

to many factors, including a diligent staff, a strong artist roster, and he especially credits RSO for their expertise in marketing procedure. Contrary to usual methods, RSO released singles from Saturday Night Fever prior to the release of the film, generating interest in both the album and the movie. "In this way, the singles publicized the film and vice-versa. Also, the albums were available in the stores at the same time that the film was being shown," explains Harrold. "The singles effectively provided advertising for the film and created a sense of excitement - definitely a perfect exercise in marketing." Harrold also points out the fact that the success of Fever opened many doors for the rest of the company's roster. "We're now able to get our product into center-aisle, frontrack positions in the retail outlets, providing better and wider exposure. We're all amazed at how much one can sell, provided you can get through to the buying public."

'Success breeds success to some extent,' continues Harrold "Our credibility with clients, radio people, all sectors of the industry, is greatly increased." With soundtrack LPs from Grease (Polygram expects sales of 11/2 million by year's end), Thank God It's Friday, and Fever doing so well, sales on back Bee Gees catalogue and other Polygram acts have also increased, "Eric Clapton is selling better now than he ever sold before. His last album sold gold in the Vancouver area alone. Our job is to achieve the maximum potential for the product we handle, and I think that in these cases we've done really well."

Harrold also sees the success of soundtrack

albums as an indication of things to come: "In a way, the film soundtrack is the precursor of the video-disc. The video disc is, of course, not available yet, but the success of these films and records show that there will be a huge demand for it.

Harrold also commented on the surge of musical excitement that seems to be especially prevalent in Vancouver at the present time. "Polygram divides Canada into three markets: Quehec and the Maritimes, Ontario and western Canada. Each region is now doing onethird of our business, which is quite a different pattern from the past. We're finding that we're doing more and more business in the West. There's a tremendous amount of enthusiasm to break new acts, and lots of excitement out there."

In addition to his responsibilities as Polygram's president, Harrold also serves as chairman for CRIA (Canadian Recording Industry Association), and spoke briefly about the role that he and the organization play. "We've been trying to deal with the government in diplomatic ways, behind closed doors, negotiating and so on. But what has happened is that we've now begun publicising, and very strongly, the classical import issue, for example. (Revenue Canada recently raised the duty and federal sales tax payable on this item, see RPM's September 16 issue, page 3.) The public is now getting very concerned and upset about this, and therefore, to some extent, we're trying to put the pressure on and get a bit more attention for our industry. I think that CRIA, as a whole, is taking up a much more visible stance in government sectors in Ottawa, and I also think that this is the way we have to be. We're also very concerned," Harrold continued, "about questions of piracy and bootlegging counterfeit records and tapes. The government now says that in the future, piracy should come under the civil law. We're really fighting that tooth and nail, because we want it to remain under criminal law. We feel that when someone bootlegs an album or pirates a record, they are committing a crime - the crime of theft. We have to talk very loud and clear to the government about these things, because, understandably, they don't have too much experience in the record business, and we have to spell it out for them."

#### CBS releases jazz debut by key man Dale Jacobs

CBS Records is releasing a debut album by n Epic recording artist Dale Jacobs, Jacobs, a native of Vancouver, is a keyboard master and a multitalented artist, whose creative scope includes writing, arranging and producing. His debut album, titled Cobra, includes session performances from several of the top session people in Canada.

Over the course of his career, Jacobs has been involved in virtually every aspect of contemporary music. Immediatelly attracted to electronic musical sounds, he became so involved with the instruments that he was eventually asked to design new instruments.

In addition, he has been heavily involved, over the past five years, with film scores, ad iingles. television specials and pop songs. He now owns his own recording studio, which enables him to concentrate on engineering and involve himself with compsoing new electronic music

In support of the release of the cobra album. Jacobs and his band have begun a sevendate tour of western Canada, September 19-26. which includes concerts in Winnipea. Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Victoria, and his hometown. Vancouver, CBS are enthusiastic about the album, and feel that Cobra and Jacobs will become hot items in the near future.

#### CBC-TV to air Toronto Symphony special

The Toronto Symphony's China tour will be highlighted in a CBC-TV two-hour musical documentary which will be aired at 9 pm on Wednesday, October 4.

