



Sam's surges into future with third floor overhaul

Paving the way for the 21st century, Sam The Record Man's third floor of its flagship store has been transformed into a new multimedia software outlet called Sam The Interactive Man.

It is the first step in Sam's quest to offer multimedia product on a national level. Another two setups are set to go in Vancouver and Montreal in the next six months, with some secondary markets to start up smaller version and a program to go to all mall stores within one year.

Since October, the Toronto Yonge Street location has carried all forms of software: CD-Rom, CDi, 3DO, Laseractive, and various levels of video games. However, the catch is that the store has set up hardware posts where consumers can walk off the street and be offered a hands-on demonstration of all the materials, including an impressive display of new CD-Rom and Laseractive titles.

"The idea," says Jason Sniderman, president of Roblan Distributors, "was to carry as many platforms and different formats as we could. The reaction was good enough in the three months before Christmas to entice us to expand to where we now have 4,000 square feet."

The area is divided into two levels. The lower level contains mostly video software alongside the Laseractive model, while the upper level offers the higher-grade video product and the alluring CD-Rom setup. The biggest advantage, however, is its interactivity. "Being a neophyte at this stuff, I was learning as I was setting this thing up. We had determined that a high priority would be accessing the hardware in the store so people could interact with it."

Although lining up hardware and software obligations in the store simultaneously has been a challenge, Sniderman maintains "we've always had a commitment to exposing new technologies, even if we don't have anything to sell."

An example of this is Sam's carrying 3DO software even though a player could not be secured, and the availability of Laseractive

players without software. Nonetheless, Sam's remains perhaps the only music retailer to have in place this sort of venture.

"This is too important. There are too many things at stake. You have to make sure the public is educated in the environment of your store, rather than any other type of random situation."

The impact on the retail environment on the national level is yet to be determined, but the initial response has been very positive. Last year alone, eight million CD-Rom titles were sold.

"I want people to know it's just not a standard record store with 120 BPMs blasting at you as you walk in. We want an environment where your entertainment desires are fulfilled. And it's a learning experience as well. It's not just retail: that's only half of it."

"The impact may be intangible right now, but it turns into something tangible when you get that type of warm, fuzzy feeling coming to a Sam The Interactive Man store."

Obituary

Sudden heart attack fatal to Jim Corbett

The industry was shocked to hear of the sudden death of Jim Corbett, a veteran in the record services industry.

Mr. Corbett died in Toronto on June 9 at the age of 66.

Originally from Montreal, Mr. Corbett, one of 11 children, first became involved in the record industry with Sparton Records. He went on to work with Phonodisc and GRT. He launched his own company, J.C. Enterprises in 1970, which became a family affair with his sons Gerald and Ron. After more than a decade of servicing the industry, the firm fell

"The return I thought I would get would be based on video game sales. All I had to do was give it its own floor, and I'd be laughing."

"But I was very surprised to see the incredible sales for CDi. We started selling it the minute people knew we had it. I immediately became a prime component of what we do."

"I was also very surprised at our 3 1/2-inch CD-Rom sales. I expected nothing, and the results have been incredible. I can't keep Peter Gabriel's Explorer in stock."

Adds Fillion, "CD-Rom is growing quicker than any other type of format. As kids go to school, they're getting computer educated. Within the next ten years, everybody will be buying a home computer. There are more and more services you can carry on a computer. All these things will add up to giving people reasons to buy a computer."

François Cousineau elected president of SOCAN

Montreal composer François Cousineau was elected president of SOCAN at a June 10 meeting of the new board at the society's head office in Don Mills.

Cousineau is a member of the Bar of the province of Quebec and of the Canadian Bar Association, and is a director of SPACQ, SODRAC and Teleglobe Canada Foundation. He has written the music for eight feature films, three musicals, more than 100 songs and countless jingles. He also wrote the music for the Marilyn, the Radio Canada series and is writing a rock opera with Luc Plamondon.

Vancouver songwriter Bill Henderson is first vice-president; Montreal music publisher Diane Pinet is second vice-president; Toronto songwriter Eddie Schwartz is secretary; and Toronto publisher Alexander Mair is treasurer.

