




MIANS undertakes study of maritime music industry

The rapid and dramatic growth of the east coast music industry has been virtually without precedent in the Canadian music business. Almost every

major label has ventured into the maritimes to develop artists, with some, such as Warner, Mercury/Polydor and EMI, achieving tremendous

successes with bands like The Rankin Family, The Barra MacNeils, Ashley MacIsaac and The Irish Descendants.

In light of this, the Music Industry Association of Nova Scotia has enlisted the Business Development Bank of Canada (formerly the Federal Business Bank of Canada) to undertake an analysis of the music industry in Nova Scotia.

The study will help to determine the size of the industry, how many Nova Scotians are employed in the industry, the revenue being generated by the music, what services are available in Nova Scotia and outside the province, and the growth potential of the industry.

According to MIANS president Charlie Cahill, "I'm convinced that this industry study is the most important initiative MIANS has ever undertaken. I believe it will show that the music

FACTOR suspends access to new talent, indie programs

The board of directors of FACTOR announced at their August 16 meeting that they will suspend accepting applications for funding to the Independent Artists Recording Loan Program. FACTOR reports that the budget for this fiscal year has already been committed, meaning no further applications can be considered.

Since launching the program last June, FACTOR has received more than 800 requests for funding and has approved funding for 188 projects. Any projects still being evaluated and recommended for support will receive funding, however the board will likely pro-rate the funds any project will receive.

FACTOR is also suspending the acceptance of applications for the New Talent Demo Program in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Again, budgets have already been committed and thus, no further applications can be considered. The New Talent Demo program

is the only FACTOR program budgeted regionally. FACTOR will continue to accept applications from other provinces.

FACTOR executive director Heather Sym stated, "With declining revenue, it is getting harder and harder to address the needs of the industry. FACTOR, with the support and partnering of its regional affiliates, with very limited funds has done a tremendous job in creating a national awareness of the programs available to support the industry. The time has come however, where our effectiveness is being undermined due to a lack of funding. Not only are Canadian artists a part of our cultural identity, they are also a good export investment."

The board will resume accepting applications on April 1, 1996.

Blue Rodeo back to the farm for new release

Jim Cuddy describes it as "a brand new evolution for Blue Rodeo confusion." In other words, as is usually the case with this Toronto outfit, expect the unexpected from the group's latest WEA release, *Nowhere To Here*.

Following the critical and commercial success that accompanied their last release, *Five Days In July*, an acoustic-oriented collection of songs, most industry insiders were predicting a return to all-out rock and roll on their next session. But the relentless touring which followed *Five Days* changed the group's outlook towards the songs written towards their newest album.


Instead of straight ahead rock and roll, the collection of songs on *Nowhere To Here*

(actually written in 1993) is as diverse and eclectic as anything the band has previously offered. Infusing many of the improvisational aims of their live outings, *Nowhere To Here* captures that elusive 'live' feel that many bands long to recreate in the studio.

From the lamenting *Save Myself to the* spacey funk of *Girl In Green*, the album is as complex as anything Blue Rodeo has presented before. "The last album was so focussed," says Cuddy, "this one is the antithesis of that."

Recorded at the newly-built state-of-the-art studio at Keelor's farmhouse north of Toronto, co-produced by the band and John Whynot, *Nowhere To Here* will hit retail on August 29.





The study is a joint venture between



Do we need headhunters???







Rankin Family embark on the Endless Season

EMI releases new album from Cape Breton clan

A rapid rise to fame can often create undue expectations for a band. It means escalating pressure from both the fans and, to a lesser extent, the record company. Pressure to produce new material as soon as possible, and to make that new material as fresh and inspiring as possible.

The Rankin Family has risen up the proverbial path to fame as quickly as any Canadian artist in the past decade. That rise first started with their first self-titled independent album in 1989, an album largely comprised of traditional Scottish melodies, which went on to become a platinum seller in Canada.

It was their sophomore effort, *Fare Thee Well Love*, that truly put the band on the map, led by the haunting title track that remains the group's signature song. That record sold 400,000 units in Canada, and was soon followed by 1993's *North Country*, another multi-platinum success.

The band's arrival was cemented at the 1994 Juno Awards, where they coupled four awards, including the coveted Canadian entertainer of the year, which is voted on by the public.

