Praxis' Elias incensed over industry wags

Having recently returned from both the MIDEM and NARM conferences, Al Alias of Praxis Technologies says the retail segment has "nothing to worry about" in the upcoming months. "I think the industry's in for one helluva second quarter," he adds.

At MIDEM, Elias maintains an important "dialogue" was established between the world's compact disc manufacturers, who were quick to dispell rumours that CD price drops were imminent.

"If anything else came to light," he continues, "it's that we have two distinctly different words in the manufacturing sector. One is capacity and the other is production. There are those who say they've got 18 million capacity . . . but what is their actual production?"

"There's a big difference between those two words, and they seem to have confused a lot of people. There's a lot of groundswell, over remarks there'll be an overproduction situation with regards to CDs this year. My personal opinion is that the market has been sadly underestimated."

Elias does add however, that the Japanese and Koreans were conducting a

CD sales in Canada show an increase of 179 percent

Industry statistics for the month of December, 1986, released by the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) show the net value of sales of CDs for the year-to-date were \$48,902,000, as opposed to \$17, 541,650 the year previous, an increase of 179 percent.

The breakdown, as far as net shipments (units), reveals that during the month of December 1986, 398,000 units were sold, as opposed to 161,050 the previous year, an increase of 147 percent. The year-to-date figures were 3,345,000 units shipped, while in 1985 there were only 1,304,201 units shipped, an increase of 156 percent.

The net value of sales for the month of December 1986 were tallied as \$6,140,000, while the year previous they were \$2,190,818, an increase of 180 percent.

Combination of CD and video technology a reality

The video single, an application of "optical playback media", technology based on Compact Disc, will be introduced to the public at the Consumers Electronic Show in Chicago this June. The announcement was made by the N.V. Philips and Sony Corporations.

Although the regular 5" CD players will be audio compatible with the new technology, CD video players have now also been introduced. And, vice versa, all CDs can be played on the new players. In order to distinguish the video single the regular CD, the former will be manufactured in gold colour.

However, beyond the various CD players, Philips has introduced their "Combi-Player", which has the capability to play CDs, video singles, as well as the 8" and 12" optical video discs already on the market.

Called LaserVision, the optical discs of-

Genie organizers quickly rectify slam to McTeague

It was only after the voting ballots for this year's Genies were sent out that it was discovered there was one nominated song not on the ballot for Best Original Song. The song, Toby's Theme (Cold As Ice), was from the Filmline movie, Toby McTeague, and one of the first to realize the error was the producer of the film Pieter Kroonenburg of Filmline International. Needless to say his reaction was "cold as ice", and the Academy of Canadian Cinema & Television-organizers of the Genies - was quick to remedy the situation by sending out a new ballot for Best Original Song to its 800 voting members across Canada.

It was stressed that "only the new ballots" with the Toby McTeague song included "will be tabulated" by the academy's accountancy firm, Thorne, Ernst and Whinney. Academy members have until Mar. 9 to vote. The awards ceremony will be held Mar. 18.

In the meantime and taking advantage of the added press this omission has caused, Scott Richards, president of Freedom Records, has rush-released the single of Toby's Theme (Cold As Ice), performed by Kevin MacDonald. The single was written by Kevin Hunter and Peter Pringle, and produced by Hunter and Claude Demers. The flip, Toby's Race, written by producer Demers and J. Kaplan, is also featured in the film.

fer a maximum of 40 minutes (the 8" EP) of combined analog video and digital or analog audio, while the 12" configuration runs 2 hours. They provide opportunities to combine CD sound with the "superior quality" of the optical video disc for programs such as concerts, video compilations or films.

The companies report that for the first time it will be possible to hear digital sound with video clips because there is no sound difference between the Compact Disc and the video single.

Both are also reportedly investigating the possibility of developing a CD audio single that would be compatible with existing CD players. A 3" audio single could carry up to 20 minutes of digital music and made compatible by means of an adaptor. The popularity of the CD format has made the development of a successor to the 7" analog single necessary.

Title track taken as first single from new Box LP

Alert Records has just shipped the title track as the first single from the third Box album. The single, Closer Together, will be followed by a March 20th LP release.

The Toronto-based label has also scheduled a 12" radio-only release of the track, as well as an extended dance mix to follow. Guesting on the single is Quebec vocalist Martine St. Clair on backing vocals.

The album was produced by The Box and Marc Durand (President of Alert), at Studio Vert in Quebec City. A video, directed by Box member Jean Marc, is also available.

Chrysalis and MCA renew distribution deal

While many industry insiders were expecting the Chrysalis executives to strike a deal with CBS Records in Canada, official word has come down that MCA has renewed their agreement for the rights of the label in Canada. Chrysalis is distributed in the U.S. by CBS.

"The successful team of Chrysalis Records' artist roster and Canada's MCA marketing and distribution has delivered extremely positive results during our first three-year association," comments Jack Craig, President Chrysalis Records.

The label currently boasts a pair of Canada's "hottest" records: the multi-platinum Fore by Huey Lewis & The News, and Billy Idol's Whiplash Smile.

"The growth of our label roster and the effective execution of the marketing of our music by MCA Canada has produced artist career development results very quickly," he concludes.