Montreal songwriter Jane McGarrigle has been named chair of the SOCAN communications committee and Toronto publisher George Ullmann returns as chair of the distribution and tariff committee. Mark Altman, a Toronto publisher, is past president.

The complete SOCAN board of directors, which will serve until June, 1996, comprises nine composer/songwriters and nine music publishers, as follows.

SOCAN's total receipts in 1993 reportedly hit "an all-time high record," at \$77,841,000 (up 2.4 per cent), of which 43 per cent was paid to SOCAN members. Foreign performing rights societies accounted for 34.8 per cent for performances of foreign music in Canada, and administration costs took 18.8 per cent of gross receipts.

One of the negatives of the report was receipts from radio which declined by \$441,000, which was due mainly to the reduced tariff set by the Copyright Board for those stations using copyright music for less than 20 per cent of the programming day. In the other categories there were slight increases, except for concerts, where there was a 23 per cent increase.

ZZ Top touches down for BMG metal date

ZZ Top's Frank Beard, Billy Gibbons and Dusty Hill, took time out from their Toronto date (May 30) at Maple Leaf Gardens to get acquainted with BMG, their new Canadian distributor.

Toronto was the first stop of a four-stop Canadian tour in support of the band's RCA debut album, Antenna.

Prior to the band's Toronto date, the album passed the 50,000 units sold mark, which enabled BMG staff to certify the album gold. BMG's president and general manager Bob Jamieson met the band backstage and made the presentation.

Zellers honours Saturn for fourth straight year

Toronto-based Saturn Distributing was awarded the Zellers' Supplier of the Year award at a recent banquet held in Montreal.

This is the fourth year Saturn has received this prestigious award. The award was particularly important to Saturn, which set an industry benchmark, considering the number of suppliers servicing Zellers nationwide operation.

Saturn took advantage of the occasion to present Zellers with the supplier's own

It was also reported that receipts from foreign performing right societies reached an all-time high at \$12,738,000 (up 2.2 per cent)

The total distributed in 1993 was approximately \$60.6 million, a decline of about \$900,000 over the previous year. Distributions to SOCAN writers increased by 2.3 per cent (or \$392,000) over 1992, topping \$17 million for the first time. Close to 58 per cent was for performances of works by SOCAN members outside Canada. Radio and general was down by 10 per cent.

Of particular significance was the fact that SOCAN had 700 additional writer members taking part in the radio and general pool. Overall, the number of SOCAN writers participating in distribution was up by 8.2 per cent to 11,935.

The Beastie Boys sell out Toronto date at Palladium

The Beastie Boys were in Toronto recently for an exclusive sold-out date at the Palladium, and a surprise visit by a large delegation of EMI Music Canada staff.

Between rehearsals and interviews, the band found time to accept gold awards for Check Your Head, their last album, and for Ill Communication, their latest, which has since gone platinum.

The New York-based band is scheduled for the Lollapalooza tour this summer, which kicks off its Canadian dates in Montreal (July 27), followed by Barrie (28), and Vancouver (Aug. 31).

FEATURED ARTIST - by Craig Thompson

Lynda Lemay sticks by her stylized song roots

Seeing as it has been four years since francophone Linda Lemay released her first album, *Nos Reves*, it could be expected that Lemay's recording future was encased in a cloud of doubt.

Not so, according to Lemay.

"It took four years to find the right people. I wasn't totally happy with the first album. This time, I took my time to do it properly."

Lemay's new album, simply titled *Y*, is laced with the kind of stylized songwriting and production popular on most of contemporary AC radio in the '90s. The fact that the lyrics are in the French language in this light is secondary.

Helping out Lemay were producer Marc Pérusse, Yves Savard, who has been with Lemay since the beginning, and her manager Martin Leclerc.

"Yves has played a pivotal role in my career, and he helped me to get the right musicians to play on the album."

One of the keys for Lemay is the ability of a recording to capture the essence of her live performance, a medium in which she has always strived for perfection.

"On the first record, I was not able to translate this. This album has found it. I tried to find a proper balance, an equilibrium, between the songs that make you laugh or joyful, and those that make you think. To find out about me, you have to see me live. Then you would get this sense of balance, which is important to my work. People know me by my live shows."

