



Gabriel goes from So to Us with new album

It's been six years since *So*, Peter Gabriel's last studio album, was a worldwide hit. *So* it was with great interest that journalists lined up to talk to one of the world's most eclectic musicians at a recent press conference in Toronto.

Gabriel, 42, was in town to promote his upcoming Geffen album, *Us*, which hits the streets on Sept. 29. He calls *Us* his first real record of love songs as well as being his most personal and emotional album. A number of songs were inspired by his divorce from his wife, Jill Moore, and his subsequent romance and break-up with actress Rosanna Arquette. The angry first single, *Digging In The Dirt*, grew out of a project about inmates on death row and he describes it as "letting his bastard loose."

Us is the third Gabriel album to be produced by Canadian Daniel Lanois and his experience and judgment helped focus the former Genesis founder's wild imagination. Gabriel says he has always been impressed by Lanois' grasp of sounds, but now has greater respect for his writing abilities as well. "He's very gifted. He supports the artist and what they're trying to do."

The collaboration has resulted in an album featuring layers of sound and rhythm from both Gabriel's band and musicians from Armenia, Turkey, Kenya, Senegal, Moscow and Egypt.

But Gabriel's interest in music from around the world isn't a recent phenomenon. In 1980 he conceived of the idea of a World Of Music Arts and Dance festival, and he founded WOMAD a year later. This is now the 10th anniversary of WOMAD festivals, which are staged annually in Toronto and other cities around the world.

In 1989 Gabriel released *Passion and Passion Sources*, the first two albums on his own recently formed Real World Records. The label was founded by Gabriel and WOMAD to record and promote a wide range of different artists, both traditional and modern, from all over the world.

This year Gabriel invited artists from around the globe to his studio in Bath, England to record an album for Real World. One of the invitees was Canadian singer/songwriter Jane

Siberry, a talent who Gabriel has been aware of and respected for a number of years. "I'm sure it's not going to be very long before she has a major breakthrough around the world," he says of Siberry.

Gabriel has also been heavily involved with a number of human rights causes, taken part in various benefits, worked on ideas for

Dixon and Moore launch Dynasty Music Corp.

Well-known Canadian music entrepreneurs Neill Dixon and Gil Moore have joined forces to launch Dynasty Music Corporation.

The Dynasty Record label, under the corporation's umbrella, is being launched with the release of an album by its first signing, Triumph.

The Triumph album, scheduled for release on Oct. 27, will be distributed by Virgin Records, now part of Capitol-EMI.

Dixon is president of Chart Toppers, a full service marketing and promotion company.

Moore is co-founder, lead vocalist and drummer for Triumph. He is also the owner of Metalworks Recording Studio.

Completing the Dynasty team is Kathy Hahn as marketing/promotion director, and A&R director Andy Holland.

PolyGram launch for world's first DCC factory

PolyGram has officially opened the world's first pre-recorded digital compact cassette (DCC) factory in Amersfoort, The Netherlands.

The new factory has been fully operational since July and has already produced hundreds of thousands of DCCs. The factory, which employs 170 workers, has the capacity to produce a combined total of 36 million DCCs and analog cassettes annually. The factory will not only produce DCCs for PolyGram's own record labels, but for all other record companies which are supporting the introduction of the DCC music system in France, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the United States.

A combined total of 500 DCC titles from major record labels will be released as part of the introduction of the DCC music system. The initial DCC catalogues will consist of both popular and classical, international and local repertoire.

The DCC music system is designed for home, in-car, personal and portable use and plays not only DCCs, but cassettes from listeners' existing collections.

The DCC music system was invented by Phillips Consumer Electronics of The Netherlands, and was co-developed by Matsushita Electrical Industrial Company of Japan. Major global record companies, including BMG International, EMI Music Group, MCA Music Entertainment, PolyGram and The Warner Music Group, support the DCC music system and are releasing pre-recorded DCCs.

And Gabriel's only going to get busier in the ensuing months. Along with his other ongoing projects, he'll be busy promoting *Us* and preparing to hit the concert trail in January. Canadian dates are expected.

R-Tek's financial results are delayed by liquidation

R-Tek Corporation has announced that the financial results for the fiscal year ended June 30, originally expected to be available at the end of September, will now be delayed until November.

The delay is caused by the previously announced (RPM Sept. 12/92) receivership of R-Tek's German subsidiary, Dino Music GMBH. R-Tek is primarily engaged in the acquisition, production, marketing and distribution of music in Europe, North America and Australia under the Dino and Quality labels.

Peter Mathers' guitar explorations going live

Canadian guitar virtuoso Peter Mathers will appear at Harbourfront Studio in Toronto on Oct. 23.

Mathers' show, entitled 'Heartstrings, Guitar of the Americas,' is a solo 12-string and classical guitar concert that explores the indigenous guitar styles found throughout North and South America. The show incorporates many theatrical elements with dramatic narrative, lighting and costumes.

