## John J. Williams forms Direction Records

John Williams, former director of recording and publishing with CBS Disques in Montreal has formed his own record company, Direction Records. Offices are at 300 Place d'Youville in Montreal, and Williams intends to open offices in Toronto shortly.

Direction will sign Canadian artists and make licensing deals to represent U.S. and foreign product in Canada. They have also formed two publishing companies, CAPACaffiliated One Way Music, and No Turns Music, affiliated with BMIC, which are expected to represent a variety of European catalogues in Canada.

The first record from Direction will be a single by disco artist Jackie Robinson, titled Pussyfootin'. It will be released almost immediately and followed by an album. The release was negotiated with Ariola, a German company.

Williams, in announcing the company, stated, "The emphasis of Direction will be towards an international stance. We will represent our Canadian artists abroad as well as at home in Canada, and will take on artists from other countries who we will represent in this country or on an interna-
tional level."
RCA Ltd. will reportedly distribute Direction product nationally in Canada.

Direction Records will be a bilingual company. Williams explains, "We have major contacts throughout Europe; our ability to function bilingually and biculturally, given our understanding of different approaches, will give us considerable advantages in marketing in Canada and abroad. Williams will be attending the MIDEM conference in Cannes, France.

Michel Normandeau, former member of Quebec group Harmonium, has been apointed Williams' executive assistant. 'Harmonium's three albums have all reached gold status in Canada.

The formation of Direction Records is described as a major move for Williams. He began his record industry career 21 years ago with Quality Records, moved to CBS two years later and, except for a two-year period when he left to establish Les Disques Barclay, had been with CBS since. He had been director of recording and publishing for five years, and was also appointed director of CBS Disques in Quebec two years ago.

## Keane to concentrate on music/production

Barry Keane has left his position as president of RCA's publishing arm, Sunbury/Dunbar to concentrate more on his music and production endeavours. Keane has been associated with RCA for the past five and a half years. Prior to that he chalked up a seven year association with Quality Records working in several management capacities including promotion, A\&R and sales.

Keane will continue to tour with Gordon Lightfoot's backup group and will also step up his studio session and television work. He has become much in demand as a drummer and has a growing list of album credits. Keane is also expected to become involved in independent record production.

As of January 1, Polydor Records has acquired the rights for Canadian distribution of all new Philips releases in the popular and classical fields. These will be released in Canada on the Mercury label. Distribution of the Philips back catalogue will also go to Polydor, effective April 1. At that time, Philips product will be issued on Mercury and distributed by Polydor.

Philips French language product will continue to be distributed by London on the Philips label.

Among the artists whose material will be affected are 10CC, Thin Lizzy, Twiggy, City Boy, and Streetwalkers.

## Quality to do extensive promo on Lynx

Stan Lepka, Quality Records' national promo co-ordinator, is planning a crossCanada newspaper blitz to promote a debut album by Lynx. The album, titled Missing Lynx, is receiving strong FM airplay in the Toronto area and is slated for U.S. release early in the year.

Lynx are presently rehearsing for a string of one-nighters through southern Ontario, booked by Music Shoppe International.

## Dodson exits Stampeders for solo recording career

Rich Dodson, lead guitarist of The Stampeders, has exited the popular group to pursue a solo recording career. He has been with the group since its inception in 1963 and was responsible for many of the group's hit efforts including Sweet City Woman, Devil You and Wild Eyes.

Dodson will be entering the recording studios shortly to tape material of his own. Label information is not available at time of writing.

The Stampeders will continuc to use material from Dodson including a new song, Night ln The City. This will be a cut on their next album.

Dodson has been replaced by Doug Macaskill who is included on the group's new album to be completed in February. He was formerly lead guitar for Dejavu.

## Sold out notices for Mercury's Rush

SRO Productions of Thornhill, Ont., management for Mercury group Rush, report "sold out" concerts at Hamilton's McMaster University (Dec 30) and Maple Leaf Gardens' Concert Bowl in Toronto on New Year's Eve. A total of 14,000 attended the Concert Bowl appearance and a duplicate concert held on lanuary 3. SRO reports that more than 2,000 were turned away at the McMaster concert. The Toronto concerts were opened by Canadian groups Wircless and Chilliwack.

Daryl Dragon and Toni Tennille, the husband-and-wife team known as The Captain and Tennille began some years ago doing various vocal and instrumental sessions, including tours with the Beach Boys. On the strength of a self-released single called The Way I Want To Touch You they landed a recording contract with A\&M, resulting in an album from which was released a second single, their version of Neil Sedaka's Love Will Keep Us Together. The combination of Toni Tennille's vocals and The Captain's arrangement turned the song into a million-seller.

