Buffy Sainte-Marie to join Juno Hall Of Fame

Songwriter, recording artist and political activist Buffy Sainte-Marie will join a select group of Canadians when she's inducted into the Juno Hall Of Fame at the 1995 awards ceremonies in March at Hamilton's Copps Coliseum.

According to CARAS president Lee Silversides, "Few Canadian artists have had the long-standing international success of Buffy Sainte-Marie. From her first album in 1964,



Faire and MacNeil romp home with CBC winner

Rita MacNeil's new CBC-TV series, *Rita & Friends*, scored big time with viewers with its first segment, which premiered Oct. 28.

Preliminary figures indicated that 1.735 million viewers watched the show, which guested Roch Voisine, Jann Arden, Real World and Punjabi By Nature.

Producer Sandra Faire had expected good numbers, in view of MacNeil's popularity as a family entertainer, and was obviously quite pleased with the result. "Canadians love Rita MacNeil, and as proven by these figures, they're anxious to see Canadian talent. We have some wonderful talent in this country and Rita will be giving them an opportunity to be seen by a national audience through her series."

Faire expects the series will settle in at about 900,000 viewers each week.

The second in the series (Nov. 4) guests Michelle Wright, The Jeff Healey Band, Lennie Gallant and Theresa Malenfant.

Born a mixed-blood Cree on a reservation near Regina, Sainte-Marie was soon adopted and raised in Maine, with little knowledge or awareness of her heritage. She graduated from the University of Massachusetts and headed to New York to become a folk singer, eventually signing a record deal with Vanguard Records, alongside Ian & Sylvia and Joan Baez.

While artists like Donovan and Bobby Darin had hits with Sainte-Marie's songs like *Universal Soldier* and *Until It's Time For You To Go*, her own growing awareness of her culture eventually led to more politically-powerful songs such as *The Buffalo's Gone*, *Bury My Heart At Wounded Knee* and *My*

Martin compiles Beatles treasure trove from '60s

An exceptional package of Beatles recorded material from the early '60s entitled *Live At The BBC* has been scheduled for a worldwide release by EMI on Dec. 6.

Containing 56 tracks, the album was compiled by George Martin, who produced all The Beatles studio recordings for EMI, with the cooperation and agreement of Apple and the BBC. The album will be released in double CD, double cassette and double vinyl configurations. The songs were originally recorded for broadcast by the BBC.

Of the 56 tracks, 30 were never recorded in a studio for EMI, and the vast majority consists of rock n' roll classics from the band's pre-1963 stage appearances in Liverpool and Hamburg.

Also included is a rare Lennon/McCartney song, *I'll Be On My Way*, originally given to Billy J. Kramer. The song was featured on the B side of his debut single *Do You Want To Know A Secret*.

The music was digitally remastered using the Sonic Solutions facilities and has a running time of more than 130 minutes.

The album also includes dialogue between The Beatles and BBC disc jockeys Brian Matthew and Alan Freeman, among others.

An accompanying booklet contains extensive information about the recordings, a

In recent years, Sainte-Marie was instrumental in promoting the recognition of aboriginal songwriters and artists, through the creation of the best music of aboriginal Canada award for the Junos. It was she who appeared on the 1993 Junos to announce the creation of the award, which was presented for the first time last year.

The Juno Hall Of Fame Award is to honour those who have made contributions towards the greater international recognition of Canadian artists and music. Some of those honoured in the past include, Joni Mitchell, Neil Young, Gordon Lightfoot, Anne Murray, and last year's recipients, Rush.

EMI Records Group North America chairman Charles Koppelman will once again serve as executive producer on the project, along with Don Rubin and Eliot Wiseman, with Phil Ramone and Hank Cattaneo serving as producers. The 54-piece *Duets II* orchestra was conducted by Patrick Williams.



One smart fella . . . ! A bunch of us media weasels were on hand for another bang-up, kiss-the-cod-and-down-the-screech, party-till-ya-drop celebration in St. John's last week. The occasion was the official knot-tying of EMI Music Canada and Duckworth Distribution. And, what a party it was. The same thing happened the following night in Halifax, but I had to bow out of that one. Snook, a very funny stand-up Newfie-lander comic, opened the show and introduced Duckworth's Fred Brokenshire, who in turn, introduced EMI Canada president Deane Cameron with "He's gotta be one smart fella . . . going into business with me!" With the Plankerdown Band supplying the music, a group of dancers, not one over 80 pounds, jigged, quadrilled and sashed to and fro for more than 20 minutes. Now you know why none of the dancers weighed more than 80 pounds. And it also answers the question of what do you do if you can't fish in Newfoundland? You run the goat! (EC: *What about us sheep . . . ?*)

There really are leprechauns . . . !

