Radio in the Changing Home.

By Dr. C. W. KIMMINS.

It is not goverally recognized what very important changes are going on, not

only in the organization of the bome, bur, what is still more significant, in the attitude of the child to the home. During the past fifty years, the changes have been far greater than those in the preceding five hundred years. In the old days, the organization was fairly simple, with the autocratic lather, whose word was law, and whose rule was, to a large extent, absolute. He was secure on his padestal, as the dispenser of material things for the well-being of his family. On the other side, there was the highly-domesticated mother, clearly in a subordinate position, whose devotion to her family probably reached a far higher standard than that attained by the normal modern mother. Having less interests outside the home, she was able to concentrate all her energy and ability on the welfare of her children.

With the movement for the higher education of women, there came a very natural demand for interests outside the home, which would give the mother a fuller and more interesting life, and give her an opportunity of securing more satisfactory expression of her intellectual espications than was possible within the narrow limits of domesticity in the lamby circle. The emancipation of women, the opening of professions to them which had hitherto been closed, and the various types of social service which make a special appeal to women, have all combined to offer her a far more attractive life than was possible in the past. -

The King's English.

A B.B.C. Advisory Committee on Pronunciation.

THE B.B.C. have long felt their responsibility in the matter of setting a standard of spoken English by means of the speech of their announces. This is a responsibility which they are forced to assume whether they like it or no. However little they may wish to dictate or lay down principles of promunciation for the country, they are aware that they must constantly be setting fashious.

For example, it frequently happens that their arms meets are confronted with a word in print which is selded or never heard in speech. Difficulty tree, also, in the case of foreign names, such as M profiles, which are half nothingstread as this country. It would obviously be an affectation to speak of Paris as "Pares." Ought one to adopt the sailor's pronunciation of Busness Ayres, or the Spanish pronunciation, or atmething in between 7

Then again there are a vast number of doubtful words which have two or three alternative promunications even among collected speakers. The B.B.C's correspondence contains many complaint by Northerners against what they call the absently methods of Southerners, particularly in relation to the firsts "r" and the aspirate in words like "which" and "when." There are also technical words, such as "aerial "and "occustion," in which the professional people have adopted a promunciation that can hardly be defended on logical principle, and then the question arises whether the amounter ought to use the technical pronunciation or the form to be found in the best dictionness.

The intuiting a therings of members of the same family sharing the evening contentiament, and discussing the new and pleasing experience brought to them by wireless, are precious along the other forms of mechanised recreation are largely individual in their application, and, moreover, necessitate leaving the home.

Radio is still in a state of comparative childhood. In the technical details of its mechanical appliances, it has so readily over come the deficulties associated with early experiments, that the interval that remains before substantially perfect transmission can be secured, is simply a matter of time, and we can look to the future with great confidence. The problem of the human element, and the type of material which can be most usefully employed by radio, in order to take full advantage of its enormous possibilities for recreational and educational purposes, must, for a long time, however, be matters of careful and patient research.

In listening, the most casual observer is impressed with the vast difference between the specially gifted performer and one who has no particular aptitude for this highly specialized type of work. This, of course is most marked where the popular lecturer or the teller of interesting stories is involved.

As time goes on, men and women of special ability for radio work will be discovered, and, what is of equally great importance, with an adequate knowledge of subjects of sufficiently general appeal to interest listeners of moderate intelligence, and of a wide range of age. By careful observation and judicious selection, there will be no difficulty in finding suitable material to meet these demands.

The state of unrest in family bie, so prevalent to-day, due largely to the greater variety of outside interests, which tend to bring about the deappearance of the links which formerly bound the members of the group together, has long been a matter of profound concern. Something was evidently needed to make the home more attractive, and to revive the waning interest in common action by the family. Radio performs this function admirably, and there is no doubt that it can, and will, effectively neutralize, to a considerable extent, some of the more serious tendencies of the changing home.

ONE Saturday morning recently, when the heat of the sun seemed to make London a fine place to get away from, if only far a few hunts. I was overcome by a feeling that I must go into the country.

The feeling grew till it became irresistible. I happen to have a friend, a nice man, who has a nice ear, and it chanced we were speaking together over the belephone. Fortunately at that moment he had the same feelings as myself about Loudon, with a desire as atrong as mane to see the trees growing and scent the newly-mown hay. Precisely one hour later we set off to spend a week-end among the delights and beauties of rural England.

Our way took us off the bester track. That evening we came to a village with the most invitinglooking "July Waggoner" place I have ever seen. There it was standing just off the bighway with a large expanse of greensward opposite where the village youths were just finishing a cricker match with other youths who had some from a few miles along the road to induge in one of several annual set to's "I was told they have together with but and ball every year.

