

## FACTOR & CIRPA to spearhead events project

FACTOR, in conjunction with CIRPA, chaired a meeting of industry professionals on June 2 to discuss the possible formation of a non-profit organization to deal with presenting Canadian talent at international industry events.

Working under the umbrella of Canadians Showcasing Internationally, the organization will develop and promote dates for Canadian talent at international industry events.

In view of the impact Canada Rocks Cannes '92 had at MIDEM, this project will have priority. However, the purpose of the organization will be to offer similar showcasing assistance for other international industry events.

The mandate of the organization is to set criteria "to determine which Canadian artists


## Barenaked Ladies cover London in double-decker

The Barenaked Ladies lived it up in London, England last week after playing to 8,000 people at the Ontario Place Forum in Toronto a few days earlier.

The Ladies, who were Canada's most successful independent band before recently signing a world-wide deal with New York's Sire Records, were in London promoting their EP which has sold in the neighbourhood of 75,000 copies in Canada. The cassette EP was released independently here and is being handled by Cheree Records in the United Kingdom. The song Be My Yoko Ono is being played by Greater London Radio and has been added to the playlist of Radio 1 in the evenings.

Last Tuesday the band toured London in an open-top double-decker bus, playing while they went and also stopping to visit disc jockeys and producers at Radio 1 as well as at the offices of influential music tabloids, NME and Melody Maker. The band also played a special gig for retail and press people and did an interview with BBC Radio Leeds which went live via all eight northern England BBC Radio stations.

The Ladies' debut Sire album, distributed here by Warner Music Canada, is scheduled for a June 30 release. It will be released two weeks later in the United States.

should be showcasing at international music industry conferences and to assist in arranging funding to cover the costs" of these events.

The actual production and promotion of the events will be the responsibility of the industry, with individuals hired to handle the various aspects of each event.

Overseeing the initial meeting were: FACTOR executive director Heather Sym; CIRPA executive director Brian Chater; Steve Propas of Steve Propas Management; and FACTOR's legal counsel, Craig Parks. The FACTOR board has granted permission for the organization to be run out of its offices. FACTOR will also make an annual financial contribution to the project.

Sym, who was involved in the MIDEM '92 showcase and realized its potential, was outspoken in her belief that such a project, under this new organization, should continue. "I'm sincere in believing this can be done," she says. "I recognize the fact that it can fall within the mandate of FACTOR to support this project initially because we are an industrial strategy. Hopefully, other people in the industry will share the vision and it can become something that can take care of itself.

"I don't have a hidden agenda. I'm only involving myself for the sake of the industry.

## Warren Hill to play Beaches jazz festival

Lido Chilelli, president and producer of the Beaches Jazz Festival, has announced the lineup of events for the fourth in this series of annual events (July 22-26).

Warren Hill has been firmed for the All Star Jam at the Kew Beach Bandshell on July 25. He will be joined by Tony Flaim and Mel Brown. Also scheduled are the Brampton Jazz Ensemble, Molly Johnson & Big Sugar, Johnny Pacheco 10-piece Latin Orchestra and Stan Samole.

Featured at the bandshell the following day will be Denny Christianson, the Humber College Jazz Ensemble, Jazz Report All-Stars (featuring Bill King, Melissa Mann and Liberty Silver), the Dave McMurdo Jazz Orchestra, the Joe Sealy Quartet with the Grand Ladies of Song (featuring Arlene Smith, Bobbi Sherron and Jody Drake), and the Norman Villeneuve Sextet.

Bill King, master of ceremonies and musical director of the festival, is expected to announce further headliners to the bandshell dates.

As well, selected street corners along the Beaches strip will feature bands that will play a variety of music including calypso, Latin, fusion, steel drum and jazz. Those firmed to date are Sean Bray, Tony Carlucci Quintet, John Cheesman Sextet, Cimarron, Five After Four, J.A. Connection, Jacek Kochan, Rick Lazar Montouno Police, Carlos Lopes and Todo Mondo Loco.

Through the sale of T-shirts and other memorabilia, funds are raised for Senior Link, a non-profit organization that provides year-round assistance to seniors in the Beaches area.