Ross Reynolds, Executive Vice President and General Manager of MCA Records Canada, maintains that "The explosive growth of Chrysalis was key in the re-emergence of MCA in Canada," continuing with "It is most gratifying that we will be participating in the next phase of Chrysalis' growth as they continue their history of breaking and developing new artists."

Amid Capitol-EMI's "Year of the Tiger", last summer the Crowded House debut album was released. However, only now is the band, formed and fronted by ex-Split Enz member Neil Finn, beginning to see the fruits of their and producer Mitchell Froom's labour.

Written and recorded on the band's "own terms", says Finn, their self-titled release is currently climbing the charts across North America, fueled by the success of the first single, Don't Dream It's Over. The eventual popularity gleaned from the recording ironically, was not Finn's motivating factor, he relates, as much as just doing "what we had to do."

Even though Finn is the band's songwriting inspiration (and he wrote many of Split Enz hits), he didn't want this project to be 'the Neil Finn solo' debut. "I made the decision to get a band together," the singer explains, "and 'Neil Finn' would have subtly eroded that feeling within the band."

Interestingly enough, the band's name came about while they were recording in California. "We were living in a house in Hollywood that was chaotic most of the time," Finn continues, "Just because it was a crash course in learning about the other guys personalities."

"Nick (Seymour, bassist) is the kind of guy who would go out to the pub and arrive home with about 5 people who you've never met before. Well . . . I used to get home from the studio and find these people surfing down the stairs on pieces of cardboard.

"All that talent taken into account," he adds, "the name seemed to suit very well. That feeling of energy in a crowded house with that bit of tension as well."

Following the demise of Split Enz, the

details of which Finn is reluctant to discuss, drummer Paul Hester stuck with Finn and they later hooked up with Seymour, and now they are looking for a fourth member, a keyboardist, to fill out the lineup while on tour.

However, several problems did exist with Split Enz, and Finn mentions a few: management, translating their recorded songs live and those songs not breaking stateside. "It was frustration," he recalls. "because we seemed so close. But in the end, there were other reasons that broke up the band, far and above not being big in America."

Finn currently is managing Crowded House, he stripped his new songs down to "almost nothing" and recorded them that way, and those songs are breaking in the U.S. Still, breaking in America is not Finn's

RECORDS TO RADIO - by Valerie Lapp**Easing into 1987 isn't that simple for CBS**

Everything happens at once, doesn't it? There we were, taking it slow, gently easing into 1987, when suddenly Ka-Bam! Everything exploded . . . Tell you what I mean: At the end of January, the new Psychedelic Furs LP, Midnight To Midnight, was released, and it only took one short week to realize that the first single, Heartbreak Beat, was to become an AOR chart favourite. That momentum still holds, while ex-Men At Work leadman Colin James Hay's first single, Hold Me, runs a close second, with heavy AOR support.

Still young, but already showing promise, Patty Smyth's (ex-Scandal) infectious rocker, Never Enough, has hit AOR solidly across Canada; and Santana's Vera Cruz is taking radio by surprise with its accessibility, certainly having Buddy Miles involved in the project hasn't hurt.

And some sleeper hits crept up to knock us on the back of the head when we weren't looking: Europe, the Swedish rock band whose album has been out for months, is suddenly the name on everyone's lips, with Final Countdown, a Top Ten hit, and a European tour selling out completely (still no word on a North American tour, but it seems likely). And those nasty Beastie Boys have become the band everyone hates to love, with David Letterman intoning "You've got to fight . . . for your right . . . to P-A-A-A-RTY" one week, and Top 20 action happening the next.

But apart from Europe, this is only the Columbia side. Over there on those other labels, Epic and Portrait and the like, the excitement is just beginning. The new Spandau Ballet LP is a diverse appealing album, the band's first for CBS, and though only a week at radio and on the streets, already has a positive buzz surrounding it. Good CHR and AOR is in already on REO Speedwagon's first record for a while; and Greg Allman (yes, of the Allman Brothers) is roping in solid AOR play after only two weeks with I'm No Angel. Too early to tell yet on the Tim Feehan advance single, Listen For The Heartbeat, but radio reaction is positive.

primary concern, but he does admit, "I've never seen a band that doesn't want to be successful."

"But," he maintains, "the minute you let that become your over-riding factor then the music slips back into the back seat." While staying in California, Finn admits it was difficult to avoid the commercial trappings of that environment.

"It was a constant assault every day," he explains. "But I believe you're most commercial when you're being yourself . . . like having your personality come through the most, that would make you the most commercial. Rather than trying to adapt any formula. I think that's a recipe for disaster."

"You can never predict what's going to be successful and what's not," Finn continues, concluding with "so that's not a conscious thing with me . . . rather just to do the best I can and hope that what it is that makes us different is what it is that also makes us commercial, eventually."

And true to CBS form, the flurry of surface activity on new and fast-breaking product, never quite obscures the solid action of more seasoned music: The Springsteen live boxed set continues to sell through at retail, 275,000 units (call it 1,375,000 for comparison's sake) and counting; The Bangles' Different Light has just passed 2-times platinum; Paul Young's Between Two Fires is well on its way to platinum (a wildly successful radio contest promotion, and the current Canadian tour dates will give it the push it needs); Eddie Money's Can't Hold Back has scooted past gold on the strength of single No. 2, I Wanna Go Back; and Cyndi Lauper's True Colors moves steadily towards 3-times platinum.

