex in Nashville, I learned that the Opry brass are seriously considering staging a special show, starring headliners from their famous show for Canadian spectators only. It would be a one-time-only experiment, according to Bud, as they regard central Canada, particularly Ontario, as one of the most prime market areas for the Opry shows, and Opryland's outdoor attractions. As things now stand, a Canadian holiday weekend in comfortable travelling weather literally turns the Opryland complex, including all of its attractions and the Grand Ole Opry itself into the fourth largest city in the state of Tennessee, with enough residents of Ontario on the grounds to populate a good size town.

Barry Brown adds record production to his already well known talents of composing and singing with some excellent behind-the-console effort on singles by Don Cochrane and Ralph Carlson. They're both on the Ottawa-based Snocan label. Manitoba by Cochrane and Don's Barber Shop by Carlson are getting considerable DJ attention, and they are richly deserving of every spin. An album by Ralph Carlson has been all but completed, according to producer Barry, and will ship shortly to DJs across Canada.

The bottom line on Mike Graham: one of his tunes has been recorded by Gary Stewart. Do Right Woman, was one of several new things layed down by Stewart at one of his more recent Nashville sessions. Eventual disposition and/or release date is not known at this writing.

Marty Robbins will play thirty five Canadian one-niters in 1977. He has much to remember 1976 for, particularly as it was the first year in his lengthy and successful career that he ever had back to back, number one hits: El Paso City and Among My Souvenirs accomplished the feat, a first that delighted Marty. His forthcoming album, he told me backstage at the December 11 Opry will offer several of the good old tunes in a similar vein to Souvenirs. Why not?

And you think Grand Ole Opry tickets are hard to come by. Opryland's Nathan Kline tells your reporter that the new Opryland Hotel and Convention Centre, not even complete until at least the fall of 1977, has already had convention bookings and inquiries for as far in the future as 1985.

The western ladies are busily pursuing their recording careers. Lovely Glory Anne Carriere has a new single on Royalty that's doing all the right things at this stage of its release that should take it well up the RPM chart. I'd Like To Tell You is another single lifted from the gal's debut album, I'd Like To Take The Chance. And the little sweetheart from Calgary, Roxanne Goldade, continues to get encouraging, cross-Canada

airplay on her Westmount debut, Listen To The Rain. A line from Roxanne this week to let us know that her new single, slated for release next month is entitled Momma Take My Hand.

Making it under the deadline: at long last the new Mercey Brothers' RCA album, Homemade. I already know that it's some kind of album, having heard the master tapes back last Spring at Elmira. Subsequent singles from that session have been very strong for Ray, Lloyd and Larry. And I must say, the long wait for the new work on the cover has been very worthwhile. The new cover design has to be loaded with point of sale impact.

The Maritime Mafia is about to be heard from again. This time it'll be the St. John's Family, also known as Ryans Fancy. The group is about to debut their CBC network, weekly television segment. It'll be seen at seven thirty eastern time on the coast to coast CBC linkup. A new album will be in release on RCA by the end of January. Brand New Songs is the title of the new set, produced by the group themselves in Halifax. About a week prior to the scheduled release date for the new album the group will be the subject of a feature article in the Weekend Magazine, and the publication of a full length book, dealing in depth with the life and times of Dennis, Dermott and Fergus, Ryans' Fancy, will shortly be released by Breakwater Books, a St. John's publishing firm. It appears that 1977 will be the year for Ryans' Fancy, and not a minute overdue either.

Buck Owens has been set for the Beverly Hills Motor Hotel in Toronto's west end during the first week of February. He'll appear with his entire cast.

Best new single of recent times has to be the Linda Ronstadt updating of Willie Nelson's magnificent ballad, Crazy. It's a number one country record the way I hear it, and destined to make some heavy inroads on the pop charts as well.

That new album by the Post Family will be a best seller for Gary Buck's Broadland bunch. One of your better Christmas TV shows was the special involving Gary and several of his artists. It was carried on both the Kitchener CTV outlet, and on CFTO, Toronto.

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Stringband recording by will of their following

Stringband, a Toronto-based folk group who record on their own label, Nick, have put what may be a unique wrinkle in recording annals into their new forthcoming third album. Most records are paid for by the group's following in the stores, after the album has been completed and released. Stringband's has already been paid for, by subscriptions sold at the group's performances and by mail order.

Dick Flohil of Music Arts, who manage and promote the band, stated that Stringband have collected over five thousand dollars for the record from over seven hundred subscribers, some of whom contributed more than the asked-for five dollar rate. Production is already under way at Thunder Sound in Toronto, with CBC producer

Mike Snook in charge.

For the five dollar subscription rate, the buyer receives, in addition to a copy of the album, a regular newsletter from Stringband discussing the progress of the record. Furthermore, his name will appear on the jacket, and he was offered an opportunity to join the band for a session, scheduled for Sunday, December 5, to sing background vocals. The album is appropriately being titled, *Thanks To The Following*.