Their most recent album, Song Of Joy is close to double platinum in Canada, according to press officer Jim Monaco. Two successful singles were taken from the album Lonely Nights (Angel Face) and the current top ten item, Muskrat Love.

Their broad appeal has been rewarded with a weekly TV variety series on $A B C$ which has strengthened their following.

A look at the forty year career of one of Canada's media pioneers. Throughout the eras of swing, jazz, rock and today's music, Elwood Glover has been there to talk to artists and talk about their achievements.

## Elwood Glover - pioneer disc jockey and Canada's Mr. Talk Show

When Elwood Glover signs on his weekend radio program at Toronto's CKEEY, it reminds him of the shows he hosted 25 years ago on what was then CBC's Toronto pop station, CJBC.
"I've really gone full circle," Glover said in an interview to RPM: "It's marvelously nostalgic; but it's different now.

Radio is no longer the novelty it was in the '30s and '40s - now it's a necessity, to provide background music and basic information. Then it was an entertainment wonder."

The difference, he points out, is block programming: "Then we programmed in quarter and half-hour segments, and people

spun their dials to hear their favourite shows. The theory of today's programming is that anybody can turn in to the station, but it takes a two or three-hour program format - with inoffensive music and talk - to keep them from tuning out."

Glover is on CKEY Saturdays and Sundays from noon to 6 p.m., and Friday evenings.

Glover, a self-confessed schmalz artist, developed his inoffensive broadcast personality through forty years of radio and TV experience. He joined the CBC as a staff announcer in 1938 and, throughout the next 37 years he hosted some of the network's most popular variety shows and local Toronto personality programs - including Luncheon Date, which began as a Toronto radio show in 1956, became a local TV show in 1963, and was broadcast across the national network after 1971.

Before Glover signed off the show in June 1975, he had interviewed more than 11,000 Luncheon Date guests.

## SMALL-TOWN BOY

Glover, whose Schmalzy, middle-Canada appeal was never liked by the Toronto media critics, was a small-town boy who came to Hogtown to grow with Canadian network radio.

He was born in 1915 to farm parents who pioneered a spread near Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, grew up in Moose Jaw, and broke into radio as an amateur saxophone

player and band leader on Moose law's amateur station, IOAB.

In 1935, when the station had become CHAB , Glover auditioned for, and later won, an announcer job. In his autobiography, Elwood Glover's Luncheon Dates ${ }_{5}$ he recalls
"I opened the station door before 6:00 a.m. every day, cleaned up the studio and handled the 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. time period. From 9:00 a.m. until noon I was out on the street selling spots to local businessmen. From noon until about 3:00 p.m. 1 wrote the commercials and took them around to the advertisers for approval. Then, as often as not, I would return to the station in the evening to deliver the commercials I had written."

It was a dream come true for Glover who, with high school and some university training, had always been a super fan of the big-band radio broadcasting on the big U.S. stations he could pick up with his ear stuck to his set and hand on the dial.

Radio played a big role, in its early days, to create different concepts of broadcast entertainment in eastern and western Canada, Glover maintains.

Out west, where one could receive signals from only a few Canadian stations, the strongest evening signals came from the U.S. big-city giants. Glover's personality radio, developed in later years with the CBC in Toronto, is something born during his American-influenced radio years on the prairies.

## NETWORK BREAK

Glover's break came in 1937 when he was picked to help anchor an on-location broadcast on the newly-formed CBC network show Nightshift, a program originating from a different city each week to report on the recovering post-depression economy.

Among the national audience who heard Glover for the first time was CBC general manager Gladstone Murray, who offered young Glover a job with the network in Toronto.

## glover the announcer

Glover started with Toronto's CBL in the spring of 1938 - chiming the Bulovawatch time several times a day on nonnetwork station breaks.

In March 1939 he married Moose Jaw sweetheart Violet Sharpe between reading Crisco commercials for the 4:15-4:30 p.m. Vic and Sade show and the suppertime departure of a New York-bound honeymoon train.

In addition to announcing, Glover worked on local Toronto record and livemusic broadcasting during the war years on CBY (then the network's secondary Toronto station).

With Byng Whittaker he put on the 1010 Swing Club, a weekly jazz record program - the first of its kind on any CBC station - which later broadcast live from Toronto's Club Top Hat with Frank Bogart and his orchestra.