Basically, what we would be is a fundraising and processing body that would determine which artists would be showcased. I have ideas but I'm not trying to make this the Heather Sym project. We're an executive that's trying to be a steering committee and the board of directors has to be formed by the industry."

For the first year, because the priority will be Canada Rocks Cannes '93, a budget of \$125,000 has been set. The money and the budget will obviously increase as the other projects are pulled into it.

Several people have already agreed to serve on the four sub-committees. A production committee will handle the logistics involved in producing international showcase events. The eligibility committee will establish criteria to determine which artists are eligible to perform at such showcases. The promotion committee will ensure that the organization's objectives, as well as individual events, are properly marketed and promoted. The fundraising committee will assist in arranging funding for showcase events to offset the organization's expenses.

It was emphasized that this project was national in scope. Music industry professionals from across the country are invited to lend their expertise by volunteering to serve on either one of the committees or the board of directors.



## RCMP and CRIA unite to combat music piracy

An investigation by the RCMP, in co-operation with the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA), has resulted in a Quebec City man pleading guilty to two counts of copyright infringement.

Sébastien Chicoine had been found to be illegally producing and selling compilation cassettes that included recordings of artists such as the Rolling Stones, Pink Floyd, Led Zeppelin and Prince. He faces a \$500 fine or three months in prison on each count. The judge also ordered certain items of duplicating equipment found in Chicoine's possession to be destroyed.

"Cassette and CD piracy is still a major problem for recording artists, composers and record companies in Canada," said CRIA president, Brian Robertson. "The recording industry is particularly grateful to the members of the General Investigative Section of the RCMP in Quebec City for bringing this case to court."



# The history of the BIG COUNTRY AWARDS

A look at the struggle by RPM's Walt Grealis to form a country music association in Canada, beginning with the first Big Country meeting. Then came CACMA, ACME and the Big Country Awards. Eventually, the country music industry elected to take the awards away from their founders and go with its own show. But the Big Country Awards show bounced back, and this year it has become a nationally televised event. This is now the 20th year since the first Big Country meeting was held. And the history of Canadian country music continues . . .



The country music industry in Canada dates back farther than Wilf Carter and Hank Snow. But although there was always lots of talent, most Canadian artists felt they had to go and record in Nashville to be successful, even to achieve success back up here. And radio certainly didn't help the cause of Canadian country acts. In fact, before the CRTC's 30 per cent Canadian content regulations were introduced on Jan. 18, 1971, the number of Canadian singles aired on country radio stations was less than one per cent.

With the immediate need for radio to play a lot more Canadian country music came a push for an organization that would represent Canadian country acts. After several failed

attempts to join with the Country Music Association in Nashville, a burgeoning movement in favour of an independent Canadian organization was launched in the early 1970s.

That's when RPM's Walt Grealis and Stan Klees came up with the idea for the Big Country communications and music meeting. It was a chance for artists, record companies and radio programmers to have a meeting of the minds and discuss some of the issues facing the struggling Canadian country industry.

On the evening of Fri. Sept. 21, 1973, approximately 200 delegates started arriving at the Holiday Inn (Don Valley) in Toronto. The next morning the first Big Country meeting

began with Jack Boswell, president of Marathon Records, as the first guest speaker.

A number of other speakers took to the podium and a workshop session for radio programmers, record company executives and retailers was also held. What was accomplished was a meaningful discussion by those in the industry who were concerned and who wanted to improve a situation that was going nowhere fast because of a lack of communication.

Afterwards, everyone got to relax and see just what kind of talent this country possessed at a closing showcase. By the end of the weekend, a link from St. John's to Victoria had finally been established and the groundwork for an annual get-together was laid.

Fourteen months later, Big Country reconvened at Toronto's Inn On The Park. Grealis, Big Country's co-founder, opened the Nov. 23-24 event with a stirring speech:

"We have gathered you here to communicate. To share opinion and fact. Your input as well as the evaluation of the output . . . will be the sum total of what you will gain from these two days.