Mathers' first recording was a classical crossover album called *Forbidden Games*, a collection of movie themes and pop songs arranged for the solo classical guitar. This recording helped to develop a collaborative relationship with Liona Boyd, who recorded Mathers' arrangement of *Love Story* on her album, *The Romantic Chair*.

Mathers was awarded a FACTOR New Talent Demo Award and an Ontario Arts Council grant to tour the Heartstrings show. He recently released his 16-track *Heartstrings, Guitar of the Americas* album on the Manticore label.

"The joke here is, 'What's the difference between yogurt and Canada? Yogurt has an active culture. We're still trying to find out what Canada's active culture is.'" The reporter then apparently elaborated, paraphrasing Berman as saying that if the U.S. protected its culture the way Canada wants to, artists like Anne Murray and Bryan Adams would never have made it. He was also quoted as saying these artists owe their success to unfettered access to the U.S. market. Hot stuff, wouldn't you say. Do you think he just might think he knows what he's talking about. He used to be with a major record company in the U.S., as a matter of fact, a couple or three of them over the years, before becoming the mouthpiece for all of them. Maybe he knows the potential of our cultural industries, particularly the recording industry, and wants to scuttle it quickly. (EC: *We'll have our hands full with battles against Quebec and now the U.S. What's that about the mouse that roared . . . ?*)

It's been a great party season!!! CPI was one of the best and most constant hosts of opening night parties this year. Besides the shows they had at the O'Keefe Centre, the boxes at the CNE Grandstand were used as hospitality suites for several of the big shows, including Elton John and U2. Each suite had an abundance of finger food, soft drinks, beer and wine. The boxes aren't the most ideal to watch the shows from, but just being there was important. Several programmers from radio stations within driving distance of Toronto also took advantage of the hospitality offer, a few even brought a couple of busloads of contest winners with them. Unlike the old days at some of the CPI events, Mary-Anne Farrell and Jim Monaco looked after every detail and made everyone feel like a somebody. Great PR. (EC: *A smile and a handshake doesn't cost anything . . . !*)

Rewriting history!!! Every once in a while someone will do or say something that will rewrite the history of our industry. Often it can just be sloppiness and sometimes it is purposefully mean. This week we are launching a new feature in RPM called Page From The Past. We will reprint parts or pages of RPM that will show the article as it appeared in RPM at the time. Often this will set the record straight but, more over, it will also discourage anyone who feels that there is no chronicle of the important events in our industry. What a great country show . . . ! As reported elsewhere in this week's edition, CTV's CCMA awards presentation was a fast-paced, exciting, and very interesting 90-minute package of entertainment. There was a little Nashville boot-licking from the audience every time the name Garth Brooks was mentioned, but he shot them all down by praising the Canadian country music industry for being Canadian. In fact, his humbleness humbled the audience, not to mention those who followed him. Old stone-faced Ian even managed to crack a smile. Kissing Rita MacNeil while presenting her with the fan

award was also a nice gesture by Brooks. Back to the show. My only complaint was, again, the purple lighting of the audience. It was a little better this year, but there are still too many shots taken in the dark. Oh yes, one other little irritant . . . gushiness, on any level, demeans the artist. It's alright to say thank you to the fans, and to the country, and to your manager and record company . . . but why take a suckhole approach? (EC: *It was a great show . . . !*)

No jeans Lulu's is back . . . ! No big fanfare, just a bright orange program announcing "We're back" and upcoming dates at Lulu's in Kitchener. They kicked it all off on Aug. 13 with April Wine, followed by Dwight Yoakam on the 14th. They're even bringing back The Stampeders. Yep, Rich, Kim and Ronnie will be there for two days: Sept. 25-26. Have no idea who's running the place, although they tell me the landlord has taken charge. Now, that makes a lot of sense, doesn't it? (EC: *But, it's still no jeans . . . !*)

Four broadcasting greats named to Hall of Fame

This year, the Canadian Association of Broadcasters will induct four of Canada's leading broadcasting pioneers into the Broadcast Hall of Fame.

Being honoured are Murray T. Brown, Joseph V. Butler, Jean A. Pouliot, and Hal Yerxa. The four will be inducted at a special luncheon ceremony during the CAB convention in Vancouver on Nov. 3.

Brown, a former president of the CAB and CCBA, was the CCBA's 1975 Broadcaster of the Year. He began his career with CFPL-AM London in 1945, where he later became

Brooks and Allen help Martina McBride's career

In the space of a year, Martina McBride has gone from selling T-shirts at Garth Brooks concerts to opening them.

The Kansas native's husband John is Brooks' production manager, and he saw bringing his wife along with the tour entourage as a good way for them to stay together while he was on the road with Brooks. So while McBride was doing songwriters' demos and peddling her own demo tape around Nashville, she also started selling shirts at concerts.

McBride eventually landed a record deal with RCA. And while she was working on her debut album, Brooks phoned her and asked her to open for him on his upcoming tour. She accepted without hesitation.

