

Just for the record, Bernie's other like is picnics, as distinct from chimps' tea-parties.



So they've both plenty of woodland wildlife as neighbours. Animals and Mike and Bernie Winters just seem to go





THEY ALWAYS GETTHEIR MAN.

Magpie looks at the famous 'Redcoats' the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

In the 1800s the land between Canada's Great Lakes and the towering Rocky Mountains was a huge hunting ground and home to some thirty thousand Red Indians. They roamed the plains and

hunted buffalo-their main source of food and clothing. They had lived a similar existence for centuries and no one had ever interfered.

But then their way of life began to change — very gradually at first. Occasional travellers journeyed by wagon train to the plains and traded with the Indians. The tremendous possibilities of the vast territory were soon realised. The traders increased—and began to settle. They built their log cabins on Indian lands and threatened the existence of the buffalo.

Then the real trouble began. The country began to open up even more and fortune-hunters, desperadoes and thieves drifted back and forth across the border between Canada and the United States. The Indians were influenced by the white man's bad habits. Life had become the cheapest commodity on the plains and bloodshed was frequent in the terrible period of lawlessness that followed.

The Canadian government in Ottawa decided to act. In May, 1873, the North-West Mounted Police Force was formed. The duty of this body of men was to calm the growing unrest among the Indians.

By great courage and determination they succeeded. Law and order was

installed. Even more important, the Force won the confidence of Crowfoot, chief of the powerful Blackfoot Confederacy. This led to the signing of the Blackfoot treaty—the most significant in Canadian history. Afterwards, Crowfoot said of the Mounted Police: 'Bad men were killing us so fast that very few of us would have been left today. The police have protected us as the feathers of the bird protect it from the frosts of winter.' They were wise words from Crowfoot - but there were more problems on the way for the North -West Mounted Police. In 1876, five troops of the U.S. Cavalry under General Custer



'The Mounties'. their red coats, boy-scout hats and jodphurs were romanticised in films, rescuing damsels from grizzly bears and shooting out the baddles from snowy mountain hideouts.

But they originally formed to protect the whites and Indians from wiping each other out, Big trouble came in the shape of **Chief Sitting Bull** (right) who led his Sioux tribe across into Canada, trespassing on the Blackfoot territory. were wiped out by

Chief Sitting Bull, the
Sioux in their thousands fled
to Canada to escape the avenging American troops. The
Mounted Police had the task of preventing a union of Canadian and American Indians—and preserving the Blackfoot hunting grounds from the Sioux.
Luckily, the loyalty of Crowfoot and the
vigilance of the police prevailed.

Nowadays the 'Mounties'—renamed

Nowadays the 'Mounties'—renamed the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in 1920—have a vastly different role. In addition to general police duties the force has its own 'Air Section', 'Marine Division' and five scientific laboratories. It is also the Canadian representative of Interpol.

A typically modern assignment for the Mounties was a patrol performed in 1963. Their objective was to locate and save a party of four Eskimos lost on the east coast of Baffin Island. The Eskimos were stranded when their snow house broke in two as the ice parted during a severe Arctic storm. The search was carried out under appalling weather conditions and one Eskimo was found and evacuated. His unfortunate companions

were not so lucky.

The R.C.M.P.'s Marine Division has also done much good work. With forty-one vessels, its basic function is the enforcement of the Customs and Excise Acts.

The Mounties still rely on horses—but not for transport. On ceremonial occasions the men can be seen in their famous scarlet coats for which they are so well-known. But they are no longer guardians of new territories—they are Canada's modern police force of today.

★ You may remember the 'Magpie' presenters visiting the training centre of the Metropolitan Mounted Police at Imber Court last year. They took with them Magpie's pony, Puff, who after passing a stringent test became the smallest qualified police horse! And the children who also went with the presenters had won a competition to give names to the newly recruited police horses.







Colin Willock looks at more inhabitants of the Okavango . . .

