




Military Memories

Continuing LOOK-IN's ABC of Football, this week's letter—'E'—is for Everton. Why not cut out this item and keep it with the others to form a complete soccer scrapbook?

One of the First Division's most distinguished clubs, Everton, once had in its

side two of the all-time greats in soccer—Dixie Dean and Tommy Lawton. These two both played at the centre-forward position for the 'Toffees' (Everton's nickname). And Dixie Dean, in the 1927-8 season scored sixty League goals—an English League record to this day.

Goodison Park, Everton's home ground and one of the finest in the country, has its records, too. The Park had its biggest-ever attendance in a League match with neighbouring rivals, Liverpool, in 1948. Seventy-eight thousand, two-hundred and ninety-nine people turned up to watch the game. The record receipts were taken in 1963 when Everton played Inter-Milan in the European Cup. A mammoth £31,709 passed through the clicking turnstiles.

Harry Catterick replaced John Carey as team manager in 1961 and much of the credit must go to Harry for making Everton's football so enjoyable to watch.

Everton's football also gets results. They have won the League title seven times and appeared in seven F.A. Cup Finals—winning three of them.

The visitor said: "Hey! What's that huge thing?"



Magpie Music Makers

Continuing his series on musical history, Will Yeomans looks this week at another wind instrument.

THE TROMBONE is said to have developed from the long Buzine, an unwieldy form of straight trumpet,



as shown above. The sliding-tube instrument was most likely invented in the late 14th century and it soon became known as the Sackbut. These instruments later came to be made in various sizes from the Treble down to Double-Bass.

The engines of the one-hundred-and-sixty-five ton SRN4 hovercraft roared into life—putting a layer of air between its base and the water. Its huge load, two-hundred-and-fifty passengers and thirty cars did not affect its performance. Leaving Dover at 6.30 a.m., it began its journey—destination Calais, France. Reaching speeds of up to seventy miles an hour, the hovering monster sped across the choppy waters of the English Channel, arriving in France just thirty minutes later.


This was another routine trip for British Rail's Seaspeed hovercraft service, which carried ninety-eight-thousand-and-forty-four vehicles and over half-a-million passengers on its cross-Channel 'flights' during the last year.

The all-year-round cross-Channel services—Dover to Calais and Dover to Boulogne—are operated by two SRN4 hover-craft, *The Princess Margaret* and *The Princess Anne*. The results achieved prove that the hovercraft is now a major form of Channel transport.


Hovercraft are used for a variety of purposes other than commercial travel. Many of the smaller craft, including the BH7 and the SRN5, were built for military service and are currently in operation in Canada and America.

An Englishman, Sir Christopher Cockerell, invented the hovercraft, after years of research. He demonstrated his first working model in 1956 and on 25th July, 1959, only three short years later, the world's first hovercraft, the SRN1, crossed the English Channel. It was a colossal victory for English technology, and experts agree that there will always be a place for hovercraft in the modern age to come!