"I'm still in shock," she said over the phone from Syracuse, N.Y., the day before she played to a sold-out grandstand at Toronto's Exhibition stadium. "It's a hard job but somebody's got to do it."

Audiences have been quite receptive to the charming 26-year-old's 30-minute opening performances, McBride says, and sales of her album, *The Time Has Come*, have increased in every city she's played. The second single from the album, *That's Me*, debuted at No. 92 on last week's RPM 100 Country Tracks chart.

McBride brings modern elements to traditional country music, a style she refers to as an art form. "It's been passed down from generation to generation. I love all kinds of music, but that's the style of country I choose."

McBride also has a Canadian connection; her manager is Bruce Allen. McBride had heard of Allen because her brother-in-law knew him through some photography he had done for Bryan Adams. He gave Allen a tape and John followed it up with a phone call. Allen was interested and, after meeting with the McBrides, a deal was in place.

"Bruce is really motivated and energetic and he seemed to be a do-er, so that interested me a lot. We just hit it off. It's a real challenge for him because he hasn't managed any country acts before. But we're having a great time and he's doing a great job for us."

When asked if she knows much about the 'bad boy' reputation Allen has in the Canadian music industry, McBride laughs. "We're taming him down," she says. Good luck, I says.

manager. He was appointed general manager of CFPL-AM/FM/TV in 1955, and president and general manager of CFPL Broadcasting Limited in 1968. In 1971, he was also named president of CKNX Broadcasting Limited. Brown has been honoured by the Association of Canadian Advertisers for outstanding service to the industry.

Butler, now chairman and president of VOXM Radio Newfoundland, took over the family's broadcasting business in 1954 when his father died in a plane crash. He eventually built the 1,000 watt station into Newfoundland's largest private network, which now consists of nine AM and FM stations. He is director of the Lieutenant Governor's Institute on the Family, and chairman of The VOXM Cares Foundation, which has provided more than \$1.5 million to community projects.

Pouliot is president and CEO of CFCF-TV Montreal and Télévision Quatre Saisons. An engineering graduate of Laval University, he served as wartime superintendent of the Canadian Navy Electrical Laboratories in Ottawa and went on to become executive engineer for Famous Players Canadian Corporation. He became general manager of CFCM-TV and CKMI-TV Quebec in 1957. He has also served a term as president of the Television Bureau of Advertising, was president of Broadcast News from 1971 to 1977, and was vice-president of television for the CAB for four years. He was CAB president from 1965 to 1967.

Yerxa, now retired, began his broadcasting career in 1937 and is a member of the CAB Half Century Club. After war service with the Regina Rifle Regiment, he joined CKCK, and in the early '40s moved to CJCA Edmonton where he hosted the popular children's show, *Uncle Hal and Jo-Jo the Parrot*. He helped launch CKRD, *Red Deer*, and opened his own 1,000 watt station, CFCW, *Camrose*, in 1954, which became Canada's first full-time country music station.

The Broadcast Hall of Fame was launched in 1982 and honours the leaders in the industry, who have devoted a substantial part of their careers to Canadian private broadcasting.

This year's inductees bring Hall of Fame membership to 104. Included in the roster are Gordon Sinclair, Betty Kennedy, Jack Webster and Bob Hesketh.


Früvous and Amos are becoming quite famous

Lorne Lichtman brings Trend into mainstream

Lorne Lichtman, a veteran of both the retail and recording industries, has taken over the major responsibility of bringing the Trend Music Group into the mainstream.

Lichtman joined Trend recently as national sales and marketing manager. He has already instigated changes that, in the space of one month, have brought Trend "from being a very sleepy, quiet record distributor, to being a very aggressive record company."

Trend was first launched in Old Montreal in 1947 as Musimart of Canada, becoming BSR Music of Canada in 1977, Trend Records & Tapes in 1978, and finally Trend Music Group Inc. in 1991.

Jack Inhaber, the company's long-standing president, will still be actively involved with the organization, but has allowed Lichtman a free hand to streamline the company and increase its visibility in the marketplace.

"The direction of the company is definitely the direction I'm going," explains Lichtman. "As far as product access, what we're picking up, how we're going to sell it, and what we're selling, is my responsibility."

Trend distributes approximately 150 domestic and international labels nationally. One of Lichtman's first moves was to put together an impressive, well laid-out fall/winter (1992-93) catalogue. He also launched

New arts awards honour best of Canadian talent

Canada's most talented performing artists will be honoured with new national awards administered by the recently formed Governor General's Performing Arts Awards Foundation.

Each year, six performing artists from the realms of theatre, dance, classical music and opera, popular music, film and broadcasting will be chosen to receive Governor General's Performing Arts Awards for their lifetime contribution to the cultural life of Canada. Each individual will receive \$10,000 and a commemorative medallion.