"It may result that at the end of this two day meet, a group of you will join forces to form an association of country music in Canada. If that occurs . . . we will have taken a step in the right direction. If you only make one business contact or benefit by an assimilation of facts and opinions . . . you will leave this meeting just that much better.

"Take note that we have assembled speakers who are Canadians. They are familiar with this industry and work in the Canadian country music area. They will share their

ideas, opinions and problems . . . and perhaps solutions . . . with you."

And that's exactly what happened. Each speaker brought a positive view of what country music in Canada could be. Delegates shared their problems and were inspired to find solutions that could lead Canadian country music in a meaningful direction.

After the discussions, almost 300 people gathered for the Big Country Showcase, which grew from a five-hour event to an eight-hour extravaganza. More than 30 performers took to the stage and promoters and bookers got to see them in a theatrical setting.

After the first two Big Country meetings got the ball rolling, RPM picked up on the momentum in June, 1975 by beginning a section of the magazine called Country Week. Country music had lacked a good medium of news, information and promotion and past attempts to create a Canadian country magazine had lacked the support to keep it



a float. Country Week was established as an alternative and it turned out to be a successful experiment.

A star system was gradually becoming established in the Canadian country industry. The next step was to formally recognize the stars with an awards show. In 1974, unofficial meetings were held across Canada as country music people began to feel out how such a show should function.

Grealis and Klees eventually took it upon themselves to form the Canadian Academy for Country Music Advancement (CACMA), a group which was to act in an advisory capacity to the newly founded Big Country Awards. On Aug. 1, 1975, CACMA was officially formed. Membership in the academy was open to all those involved with country music who paid a one-year registration fee of \$10. Members were allowed to nominate people for the awards and also received voting ballots.

Sept. 27-28 brought the next Big Country meeting and the first Big Country Awards banquet back to the Inn On The Park. During the meeting, ways that the academy could be

used to advance the industry were discussed, including extending its activities beyond the awards.

At the meeting, the fledgling academy decided to change its name to the Academy of Country Music Entertainment (ACME). The consensus was that there was no need for nationalism in the name of the organization. Delegates elected Grealis as chairman of a steering committee, which would number no more than 10, made up of members from various segments of the industry. The committee would work to obtain a charter and set out membership rules and voting policy

for future Big Country Awards.

After all the political wrangling of getting an association off the ground was at least temporarily done with, it was time for the caper of the weekend -- the first Big Country Awards presentation. Lynn Jones, Carroll Baker, Patti MacDonnell, Dick Damron and Ron McMunn all performed, and CBC television cameras were there to capture the excitement and broadcast it the next evening on a program called Twenty-four Hours.

The highlight of the evening was emcee Tommy Hunter's surprise induction into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame for his "outstanding contribution to Canadian country music."

The steering committee met the next spring and an interim board of directors was elected from those members of the original CACMA who were present. A board was required so that the developing trade association, from that day officially known as the Academy of Country Music Entertainment, could become a chartered, non-profit organization.

The first board was comprised of: Hank Smith, president; Charlie Russell, vice-president; Gary Buck, secretary-treasurer; and directors, Larry Kunkel, Lanny Salazar, Sammy Jo, and Klees. Their appointment was only an interim measure as they were not elected by a general meeting.

Big Country moved west to the Edmonton Plaza Hotel for the next convention and awards ceremony, Sept. 25-26. Feelings of both optimism and doubt were in evidence as ACME's 350 members gathered to try and bring country music to a wider audience by forming a number of specialized committees which could focus on improving various parts of the industry. After some bickering, Dave Charles, the program director of CFGM Radio in Richmond Hill, Ont. (and now president-elect of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences), invited his rival, Barry Nesbitt, general manager of CKFH Radio in Toronto, to work with him in heading up the radio committee.

Charles urged all segments of the industry to "talk to each other, (and) break down the mental walls and barriers in your mind."