It was in January 1978, that conductor Andrew Davis and the 94 orchestra members journeyed 8,000 miles to the People's Republic, a country just recently opened to foreign visitors. With soloists contralto Maureen Forrester and planist Louis Lortie. the tour covered three major Chinese cities in two and a half weeks. Musical selections included works by Beethoven, Liszt, Mahler, Tchaikovsky and Canadians Francois Morel and Sir Ernest MacMillan, as well as pieces by Chinese composers.

Throughout the tour, Chinese and Canadian musicians exchanged ideas on the music of both cultures compared instrumental technique, and celebrated together at afterhours banquets

During the season, listeners will also be hearing concerts by the Tommy Banks Band (November 3-4), the Moe Koffman Quintet (17-18), and Stephane Grappelli (February 16-17), in addition to regulars Nimmons 'n' Nine Plus Six, The Boss Brass, the Bob Hales Big Band and the Rodger Simard Nine.

(It was Ralph Peer who discovered country artist Jimmie Rodgers, the first person named as a member of the Country Music Hall Of Fame.) The organization rapidly took its place as the first publishing house to involve itself in the international exploitation of music when it expanded into Europe and Latin American during its early years. More recently, Peer Southern's activities have expanded into Japan, Australia and South Africa, and the company's scope has broadened to include all facets of publishing. Peer Southern has also kept itself abreast of new trends and developments in the fields of pop, rhythm and blues, and new wave.

#### CISAC congress slated for Toronto & Montreal by J.J. Lin

CISAC, the International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers, is holding its biennial congress in Canada this year for the first time in its 52-year history. The nine-day gathering will be held in both Toronto and Montreal Sept. 23-Oct 1.

CISAC, the worldwide body comprised of performing rights, mechanical rights, literary and other intellectual property rights societies, includes about 95 organizations located in virtually every major country in the world, with the exception of the People's Republic of China. Delegates from the various organizations involved will gather in Toronto Sept. 23 for an official opening. Following a Sunday trip to Niagara Falls, the delegates get down to business with the official opening of the congress on Monday morning, at which the Canadian government will be represented by the Honourable John Robarts, Secretary of State.

Opening ceremonies will include a performance by the Canadian Brass and a showing of the film North Of Superior. In addition, U.S. Registrar of Copyrights Barbara Ringer will be presented with CISAC's gold medal in recognition of her position in preparing that country's new copyright act. Working sessions begin that afternoon, with discussions of general administrative matters continuing through Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon, a paper will be given by Prof. Erich Schulze of GEMA in West Germany. Canada's own John V. Mills, Q.C.,

General Manager of CAPAC, will deliver a paper Wednesday morning, after which the entire congress moves to Montreal.

Thursday morning, Mexico's Jose Maria Fernandez Unsain gives a paper, followed by another paper in the afternoon and an evening reception given by the city of Montreal.

On Friday morning, CISAC's Administrative Council and Executive Bureau hold their regular meetings, followed by another general meeting, the closing session for the general delegation of the Confederation, and a closing banquet Friday night.

On Saturday, the International Mechanical

Rights Bureau (BIEM), a body comprised largely of European organizations, holds its meetings. Sunday, all the delegates get together one last time for a trip into the Laurentians, highlighted by a luncheon and a pop music concert.

Mr. Mills, representing the host country Canada, noted, "We anticipate there will be about 50 countries represented, with a probable total attendance of 300 to 350. All of the people represented will be the administrators of copyright and the various rights, not only musical but literary copyright, dramatic rights, television screenwriters, and so on, from virtually every major country in the world. CISAC is the grouping of all the creative people in all of the different forms and bodies."

Papers and general business meetings will be open to the entire delegation, plus special guests, such as representatives of UNESCO, the World Intellectual Property Organization, and the Canadian government. Although the individual creative person will not be able to hear the papers delivered, copies of the texts will be made publicly available after the congress.

Canada is represented in CISAC by three bodies; The Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada (CAPAC), and two more literary-oriented groups, the Societe des Auteurs and Societe Canadienne-Francaise de Protection du Droit D'Auteurs (SCFPDA).