Two other special awards will also be given each year. The Ramon John Hnatyshyn Award for Voluntarism in the Performing Arts will recognize one individual each year for his or her work in support of the performing arts. The National Arts Centre Award will be presented to an artist or group who has made an outstanding artistic or cultural contribution to Canada in the past performance year. Recipients of the National Arts Centre Award will receive a \$10,000 prize to be donated by the recently formed National Arts Centre Foundation.

The 1992 award recipients will be honoured at a tribute at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa on Nov. 7. The gala event will showcase the work of those honoured and will be broadcast nationally on CBC and SRC at a later date.

The nominating committee for the Popular Music category is comprised of Denise Donlon, Sam Feldman, Harvey Glatt, Guy Latraverse and Michel Sabourin.

a monthly new release schedule, accompanied by a 20-song CD/cassette sampler, which allows his buyers to hear a cross-section of available titles.

A major priority for Lichtman is the signing of Canadian acts. He has been crossing the country targeting retailers and rackjobbers and setting up deals with artists and labels. "I arrived in Vancouver Sunday afternoon (Sept. 20), and by the end of the day I had four deals for Canada . . . four more Canadian artists signed. I'm being pretty aggressive about picking up domestic artists and production deals, as well as international licensing. I'm very directly involved at this point for signing labels and artists. We are trying to use the same mandate as a record company has, except on a very different scale.

Also, we can move a lot faster, because obviously there isn't a lot of politics involved here. We can do deals in days, whereas others can take weeks and months. We've gotten some labels because of the delay factor with other companies. The decision making for product is mine solely. I can say yes or no on the spot."

With the catalogue, monthly release data

Triumph's Troublemaker is a Hellraising single

Triumph will be making waves in the next month with the release of both a song on the Hellraiser III soundtrack and an album of their own.

The song Troublemaker is featured on the soundtrack, which goes to radio and retail the week of Oct. 5. The soundtrack has already been released to retail in the United States and Troublemaker has proven so popular to U.S. radio programmers that a promotional compact disc of the song has been released.

Troublemaker is also the first single off Triumph's new album, *Edge Of Excess*. The single ships to radio and retail on Oct. 1, while the album is set for an Oct. 20 release.

On Oct. 17, from 10 p.m. to midnight E.S.T., the Rock Radio Network will debut the album live via satellite from the band's own Metalworks Recording Studios in Toronto. Stations from coast to coast will simulcast the listening party and hold Triumph-related contests. Prizes will include copies of the soundtrack, copies of *Edge Of Excess*, and passes to private screenings and openings of Hellraiser III in each market. And in co-operation with the film's Canadian distributor, C/FP Distribution, some major markets will be flying winners into Toronto to raise a little hell at the listening party.

Q107 in Toronto will extend the Hellraiser III promotion until Oct. 28, when it will host a private suitcase party at the Phoenix Concert Theatre for their listeners who attend an advance private screening in Toronto. To participate, listeners will be required to dress in a Hallowe'en costume and bring a suitcase. The winner of the prize for the best costume will receive a trip for two to spend Hallowe'en in Hollywood.

and sampler, not to mention the very expensive coast-to-coast cementing of contacts by Lichtman, Trend is obviously willing to open its purse strings to secure a greater visibility in the industry and marketplace.

"Sure, we're spending a lot of money, and, because of our professional approach, we are experiencing a good reaction already. The profit factor lies with our accounts . . . with making sure they are aware of and buying our product. I'm flying and driving to every major account. By the time I'm finished, they're going to know everything they should know about the Trend Music Group and our unbelievable catalogue."

Lichtman also sees a profit factor in his "open door" policy toward signing Canadian acts. "We can offer Canadian acts a larger market, rather than being restricted to an isolated market. There's a lot of great Canadian talent available, and, with just a little bit of a break they can do well. We are offering national distribution, and we are pursuing it aggressively.

"I think majors get to be much more selective. And if it isn't geared toward a bulk audience, they don't want it. All they're looking for are the mega-hits that'll make them money. They really don't listen to music any more. It just becomes product. I listen to everything and judge it by its music and merit."

Lichtman is also encouraging his distributed labels to support and promote their product. "There are important projects that should be promoted through radio and the print media. Word of mouth alone can't do it.

"What I really want is the industry to respect us and to realize that we have some very creditable product. That irritating view held by some that if it's not on a major it doesn't matter, should be thrown out the window, because I totally disagree with that. We are a Canadian company. Our views are Canadian and we know and cover the territory. These are our credentials."

Allen announces tour of university campuses

Bruce Allen is taking his outspoken thoughts on the Canadian music industry on the road.

The notorious manager of Bryan Adams is doing a university speaking tour through the end of September and into October. In a presentation called 'The Canadian Music Industry Laid Bare,' Allen will discuss his thoughts and feelings and likes and dislikes of the inner workings of the Canadian music business. The engagements will also include question and answer sessions.

The tour dates are: the University of Manitoba (Sept. 28); University of Saskatchewan (29); McMaster University (Oct. 14); University of Waterloo (15); University of Calgary (21); and the University of Alberta (22).