Will Millar, the quintessential purveyor of all things Irish, is on the road to realizing one of his original goals. He's not leaving the Irish Rovers, but he has found time to do a little bit of roving on his own. Not too many people realize that the Irish Rovers were the first to rock North America with a children's song, Shel Silverstein's Unicorn, which peaked at #2 on the RPM chart dated March 30, 1968. Anyway, I had the opportunity to sit down with Will, whom I haven't seen in more than 20 years, at, of all places, The Unicorn, the chain of pubs he and the other Rovers still own, along with the Rose & Crown. Will is pushing his new children's album, The Keeper, which includes The Unicorn. He is also promoting The Lark In The Clear Aire, an album of beautiful Celtic melodies . . . "a mellow draught of music," says Will. We'll be doing up a fine profile on Will over the next couple of weeks. (EC: *Foine you say . . . ?*)

It's superman . . . ! Do you believe it has been five years since HMV landed in Canada? And, under the guidance of Paul Alofs (EC: *Clark Kent look-a-like!!!*) an empire was born (EC: *An industry woke up!!!*). Things changed (EC: *Got Better!!!*). A new approach to marketing (EC: *Nice, clean, well-organized stores!!!*). Knowledgeable staff (EC: *He's been here for five years!!!*). He's done a good job (EC: *Everybody likes him!!!*). They respect him. Congratulations Paul! (EC: *Yah . . . !*)

A terrific learning experience!

Today's Country, sponsored by Craven "A" and syndicated to 70 country stations across Canada, has to be the slickest, smoothest, most ear-pleasing production on the radio waves. The Oct. 16th show was particularly entertaining, with performances by Farmer's Daughter, a warm and fascinating trio from Vancouver, and Toby Keith. He's an Oklahoma cowboy who has his first #1 single in Canada. On the educational side, it was fascinating to be front and centre to an easy-going forum on songwriting with four of perhaps the world's most successful country songwriters: Pat Alger, Jil Colucci, John Vezner and Kostas. Each had their own intriguing experiences to relate and each took turns singing a couple of their songs that became hits over the years. This is the type of learning experience that our whole industry should be patched into, but because of time restrictions, the session was far too short. The foursome did a much longer session the next night at UltraSound. The reaction from some of the industry people in

attendance indicated that more of these close encounters with successful songwriters, perhaps even a few from our own country, would be a very productive assist to the industry generally. The hosts of Today's Country, Greg Shannon and Sharon Edwards, add that very personal touch in intro'ing and extro'ing guests and keeping the show on a highly entertaining plane. The production staff includes John Howard as director and producer Jan Cody. The music director is Mike Francis. (EC: *Every day is a learning experience!*)

There's that Cancon thing again!

Two reports in this week from two different publicists, each pointing out that the record they are pushing is 100% Cancon. First they tell us how great the session was in Nashville, with all the wonderful Nashville pickers and producers, and how the mixing and mastering was done in Canada and the voices added. And they've even applied a 100% Cancon logo. Where do these people come from? If the use of the MAPL logo is out and out deceptive, its use should be denied to those people who are trying to trick the programmers into believing their record is 100% Cancon. (EC: *It's about time . . . !*)

Speaking of country . . . !

Does country music sell? Well, of course it does, if it's available. That seems to be one big problem in this country. It's surprising and a sad commentary on the state of retail, to see how many retailers take a pass on country product. Remember many years ago when Sam Sniderman boasted that he could make a good living on stocking only Canadian product? I wonder how well a mainstreet store would do if it only stocked country records? Just in case you were wondering, there are 15 country albums on the RPM 100 Albums chart, and the number of gold and platinum country albums is pretty surprising, considering the attitude at retail. Country sales could be awesome, with a little help from retailers. (EC: *Right on!*)

This just in . . . !



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FEATURE INTERVIEW - by Ron Rogers

Patricia Conroy offers new material You Can't Resist

Canadian country music is trying to find its own place in the crowded country scene. With Nashville artists occupying so much space both at radio and in the front racks at retail, finding a small niche for a new Canadian talent is indeed a difficult task. Patricia Conroy first began carving her own niche back in 1990 with her debut album, *Blue Angel*. She followed that with her 1992 release *Bad Day For Trains*, an album that put her name on the short list of truly talented and promising female country artists in Canada.