#### CISAC - The voice of the creative people worldwide

In the 52 years of its existence, the International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC) has become a very powerful world force in the protection of the creators of intellectual properties. The organization was formed in 1926 as an international body of performing rights and mechanical rights organizations, dramatic, literary and audiovisual right protection groups.

CISAC now comprises 72 regular member and 23 associate member organizatons, and the International Federation of Translators, totalling 96 groups involved.

The Confederation's statutes define its basic aims as:

1) to assure and safeguard the respect and protection of the moral and professional interests of the creators of all literary and artistic works.

2) To safeguard and contribute to the defense of the legal and financial interests attaching to such works, both nationally and internationally.

3) To coordinate the technical operations of member societies and to ensure collaboration among them, always on the understanding that each society has total authority over its own international organization.

4) To set up an international information and study centre.

In order to achieve its aims, CISAC's regular members elect an Administrative Council comprised of 24 member organizations. Presiding over the council this term is West German's Werner Egk, with Portugal's

Luiz-Francisco Rebello serving as vice-president. The presidents of the various major councils under CISAC also participate in the Administrative Council. The Administrative Council in turn elects from among its members an Executive Bureau which meets twice a year, around the world, to manage the affairs of CISAC. The current President of the Executive Bureau is Jean-Loup Tournier of SACEM, France, with CAPAC's John Mills serving as vice-president. The Bureau includes eight other members, plus CISAC's

Secretary General, Jean-Alexis Ziegler, a permanent member who administers the organization full-time from its Paris head-quarters. The Administrative Council and Executive Bureau members are elected every other year at the biennial congress.

Working with CISAC's main structure are several permanent councils and committees, as well as a large number of subcommittees struck whenever there is a need to

#### France - birthplace of the creator's rights

The notion that the creator of a piece of intellectual property should have the right to determine the use of that property has only really become established throughout the world within the past century, catching up very slowly with the rights of the inventor of a physical creation. The world leader in recognizing and preserving the rights of the creative beople has always been France. France was the first country to recognize the idea and the first to establish an organization to enforce the rights of performance.

The principle of copyright of an intellectual property actually dates back to the early 17th century. It is written that Tristian the Hermit, a writer who lived from 1601 to 1655, had a valet who wrote a play. Tristian decided to produce it. The actors agreed to share the proceeds with the author, but when the public discovered the play had been

written by a valet, they refused to pay the full price to see it. This would leave a small wage for the actors, and nothing for the playwright.

When the valet complained, Tristian stepped in and asked the actors to agree to pay the author one-ninth of their pay. In this way, according to the story, the principle of performing rights was established.

As early as 1791, the notion of copyright protection has been a part of French law. At that time, Louis XVI signed a decree giving authors the exclusive right to authorize the use of their works in public. Another law was passed two years later concerning reproduction of works. However, policing the protection of copyright remained a problem for decades after.

attend to some particular matter. In addition to the Administrative Council and Executive Bureau, there are four international councils for creative people, covering the fields of composers and authors of dramatic work, of music, literary writers and authors of audiovisual works. In addition, a Pan-American Council has been established dealing specifically with the problems of South America, and a Pan-African Council dealing with matters in the Dark Continent

Two full-time committees also work within the CISAC organization. They are a technical committee, dealing with computer systems, assisting countries in the establishment of EDP and working on compatibility among the different countries' systems, and a legal and legislative committee, dealing with copyright law in countries around the world.

Sub-committees are formed very frequently, as necessity dictates, and can deal with anything from an international concern, an internal matter, or even a new medium, such as satellite broadcast or cable television, which involves the use of created

works. These committees meet regularly, or irregularly, all over the world. CAPAC's John Mills explained to RPM, "It's a constant participation. The secretariat is exceedingly busy. The Secretary General is constantly all over the world, with meetings on all the different areas of copyright that come up."

The scope of CISAC's involvement is immense. They attend meetings to help establish copyright legislation in various countries to protect created works, they lobby and bring world pressure to bear on countries in order to ensure this protection, they assist nations in the establishment and betterment of copyright legislation and royalty collection, and provide a forum for the regular discussion of copyright matters.