Allen also hosts a weekly national phone-in radio show every Sunday called *Sound Off With Bruce Allen*.

Rita MacNeil has come a ways from her early days

Rita MacNeil's voice can bring a concert hall full of rugged miners to tears with its emotion but, offstage, it rarely rises much above a whisper.

MacNeil was in Toronto to promote her upcoming Virgin album, *Thinking Of You*, and was interviewed in a downtown hotel suite. She was soft-spoken and somewhat shy, but you could sense she was excited about the way her career is going.

MacNeil, who for the second consecutive year was recently voted by fans as the Canadian Country Music Association's Entertainer of the Year, has become one of this country's biggest musical stars, both here and abroad. She has won a number of awards and honours, has released five double platinum albums in Canada, has knocked Madonna out of the No. 1 slot on the Australian singles charts with *Reason To Believe*, has had three albums in that country's Top 100 at the same time, and hosted a CTV Christmas special which attracted a record-setting 1.7 million viewers.

Not bad for a woman who left her home of Big Pond, Cape Breton when she was 17 and struggled for years as a single mother cleaning houses and slinging hash in Toronto

He has also worked with CPI and DKD in the development of the Quidi Vidi Park Annual Music Festival.

Tarlton explains that the two new agreements shore up the network to face the challenges of the nineties. "We can honestly say our group from coast to coast, which also includes Perryscope, Nite Out, Bass Clef, and Les Productions Brazz, are the best and most experienced entrepreneurial talents in the Canadian music industry, and we look forward to an exciting decade of presenting the world's greatest entertainers to Canadian audiences."

Canadian indies meeting to share some new ideas

Members of the independent sector of the Canadian music industry are starting to talk to each other about the problems each of them faces.

The first meeting was held in August and focused on the European territories. A September meeting, hosted by manager Jodie Fernyough, dealt with October's CMJ convention in New York City. The next meeting will be held at the Harris Institute in Toronto at 7 p.m. on Oct. 6.

Raw Energy's Graeme Boyce, who organizes the meetings, says he learned a lot of things on a recent business trip to Europe and decided to pass some of that information on to others. "I had no idea it was going to be an ongoing situation for us, but the discussions have been incredibly informative and have certainly warranted us continuing unabated.

"The sector traditionally known as a bunch of lone wolf organizations, or even mavericks to some, is banding together and actually talking about the problems and the frustrations that each encounters throughout the work week. Communication, I suppose, has always been a stumbling block, due to an obvious lack of time and money. Now, though, people are finding the time to come out and try to solve some of these problems; to discuss new ideas and network their acts.

"From what I'm hearing already, we have a potential tinderbox in the making. With the recent rash of successes which several Canadian artists have achieved on their own as late, coupled with the spate of U.S. signings and the hoards of A&R staffs still scouring this country from coast to coast, the retail situation has taken on a greater responsibility for the independent community. There are many interesting scenarios, together with tough decisions to answer, that have arisen this past year and this is what we will address at our next meeting."

in Big Pond. "That's where I hang my hat," she jokes, noting that fans constantly send her new ones because they've become a trademark of her stage appearances.

Thinking Of You, which will be released Oct. 13, was produced by longtime associate Declan O'Doherty. And while the music tracks were laid down in a studio, most of the vocals were recorded live at the Capri Club in Sydney, N.S. She wanted a sparser sound on this album, and couldn't think of a better way of getting that than recording in the former college pub where she sang in years ago.

As with any MacNeil album, it's her voice which dominates on *Thinking Of You*. And she chuckles while dismissing my query about vocal training. "I have no explanation. That's just the way it is," she says.

"My mother sent me to lessons when I was younger but I was too shy and the teacher ended up doing all the singing. So that was soon the end of it."

MacNeil wrote nine of the album's 10 songs and describes them in this way: "The songs are of love and friendship and places - the same kinds of emotions that run through all my work. There's a country and traditional flavour, Celtic, blues, folk and rock. I don't label it, I prefer to just call it music. I don't look to do anything earth shattering. The music is just an extension of myself."

MacNeil's songs are quite personal and, though she was pleased when Anne Murray covered *Flying On Your Own*, she says she wouldn't write a song specifically for another person. "I couldn't do that because my songs come straight from my heart."

That's why it's somewhat of a surprise that the first single off the album is a reworked version of Sam Cooke's *Bring It On Home To Me*, a staple of MacNeil's live performances in recent years. "It's something a little bit different and it's a lot of fun," she explains.

After finishing her promotional duties and performing on the CCMA Awards, MacNeil has embarked on a 22-date tour of western Canada which continues until Nov. 14.

Asia's upcoming album distributed by Eureka

Eureka Records has picked up the distribution rights to Aqua, Asia's first full studio album in seven years.

The album will be released on Oct. 16 while the first single, *Who Will Stop The Rain*, is at CAR now. Asia has just finished playing a sold-out tour of Japan where Aqua went straight to number one with 60,000 sales the first week out. A European tour in October will be followed by a U.S. tour early in the new year. Some Canadian dates are possible.