Flohil explained that the group has had difficulties interesting the major labels, presumably due to the band's non-commercial sound. The first two albums, distributed by Treble Clef and by Stringband themselves, have sold in the five to six thousand range to date. Stringband have a strong following in the prairie provinces.

American Song Festival 1976 finalists announced

The American Song Festival has announced the names of their nine 1976 category winners. There are six amateur and three professional categories, and the amateurs and professionals will compete for one grand prize each.

In the amateur division the Top 40 finalists are Dennis Blair and John Durkin of Whitestone, New York for their entry *When I'm Loving You*; easy listening winner Richard Baron of Plainfield, New Jersey for *Do You Ever Think Of Me*; country finalist Leo Gianangelo of Hyde Park, Massachusetts for *Sing*; David De Luca of Ridgewood, New Jersey for folk entry *Home To Stay*; gospel finalist Warren Hickman of San Francisco for *The Only One*; and jazz-instrumental finalist Bob Francavillo from Endicott, New York for *Stories Past*.

Professional finalists are Mark Vieha of Chicago for the Top 40 entry *Hard Leavin'*; easy listening finalists Kim Carnes and Dave Ellingson of Hollywood for *Love Comes From The Most Unexpected Places*, and country winner Ned Nelter from Seattle for *Take My Hand*.

The Grand Prizes will be presented in festivities in New York City on January 13, 1977.

The American Song Festival is presently in its third year. Some of its amateur winners have since become professional songwriters, and some have signed publishing and recording contracts as a direct result of Festival exposure. Past winners include Kenny Loggins, Bobby Goldsboro, Tom Jans, Eddie Rabbitt, Daryl Hall, Robin Thompson, Tim Moore and Phil Galdston and Peter Thom.

Choya to release album in Canada & U.S.

Paul Clinch and Choya are preparing for their first album release. The album, to be called *Living Like A Rich Man*, will be released in the new year on the Realistic label. Negotiations are currently underway

for a national distribution deal.

The album follows, after a long delay, the success of the single *Linda Write Me A Letter* early in 1976, also on the Realistic label.

Currently Choya is the first act to be signed to Realistic. Anna Moore handles promotion and administration for the label.

The album has been picked up for distribution in the U.S. by Buddah Records through the efforts of Ian Guenther and Willi Morrison, the Three Hats Productions team who produced the album at Phase One. The Linda single has been re-recorded with the help of a Memphis string arranger for the U.S. market, and it will be included on the album. The single has already been released in the U.S., and recently received a Gavin pick. A new single from the album will be released in the new year on Realistic for Canada.

The group - Paul Clinch, drummer Gary Gies, guitarist John Shand, keyboardist Bruce Ley and vocalists Rickie Yorke and Debbie Schaal - will be on the road in the U.S. for a few months in the new year, with bookings arranged by Paul Schinder.

Mushroom's Chilliwack set hectic tour dates

Toronto-based public relations firm Charles-Dunne & Owens report that Chilliwack are scheduled to open the eastern portion of the upcoming April Wine tour. The tour includes dates in Cornwall, London, Sudbury and Ottawa, Ontario between January 4 and 8.

Prior to the April Wine tour, Chilliwack will be appearing with Rush and Wireless in the Maple Leaf Concert Bowl in Toronto, New Year's Eve and January 3.

Chilliwack have just completed a western Canada tour with Trooper and debut appearances in Seattle, Washington and Portland, Oregon. Their current single, *California Girl*, is on the Mushroom label.

Wilcox signs management pact with Steve Wahrer

Music Shoppe International performer David Wilcox has signed a personal management deal with Steve Wahrer, a Music Shoppe agent for two-and-a-half years. Wahrer has left Music Shoppe to manage Wilcox full time. Wahrer had been Wilcox' directive agent for six months prior to the pact.

Wahrer and Wilcox, whose band has a substantial Toronto and Ottawa following, are looking for a North American recording contract. Music Shoppe reports several companies interested.

Wilcox has considerable studio experience and has toured as a guitar player with Ian and Sylvia and Maria Muldaur.

Myles with Ambush doing recording, performances

Myles Cohen, formerly of Myles and Lenny and his Ambush group have been working one-nighters and club weeks in Toronto and the surrounding areas. The group, which includes Rick Doyle on guitar and vocals, Ivan Boudreau on bass and vocals and Bill MacKay on drums, climaxed a busy December with a New Year's week engagement at the Gasworks in Toronto.

Myles With Ambush will be in the studio cutting four sides for CBS. The group is booked by Music Shoppe International.

Music Shoppe re-signs Bond: tour planned

Music Shoppe International and CBS recording group Bond have re-signed their agreement giving Music Shoppe continued exclusive Canadian booking rights for the group.

