ALL BRITISH RECORD BAN PUBLIC REPRODUCTION

Performing Right Society Says "All Clear" on Its Repertoire

A S exclusively announced in last week's BROADCASTER a definite ban on the reproduction of records, but for two exceptions, has been issued as a "warning" by the E.M.I. Associated Companies—H.M.V., Columbia and Zonophone.

Every other maker of gramophone records has taken, or is taking, similar action. There have been several meetings between the com-

nave been several meetings between the companies concerned pointing to the formation of a Patent and Copyright Gramophone Pool.

According to H.M.V., Section 19 of the Copyright Act of 1911 (referred to at length on page 37 of this issue) gives the record manufacturer absolute control over use of his own records.

B.B.C. Unaffected

A contract has been made with the B.B.C., who are unaffected by the new move.

Continental misuse of records for broadcast

purposes is given as one of the more important reasons for the step.

The only exceptions to the ban are the use of records for educational purposes and their use with P.A. equipment made by the Gramophone Co., such use apparently being only allowed when the express permission of the company is obtained.

Indications were also given by H.M.V. that there was a desire to make the scale of fees charged at present more consistent, or even reduce them.

"It is hoped," said the Gramophone Co., "that the present position will be of a temporary nature."

An H.M.V. official is acting as Chairman of the Committee, who are representative of all makers concerned with this new move.

The Company instances Germany, Italy, Czecho-Slovakia, Yugo-Slavia and Austria as countries in which broadcast authorities have already agreed to limit the record broadcasting to 60 hours per month. In some instances almost 100 per cent. programmes were previously derived from records.

One record was broadcast 73 times in one day in Australia, according to H.M.V.

The attention of the Company was also drawn to the fact that the R.G.2 Licence permits of the "manufacture and sale of radiogramophones and sets of parts as defined (and no other apparatus whatsoever) to proprietors of, for use in public-houses, hotels, restaurants, cafés, tea houses, boarding-houses and small dance-halls (only) not attached to or forming part of a theatre or cinema." It is obvious that one cannot "use" a

radio-gramophone without a record, but the record companies' argument is that if such permission is given by the R.G.2 Licence it

the R.G.2 Licence, which is granted until 1934. This licence cannot be withdrawn. neither can any of its provisions be altered, except under conditions (none of which affect

this question) specified in the Licence.

The Crystalate Co. is lining up with other companies, but intimated that a fee will probably be charged in respect of public record reproduction.

The Homophone Co. stated that all makers, including small ones, were interested in the

Edison Bell stated that the record makers

Edison Bell stated that the record makers had already signed an agreement which governed their policy in the whole matter.

Marconi's Wireless Telegraph Co., Ltd., who were approached by THE BROADCASTER as signatories and operating members of the radios gramophone pool, stated that the two matters—the R.G.2 Licence and the new warning—had nothing in common.

The P.R.S. Attitude

The only definite statement issued so far comes from the Performing Right Society. "Certain gramophone record manufacturing companies," says this statement, "claim that

they are entitled to forbid the use of records of their manufacture for the purpose of public entertainment.

"It is not for the Performing Right Society to advise as to the rights of the gramophone record companies in this matter, which is one

to be decided by the Courts.

"So far as the Society is concerned its position is that it controls the right of public performance in the copyright musical works in its repertoire, and anyone holding its Licence is entitled thereunder to perform such works within the terms of the Licence, irrespective of the means of performance.

Pending a clearer declaration of the inten-tions of the record makers, it is apparent, therefore, that those interested in the public performance of records must rest content with the protection afforded them by the Performing Right Society Licence and the R.G.2 Licence.

COMPANIES

DETAILS OF P.R.S. LICENCE

PROVISIONS AND WHAT IT COVERS

The Performing Right Society Licence for an annual fee, which varies according to the premises concerned, gives permission for the licensee "to perform publicly any and every musical work for the time being in the repertoire of the Society, and of the Foreign Societies for the time being affiliated thereto," on the premises licensed.

The full "Conditions and Provisions" of the licence are as follows:—

the licence are as follows :-

The Conditions

The Conditions

1. This licence shall not extend to or be deemed to include:—

(a) Oratorios, choral, operatic or dramaticomusical works (including plays with music, revues and ballets) in their entirety, or songs or other excerpts from operas or musical plays accompanied either by words, pantomime, dance, or visual representation of the work from which the music is taken; but fragments or instrumental selections from such works may be performed without words, dialogue, costume, dramatic action or scenic accessory, and unaccompanied by any stage action or visual representation of the work of which such music forms a part.

(b) The broadcasting or other transmission of any performance, beyond the precincts of the premises hereby licensed; and, conversely, the public audition at the premises hereby licensed by broadcasting or other transmission of a performance taking place elsewhere.

2. If the premises hereby licensed shall be temporarily or permanently used by the licensee for any performance or class of entertainment different from the class of entertainment being given thereat on the grant of the licence, this licence shall not be taken to extend to or authorise such different entertainment without the previous written sanction of the society.

3. The licensee shall not assign or part with the possession of this licence without the previous consent in writing of the society. If the society shall frant such consent, the licensee shall pay a fee of 2s. 6d. for each such written consent.