Glover continued to announce and host on network variety shows like Robin Hood Flour's They Tell Me (later called

The half-hour daily record show was a breakthrough for Glover's personality radio. He writes:
"We set out with an idea that would bring to fruition something that I thought was long lacking - the personal approach to a record show, classical and pop. It had to be attempted on a network noted for a stuffy and formal approach to matters musical. I couldn't think of anything more appropriate to call it than what it was meant to be - Musically Yours, a show slanted to the dilettante, the broad taste, every kind of music with the feeling that each listener could consider it for his or her own special pleasure.
"My approach was to share my wideeyed discovery of much of what 1 , too, was hearing for the first time . . a brief half-hour every afternoon when people who liked phonograph records got together with somebody who was as thrilled with them as they were."

## ENTER LOCAL RADIO

Musically Yours went off the air in 1949, when, with the advent of the ' 50 s, and TV, Glover and the CBC saw the waning of network variety radio and the growth of TV.

As the evening audience's turned to television and advertisers took their support away from radio network variety in favour of the new medium, local radio's high-rated noontime and supper-hour spots began to play a bigger role for the CBC.

CJBC, CBC's secondary station in Toronto at this time, became a local Toronto pop and personality station - and Glover fit right in.

In 1951 he started At Ease With Elwood Glover, a late-afternoon and suppertime pop music record show with news, weather and traffic reports and syndicated features like Bob And Ray.

Glover didn't sign off At Ease until 1971.
In the early "50s Glover was a nember of CJBC's Saturday Night Juke Box Jury with Dick MacDougal and Byng Whittaker.

Each week the jury heard three new releases brought in by eager record company promo men and delivered its verdict: hit or miss.

Some of the biggest stars of the times like Peggy Lee, Frankie Laine, The Four Lads, Nat Cole and Tony Bennett - appeared on Juke Box Jury when they were in town.

Glover's experience interviewing stars went back to the 1010 Swing Club days, when he put the microphone to big band leaders and stars appearing in Toronto.
"What a contrast with today," Glover writes, "Now if you want to interview anybody you just sling a Nagra around your shoulder and tape the whole world. In those days we'd get Roly Anderson to take out the mobile unit, a huge truck used for CBC actuality broadcasts, which we'd park, usually beside a convenient window, run the mike cable into an office, jack up the

sloping corners of the truck assuring a flat, horizontal surface for a smooth unwavering track for the recording turntable."

## LUNCHEON DATE

At Ease With Elwood Glover became a fixture on CJBC's late afternoon spot (although it was never officially confirmed by CBC brass until 1968!), and in 1956 CBC's Toronto brass asked Glover to create something for the noon to $12: 30$ spot.

Luncheon Date was born.
"The show was unscripted, Glover recalls in his book, "In fact, ever since the days of Musically Yours, I grew away from the printed word, more and more relying on anecdotes, amusing items, and current headlines to intersperse throughout the program as I saw fit. This experience proved

invaluable in later years because as I became more involved with daily programming, the pressure of turning out an hour or more a day made script writing an impossibility."

In 1962 Luncheon Date moved from the CBC studios to a table in the corner of the Four Season's Hotel dining room. In 1963 it became a TV show as well, simulcasted on radio for its first TV year.

GLOVER ON TV
Glover was ready for the changes needed for TV. His no-notes style of radio hosting prepared him for the spontaneity live TV

demands. Brief TV appearances in the ' 50 s e encouraged him to discard his hornrimmed glasses, shave his pencii-thin mustache and cover up a bit of his receding hairline.

His chipmunk face and easy ad-lib talk were his main assets to become one of Canada's most prominent TV talk-show hosts of the ' 60 s and ' 70 s .

The location was switched to the lobby of the Four Seasons to accommodate-TV production. In 1970, when the hotel opened a discotheque, Luncheon Date moved in to be a full-fledged variety show.

The hotel's disco was the set - and, with lights and production equipment permanent fixtures, it was appropriately named The Studio.

Luncheon Date's TV audience, Glover reflects, was narrower than the audience he had reached on radio. At home at noon were mostly elderly people and housewives - and as noon talk shows were introduced on other Canadian stations and U.S. daytime talk shows flourished, the competition for even that audience became fierce.

Luncheon Date's. audience was very Canadian too. The most popular shows during the program's network run were: Stompin' Tom Connors' wedding; and Keath Barrie reading his poem, On Being Canadian.

Glover got a band, The Sonny Caulfield

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Trio, and a small budget for entertainment. From 1971 the show was broadcast over the entire CBC network.

Glover signed off Luncheon Date for the last time in 1975 and chose retirement from the CBC over desk jockeying somewhere in the network's bureaucracy.

AND NOW, CKEY
Later that year he joined CKEY, where now, he feels satisfied in reaching, ironically, a larger and more diverse audience than he did on network TV.