That rapid rise to fame has resulted in an enormously hectic schedule, filled to the brim with touring, recording and the ever endless publicity jaunts. Another such publicity jaunt brought the band to Toronto to talk about their latest effort, *Endless Seasons*. According to the group's elder Rankin, John Morris, the hectic scheduling resulted in a rapid-fire recording.

"The pre-production started last fall, in October I believe. The first recording session we had was in a place called Longview Farms in Massachusetts. We recorded some bed tracks there and did some vocals. In February we went to Nashville, to Sound Emporium studios, and recorded there for a week and a half or so, and in April we went back again to do some more. So we did the whole thing in segments. We also recorded a track in Ireland, but it didn't make it on this album.

Listening to the record, one gets the sense of a band searching for a new direction, a desire to seek a new focus in terms of their sound and the way it's conveyed. John Morris says a lot of that directional change is due mainly to the songs themselves.

"Jimmy (the group's principal writer)

writes a lot of stuff, and the styles are different. The stuff we use of his may have a certain direction, and maybe some stuff we didn't use had another direction. But what we did record this time was a little more guitar oriented, maybe a little more stripped down. There's not as much programming, not as much synthesizers. So it may be a little less embellished, and the writing may have called for that. And it may not have been an intentional thing.

"From the outside, I think it's often easier for a person like yourself to listen to it and think 'hey, that's different'. But from the inside, we don't think about it a lot. Sometimes, you don't even notice that it takes a certain direction. I think it's just another facet of what we do."



The differing styles in the writing comes from a background based in performance. As John Morris points out, when you're performing before a mixed bag of people, you learn to incorporate a diverse array of music in order to please everyone.

"We've always played music. When we were kids, we played for local dances and weddings and those such things. Part of the appeal I think we may have had was that we played a wide range of music. We had a lot of different influences, like country, celtic, fiddle music, we sang harmonies, we played even old rock 'n' roll stuff. It was stuff that would appeal to everyone at these dances. So it's not like we've changed our focus, and we're playing stuff we haven't changed before; we've always dabbled in different types of music, only it's on a recording this time."

The endless quest by artists and producers to achieve that 'live' feel is often a fruitless one, according to some. But Raylene Rankin says that their desire to try and achieve that 'live' feel led to the hiring on of producer John Jennings, best known for his work with Mary Chapin Carpenter.

"When we recorded the previous albums, we were very nitpicky about little things, and we felt sometimes that we over-polished things, and that our live sound suffered for that. This time we wanted to try a different approach, where we would be a little more relaxed towards our performance on the album, and communicate some of the life that comes through in our live performances. I don't know if we succeeded or not, but it was the idea.

"We all had different feelings about how we could go about recording this. But John's approach is very laid back, and he let us do our own thing. He would only interfere or take a strong-handed approach if something definitely didn't sound right. Other than that, he very much wanted it to be our album, so that our interpretations and arrangements would come through."

And as John Morris points out, Jennings also made sure to keep that trademark Rankin sound intact.

"I think more than anything, he just kept and eye and ear out for things that weren't indigenous to what we do. Maybe that was more his direction, as opposed to trying to get us to do things that weren't natural to us. He certainly gave us more breathing room.

"I think there's a justification for that type of recording. When you want to perfect everything, you also sacrifice the musicality sometimes, the inspiration, the expression, the feel..."

It would be easy to pinpoint the rise of the Rankin Family as being the turning point towards the eventual landslide of major label signings in the maritimes (ie. The Barra MacNeils, The Irish Descendants, Rawlins Cross, Ashley MacIsaac). But Raylene feels that the rush to sign east coast artists was merely a continuation of the growing confidence in domestic artists in general.

"I think it had something to do with the confidence in the music, and I say that for Canadian music in general. It seems to me that in the last five to ten years the industry, more so than the public even, feels more secure and confident in Canadian music. And that effect has just spilled over to the east coast. The music has always been there. There have been people who've made it nationally and internationally from Nova Scotia, like Anne Murray, Rita MacNeil, Figgy Duff...It's kind of like a renaissance in the last five years."

It's somewhat ironic that the explosion in popularity of east coast music has come at a time when the area is continuing to suffer through economic doldrums. Ironic to some, that is, but Raylene feels that economic strife in the maritimes isn't exactly a new idea.

"One thing about east coast people is that they have learned to laugh. The area has always been stressed economically, since the turn of the century. So they learn not to take things so seriously, and to enjoy what they have."

