Born in Queensferry, North Wales, this blond and bright all-round entertainer moved to Blackpool when he was five. Bobby now lives in Yorkshire with his wife, Jenny, and has a fifteen-monthold daughter named Sarah. I asked him if he would like her to follow in his footsteps.

"She already seems to," he replied, reminding me of an incident which occurred earlier this year while he was appearing for the summer season at a show in Scarborough.

It's fun and games for the Tiddleywinks—the toy-town residents—while Bobby tips his topper as a salute to them.

"My wife brought Sarah along to the theatre during my act. Next moment, I looked round from the audience to see my daughter pulling at my trouser leg and muttering something that resembled 'Daddy'! Sarah had toddled on to the stage when no one was looking. Talk about an early start!"

Off-stage Bobby relaxes best by simply going home. But he also enjoys a good game of golf.

"I won a prize recently," he boasted, puffing out his chest. "It was at Scarborough when I was having a round with the Bachelors, Peter Gordeno and some others. Mark you, it was the booby prize! I scored the most strokes for one hole out of all the players . . ."

Bobby claims there was only one time he ever had stage nerves—when he was due to appear at the London Palladium. But as far as 'Junior Showtime' goes, he enjoys every moment of it.





Like disciplined fireballs, the scarlet jets of the Red Arrows fill the sky with a dazzling display of daring aerobatics.

The Red Arrows of the RAF perform their brilliant stunt flying all over the world. It is supersonic showbusiness with a double purpose: to entertain the public and illustrate the skill and expertise of the trained RAF pilot.

In war and peace the gallant pilots of the RAF have created a legend of flying skill and heroism. A legend studded with names such as Douglas Bader, 'Cobber' Kain, 'Sailor' Malan, and fabulous aircraft such as the Spitfire, Hurricane and the Lancaster bomber.

The Royal Air Force was formed in April 1918-during the First World War-by the amalgamation of the Royal

Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Air Service.

A famous fighter of the period was the Sopwith Camel, a sturdy little biplane with a top speed of 150 mph and armed with two Vickers machine-guns synchronised to fire through the propeller.

The Camel destroyed more enemy planes in combat than any other Allied aircraft in the First World War. It was in a Camel that Captain Roy Brown of the RAF shot down Germany's greatest air ace, 'Red Baron' Manfred von Richthofen, in 1918.

In 1931, the RAF won the coveted Schneider Trophy outright for Britain after winning the international speed event three times in succession. These famous air races were for sea-

planes only and the RAF flew a beautifully-streamlined monoplane specially designed by R. J. Mitchell-and it was from this Schneider Trophy winner that Mitchell developed the immortal Spitfire.

Super Spitfires

In the mid 1930s, RAF aircraft were still mainly fabriccovered biplanes, with the fastest fighter speed only 220 mph. By 1939 the eight-gun Spitfire had emerged, with a speed of 360 mph. It was this superb fighter, together with the Hurricane, that defeated the mighty German air armada during the crucial Battle of A spitfire (left) and Hurricane of Reitain.

Top scoring Spitfire pilot of the RAF was Wing Commander 'Johnnie' Johnson, with thirty-eight victories. The Spitfire served with the RAF until the early 1950s, when the

Of the twenty-thousand Spitfires that were built only a rare few are still in existence, and fewer still are in flying condition. Some belong to the RAF and others are privately owned. You may be lucky enough to see a Spitfire showing its speed and style at an air display.

Famous aircraft of Bomber Command during the Second World War included the Wellington and Lancaster bombers. The celebrated 'Dam Basters' flew the four-engined Lancaster when they raided dams deep in Germany. This aircraft, like the Spitfire, can sometimes be seen flying at an air show.

Present-Day Planes

Today, the front-line fighters of RAF Strike Command are the supersonic Lightning and Phantom—both capable of flying at 1,500 mph—and the Harrier, the first VSTOL (Vertical Short Take Off and Landing) strike fighter to serve with the RAF, or any air force.

The Jet Provost is the standard basic trainer of the RAF; the advanced jet trainer

is the Gnat, the plane flown by the pilots of the Red Arrows. The lightweight Gnat is an extremely again set with a fast rate of Clarb—40,000 feet in seven grantes—and is ideal for bridging the sap between

basic trainer and frontline fighter

The deltawinged Vulcan is the RAF's long-range strategic bomber; it can fly at very high altitudes (over 65,000 feet) or very low level to get under enemy radar.

In 1972 a brand-new aircraft, the Jaguar, will enter service with the RAF. There will be two versions: a single-seat strike fighter and a two-seat trainer. The supersonic faguar is an Anglo-French project, developed jointly by the British Aircraft Corporation and Breguet Aviation.

In just over fifty years the Royal Air Force has forged a tradition of skill that is admired, and respected the world over just watch the Red Arrows in action and you'll see why



DO YOU KNOW what is the most striking difference between the animal life of the tropics and that of a very cold climate, like the Antarctic? A tropical country is filled with thousands of different species of animals, insects, birds, reptiles and mammals.

