



# Little Richard

THERE is a theory that for a record artiste to remain popular he must be seen in person by his devoted public. One person who blows such a theory sky-high is our cover personality this week, Little Richard.

Not only has he never been seen in this country—with the exception of a couple of movies—but he is no longer an active entertainer even in

ast summer, Little Richard decided to set aside the attractions of show business and he entered the Oakwood Adventist College on a term of two years intense study.

His decision, not an easy one,
was neither hurried nor eccentric. He has always been
deeply religious. His early
life, one of humble and hard
surroundings, had been firmly
tied to religious beliefs.

orn in Macon, Georgia, on Christmas Day, 1935, Little Richard was determined that one of his missions in life would be to make things easier for his family.

His first singing opportunities came through the local church choir and then, a little later, he began singing with travel-ling shows and entering talent competitions.



FROM the tangled, shattered metal of a crashed car, the body of Hank Williams, singer, was taken to the morgase. Hank be more famous dead than alive. Hank Williams, country and western disciple, around whose muste there has grown a fervid James Dean Ble call of the

Dean, too, had died at the wheel of a car and his fame was to live on with the American

When he died on New Year's day, 1953, Hank Williams had had released only 12 of his discs, among which was an LP.

Since his death, a further 25 exceeds have been issued by the control of th teenager.



This means that if the average This means that if the average total of American records in our hit parade is 75 per cent, the Americans produce records that are, on average, 75 per cent better than ours. By better I mean more commercials.

This may sound a very materialistic interpretation of the word better, but how close can one judge popular music except by the extent of its popularity—or in other words, by the number of people who like it enough to want to buy it?

On this system of rating-which I believe to be the only sound one the American records are cer-tainly at least 75 per cent better than ours. They are more profes-

The British popular records, with certain notable exceptions, are pro-duced with the ineffectual enthusiasm of amateur theatricals, by

gentlemen who at the back of their minds believe that there are certain inherent qualities and standards that matter in popular music whether they are appreciated by the public or not. "The public may not like this, but I know at is good," is often the

attitude. The American approach is, "If the public don't like this, then it sticks." And they are right.

If a product doein't get across to the public for whom it should have been created, it has failed. There, is no gut, no life in the art for art's sake" angle.

### It's wrong

The idea that there can be some-thing good in a record irrespective of whether it is appreciated or not is an example of wrong thinking. is an example of wrong thinking. A quality does not exist in its own right, It is something that has to be appreciated. And if it isn't appreciated, it isn't there. For a Jong, long, time learned scholars tried to discover the reason for. Shakespeare's greatness, as a writer. They delved and probed for embracing philosophy which could be shown to be the foundation of

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