Aqua was produced by group founder and keyboardist, Geoff Downes. Also appearing in the current lineup are new vocalist/bassist John Payne, guitarist Steve Howe, drummer Trevor Thornton, and guitarists Vinny Burns and Al Pitrelli. Also making a special appearance on drums is Carl Palmer, Asia's original percussionist and a founding member of Emerson, Lake and Palmer.



I.R.S. will be moving into the same office as Virgin Records Canada on Oct. 1, the same day the labels will align their marketing, promotion and publicity forces. The I.R.S./Virgin relationship will be for Canada only and won't affect any other territory in the world. I.R.S. will continue its current sales and distribution relationship with Capitol-EMI.

Kane, who joined I.R.S. in 1989 as national sales and marketing co-ordinator, will be responsible for all aspects of I.R.S.' activities in Canada. Paul Orescan, current president of I.R.S. Canada, has been promoted to a new executive position with I.R.S. Records. Orescan was in Los Angeles at press time and was unavailable to give more details.

Kane says that rumours of his label's pulling out of the country, which recently appeared in certain publications, caused some problems, but were incorrect. "We're not going away. We're going to continue to have a presence in the Canadian marketplace. Over

I.R.S. and Chrysalis merge with Virgin team

Three labels under the umbrella of EMI Canada will soon be under the same roof.

I.R.S. Records Canada and Chrysalis will both share the downtown Toronto offices of Virgin Records Canada. I.R.S. moves in on Oct. 1, while Chrysalis will be handled by the Virgin team, under the leadership of Doug Chappell, starting in early 1993. Distribution of the full Virgin label switches from PolyGram to EMI Canada on Jan. 1, 1993.

Virgin will remain an independent marketing, promotion and A&R arm of EMI Canada. "The new arrangement should give us a strong repertoire and good product flow all year round," says Chappell. "We're going to go out and take on the industry. I think it's a great opportunity for all three labels. They're all different but they all have similarities."

The objective behind the moves is to have the three labels marketed with the right experience and in the style most compatible with the individual artist rosters.

Sales and shipments stagnant for August

Sales and shipments of recorded music in August stayed around the same level as they did last August, according to figures released by the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA).

Total shipments were down one per cent from August, 1991 while the net value of sales was up two per cent. Compact discs continued to capture a larger share of the market while cassettes remained in decline.

"I think it reflects the end of summer blues," CRIA president Brian Robertson says of the figures. "There's not much life to the market."

For the year to date, total shipments are less than one per cent behind 1991's figures. Net sales are up five per cent over last year. "I know the (record) companies are looking to the fall and winter seasons for a bit of stimulation," Robertson says.


Myles ahead of the rest! The new release, from Alannah Myles is off to a good start. Song Instead Of A Kiss has this week's top add at No. 58.

The meeting was chaired by Grealis, pro tem chairman of the Academy. Also in attendance was Kenneth M. Smookler of the law firm Smookler and Smookler.

The executive of the new Academy are: Hank Smith, president; Charlie Russell, vice-president; Gary Buck, secretary-treasurer; and directors, Larry Kunkel, Lanny Salazar, Sammy-Jo and Stan Klees.

The mandate of the new Academy will be "To promote the preservation, appreciation and development of those forms of entertainment known as country and country-oriented music."



Another winner for producer Ken Gibson

CCMA awards show was a bare-bones spectacular

CTV producer Ken Gibson, who once again helmed the Canadian Country Music Association's awards presentation (Sept. 20), kept the set designers at bay this year. Instead of the overly expensive, not to mention overly done sets, Gibson and his borrowed-from-the-CBC director Joan Tosini banked on gaining viewer attention with attractive personalities and a phalanx of multi-coloured, twirling lights and bursts of fog.

George Fox hosted the show again, and kept the pace interesting with his usual laid-back, homespun Alberta humour. The presenters, for the most part, made their introductions straight and according to the cue cards. The winners managed acceptance speeches that were both bright and brief, and the performances were short and memorable. This year's awards show was certainly a celebration of Canadian country music.

Country superstar Garth Brooks was on hand to make a presentation, which he did most modestly, to Rita MacNeil for her second consecutive Fan Choice Entertainer of the Year award. She was chosen by customers in more than 1,000 record stores across Canada where ballot boxes had been set up. MacNeil, who had just performed her new single, Bring It On Home To Me, and was waiting in the wings to return to her seat, was genuinely overcome by the win.

Brooks also received an award for the Best Selling Album (Foreign or Domestic) for

his Ropin' The Wind album, which has sold more than 300,000 copies in Canada. On gaining the stage, Brooks even humbled presenter Ian Tyson, by removing his hat in respect for the audience, causing Tyson to do the same. While making his brief acceptance speech, the fire alarm suddenly began to ring, which Brooks professionally used as a cue to make his exit, breaking the audience up with, "The bells are ringing, the school bus must be leaving."