But of course it doesn't stop there. We're all looking forward to the late March release of Gowan's new album Great Dirty World, kicking off with the brilliant Moonlight Desires (featuring ex-Yes man Jon Anderson) at the beginning of the month. And yes Virginia . . . there will be a Michael Jackson album . . . soon. It's slated now for April 1st, and although I can't tell you the title yet, I can tell you that the reports from the people who know, say it's a bigger killer than Thriller.

Sure everything happens at once. Sure would be boring if it didn't . . . wouldn't it?

An interview with Beatles' producer George Martin

The Beatles: a new era of profound nostalgia

The Beatles have entered the new dimension of compact disc technology, and the marketing expertise of Capitol-EMI has already guaranteed a new wave of hysteria by a group who revolutionized the world of entertainment. The hysterical little teenyboppers who, years ago wet their pants and created havoc at the mere mention of "The Fab Four", are now 25 years older, but their loyalty to this British group lives on, already obvious through the initial ordering pattern for the first four releases.

Capitol-EMI Canada held a listening party at Toronto's Sounds Interchange (Feb. 24), to introduce the Beatles on CD, and needless to say, the room was charged with emotion as one after another, the old songs filled the room with a clarity never before heard. Interestingly enough, the new Managing Director of Capitol-EMI Canada, Richard Lytton, who was in attendance, was front and centre at the Abbey Road Studios in London when the Beatles recorded Sgt. Pepper. The year was 1967, and the wide-eyed 17-yr. old had just joined Capitol-EMI. One of his first chores was that of a "button-pusher" at Abbey Road for these particular sessions.

Rather than go into detail about the CD release of the Beatles' product, RPM was fortunate to be privy to an interview with producer George Martin, which took place at Air Studios, Monday, February 16, 1987, and which follows:

What has been your involvement with the first four Beatles' Compact Discs being released on the 26th of February?

Listening to them. Rupert Perry, Managing Director at EMI Records, asked me to listen to what had been done in December in the way of issuing stereo versions of the Beatles records on CD. I listened and I didn't think they were very good. I was also worried because they were perpetuating a kind of myth that had grown up, that those early records were made in stereo. I preferred the mono original and said the mono should be issued.

Why did you feel so strongly about the mono recordings?

We are talking about the very first records the Beatles made, in fact, the first four Beatles albums issued. While I think there might be a case for issuing the last two of the four in stereo at some time, in view of the way in which they were done, I think it was very sensible to make them all mono CDs. The first Beatles records were mono records, they were not stereo records and never intended to be. **How do you recollect those early days in the studios?**

When I made those mono records, the only machines available in the studios were either a mono machine or a stereo machine, which the classical people used. I used a stereo machine as a twin track machine - I separated the two sides and recorded them separately.

As we did live performances of the Beatles in the initial stages, I put all the rhythm on one track and all the voices on another. The reason for that was to make stereo, but so that after the Beatles went

home I was able to compress the two together to get a hard impact sound for mono - it saved me time and gave me a better record.

Would you have changed things in light of technical developments since 1962?

Of course I would have changed things if I had today's technology, but the actual quality of the recording I'm very pleased with, listening to them again, going back all those years. They have a tremendous drive and vivacity and cleanliness which I'm very pleased about.

Have you discussed the CDs with any of the Beatles?

I've only been able to get hold of Paul and I told him I'd heard them and they they were very good and that I was doing some work on the next batch.

You are currently involved in work on future Beatles CD releases. What exactly are you doing?

I'm working on Help, Revolver, and Rubber Soul. When I heard the transfers that had been done I didn't think they were very good and could have been cleaned up. So I asked if I could listen to the original four tracks that had been done and I found there were things on there which could have been put over on to Compact Disc much better, so I've been working on that. Not to change anything, but to clean up the sound - it's surprising how effective it is because on CD you hear so much more - you hear distortion and all sorts of things you'd rather not hear, things you didn't hear in the original songs.

After these, there is of course Sgt. Pepper. Do you foresee any particular problems in relation to the CD?

Well . . . we got better as we went on. I started recording the Beatles in 1962 - when life was very primitive in technical terms - and Sgt. Pepper was 1967, we'd had five years experience by then and we'd gained stereo. By the time Sgt. Pepper came along, although it was only four tracks, it was a fairly good stereo record and I'm rather reluctant to touch it although I'd like to hear the original again.

One of the benefits of going back and listening to these originals, while I'm not changing anything - the mixes are exactly as I did them 22 years ago - we are gaining technically because we are going back to the original four track one inch masters and we don't have any generation loss of dubbing down to stereo and then copy masters.

Even if you don't do anything but just do it exactly as you did, you're still going to get a better record for CD.

How did you feel listening to the recordings over 20 years later?

Until recently I'd never sat down and clinically listened to these Beatles recordings as you do when you're making a recording. It's been exciting but somewhat traumatic, particularly going back over the master tapes and listening to all the out-takes and listening to John's voice sort of chatting me up as I'm playing the piano with him. It's like going back in time and it's a little bit unnerving and at the same time thrilling because in fact the

ness of their performance is wonderful. It thrilled me to bits to listen to those voices as they were. I'm so glad they're going out on Compact Disc.