4. The society, by its duly authorised agent, shall have the free right of entry in and upon the premises hereby licensee shall, for the duration of the licence, supply to the society or its authorised agent weekly by post, on the forms obtainable free from the society, a list signed by or on behalf of the licensee of all the music performed and of all songs sung at the premises hereby licensed, with the names of the author, composer, arranger and publisher of each such composition, and the number of times each has been perfor

Convoy Holds up Leicester Traffic

SHOW IN FULL SWING IN 2 **HOURS**

LEICESTER, 7.0 P.M., MONDAY, 26. "Drivers! Please turn round and return the same way as you came, then take the first turning on the right. Hurry, please; the police are getting peevish!"

This announcement, made at 6.30 p.m. in Leicester from a P.A. van, is a sidelight upon the impression which the Radio Convoy made

at Leicester.

Between 60 and 70 radio vans congested the 'bus parking place opposite the Palais de Danse and, coupled with the crowds which had assembled, created such a traffic crisis that despite the fact that all police arrange-ments had been made previously, the Convoy

was asked to move.

At 6.30 p.m. the Palais de Danse, Leicester, was just an ordinary dance hall. At 8.30 p.m. it was a wonderful advertisement.

Twenty-nine stands had been erected in those two hours and in the gallery fifteen minutes after the doors were opened the representatives of those firms who had taken their part in the convoy were busy answering questions and distributing literature.

Two Thousand Visitors

It was estimated that at least 2,000 people visited the hall for the one night show, many of whom stayed to dance.

A mobile P.A. van parked by the side of the hall provided part of the dance music, while a local band supplied the rest.

The convoy, which had kept "schedule" time all the way from London, had been advertised in the windows of every Leicester radio trader of any importance by means of radio trader of any importance by means of window bills, and was, in addition, heralded by P.A. vans which toured the town for some time before the opening of the exhibition and dance.

One prominent manufacturer said, "If I have achieved nothing else to-day, the thousands of handbills and catalogues which I have distributed in towns and villages en route has made the Manchester convoy worth while.

Demonstrations were given in numerous centres, one of the most successful being at Bedford, where a civic reception had been arranged, and where the Mayor was supported by a local manufacturer and vice-president of R.M.A., Mr. J. T. Mould, of the Igranic Electric Co., Ltd.

On arrival at Manchester the vans were inspected by a committee consisting of Messrs. T. Barratt, Chairman of Manchester W.R.A.; J. R. Carter, Vice-Chairman, Man-chester W.R.A. and Secretary, North-Western Area Executive; H. G. Jenkinson and H. Nightingale, Joint Secretaries, Manchester W.R.A.

Prizes, consisting of silver-framed photographs of the vans, were awarded to Lotus for the best publicity van, and Kolster-Brandes for the van best featuring the exhibition.

Smartest Van

Exide won the prize for the neatest and smartest van on arrival, with G.E.C. a close second.

In the opinion of Mr. Paul B. Klugh, Vice-President and General Manager of Zenith Radio Corporation of U.S.A., which company now has a stake in the Radio Manufacturing Industry in this country through Zetavox Radio and Television Co., Ltd., and its sole concessionaire, Kenneth Brooks (Radio

and Television), Ltd., there are two points of outstanding interest which have attracted his attention during his visit.

British manufacturers, according to Mr.

Klugh, have an enormous advantage over their U.S.A. contemporaries in the matter

of price control.

of price control.

In the U.S.A. price control is illegal.

"When I see in The Broadcaster dealers and factors being compelled to apologise to the extent of a full advertisement for cutting the price of a product," said Mr. Klugh, "then I am frankly envious."

"Our laws do not allow us to control prices in any way or to form trade associa-tions for the same purpose. So far as Zetavox products in this country are concerned, we propose to take full advantage of our powers to uphold our list prices."

On the other hand, Mr. Klugh sees the valve situation and the uncertainty of the licensing arrangements as the weakest fea-tures of British radio.

"We have come into this market," said Mr. Klugh, "by accepting at the outset the conditions of trading here. We have accepted both the valve and licensing situations.'

Mr. Klugh is fond of a good cigar, and over an excellent "smoke" confided to The BROADCASTER his opinion that the sale of valves in this country would suffer from the same complaint as has the sale of cigars.

"I pay more than double for my cigars in this country compared to U.S.A. prices. The same applies to the valve. At the same Zetavox will abide by them in this country and use only British valves."

So far as the licensing conditions were concerned, Mr. Klugh was mainly interested

in the question of uncertainty.
"What is to happen next year?" he asked.

Definite Policy
"In the States we have a definite policy
under which each maker knows he will
operate until—I speak from memory roughly 1938.

Asked his verdict on the activities of his own company in the U.K. up to the present, Mr. Klugh expressed himself as thoroughly satisfied. "But I am much more interested," he said, "in what Zetavox will be like in five years time than I am in this year's

Mr. Klugh, as already stated in The Broadcaster, is one of the representatives of the American R.M.A. at the Madrid Conference, and left London for Madrid last Thursday.

As a contribution towards the brightening up of the North London W.R.A. branch meetings, Mr. T. M. Petrie suggested, at the meeting held at the Alpha Café, Finsbury Park, on Tuesday evening, that members should undertake in turn to discuss points of topical trade interest reported in the weekly

"We have two splendidly conducted Trade papers in THE BROADCASTER and the Trader,

he said.

Explaining his suggestion, Mr. Petrie pointed to several matters in the week's news which warranted further discussion.

He referred to the fact that the Luton W.R.A. Branch had agreed upon a minimum

price for charging accumulators.