Some of these people got to know Lemay when she performed a very successful opening slot for Daniel Lanois in Quebec City. In one of the reviews of the show, she was accorded the same print space as Lanois, as the response to her show was quite overwhelming.

Lemay's album will not be restricted to Quebec. Says Warner Music's national artists

relations manager Roger Desjardins, "even though the English may not totally understand, her lyrics are very deep. Things that I always wanted to say she's bringing out of me. There are parts that make me cry, parts that make me laugh. Her writing is very deep. I think English Canada will be very receptive, especially with her beautiful voice. Music has no language."

Continuing on from this somewhat controversial statement, Lemay adds that "I've always performed for a French audience that totally puts me under a microscope and analyzes everything I say. To play for an English audience,

I'm not sure how they'll react to it, because everything I do is so lyrical. The shows might be a little softer."

After this, the unavoidable question of whether Lemay would follow in the footsteps of Roch Voisine and Celine Dion comes up.

"No," she answers with typical aplomb. "I've always performed in French, so I feel extremely comfortable. I haven't mastered the English language yet, and even if I do, I'm not sure I would be comfortable enough to write in English. But, by the same token, I would never say no."

A&M's Jann Arden sweeps ARIA awards

A&M recording artist Jann Arden had an impressive showing at the recent Alberta Recording Industry Association annual awards.

Arden triumphed in six different categories, including best album for *Time For Mercy*, best single for *I Would Die For You*, and best female artist.

Arden was also recognized in the categories of pop/light rock vocals, songwriter/composer and most promising artist. In addition, Arden's Musicworks management team of Neil MacGonigill and Rudi LeValley were named top management team and director Jeth Weinrich was awarded the top video prize for *I Would Die For You*.

The video for *I Would Die For You* recently picked up the Golden Sheaf award as top music video at the 30th annual Yorkton Short Film And Video Festival, winning out over 312 other entries. This makes two in a row for Arden and director Weinrich, who won last year for *Will You Remember Me*.

Finally, in the last bit of Arden news, the

Warner is planning to release *Y* across Canada, and Lemay and her core band will tour Ontario in the summer and, if all goes according to plan, across Canada in the fall. Lemay feels confident that the team supporting

"I've got a great entourage around me," she concludes. "Now, I have Martin, and I feel I've got the full group I need to work with. This way, the pressure is taken off me and I can do what an artist can, which is concentrate on the music."

FACTOR offers new loan program for independents

The Foundation to Assist Canadian Talent On record has set up a new loans program for unsigned independent artists called the Independent Artists' Recording Loan Program.

This program replaces the compilation CD and producers programs that were recently eliminated. Deadlines are June 30 and September 30 for rock, country, easy listening and dance/rap, and October 30 for other programs.

The recording must compromise at least four songs, and must have a Canadian producer.

FACTOR will provide 50% of the budget up to \$7,500 of any kind of music. Payback will be deducted from CD and cassette sales, at a rate of \$0.50 for tape and \$0.75 for CD, with a two-year period to pay back the rest of the loan, after which the account is closed.

Application forms can be obtained by contacting Heather Sym at the FACTOR head office in Toronto.

In a decision met with applause from Canadian industry executives, the CRTC announced that the US-based Country Music Television channel (CMT) is being removed from Canadian cable services once the new Maclean Hunter/Rawlco Canadian country channel hits the airwaves.

CMT was launched in Canada in 1984 and reaches more than 1.9 million homes in Canada, as well as 24.5 million homes in the US. CMT Europe, launched two years ago, reaches over 8.4 million homes in Europe.

Not surprisingly, the move was met with derision at Group W Satellite Communications, the company which owns CMT. Group W senior vice-president Lloyd Werner expressed his company's distaste for the CRTC decision.

"When we heard about this we were flabbergasted. We anticipated that there would be at least one other country music channel licensed by the CRTC. We thought it would be good for the Canadian cable operators, good for the Canadian viewers, and good for us, because we'd have to get better at what we do, because competition always does that.