Looking back, he reflected in an interview, if he hadn't come to Toronto with the CBC , he probably would have moved into station management in the west. With the CBC , however he always resisted the corporation's tendency to push successful on-air personalities into desk jobs.

After 40 years, Elwood Glover is still on the air - where he really always wanted to be.

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# Canadian music well represented at MIDEM

MIDEM could have become just another impossible dream for Canadian participants if it hadn't been for Canada's Industry Trade and Commerce Department. The government body took the initiative and assisted the Canadian music industry with a government-sponsored booth where they could meet and negotiate with their counterparts from around the world. Consequently the Canadian music industry will be broadly represented at M1DEM ' 77 by leading producers, publishers, record distributors and Canada's performing rights organizations, BMI Canada and CAPAC

Major names represented by Canadian companies at this year's MIDEM include Hagood Hardy, a well-known composer/ arranger/orchestrator/producer and performer. It was his single, The Homecoming, which copped a Juno Award for him last year. The single went on to attain gold status and his follow-up album became a platinum winner. Also being represented will be Stompin' Tom Connors, a past Juno award winner in the country category.

April Wine, represented by the Montrealbased Aquarius records through its president Terry Fludd, will also be a proven name at MIDEM. They are considered one of Canada's highest grossing rock and roll groups. Mainstay of April Wine is their leader Myles Goodwin who writes the majority of their material as well as handling lead vocals, guitar, piano and moog.

GRT's president Ross Reynolds will be representing, among others, Canada's best known jazz performers, Moe Koffman, who is currently on release with a new album, Jungleman.

The west coast's Terry Jacks will also be represented through his Gone Fishin' music publishing company. Ironically, it was Jacks' single, Seasons In The Sun, that became the second biggest English-language hit (after the Beatles) in France. The single, written by Jacques Brel and translated into English by Rod McKuen, has sold in excess of 10 million copies around the world

As well, several Canadian companies are well established in sub-publishing and sub-licensing and the promotion of composers and artists from abroad. Much of this came about, of course, through attending MIDEM over the past few years.

BMI Canada Limited will also be on hand to assist their writers and publishers. The Canadian performing rights organization, a non-profit making organization was formerly a subsidiary of Broadcast Music,
 knowledge of the Canadian and international music industry to their members, visitors and participants at MIDEM.

CAPAC, a non-profit organization operating both nationally and internationally, was founded in 1925. Within their membership they have more than 5,000 Canadian members and represents an estimated 250,000 foreign composers, authors and music publishers through affiliations with 37 similar societies that administer performing rights in more than 100 nations of the world.

From the Canadian government side, those actively involved in this year's MIDEM include F.I. Wood, Minister-Counsellor (Commercial) of the Commercial Division of the Canadian Embassy in Paris, France, and Julie Radwanski, International Public Relations Office of the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce.

In an effort to present MIDEM in its proper scope, RPM contacted several music industry executives who will be attending and, through their own words, they can best sum up the importance of this International Record and Music Publishing Market.

 WHERE IT ALL BEGAN
## Bernard Chevry started MIDEM in '67

MIDEM is the creation of Bernard Chevry, who has organized every MIDEM since the first one in 1967. All of the meetings have - taken place in Cannes, France, a location Chevry had thought ideal for its atmosphere, accommodation and size.

Chevry's background includes the setting up of a wholesale record operation (COGEDEP) and a television programming firm (MIP-TV) among other activities in the early 1960s.

At the first MIDEM in 1967 there were 349 companies and 900 people in attendance, by 1976 the numbers had swelled to 500 companies from 40 countries and over 5,500 people.

Chevry has said, in interviews, that he feels that while if he hadn't founded MIDEM someone else would have, the fact that it has been done by someone outside of the music industry has given MIDEM a greater scope than it might have had.

Chevry has said that it gives MIDEM credibility that the U.S. takes part instead
of organizing their own music publishing market as might be expected. (It wasn't until last year when the first Musexpo was held in the U.S.)

The largest contingents to MIDEM come from the U.S., France, Germany, and the U.K.

MIDEM is set up on four floors of a building, and each floor has a number of booths of various sizes assigned to representatives of various countries. Canada shares one large booth, and each company has staff in charge of appointments. The booth also has listening rooms, as the rules state that music cannot be played audibly. The idea is to go from booth to booth in a circle, making appointments. The booths are open from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and business, naturally, continues back at the hotel during the evening. As Attic's Al Mair explains: "If you're properly organized, you can have breakfast with someone, lunch with somebody else, and dinner with somebody else again, and still squeeze in ten appointments during the day."