Mills observes, "CISAC is a very important body in the whole sphere of international copyright legislation. It attends international congresses and governmental conferences dealing with copyright matters, as the spokesman for the creative people. It's held in very high esteem. It's a very important organization, a constantly active body, and really the only organization on the international level that is dedicated solely to the protection of the creative people."

# Bachman pacts with CBS for Legend distribution

Randy Bachman, president of Legend Records, has announced the finalization of worldwide contractual arrangements with ACBS Records for distribution of Legend Records product, including product by Canadian group Trooper, who Bachman produces. Canada is excluded.

Negotiations are now underway with MCA Records, who currently distribute and market Trooper product in North America

Concert promoters and theatre owners continued to use the works of composers and authors without paying royalties. There was little the authors could do indvidually. They had to cooperate in the formation of an organization which would police their rights and distribute their royalties.

The birth of this organization dates back to 1847. Writer Ernest Bourget and composers Paul Henrion and Victor Parizot were attending a cafe concert at the Ambassadeurs on the Champs-Elysees in Paris. Several of their works were performed in the concert, but the creators were not offered royalties for the performance. They noted that while the public were paying them nothing for the right to hear their music, they were expected to pay the cafe owner for their seats and food.

The three refused to pay for their meals, claiming the use of their music as payment. They further took the matter to court, securing at the same time the support of publisher Jules Colombier. On September 8, the decision came down, forbidding the Ambassadeurs to use the creators' works. The owner pursued the matter, and the case went to court again. This time the decision, from the Paris Court of Appeals, not only refused the proprietor use of the works, but he also had to pay the creators substantial damages.

As a result of this verdict, Bourget, Henrion, Parizot and Colombier founded the Agence Centrale Pour La Perception Des Droits Des Auteurs Et Compositeurs De Musique in 1850. The organization, the world's first performing rights society, quickly gained over 200 members and collected about \$32 that May. The following year, the Societe Des Auteurs, Compositeurs et Editeurs de Musique (SACEM) was formed. The new organization collected and distributed over \$3,000 in its first year, and over \$200,000 three decades later. SACEM, now

one of the world's largest performing rights organizations, turns over about \$70 million per year.

As SACEM grew in size and organization, it also began to spread. The French organization, holding firm to its belief that the protection of the rights of creators is a sacred trust, assisted in the formation of a Belgian society in affiliation, and later did the same in Britain, Holland, Switzerland, Spain, Greece, Monaco, Portugal, Rumania, Syria and Egypt. Foreign writers and composers, with no agency in their own countries for protection, were glad to let the French society act in their behalf.

In time, writers began establishing national performing rights organizations in their own countries. In September of 1886, 14 nations

attended a diplomatic conference in Berne, Switzerland, paving the way for the Berne Copyright Convention, signed by the 14 countries two years later. In 1926, the International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC) was formed as an international body to represent the interests of the creative people around the world


CISAC now includes 95 member societies representing virtually every civilized country in the world. It carries a very strong lobbying voice in world diplomatic circles, and has upheld its sacred trust very successfully in its 52 year history. It was only natural, in choosing a headquarter site for this body, that it be established in Paris, France, the birthplace of the creator's rights.

To help promote Frozen In The Night, the album from which both singles were taken, Hill has just completed a promotional tour in western Canada, where he visited key market radio stations in Vancouver

and Calgary. Live interviews with the artist were aired on Vancouver radio stations CKLG-FM & AM, and CJAY-FM in Calgary, while additional interviews were taped at CFCN, CKXL and CFUN.

Frozen In The Night reached gold status on its release date of Aug. 17, and with reorders coming in at a steady pace, GRT expects the album to reach platinum within a few weeks.

#### Crowcuss hit number one in Guatemala

Winnipeg's Crowcuss, currently completing their first album for the Edmonton-based Stony Plain label, recently learned that their single, Running Start, has hit the number one spot on Guatemala's Radio Exclusiva, Central America's top rated radio station. The single was leased to Dideca Records for Central America, and climbed to the top chart position within four weeks of release.