The N. London Branch, he said, had never decided upon a line of action where charges were concerned. The hiring out of accumu-lators tended to restrict sales, and almost amounted to unfair trading.

Help a Hospital?

He congratulated Manchester upon their joint action in presenting an inscribed wireless set to a local hospital.

"Is there a member of the North London Branch bold enough to make such a proposal for a London hospital?" he asked.

A resolution was unanimously passed "that

the N. London Branch notes with pleasure and satisfaction the fact that the East London W.T.A. has decided to formulate itself a branch of the W.R.A., believing that such a step will add to the prestige of the association and benefit our own immediate circles."

Mr. Sam Weller reported that he had made good progress with regard to the suggestion of running a series of lectures on prominent trade matters. Several lecturers had offered their services, and it was hoped to start the series on October 25, with a talk on rectifiers.

On October 11, the principal feature of the meeting is to be a display of A.R.P. sets and accessories.

H.-P. Questions

Much of the time of the meeting on Tuesday was taken up with a discussion on various forms of hire-purchase agreements

various forms of hire-purchase agreements evolved by manufacturers and wholesalers.

Mr. Weller pointed out that it was the manufacturer, not the dealer, who first introduced hire-purchase. Yet the dealer was expected to shoulder the burden.

On the strength of the information collected by the Branch, a note is being sent to all members offering information pointers.

to all members, offering information, pointers and advice if they will communicate with the secretary.

Pursuing the branch's membership campaign, a series of four circulars has been pre-pared, and these are to be mailed to 300 non-members in the area at regular fortnightly intervals.

Now, for example, the battery model of the Empire kit, which sells at £6, is obtainable for 15s. down with seven monthly payments of 15s.

The terms for the Melody Maker kit, selling at £7, are 14s. deposit with nine payments of 14s.

When it is desired to supply batteries, speakers and so on under inclusive H.P. agreements, 10 per cent. should be added to the list price of the goods, and the total sum divided equally between deposit and payments laid down for the instrument in ques-

The extra goods supplied must, of course, be Cossor products.

MANCHESTER

THE Radio Convoy, improved organi-sation of the Exhibition itself, and better publicity in the North of England have all combined this year to produce a better Manchester Radio Show.

One point of interest with regard to Manchester is the fact that a uniform colour scheme similar to Olympia is not

insisted upon.

We have heard particularly this year many opinions expressed for and against the latitude which is allowed to exhibitors at Manchester, both in the matter of stand design and in the use of colour.

Frankly, we do not think that a uni-form colour scheme is either advisable or

possible at Manchester.

It is inevitable that the Manchester Show must be in the nature of an "echo of Olympia."

A uniform colour scheme at the City Hall would undoubtedly accentuate this

disadvantage.

Because of posters, window displays, exterior showrooms of firms not exhibiting at the City Hall, public address vans, the Ekco Show at the Paramount Theatre and the Marconiphone at the Albert Hall, one cannot travel far within the boundaries of the City without realising that this is Manchester's Exhibition Week.

RECORD RUMPUS

CONSIDERABLE "fog" surrounds the action of the record manufactur-ing companies' action in banning public performance of records.

No definite statement of any real value

can be elicited from them.

It would appear, however, that the problem really involves a divergency of views between record makers and the

Performing Right Society.
So far as THE BROADCASTER can understand this decidedly obscure position at the moment, the record firms maintain that they have both copyright and patent interests in their own records, and that they are entitled to some sort of return from those rights.

We are inclined to agree.
As a first step, they have definitely forbidden performance of records in public without making any exceptions or offering any conditions under which such per-

formances may take place.

This is a step with which The Broad-caster decidedly and definite disagrees.

It is a ban which, in our opinion, record makers cannot maintain, and which will only cause ill-feeling between the Radio and Gramophone Industries.

REPRODUCTION of RECORDS in

OLLOWING the issue by the E.M.I. record manufacturers—His Master's Voice, Columbia, and Zonophone—of the new "Warning," a number of questions have been put by The Broad-CASTER to various record makers to ascertain the position as it affects the Radio Trade.

The wording of the warning is:-

"CAUTION .- His Master's Voice gramophone records are manufac-tured under British, Irish Free State, Australian and New Zealand patents, and are licensed for sale only at authorised prices, and only for private performance. Any sale at other than authorised prices, or any unauthor-ised broadcasting or public performance of such records, constitutes an infringement of the above-mentioned patents, and will render the infringer liable to an action at law. Copyright subsists in records by virtue of the Copyright Act of 1911. The Company reserves all its rights under Copyright

According to the Patent Department of the Gramophone Co., Ltd., reliance is placed upon the Copyright Act of 1911, and upon patents involved in the actual manufacture of gramophone records.

The Copyright Act

The Copyright Act is divided into three parts. Part 1 deals with Imperial Copyright, Part 2 with International Copyright, and Part 3 with Supplemental Pro-

Copyright is defined under the Act as the sole right to reproduce a work or any substantial part of it-" and shall include the sole right-in the case of a literary, dramatic, or musical work—to make any record, perforated roll, cinematograph film, or other contrivance by means of which the work may be mechanically performed or delivered, and to authorise any such Acts as aforesaid."

Clause 2, Sub-section 2, states that in-fringement takes place if any person sells, hires, or offers for sale or "by way of trade exhibits in public" any work which to his knowledge infringes copyright.
"Copyright in a work shall also be

deemed to be infringed by any person who for his private profit permits a theatre or

The Position Examined

other place of entertainment to be used for the performance in public of the work without the consent of the owner of the copyright, unless he was not aware, and had no reasonable ground for suspecting that the performance would be an in-fringement of copyright."