So we staved awhile to give the engine of our cartime to sool down. Before we were ready to start again we had discovered that the "Jully Waggener" had some bedrooms where we could sleep the night.

There was. The landlord's son brought out a lot of flex we wire to which was attached a lond-speaker. Soon, where the cricket match had been played, we saw the village youths and made denoing to the music of the Savoy Bands until Big Ben struck midnight.

That denoing and the fun on the village green is something I shall remember for a long time, just as I shall not forget another occasion last January when I heard the Saroy Bunds playing through a loud-speaker.

I was crossing the Atlantic from America at the time. The weather was liftly throughout the voyage, and one night it was so bad that all who were not good sailnes had retired to their cabins. The slap was rolling in the storm, and I found myself the only person in the smoke-room. Outside the wind howled and the sea raged, but above the noise I could hear the same Savoy Bands as I heard on the English village green playing their dance music for everybody who cared to listen.

What one sain who has experienced such diverse meinents as these think about wireless? My own feelings are that any new medium—cell broadcasting a mirrole, a science, an industry, or whatever you will—that offers such great potentialities for the benefit of mankind must be expected to the fullest extent without those income hindrances that in the past have robbed the world of the benefit of other inventions longer than was necessary.

I feel that broadcasting has still a great deal to give us, if only we will let its development go shead as we must and will overtually have to do.

Broadcasting has opened a new field for many people, not the least of whom are members of my own calling. In this connection I should like to refer to the discussion I have noticed recently on the question of fees for artists who have been waked to broadcast.

I do not, by sny means, say that an artist should be asked to work for nothing, but I do think that for some time to come the question of big payments for broadcasting should be the last thing an artist should worry about. This applies alike to those who are "known" and "unknown." There has never yet been anything like broadcasting for bringing an artist before the public or giving the

Let me give another in ideat effecting myzelf. I am sufficiently conceiled to believe that many people, not only in this country, but in others, have heard of George Graves, but I know also that there are many who have not

After my last appearance at the London Studio a letter was received from a man living near Liverpool who said I was very amusing. "His humour is contagious," said the writer, "He must be a rising comedian. Please put him on a sain." Now that man must be a new audience for me. When I go to Liverpool, he would say to his wife and family. "There is this Greage Graves who breadeast, Let's go and see him." I am seamilie enough to think that breadcasting, instead of deterring people from going to see an artist they have heard, would rather create a desire to hear him are a next to see what he looks like.

Every artist who broadcasts, provided he can "get over" all right and make a hit on the wireless, is building up an unknown someone that will stand him in good stead for a long time to come.

In this connection let me quote the case of John Henry, who, before he started broadcasting, was not so well known as he is to-day. This summer I hear he is doing splendidly with his performances at the senside.

All those things, to my mind, show conclusively that there is everything to gain and nothing to lose by a better understanding being arrived at between music-hall managers and the broadcasting authorities, in a spirit of "give and take."

Why cannot both sides get together and set up a joint committee on the lines of that which did so much good for the theatres and broadcasting! Here is a concrete example of what sansible orgotations can accomplish. authorities would do more for artists than they do now if they could. Take the matter of the money that listeners have paid in licence fees and which the Post Office are holding back because it is in excess of the £300,000 that they consider sufficient for annual current expenditure at present.

After all, £500,000 is not a big sum when twenty separate stations have to be kept working continuously and material found for nearly \$0,000 hours of broadcasting in a year. The money has been provided by inteners for this specific purpose, and it should certainly be used to that end. Then is no doubt that the policy of bolding up this money—it may be for a raid such as was made to the Road Fund—is starving the service and preventing development.

And added to this, if the B.B.C. could get it, I am sure artists would stand to benefit all round.

MENDELSSOHN'S SCOTCH SYMPHONY.

(MASCHESTER, SCHOOL)

IN 1820, when he was twenty, Mandelssahn paid his I first visit to this country, and spent six weeks of the summer in touring the Scottish Righlands.

Two of his works, the Hebrides Overture and this Scatch Symphony, contain impressions of his tour.

A visit in Hulywood Palace, with its ead memories of Mary Queen of Sents and the marder of Rizzio. gave him the inspiration for the opening of the Symphony.

The work is in four Movements. Though they are separate and distinct. Mendelssohn directed that there should not be panses between them.

The Introduction has first a romantic and melancholy time, like that of an old ballad, and then an impetuous Violin passage. After these have been discussed a little we plungs into the netual First Main Tune of the Muvement, played by Strings and Clarinet. It is based on the open og so lody of the Introduction. A vigorous episode for Full Orchestra brings in the Second Much Tune. beginning on the Chrinat.