A cold climate supports very few species indeed. But great numbers of those species manage to live in freezing conditions.

It's just as if Nature has only been able to work out a few designs that can stand up to the harsh conditions and has then put them in to mass-production. Take the seals of the Antarctic as an example.

Only five of the world's thirty-one species of seals live in these freezing southern waters. But they exist in great numbers there because of the abundance of food in the sea around them.

Antarctic seals have some very interesting habits. The crab-eater seal has curiously shaped teeth that allow it to take in a mouthful of sea water and then let it drain out through the gaps between the teeth, leaving behind all the small crustaceans that it eats.

Then there's the weddell seal which cruises after prey, right to the edge of the southern ice. To cope with the icedup offshore waters, it chews vertical tunnels up through the pack ice to act as breathing holes through which it can

always get surface air.

These ice chimneys also help to protect it when it is hiding from the merciless attentions of the fierce leopard seals which prey on other seals and penguins. A big leopard seal can reach twelve feet in length and is armed with a set of teeth that wouldn't shame its African namesake of the big cat family.

The most splendid of all seals doesn't venture all the way south. You find it lording over its harem of up to fifty wives on the desolate shores of the sub-Antarctic islands, like the South Orkneys, South Georgia and even as far north as


A bull elephant seal weighs up to 8,000 lb and can stretch its vast body over twenty feet of beach. Some people call them 'sea elephants' with very good reason. They can roar like an elephant and shift their huge bulk amazingly quickly if a rival comes to challenge them for their womenfolk.

A male sea elephant could easily win a prize for the ugliest animal on earth. In the breeding season it grows an enormous bulge on the tip of its nose which makes the creature look as if it takes too much to drink.

Like many enormous animals-whales for instance—the species depends on very small items of food, but lots of them. A sea elephant has no chewing teeth so it has to swallow the fish it catches whole. When hunting it can dive hundreds of feet deep and stay under for up to seven minutes.


Seals certainly form the world's largest population of carnivores-flesh-eating animals. Like whales they were once land mammals which took to the sea, way back in the dawn of time because they found life safer there or more abundant in food


All the Antarctic seals are what are known as 'true' seals. Their rear flippers are joined and bent backwards for swimming rather than walking. The 'eared' seals are much closer to land mammals. They include sea lions, fur seals and walruses. They can be recognised by their external ears and by the fact that their back flippers are divided for walking on land.



Above: a huge Elephant Seal can weigh up to eight thousand pounds. Below: the Weddell Seal chews tunnels in the ice.











The industry dates from the 17th century. Suitable clay was found in the area and there were local coal deposits nearby for firing the kilns. The key figure in making the Staffordshire potteries world-famous was the great artist and craftsman, Josiah Wedgwood (1730-95), who was born at Burslem in Staffordshire. Starting work as a boy in the family firm, he became



an expert potter, then thought up new materials and methods of working. He made pottery inspired by ancient Greek and Roman models, and with improved clay produced wonderfully ornamental vases and urns.


Do you know what an alchemist is? In olden days, he was a man who tried to find ways to turn lead into gold. Here's an easy way to do the same kind of trick.

Copper to Silver

You drop a two-penny piece into an empty matchbox, close the box and give it a couple of shakes. When you open the box again the coin has changed to a silver one—in fact a five-penny piece.

The box must be specially prepared by cutting a slot in the end of the tray, as shown, big enough for a two-penny piece to pass through. Before you start the trick, open the box half-way, and push a five-penny piece in between the end of the tray and the cover—the dotted lines show its position.

To perform, drop the copper coin into the box, but let it slide secretly through the slot into your hand, where you must keep it hidden. Close the box with your other hand (which allows the silver coin to fall into the box), give it a shake, and then open it to show the copper coin has been transformed to silver. Always be careful to keep the slot end of the drawer away from the audience.




Heavyweight Paper

This is more a bit of fun, than a serious trick. Show your friends two similarly sized pieces of paper. You write the word 'HEAVY' on one and 'LIGHT' on the other. Then tell your audience that when you drop both pieces of paper at the same time from an equal height, the 'HEAVY' paper will reach the ground first. When they laugh at this idea, you quickly prove them wrong. Simply crumple the 'HEAVY' paper into a ball before you drop it. This will make it fall

straight down, while the 'LIGHT' paper flutters slowly to the floor.

Odd Man Out



Set up a neat pile of draughts—as shown—all the same colour except for one odd one, second up from the bottom. Now challenge your friends to remove the odd one from the pile without touching or upsetting the other pieces. Here's how! Simply place another draught on edge about four inches away from the pile, and shoot it at the pile by pressing down on it with one finger—rather like squirting a cherrystone. With a bit of practice you will be able to knock the odd draught clean out.