The normal life of a copyright is fifty years after the death of the author.

Section 19 of the Act, which has eight sub-clauses, deals specifically with records and has particular application to the question of radio performance of records.

How Records Come In

"Copyright shall subsist in records, perforated rolls, and other contrivances by means of which sounds may be mechanically reproduced, in like manner as if such contrivances were musical works, but the term of copyright shall be fifty years from the making of the original plate from which that contrivance was directly or indirectly derived, and the person who was the owner of such original plate at the time when such plate was made shall be deemed to be the author of the work, and, where such owner is a body corporate, the body corporate shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act to reside within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Act extends if it has estab-lished a place of business within such

parts.
"It shall not be deemed to be an infringement of copyright in any musical work for any person to make within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Act extends records, perforated

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rolls, or other contrivances by means of which the work may be mechanically performed, if such person proves :-

(a) That such contrivances have previously been made by, or with the consent, or acquiescence of, the owner of the

copyright in the work; and
(b) That he has given the prescribed notice of his intention to make the contrivances, and has paid in the prescribed manner to, or for the benefit of, the owner of the copyright in the work Royalties in respect of all such contrivances sold by him, calculated at the rate hereinafter mentioned."

Royalty Point

The Royalty rate given is $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the retail price of the record when the "contrivance" is sold within two years of the commencement of the Act (July sold after expiration of that period, five per cent."

The Board of Trade is given power to increase or decrease the Royalty rate as a provisional measure to be confirmed by Parliament.

Interpretation

Clause 35 of the Act deals with interpretation, and states that "performance" means "any acoustic representations of a means "any acoustic representations of a work and any visual representations of any dramatic action in a work including such representation made by means of any mechanical instrument."

"Plate" includes any stereotype or other plate, mould, transfer or matrix by

which records are produced.

A full examination of the Copyright Act as it affects the electrical and radio reproduction of records will be published next week.



Your Shop a Show

by John May

O any radio dealer who has just completed stocking up his shop with 1933 models I would say, "Call it an exhibition!

"There is nothing the British nation loves more than a show," a wise man said once. I am convinced he meant a radio show.

People who want to look at the new sets are shy of coming into a shop without money and the purpose to buy. But say you are a radio show in your shop and they running a radio show in your shop, and they will come in hundreds.

To many men a radio show is as magnetic as the spring sales are to women. ×

To nine hundred and seventy odd names from the "Telephone Directory" a dealer friend of mine sent a simple invitation card.

It was under a halfpenny stamp, and requested the pleasure of the recipient's (name written in) company at a week's exhibition of radio.

No letter went with it. There was just the plain invitation on a pale blue card in a pale blue envelope.

Within a week that mail shot brought in over £500 of worth-while inquiries. *

*

*

A FOLLOW-UP circular letter, which went out four or five days later, brought in another £70 of inquiries.

Of course, the two figures I give are not final. Inquiries will trickle in for weeks as a

result of these two circulars.

And, as my friend reckons on a good twothirds as his conversion coefficient from inquiries to sales, it looks as if he may sell £400 worth of goods.

THE circular, by the way, is well worth reproducing. Here it is:

Have you seen Radiotown's own Radio

Show yet?

It started last week, and is such a big success we are continuing it for days more.

All the latest 1933 instruments are on show, and the models exhibited have been specially chosen for their suitability for Radiotown.

You can come and hear any of these in a comfortable demonstration room, or you can have them demonstrated in your own home.

Any questions you have to ask will be answered by a salesman who knows all about the secrets of radio. Why not come along to-night? You will not be pestered to buy.

WHEN running a show of this kind the shop must naturally be furbished up for the occasion. It must look as if something is going on.

People must ask, just because they see it as they pass, "What's happening at the radio shop this week?"

It would not be a bad idea to have a huge poster on the building above the shop. It could bear the words "Radio Show," and at night should be fleed lit night should be flood-lit.

ONE bright little stunt at the Olympia Exhibition was the fake coins used to advertise the Ekco show.

They were circular pieces of cardboard,

printed one side with a replica of an early Victorian penny and the other with an advertising message.

Scattered on the floor, many people picked them up, thinking themselves a penny better off—till they felt the weight and saw the message on the other side.

This idea could be used at any local show.

SALES LETTERS.

A LARGE number of dealers are writing and asking me for sales letters without saying what they want them to deal with. Others are asking for a letter dealing with as many as

Sales letters must have a subject.
The dealer who asks for a letter probably has one in mind.

He should

mention it in his request. Too many subjects lead one to shoot

at six sales and miss all the lot. It is better to aim at one only and hit the bull's-eye.

P.S.—Sometimes a subsidiary matter can be mentioned profitably in a P.S.

IT pays to keep a careful check on results from postal advertising. Most interesting facts can be learned.

Of course, you will find that certain seasons of the year give the best results. But you will find that certain copy pulls like a Clydesdale, while some other appeal brings nothing like satisfactory results.

And you will find that printed salesman-

ship, intelligently used, is of far more use to your business than you suspected.

YOU will find, too, that the first "shot" is only part of the campaign. Direct mail like all advertising, should be kept up to give the best results.

The thoughtful dealer, when planning his first letter will also plan his follow-up, whether he decides to send out two, three or four successive letters.