Conroy has come full circle in 1994. Coming on the heels of her stunning win in the female vocalist category at the recent CCMA Awards in Calgary, Conroy has released her third full album on Warner Music, *You Can't Resist*.

Recorded at the famed Morin Heights Studio in the outskirts of Montreal (her hometown), the album features the production work of top-of-the-line talents Mick Wanchic (John Mellencamp, Sue Medley) and engineer Justin Niebank (Eric Clapton, Wynonna).

Through Wanchic and Niebank, Conroy was also able to entice some of the top studio players in the country and pop fields, including drummer Kenny Aronoff, and guitarists David Grissom and Brent Rowan.

According to Conroy, although the production work at Morin Heights was something of a peaceful existence, the pre-production for the album was anything but.

"I went down to Nashville and spent about six months looking for songs. We actually spent about a year and a half getting this album together.

I got to know some writers and figure out what was going on, and I could tell by the songs being pitched to me what was happening on the charts, and it just wasn't for me.

"But when I started hearing stuff like *You Can't Resist It* and *Diamonds*, then I realized those were the kind of songs I wanted to do."

Conroy stressed the fact that her mission on this album was to create her own sound, and she did everything in her power to avoid copying the assembly-line Nashville sound. She says a lot of that has to do with the widening definition of country and rock and roll.


"I think I know what country is these days, but I don't know what rock and roll is anymore. I think this is cutting-edge country. And I think this is exactly where it is headed, if it's going to last with the younger generation.

"I definitely went for my own sound, my own niche this time. I don't know how everyone's going to relate to it. The last thing I wanted to do is sound like anyone else. It's just so hard, especially in the states, to get in there. If you sound like everyone else, you get

lost."

While Conroy is naturally exuberant about the release of her new album, she is also still glowing over her recent triumph at the CCMA's. She says that winning the female vocalist award was simply the capper on a great weekend.

"I was feeling really good that weekend. I had the album, and no one had heard it yet but



I knew how good it was. We did a great showcase on Saturday night with Kenny Aronoff on drums, and that was something the whole band will never forget. Our guitar player, Bob Funk, won guitar player of the year. So I thought that was it, it's been a good weekend, we'll see ya later. I think shock was probably written all over my face when I won."

To say that Conroy had finally arrived at that moment might be putting things in too cliché a fashion, but to her, it certainly seemed that way.

"It definitely seemed like everything came to a head. Who knows what goes on out there. You're so focused on what you're doing when you're making an album. Finally when it was done I thought, wow, people are still thinking about me."

While Conroy is quickly becoming a fixture on country radio in Canada, alongside Michelle Wright, Lisa Brokop and others, she is still trying hard to crack the all-important American charts. So she naturally has a positive opinion about what some have deemed as the Nashville-oriented US country radio, although

she agrees that it does need the occasional spark.

"I'm trying to get on American radio, I'd love to be a part of the whole thing. I definitely think that it needs a little kick in the pants every once in a while, but then again so does everything. It needs acts like *The Tractors* and *The Mavericks* to come in and stir it up a bit. And that's no insult to what's out there now, I mean I have a great love for country music, and I'll always have that."

While the new album contains only three Conroy originals, as compared to five on the last record, she continues to develop as a songwriter. Tracks such as *I Don't Wanna Be The One*, *Crazy Fool* and *Keep Me Rockin'* (co-written with Jennifer Kimball) are symbolic of a maturing artist still trying to find her sound. After all, it must be hard to find your country roots when you grew up in Montreal.

"My mom was a huge country fan, and she played guitar and sang Patsy Cline, and she got me into it. I spent my summers on a farm in New Brunswick with all my cousins, driving up and down the road, in the pick-up, listening to stuff like J.C. Riley. So I got a good dose of country music. Some of it I didn't like, some I did, and it just never left me."

After shuffling through hundreds of songs to find the right mix on this new album, Conroy is confident that this is the best album she could have done. And she's happy to be part of the growing image makeover of country music in general.

"I don't know what the future holds for me, but I love the country music family I've become a part of in the past 10 years.

"I'd like to see things get bigger and better for country music here. I think there are still too many people who think haybails and blacked-out teeth, and that's just not the case. If I'm a Canadian country singer from Montreal, then I'm going to reflect my lifestyle in my music."