"It's an unprecedented situation for a Canadian band," commented Holger Petersen, Stony Plain label manager. "The credit goes to Yehudi Altman, a friend of the group's and an entrepreneur in Guatemala City. He presented a demo tape by Crowcuss to an announcer at the station, Running Start was played a few times and the response warrented a chart listing. We then worked out a licensing agreement with Dideca Records. Crowcuss recently did a long-distance telephone interview with the station, and there is a possibility of a Central American tour."

Running Start will be released in Canada simultaneously with their upcoming album, Meanwhile, the group's current single, Love School, is receiving extensive airplay in western Canada.

## Fraser Jamieson & London Records of Canada

### A thirty-year relationship

By far the longest serving record company president in Canada, London's Fraser Jamieson effectively entered the recording industry at that position 30 years ago. Jamieson reached the presidency of London via an unusual and circuitous route.

Born in Montreal in 1917, Jamieson at-

tended the University of British Columbia and graduated as an electrical engineer in 1942. As the country was then in the midst of World War II, he immediately enlisted in the Canadian Navy, and was assigned to a special, then-top secret branch called R.D.F., which was, in fact, radar. He was placed on loan to the British navy.

After the war, Jamieson returned to Canada, and through a connection, moved down to New York, under the suggestion that he might market some gramophones. The company turned out to be London Gramophone, who were introducing the high fidelity recording to North America. There he met the man in charge, Mr. Toller-Bond. who convinced him that instead, he might prefer to become involved in a new project being launched by Decca, called Decca Navigator. The company was being set up to manufacture a new system of navigation. Jamieson accepted the offer.

Decca Navigator didn't progress very rapidly (it is quite successful in most other world markets), and Jamieson recalls, "I had to go to Europe for a while, and when I came back, there were a whole bunch of new guys in the building, and they were all selling records. So I got into the record business."

Jamieson continues, "Everybody was a vice-president there, so Toller-Bond told me that if I could find someone that didn't have a boss, I'd have a job. I went out in the back end, which was about to be a warehouse, and there were two guys there. I said, 'You fellows got a boss?' They said, 'No, Sir,' and I said, 'You do now.' So I became the head shipper for London Gramophone in New York '

At that time, there were no records to ship, but the first crates came in several days later. There were 300 records (78's) to a 150-pound case, and Jamieson and his staff of two loaded them in themselves - the

first case of London records in North America.
Within a year, London had become somewhat more established with their first major hit, Gracie Fields' Now Is The Hour, and Jamieson returned to Montreal with Jim Landy: to open the company's Canadian office as o Managing Director - the British name for the same job as president. (The title was changed several years later). A career was born that was to become one of the most illustrious and respected in the history of the Canadian industry

Jamieson recalls the early days in Canada: "There wasn't much change when I got to Montreal. I was doing basically the same thing. I was still humping records into a warehouse and shipping them out."

London started out in September 13, 1948 with a staff of about six. The following February, an event occurred that would have a marked effect on both London and Jamieson, when Alice Koury was hired. Koury progressed through various clerical,

secretarial and executive positions, eventually becoming Vice President and Mrs.

Jamieson.

London has progressed and grown vastly since the early days, from distributors to branch offices, and with the addition of lacquering, tape manufacturing and record pressing facilities, as well as a full-blown national sales and promotion team. Jamieson now administers a large organization, overseeing over 300 employees and manufacturing and distributing product from around the world throughout the country.

Jamieson has delegated much of the responsibility in the creative and marketing veins to his Vice President Koury, who oversees artists & repertoire and the general business side of the company, and to Ken Verdoni, Vice President, Marketing. He concerns himself largely with his own love, which is the technical side, supervising closely

London Records of Canada (1967) Limited and its president, Fraser C. Jamieson, recently celebrated mutual landmark milestones within the Canadian recording industry. On September 13, London celebrated the 30th anniversary of the day Jamieson first opened the operation in Canada.

London, now a wholly-owned subsidiary of the British Decca Record Company Limited, has progressed vastly from those opening moments, when Jamieson personally carried in the first crate of records and celebrated the occasion with his staff of six. The company is now a fullybranched national operation including under its umbrella facilities for mastering, pressing and tape manufacturing, as well as a thorough sales and promotion force. They employ over 300 people.