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# Canadian industry execs present at MIDEM

## GERRY LACOURSIERE A\&M Records

Gerry Lacoursieré, vice-president of A\&M Records for Canada, attended MIDEM for the first time in 1976. He is not planning to return this year.
"It was a gigantic marketplace for the record industry. We can buy and sell masters and pick up publishing on tunes, sell publishing, etc. It's really quite fascinating. If you've been in Mexico, and you've been

to a market in Mexico where you barter back and forth, you get that same kind of feeling at MIDEM, except that it's all pertaining to recorded masters and song publishing
"A lot of masters were picked up last year and in previous years that became international hits. One that comes to my mind is Andrea True's More More More, which was originally picked up out of a meeting at MIDEM. For someone who's looking for masters and trying to pick up masters for his own territory I think it's fantastic.

Lacoursiere explained that his company is not set up to deal masters independently of its world-wide affiliation: "We're an international label. We're already tied in with licensees in other markets. I would like to see some of these people coming in who can actually do sales marketing and promotion on a day to day basis. Unfortunately at MIDEM you see a lot of people in a position to pick up masters, and being part of an international company, I'm not really in a position to sell masters. The people that I want to see are not really there.
"We're locked in with the international
affiliates through A\&M already. We're not in a position to bargain our acts in other marketplaces. It's part of the A\&M philosophy at this particular point. Should it change so that we could go in and try to make a deal with one of our masters to another company, I could see much more value for us as a company being represented there." A\&M affiliates world-wide hold their own conferences.
"I didn't pick up any masters. That's one of the reasons I'm not going back. We have enough on our own roster. Between the acts that come out of England and the United States and the 14 -odd acts we're producing out of Canada, I just don't feel I can justify picking up something else on top of that.

Lacoursiere noted another benefit of the MIDEM conference, as a showcase for the artists; "I think you'll see some of the best, most professional entertainment there, and you'll find it very well put together as far as showcasing. Every night they have a gala where they have about three or four acts per night. Those shows are videotaped and shown on European TV. It's very good exposure for a lot of acts. Usually they are looking for that international breakthrough.

In summation, Lacoursiere states, "The essential value of MIDEM for us would be picking up masters, picking up subpublishing or publishing for songs in our own territory that originate out of Europe."

## BILL KEARNS Quality Music

Bill Kearns who was recently appointed as manager of Quality Publishing, is a firm believer in MIDEM and in his new capacity will play a much more important role this year. "It's just a tremendous international music thing," says Kearns, "with pcople from all over the world. In a week you can see everybody you need to. The weakest point is that there isn't a great deal of representation from major American companies but Europe, Japan, South America, the East, they're all covered and its possible to see them all. We were able last year to get some product released in. Australia and England."
"The first year you establish contacts, really, and if you get something practical out of it it's a bonus. It's very much a working convention. lt's not a big social event. There are some social things but it's not a party, as opposed to things that have happened here and in the U.S. People come to acquire product and to have product

released in countries other than their own, and you get it done. It's really the only annual internnational music event."
"Last year was the first time I went for Quality. Publishing is relatively new for

us, but it's worthwhile. I think the fact that George (Struth) is going, the president of the whole company, indicates that it is worthwhile. We've opened our own American office now and we're looking to make international contacts."


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## ROSS REYNOLDS GRT Records

GRT president Ross Reynolds will be attending MIDEM this year for the seventh time. He feels a substantial portion of his overseas business is done through contacts made at MIDEM which would otherwise have taken a great deal of time and expense to develop.
"I keep going back because each time I've gone I've felt that it's been worthwhile. We either have placed product overseas or made deals to bring product into Canada.
"What happens is you can get an initial understanding, and then it takes a lot of follow-up. Typically there are very few deals consummated at MIDEM, but there are a number that can be initiated there. There

are some people who do make all sorts of wild announcements of how they bought this and bought that. Some of that goes on, but normally it's making the contacts for later on.
"It's probably the one time of year when I'm able to spend that degree of time and make a concentrated effort of dealing with the foreign licensees and foreign licensors. As a result, it's the prime time for making contacts. Once those contacts are made, they're contacts that are utilized throughout the year. MIDEM is a good time to renew and make additional contacts.
"Both for publishing and record companies we're either trying to acquire the rights for Canada or in terms of our artists or songwriters, we're trying to gain exposure and representation for them in various countries throughout the world."

Reynolds mentioned that GRT has changed its general policy from one of selling the label to one of selling the individual artist, except in areas where access is difficult. On the publishing side, he is still dealing with the whole catalogue.