Michelle Wright, a veteran of 12 years in the country recording field, maintained her status as Female Vocalist of the Year. Wright also won the Single of the Year award for Take It Like A Man, the video for which Steven Goldmann won the Video of the Year Award. The evening wouldn't have been complete without a performance by Wright. Centre stage and alone, and bathed in an eerie blue light, she delicately wrapped her country/blues signature around her version of He Would Be 16. The performance was a showstopper.

Cassandra Vasik, now an established and highly respected member of Canada's country songwriting and recording community, displayed her intensely professional vocal charm with the song that brought her into prominence, It Comes Back To You. Also a standout was newcomer Lisa Brokop, who performed her current chart single, My Love. Joan Kennedy, who has catapulted into prominence through recent chart successes, added her Maritime warmth to the show with one of her chart singles, If You Want Love. It was a convincing and very poignant performance.

There were also energy-inspired performances by Fox, Prairie Oyster, Joel Feeney, South Mountain, Ian Tyson, Gary Fjellgaard, The Johner Brothers, and Mark Koenig, a true picture of Canada's now established country star system.

Prairie Oyster were also multi-award winners. They took home the Group of the Year Award, the Album of the Year for Everybody Knows, and the band's keyboardist, Joan Besen, won the Song of the Year Award for writing Did You Fall In Love With Me, which was recorded by Prairie Oyster.

In other awards, Carroll Baker was finally recognized for her many years of contribution to the country music industry by being inducted into the Hall of Honour.

Also notable were the tributes to several of Canada's country greats taken from the carefully preserved archives. Included were Wilf Carter, The Mercey Brothers, Stu Davis, Ian and Sylvia, The Family Brown, and exceptional footage of Carroll Baker, which cleverly segued to her induction into the Hall of Honour.







DOUG AND THE SLUGS - Rock
Tales From Terminal City
 Tomcat Records - TCCD 92102

Doug and the Slugs burst onto the scene with Too Bad, a Top 20 hit in 1980. And while they've been a popular live draw since then, that song remains their biggest hit to date. The band has kept a low profile for the past few years but has returned with Tales From Terminal City, a very good independently released album which uses Vancouver as a central theme. Lead singer Doug Bennett's lyrics are offbeat and fun and he still hasn't lost the distinctive vocal stylings which make his voice immediately recognizable. The Slugs have their licks down solidly too. Terminal City, a blues-flavoured celebration of Vancouver culture, leads off the album and features a strong guitar solo in the bridge. Let The Jelly Roll is a mixture of pop and good old R&B, and Shotgun has barrelhouse piano duking it out with the guitars for instrumental supremacy. Say You're Going To Love Me, Rusty Bus, and Mystery Bride are also good bets. - SM


POINT OF POWER - Hard Rock
It's About Time
 BEI/MCA - BEID-22-J

This Vancouver band was formed three years ago and this is their debut album. The members of the group have all played with other bands in addition to being popular session players. Their commercial hard rock sound at times has been compared to early Van Halen. The lustful Come See The Doctor is the first single and Lovin' You (Is All I Wanna Do) is the power ballad. Other key tracks are Going Strong, Kick It Out, and Love Takes Time. - SM


DOUG BARR - Featuring The - Children
Big Boy Band - Somebody Loves Ya!
 Lowansa Records - LRCD-0392

If radio was as experimental and gutsy as it was a few years ago, Doug Barr, like many in the children's recording business, would be getting a lot of attention. Radio

consultants seem to have overlooked that for every female listener, 18-26, there are one or more offspring who just might become enraptured by their mother's favourite jock if they could hear something that appeals to them. Doug Barr has the answer. This album, released in CD and cassette configuration, is a highly entertaining and delightfully simplistic attention-getter for three-to-nine-year-olds. Great stuff, done up in country, rock, pop, reggae, and pure entertainment stylings. Key are I'm A Train, Somebody Loves Ya, and Do I Love You? Yes I Do! Barr is no stranger to the recording field. This is his fourth album release since 1985. Lowansa is based in Toronto. The album is available through toy stores across Canada. He also hosts Doug Barr's Musical, Magical Day, aired on The Family Channel. - WG


PATTY SMYTH - Pop
Patty Smyth

This isn't the same Patty Smyth that lead Scandal to the top of the charts in 1984 with The Warrior. It's the same person, but this Patty Smyth has a softer sound. The album couldn't have asked for a better push than a lead single that went straight to No. 1. Sometimes Love Just Ain't Enough (with Don Henley) is clearly the best track on the album. Smyth also co-writes much of the material on the album. While there may not be another No. 1 song on this album, there are a few songs that should garner strong radio play and help generate sales. Watch for Make Me A Believer and I Should Be Laughing as possible follow-up single releases. -TE



