Next Week: Fun at the Fair!

THE SHOWDOWN AT SUNSET in the deserted main street of Dodge City, Kansas. Both Marshal and gunman square up, a dozen yards apart. A blur of action, the roar of six-shooters, and the 'baddie' collapses in the dust... That's the sort of scene that has made the Western such an exciting part of television history. Dodge City has been the setting of one of ITV's longest-running Westerns,

A LOOK-IN ON TV WESTERN

HHY Gunsmoke, which started on television (entitled Gun Law) back in 1956, when the actor who plays Marshal Matt Dillon-James Arness-was only known as the protége of the greatest Western actor of them all, film star John Wayne.

Wayne taught Arness the ropes. Now Matt Dillon, 6ft. 6in. tall, 14-stone, fast with a gun, modest and quietly

spoken, is typical of the TV Western hero.

Such characters, however, aren't all hotshot lawmen. One of the most popular of TV Westerns, Wagon Train featured stories about the Wagon Master, Scout, and early pioneers who blazed a trail westward in covered wagons. Many great film actors, like Mickey Rooney, Charles Laughton, Lee Marvin, and Raymond Massey, made guest appearances in this series.

Wagon Train also made a big star of a hitherto littleknown actor called Robert Horton. He was such a success as Scout Flint McCullough, that he later starred in his own Western series, A Man Called Shenandoah. This time he played a cowboy with a lost memory, who was searching for his identity and background.

Actor Clint Eastwood, now an international film star,

first made his name as a television Western hero as the gawky Ramrod Rowdy Yates in Rawhide, a series about cattle drives-and the men that drove them. And, of course, many of the legendary characters, both heroes and villains, have provided material for TV westerns-like The Legend of Jesse James, stories of the famed Wild West outlaw.

Television has produced individual Western heroes a'plenty. It has also introduced sagas set around families and ranches. For many years, the Cartwrights-on their sprawling ranch, The Ponderosa, which stretched from the shores of Lake Tahoe to the slopes of the sierras and east to the desert around Virginia City were the best-known family on television.

Father Ben Cartwright (Lorne Greene), and sons Adam (Pernell Roberts), Hoss (Dan Blocker) and Little Joe (Michael Landon), defended their family name and wealth from rustlers, speculators, silver barons and killers for hundreds of episodes.


The success of that series, you will probably remember, led to the introduction of another Western family: The Barkleys, in The Big Valley, starring Barbara Stanwyck as the hard-hitting widow, Victoria Barkley.

Westerns aren't all drama and gunfights. One of the unusual ones is F Troop, a comedy cowboys-and-Indians

series about life in a Cavalry troop.





Life in Labrador

Tony Bastable writes about Canada's coldest corner.

If I could select a location to go filming in the winter, I would choose somewhere warm — like the *Bahamas*! But, as luck would have it, my MAGPIE trip at the end of March took me across the world to the coldest RAF station on Earth—Goose Bay, Labrador. For geography en-

thusiasts, that's the most northerly district in the Province of Newfoundland, in Canada.

Our mission? To discover just what living conditions were like in that part of the world.

I flew there from RAF Brize Norton in a VC10 of Air Support Command, and I soon discovered one thing about Goose Bay—there were no geese there. It was far too cold. The station was so named to create a 'mate' for another lonely spot nearby—Gander.

In extreme temperatures like this, the RAF insists that every man is issued with specially-designed protective clothing. One day, I tried it all on. Believe me, after fifteen or sixteen layers, I began to feel like a stuffed penguin. But even so, in the depths of winter (and during my stay, I was informed it was nearly spring) the men can only work outside for a few minutes at a time. If they remain out for longer, they run the risk of getting frostbitten.

These days, the station itself is used by the dramatic-looking bombers of Strike Command. We spent several hours filming the aircraft taking off, landing and being serviced. The sub-zero conditions here certainly teach the service crews one important fact—how to service an aircraft well in the shortest possible time! The crews also have to learn special tricks to beat the weather. For instance, an aircraft's wheels must be covered while it is stationary. If this is not done, they will freeze solid to the concrete in minutes!