"We ourselves will do everything we can to get the CRTC to reverse their decision, including pointing out that the CMT reaches 25 million homes in the US and eight and a half in Europe, and that we have because we have become the country music window on the world. And we think that is a greater benefit to the country music artist than a stand alone country music channel in Canada.

"They're teeing us off to the extent that we may stop running Canadian artists on our channel. If we're no longer programming for Canadian viewers, why do we have to show Canadian artists. It's an option, but it isn't a pleasant option."

While Werner was adamant in his displeasure over the decision, he was equally quick to point out that the decision will have little to no impact on CMT in terms of revenue.

"We priced ourselves to the Canadian cable operators very reasonably, and the amount of money we receive from Canadian operators is very small, and just about covers our marketing expenses. So it has no financial impact, other than it deprives us of a market and deprives the market of us."

Werner also expressed the view, shared by many industry insiders, that the new Canadian channel, in its effort to subsidize Canadian artists and new videos, may quickly price itself out of the marketplace in an attempt to balance the books.

Custom-made guitar presented to Bryan Adams

A custom-designed platinum Fender Stratocaster was presented to Bryan Adams by A&M and PolyGram in Vancouver to signify total sales in excess of 40 million units worldwide. A&M commissioned Fender to construct the one-of-a-kind guitar.

Through the assistance of Adams, a whale sanctuary has been created in the Antarctic. Adams pushed for the sanctuary by placing postcards on every seat in every venue he played on his ongoing tour, including Japan,

"They're going to finance videos and pay the artists every time a video runs. Well, if you add that to their marketing expenses, their uplink expenses, their master control expense, it doesn't make sense. It doesn't make any money. Eventually, once we're out of the picture and there's no competition, they're going to turn around and charge the Canadian cable operators an exorbitant fee, three to four times what we're charging."

But if the Canadian industry is saddened by CMT's loss, they aren't showing it. According to Standard's Gary Slaight, who was beat out for the Canadian country channel by Rawlco, CMT's loss isn't a loss for the Canadian country music industry.

"TNN is still up here, and I think one American country channel is fine. They don't put anything back into our industry and they take a whole bunch of money out. We said at the hearing that CMT should be gone. They play Canadian videos very rarely, and the only



CFRB remains the number one station in Toronto, based on the recently-released spring BBM ratings. The station now enjoys a 12.5% share of the market, with a circulation base of 966,300 listeners totalling some 12 million hours each week. Morning man Wally Crouter continues to be the king of am and AM, grabbing an audience of over 700,000 listeners. The station also made some significant gains since the fall. Weekly tuning by adults 25-54 is up 21%, while the station's 25-49 share is up 59%.

CFRB's Standard stablemate Mix 99.9 didn't fare quite as well in the ratings. The station's share dropped from 5.7 last fall to 4.9 this spring. Station program director J.J. Johnson says that the station's ranking and circulation remain the same, and the drop in the share is "a minor setback". He adds, "I don't necessarily believe in these things. But we took a hit with males, and so did Q107, CFNY and CISS, which may have something to do with all the baseball on in the spring." When asked if the station would be making any changes, Johnson said simply, "just watch!"

Staying with Mix 99.9, the station is holding a Show Us Your Mix Contest, co-sponsored by Canada Pure Beverages. The station wants listeners to display the words Mix 99.9 to as many people as possible, using

South Africa, and Korea. The cards encouraged fans to write the presidents of countries that would be involved in voting for the sanctuary.

time they picked it up a bit was because of the hearings."

When informed of CMT's displeasure over the de-listing, Slaight replied curtly, "I think that's too damn bad. They're an American company who've had a free ride up here, taking millions of dollars out of Canada and putting zero back in. I don't have one bit of empathy for them. The same company that owns CMT owns TNN, and TNN is staying here."

When asked if Standard is planning an intervention with the CRTC over the Rawlco license, Slaight commented, "We're looking into the possibility, but we haven't decided yet. We're getting legal opinion on whether it's worth pursuing or not."

CMT will be discontinued on Canadian cable when the new Canadian country channel begins operation, sometime in late 1994 or early 1995.