AST NIGHT we had hippos' tripping over our tent ropes. What a panic! I don't know who was more scared — the hippos' or us. Luckily they eventually fled back to the water twenty yards away without trampling on us.

Hippos' are fascinating creatures, though horribly dangerous ones. Did you know there are more casualties from hippo' bites than from any other wild animal in Africa? Those huge bulldozer jaws are armed with ivory tusks, top and bottom. I was once in a Land Rover that was charged by a bad-tempered hippo'. Its teeth punched four holes in the floor that looked as though they'd been made by armour-piercing shells.

The Okavango hippos' spend all day in the water with just the tips of their pink ears and nostrils showing. Every now and again they submerge and go for

a walk along the bottom. They leave a trail of bubbles behind them like a torpedo's wake. They feel safe in the water and only come ashore to feed at night, when they go for grass. They eat up to five

foraging for grass. They eat up to five hundred pounds of it at a single sitting!

There's only one rule to remember when you meet a hippo' ashore. Never get between it and the water—especially if you happen to be standing on the only trail through

the swamp. A frightened hippo' has only one idea: to get back into the water as soon as possible—if necessary demolishing anything he meets on the way.

The males are very aggressive, especially when the herds are over-crowded. Most of them carry fight scars made with those tusks. When they yawn, it's often to threaten each other.

I once saw a truck that had been hit by a one-and-a-quarter ton hippo'. It looked remarkably flat. Our Okavango hippos' are actually telling us what they think of us as I write with a chorus of long-drawn-out snorts and grunts.

There are several ways, Wayne. One, not often used now, is to build a giant monster with men inside working it, like a famous dragon in an old German film of the 1920s called Siegfried. Another is by making models and filming them in a vast number of slightly different positions which flow smoothly when run together at film speed.

These monsters are set near humans either by 'back projection' or 'travelling matte'. Back projection is a moving film projected on the back of a screen behind the actors and is not always successful-because the actors look much clearer than the back-projected figures or animals. Travelling matte, in which the background and fore-

ground are photographed separately, is better. Leaving out the very complicated technical explanation, what happens is that half or part of each film frame is blacked out, while the monsters are shot on the other half, then the process is reversed and on the other half humans are shot at a distance and looking small while the monsters are

blacked out. Combine the two and you can have some very frightened humans up against g very big monsters.

Monsters are not always s models. Sometimes enlarged pictures of spiders, ants or iguanas are used against a background of tiny humansand very nasty they look!






★ Here's a clever scientific stunt which looks like real magic.

Revolving Spoon



Stick a pin or thin nail upright in a block of wood, and balance a spoon on it, as shown in the illustration. That's the hardest part of the trick. Now find a small polythene bag and twist it into a sort of rope. Pull this rope quickly through your hand several times, and then place the end of it close to—but not touching—the handle of the spoon. Amazingly the spoon will be attracted towards the bag like a magnet and will follow it round as you move your hand in a circle.

Tricky Tags



You need a few luggage labels or tags and a short length of string. Thread one of the labels on to the string, and then thread both ends of string through the holes in the remaining labels, as shown.


Now, if someone holds both ends of the string, it is obviously impossible

to get the labels off the string without him letting go. But you cover the labels with a handkerchief for a moment and immediately succeed in removing all the labels from the string.

How? You simply tear the bottom label off—which allows the others to come off easily. Keep the torn label in your handkerchief, while the audience examines the others. Important—do not draw attention to how many labels there are at the start of the trick.

A Hard Blow

You'll need plenty of puff for this one—and so will your friends. Take an ordinary playing card and bend two of its opposite corners downwards, as shown. Then put it on the table—face down—and challenge your friends to blow the card over on to its back. However hard they blow they will find that it is impossible. But you can do it—and here's how. Blow the card gently towards the edge of the table, so that part of the card projects over the edge. Now get below the level of the table, and blow sharply upwards at the card.



GEASER GIME

Last week you had to find the total a length of a fish that had a head ten inches long, a back as long as tail plus head, and a tail as long as the head plus half the back. Here's the answer.