London is also a force on the international scene, distributing product from a wide variety of labels and companies from within Canada and around the world, in virtually every musical field, from classical to rock, adultoriented and disco, in English, French, and any other language marketable.

Herewith, RPM tells the London story, from its birth in British Decca to its current status as a major Canadian record company. It is also the story of Fraser Jamieson, the man who has guided the company along every step of the way from its inception.

the lacquering and manufacturing aspects. Jamieson notes, "I think my interest in those things technical reflects my background. I started off in life as an engineer, and I suppose I've never really gotten away from it."

Jamieson is also heavily involved within the music industry, both in Canada and globally. He is a past president of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA), and currently chairman of CRIA's Copyright Committee. He is also president of the International Federation of Phonographic Industries (IFPI), a worldwide body of recording industry associations. Jamieson was instrumental in convincing the IFPI to hold its annual meetings in Canada last year, celebrating the 100th anniversary of recorded sound. For his efforts on behalf of music in Canada over the past three decades, Jamieson was honoured last year at the RPM Music Industry Awards by being named to the Canadian Music Hall of Fame.

Above all, Jamieson runs London Records with an attitude of fairness and honesty, both towards his staff, artists and employees, and towards the people and companies he deals with in the industry. Artists and labels come and go, but Jamieson and London try to maintain as friendly and honest a relationship with the industry as possible. Jamieson, with 30 years experience, observes, "It seems to work that way."

## THE BRITISH DECCA STORY - AND SIR EDWARD LEWIS

London Records of Canada is a wholly-owned subsidiary of British Decca, of which the Chairman is Sir Edward Lewis. Sir Edward, a former stockbroker, has run the operation since he began in 1929. Among his early accomplishments was the formation, in the 30's, of American Decca, which was to become a very powerful company for years to come.

Sir Edward's first years as Chairman of Decca were not all he had hoped for, as he found himself and his company very quickly in the midst of the Great Depression. However, the adversity gave him an opportunity to truly prove his merit. "A lot of people give Sir Edward credit for saving the record industry in the 30's," notes London Canada President Fraser Jamieson. "The record industry got hit by two things in the 30's. One was the depression, which was pretty awful, and the other was the so-called 'batteryless' radio."

The "batteryless" radio, which plugged directly into the wall, replaced the cumbersome battery which had been used in the 20's, and made radio a very important cultural medium as popular as television is today. Furthermore, despite the invention of the electrical microphone, which vastly improved the quality of recorded sound, radio, which featured live music and dramatic programming, cut deeply into record sales, since people couldn't afford to buy both.

Jamieson recalls,"A lot of record companies nearly failed, and a lot of them did fail. In

1933, the record industry reached its lowest ebb. Then it started to take off again.

"A lot of people say it was Sir Edward's faith that did it. In Europe, radio didn't develop as quickly as in the States, and he was the one who wanted American talent

for Europe. He made deals and got the rights to American product for Europe. He just believed in it, and by the time the war rolled in, in 1939, they'd sold their first million seller, by the Andrews Sisters."

Decca also developed such talents as Guy Lombardo, Bing Crosby and Mantovani,

becoming one of the top labels of the day.

During the war, British Decca was asked by the government to give up its international holdings, as were most British companies. They lost control of their U.S. operations, which were later acquired by the Music momentum of America and have since become MCA. Decca, however, managed to buy back its American classical catalogue after the war, and remains to this day a top purveyor of classical music.

Through the years, Sir Edward and his company have always been great innovators. They became involved in the creation and development of some of the early radar and navigation systems. One of their wartime creations would evolve into a major recording state of the art break through.

During the war, the RAF discovered that a microphone dropped into the water could detect whether a ship or submarine was German or British, because of differences in sound frequencies. They wanted a recording as a teaching tool, but the frequencies were too high for conventional recordings. Through Decca and Arthur Haddy, a huge cutter was invented which could record sounds up to 14 kHz, from the previous 6 kHz standard. This developed into the first high fidelity recording system, Full Frequency Range Recording (FFRR), which gave Decca an edge in recordings until well after the war.

