



A thief with dirty hands . . . a whitewashed wall . . . and Magpie investigates a great step forward in the fight against crime.

burgled — but the Japanese police could not understand why Henry Faulds, a medical missionary in Tokyo in the 1870s, was so excited by the sooty fingermarks on his whitewashed wall.

They were amazed when the 'mad foreigner' insisted that the man they had arrested should make marks on paper with his inky fingers; and when, after comparing these marks with those on the wall, Faulds declared their captive was innocent, they shrugged in disbelief.

When the real thief confessed a few days later, and Faulds showed the police that the marks left by his fingers were exactly like those on the wall, they credited the doctor with magical powers.

TELL-TALE LINES

For some years, inspired by the Japanese custom of signing documents with thumb or finger prints, Faulds had been studying the patterns made by the 'capillary lines', the ridges of skin on the finger tips which, we now know, do not change from birth to death. Now he had shown that this pattern could be used to identify a thief, he wrote to the British magazine *Nature*: 'When finger marks on clay, glass etc., exist, they may lead to the scientific identification of criminals.'

But although Faulds offered his discovery to Scotland Yard and even offered to test it at his own expense, the British police were not interested. They were more concerned with 'anthropometry', an identification system based on the measurements of different parts of the body, invented by the Frenchman Alphonse Bertillon.


Bertillon's system, although more accurate than early fingerprinting methods, was clumsy. It called for a dozen or more absolutely accurate measurements, as well as a series of photographs. However, in 1892, an English scientist named Francis Galton proved that the odds against any two fingerprints being the same were as high as 64,000,000,000 to one—and that if 16 points of identification between two prints were the

same, those prints were certainly similar in all respects. So fingerprinting replaced anthropometry as the most important factor in 'forensic science', or scientific crime detection. Sir Edward Henry, who became Assistant Commissioner at Scotland Yard in 1901, was responsible for its acceptance by the British police.

Since about 1914, the fingerprinting of suspects (whose prints are destroyed if they are found to be innocent) and convicted criminals has been a matter of police routine. Some years ago, when the police of Blackburn

were hunting a dangerous criminal, the fingerprints of every male over 17 in the city of around 120,000 people were taken. The police got their man!

FINGERS ON FILE

The Fingerprints Registry is the most important department of the Criminal Record Office (CRO) at New Scotland Yard. It is believed to contain near 2,000,000 sets of prints. As well as the fingerprints of both hands, the CRO's file on every convicted criminal contains his real name and 'aliases' (false names, of which one criminal had 400!); his detailed description, with photographs; and a list of his crimes and his methods of committing them.

It is the proud boast of the CRO that the one thing no criminal can escape is his past!

To bring out recently-made 'latent' fingerprints (prints invisible to the naked eye) on a shiny surface, dust the surface lightly with fine talcum powder. After a few moments, gently blow the powder away: the grains that remain sticking to the surface, should show up the outline of the prints.

History of the "West Brothers" Identification..

Bertillon Measurements are not always a Reliable Means of Identification





In 1903, one WILL WEST was committed to the U. S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, a few days thereafter being brought to the office of the record clerk to be measured and photographed. He denied having been in the penitentiary before, but the clerk doubting the statement, ran his measuring instruments over him, and from the Bertillon measurements obtained went to his files, returning with the card the measurements called for properly filled out, accompanied with the photograph and bearing the name WILLIAM WEST. Will West, the new prisoner, continued to deny that the card was his, whereupon the record clerk turned it over and read that William West was already a prisoner in that institution, having been committed to a life sentence on September 9, 1901, for murder.

The Bertillon measurements of these, given below, are nearly identical whereas the fingerprint classifications given are decidedly different.


The case is particularly interesting as indicating the fallacies in the Bertillon system, which necessitated the adoption of the fingerprint system as a medium of identification. It is not even definitely known that these two Wests were related despite their remarkable resemblance.

Their Bertillon measurements and fingerprint classifications are set out separately below:



The 'Dummy' Dinosaur

The other morning I was drowsing in the sun outside our tent in the Okavango Swamps in Botswanaland. Suddenly I awoke to find myself looking at what, in my sleepy state, I took to be a dinosaur. A huge lizard was staring at me from the reeds.