Reynolds has found the pace at MIDEM somewhat frantic and hurried: "It really is a trade fair in the traditional sense. You run around making appointments. You've got a half-hour or an hour to meet with somebody and discuss business and while you're meeting with them you play your product and he plays his product and you see if there's any interest and then run on to your next appointment.
"If people want to run around and party and be seen, that's available. If people want to run around and put across their product, that's available too.
"It's just the fact that everybody's there. People operate out of the five or six hotels where the majority are staying and a lot of business is done after the day closes in the cocktail lounge."

Reynolds notes some of the shortcomings and disadvantages of MIDEM: "One of the things that it doesn't do is provide a really good access to U.S. record companies. There will be a number of U.S. companies there, but they are not nearly as heavily represented as the European and English companies. We've found it a lot more effective to make those contacts by going to Los Angeles or New York.
"You can dislike a lot about it - that it really is a rat race. The day is set up with appointments literally all day long, breakfast on 'til dinner, so there's an awful lot of running around and a fair bit of horse trading.
"But on the other hand, it saves an awful lot of time and effort. You meet people from Japan and Australia and all the European countries, and even some of the Iron Curtain countries. A lot of the important people from those countries are at MIDEM. Despite all the frustrations, it has each year proved to be a very worthwhile venture."

## ANDY NAGY RCA Ltd.

Andy Nagy of RCA Records' Montreal branch has attended MIDEM several times in the past, and is planning to return this year. He is a strong believer in the conference's merits.
"First of all I think that it is probably, in my opinion, one of the most organized conferences I've ever attended. The entire MIDEM concept is extremely well-organized.
"Where a company like RCA really does benefit is that a lot of the independents in Europe display their wares, their product and publishing and it gives you an opportunity to expose your own product to all of the affiliates - again I refer to a company like RCA where every single affiliate and licensee is in attendence.
"Therefore you get the opportunity, not via mail but on a one-on-one basis, to play your product and do a little bit of selling, telling a story, of each one of the artists you have available to the rest of the world. Until we started to attend MIDEM on a regular basis, it was strictly sending our Canadian productions through the mail, and the releases were very few and far between. Since we got into the MIDEM trip, we've been able to play the product and, by telling our story and the purpose of the recording and the magnitude of the artist in our particular market, we've been able to obtain releases in many parts of the world through our affiliates that we were never able to do before.
"Also, in the event that one of our affiliates would pass on a given record, the opportunity is there to give a second

option agreement to perhaps an independent or even a major that may be interested in the field of product.
"Also, where any of the majors have offered their product to their affiliates in Canada and they have passed on it, it gives us an opportunity to react right on location and pick up a second option for the Canadian market. Some of the names that we did in fact pick up because of MIDEM were artists like Vickie Leandros, Roger Whittaker and Joe Dassin.
"It also gives the opportunity for people attending to view a part of the world that a lot of people are not familiar with. It

gives you an opportunity to see why some of the Canadian productions would not have appeal in other parts of the world, and it gives the foreign people an opportunity to recognize that not everything that's a hit in their particular market would necessarily become a hit in the Canadian market.
"Once you leave MIDEM, the contacts that you have made carry on indefinitely. Therefore, not only on that specific week but throughout the year, should one of our affiliates pass on a record, or should any independent that we have met have a record available for the market, they remember you because of that one-on-one relationship that you attained at MIDEM.
"We do have the opportunity to move a lot of product. Everybody who attends tries to wrap up an agreement while they're at MIDEM, at least in principle. We try to obtain every thing possible that is of interest to us or sell product that may be of interest

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to somcone else at the conference.
"This is my personal feeling. I've gotten different comments from people that have attended who say it's like a circus and so forth, but I would have to say that the people attending in general are extremely serious people, and for the people that want to work and want to establish contacts and move product, there's no greater opportunity in the world than at MIDEM."

AL MArR Attic Records

Al Mair, president of Attic Records and Publishing Group, has been one of the most successful independents (publishing and label) in Canada. He has done business at MIDEM over the past few years and believes that "For a Canadian company, MIDEM is becoming increasingly important because it's so unique. It's the only opportunity most Canadians have for any contact on a one-to-one basis with people from non-American companies. We all go to New York and Los Angeles a lot of the time but how often can you sit down with someone from Australia or Germany or Holland or wherever it may be, and try to understand what their market is all about. One of the key things people here don't seem to realize is that there's a limited number of radio stations in most countries outside of North America. Many countries have fewer stations than we do in Toronto alone. Your chance of getting on the air there is fairly minimal. But you talk to people from there, find out how they get around the problem
of so few radio stations. You try to get an understanding of their market and also what's happening musically."
"Some comments for someone going to MIDEM for the first time would include the explanation that it takes time to establish your credibility, just as it does in Canada. You can't expect people to jump

up and down the first time you play a record for them. They have to evaluate you. You also have to learn to evaluate people yourself, judge what they're offering is worth giving up precious time for. You have to have an idea of exactly what kind of thing you're looking for, and stick to your aims. It takes experience to determine which people can help you achieve those aims. You also must be prepared to make