Within 45 minutes, eight other committees were also formed. They were: record companies, headed by Barry Haugen; retail, headed by John Davies; artists, headed by Joe Brown; agents and managers, headed by Don Grashey; fundraising, headed by Blake Emmons; publishers and writers, headed by Bev Munro; club owners, headed by Jerry

Brown; and public relations, headed by Patti McDonnell and Marghi Cocks. The committees were to report to the board of directors. It was decided that organizational membership would be \$100 minimum.

At the meeting, Grealis presented ACME with a cheque for \$3040. The money was the total of the memberships received by CACMA to help launch the new official academy.

This atmosphere of co-operation pleased ACME president, Smith. "I finally have a feeling of confidence in ACME. I haven't had it since I became president in March," he said.

ACME also honoured four members who had worked in country music for a quarter-century. Orval Prophet, Joe Brown, Dick Damron and Harold Moon all received commemorative plaques.

Grealis emceed the awards banquet and, between presentations, seven of Alberta's finest country artists performed: Joyce Smith,

Tony White, Donna Adams, R. Harlan Smith, Merv Smith, Paul Hahn, and Roxanne Goldade.

Comic relief was supplied by Ronnie Hawkins, who had a hard time opening the envelope which held the name of the winner for best country single. The Hawk said he never had that trouble at home because the RCMP opens all his mail before he gets to it.

Soon after the Edmonton meeting, things began to unravel once again as a lack of communication between executive members themselves and with the membership at large, started causing problems. The geographic distance between executive members was a difficult obstacle to overcome. As a result, Russell eventually tendered his resignation from the executive.

Ottawa hosted Country Music Week from Sept. 19-25 in 1975. The Big Country Awards closed the week-long celebration of country activities at the Skyline Hotel. The show was once again emceed by Grealis. Damron, Dallas Harms, the Family Brown, Prophet, Bob Webb and Baker all performed.


Country Music Week was celebrated for the second consecutive year, this time in Regina, from Sept. 25-29. During the week, the Big Country album was released as a means of fundraising for ACME. The Big Country meeting and awards were held Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at the Regina Inn.

were held on such topics as the country artist in Canada, programming Canadian country music, racking and retailing Canadian country music, and the Canadian country record company. That evening a special showcase featuring Baker, Terry Carisse & Tenderfoot,

David Thompson, and Jerry Palmer entertained the assembly.

ACME held its annual general meeting the next morning. By that time, Charles had become president. Klees and Grealis were presented with plaques making them honorary ACME members in recognition of their founding of both the Big Country Awards and ACME. Paid memberships to the academy had grown from 50 to 630 in 12 months, with the bulk in individual memberships. ACME was also granted a federal charter enabling it to apply to the federal government for funds for the betterment of the country industry in Canada.

The awards show that evening was emceed by Ronnie Prophet and featured performances by Glory-Anne Carriere, Jerry & Jo'Anne, Rondini, Terry Carisse & Tenderfoot, Orval Prophet, Sheila Ann, Baker, and the host himself. Crews from Global Television, the local CKCK-TV news team, and people from CTV's W5 were on hand busily shooting footage and doing several interviews with many of the artists. Global edited their tape and presented it as a Global Big Country Special on Oct. 14.

Big Country 1979 was held at the Skyline Hotel in Mississauga the weekend of Sept. 22-23. Three panel discussions were held on Saturday covering the subjects of retailing and marketing country music, Canadian productions and the radio programmer, and

the role of the record company in marketing and promoting country product.

The awards were once again emceed by Hunter, a veteran of some 20 years as host of a major Canadian country television show. Performing during the evening were Ralph Carlson & Country Mile, Laura Vinson, Gary Fjellgaard, Nancy Ryan, Artie MacLaren, Eddie Eastman and the Family Brown.

The Winnipeg Inn was the scene of the first Big Country event of the 1980s, ending another successful Canadian Country Music

Week from Sept. 20-21. By this time, two camps had formed within the industry and, in a keynote speech, Grealis pointed out the definite need for understanding in order to avoid harming Canadian country through interference from either side.