Broadly speaking, it may be said that all the shots in a mailing campaign should bear a family resemblance so far as type display is concerned. This links the product up in the

mind of the recipient with the sales promotion matter he has previously received and thus prevents waste of effort.

But while there should be a family resemblance, there should be novelty as well, or you kill your chances by boring your "prospect."

HAVE you realised that the pages of your local paper are an invaluable source of information when you are compiling a mail-

Ing list?

Not only will you find names and addresses there, but information about the owners which will often give you a good lead for a sales argument.

It would pay any wide-awake retailer to have a regular search made in all his local Trade papers every week for this kind of opportunity.

NUMBERS of retailers have been asking for lay-outs for folders and pamphlets lately. Here is a warning for them.

One fundamental error made in his early

attempts by the user of printed sales promotion matter is cramping the cost.

He does not look at the problem as would

He does not look at the problem as would the production manager of a factory. He does not ask himself: "What percentage of the cost must I put aside for material?" Almost invariably he asks, "What is the cheapest quotation I can get for the job?" This is the wrong way to look at printing. Even the best Broadcaster-designed lay-outs will not pull if they are badly printed.

SHORT WAVE TESTS SOON

It is the intention of the B.B.C. to radiate test transmissions from the Empire short-wave station at Daventry before the

end of the year.

If these tests prove satisfactory, there will be a full service for the Dominions and

Colonies before the summer of 1933.

In the initial stages of the service the B.B.C. will endeavour to provide a programme of about two hours' duration between the hours of 6 p.m. and midnight, local time.

For this purpose the Empire has been divided into zones, and three distinct programmes will be radiated on different wavelengths at different times of the day.





With a good relay service you can have alternate programmes for a small sum—usually 1s. 6d. weekly.

This is a free country, and the public can have receiving sets or relay at will. Let the two compete fairly and openly.

any of the loss on sets returned by defaulters. Where is this going to end, and how does the dealer fare who finances his own credit transactions? It seems that he loses all the advantage that he previously enjoyed by reason of paying his accounts with cash instead of hire-purchase notes.

Which would the manufacturer rather have—cash, or an agreement? If the answer is obviously cash, then he who pays cash should receive an advantage, and this must take the form of an accommodation fee to the dealer.

form of an accommodation fee to the dealer who pays with an agreement.

My opinion is that extended payments are

the affair of the dealer and not the manu-

facturer.

HIRE PURCHASE

EXPORT MISTAKES MADE BY **OUR MANUFACTURERS**

Indian Market Will Expand Rapidly Says Lahore Retailer

SIR,—It would appear that although the radio business is booming in Britain, British firms are not getting their fair share of overseas markets. It is interesting to try and discover the reason or reasons.

Goods usually are not bought because :-

(1) They are unsuitable.
(2) Unattractively got up.
(3) Too high in price

(3) Too high in price.
(4) Insufficiently advertised by the maker or the dealer.

(5) The dealer will not sell them. Applying the above to the market in North India, let me give my opinion, remembering that our nearest transmitter (2½ kw.) is 875

miles away.

(1) I know of no reasonably priced set, with the possible exception of the Philips 2802 (selling at about £22, with batteries, etc.), suited to our peculiar requirements. We want something to receive short, medium and long waves. Quality is not so important as quantity, so to speak.

Component Faults

Components are legion, of course, but even the best makers send out unimpregnated transformers and condensers filled with tar. A temperature of 115 deg. in the shade and a humidity of 85 or more do not help keep these in good condition.

(2) The usual British carton never arrives whole, and one is lucky if the contents are undamaged. Thin bakelite cases are neat but not particularly strong, and it is asking for trouble to put a 3-lb. transformer in a one-sixteenth inch bakelite shroud. Lurid greens and reds do not always attract, as one well-known firm seems to imagine.

(3) Prices are far too high. We pay 50 per cent. duty on c.i.f. prices. After all, the overseas dealer cannot 'phone or send a postcard when he is short of stock, and must, therefore, be overloaded if he is to supply even the majority of the read of his even the majority of the needs of his customers. This means so much dead capital.

Coupled with high prices, I would mention too wide a selection. Take valves, for instance. How can any dealer in a small way ever hope to stock the 1,001 types available? Isn't there much to be said for the American

(4) In this country people are inherently conservative, and ask for and accept only such goods as they see advertised in the usual popular magazines. Blue Spot speakers outsell all others. Lissen and Telsen products and Mullard valves all go well.

Boom Soon

The dealer naturally stocks what he can sell, and is disinclined to push lines of probably equal merit that are, however, comparatively unknown. The manufacturer who nurses India for a time will reap his reward. Wireless will boom out here within the next

three years.

(5) There are many reasons for the refusal of dealers to handle any but certain lines.

One of them is the question of sole agencies.

Personally I strongly object to selling articles on which some other firm is drawing a rake-off, although the chances are ten to one they have no stocks themselves. Manufacturers should give the same discounts on all direct orders from accredited firms but should resolutely discountenance dabblers. It is very common for some back-street bazaar firm to adopt a high-sounding title and print impressive stationery and get away with it. They never by any chance maintain prices and are content to take 5 per cent. profit.

There is also the question of damaged goods. To return the damaged article to England and to pay the charges on the replacement kill the profit. It would be preferable to allow an extra discount to cover small claims. This is done by some American manufacturers in the case of valves.