Vancouver's Z95.3 FM is the big winner in the west, according to the latest ratings. CKZZ's audience increased a whopping 21% from the fall, and the station now enjoys an audience of more than 400,000 listeners. The station cites a dramatic rise in its adult female listenership as the biggest factor in the overall increase. According to The Book, the rankings went like this in the Vancouver FM field: Z95.3 FM - 408,200 weekly listeners; CFMI - 388,000; CFOX - 327,000; CHQM - 324,000; CKKS - 277,100; CJJR - 225,400. CKZZ-FM signed on in May 1991, playing a collage of dance, pop and alternative music.

Classic Rock Y95 in Hamilton has crowned the Brantford-based band The Redeemers as this year's winner of the station's Future Classics new talent search. The band played, along with fellow finalists The Bryan James Duffy Band, Roadside Attraction and Threshold at Lulu's in Kitchener, Joe Fridays in Brantford and, for the finale, Acropolis in Hamilton. The finale was taped for simulcast on CHCH-TV and Y95 on June 18. The Redeemers picked up the grand prize, supplied by the station and Subway Sandwiches, of \$10,000 cash, \$5,000 in instruments from J.L. Sound, a music video production from Hills TV and Video Productions, and a recording session from Grant Avenue Studios in Hamilton. The top 12 entries in the Future Classics search will be included on the '94 CD compilation. Proceeds from ticket sales for all showcases and merchandise sales will benefit Chedoke McMaster Childrens Hospital.

K-104 FM in Woodstock, Ontario is presenting Summerfest One on July 4 at the Western Fair Grandstand in London, Ontario. Among the acts to be featured are Blue Rodeo, 54-40, Colin James And The Little Big Band, Tea Party and Junkhouse.

IN THE CLUBS

HMV's Fresh Blood new music sampler has arrived, following the call for submissions during this year's Canadian Music Week. The big winner out of the 250 entries was former Shuffle Demon George Koller, for his debut solo recording *Sunlight Rain*. He describes the music as "an alternative to the alternative - the music expresses a minimalist, universal and optimistic energy... (and) is not damaging to the senses." As winner, Koller receives financing for pressing costs, artwork, and remastering of 3,000 CDs to be placed in all HMV stores. The Indie Sampler also includes tracks by Toronto's Anhai, Coda The West, Harrister Beercap, Junk, Monkey Trial, Sponge, Squirrel, Subtractor, Two Thirds Water, Trigger Happy and Wind May Do Damage, Vancouver's Juggernaut, and Montreal's Tariq. Judges were Larry LeBlanc, Kim Clarke Champniss, and HMV's Stewart Duncan and Grant Kein. Here's hoping next year's finalists represent more of a cross-Canada interest.

The four-band bill at The Palladium (June 10) was one of the better to come around in a while. While openers Cell were pretty much forgettable judging from the comments I heard from fans around me, SubPop's Eric's Trip quickly followed, erasing any memories with its thrash/pop material. The members had just suffered from a recent car accident, and the poor sound at the venue certainly didn't lift their spirits. hHead was the most anticipated band of the night, as the show was one of the groups' first since recording the new album, entitled *Jerk*, set for release in September, in Los Angeles. They made a good case for a label signing by playing their raunchy hard rock/grunge/pop material with unbridled enthusiasm, with a frothy mosh pit developing at the front of the stage. Industry types from A&M and Warner, among other labels, were in attendance, and hHead did not disappoint its loyal fanbase. Noah Mintz is beginning to sound more and more like Eddie Vedder each day, and this is offset by the growling chunks of Brendan's bass guitar playing and his wild stage presence. Closing out the show were the Doughboys, playing what must be its umpteenth gig of the past year. A raging set to a jam-packed house, reaffirming the Doughboys place atop the Canadian punk-pop roost.

Change Of Heart's new album, *TummySuckle*, is set to go the first of July. Having heard an advanced cassette, I can assure you that COH deserve a prominent place somewhere in this industry. After returning from gigs opening for COH fans The Tragically Hip, and with a prominent place at the Canada Day Hip date, what more do you need? As well, another band managed by Amy Hersenhoren, the awesome King Cobb Steelie, have seen the departure of its keyboardist/sampler, to be replaced by none other than Don Pyle of Shadowy Men On A Shadowy Planet. They have been entertaining

some very enticing (as well as some very poor) offers from the major labels here in Canada. I'll keep you posted.