What are the most important points to be made to people buying the Beatles Compact Discs?

I think the point to be stressed is that these are vintage recordings . . . it is a long time ago. The first record was made at the end of 1962, and life was primitive in technical terms, so translating them to this modern media does give problems.

Stereo really didn't become popular until Sgt. Pepper - previously it was something of a lesser attraction. We were still experimenting.

On Rubber Soul, for instance, I haven't changed it because it's kind of history. If it were not for that, I would have changed it because in my sense of experimenting, I put a lot of lead voices on the right hand track only, put bass on the left and not much in the middle. I was playing around finding out the best format for stereo - the Beatles had nothing to do with that, it was just my aberration. At the same time, mono was the way they were recorded and the impact is tremendous.

Beatles CDs on Parlophone

The Beatles CD product will be on the original U.K. release label, Parlophone, using the original cover art. As an added bonus for North American buyers, these imported CDs contain all the tracks of each particular release, not the restricted North American version.

The first four titles shipped are Please Please Me, With The Beatles, A Hard Day's Night, and Beatles For Sale. Another single, All My Loving, will be released shortly.

The second wave of CD releases will be shipped in May, and the rest staggered throughout the year.

The Esquires to celebrate Golden Jubilee

Esquires' drummer finds treasure in Regent ashes

Richard Patterson, who was the drummer for The Esquires back in the early '60s has discovered a video from that time era, dramatizing their 1964 Capitol single, *The Man From Adamo*, along with the flip side, *Gee Whiz It's You*. The Esquires, which went on to become The Staccatos and finally The Five Man Electrical Band, was the first Cana-


Archives. However, copies are being made for distribution to CBC-TV's *Good Rockin' Tonight*, and to MuchMusic, as well as the Esquires' 25th reunion. The latter will take place at a Civic Centre Salon concert (Mar. 21), flying the banner of Rock 'n' Roll and Remember. A copy of the clip will be made available for this reunion as well.

Erskine also points out that there has been talk of CARAS presenting a "separate national awards show devoted to rock video, which will likely air at the end of the year."

She quotes Mel Shaw, a member of the advisory council of CARAS, and its former president as saying, "This is still in very early development, but we are discussing the recognition of pioneers in rock video, and my feeling is that something worthy of prime consideration is this thing the Esquires did."

The music clips were apparently initially made for a jukebox invention (Telebox), incorporating a movie screen with clips available for both the plug and the flip side of each single.

As Erskine explains, "For the Esquires, doing the clips was not a significant event in their career. None of the members asked for copies and some of its members don't even



dian band to win a Juno Award. At the time, the awards were known as the RPM Gold Leaf Awards. The band won the 1964 award in the category of Vocal Instrumental Group of The Year.

Evelyn Erskine, who reports on the Entertainment scene for the Ottawa Citizen in her *Nights Out* column, points out that "It now appears the Ottawa band (The Esquires) pioneered rock video in this country."

She goes on to explain that "Technicians at Crawley Films cleaned the soot and grime off footage that constitutes the first known professional rock video to have been made in Canada."

According to Erskine, Eric Levin, owner of Regent Vending and Amusements, had discovered the footage. His father, Mac Levin, who died in 1977, had apparently commissioned the videos, "actually shot on 16mm film, not videotape as is the practice today," notes Erskine.

"The entrepreneur thought this would put him at the forefront of a new trend," continues Erskine. "He was right, but that trend didn't catch on for another 20 years."

Needless to say, Patterson, who has been the major thrust in keeping alive that "important" era of the Esquires, was quite excited about the find. Erskine quotes him as saying, "I was told there had been a fire at Regent Vending, and that the films no longer existed. I thought, 'too bad, a little history of the band has been washed down the tubes,' so I left it at that."

In the course of putting together memorabilia for the Esquires' 25th annual reunion, Patterson again contacted Levin and found the film had in fact survived the 1965 fire. The film had been stuffed in a box and stored in a warehouse.

The clip is being donated to the National

remember having done them."

Again, she quotes Patterson as saying, "Things were happening so fast at the time, this was just another thing we had to do. It was only years later when we tried to piece our history back together that we realized the relevance of it."

In concluding, Erskine says, "Ironically, it was these pioneer 'rock videos' that will expose the Esquires to a national audience in 1987 and may become the thing the group was best known for."

Currently climbing the RPM 100 singles chart with *Kiss You (When It's Dangerous)*, and the album chart with *Almacantar*, Eight Seconds, an Ottawa quintet, have embarked on a 16-date U.S. tour with Wang Chung. The latter recently topped the charts with *Everybody Have Fun Tonight*.

The tour kicked off in Irvine, California (Feb. 28), followed by dates in most of the western and mid-west states, Pennsylvania and winds down in College Park, Maryland (Mar. 30). Other dates are being added as the tour progresses.

CHEZ-FM's (Ottawa) Music Director Greg Torrington was quoted as saying, "Don't overlook this band. The album is very deep for AOR . . . with solid sell-through at retail."

Damon Studios setting for new Moss single

Recorded at Edmonton's Damon Studios and produced by Peter Bacsalmasi, singer Susan Moss has released *Stoneman*, a contemporary pop song, which she co-wrote with Bacsalmasi. The single qualifies as 4-parts Canon.