And as John Morris notes, east coast artists are simply taking better advantage of the more available outlets to purvey their talents.

"I think we're learning to use the means that are available to expose what we have to offer. A lot of young musicians now know how to use all the mediums to get their product out there, to get their picture out there."

And what about those heavy expectations? John Morris agrees that winning those four Junos was both a tremendous blessing, and just a little bit of a curse.

"I think it was a great thing, and it was a tribute to the people who helped make it all happen. There were a lot of positive spin-offs to it. But it does put more pressure on a group or artist who does win accolades like that."

The Rankin Family's *Endless Seasons* is shipped to retail on August 28. The band is currently playing selected dates throughout southern Ontario.

The early word is that the movie may be a bust, headed straight for that dreaded one-copy-only shelf at the video store. But it wouldn't be the first time that a soundtrack rose above a rather moribund movie to become a huge success in its own right. Dazed And Confused seemed to be in and out of the movie theatres overnight, but the soundtrack went on to sell in the hundreds of thousands, proving that music can speak for itself. Empire Records is the story of six teens working in an indie record store about to be gobbled up by a huge chain. But that's not really that important, is it? What is important is the fine collection of talent that's been brought together on this album. How's about Gin Blossoms, Cranberries, Toad The Wet Sprocket, Better Than Ezra, Cracker, etc., etc. There's a few acts here you might not have heard about, Edwyn Collins, The Martinis, The Innocence Mission, Ape Hangers...., but some nice exposure on this record will certainly help their cause. And what's also a major bonus here is that a number of the tracks are of that previously-unreleased variety, making it a must-have for those rabid Gin Blossoms, Cranberries, Toad fans. And hey, if Reality Bites can make a star out of Lisa Loeb, surely one of these unknown bands (our pick is Canadian singer/songwriter Coyote Shivers) can rise to the challenge. **-RR**

GARBAGE **-Alternative**
Garbage
Almo Sounds AMSSD-80004-J

No doubt you'll be hearing a lot about this record, probably because of its connection with million dollar sound man Butch Vig (the mind behind Smashing Pumpkin's Siamese Dream, Nirvana's Nevermind and Soul Asylum's Let Your Dim Light Shine). The difference with Garbage is that Vig fills in as full blown bandmember, though the big surprise is that this is anything but a Vig vehicle (say that three times quickly). Garbage are Vig, Steve Marker, Duke Erikson and Angelfish's Shirley Manson who showcases as the band's vox. Hers is the voice in the dark whom the listener follows through an urban maze of subdued guitar, digital gadgetry, fuzzy bass and drum loops. And what an eclectic guide she turns out to be: seductive, psychotic, spooky; her vocals often trailing away on a lyric about melancholia or God. The woman is nothing short of incredible. The record has more than enough in the way of pop, but all of it plagued



with an electronic sub-text that's hard to fathom. Perhaps it's that exact mixture of pop and chaos; that murky sub-urban ambience and technical precision that makes Garbage a perfect album... it's difficult to tell. A Stroke Of Luck is smooth. As Heaven Is Wide is creepy. Queer is slick. Stupid Girl is sexy. Milk is a mirage. **-RG**

URGE OVERKILL **-Alternative**
Exit The Dragon
Geffen 24818-J

Let's face it, everything that was ever included in Quentin Tarantino's Pulp Fiction became the stuff of legend the moment the credits hit the screen. And Urge Overkill's version of Neil Diamond's Girl, You'll Be A Woman Soon ingratiated the band into the hearts of many who wouldn't have otherwise given them a second glance. That's not to say that they owe their success to the movie (hardly), only that there was a fundamental change in the way the average bloke perceived this band once the film came out. That track tried hard to fit in to the surfin'



fifties feel of Pulp, but still had enough of that Urge Overkill sound that you will hear on Exit The Dragon, the band's fifth (!) full length release. Aside from an overblown epilogue/duet (Digital Black) that spends eight full minutes wondering where to go, the record offers a pretty dependable collection of L.A. drug music (admittedly, that sentiment might just be a die hard afterimage from the movie). There is a lot of repetition in the riffing (clearly the preferred methodology behind the band's songwriting), though there is enough musical deftness between Nash Kato, Eddie Roeder and Blackie O to prevent the thing from ever getting boring. Again, that half of the album feels half-assed is not a bad thing, just the philosophy behind the music making, something along the lines of preserving disorder, as we understand it. Some cool rockin' on Jaywalk, This Is No Place and Last Night/Tomorrow might make Lenny Kravitz a close friend. Groovy, literally. **-RG**