The group's manager, Barry Cobus of Franklin House, is planning a spring headline tour of the Maritimes consisting basically of schools and colleges.

Bond's directive agent at Music Shoppe is Mike Greggs, who represents all of Music Shoppe's Franklin House acts.

CTL/U.A. effort released in South Africa

They Don't Play Our Love Songs Anymore by Marilyn "Lynn" Jones a CTL production released in Canada on the U.A. label, has been released in South Africa by U.A.'s affiliate RPM (no relation).

CTL's Mal Thompson explained that the syndicated George Hamilton IV television series, on which Ms. Jones is a regular performer, is carried on the new South African television network. Hamilton has been in South Africa promoting the program.

Thompson is preparing to produce a new album for Cathie Stewart, another George Hamilton IV regular.

Pig & Whistle

The first family of Canada's pub life

CTV's Pig & Whistle family is the only Canadian family who live in a pub.

They've been doing it for more than a decade now, presenting one of Canada's

longest-running TV variety shows - a weekly freewheeling and sudsy frolic through everybody's fancy of the mythical Limey and Irish pub.

In mid-December they taped this year's Christmas and St. Patrick's Day special shows, and kept right on celebrating to mark the taping of the 300th programme in the series, produced by CFTO's Glen-Warren Production for the CTV network.

Jerry Rochon, Pig's executive producer since day one, explained in an interview that its creators have always seen the show as a family situation: John Hewer is the father, Kay Turner the mother, and the dancers are the children. Scottish comedian Billy Meek is the interpretive lodger, Anita Scott the crazy aunt, and the Carlton Showband and weekly guests are friends and neighbours.

"If I sat down to create another show, I'd ask myself: What kind of family would I nuclearize?" producer-director John Johnson said, emphasising the success of the family concept.

When they first created the show, Johnson pointed out, entertainment in Canadian pubs was almost unheard of. So was the appearance of drinking on TV. The Pig family used to down British ginger beer on camera, but now are forced to settle for New York State near beer. But it looks real.

Visitors to Toronto often call the CTV offices to find out where the Pig & Whistle are.

Of course, it doesn't exist and nothing like it exists in Britain or Ireland. It's just a successful way to present good-time, old-world music to about a million viewers a week.

"Too many producers produce for critics and people in the industry, Johnson said: "But there is always a place for entertainment for the people."

The mythical British character of the show has been so important to its popularity that during the show's early years they kept it secret that it was created and produced in Canada.

Pig's ratings, Rochon explained, have always been seasonal. Every fall, when viewers are channel hopping to see the season's new shows, Pig's ratings fall. And every year the viewers come back in winter. From December to March it's one of Canada's favourite Canadian-produced variety shows. This year, so far, is no exception.

For the Carlton Showband and six regular dancers, being part of the Pig & Whistle family has been enjoyable steady work.

Dancer Wendy Nicholson, who joined the show four years ago and who dances on others, like CTV's Bobby Vinton Show, said there really is no better TV work in Canada for a dancer. Her mother, Romaine, danced with the show when it started in 1966, and still does.

They like working on the show because it's freewheeling and spontaneous: "Everything is so much friendlier and it all goes so much faster."

"Most television choreography is staged to look good at a distance, but ours is more personal, face-to-face - the interaction of dancers and other performers is more like conversation," choreographer Roland explained.

Roland, who also stages choreography for the Bobby Vinton Show and CTV's Miss Canada and Miss Teen Canada shows, says the loose feeling on the Pig set comes from dancers and other performers stylizing just the sort of things you'd expect from fun-loving amateurs in a neighbourhood pub, only performed by professionals.

Comedian Billy Meek sort of typifies the character of the Pig & Whistle myth. Like so many of the Pig's viewers, Meek came to Canada following World War II. He had performed since childhood in a family act through the music halls of Britain, and like so many other Brits in Canada, had to adjust to a new scene here.

It took him six years to get a Canadian comedy and music act together, and he toured it for 15 years before getting the call from Johnson in 1966. He still tours when the show is not in production.

Johnson says one of the secrets of the show's success is its nostalgia - its dated repertoire. For its first five years all the music was pre-1940. Gradually, they've moved ahead into the war years, and now even include some early '50s material. But he only selects material with a "timeless quality."

Over the past few years he's introduced a little cabaret character into the show, and he sees a gradual shift in that direction for the Pig & Whistle family.

CBC broadcast records are spinning faster

CBC radio's broadcast recordings department has geared up its pop-music activity this year.

CBC's Ann Hunter reports that new recordings by Jackie Richardson, Nancy Dolman, Bev D'Angelo, Marc Jordan, Peter Law, and Diane Brooks are finished or near completion.

Dolman, Jordan and Law have each recorded four of their own compositions, and Jackie Richardson has four songs all arranged by Milan Kimlycka. Diane Brooks taped six tunes and Bev D'Angelo four, three of them originals.

As well, Hunter has set session dates