With three videos in the works, and plenty touring planned well into next year, Patricia Conroy may prove to be an artist that American programmers simply can't resist.

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JIMMY PAGE & ROBERT PLANT -Rock

The unplugged album to end all unplugged albums? Well, maybe not. Although this long-awaited effort was stated to be the final episode in this overworked medium, we do hear rumour of more such projects coming in the future. Ah, but will they be able to top this one? We all knew that the former Zeppelin members would reunite one of these days, the question was, what form would it take, and, would they play Stairway To Heaven? Plant and Page have taken some classic Zeppelin material, thrown in some new stuff, and even mixed in some traditional eastern music. The result is one of the best of all the unplugged albums, one that should please both old fans and those who don't really know their material (are there such people?). The backing band is mainly comprised of Robert Plant's touring crew, but there's a slew of eastern and Egyptian musicians lending their talents as well, on such unique instruments as a dobolla, duf, bendir and nay (egyptian bamboo flute). Some of the newer tracks don't translate quite well, but the older material shines through, demonstrating once again that Plant and Page are two of the more influential songwriters of the rock genre. The lead track, Gallows Pole, has already made headway at radio. But more should be on the way. Standout tracks include Thank You, Since I've Been Loving You, The Battle Of Evermore and a particularly amazing Kashmir, done in the eastern style reflective of its name. To answer that other question, no, there's no Stairway To Heaven here. Like we need another version. -RR



THE BLACK CROWES -Rock

Tremendous press for a debut album can often be the kiss of death for a band. As soon as you've been tagged with "the next..." label, people will expect the world from you, which makes it that much harder to deliver the second time around. The Crowes shot out of a cannon with their first release, Shake Your Money Maker, which spawned some stunningly simply rock and roll songs (Jealous Again, She Talks To Angels, Hard To Handle), and had everyone and their dog comparing the band to The Rolling Stones. The group toured incessantly, even popping up on the much-coveted Saturday Night Live spot. But the exhaustive promo for that album must have drained the band, and it showed on the followup, which didn't have nearly the drive or the passion that the first contained. After taking a brief leave of absence from both stage and studio to re-vamp their batteries, the Robinson brothers and company are back with an album almost

equal in energy and ambition to the first. Produced by the Crowes and Jack Joseph Puig, America is modern rock and roll without all the lame, half-hearted prophesizing so endemic in most alternative acts. Songs like Gone, A Conspiracy and Cursed Diamond are as good as anything the band has done before. With some monstrous touring likely to follow in the new year, this album should get the Crowes back on top of the AOR department. -RR



AEROSMITH -Rock

You know you're good when you can put out more than one greatest hits albums and still not get everything in there that your fans want. This greatest hits package basically covers all of the top tracks from their recent four-album tenure with Geffen Records. There will always be the naysayers who say, hey, that song sounds exactly the same as the last three or four. But does it really matter, when you've sold 53 million albums worldwide to date (that's 53 million!). Want more proof of the popularity? The band's latest album, Get A Grip, continues to rest comfortably on the RPM 100 Albums chart, after an incredible 78 weeks. Aerosmith is kind of like the Pink Floyd of the pop/metal set - there may be big bands, but there's none bigger than them. Included on the package are a slew of hits: Dude Looks Like A Lady, Rag Doll, Angel, Love In An Elevator, Janie's Got A Gun, Cryin', Livin' On The Edge, Crazy and Amazing. Also thrown in are three other tracks: Deuces Are Wild (from The Beavis & Butt-Head Experience), and two new songs, Blind Man and Walk On Water. This is rock and roll you can sink your teeth into. -RR

JANI LAUZON -Folk 'N Blues


A blues and folk singer, Lauzon has a distinctively natural vocal energy that commands immediate attention. There is a softness, yet an urgency in her projection that creates an aura of importance to her message, whether as a solo writer with Broken Spirit or writing with David Thrasher on White Ceiling Blues, and Don't Tell Me. Also key is Diamond In The Rough, which she wrote with Mick Walsh, and Endless Night, a co-write with John Brlde. The vocal purity here is testament to her many years of voice, movement and theatre training. The connection is complete. Lauzon is a beautiful example of the talent that lies within the aboriginal peoples, displaying it here with a very unique picture of her cultural background through her original penning of Wabakii Bezbig and Wabakii Nizh. Don't overlook Don Bryant's penning of 99 Lbs, and Be My Magician which was written by Bettina Maylone. Great instrumental backing here as well. Check out the credits. Produced by Ken Whiteley and Lauzon. Recorded at Casa Wroxtton and Pyramid Sound in Toronto. -WG

