
Dear Stewpot,



Henry Mancini—composer of the theme music to 'Cade's County'.


by Henry Mancini, who also composed the theme music for the films 'Charade' and 'Breakfast At Tiffany's'.





THE YOUNG KING'S CURSE!

April, 1923—and a hush falls over the room in the Continental Hotel, Cairo, where Lord Carnarvon lies dying. As he breathes his last, every electric light in Cairo suddenly goes out—and the engineers at the power plants can give no explanation for the failure. At the same moment, far away in England, Lord Carnarvon's pet dog gives a terrible howl—and falls dead!

Has the hand of a king dead for three thousand years reached out across the ages to strike down the man who dared to break the peace of his treasure-filled tomb?

Howard Carter, discoverer of the tomb at Thebes in 1922, The story of 'the Pharaoh's curse' began in 1922, in the Valley of the Kings at Thebes, on the banks of the Nile. There, Howard Carter made the greatest of modern archaeological discoveries when he uncovered the tomb of Tutankhamen, the young king of Egypt who died at the age of eighteen, just over three

thousand, three hundred years ago. On November 25th, 1922, Carter and Lord Carnarvon were the first men to enter the chamber leading to where the king lay in his coffin of beaten gold, guarded by the jackal-headed image of the god Anubis.

Within six months, Carnarvon was dead, after a fever caused by a mosquito bite had turned to pneumonia. And before a year was out, two other prominent members of Carter's team, neither of them more than middle-aged, had also died. All over the world, people spoke of 'the Pharaoh's curse'.


But since then there has been no more evidence of a supernatural fate at work. Carter himself continued work at Thebes and did not die until 1939. Several leading members of his team lived to be over eighty.

Among the inscriptions found at Thebes are several which threaten the vengeance of the gods on any who violate the tombs of the kings. But that has not stopped the robbers who, for centuries, have pillaged the tombs for the sacred, golden objects buried there. It is our good luck that the tomb of Tutankhamen escaped.

During recent *Magpie* programmes, Sue and Tony talked of the transportation of the Tutankhamen treasures and their present display at the British Museum, London. If you haven't yet visited the exhibition, and would like to, it lasts until the end of September.

Strangely enough, however, Tutankhamen himself may have suffered from a kind of 'curse'. In most Egyptian tombs, papyrus rolls telling of the life and deeds of the occupant are found—but there were none in Tutankhamen's tomb, and inscriptions dealing with his life found in other places show signs of having been defaced.

It has been suggested that Tutankhamen angered many of his people by his support of the worship of the god Amun, at the expense of the god Aton. After his death, followers of Aton may have tried to destroy all records of the young king—for the ancient Egyptians believed that a man's spirit was immortal only so long as his name was remembered by the living.


The smallest is the Goldcrest, which measures 3½ inches long and only weighs 0.16 oz. It has a fine yellow and orange crown with a black border.

John O'Groats, which is the north-east tip of Scotland in the County of Caithness, is 873 miles from Land's End, Cornwall, the extreme south-west tip of England.

The saying 'From Land's End to John O'Groats' means from one end of Great Britain to the other. Note that John O'Groats is not the most northerly spot: Dunnet Head is!

Saturn has three rings which are formed by many millions of small particles. No one knows for certain how or when these rings came into existence, but Saturn has at least nine satellites. It is possible—so experts say—that the rings are the remains of a tenth one that exploded for some reason. The rings undoubtedly help make the planet very beautiful to look at. They are less than ten miles thick, but at their widest are over 170,000 miles in diameter.

The deeper a diver goes, the more the water pressure builds up on him. Because of this, enough air must be pumped down to him to allow him to breathe properly, and for enough pressure to be put inside his suit to equal the pressure outside it. The added pressure in the diving suit injects nitrogen into the

do fireflies light up?

No one fully understands the marvellous way that these creatures produce light, Angela -and control it, too, for they can flash or glow. The light comes from organs on the underside of their bodies where they have reflector cells and lightmaking cells as well. This light, which can be yellow, bluish, reddish or greenish, is not hot, so the insects do not waste any energy. The light helps the female and male to locate each other, for fireflies are nocturnal creatures. Most of them live in tropical climates.

You may also like to know that the firefly has another lesspopular name—lightning bug. So take your pick!

blood and tissues of the diver. For, unlike the oxygen, nitrogen in air does not get absorbed into the body.

But if the diver shoots up to the surface too fast, this nitrogen gas will rapidly make bubbles in his blood as it tries to escape from his body, and this is when the dreaded 'bends' occurs. However, if the diver is brought up slowly, the nitrogen will escape slowly and all will be well.

Needless to say, all experienced divers are aware of the danger from 'bends'.

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