"Since the awards are free from political influences of the industry, ACME control could be detrimental to the awards. RPM is free from these problems. I am not a manager, a recording artist or company, nor am I a songwriter. With ACME control there could be a horrendous clash of personalities. I've been called a dictator. However, if it's prefixed by benevolent, I don't mind. Everyone has the right to suggest changes, and our new voting system came from such suggestions. We are all here for the benefit of the industry, and the award shows are tailored to promote the industry. Others, like ACME, are welcome to have another show. They could make their own significant contribution, especially if their contributions went on for 12 months of the year. Their opportunities are limitless."

After Grealis called Klees to the stage to answer delegates' questions about the new nominating system for the Big Country Awards and for the system of tabulating record

movement on the RPM Country 75, the day's panel sessions began. The first panel dealt with retailing and merchandising and was made up of representatives from various record labels and distribution companies. The second was comprised of club owners from across Canada who dealt with questions concerning the importance of clubs, presentation and promotion.

The third and final panel of the day dealt with the factors accounting for Cancon rejection by radio programmers. It was comprised of program directors, managers and on-air personalities. During the discussion, George Hamilton IV rose to his feet to cite the importance of RPM as a vehicle for promoting Cancon nationally and internationally.

"In my travels throughout the world, and in particular through the U.S., I often see RPM sitting on the desk of the program or music director. RPM is obviously important to U.S. programmers who are very interested in what's happening north of the border."

That same evening was a special one for Grashey, as he was recognized as a pioneer in both Canadian and American country music. He was inducted into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame.

Two panel discussions were held on Sunday, dealing with television's ability to promote country records, and the strength of Canadian songwriting and publishing.

Grealis hosted the awards presentation later that evening, with Ron Halldorson's orchestra providing the musical background. The event was carried live on radio for the first time and featured performances by such local talents as Gurney Anderson, Len Henry, Iris Larratt, and Dale Russell.

Big Country returned to the nation's capital in 1981, with an event held at the Talisman Motor Hotel during the weekend of Sept. 19-20. Panel discussions dealing with music publishing, country music radio, promotion and publicity, building a starsystem, and country production took up most of Saturday.

The sold-out awards ceremony, emceed this time by Bill Anderson, featured performances by Baker and her group, fiddler Graham Townsend, Terry Carisse and Tracks, Marie Bottrell, Orval Prophet, and Damron.

But soon after the successful Ottawa weekend, bitterness raised its ugly head again over the control of awards honouring the Canadian country industry. And on Jan. 25, 1982, ACME distributed a ballot to its members asking them if they wanted their own awards

which would be separate from Big Country. The membership spoke loud and clear.

There were 550 ballots mailed, of which 356 were returned. Of those, 300 ballots (84 per cent) were in favour of ACME having their own awards and just 56 (16 per cent) indicated that they would be happy with the Big Country Awards continuing as the only awards for country music in Canada.

Grealis was bitter about the result but, as promised, he bowed to the wishes of ACME's

members. "It was obvious that the members of ACME wanted ACME to have their own awards. Now they have them and we can go on with building a country music industry in Canada," he said.

"I feel that ACME and the country music industry was moving backward for the past five years while they bickered about who will have the awards. Before we forced them to take ACME and make it an industry association, they bickered for years about how they were going to form an association. Now they have both. How they got them doesn't seem to matter."

While Grealis was disappointed that his planned celebration to mark the 10th anniversary of Big Country at the 1982 awards in Halifax was scrapped, he still encouraged those in country music to head to the East coast for ACME's convention and awards show. "I feel they should have every chance to make a success of the awards and, although it's hard to put on a good show without losing money, they should try to do the best they can."

ACME was renamed the Canadian Country Music Association (CCMA) in 1986. In the minds of many, this was an attempt to rewrite history. Few today remember that it was Klees and Grealis who started the CCMA.

Big Country was shelved from 1982 until 1985, but was brought back through pressure from several country music industry people. On Apr. 28, 1985 at Toronto's Inn On The Park where, 10 years earlier, the first Big Country Awards were held, the event made its comeback. Though the meetings of earlier Big Country's were no longer held, the awards banquet was still filled to capacity by the

who's who of the industry.