CORKY SIEGEL **-Classical/Blues**
Chamber Blues
Alligator-4824

The line "In Chicago" comes to mind at first listen to Siegel's mad-hatter fusion of his own brand of blues with the coiffured classical music set. Fortunately, Siegel show a great deal of respect for both music genres, which makes this album so entertaining. Siegel has been recording since the late '60s, but the concentration was on blues, the Butterfield and Musselwhite brand. One of his fans in those days was Seiji Ozawa, conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, who went


on to take the helm of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Seiji, in fact, opened the door for this kind of fusion, when, in 1968, the Siegel-Schwall Blues Band, and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra played William Russo's Three Pieces for Blues Band and Symphony Orchestra to the delight of a packed house. Now, Siegel and his ensemble, the West End String Quartet with percussionist Frank Donaldson, have this new project, described as "a cross between Muddy Waters and



Mozart." There's a spoofish side to Siegel that most jazz/blues and classical music purists might detect. But nevertheless, the intricate balancing of these works, all his own, with "pure sweet wooden music," create a masterpiece of listening intrigue. And then, of course, there is Siegel on blues harmonica and keyboards. Here's an example of Siegel's brilliant mind when it comes to his new music form, pointing out how the Allegro (Opus 8), a key track, was written in three sections. The first, "an improvised introduction by tabla and piano. This was followed by an allegro passage in the quartet which moves into what we call the 'detunando' sections where the cello and viola tune down their 'C' strings to a 'B'. This section is based on a blues ostinato of Rollo Radford's invention (the bass player from Siegel-Schwall). This section features a non-barline, semi-improvised battle between the violins." Also key is No One's Got Them Like I Do (with a Siegel vocal) and Filisko's Dream. But don't overlook Slow Blues (Opus 7). Produced by Siegel and Hans Wurman and dedicated to Seiji Ozawa. **-WG**

JEREMY GREENHOUSE **-Folk 'n Pop**
The Things That You Believe
Folkstone

Perhaps the best introduction to this Ontario-born folk singer (now living in BC) and his clever assault of the senses, is his fiddle work on Who Lit That Fire? A musicologist, who hasn't been intimidated by the title, Greenhouse digs in, right down to his roots. He fashions his story-telling, somewhat after the Celtic bards, but with an obvious penchant for the modern. The text of Lover And His Lass, for instance, is a song from Shakespeare's play, As You Like It. Mackenzie is a poignant reminder of the rebellions in Upper Canada in the early 19th century. Lingering In Your Eyes is the story of Greenhouse's older sister Marianne. Great folk stuff. Greenhouse's inspiration and ability to communicate is also very prevalent on Silver, Ginger Goodwin and Samantha's House. In fact, there isn't a bad track on the album. Greenhouse's vocals are soft, but restless, prioritizing the story line which adds to the folk charm. He is incredibly talented on the fiddle, guitar and mouth harp. His backing comes from bassist Kelly McCausland and drummer Colin Gray. Carolyn Howe, Wade Noble and Laurinda Williamson provided background vocals on Samantha's House. The album was produced by Greenhouse (executive producer Rachel Hedrick) and recorded at Victoria's Digimax Studios. THE SKYDIGGERS **-Rock**

Underground success can often be, ironically, a kiss of death for a band seeking serious commercial success. Radio and retailers often have the opinion that, if they were born in the clubs, and they're still hot in the clubs, then they'll probably stay in the clubs. That's a tragedy really, and it's probably cost the radio listeners and record buyers a couple hundred really great artists who never made it because somebody didn't think they were worthy of 'the big time'. The Skydiggers have always been cult favourites in the Toronto area, ever since they made that first fateful appearance at the Cabana Room in their hometown. Three critically-acclaimed records followed, all of them achieving that certain level of underground (there it is again) success, but none of them really turning the band into a platinum selling act. If, as the saying goes, everything goes right with this one, however, the 'Diggers should be getting their photo looks prepared, for all those pictures to be taken on the presentation of some multi-platinum awards. Canuck guitar rock at its finest, The Skydiggers have the indefinable something (much like The Tragically Hip) that makes their records sound Canadian. It's rock and roll, make no mistake, rolling along at a rollicking pace throughout most of the album's 14 tracks. After your first listen, you may be thinking, "I've heard all this before." But listen again, and again, and maybe, one more time, and you'll hear something a little more. You'll hear that backwoods, pseudo-industrialized slice of Canadiana that tastes of maple syrup and very cold beer. Highlights include Toss & Turn, Radio Waves, What Do You See?, Endless Grey Night and Just Another Day. Produced by the band, the record was recorded at the Lighthouse Theatre in Port Dover, Ont. **-RR**