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a deal on the spot. If you're selling, you have to say what you want for it right away, and you have experience at it. Ask too much and you'll scare a buyer away; ask too little and you may be hurting yourself. In addition to all this, organization is vital, it's a key to success. Organizing your objectives and your time. A week is long enough if you use your time well.
"The first time you go, you don't know what it's all about. You might spend two or three days wandering around, but like any bușiness trip, you should not go helterskelter. You go looking for certain things. If you keep your eyes open, though, you could pick up a good deal you didn't expect. For example, Patsy Gallant's new single is a German song we picked up at MIDEM last year."
"It's the most important international event of the year.
"I'll be going with two lawyers and one of our writers, Greg Adams."

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At MIDEM

GERRY RENEWYCH Chappell Canada

Gerry Renewych, who this year took over the Canadian reins of Chappell Canada as General Manager, has experienced success at MIDEM in previous years. This year however, in his new role, he expects to do even more. "I'll be going myself", he told RPM, "I can only base an opinion on past experience and the several trips I've made before this year. I picked up several compos-

itions when I was there. One tune I picked up was a song called Loving You Baby, which I placed with the group Wednesday, and was fairly successful. Undoubtedly, it paid for several trips I must say, because eventually the song ended up going on two different K-Tel packages which involved sales of over 300,000 units, on top of the success of the song itself.
"Like everything else, you get what you put into it. People get down there and they just think, it's a holiday in some cases. You can get an idea of what's going on in Germany and other parts of the world in terms of the music industry and how they operate. I get to meet people from the Chappell offices in all those places. For an international publisher, it's good for me from the point of view that I meet the heads of the different companies and we exchange ideas in terms of the kind of material they would like to see us pick up for Canada and what we would like to get picked up for the rest of the world."

Renewych explained the process involved in having a Chappell song picked up by another company somewhere else. "If we get involved with a Canadian copyright, a Canadian song, we automatically try to get the song for the world. Let's say I get
the song recorded by a Canadian act and the song comes out in the U.S. and Canada. I send the song to our office in London England and if they turn it down for any reason, if they feel they can't do anything with the product, then I'm free to go to any other publisher in any other territory. That's when MIDEM comes in. That's when we can bring in a record and deal with another outfit there. We're taking down some Brian Way product, and some Sylvia Tyson songs - Nana Mouskouri just recorded one of her songs in French. Also, a song on each of new April Wine and Jackson Hawke LPs.
"The trip is good not only for MIDEM itself but because we also have our inter-national-meetings there, prior to MIDEM. We meet reps from other Chappell offices and exchange product. We don't actually exchange product at MIDEM, it's all done before it starts."

## S.CAMPBELL RITCHIE BMI Canada

Now totally Canadian-owned and operated, BMI Canada is becoming more involved in promoting Canadian music throughout the world. The Canadian performing right

organization's Managing Director, S. Campbell Ritchie expressed his. opinion of MIDEM as follows.
"Since BMI Canada Limited became totally Canadian-owned and operated last Spring we have been even more active in going out into the world to promote Canadian music. MIDEM, in January, is sure to make our job a lot easier. Why, in that one place we'll be able to talk to foreign music publishers, to booking agents, broadcasters and journalists. Since we became independent we've continued to operate under access. agreements with the foreign performing right organizations, and hopefully MIDEM will also allow us to meet personally some of the representatives of their organizations.
"But we're not really going to MIDEM to promote BMI Canada; we're more interested in steering contacts to the publishers and songwriters back in Canada who aren't able to go themselves. The Canadian government is providing sound facilities and our representatives at MIDEM will be taking along tapes and recordings by our affiliates. All kinds of music will be represented,

The 6,700 Canadian writers and composers and 1,200 music publishers who have assigned their performing rights to BMI Canada will be directly represented at MIDEM in France in January.

Since BMI Canada became totally Canadian-owned and operated earlier this year it has made an even greater effort to go out into the world to promote Canadian music.

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from Burton Cummings' new material, to that of Valdy and country star Dick Damron. Many of our affiliates, have, of course, established their own contacts abroad, and all we're trying to do is assure Canadian music creators there is a voice there for them.
"Our representatives at MIDEM were named because of their deep knowledge of music in Canada, and the problems facing Canadians. Carole Risch is from Montreal where she owns her own record label with publishing subsidiaries. She's a director of BMI Canada. Diane Pinet is employed by BMI Canada in the writer/publisher relations department and works directly with Canadian songwriters and publishers."