Having toured the nightclub circuit (both in her native Alberta and Ontario) to much local admiration, Moss believes she is now ready to support her recordings with a full-scale tour. An album has been produced and should materialize this spring.

Session people included: John Logan (drums), Bob Gilligan and Dave Keast (keyboards), Larry Mollerup (bass), and John Pamer (percussion).

Honeymoon Suite cut Mel Gibson film track

Honeymoon Suite recently returned from Los Angeles where they recorded *Lethal Weapon*, the title track for a new Warner Bros film of the same title. The film stars Mel Gibson and Gary Busey, and is set to open in Canada the first week in March.

Director Richard Donner (*Superman*, *Goonies*), has also been approached to direct the corresponding video for the tune.

The *Lethal Weapon* single was written by Michael Kamen (*Pink Floyd's The Wall*), and produced by Ted Templeman, who has worked with The Doobie Bros, Van Halen, Van Morrison and Little Feat, among others.

WEA is rush-releasing the single to tie in with the release of the film. A soundtrack album, featuring Eric Clapton, is scheduled for a late March release.

New Faces touting Cherry Beach single

Toronto-based New Faces, who had what was regarded as a "highly successful" showcasing at the Blue Note in December, are experiencing impressive radio adds for their *Cherry Beach* single, *I'm Gonna Make You Love Me*. The single was released as a 12" and "has opened many doors for the band," says their manager Eugene Dinnall of First Impressions Entertainment.

The 6-piece band have been firmed to play Lee's Palace in Toronto on Mar. 6, followed by the Horseshoe on the 26th. A new single, *I Want To Love You*, is being scheduled for a spring release, for which a video is also being prepared.



Bon Jovi to No. 1 on the MuchMusic Top 30

After only 7 weeks on the MuchMusic Top 30, Bon Jovi's *Livin' On A Prayer* moves into the No.1 position, followed by Peter Gabriel's *Big Time* at No. 2, Jacob's Ladder by Huey Lewis & The News at No. 3, and Glass Tiger's *You're What I Look For*.

New to the chart this week is Lou Gramm's *Midnight Blue* at No. 28, and Duran Duran's *Skin Trade* in at No. 30.

Carole Pope to play RYH's Imperial Room

Gino Empry reports that Carole Pope will be playing the Imperial Room of Toronto's Royal York Hotel from Apr. 20 through 25. Pope, who is on a self-imposed sabbatical from the recording industry, has been working closely with the domestic and international film industries over the past year.

Pope and Rough Trade decided to go their separate ways last year. It's not known at time of writing whether she is preparing to return to recording. For her Imperial date she will be accompanied by a 5-piece band.

Duke Street's signings offer commercial promise

With material impending from Edmonton's Neo A4 and Saskatchewan's Mark Korven, the Toronto-based independent label, Duke Street Records, is hoping to enjoy their most successful year to date.

Duke Street also anticipates product forthcoming shortly from renowned jazzman Moe Koffman, as well as Chalk Circle, Hugh Marsh, and Jane Siberry. The latter collected her first (and the label's first) gold album last year for *Speckless Sky*. Three projects from classical musician Eric Robertson are expected this month.

Neo A4 will be on release with *Desire*, a 5-song mini album, with the title track simultaneously released as a single and video. In 1986, the band was awarded Best Group of The Year by the Alberta Recording Industry Association, following their release of *The Warmer Side Of You*.

Most recently added to the label's roster was Mark Korven, who has completed recording his debut at Edmonton's Goede and Toronto's Manta studios with John Switzer and Colin Lay. Titled *Ordinary Man*, the album ships Mar. 24, preceded by the single and video of the same title.

Duke Street's vice president, Adrian Heaps, confirms that Robert Palmer will be featured on four upcoming Hugh Marsh tracks from his next album. The set will also include a version of the rock classic *Purple Haze*. It's expected the LP will ship mid-June.

Prior to the Marsh release however, Duke Street is looking to slate the release of Chalk Circle's first full-length album, a follow-up to last year's critically-acclaimed mini-album, *The Great Lake*, which earned the quartet a Juno nomination. Chris Wardman is again producing at Manta Sound.

Koffman's latest offering, entitled *Momentum*, a mixture of originals and jazz standards, will be released in early April. While the new Jane Siberry is not expected until August, a TV special feature is nevertheless, set to air Mar. 27.

Heavy phones prompt release of Harris single

Ed Preston, President of Tembo Music Canada, reports that "import copies of the Rolf Harris single, *Tommy* (From 88 Pine), currently played by CFRB's Ray Sonin and Nevin Grant of CKLH, has been pulling strong phones." Grant has even gone so far as to claim the single has resulted in the "heaviest phones we've had on any record since we went on the air."

With reaction this positive, Preston has rush-released the single (Feb. 20). Tembo is distributed in Canada by RCA.

The song was apparently played to Harris about five years ago by composer Victoria Panos, a native of Edmonton, but who now lives in Brisbane, Australia. With the approval of the writer, Harris did some additional work on the song which he took into the studio, to record as *Tommy* (From 88 Pine).