Further Decca breakthroughs in state of the art included Sound 4 Monophonic

recordings, essentially the first use of four-track recording. This led, in the 60's to Phase 4, considered one of the first major steps toward modern quality recording.

Decca was also instrumental in the development and success of stereo. Arthur Haddy was again involved, helping to devise a compromise method of stereo reproduction to solve a dispute, creating the convention now in use worldwide. Another major involvement was in the development of the Dolby noise reduction system, both for the studio and for home use. London, in fact, were the first Canadian company to manufacture cassettes using the Dolby system.

To this day, Decca and London continue to maintain the highest degree possible standards in the quality of their recordings, and of Sir Edward Lewis, Jamieson speaks proudly when he says, "He's my boss, and a very good boss."

### LONDON RECORDS OF CANADA IT BEGAN IN MONTREAL - 1948

In 1948, when Fraser Jamieson first opened the doors of the London Gramophone Corporation of Canada, roughly 50 percent of the record business in Canada was in the hands of RCA Victor, with most of the remainder controlled by Columbia and Decca (MCA).

London Canada started out in the second floor of a building in Montreal whose main floor served as a bottle reclamation operation. At that time, London was a small company whose main task was shipping imported product from London U.S. to a system of distributors across Canada. The first and largest of these distributors was Mackay Records of Toronto, run by Max Zimmerman. This was followed by distribution agreements in Calgary, Vancouver and Winnipeg, with London distributing to the Quebec market itself.

At first a subsidiary of the U.S. London Gramophone operation, the company has since been acquired directly by British Decca, the company who also own the U.S. concern. In 1954, the Canadian operation's name was changed to London Records of Canada.

After a little more than a decade, Jamieson became determined to see the company grow and become more independent. London began to buy out its distributors and establish branch offices instead. Jamieson recalls, "We took over Calgary as a branch in 1962, and Winnipeg in 1963, Vancouver in 1964 and Toronto in 1967 as a branch operation. We then opened a branch in Quebec City in 1969."

In so doing, London actually became the first company to achieve total national distributorship in Canada. "Even though RCA were there ahead of us, for a long time they had a distributor in Saskatchewan. So we were the first ones to be 100 percent branched."

In addition to its growth as a distributor, London began to branch out beyond the simple business of import distribution. Having become a manufacurer as well as distributor, they decided in 1964 to open their own lacquering facility. They had previously used those of RCA. They had developed ties for record pressing with Compo, a company which dated back to the Berliners, inventors of the flat disc.

In May of 1970, they expanded further with the building of their own tape manufacturing plant, to accommodate the growing market for 8-track and cassette tapes. Within a few years, they would become the first company to manufacture tapes recorded using the Dolby noise reduction system. Then, in April of 1975, they took a grant step into the world of manufacturing with the opening of their own record pressing plant.

With total control over the physical manufacture of their product, they would be able to ensure the highest possible quality standards. The pressing plant has a capacity of 10 million albums and 45 million singles per year.

As the company grew, London had to change its base of operations several times through the years, ending up in a huge complex on Montreal's Cote de Liesse. The Building is the home of the company's national offices, the Montreal branch office plus the lacquering, tape manufacturing and record pressing facilities, as well as ware housing and the local one-stop operation.



They have also carried, for a time, such international and Canadian labels as Philips, Mercury, Tamla/Motown (one year), and Aquarius. They continue to distribute a large number of international labels, many of which are associated with British Decca, and maintain status as one of the top distributors of Canadian product and Canadian labels. In fact, London has been instrumental from a very early stage in the support of Canadian artists, with the full encouragement of the parent company British Decca. In 1951. London recorded a collection of French-Canadian folk songs by Jacques Labrecque, who later achieved a major hit with La Parentee. Later in the same year, a makeshift studio was prepared to record the first-ever London record in Canada. It featured Pierre Roche and Charles Aznavour.

#### LUPIN, BRADLEY AND TRUDEAU THE MANUFACTURING TEAM

The key positions in London's mastering, tape manufacturing and pressing facilities are occupied by three men whose combined experience spans well over half a century. They are Emile Lupin, in charge of the mastering rooms, John Bradley, who manages the tape operations, and plant manager Claude Trudeau.