The station boasts its own physical training instructor— Corporal Mick Storey. He organises indoor games as well as snowshoeing and tobogganing. I had an absolutely great time on the toboggan runs.

Because of the absence of roads in Goose Bay, whenever I wished to travel anywhere I had to use a ski-doo. This machine

is literally a combination of a motor-bicycle and a sledge. It has a powered caterpillar track at its rear, and movable skis for steering at the front.

At the end of the week it was time to pack up the cameras and go home. As I flew for hours over the vastness of Newfoundland I had a special thought. I was really better off going to Goose Bay instead of the Bahamas—at least I had no difficulty in keeping away from the crowds!





HOW is it that fish can breathe under water but we cannot? Julie Jones, Swaythling, Southampton.

Our lungs are not made for underwater breathing: a fish's gills are. To breathe, a fish takes in water through its mouth and then closes the sides of its throat together, which pushes the water through the gills' openings on each side of its head. The water passes over the gills, which are so made that they can take oxygen from it. The oxygen goes into the gills' blood vessels and on into the blood to the rest of the body. Carbon dioxide (waste product) passes out through the gills.

If you count the giant Californian redwood trees as plants, then 'General Sherman' in the Sequola National Park gets the prize for being the biggest living thing on earth. Its base circumference is 101 ft. 7 in. Seventeen men, with their arms outstretched, are needed to encircle it? Experts think the tree weighs 6,000 tons!

Also in California is a Giant Chinese Witerla, claimed to be the world's largest blossoming plant. Planted nearly eighty years ago, it has branches 500 feet long.





THESCAVENGERS

THEY'RE THE DUSTMEN OF AFRICA. A tattered crew with a down-at-heel look as they hop around with hunched 'shoulders' and ragged feathers flapping round them. At least, that's the way they always look on the ground. They're the vultures.

Vultures fill most people with loathing and disgust. Naturalists, myself included, don't feel like that at all. Whenever I see a gathering of vultures on the African plains, my first reaction is one of gratitude for the public service they perform.

I grant you that when you see him on the ground, a vulture isn't exactly beautiful. But once he gets airborne, that's something very different. Vultures are one of the most graceful and efficient fliers in the world of birds.

It's absolutely essential to their way of life that they should be. They use their superb flying powers, not only to spot dead animals on the ground but also to travel hundreds of miles in search of food. And in doing so they hardly ever flap their wings.

Vultures are soaring birds. They can use the air currents with an ease that makes human glider-pilots green with envy. Like a glider pilot, they rely on 'thermals'—columns of hot air that rise over rocks, open spaces; anywhere that collects and holds the heat of the sun. Above such features, the thermal, or hot air current, rises rapidly for sometimes ten thousand feet or more.

The vultures feel the lift of the thermal under their wings and allow themselves to be wafted up on it. They turn in a tight circle to keep inside the thermal and, as they swing round, they keep an eye out for dead animals on the plains beneath.

Often it isn't a carcase they spot, but the shapes of other vultures dive-bombing down out of the sky. Then they know that their companions have found a meal and swing down to join them.

When one thermal dies on them, they have to use a wing flap or two until they find the next one. But they waste as little energy as possible.

There are at least six kinds of vultures on the plains. When feeding, they have a distinct 'pecking order'. This means that certain members of the community get priority.

The bigger ones, like the Griffon and the Lappet-faced, eat first. The junior vultures have to wait for their share.

Two of the most interesting species have special parlour tricks that help them feed. The Egyptian vulture has learned to break open ostrich eggs by throwing stones at them. The Lammergeyer, which lives in mountainous regions, drops bones from a great height to crack them to get at the marrow.

Another scavenger often found round a lion kill, competing with vultures, is the Tawny Eagle. You'd expect to find an eagle feeding in a more dignified way. The Tawny sometimes captures lizards and small mammals, but it is far more likely to be found eating carrion or hanging around camp sites for scraps.

Vultures soar upon 'thermals'—hot air columns—simply by holding their wings motionless and out-stretched.


The Balancing Match

Magnetic Water



If you put a needle on a piece of blotting paper or tissue, and then gently drop the paper on to the surface of a




glass of water, the paper will soon become saturated and sink, leaving the needle floating on the surface. Amazing, isn't it?