JONI MITCHELL -Folk/Pop

It's been a long time coming, but Joni Mitchell finally decided to emerge from her shell and record another album, moving back to Reprise after a short stretch with Geffen. Mitchell hasn't released an album since 1991's Night Ride Home, and it looks as though in the meantime she's been working on her painting skills, as the cover art on this impressive package is full of Mitchell originals. It's not often that you can say a



package can help sell an album, but in this case that's entirely possible. But of course, when you're speaking of Joni Mitchell, the music's the thing. Mitchell has always had an intuitive grasp of the songwriting art, and its demonstrated in full on this album. What's impressive about Mitchell's songwriting talent is that it has been able to move from the soul-searching melancholy of the '60s, through the self-indulgent purgatory of the '70s, to the modern social sensibilities of today. One of the most powerful songs on the record is a track entitled Sex Kills, a strong commentary to the L.A. riots. Mitchell has emerged in the '90s with a potent vision of the world and its social strata - good to know some things never change. -RR



ROBERTA FLACK -Pop
Roberta

It seems to have become a cottage industry these days to reach back into the vaults to re-do some classic popular songs. With rock dinosaurs coming out of hibernation and making millions in the process, it's not surprise that some more mainstream popular artists are attempting the same thing. Roberta Flack has been a household name since the early '70s with hits like Killing Me Softly, The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face and The Closer I Get To You. It says something about the importance of this artist when Ahmet Ertegun himself, the founder and chairman of Atlantic Records, is executive producer of the project. In the instrumental vein, some of those contributing their talents include pianists Kenny Barron and Bernard Wright, trumpeter Randy Brecker, Hiram Bullock on guitar, and Steve Jordan on drums. Flack uses her brilliant velvet voice on some classic songs, ranging from Duke Ellington's In A Sentimental Mood to B.B. King's The Thrill Is Gone. To say that this is a professional record is an understatement. A great album to put on when you want to know what class in music is all about. -RR




RITA CHIARELLI -Rock 'N Blues
Just Gettin' Started
Stony Plain-1197-P
One of the true veterans in the business, Chiarelli's roots are front and centre with this package

which she co-produced with John Switzer. There's enough hot rock 'n blues here to more than satisfy her growing fan base. Actually, Chiarelli shows her rock side here with an intensity that might surprise those who have followed her career. Satisfied has been taken as the first single (Warner comp 221), a good choice, revealing Chiarelli's subtle side of the blues. The high-energy vocal projection aside, Chiarelli has a meaningful way with lyrics, all of which she wrote here along with the music, with the exception of Elvis Presley's Love Me. Perhaps the best examples are Tupelo, a beautiful acoustic tribute to Presley, and Blue Rain. Chiarelli is in exceptional vocal form on Hurtin' Chain, a powerhouse rocker with a soothing, soulful vocal support from Jackie Richardson, no stranger to the blues field. Besides her exacting vocal delivery on Love Me, four members of Prairie Oyster make this a memorable track. The Oyster connection is also obvious on Heartbreak Of The Week, which could gain attention at country, particularly those who experimenting with new country. -WG



JESSE WINCHESTER -Country/Pop
Third Down, 110 To Go
Stony Plain Classic-1199-P

This is Winchester's repackaged album from 1972, but it is important in view of his continuing popularity in pop and country music. Now living in the Eastern Townships of Quebec, Winchester now concerns himself only with writing. This release is the first of his Bearsville catalogue to be made available on CD. With Amos Garrett on guitar, Winchester framed his music with a gentleness that created the right niche for him at that time. Three tracks were produced by Todd Rundgren: Silly Heart, Glory To The Day, and Midnight Bus. The other tracks were produced by Winchester. Key here is Full Moon, Do It and Isn't That So. But don't overlook the barnburning rockabilly entry of God's Own Jukebox, timed at a too brief 1:41. New liner notes by Colin McCoy, bring this Winchester package into the '90s. -WG