"This is strictly a social gathering of the important people in Canadian country music," Grealis said in opening the night's proceedings. "This is a night off for our country performers. No one will be asked to entertain. We even asked the hotel to turn the Muzak off."

Grealis and Big Country co-founder Klees were welcomed back with a warm reception from the audience. And all of it was carried coast-to-coast on radio via Broadcast News, and locally through television coverage by CITY-TV.

The Inn On The Park hosted the Big Country Awards again the next year when they were staged on May 4. Continuing in the new tradition, there was no entertainment or performances, which seemed to suit the audience just fine. It was enough just to honour such talented artists as Baker, Gilles Godard, Murray McLauchlan, The Stoker Brothers, and The Mercey Brothers, to name just a few.

Ronnie Prophet acted as emcee before a large group of industry heavies which was in attendance on May 24 for 1987's awards ceremony at the Inn On The Park. Bootleg's Ron Irving was especially impressed with the turnout. "We heard a great deal about the Big Country Awards, and it was well worth the trip from Vancouver to meet and to be able to talk socially with so many important people," he said.

1988 marked the first year of the Variety Club Special Luncheon Salute to the Big Country Awards and it proved to be a tremendous success in raising money for Variety's Kids. Hunter hosted and also sang during the show at the Inn On The Park on May 6. Baker, Hawkins, and The Good Brothers also performed.

At the awards banquet two days later, veteran Jack Feeney was inducted into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame for being a long-time friend of Canada's country







music community. By 1989 it was decided to make the Variety Club luncheon an annual event. The May 26 event was once again held at the Inn On The Park and Don Harron, who was at his best as the colourful Charlie Farquarson, was the emcee. J.K. Gulley, Anita Perras, Mike Francis, and Blue Rodeo provided additional entertainment and also spent a lot of time with a group of Variety's Kids.

The Big Country Awards were given out on May 28 and WEA's George Fox pulled off an unprecedented first by becoming the first artist in the history of the awards to win in four categories in one year. The other highlight of the evening was the induction of Weird Harold Kendall into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame. As music director of CKWX

Vancouver for 15 years, he had developed a warm and lasting friendship with Canadian country artists.

The May 25, 1990 Variety Club luncheon at the Inn On The Park was hosted by Grealis and featured performances by Michelle Wright and Silver & Degazio.

Baker hosted the Big Country Awards on May 27 at the Inn On The Park and k.d. lang matched Fox's feat from the year before of taking home four trophies. The inductee into the Canadian Music Industry Hall of Fame this time was Balmur president Leonard Rambeau. In making the presentation, Klees was effusive in his praise of the man who helped make Anne Murray an international star.

"The industry honours artists with a Grammy, a Juno, a gold record or a Big Country Award, but the people behind the scenes are often forgotten. This award is given very seldom and no one deserves it more than the man who is best in his field . . . Leonard Rambeau."

The Variety Club luncheon moved to Toronto's Harbour Castle Westin on May 24, 1991. CHAM Hamilton morning personalities, Vickie Van Dyke and Cliff Dumas, emceed the show and took turns introducing the performers. Baker, Wright, Fjellgaard, Larry Mercey, Larry Good, Laura and Larry Mattson, Kimberly Richards, Morris P. Rainville, David Hutchins, Mike Peters, Dyanne Halliday, Ron Victors, and Terry Hill all sang Variety Club's theme, There's No Business Like Showbusiness. Many of these performers, along with Hawkins, also performed numbers




Randall Prescott (centre) accepts his 1989 award as Top Country Producer from FACTOR's Heather Sym and Bart Barton.

The awards dinner on May 26 was also held at the Harbour Castle Westin Hotel. For the first time, a sponsor carried some of the financial load for the awards. Maclean Hunter Country Radio sponsored the awards dinner, which was attended by 80 per cent of the nominees.

1992 marks the 20th year since Big Country was first formed in 1973. And in that time it has seen many ups and downs. But as those of you who attended this year's awards or saw them on CBC Television will attest, the future of Big Country now looks very safe and secure. Next year should be bigger and better than ever.