Lupin notes, "My job is to provide the pressing plant with the best lacquers possible." In order to do so, he has two identical cutting rooms at his disposal. The rooms were de-


signed with very close attention paid to their acoustics, and no expense was spared in obtaining the best state of the art equipment and monitors.

Lupin is responsible for mastering both albums and tapes. For albums, the master tape is recorded onto a lacquer disc, which is taken to the pressing plant. There, it is duplicated in negative on metal. A positive is made from the metal master, from which are created stampers.

For tapes, a one-inch running master is made and attached to itself, creating a tape loop. Huge tape pancakes on a series of

machines later record the album over and sover, and a sound message at the beginning/ send of the tape loop causes the manufacturing machinery to cut the tape at the right point.

For Lupin, the major concern in both Nacases is preserving the highest quality sound and product cutting a lacquer without hiss, pops or excessive noise, making 8-track masters without run-offs or fade-outs, whenever possible, and handling the last possible chance to re-equalize the sound. Lupin notes, "Our great advantage is that we're so close to the plants that if anything happens, there's a direct connection, and the problems can

Of the tape department, as well as mastering and pressing, Bradley comments, "We pride ourelves on a very high standard of quality. We put a great deal of emphasis on it. We have two levels of quality check - quality control and quality assurance."

The London tape plant was opened in 1970, and is the first in Canada to produce Dolby cassettes.

Claude Trudeau is another industry veteran, dating back to the Emile Berliner days at Compo and the shellac record. He joined London as plant engineer in 1974, and became plant manager when the plant opened the following year. Trudeau was largely responsible for training the plant's original staff.

In its early days, as with all new plants using untrained personnel, the reject rate was quite high. That situation is now well in check, with rejects at a comfortable less-thansix percent on albums and around two percent for singles. The quality situation is in

Dans hasn't acquired any gold albums yet. considering the small size of the Canadian classical market, but several are over halfway there, and with the market increasing all the time, one can never tell.



The RPM 100 is a national chart compiled weekly from national sales and radio station airplay and chart action. The top 50 records are computed from sales and airplay.

The computation of the records from 51 to 100 is based on early airplay, chart action and regional sales and breakouts. The chart is based on samplings from markets across Canada and indicates trends that may not be prevalent in all areas of Canada. Shaded numbers inideate a strong upward trend and gains in airplay or sales. This chart is offered as a guide to new product and an indication of trends in Canadian markets.

The RPM 100 singles and album chart (or any part therof) may be reproduced with a proper credit.

# to the editor

I just read your programmer's editorial about wages in broadcasting in the August 12th RPM. First I would like to say thank you for doing this research. It is sorely needed, and hopefully, it might change management's attitudes.

I feel fully in agreement with your whole article, especially the part about the inexperienced people hired by stations, as we say - to fill the hole. Too many stations do this, and its effect on the industry is hazardous. But my own personal experience leads me to think that this is not always true. Some naturally talented (and this assumption is up to each broadcaster individually) people are scared away from even trying broadcasting as a career when they hear what the wages are.

One thing I notice about them is they have a definite feel and heart for music, sports or journalism. As a good announcer who would like to see the standard of his industry rise, I suggest radio careers to these types of people. And they want to give radio a go, but the wages and benefits for station staff just negate the whole idea. So we are back where we started, to quote your article 'hiring greenhorns who are after glory or graduates of RTV courses that they say do not relate to the reality of radio.' Trevor A. Harvey

## Country Music Week set for end of month in Regina

During the week of September 25 - 29, Regina, Saskatchewan will be the scene of Regina, Saskatchewan will be the scene of Country Music week, five days of musical entertainment performed by some of Canada's leading country acts throughout the city. The event has been organized by Fred King and the Host Committee.

Beginning on Tuesday, September 26, through Thursday (28), country music shows will be presented at the Northgate, Golden N Mile and Southland shopping malls, featuring country shows which will run from 12:15 to 2:45, pm each afternoon. Three acts will appear daily in each location.