It was a Nile monitor, fully six feet long and a very nasty customer if you happen to get him cornered. Actually, I wasn't so far out with my 'dinosaur' guess. Monitor lizards have been going strong for one-hundred-and-thirty-million years. The biggest of them, the komodo dragon of Indonesia, grows to over ten feet. Film companies often use monitors as 'stand-ins' for dinosaurs. With the aid

of a little trick photography they look very much the part, with their long snout and neck flashing, forked tongue, sinuous shape and big beady eye.

The Nile monitor isn't confined to the Nile at all. You find this big lizard all the way from south of the Sahara to the Cape of Good Hope. Unlike many of the land-based monitor lizards, such as the goannas of Australia, the Nile species spends most of its time in or around water. That's why the long, powerful tail is flattened at the sides, to act as an oar blade which drives the great brute through the water.

My six-foot monster obviously regarded me as a dangerous specimen. He launched himself into the swamp and took off at a rate of knots. I thought this to be rather a compliment since monitors


aren't afraid of many things, including crocodiles!

A few days before, with 'Survival' cameraman Dieter Plage, I'd watched a couple of these lizards busily digging crocodile eggs out of a sand bank while the parents were off having a swim. Dieter told me he'd even seen a monitor lizard unearth the eggs from under a mother croc' which was guarding them.

Even the name 'monitor' is interesting. The Arab word for lizard is waran. The German colonists confused this with their word warnen which means 'warning'.

So the lizards became 'monitors', those which warn others about their behaviour. My view is that the monitors, with their taste for young birds and eggs, could start worrying about their own conduct a little!

were hearing aids invented? Leonard Humphries, Doncaster, Yorks.

There are basically two sorts of aid. 'Air-conduction' aids simply make sounds louder. But some people cannot transmit sound through both their inner and outer ear so they use 'boneconduction' aids. These carry sound to the bony part of the deaf person's head, normally just behind the ear. The bone


carries sound vibrations to the hearing nerves of part of the inner ear called the 'cochlea' and, when these nerves are active, hearing follows.

Bone-conduction aids have been used since the 17th century, before which ear trumpets were used. Around 1800 came the 'audiphone' or 'dentiphone', whose edge a deaf person held between his teeth. The sound vibrations were carried from there to the hearer's nerves via the jawbones and skull.

Electric hearing aids, rather like small telephones in operation, came in around 1900, but they were rather big and clumsy at first. Next came the 'vacuum

tube' aid, smaller and using a crystal mike, two batteries and a vacuum-tube amplifier. In 1953 came another breakthrough, the electronic transistor hearing aid. These tiny objects can even be built into spectacle frames or worn in the hair. We have come a long way from ear trumpets!

long the is longest pier in Britain? Douglas Tye, Middlesbrough.



We think you mean the longest pleasure pier, Douglas. That is the one at Southend-on-Sea in Essex, which is 1.33 miles long. It dates from 1889 and was extended to its present length in 1929. It is the longest pier of its kind in the world. Southend's famous pier (pictured above) offers ten-pin bowling and is an ideal focal point for the many sponsored walks which are held along its 1.33 miles.

did the Zodiac originate and why? Ray Butterworth, Preston, Lancs.

The Zodiac is a quite narrow, imaginary band in the sky through the middle of which the sun seems to travel on its annual journey through the heavens. The band is wide enough to hold the paths of

the planets and moon and twelve constellations (groups) of stars and the imaginary band is divided into twelve equal parts, which are called 'signs'.

The ancients thought the sun, the moon and the stars and planets were gods and goddesses, so were naturally very interested in them. By studying the stars of the Zodiac they thought, like modern astrologers, that they could tell the future. The Babylonians were among the first to study the Zodiac. The twelve constellations are Aries (the Ram), Taurus (the Bull), Gemini (the Twins), Cancer (the Crab), Leo (the Lion), Virgo (the Virgin), Libra (the Scales), Scorpio (the Scorpion), Sagittarius

Archer), Capricornus (the Goat), Aquarius (the Water Carrier), and Pisces (the Fishes). Notice that more than half are animals? That explains the word Zodiac, which comes from an ancient Greek word meaning 'to do with animals'.

Each of the constellations is said to lie in the sign next to the one which has its name. So the constellation Taurus lies in the sign of Gemini and so on. This is due to the fact that the signs move round the heavens with what is called 'the precession of the Equinoxes'-the movement of the earth round the sun which determines our seasons and lengths of days.


Jumping Crosses