RED HOT BURRITOS - Country
Taken By Surprise

This Saskatchewan-based band gives country music a good kick in the pants with this rollicking debut album. The group is comprised of Carla Taylor on vocals, Todd Lueck on guitars and background vocals, Corey Lueck on drums, background vocals and twangy lead vocals on Why'd You Say You Loved Me, and Glen Freeman on bass. To Be Or Not To Be leads off the album with an upbeat country swing number. The band's second single, Lonely Without You, features the piano playing of Rob Bryanton, who also produced the album. The third single, Why'd You Say You'd Call, is a real party song featuring the banjo picking of Jack Dublanica. You Don't Notice Me is the fourth, and most current, single. The band has played a number of festivals in Saskatchewan but has gotten its widest exposure by appearing on both The Nashville Network's Nashville Now television show and the Nashville Live radio show. Because the band shows such promise, major labels have apparently been showing interest. But, on this album at least, staying independent seems to have been a wise decision. Its raw dynamism

makes it stand out from some of the more slick and polished discs the majors are putting out. - SM


ICU - Rock/Pop
Stand On Your Own


This band formed in Halifax in 1987 and has become an increasingly major force on the east coast music scene since then. ICU was named Best Recording Band at the 1989 Maritime Music Awards, the same year their song Don't Turn Back was voted Song Of The Year. Last year the band won the regional competition for Labatt's National Band Warz, earning them \$25,000 to put towards recording an album and distribution of that album in Canada by A&M Records. Now the album is here and it shows that this group has some commercial potential with its rootsy rock/pop sound. Yeah Yeah No No is both my favourite and the most topical song on the album, as it takes a tongue-in-cheek look at Canada's national identity problems. Love Is Gonna Bring You Down and Little Town Girl are also strong tracks. Don't Turn Your Back, re-recorded for the album, is a moving song about the poor and homeless. This sextet has made it big in the Maritimes, now let's see if they can break elsewhere. - SM


MARK KORVEN - Pop/Folk
This Must Be The Place
 Radar Records - RR13001

This independent album is the follow-up to 1987's Duke Street release, Ordinary Man. In the five years in between albums, Korven has made a name for himself writing music for Canadian films including I've Heard The Mermaids Singing, Sam & Me, and The Grocer's Wife. Real Time is the first single and it has been added to the CBC Radio Network. There is also a video for the song. This Must Be The Place also stands out. For the most part, this is a very mellow, heavily acoustic album. The one exception is Train Coming, a song which romps along and, through the combination of drums, guitars and harmonica, actually starts to sound like an oncoming train. Korven's music is hard to categorize and has fallen through the commercial cracks before, and this album may just do the same. - SM

CORNELIS - Instrumental
Cornelis
 Brocar Music - BRO-0507


Instrumental music at its best is difficult to pitch. Radio programmers are always on the lookout for short, interesting instrumental bits for extros and intros, but very rarely will air a three or four minute track in its entirety. They should give a little more time to this recording. Jacobus Cornelis, who has released on RCA and WEA in the past, has teamed with producer/engineer Hayward Parrott to deliver 10 very ear-catching tracks that pleasantly and gently meld traditional tenor and soprano



saxes (Vernon Dorge) and acoustic, classical and electric guitars (Mike Francis), with his own keyboard synth magic. All the music was written and arranged by Cornelis, who co-produced the session with Parrot at Toronto's McClear Place. Paradise Bay is the proposed first single. Also key is Good To Be By You (which was recorded by Cornelis under the name of Jack Cornell back in the '70s), In Your Eyes, and On My Way Out West. Brocar Music is based in Toronto. - WG


SUZANNE VEGA - Pop
99.9 F°
 A&M - 31454 0005 2-Q

This album gives Vega a chance to show her diversity. Blood Makes Noise is a bouncy, mid-tempo song that is enjoying airplay and could also be looked upon as a dance track. On Bad Wisdom, Vega displays the same poignant writing style which made Luka a big hit a few years back. Song Of Sand is a ballad about the lasting effects of the Gulf War. The title track, Rock In This Pocket, As A Child, When Heroes Go Down, and As Girls Go are also highlights. Some prominent musicians appear on the album, including Bruce Thomas on bass, David Hidalgo on guitar, Jerry Marotta on drums and Richard Thompson on guitar. Mitchell Froom produced and played keyboards. Ultimately, 99.9 F° is an enjoyable album, in a subtle, unobtrusive way. - SM


LUNA2 - Pop/Rock
Lunapark
 Elektra - 9 61360-2-P

This group brings together three members from critically acclaimed bands into one cohesive unit. Dean Wareham was the vocalist, guitarist and songwriter for Galaxie 500, bassist Justin Harwood served six years with the Chills, and drummer Stanley Demeski was with the Feelies for nearly a decade. Producer Fred Maher is perhaps best known for his musician and production work with Lou Reed. Elements of all of the above acts filter through on Lunapark to make a pretty good album. Wareham's vocals are somewhat flat but suitable for the material he's working with. The top tracks are Poison Life, Anesthesia, Slash Your Tires, Crazy People, Smile, and I Can't Wait. - SM