**SYLVIA TYSON** - Country/Folk

 Sylvia and her producer Tom Russell were nominated for a Big Country Award in the Group Or Duo category for their release of *Thrown To The Wolves* (not included here), and they have teamed up for another barnburner, *Remain A Child* (included here), which could be a key track. Tyson was never known for vocal warmth, but for keeping with a cutting folk edge that commands attention. Here there is a pronounced softness, particularly with her solo penning of *So Quiet Now* and *Gypsy Cadillac*, which she wrote with Shirley Eikhard. Also key, and completely out of character for Tyson, is *Chocolate Cigarettes*, a cleverly-written Tyson and Russell treatise on Edith Piaf and Tyson kicking the cigarette habit. *I Walk These Rails*, written by Tyson and Eikhard, has been taken as the first single and is already making excellent chart gains. Tyson should not be restricted to country formats. Her material here should see crossover action. This is perhaps Tyson's best work to date. Retailers should front-rack. The Tysons were inducted into the Juno Hall of Fame this year, an extra marketing plus. (CD reviewed) -WG





A number of other talented musicians and singers are also included on the project, which was recorded live off the floor to DAT with no overdubs or click tracks at Toronto's Reaction Studios during four days in January. Omnipresent producer Michael Phillip-Wojewoda was at the controls. Blurton is an excellent guitarist who's chord experiments do nothing to diminish the sheer power of his playing. While Blurton's singing doesn't quite match his strumming, he's got some interesting lyrics to work with. *Coma*, *Chorus Of Approval*, *Give It Back* and the title track are definite winners. 





The first single is *Dizzy*, a remake of the Tommy Roe song, performed with the assistance of *The Wonderstuff*. *Meals On Wheels* is a wry look at delivering food to the old and infirm done up in a hard rock vein which manages to do *Spinal Tap* even better than *Spinal Tap*. *Summer Of '75* is a weeper of a take-off on *The Pogues*. *Black Night* is a Deep Purple song produced by Phil Oakey which ends up sounding like *The Human League*. *I Remember Punk Rock* is a humorous tune in which Reeves remembers the pioneer days of punk with breezy accompaniment provided by some of Europe's foremost jazz musicians. And yes, the *Born Free* on this album is the same one as the title track to that lion movie. The rest of *I Will Cure You* is just as witty, as are the irreverent, off the wall liner notes. 

 The Troggs are back, and they've got a lot of help. Peter Holsapple, Daniel Boone and John Keane also made big contributions. The lead track, *Crazy Annie*, was written by Chip Taylor, the man who originally penned the Troggs' signature tune, *Wild Thing*. The acoustic *Deja Vu* utilizes lyrics from past Troggs hits. *Dust Bowl* is an environmental song written by Presley and I'm In Control features his dangerously-edged voice combined with the more traditionally raunchy lyrics you'd expect from the band. What's *Your Game* and the country-tinged *Suspicious* are highlights, as is *Tuned Into Love*, which sounds suspiciously like T-Rex's *20th Century Boy*. The 11 songs on this album are consistently entertaining and, with the help of REM's current popularity, it could spark renewed interest in The Troggs. (CD reviewed) -SM

 Writer, actor, singer, musician... Cave has been the renaissance man of the dark side for more than a decade. If you enjoy reading William S. Burroughs or Charles Bukowski, you'll probably enjoy *Henry's Dream*. Its dark, often evil, imagery makes this a difficult but ultimately rewarding listen. The Celtic-tinged epic, *Papa Won't Leave You Henry*, gets the album off to a brooding start. It's followed by the raw, country-lavoured *I Had A Dream*, *Joe*. On the next track, *Straight To You*, you would swear you were listening to Leonard Cohen if you didn't look at the vocal credits on the sleeve. *Brother, My Cup Is Empty* is another mysterious yet effective track. *Cave's* deep, resonant voice is ably backed up by the powerful guitar team of Mick Harvey and Blixa Bargeld. Harvey also assists on organ, drums, piano, vibes, percussion and backing vocals. The album was produced by Cave, Harvey and David Briggs. (CD reviewed) -SM

## Canadian dates firmed for Billy Ray Cyrus

One of country's hottest new acts, Billy Ray Cyrus, has been firmed for three, possibly four, Canadian dates this month.