## TERRY FLOOD

 Aquarius. RecordsTerry Flood, president of Aquarius Records in Montreal, has been to MIDEM twice, and will attend again this year. Since Aquarius is a Canadian record company dealing with the production of Canadian acts, Flood sees MIDEM for him as a place to deal his product abroad, particularly to European countries.
"It's a social gathering where you can meet every year with people who do business in the various countries and keep a social rapport with these people, and it's also a marketplace whėre you can sell various records.
"I find, personally, that it's a marketplace that is better suited for one-shot type of deals where you have a disco record
or a top 40 ; not a major type of a deal with an artist's career development, etc. I don't think you make major deals at MIDEM, where I think that the people you'd be dealing with would rather be sitting at their offices and listen to the product and talk to you in not quite as hectic a circumstance as you do at MIDEM.

"I think it certainly has a value. Aquarius Records has placed a number of artists around the world through contacts made at MIDEM and also through deals made at MIDEM. We had a disco record at the last MIDEM which we did very well in setting up

a number of international deals on. But 1 think on a major deal, say, an April Wine deal, MIDEM's not the type of situation to best set up that type of deal - that's my personal feeling."

Flood has found MIDEM a valuable forum in which to make deals with his records, and finds the conference particularly important in setting up contacts in the publishing field.
"I would say that our main concentration on the European market would be made at or around MIDEM, and that MIDEM would be our main European push for the year. I think, however, that American deals are easier to make in New York or in L.A."

In summation, Flood states, "I think MIDEM is handled and organized as professionally as possible. I don't see any weaknesses in the organization. I think it serves a necessary purpose in the music business internationally."


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BRIAN CHATER<br>BJC Music Management

One of the original supporters of MIDEM, Brian Chater is going again this year. His Montreal-based music management firm has just celebrated its first year with a good profit margin. Says Chater: "There is no doubt in my mind that attendance at MIDEM is extremely important for Canadian independent publishers and producers for many reasons but for one main reason - to make money!
"Whatever the cost and I admit it is high, and the inconveniences, (such as French phones and taxi-drivers) I feel MIDEM is absolutely necessary to any independent as it gives you the chance to meet in one place at one time with a large percentage of the world's music people.
"While the U.S. market is extremely important, there is a great big world out there and most of it with much higher
performance royalties and mechanical rates than we have and also record companies who will pay substantial advances for product they like at excellent royalty rates!
"There are two ways of reaching this market, one is by making a world trip and the other is by going to MIDEM.
"l've always found that after a couple of days at MIDEM you couldn't tell a hit if somebody hit you on the head with it but this doesn't preclude meeting record producers and publishers and taking their product to listen to back home.
"Meanwhile every day you're there you increase your circle of acquaintances, for MIDEM is nothing if not convivial!
"This is to me the one great achievement of MIDEM the chance of meeting so many people and finding out the good people in each territory for your type of product. While you won't complete that many deals at MIDEM, I've initiated many a profitable deal there and signed the contracts over the next few months.
"There is one great truism in the music business that nobody knows where the next hit is coming from and you'll never know if your product is a potential hit in Japan, Spain or Brazil if you don't get it out. Personally I've always shown a profit from the trip after placing masters and I'm sure others who have been would tell you the same story.
"In short there's no way I'd miss MIDEM but from bitter experiences, I'd suggest you take a large quantity of hangover and indigestion pills." world.

JAN MATEJCEK CAPAC

Jan Matejcek, executive assistant at CAPAC, attended the first MIDEM in 1967 and has attended several times since. He will be at the conference again this year. As a multi-linguist, he has served to assist people at the conference as an interpreter.

Mr. Matejcek gave us the following statement on his impressions of MIDEM:
"What Bernard Chevry (the father and General Manager of MIDEM) had in mind originally when he launched his first MIDEM at Cannes in 1967 was to provide a platform for representatives of all sections of the music industry - both in the pop and in the classical fields - to exchange ideas, conclude business deals and also to view live performances by the best pop and concert artists and groups from all over the world.
"As everybody discovered very quickly, there was too much of everything and the following year saw MIDEM in its present form - devoted entirely to the commercial aspect of musical entertainment.
"Is it really necessary for you to attend MIDEM? If you have something to offer you meet all the people you need to meet and whom you may not see otherwise. Everything will be easier once the personal contacts have been established. You may also learn a lot of things, become familiar with new trends in the industry. A few people feel that MIDEM should be held every second year, but you see them there