Harris explains the makeup of the song: "A teacher has set the children in her class a task, and asked them to write a letter to someone they would like as a friend. Tommy's letter is to a spaceman and he hopes the spaceship plans that he sent for, are on the way because he has the paper, the glue and the paint all ready to build his own spaceship."

Harris goes on to explain, "Tommy's going to try to get up to Heaven in the spaceship because he wants to meet Jesus, and he feels that Jesus is a real person and he talks to him all the time . . . and so when they meet, he is sure Jesus will know who he is."

In concluding, Harris says "The song struck a tremendous chord in me and what a nice feeling it had about the reality of what children are thinking."





CKXM tallies up Christmas Bureau

According to the Christmas Bureau of Edmonton organizers, CKXM's tally for the campaign has earned the station the designation of "the largest single location con-

tributor." At the conclusion of the campaign, the Christmas Bureau received more than \$600,000.00, of which \$145,000.00 came from CKXM's desk. Each year since 1982, the station has taken a more active role in support of the Bureau, and by 1986 had committed 24 days of "on location" broadcasting. The station began broadcasting immediately after the campaign kick-off (Dec. 2), utilizing a specially constructed broadcast desk containing turntable, cart machines, and a P.A. system. All CKXM announcers originated their programs from the Westin Hotel.

Listeners pledge \$166,516 to CJRT

CJRT-FM's Joe Lewis reports that 3,381 listeners pledged \$166,516 to the Toronto station over 9½ days during its annual winter on-air fund raising campaign which closed

Feb. 8. The goal was \$165,000. Each winter since 1975 CJRT has had an on-air campaign to raise part of its annual operating revenue. The station is licensed as a non-commercial educational radio station, and receives 60 percent of its revenue from the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship and Culture. The remaining 40 percent must be raised from listeners, corporations, and foundations.

Larry Green to host CFNY feature

CFNY FM's Promotions Director, Darren Wasylyk, has confirmed rumours that Larry Green is the "notable Toronto industry insider," who replaces Skip Prokop's Sunday offering of A Rock In The Hard Place with Out Of The Blue. The feature went to air, Sunday (Feb. 15), and will be heard each Sunday from 9 pm to midnight. Says Wasylyk, "This is the hottest, most in-depth jazz

This includes product from Andreas Vollenweider, Liona Boyd, George Winston and Michael Hedges, to name just a few. Steps Ahead replaces Entertainment Coast To Coast.

60 years of broadcasting celebrated by CFRB

It was on Feb. 8, 1927 when CFRB commenced broadcasting with the power of 1,000 watts on 1030. Their transmitter was located in Aurora. Since that time the station has scored several firsts. They were the first batteryless radio station in the world; the first to establish a full-time sports department on Canadian radio; the first to broadcast on-site (remote broadcasts); the first non-government station in the British Commonwealth to broadcast with 50,000 watts (most powerful independently-owned radio station in the British Commonwealth); the first to establish news service from the newsroom of a major Canadian daily (the Globe And Mail), which ensured in-depth, to-the-minute news broadcast; the first in Toronto with air traffic reports; the first Toronto AM station to broadcast in stereo; the first station of America Cup in Canada; and the first with a computerized newsroom.

In celebrating their birthday, CFRB went live for the cake cutting ceremonies, from their main lobby - at 12:30 pm (Feb. 19). On hand were Toronto Mayor Art Eggleton, Gordon Lightfoot, Moe Koffman, Salome Bey, John Burgess, Pierre Burton and more.

CFRB listeners were invited to drop by the lobby for a piece of birthday cake and to meet on-air personalities Wally Crouter, and Bob Bratina. For those who were "car-bound" they simply had to honk their horns and CFRB "cake hops" hustled a piece of

Annapolis Valley Radio zeroes in on drug problem

Blaine Morrison, Coordinator of Annapolis Valley Radio's Tune Out Drugs campaign, reports that since Oct. 15, 1986 their comprehensive program of drug education and awareness, "has generated a great deal of interest, controversy and praise."

Morrison and John Whidden have prepared a progress report on AVR's campaign covering October 1986 through February 1987.

The idea for their project came about as a result of the September conference of the National Association Broadcasters, where it was decided to participate in the international campaign against the illegal use of drugs and alcohol. The report points out that "B.A.D. (Broadcasters Against Drugs), encourage in-

dividual radio and television stations to meet the problem head on." The report continues, "To that end, Annapolis Valley Radio established Tune Out Drugs . . . and on Thanksgiving weekend, the stations of the AVR radio network and CKWM-FM (Magic 97), launched their comprehensive drug campaign."

There has been exceptional rapport and respect between other participating agencies since AVR launched their campaign. These include the Nova Scotia Commission on Drug Dependency, the RCMP, and Valley Health Services Association. As well, AVR's sister stations in the Ottawa Valley have begun a similar campaign with both organizations cooperating in "a share of information and experience."

AVR's method of operation is to meet quarterly with the RCMP Crime Prevention Division, as well as the other agencies mentioned, plotting their program in 3 month blocks, which "guarantees our immediacy and allows for regular reflection," the report details.

In an effort to get to their listeners, "a friendly approach" was decided on, through their public service announcement campaign "that accentuated the common sense, problem solving approach, rather than the intimidation and threatening route," explains authors Morrison and Whidden, continuing with "and it worked . . ."