In its concluding pages the Movement works up to a stormy climax, to which succeeds, as a closing hought, the sad melody that we brand at the

commencement.

This is connected with the First Movement by two chords on the placked Strings. The Scotch map" (a very short note followed by a larger one) comes firting in, and the Clarinet gives out a levely-doneing First Main Tune. The Second, as a con-tract, is delicate and graceful, starting on the Strings, the Wind imitating their phrases.

MOZART'S VIOLIN CONCERTO IN A.

(CARDIFF, THURSDAY.)

This is the fifth of the six Viole Concertos that Mozari wrote when a young man of about twenty. he was living at Salebore.

He wrote for a typical Orchestra of the time. consisting of Strings, with two Oboss and two

His First Movement starts with a passage by the Orchestra, which gives out the two themes I as are to be worked upon. In this case we bear, in this opening tath (as it is called, meaning a portion for all the players), only the First Main Tune's harmony.

The Second Main Tune quickly follows-n distrilly stepping melody, beginning with a scale dissusual run and the three-fold reposition of its bottom note. Here is a Rondo, in unimpar form. Its opening melody comes round three times, with, by way of variety, two other tonce, one major and the other minor, between the repetitions. This mokes a complete little piece in orthodox Rendo form. But now Mozart meets a dashing little episode after the style of the Turkish military and that was much admired in his day. The only drawhack here is that the drums and cymbals characteristic of the Tucka' "janissary " name (se it is called) are lacking; but Mozart makes up for them by giving added piquasey to his simple scoring, so that we get all the excitement of the military band without its noise,

After this rather autonishing interruption the Rondo returns to end the Concerto, but this time only two out of its three tunes are heard,

Great Living.

By the Rev. S. M. Berry, D.D.

In response to numerous requests we publish below the address broadenet by Dr. Berry from Bourneworth and other stations on Sunday evening. Juga 27th

MAY it not be that empty note are always the result of fishing in shallow waters? It is never the superficial dealing with life which produces the hig results. If the reessure that we take to life with all its gifts and opportunities is a shallow one, the result in the end is bound to be disappointing. That is how life judges us at the very moment when

We imagine we are judging life.

The man who confesses hunself bored with the ordinary bealthy delights of human life is, all unknown to himself, telling us the kind of man be. Those who go down to the roots of simple things have a very different story to tell. The themes of the greatest poets, the subjects of the greatest artists, are nearly always simple orbit elemental things. They show these things to us is a different light because they have first of all sees them in a different light for themselves. They hanch out into the deep before they let down their note.

Great living, like fishing, is an art. We must take some spirit of venture and resolution to it before we can make the larger discoveries. No man has found the greatest secret of all which we call God, without first of all setting out on the quest for Him; there is no premise at all to those who do not make the effort implied in asking, seeking, and knocking. This is the plug to life about which all simple and sintere people agree; they treat life as though it had a great meaning and they find it to be so. Life may offer them at times a store challenge, so stern as to disturb their faith in an ultimate meaning of good. But they refuse to scoops the vertice of denial. They are with undamnted courage, and although life does not spare them so far as outward circumstances go, it gives them in the end the richest of all gifts.

The great distinction between men lies not in the apparently unjust incidence of formine and minfortune, but in the way in which we deal with what E-pling calls "those two imposters." Essentially we all sail the same seas with their uncertain currents, but the success which terms one man's head opens another's heart, while the trouble which rours and perhaps breaks one man gives strength and a deeper touch of companion to another. It is what we give to life which determines what life gives to us. It is only the deeper interpretation of de's meaning which can ever satisfy the heart of a real man, and apart from it all our experiences are futile things.

In the present discontents we must not accept a shallow account of the causes. So long as in the ordinary business of life men do not treat each other its human beings with the same needs and hopes and strivings, the result can hever be harmony and peace. Society falls into unsettlement and confusion unless we keep before us the larger interpretation of its meaning. If business is undertaken merely for personal profit, then it becomes a game of grab and the doors are open for the seven devils of selfshness and envy and strife to enter in; but if business is the secvice of society in which men co-operate with each other for the common good, its spirit alters at

Both for personal and for social life Jesus was no distant dreamer, but the master stotesman of life when He said to the world | Seek ye first the Kangdom of God and His Rightenmaness, and all there things whall be added unto you. The world still insists that tennis like these are unpractical. The truth is that any lower interpretation of life is unpractical just because it is fruitless. Some day we may learn that to loanch out a betle further beyond our suallow course and rules of blo is the one course which beings the great research for every man and for the