VARIOUS ARTISTS -Country

A package of powerhouse country that puts all the big names together. Targeted at the television audience and available at retail this is the type of release that can only serve to bring more attention to this music form that desperately needs a boost at retail. Selections are excellent with a nice mix of Canon. Includes Cassandra Vasik's Fortune Smiled On Me, Cryer's Paradise by Ron Hynes, One Horse Blue's Baby Don't Cry, Joan Kennedy's Circle Of Love, and Jason McCoy's current charter, Take It From Me. Many of the big winners from south of the border are also here, including Suzy Bogguss (Just Like The Weather), Billy Dean (We Just Disagree), Tracy Byrd (Someone To Give My Love To), Tanya Tucker (Soon), and Mark Chesnut (Woman Sensuous Woman). -WG

No, No, Power Rangers says Standards Council

In a decision dated Nov. 1, 1994, the Ontario Regional Council of the Canadian Broadcast Standards Council (CBSC) has unanimously decided that the children's television program *Mighty Morphin Power Rangers* is too violent.

The decision relates to two complaints directed to the Canadian Radio and Television Commission by concerned parents, who felt that the program was too violent for younger viewers.

Mighty Morphin Power Rangers, which airs on Global Television on weekday mornings at 7:30 am, depicts a group of five to six high school students who are secretly the *Power Rangers*. At some point during the show, the group appears as the *Power Rangers*, dressed in super-hero style costumes, and uses martial arts fighting techniques to battle the "evil

forces" of such characters as Rita Repulsa or Zed.

The main point of contention for parents has been the martial arts fighting, which constitutes perhaps 25-35% of the running time of each episode. One parent who wrote the CRTC noted, "I find after my children watched this show, they both started kicking each other and trying to act out like *Power Rangers*. This show has been banned from my sons' school."

Another parent commented, "After watching this show for about two weeks, our seven year old son's teacher called to complain of his aggressive behaviour. We decided to stop letting him watch *Power Rangers* and his teacher phoned to say that there was a big improvement in his behaviour."

When advised of the complaints by the CBSC, Global Television's Director of Public Relations and Media Relations responded with a letter to the CBSC, noting, "*Mighty Morphin*

The Regional Council reviewed all correspondence and screened five episodes of the series broadcast on Global during the week of April 25 (corresponding to the first complaint), and then reviewed all correspondence and screened five episodes of the program broadcast during the week of May 2 (relating to the second complaint).

In its decision, the Council concluded that all ten episodes breached Article 2.1 of the recently-enacted Voluntary Code regarding Violence in Television Programming, which indicates that "very little violence, either physical, verbal or emotional shall be portrayed in children's programming."

The Council also felt that the episodes breached articles 2.2 (violence shall only be portrayed when it is essential to character or

plot development), 2.5 (programming shall deal carefully with themes which could invited children to imitate acts they seen on screen), and 2.6 (programs should not contain scenes of violence creating the impression that violence is the preferred or only method to resolve conflicts).

The Power Rangers program also breached article 2.7, (programming should not contain scenes of violence which minimize or gloss over the effects of violent acts.)

The final decision by the CBCS is to be announced on Global during prime time within 30 days of the publication of the decision.

As RPM went to press, it was learned that YTV, the youth-oriented channel which also carries the Power Rangers, had decided to drop the program from its broadcast lineup.

kind of stole our own name and used it."

Although the name is the same, Durst is adamant that the motives behind the new album aren't what one might think. In this time period when seemingly every old '70s band has regrouped to tour or record, one would think that Thundermug was simply hopping on the bandwagon.

"The only problem with using that name is that I have to explain that it's not a revival or reunion or anything. The bottom line is that the songs are good, the band's good and the name doesn't really mean anything, it's just a name."

Although Durst is adamant about decrying the revival idea, he will admit that both the old and new Thundermug share similar qualities and philosophies. First and foremost, he and his band mates are interested only in making

good music.

"The first Thundermug album and this one share a similar quality, which is we were just being ourselves. There's no pretention to it whatsoever. I think that's why people like it. When they hear something really genuine they think, yes, this is great."

And as for the '70s revival, Durst, like many other people in the record business, would just like to see it go away.

"I am surprised that it's happening, to be blunt about it. I think every new generation has go to have their music, and I think the baby boomers have over-dominated to an extent. I would have preferred the younger generation to just rebel totally and say 'get this stuff outta here'."

Thundermug will be touring the new album over the next few months, and marketing it to both Canada and the US, and eventually to Europe as well.