Two aspects of the campaign, well received was the distribution of 500 posters throughout AVR's listening area, resulting in province-wide distribution because of the wide-spread interest; and the co-sponsoring of a drug awareness forum in cooperation with Wolfville's Recreation Department and Wolfville Lions Club.

Other highlights of AVR's campaign included specialized messages for target groups (parents, seniors, drinking drivers, and teens); participation in related drug awareness activities; appearances on cable television and more. "We are becoming more and more a referral entity," the report continues, pointing out that "Corporate interest in anti-drug programs has also resulted."

The report concludes with: "Thus far, Annapolis Valley Radio has committed almost \$15,000 to this project. In fact, we have been the only participant to actually contribute any funds. By the conclusion of our year-long effort, we will have allotted at least \$24,000."

Joey Conrad revives Clap Your Hands

Joey Conrad (a.k.a. Frechette) one of the original members of the Beaumarks, is back on the record scene. Conrad has revived the old hit, Clap Your Hands, that gained the Beaumarks international fame back in the late '50s.

The new version was produced by Gilles Godard, and released on Godard's Book Shop label which is distributed in Canada by RCA. The single carries a 3-part MAPL logo (MAL). Conrad is with CHOO Radio, Ajax, Ontario.

During the Andy Barrie show (10 am to 12 noon) the station broadcast from its original location at The Keg Mansion on Jarvis Street, before a live audience. The show featured drop-ins from past CFRB alumni.

There are three names prominent in what is described as "establishing a new tradition in news, music and promotion," at CFRB.

Heading the list is Ralph Lucas, Director of Programming with over 20 years experience in broadcasting. Since 1985 Lucas has been working to create what is now known as "The new sound of Stereo Ten Ten, CFRB."

The job of programming music for the station was given to John Donabie, a veteran programmer with experience in all music formats. Much of this experience was gained from the competitors he faces today. This is a far cry from the CFRB of only a few years ago. They now program such artists as Bruce Hornsby And The Range, Toto, Paul Simon, Simply Red, The Eurythmics, Alabama, Air Supply, Huey Lewis and much more.

Promotion has become an important asset with broadcasters and CFRB has met this challenge with their new Marketing and Promotion Department, headed up by Perry Goldberg. The station has now become involved with music events as diverse as Charlie Watts to Lola Falana, with theatre from Cabaret to Tango Argentino, and the opening of Casa Loma for Halloween for the first time in 60 years. They are also highly visible with various charitable fund-raising events.

One of the most interesting aspects of CFRB's new direction is their highly successful talk shows with hosts Andy Barrie and Ed Needham. Talk shows were not considered popular in Toronto however, Barrie and Needham have proven there is a ready audience wishing to make their views known, and take the consequences from the "no nonsense" hosts.

There had been some concern over the future of George Wilson's Starlight, a relaxing 2-hr. program of classical music that has become a nightly (9 - 11 pm Monday to Thursday) listening habit for thousands of CFRB listeners. The powers that be have apparently acknowledged the popularity of Starlight, a program that is rare in Canada, and there is apparently no threat to its future, at present




PATTY SMYTH - Pop/Rock

Owens' EMG to assist bands break stateside

The Entertainment Marketing Group (EMG) headed up by Joe Owens and put into operation late last year, is currently helping such bands as Capitol's Partland Brothers in their efforts to succeed in the U.S.

Owens, who has held various executive positions in the industry including that of General Manager of Mushroom Records, says EMG was created to fill an existing void in the Canadian marketplace. "If a band has a record release coming up in the U.S., and they have management exclusively experienced in Canada, I will deal with them on a consultation basis and work their U.S. record company," he explains.

"To date," Owens continues, "most bands that have had internationally experienced managers were the only ones who could have had a good shot at a 'first record' success in the U.S. Say a manager went to the U.S. and really didn't know the ropes, and had an unsympathetic record company, then

Telemagix info line testing in Toronto

A free, 24-hr. information system, called Telemagix, has been introduced to the Toronto market on a test basis. Access to information is obtained by using a touch-tone telephone, with various corporations sponsoring certain lines.

For instance, CHUM FM sponsors a live entertainment line, while The Last Minute Club sponsors a travel line, and Cineplex Odeon, a movie line.

"Toronto is the test market," explains Rasool Verjee of Telemagix. "So, when we go to Vancouver or Montreal then those sponsors can go too. And in another couple of months we'll have expanded into another city."

After its introduction, Verjee noted the system handled over 12,000 calls in 6 days, which is "extremely successful," he adds.

Owens also believes his expertise falls into the area of international marketing, as recently outlined by the Department of Communications' Sound Development initiatives. Therefore, he says independent bands, managers and labels should be able to obtain deficit financing to hire the service he offers.

"I really don't believe that sending people to MIDEM and doing showcases at the New Music Seminar is necessarily all that's involved in international marketing. It's important and I'm not saying that it shouldn't happen but I think there's more of a one-to-

Power's DeGiorgio says dance LPs are priority

According to Power Records' Vince DeGiorgio, today's record buying public (most notably "kids") are into dance records "because they relate to the younger people." Several artists who broke out of the club scene last year include Jermaine Stewart, E.G. Daly, Nu Shooz and Stacy Q, among many others.