Data Needed

Finally, the British manufacturer seems to forget that a picture carries very little weight with a technical man. Only to-day we have received a leaflet from London dealing with a pick-up. It omits to state :- Performance curve, weight on needle, whether there is any provision for feather-weighting, impe-

dance, discounts.

Let the British manufacturer remember that trade in England is not always going to be as good as at present, and although our orders are almost negligible just now they

will rapidly expand.

BIRMINGHAM BATTERY H.P. **SCHEME**

SIR,—I was interested to note in your last issue that the Birmingham W.R.A. had decided to adopt a scheme whereby dry batteries may be purchased by small additional payments in conjunction with the hire-

purchase of receivers.

I may state that in my own business I have had the scheme in operation now for the last two years, and have found it very effective and successful.

I say to my customers: "You ought to pay an extra shilling per week, together with your payment towards H.T. batteries," and after having explained to them that the average life of a dry battery is approximately three months, and that 1s. per week for each quarter will purchase a good H.T. battery, they invariably fall in with the idea.

A dealer should have one source of supply either through the manufacturer or factor, but never both.

In my opinion, "A person or firm should only be considered eligible for trade terms when in the occupation of business premises, a portion of which has been allotted entirely to the display of radio goods."

If this were adopted a number of people who are at present mixing trades would have to make some attempt to do the thing properly

In the case of new accounts, manufacturers and wholesalers, when not represented on the spot, would have to ask for photographs of the premises before supplying any goods.

Makers' Attitude

I have made the above definition as concise as possible, for I think that these conditions are as much as the average manufacturer and wholesaler will agree to look for before doing

business with anyone.

Unfortunately, there are too many wholesalers in the country who will send catalogues to anybody. Two friends of mine, one a haulage contractor and the other a draper, have recently received radio catalogues with out asking for them from wholesalers with whom they do business.

In this town (with a population of 2,500)

A railway booking clerk, a hairdresser, a fishmonger, two electricians living in private houses with no other place of business, a rate collector, a retired saddler still using his oddyses, a ratheol teacher, and four grander. address, a school teacher, and four garages, not one of which makes any sort of radio

All dealers, I'm sure, appreciate the heavy cost involved in securing world-renowned artistes to record compositions by famous composers.





Experts on Selectivity

RESEARCH BOARD AND SIDE-BAND THEORY

The findings of a committee appointed by the Radio Research Board to examine the properties of *High Selectivity Tone Corrected* Radio Receiving Circuits are given in a report published under that title by H.M. Stationery

The committee set out to answer these two questions :

Is the performance of highly selective receivers consistent with accepted theory?

What are the advantages or disadvantages of such receivers in relation to the practical problem of discriminating between wanted and unwanted transmissions?

With regard to the first, the committee find that super-selective circuits behave quite in accordance with the side band theory.

Practical Aspect

Passing to the practical aspect, the report defines two types of interference. With the first, the unwanted transmission is heard mtelligibly. The second is due to interaction of the wanted carrier wave with the carrier wave and side bands of the unwanted station and is unintelligible.

The committee find that if the selectivity of the receiving circuit is increased sufficiently, the first type of interference can be cut out. In practice, however, the required degree of selectivity is not always permissible, due to conditions of circuit and transmission stability.

Interference

With the second kind of interference, increase of selectivity will only be beneficial if the interfering note is outside the audio-frequency range essential to satisfactory re-production. Then the selectivity may be in-creased until the interference and some of the side bands are no longer received.

If the interference occurs in the audible range necessary for reproduction, it can only be reduced by special circuits sacrificing the particular frequencies on which it occurs. The reproduction will necessarily be impaired.

What the committee's findings mean is that a receiver can only give interference-free re-ception if its response is limited to audio-frequencies less than half the frequency difference between two neighbouring transmissions. The audio-frequency range of the transmitters

must be similarly limited.

The minimum carrier frequency separation between stations is, therefore, ultimately dependent on the audio-frequency range considered necessary for satisfactory reproduction.

THE Edison Bell five-valve superheterodyne is mounted in a very large cabinet of polished walnut. The top is rounded, and there is a moulding round the base.

Unusual Dial

A decorative grille is used for the speaker, and below it are three controls and two bakelite escutcheons, one for each of the two wavebands. An interesting dial is fitted, which gives a complete rotation. This is accomplished, of course, by a 2-1 step-up gearing.

The chassis is of pressed metal, sprayfinished. On the top are the six valves, the two intermediate screened coils, and the triple gang condenser. A very interesting detail is the mounting of the pilot lamp on a pivoted lever that can be pulled forward to facilitate changing the lamp when required.

Connection is made to the mains by 6 ft. Connection is made to the mains by 6 ft. of flex fitted with a moulded plug and adaptor. There is a small removable plate at the back of the chassis, beneath which is the mains voltage adjuster. There are also sockets for acrial and earth, pick-up and external speaker. A plug provides for a mains aerial.

Moving-coil Speaker

The speaker is an Edison Bell energised moving-coil type. It is fitted with a large diaphragm which is exceptionally free, and it is fed by an input transformer that is much larger than usual.

The valve combination appears to consist of an initial stage of high-frequency amplifica-tion carried out by a variable-mu valve. An oscillating detector valve is used in the next stage, followed by an intermediate amplifier, a second detector, and a pentode output valve. The valves used are two Mullard MM4V's, a Mazda AC/SG, a Mullard 354V, a Mazda AC/PEN, and an Osram U.12 rectifier.