Jann Arden makes her first-ever national headlining tour this month, in support of the already gold-plus A&M album *Living Under June*. Dates on the tour include Queen's in Nanaimo (Nov. 7), Harpo's in Victoria (8-9), the Vogue Theatre in Vancouver (11), the aptly-named Arden Theatre in Edmonton (13), Saskatoon's Broadway Theatre (14), Westman Hall in Brandon (15), the Winnipeg Cultural Centre (16), Thunder Bay's C.L.E. Coliseum (18), the Princess Theatre in Sault Ste. Marie (19), Sudbury's Grand Theatre (20), two dates at Montreal's Club Soda (22-23) and the Music Hall in Toronto (24). Bassist Neil Swainson has worked with Paul Horn, Moe Koffman and others, and has recorded and toured with George Shearing since 1986.

COUNTRY

The Loretta Lynn Collection, entitled *Honky Tonk Girl*, has been released by MCA. The 70-song, 3-CD boxed set, covers more than 50 years of Lynn's career. She got a foothold in country music during the time Don Grashey and Chuck Williams were guiding her career. Grashey has written a book on the trials and tribulations of a manager of country artists and touches on his experiences with Lynn and the other artists he managed over the years. The Lynn Collection includes her duets with Conway Twitty and Ernest Tubb. Also includes *I'm A Honky Tonk Girl*, *Coal Miner's Daughter* and *After The Fire*. Jimmy Guterman was the compilation producer.

George Jones is one of the dinosaur acts of country who just might hold on. The release of *The Bradley Barn Sessions* on the MCA label has breathed life into the 63-year old country patriarch, much of it due to the countryified guests on the album. These include Alan Jackson, Dolly Parton, Vince Gill and Trisha Yearwood, and even Tammy Wynette. Keith Richards isn't quite plugged into country, but he does add that important star ingredient to the album which was produced by Canadian Brian Ahern. *A Good Year For The Roses*, with Alan Jackson as special guest, has been taken as "the event single".

Jim Witter's new single, *Chevy Coupe*, is now at radio. This is the fifth and final single from his self-titled debut album. It has been a good year for Witter. He won a Big Country Award as best new artist, a CCMA award for *Stolen Moments*, which won in the category of Canadian country video of the year, and a MuchMusic CMVA award as Canadian country video of the year for *Distant Drum*. This video won a 1993 CMT (Nashville) award as Canadian video of the year.

Today's country has a scheduled exclusive interview with *Prairie Oyster* for the Nov. 12th edition. Also on tap are live performances with Blue Miller and Dave Gibson from the Gibson/Miller Band. The popular Master Songwriters Series continues with Kostas, one of the country's most

successful songwriters. The *Close-Up* feature takes a look at newcomer Steve Kolander, who left the lucrative advertising business in Los Angeles to start a new career in country music. The Nov. 19th edition will have Tim McGraw front and centre for a live performance. Pat Alger, a Nashville songwriting heavyweight, will add his interesting perspective for the Master Songwriters Series. Reba McEntire is in for the exclusive interview feature and Lisa Brokop performs her new single, *Take That*.

Billy Ray Cyrus is back on the charts, which probably doesn't sit too well with his critics within the country music business. His latest Mercury release, the title track from his upcoming album, *Storm In The Heartland*, enters the chart at #82. Cyrus continues to draw sold-out audiences and Canadian dates are expected to be announced over the next month.

Catherine de Korte hosts 820 CHAM's live broadcast from *The Saloon* in Toronto each Thursday. Billed as *Thursday Night Live At The Saloon*, the Hamilton station's audience, estimated to be in excess of 250,000 will be treated to special acoustic performances by visiting country artists, record release parties, contests, giveaways, line dance instruction/contests and whatever other innovative ideas proposed to the station. Royalty Records is lighting a promotion fire under releases from Tineta (Everyone's Laughing), Greg Paul (Hey Emmylou), and Kidd Country (She Ain't Used To Telling Lies). The package obviously impressed a number of country programmers who were attending. The colourful CD booklet supplies photos and brief but informative bio material on all three, as well as an interesting perspective on Royalty's 20 years of producing and releasing

Cancon product. Tracking sheets on the three new releases indicate an impressive pattern of light to heavy rotation.

Frank Newman is featured on Hillcrest compilation #21, which is now at radio. Hell Has Frozen Over, a Newman original, is described as "an emotion-packed reminder that nothing is forever." The track was produced by Wendell Ferguson of Coda The West, and recorded at Hamilton's Grant Avenue Studio with Bob Doidge on the board.