It wasn't exactly a brand new toaster, but it's the thought that counts. As part of the promotional material for a release by (London's ?) Free Spirit, I received a toaster as well as a Clinton's showcase parking ticket for the band's release, Yup. The disc shows some very promising work, as the group draws its allegiances more from American indie guitar bands than anything else: jangling guitars, semi-rough production and great choruses. Four White Pearls, Feelin' Brave, the Layla-like *Revenge* and the incredible song *Soccer Fields* all caught my attention. Free Spirit (the song) is also a worthy indicator of what this good new band can do. Hard as I tried, tough, I couldn't get that toaster to pop.

At a listening post at HMV, I happened on impulse to listen to a CD by a great group called Blue Bottle Bus. This group, like Free Spirit, is the kind of band I like, replete with strong songs, inventive, professional guitar work, and Sloan-like vocals. The six-song sampler is strong on all tracks. Another band worth noting is NOW cover-stars Bass Is Base, who may perhaps be Canada's first truly great funk/soul group. With new rapper Mystic MC part of the fold, things have reached an entirely new level, though don't expect them to be entertaining any offers from labels. They stick to the bottom end, if you know what I mean.

Thanks to the nice folk at the door of The Rivoli, I was able to partake in the

unforgiving sonic assault that is San Diego's Drive Like Jehu, whose Interscope album *Yank Crime* is distributed here by Warner. Again, while not for everyone's tastes, the caffeine rush that the four members thrashed out was imbued with tight changes and odd time signatures. For all of those who wrote off punk rock, this is the point it has developed to, and it shows no sign of slowing down. Opening were city-mates Tanner, who were somewhat forgettable. And, those two singers from those two Amy-bands were in attendance, checking out what was an educating and riveting performance.

Dale Peters is God! And you know why? Because he allowed me to see Maceo Parker, former sax player for James Brown and George Clinton, bring the roof down at the Phoenix club (June 7). This was, and I'm not exaggerating, the best show I've seen in years. Full of the tightest soul grooves imaginable, Parker has taken his entertaining cues from the hardest working man himself, and has learned how to work an audience into a spontaneous frenzy. His crack six-piece backing unit could not be any better. The pacing of the two-hours-plus show was unbelievable: a mix of fast, free-funk jams, and slow soulful ballads played carefully off one another, forming the perfect music mix. I pity those who weren't there. So perhaps I do exaggerate: Maceo Parker Is God (and Peters merely his underling).



ARRESTED DEVELOPMENT -Hip-Hop

One has to admire Arrested Development's musical courage in the face of the once-dominant but now-fading gangsta rap genre. With its smooth, socially-positive lyrics and vibes, the wise hip-hoppers in AD carefully and purposefully discard the negative and focus on the positive. In the end, these grooves put such a wide grin on your face that it's hard to believe AD gets little respect in the hardcore community. Zingalamaduni (Swahili for 'beehive of culture') is chapter two in AD's history, one that traces its roots back to Clinton and Sly, as well as the best of pop music. The first single, Ease My Mind, is already at radio and is a natural to stay there a good part of the summer. Following this are many possibilities: United Minds, the chant-like ode to the red, black and green, United Front, Pride, with its beautiful introduction, the video and radio-primed Shell, and In The Sunshine, which features a great ad-lib by Speech in the choruses and introduction. Will the hip-hop and pop environments be receptive to AD this time around? Four million Arrested Development fans can't be wrong. -CT



STONE TEMPLE PILOTS -Rock

The sound of grunge might best be described as the sound of fuzzy, overwashed guitars driving an endless stream of minor chords down your throat. If that's what turns your crank, then look no further than this band and this album, which should reaffirm the Pilots place in the upper echelons of the grunge world, an exalted position previously held by Nirvana and Pearl Jam. The Pilots had a dynamic debut with the group's first release, Core, which stayed on the charts for months and sold close to four million copies worldwide. This may go a step further and make the group one of the biggest rock acts around. Recorded in Atlanta with Brendan O'Brien enlisted as producer, this album is a continuation of the heavily-laden sound that made Core such a hit. Highlight tracks include Vaseline, Interstate Love Song, Pretty Penny and Lounge Fly. It says here that when a dozen copy-cat alternative acts have been long forgotten, this band will still be selling. -RR