Very sound and sturdy construction characterises the set. The components are of good quality and are neatly assembled and mounted.

Control of the set is very easy, because there are only a single tuning knob and a volume control, in addition, of course, to the wave-change switch. The volume control switches the set off in the minimum position. The dials are reasonably accurately calibrated

"Definitely Good"

The performance on both wavebands definitely good. On the long waves all the main stations were received quite free from interference at good room strength.

Zeesen was received with substantially no background from either 5XX or Radio Paris.

On the medium waveband the selectivity was good, although it was not quite as good as on the long waveband. We were unable to receive Stuttgart clear of London Regional at a distance of 10 miles.

The strength from all the usual Continental stations was ample for a large room, and the sensitivity was sufficient to give reasonable strength from some of the weaker transmissions. Considerable use had to be made of the volume control on all the usual powerful stations.

As regards quality, we found that there is a slight difference with the medium and long wavebands, due, presumably, to greater side-band cutting. The general nature of the reproduction is crisp and clear, with a reasonable amount of bass. The middle frequencies are well in evidence.

The reproduction is by no means coloured, and the general nature of the tone is such that it should make a very good appeal.

The set gives a very pleasing performance, and we think that, with its good appearance and reasonable price, it should sell easily.

STOKMAR MAINS STRIKING CLOCK

A SYNCHRONOUS mains clock fitted with A SYNCHRONOUS mains clock fitted with a striking mechanism is more than usually interesting. Under the name, "Stokmar," a range of these is made by Stockall, Marples and Co., Ltd., of 6, 8, and 10, Clerkenwell Road, London, E.C.1.

The model tested is a mantelpiece type mounted in a polished, relieved oak cabinet with a figured front and decorative edge. The dial is fitted with a handsome chromium.

dial is fitted with a handsome, chromiumplated bezel, and is itself silvered and provided with black letters.

A self-starting synchronous motor drives the hands through the usual hour train. For the striking mechanism the driving power is derived from a small barrel spring which is energised through the hand movement. Rota-

tion of the hands, while the clock is working, winds up the spring.

From the striking point of view the clock behaves just like a spring model. There is the usual strike warning, and the mechanism employs, presumably, one of the conventional

systems.

There is a red spot indicator which shows

if the clock has stopped.

The clock is extremely well made throughout. Careful examination of the mechanism revealed that cut gears are used, and the mechanism is by no means a cheap produc-Workmanship is of a very high order The motor is reasonably powerful and is able to drive the hands without the least suspicion of hunting. It must be remembered that although the motor is small, it is extremely powerful, as it operates through a reduction gearing. Quite appreciable force is required to rotate the hands, especially as they work against the action of the striking spring.


The fact that the motor is powerful enough to do this shows that there should be no possibility of it failing through carelessness, arising out of dust clogging the mechanism. The delicate part of the train in the region of the driving wheels is, in any case, completely enclosed, and therefore dust proof.

The insulation resistance and loading, which is negligible, are extremely satisfactory, as indicated in the table. The plug connection is a neat affair, and we regard the clock as a very good production from every point of

R. AND A "BANTAM"

The method of mounting the cone of the "Bantam" moving coil speaker made by Reproducers and Amplifiers, of Wolverhampton, was not correctly described in the test report in the September 17 issue.

The ring used in the construction is not of cardboard, as stated, but is of leather board. It is not riveted to the chassis, but is clamped by six heavy gauge steel sectors which are riveted on with solid aluminum

THE Gecophone Nomad four-valve D.C. receiver is one of the most solidly built we have yet examined. The cabinet is a very substantial affair, built on bold, modern lines from heavy walnut which has a dull finish. The grille is severe and follows the modern

lines of the cabinet.

There is a deep, illuminated escutcheon, below which are three small knobs. One is a push-pull switch giving distant and local positions. On the right is a combined volume and on-off control, and to the left is a combined waveband and gramophone switch.

An energised moving-coil speaker is fitted, screwed to the baffle board in the usual manner. It has a fairly free cone and an input transformer of reasonable size.

The chassis is very rigidly built. On the top are mounted a three-gang condenser, the tuning coils and the valves, which are arranged in line. The voltage adjuster, large replaceable fuses, and some of the other components are also on the top. ponents are also on the top.

At the back are plugs for pick-up, speaker, earth and two alternative aerial connections. The back consists of a thin sheet of wood with very large gauze-backed holes to minimise box resonance. The set is exceptionally sturdily built throughout.

Pleasing Reproduction

The performance is excellent. Dealing first with the quality, this is very crisp and clean and definitely free from marked resonances. The response falls away a little in the lowest bass, but the balance is extremely pleasing.

Ample volume can be obtained for quite a large room without overloading.

On the long waves, all the main stations were received very easily without any trace of hum. There was no break-through from the medium waves whatever.

The better performance, however, is undoubtedly obtained on the medium waveblant.



BOOSTING THE BASS

Technical Hints and Tips

IN the normal parallel-feed L.F. circuit, a suitable value for the coupling condenser is .5 mfd.

When it is desired to obtain a resonance with the primary inductance to boost the bass values from .02 to .1 mfd. are required, however

Particularly with mains sets, stimulating the bass frequently leads to trouble. Deficiencies in decoupling may become obvious and residual hum may be amplified unpleasantly.

