"A HARD DAY'S NIGHT," written especially to be the tille song of their film and released on July 10, opens with a transcadous guitar chord. Chosen by George Harrison and played by him on the 12-string guitar, this chord is the first illustration of how deliberately the number was tailored for the screen.

The chord, hard and lond, has to make its impact over the noise of screening fass and other sound-effects. Away from the screen this tingact is equally effective. It leads into a steady stamping number which has most of the vocal work being done by John Lennon. He hasks out the simple words forcefully and with some interjections from Paul McCastney.

Midway there's a fascinating instrumental break. It blends piano with free guitars (Paul and George) and the result is a delicate, charming effect.

"THINGS WE SAID TODAY" is another Lennon-McCartney composition, but this time Paul leafs the vocal. A more subdued ballad which flows pleasantly and on a good melodic line. This sumber is NOT being featured in the lift but is being used on the forthcoming LP.
