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



First of four articles introducing the Arizona desert, by Colin Willock

World without water

MAGINE a place where it can freeze at night but where the day temperature often reaches one hundred and eighty degrees!

I'm not talking about the moon, but about a desert—the Arizona desert. Near Tucson, Arizona, wildlife cameraman Des
Barflett, his wife Jen and thirteen-year-old daughter Julie

have been making lots of natural history films for Survival. Admittedly, the Arizona desert doesn't sound like a place where many animals would choose to live. You'd think they'd either boil alive or freeze to death. In fact, the desert down there is bursting with strange and wonderful

This is the first point I want to put over to you in this weekly Nature series. There's practically nowhere on earth, save maybe the Poles or the tops of the highest mountains, where some form of life can't make itself completely at home. Just look at a few of the plants you find in the Arizona desert, for example.

Firstly, there's the giant Saguaro cactus (pronounced su-wah-ro). It stands as tall as thirty feet and can weigh ten tons (see above picture). I'm sure you've seen its huge fingers pointing skywards in hundreds of western films though, actually, it only grows in this one part of the United States. These cacti live for up to a hundred years. If they should die before then, it is usually because they've been struck by lightning during a fierce storm. Most of the

other plants that grow around them are spiky cacti, too. For plants, just like animals, have to be tough to survive in this unfriendly landscape.

The Saguaro, like everyone else, needs a drink. But in this desert, it only rains once or twice a year—though when it does, it produces a flood. So what does the Saguaro do? It saves up a mighty thirst, often for six months or more. Then, when the rains come, it drinks and drinks. It drinks so much that you can even watch it swell. You see, this cactus has adjusted itself to nearly impossible living conditions.

The Arizona desert is very rich in lizards and snakes and this, of course, means that there are plenty of other creatures which get their living by hunting them. The Chuckwallah (see front cover) is a large desert lizard that has worked out its own special defence scheme. It wedges itself into a hollow in the rocks and then blows itself up so that it fits like a cork in a bottle and its attacker can't pull it out.

The second idea I want to tell you about is this: animals never come to be in any special kind of country—whether forest or desert—simply by accident. They are there because it suits them and to some extent because they have learned to suit it. This means that Nature finds a way of populating any landscape you care to name.

THE Gilo (pronounced Heelo) Monster, is the only poisonous litard in North America, it does not have famp like a snake. When it bites its victim, the poison runs down grooves in its teeth and mixes with the solive to enter the wound. So a man would have time to shake it off, or pull it loose. Small snakes, birds and other litards are not so fortunate. The Monster loves birds' eggs which provide its staple diet.

THEY call it the Horned Toad, though its real name is the Regal Horned Lizard. These tiny lizards became so popular as pets that in Arizona their capture for sale to pet shops was banned. You need sharp eyes to shot one when it's sitting still. It exactly matches the desert. They live on ants and other small insects. Their neatest trick is to squirt blood out of their eyes at attackers—surely that's enough to scare off any predator.





A REAL desert citizen and comic character who's anything but funny to a snake. The Road-runner is a large, ungainly desert bird that would far rather run than fly, and can touch speeds of nearly 20 m.p.h. over the flat desert surface. The Road-runner lives by catching lizards and snakes. It's very quick and quite fearless. This one has just killed a poisons Side-winder rattlesnake. Learn more about the Sidewinder next week.





Tennis Talk



POWERFUL service and a devastating volley-the two significant features of Virginia Wade's game. Her career in tennis has been a strange mixture of success and failure.

Virginia was born at Bournemouth, in 1945. The very next year she went to live in South Africa. She was 16 years old when she returned to England, and it was just about then she made up her mind to be a great tennis player.

"I was absolutely crazy about the game, I was willing to work hard and I felt that I could be better than anyone else.

"Unless that is your attitude, you might as well forget any sporting aspirations you may have," says Virginia.

Her talent was soon noticed and just two years after her return to this country she became a ranked player. Then followed her university studies. But by 1966 she was back on the warpath. In 1967, she won the British Hard Court title, and '68 was a year she will never forget. It was then that she won the American Open-the first British player to do so for nearly forty years! Virginia had proved to herself that she could be better than anyone else. But that win in America has not been the breakthrough we all thought it would be.

Certainly Virginia has had her share of success since thenthough not in the big games. But so competitive and talented is she, that '71 could be her year.

TAKE A TIP!

Another British player with a big serve is Roger Taylor. It's a serve that has taken him a long way down the professional road. While Roger was resting for the 1971 onslaught I asked him how he produces those devastating aces.

"It's not so much power," he said, "as time."

And when you think of it, time and tempo are the keys to success in so many sports.

The Eton Wall Game is played only at the famous public school of Eton. The wall is 118 yards long and the bitch from the wall is only five yards wide. At one end of the wall is a door, at the other end a tree and these are the goals. The teams of ten-a-side have to propel the ball along the pitch, nearly always along the wall, towards either goal. Goals are very rarely scored and the matches are usually decided on 'shies', that is a score when the ball touches the wall in a scoring area near the goal. It's a tough game, as you can imagine!





"It's not," came the reply. "As skipper of the Top Ten Soccer Eleven, I have to go to football training at the gym. Care to join me?"


Suddenly, my eyes ached and my legs felt like lead. I couldn't stand any more. Ed pulled up the car and I scrambled out.

Fold

MAGPIE STUDIO (continued)

Follow the Instructions on this page to add to your FREE GIFT studio.

Then carefully cut out Puff, his stable and the Floor Manager, and their separate bases. Note: do not cut out the white area between Puff's two sides.





of their recent trip . . .







Follow the instructions on this page to add to your FREE GIFT studio.

BEFORE you start to cut any of the items, carefully remove the entire centre spread and stick on to a piece of card thin enough to fold easily (about the same thickness as the Free Gift sheet).

Trim around the studio background. Fold the two sides forwards along the dotted lines (indicated) and stand upright.

Then carefully cut out Puff, his stable and the Floor Manager, and their separate bases. Note: do not cut out the white area between Puff's two sides.

Fold Puff along the dotted centre line which joins him at his feet. Stick him together with a little glue. Make the two cuts-marked near his feet-and slot in the two white bases to make him stand.