Push-Pull Input

T is a simple matter to use two ordinary L.F. transformers for the input to push-pull output valves.

A resistance-fed circuit can be used, the primaries of the two transformers being connected in series between the coupling condenser and earth. The H.T. terminal of one goes to negative, and its anode terminal is joined to the H.T. of the other.

is joined to the H.T. of the other.

The secondaries are each connected to one of the output valves in the usual way, separate provisions for bias being made in each case.

This has the advantage that the bias can be adjusted to suit each valve.

An Advantage

ONE advantage of push-pull output is that for a given volume, smaller valves with higher amplification factors can be used. Thus the over-all gain of the set will be greater.

Actually, a greater grid swing can also be applied to a push-pull valve than could be done without distortion if the valve was used separately. This is because even if the swing does go beyond the straight part of the characteristic curve in one direction, due the characteristic curve in one direction, due to the other valve, a sine wave output is still obtained.

P.A. Speakers

SPEAKERS for P.A. should always be placed high in a room so that the sound is thrown forward over the heads of the audience.

Another point particularly to be observed with speakers on large baffles, is that if they are mounted near a wall they should be at an argle to it and not parallel. In the latter

an atgle to it and not parallel. In the latter position results may be impaired by reflection effects between the wall and the baffle. If one speaker mounted on a baffle is being used for dancing, it is a good idea to place it high up in the centre of the hall so that the sound is more evenly distributed. A tone control is a useful fitting to a P.A. unit. It can be used to give crisp reproduction for speech when above everything clarity is wanted, and a rounded tone with predominate bass for, say, dancing. dominate bass for, say, dancing.















Band Pass Tuning

Nevertheless, he has taken care to provide parallel descriptions in language that can be understood by the novice. The result is a book that is an elementary and an advanced text-book.

The first chapter explains radio transmission. Then the book goes on to describe how distortion can be introduced in H.F. receiving stages and the methods of avoiding it-

ing stages and the methods of avoiding it—e.g., band-pass tuning.

Component by component, right to the speaker, is dealt with, always explaining the method of function and giving the requisites for distortionless operation.

OPPORTUNITIES IN ALGERIA

French Associations Act Against Price Cutting

Strong attempts to secure strict maintenance of list prices is being made in both Paris and Lyons by their respective traders' and manufacturers' associations, the S.P.I.R.

and manufacturers associations, the S.P.I.R. and the S.N.I.R.

The Broadcaster Paris correspondent states that this move has been long delayed.

The S.P.I.R of Paris, he adds, has just sent its members a list of recommendations concerning the sale of radio goods. These emphasise the obligation not to give discounts to any person not a recognized trader. counts to any person not a recognised trader.

Such dealers pay a special tax to the State.

Although somewhat different in its methods, the S.N.I.R. or Lyons is taking the same stand. This association goes a step

the same stand. This association goes a step further, however, and insists that its members shall give purchasers a year's guarantee with full service during that period.

Maximum service rates have been fixed by this association. The night rate is just under 10s. for the first hour at the present rate of exchange, and about 3s. 6d. an hour afterwards. Day rates are about 7s. for the first hour and 2s. 6d. an hour afterwards.

NOTTS STATIC TESTS

Following complaints, notably by the Not-tingham branch of the W.R.A., and the visit of a deputation which included Mr. J. Thornton (Thornton and Vowles, Ltd.), chairman of the branch, to the manager of the Notting-ham Passenger Transport Department, tests were carried out between 11.30 p.m. and mid-night on 'Tuesday of a "stopper" coil de-signed to eliminate the interference.

Two special vehicles, one carrying the coil and the other not so equipped, were driven along the affected route, and twelve observers took note of the effects at different points, using receivers in residents' houses. Reports apparently were somewhat contradictory. It is expected, however, that the results will be communicated officially to the local W.R.A. members in due course.

NO BRITISH SETS IN **JUGOSLAVIA**

Although imports of radio apparatus into Algeria have been restricted of late under the quota system instituted by the French Government, the market is considered to be of grow-

ing importance.
Sets to suit the market should be able to receive most of the European transmitters, and the price should be about £36 at the current rate of exchange. Battery sets are now being sold for about £10.

They should be of the super-heterodyne or

band-pass type, and should cover wavelengths from 200 to 2,000 metres. Mains supply voltages, 120 volts A.C. 50 cycles in Algiers, and between 110 and 115 volts A.C. 50 cycles elsewhere.

elsewhere.

No radio manufacturers are in business in the country, but a number of dealers make sets from components.

A list of dealers in Algeria, together with other useful information on this market, is available from the Department of Overseas Trade, 35, Old Queen Street, London, S.W.1.

The chief sources of supply of radio goods for Yugoslavia are Germany, Holland and America. There are no British sets on this market.

American Sets

About 18 months ago American sets were not known, but they are now competing strongly with other makes of receiver. Much of their popularity is said to be due to the superior selectivity and quality of the U.S.A. products.

products.

American prices are lower than corresponding European prices, but on the other hand supplies are only available for cash and on minimum orders of 50 or 100 sets.

About 90 per cent. of sets in use are for mains operation, but there is a wide difference in the supply voltages available.

The main supplies are 200 and 110 volts 50 cycles, 110 volts 42 cycles, and 220 and 110 volts D.C. In villages and outlying districts an assortment of supply voltages is to be found.

"The market exists here for really selective sets which can completely cut out the local stations," states the Department of Overseas Trade in a report on the matter.