Lisa Brandt is leaving Waterloo's KOOL-FM morning team on August 18th, to co-host the Hometown Morning Show with Bob Bratina on CHML Hamilton. Brandt will also be CHML's new entertainment editor. Brandt is also co-owner of Davisville Productions, with partner Wray Ellis.

Ottawa's Y105 Young Country hosted a tricycle race down Spark Street in Ottawa recently, all for the benefit of the local Boys And Girls Clubs. More than 100 station listeners raced down the central Ottawa street, afterwards enjoying a free BBQ from Grill Master Express Catering, and every contestant left with a Y105 t-shirt and trophy. Semi-finalists won copies of the film Speed, runner up Bruce Robinson won a Bianca 10-speed bike worth \$600, while race winner Gerry Laurin drove away in a brand-new Dodge Neon. The brand-new tricycles were then donated to the Ottawa-area Boys and Girls Clubs in the memory of CJOH sportscaster Brian Smith.

Classic Rock 100.3 FM The Bear in Edmonton's overnight announcer, Cub Carson, took over the broadcast studios on July 26, locking everyone out, including the Bear morning zoo. Carson, who'd been on the air since midnight, declared that "No one would be allowed into the studio to do their on-air shifts until his demands were met!" Those demands included BIG giveaways on the overnight shift, a better parking spot, five pounds of coffee, and the station was to bring a major concert to Edmonton so he could announce it. After more than 17 hours on the air, and several calls to MCA Concerts Canada, the station managed to arrange for a Van Halen concert on September 11 in Edmonton. Carson announced the show, then left the booth to run very quickly to the bathroom. An inspiring method to announce a major concert.

Toronto's MIX 99.9 will celebrate its fourth birthday in style on Labour Day Monday by throwing a huge party for their listeners. Last year's Beachfest attracted a huge crowd of more than 100,000 people. Beachfest is an all-day, free, family funfest filled with live concerts, children's activities, arts and crafts and more. It all takes place at Kew Gardens in the Beaches. The entire festivities get underway at 11 am, running through to 7 pm. The music line-up features a plethora of Canada's finest, including Kim Mitchell, Alannah Myles, Big Blue Bus, David Deacon & The Word, the cast of Tommy, John Bottomley, Gowan, Philosopher Kings, as well as a mystery headliner. Last year's mystery headliner was Barenaked Ladies, so we should expect a good one this year.

AM 640 in Toronto has announced two new additions to its daily talk line-up, to coincide with the debut of the station's new morning show on September 5. Joining the recently announced Jane Hawtin and Gene Valaitis Morning Show in September is One On One with Steve Warden, a brand new program to be heard weekdays at noon on AM 640. One On One will feature interviews with local personalities and entertainment newsmakers. Following One On One, AM 640 will then simulcast Jane Hawtin Live in conjunction with CHCH Television, offering southern Ontario a new multi-media midday talk show hosted by the former CFRB personality. To accommodate these moves, the popular midday show Horsman/Lederman, is being moved to the 2-4 pm slot.

Q107, AM 640's sister station, has announced its final four for 1995 from the 16th annual Homegrown Search for new Canadian rock. Those four finalists, Poor Get Fat, Naked Planet, SuperGarage and Anyhowtown, will join eight other bands on the station's annual CD compilation. The four bands will then showcase at the Q107 Homegrown '95 Showcase and CD release party at The Phoenix on August 29. At the event, the bands will perform for more than \$25,000 in cash and prizes. Joining these finalists on the homegrown CD are Edith's Mission, 2nd Generation, Stone Windows, Blue Heavies, Cancer Fish, Swamp Baby, Trout 22 and Terence, This Is Stupid. The dozen artists featured on the CD were selected from more than 500 entries received at the Q. The top 50 were counted down on-air over a five-week period. Q107's Homegrown 16 CD will be available as of August 30 at southern Ontario Music World locations. The CD will also be available free with the purchase of selected MCA domestic titles, including The Tragically Hip's Day For Night, Age Of Electric's self-titled debut, the Headstones' Teeth & Tissue, She Stole My Beer's Mule, Gandharvas' Kicking In The Water and The Walk's Turbine.