The Mercury recording artist is booked for a June 24 date in Calgary and a show on the 25th in Edmonton.

Lulu's in Kitchener, Ont. has been tentatively set for June 26. Cyrus and his crew then move into Toronto on the 27th for a date at the Music Hall.

Although a newcomer to the charts, Cyrus has been trying to break into the business for 10 years. His signing with Mercury and the release of *Achy, Breaky Heart*, his debut single, literally exploded onto the charts. The single entered the RPM Country 100 at No. 44 on May 16, and, after seven weeks, moves into the No. 2 position this week.

Cyrus' single has also cracked the AC chart, entering at No. 27. *Some Gave All*, his debut album which shipped gold, enters the RPM Top 33 Country albums chart at No. 5.

Brother Barry, who wrote the new song and who was also a member of the Family Brown, makes up *Lonesome Daddy* with Tracey's husband Randall Prescott. Randall, who had joined the family band during the '80s, produced the self-titled debut album, which includes the new single. The album will ship the end of June.

**Alan Jackson goes platinum** in Canada with his Arista album, *Don't Rock The Jukebox*. This is his second platinum album for Canada. Here *In The Real World* was certified as a 100,000 seller in May of '91. Jackson is making good moves towards the top of the Country 100 with his latest release, *Midnight In Montgomery*, moving into the No. 11 slot this week. Dallas, his previous release, topped the chart on March 28 of this year.

**Straight Clean & Simple**, charting with *What You Get Is What You See*, are scheduled for the Calgary Stampede (July 4-9), Craven Big Valley Jamboree (10), and Country Music Week in Calgary (Sept. 16-20). The Hussar, Alta. band is already preparing a follow-up single titled *Misty*, which is also included on their *Iron Lady* album.

**Peter Wild makes his move** into country music with his debut, *She Just Beat Me To The Door*, released on the Wild label. The 28-year-old native of Brantford, Ont. has a solid background in entertainment, from drama to

rock 'n roll. It was his performance in front of a largely country music crowd at the Canadian Open Singing Contest held in Simcoe, Ont. in 1989 that convinced him to concentrate on country. Since then, he's opened for some pretty big names in country, including Marie Osmond, Michelle Wright, Conway Twitty and Johnny Cash. He has also had his share of radio and TV time. ## CHARTS

**Queen holds top spot.** Classic Queen easily keeps the No. 1 position on the Albums chart. The Black Crowes narrowed the gap, but remains well behind with The Southern Harmony And Musical Companion. The top two adds last week continue a quick pace to the top. Kiss' Revenge lands at No. 11 and the new country sensation, Billy Ray Cyrus climbs to No. 21 with Some Gave All.

**The next crossover champ?** The success of Billy Ray Cyrus isn't limited to just the country world. Achy Breaky Heart bullets to No. 2 on the Country chart, but it's also receiving some crossover airplay. It has been quite a while since a country artist has had major crossover success. Name the last artist to have a No. 1 song on both the Country and Hit Tracks/Singles charts.

**Celine hangs on . . .** It appears it will be a two-song battle for the No. 1 song next week. Celine Dion's If You Asked Me To keeps the top spot for a second week with Genesis' Hold On My Heart a close second. No other song appears close enough to challenge for No. 1 next week.

**Second highest of the year!** It's Probably Me, The Sting/Eric Clapton song from the Lethal Weapon 3 soundtrack debuts at No. 38. It is just the third song this year to enter the chart in the Top 40. Genesis did it early in the year when I Can't Dance debuted at No. 34. On the same week, Michael Jackson's Remember The Time entered at No. 40.

**The last three.** The last country artist to have a crossover No. 1 song was Dan Seals. Bop reached the top of both the Country and Singles charts in 1986. That's two years after Willie & Julio hit the top of both with To All The Girls I've Loved Before. Prior to that, Kenny Rogers & Dolly Parton turned the trick with Islands In The Stream in 1983.


