JET HARRIS is almost certain to make his comeback to show business on the forthcoming John Leyton tour which opens at the Granada, Edmonton, on February 8. He will probably be featured as a soloist with backing provided by The Impressions. Jet Harris was involved in a car crash last September and received bad hand and head injuries. Also hurt in the crash with him was Billie Hayes, who has since had a new disc released called "That Boy John." Jet's manager, Roy Moskow, also claims that Jet has been offered a film part and that there has already been discussions with a director of one of Britain's leading film companies.

He told DISC on Monday that he could not confirm whether the tour would mark Jet's return.

It opens at the Edmonton Granada on February 8, Subsequent dates are Birmingham Odeon (9), Cheltenham Odeon (10), Tuanbridge Wells Excalibur (11), Guildford Odeon (12), Kingston Granada (13), Bristol Colston Hall (14), Portsmouth Guildhall (16), Greenwich Odeon (17), Colchester Odeon (18), Stockport Odeon (19), and Liverpool Empire (20).

The tour continues at Liverpool Empire (March 1), Nottingham Albert Hall (2), Birmingham Odeon (3), Bradford Gaumont (4), Blackburn Odeon (5), Wolverhampton Gaumont (6) and ends at the Morecambe Winter Gardens (7).

The Swinging Blue Jeans will play inclusive dates between February 9-14, February 16-20 and February 23-27.

TV dates for the group are "Five Go 'O Clock Club" (January 10), "Go Man Go" (January 17), "First Date" (January 24), "The Saturday Show" (January 19), "The Arthur Haynes Show" and "Twin Beat," both on January 25, and Anglia's "Music Match" on January 29.

"I wanted to record for a long time," he told me. "Because I've got it in my head to follow up the success of Big Ben Crispard which made it in 1946. Our version has really started to get noticed. It's just the round I wanted."

The girls picked up part of her surname, though, and added "Ronette" to their group, "declared Ronnie. "We're a pop team. I guess we do what we do best. We try to sing the 'New York sound' in our work, but actually we do all our recording in California."

"Your British audiences are very good," said Ronnie. "They have a great appreciation and admiration," said Nedra. "We're doing exactly the same act as we do on lock here, and we're doing it everywhere."

GERRY MARSDEN, WHO PENNED HIS LATEST SINGLE, REVEALS HOW HE WRITES HIS SONGS

GERRY and The Pacemakers were playing a one-nighter at an hotel in Lowestoft and late in the afternoon, Gerry drifted down to the hotel ballroom to get his guitar in tune with the piano. A passing singer stopped and "commented" as he was tuning. Gerry dashed back to his room, played the phrase over, added to it, and immediately taped it.

The next day, the Pacemakers travelled to London, and in his hotel room, Gerry played the tape and worked out a lyric.

"It's All Right" is the "A" side of his new disc to be released tomorrow (Friday).

"We've written several numbers," said Gerry between houses of his pastime—“Babes in the Wood.” “And that's the way most of them happen.”

• On a train

“We were in the train one time, travelling to London when one of the girls said to me that ‘You’ve Got What I Like’ would make a good song title. We were on our own in the compartment so out came a guitar, we worked on it—and the result is the ‘B’ side of our new single,” he said.

“It’s All Right,” which is the “B” side of “You’ll Never Walk Alone,” is another short that had a strange birth. “I was collecting my car from a garage in Hyde Park,” said Gerry. “I suddenly a phrase came to me. I hummed it around for a bit—got the words in my head—and stayed there until the song was complete, and finally fixed in on paper.”

“We have three numbers ready now, which we may possibly record when we do an LP session very soon. Two of them have never been played in public yet.