"And don't try to tell me that Wang Chung's record is rock 'n' roll . . . it's a party record," he claims. "It's what the kids are buying too."

DeGiorgio also suggests that radio programmers are listening to records this year, "and even testing them," which has made these breakout successes much more possible than previously. "Dance music will influence what is heard on radio in 1987," he quips.

Released on the Power label is the dance floor hit, *Holiday Rap*, already halfway to gold. Says DeGiorgio, "this record has opened the door for at least ten others in that same ilk to break through at radio this year."

He continues with "Kids love this music because it's different. It's strange." He concludes with "It's unique and that's all they want."

one ratio that has to be established," he adds.

"I make a point of not trying to become a partner in the management company. I'm not looking for a piece of the band. There's no long term commitment," he stresses. "By the same token, I try to educate the managers. I don't go off and do all of this stuff by myself.

"I make sure the managers are included in what's going on. I make sure they get a monthly report that lets them know everything that's happening. I introduce them to all the people they need, and if they develop those relationships by themselves, then it all works to their benefit and basically," he maintains, "I put myself out of business in six months. But that's the way the idea has evolved."

EMG is also apparently capable of linking corporate sponsors with bands, from such promotional vehicles as radio syndication, sweepstakes, concerts, personal appearances, and videos. Sponsorship and endorsements are not tied to the breweries, he emphasizes.

"A lot of people have the impression that beer companies own the music business in Canada. I'm trying to meet with the various companies and explain to them that this really isn't the case. That of an artists' activities 12 months of the year touring is only a portion of that. There are lots of other opportunities, from posters to print campaigns to television campaigns to product launches . . . there are a million different ways to use music."

More Peel Sessions released by PolyGram

Through the Strange Fruit label, Canada is now the only other country, outside of the U.K., to have domestic releases of The Peel Session EPs. PolyGram recently released 6 more titles including *The Primevals*, *June Tabor*, *The Specials*, *Stump*, *The Birthday Party*, and *The Slits*.

John Peel, who this year is celebrating two decades with BBC's Radio One, is the host of his own weekly radio show of which over the years, the likes of Pink Floyd to Dire Straits have appeared. These shows were taped, and last January the first "sessions" were introduced.

Interestingly enough, Peel wants none of the notoriety that accompanies these recordings. "I've always held that being a DJ wasn't something to be particularly proud of," he says, continuing with "so I really don't understand the personality thing that's grown up around the radio DJ.

"It's not that I've cultivated an anti-image, but I have consciously set out not to be tricked into self-importance," he continues. "If my daughter became one of those girls that hangs around outside Radio One waiting to see . . . (disc jockey) Bruno Brookes . . . my God . . ."

Peel also prepares a weekly half-hour programme of new music for the BBC World Service, which can be heard on short wave, Monday nights at 10:30 pm EST.

Previously released from the Peel Sessions were *The Damned*, *Stiff Little Fingers*, *New Order*, *TWA Toots*, *Joy Division*, *Gang Of Four*, and *The Ruts*.

Commercial country acts push sales up in 1986

Distributors, checked by RPM, are reporting that sales of country product rose significantly during 1986 - due to the "new breed" of country acts featuring a more pop or rock sound.

At the same time, many of the country veterans continue what they do best - by recording traditional styled country material. Even some of the newer acts have appeared recording in this traditional fashion.

Warren Stewart, tape department head for Roblan Distributors, estimates their country sales have risen about 30 percent. "It's probably because a lot of country artists are crossing over," he said. "They're changing with the music styles and aiming to be on A/C charts as well as country."

Stewart feels the sound of country is changing, and suggests this change emulates a younger feel, less traditional in sound.

"Dan Seals and Randy Travis were huge sellers," continues Stewart, "and remember,

Travis was a relatively unknown artist."

Stewart also believes many of these acts are adjusting their sound to please the younger audience.

"It was either sell a lot of records or break even," he speculates. "and with acts like The Judds, Marie Osmond, and Sawyer Brown, 1987 could see an even greater acceptance of country music."

Sue Doiron, Central Region Buyer for Sound Insight, also reveals an increase in country sales, noting the success of Travis, Seals, Reba McEntire, Dwight Yoakam, and others.

"There's also Steve Earle and The O'Kanes," she said. "Earle did great last year and is doing well now. I think there's going to be more of the newer country acts breaking other new country acts. There seems to be more new artists making the jump."

For some, Doiron speculates it may have been a matter of survival in today's market.

"I think they know they have to change a bit," she continues. "The more commercial the better. People are changing their listening habits."

Paul Herzog of Records On Wheels estimates their country sales are up anywhere from 15 to 20 percent. "I guess a lot more are crossing over to the pop charts," he said. "Dan Seals is a lot more commercial . . . it's almost not like country . . . it's pop country."

Sue Burgess, also with Wheels, says she noticed the increase beginning last summer, and pointed out that the majority of their country sales are on cassette.

Burgess explained that some of these artists may be recording a more commercial sound in order to reach a larger audience. She reports that Wheels has not only done well with the newer country acts like Travis and Earle, but with some of the traditional names like George Jones and Merle Haggard.


Mark Koenig off with RCA single

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