Primed for Tiger Beat, Dunnery is much more than just a fashion plate. The former guitarist for Robert Plant, Dunnery is picking up some early airplay for American Life In The Summertime, a great single that introduces us to Dunnery's world: 'I don't wanna be like them! I just wanna be me! A record company clone? Not me!' Think Beck's Loser in terms of anthemic potential. With a line such as this, though, Dunnery does draw favourable comparisons to a couple of singers with his surprisingly bluesy voice. Homegrown and Fade Away are more strong airplay possibilities. Feel Like Kissing You Again is a classic soul/pop ballad, and King Of The Blues is worthy, as is Everyone's A Star. Take note of the last track, Good Life, with its simple strings and acoustic guitar backing Dunnery. For once, this is an album with very little filler, and could make a splash at retail, radio, and perhaps most importantly, video. -CT


GRAPHIDI LOGIK -Rap

This trio of Toronto-based rappers are poised to be the next great hip-hop hope for Canada. Graphidi Logik come replete with three strong,

While Jugganot, Frisko, and Kool Aid draw comparisons to a number of rappers (ie, the Hieroglyphics), they can hold their own in any circumstance. The first track to check is the energized Can I Get A Yo!, with a Naughty By Nature flavour to it. The first and third rappers are the strongest on this track. The title track is good, as is Dear Dad, a sentimental ode to absent fathers. That's Just Me utilizes Dr. Dre-type keyboard stylings, and Good Kid is a good ode to growing up. A strong full-length album that hopefully will make these kids the next Maestro. But can they stack up

CHRIS DEBURGH -Pop

Every artist has a formula, and even if they think they don't, they're probably just kidding themselves. Thus, it's a rare event when an artist breaks out of the mold he's been sealed in and ventures into new territory. Chris DeBurgh has been cast in the role of pop balladeer for years, a title he put a rock solid claim on back in the eighties with his monster hit Lady In Red. With this latest release, deBurgh has made a concerted effort to stray from this style. First, he gave the heave-ho to his old band, picking up four new players from the south of London. Second, he grabbed a new producer, Pete Smith, who was also determined to put a harder tack on what had been an increasingly softer sound from deBurgh. And finally, for the first time in his career, deBurgh went to outside help piecing together some of the songs. DeBurgh enlisted the help of Albert Hammond on two of the tracks (The Snows Of New York and Love's Got A Hold On Me), and Steve Duberry on another couple (Here Is Your Paradise and Oh My Brave Pickings). The result is an album that should please fans of the older deBurgh sound, and might dismay those who've grown accustomed to the likes of Lady In Red and Sailing Away. Highlights include the lead single, This Weight On Me, Blonde Hair, Blue Jeans and This Silent World. -RR



UNIVERSAL HONEY -Pop

Universal Honey is a tight, four-piece unit from the Toronto area that has been playing steady live gigs for quite some time now. This is its first full-length, independent release, recorded at Soundfield Studios and Winfield Sound Underground by Aubrey Winfield and the band in October '92 and December '93. This alternative-leaning release has good cross-over potential for a number of formats. Just Before Mary Goes is the perfect radio introduction to Universal Honey. The unique sound of Leslie Stanwyck's voice is polished and confident, with a hook in the chorus to kill for. The first song, Find Yourself, is driven by a guitar riff that is at once fresh and familiar. Other strong numbers include Dirt Road, with a delicious guitar sequence, and Upfront With You, a natural for modern rock and college radio. Angel's Slow Burn's title is very appropriate, as the song moves in a paced, melodic way as Stanwyck's voice weaves tastefully in and out of the song. This record is a good introduction for major label interest, as Universal Honey play some of the sharper Canadian pop to come along in quite some time. We're anticipating some even stronger material in the near future. -CT

Gautier finds calling the shots all he needs

Since his first singing gig at 17 years old on September 5, 1971, Montreal-based country singer Bourbon Gautier has progressed to the point where his distant dreams have become a reality.