Prairie Oyster holds at #1 with Only One Moon, the title track of the band's Arista album. No news on a follow-up, but we should know, probably by next week.

Charlie Major is off and running with the first single from his new album, (I Do It) For The Money. Taken from his upcoming Arista album, Lucky Man, the single is the most added this week, entering the chart at #68. The Arista people were quick to release this single, and several major and secondary stations put it on heavy rotation immediately. This is another Major original. The album was again produced by Steve Fishell and recorded in Nashville.

Joel Feeney has the big gainer this week with Life Is Just A Dream bulleting up to #49 from #64, after its third week of charting. This is the title track of Feeney's MCA album, which was produced by Chris Farren and Hayward Parrott.

Jason McCoy's new single, Learning A Lot About Love, is now at radio. Expect a flood of adds for next week. This one is a barnburner for McCoy, the follow-up to This Used To Be Our Town, which hit #1 on the RPM Country 100 on July 31/95, holding on for two consecutive weeks. The single, which was written by McCoy and Terrine Barnes, is now descending the chart (#13). This has been a good year for McCoy. Besides

signing with MCA and having a #1 single, he has been nominated for a CCMA Vista Rising Star award. As well, the video for This Used To Be Our Town, made its debut in June as Pick Hit on NCN and was recently tagged as the most played video (tying with Shania Twain's Any Man Of Mine) for several weeks on the country music channel. McCoy has just wrapped a six-week western Canada tour. The 25 dates included some of the largest country music festivals in the west. His cross-Canada tour began in Fredericton on May 24, which coincided with the release of his debut album for MCA. He has also taped the Rita MacNeil & Friends CBC-TV show, which will be aired in the fall.

Suzanne Gitz is charting with her latest Tomcat release, Teardrops In The Rain. This will be the last track taken from her Fallen Angel album. Tomcat has opened offices in Seattle and, in effect, is now a US label. A new album is now in pre-production stages with producers Al Rodger and Simon Kendall. The latest release, which enters the chart at #92, was written by Doug Bennett of Doug & The Slugs, owner of the label.

Willie Nelson has a new lease on the charts, with Turn Me Loose & Let Me Swing, his coupling

with Curtis Porter. The single, which enters the chart at #91, was released in Canada through an agreement between Nashville's Step One Records and the Edmonton-based Royalty label. Royalty also has the distribution rights for Six Hours at Pedernales, the album the single was taken from. The song is a Ray Pennington original. He also produced the album. The video of Turn Me Loose, is expected to be slotted at #1 on The Nashville Network in the next two weeks.

The Rebel Phoenix Band is the new handle for the Oshawa, Ontario-based Alibi that gained national recognition with several of its releases. Joining lead vocalists John Redekop and Dave Clow, is keyboardist Steve Soucy and pedal steelman Jim Dorin. Two Timin' A Three Time

New album and tour in works for Rita MacNeil

Rita MacNeil's new single, Rolling Thunder, will go to radio on Aug. 29. Porch Songs, the album the track was taken from, has been scheduled for a Sept. 26 release date.

When EMI Music Canada president Deane Cameron, saw MacNeil perform Rolling Thunder, a MacNeil original, last year at the Ontario Place Forum, he was suitably impressed to encourage her to record the song. All the material on the new album, which was produced by Don Potter, was written by MacNeil. The album was recorded at Nashville's Shiloh Studios.

MacNeil's fall tour begins in Winnipeg (Sept. 18), followed by Regina (20), Saskatoon (21), Melfort (23), Calgary (25), Edmonton (26), Banff (29) and Red Deer (30) to cap the month of September.

Watch for Lawnie Wallace to take the spotlight. The Stouffville, Ontario singer/songwriter was recently signed to MCA Records Canada. Her first single, Little Lies, Big Trouble, goes to radio in mid-September, during Canadian Country Music Week '95. Curtis Grambo is on the move, giving a promotional assist to his album, Big News Back Home. The album is released on the Time Art label. The Oak Lake, Manitoba artist has been nominated for a CCMA award as male vocalist. The Grambo tour of Ontario begins at the Golden Nugget in Thunder Bay where his engagement will run from Aug 29 through Sept. 2. 