Gautier is currently on a promotional tour of Canada supporting his new release, *Camelback Road*. The album gave Gautier the opportunity to record with a handful of his 'dream' session players at Battery and Sanctuary Studios in Nashville.

"The record company just kind of gave me a blank cheque and said do it the way you think a record should be done," Gautier relays. "I had to explain who these guys were."

These distinguished players included bassist Willy Weeks (Vince Gill, Wynonna), drummer Eddie Bayers (George Strait), Chris Leuzinger on guitar (Garth Brooks), Sonny Garrish on steel guitar (John Anderson, Randy Travis), pianist Dennis Burnside (Ronnie Milsap), and George Jones' fiddler Hank Singer. To top off this impressive list, Bob Bullock was the co-producer.

The title of the first single was a natural spinoff from these sessions. It was Gautier who was 'calling the shots', rather than a producer or Nashville songwriter.

"It's total trust from Double Discs. They have the right attitude. I had a lot of control in the session. Of course, this album is going to have to do something because it's costing a lot of money."

Heading into the country hotbed that is Nashville, Gautier was aware that he was up against tremendous odds. The industry professionals in Tennessee have seen all types of small and big-time acts come and go, but Gautier was not going to leave a faint impression, as shown on *Camelback Road*.

"It's real important when you go to Nashville to have your own thing. They make so many albums that you could end up with something that sounds like most of the other stuff. I don't know how much my album differs from all that stuff, but I tried."

One thing Gautier took away from the sessions was the honest-to-goodness niceness of the people there.

"A lot of people were telling me, you must've been scared because you don't know how they're going to react. But I had been to Nashville before, in 1986, to record a demo. There's something about Nashville, it seems, that to live there, you have to be nice."

"If you have your own sound, you can stand out in Nashville. I had my own songs and did the arrangements. I knew I wanted brushes on one song, dobro on another. Before you go there, you need an idea of how things sound. But you also have to give the players some leeway."

With the thoughts of Nashville still fresh in his mind, Gautier had some not-so-pleasant things to say about the Canadian country scene in relation to the music machine that is Nashville.

"It's not the same up here," he says in reference to the country music scene in Canada. "I went to Halifax recently, and people are different there than they are in Montreal, as

well as Toronto or Vancouver. Nashville has its own thing. They'll never say it sounds bad. Here, you'll hear this."

Not only this, but Gautier feels the influence of American artists at retail and radio is something that is harmful to Canadian artists.

"It's the old thing that anything coming from the US is better than Canadian stuff. The other thing is that when I go into record stores, Canadian records seem to be priced higher. That's because the American records sell more, so you can price them less."

"If you walk into a radio station, you'll see all the posters from all the Americans. I think everybody has to do a little more to help the Canadian thing."

"We're big enough of a country, we have enough talent here, and we're mature enough to say our stuff is good. We should be able to have our own sound, our own style, and love it before we love the American style. Right now, some of the country we're doing sounds a lot like American country. It's not like Gordon Lightfoot or something. He had his own sound. Ultimately, that's where it should go."

One aspect of the country industry Gautier is excited about is its move into international waters, especially in Europe, where country music is steamrolling ahead.

"Maybe Europe would be interested if there was something authentically Canadian rather than something that sounds like the rest. But this is all just words. It's something to hope for."

As part of Gautier's own version of the 'Canadian thing', his concerts are often performed in the two official languages of Canada. This happened when he opened for Billy Ray Cyrus in Montreal. Half of the audience was from the Ottawa-Cornwall corridor and from south of the border. But his

choice of language is a strictly apolitical decision.

"It depends where I'm performing. When I sing, I'm not doing a political statement. It depends on who is listening."

"I'm a singer. When I and sing Merle Haggard's *Big City*, I'm not singing in English or French, I'm singing *Big City*. Playing live takes a lot of work, but it's my thing to be on stage. You can reinvent yourself every night."
