Gordon Lightfoot was born near Toronto in Canada and must have served one of the longest apprenticeships in the music business.

For a lot of people in this country, he only arrived with his hit single 'If You Could Read My Mind'. But this was the result of fifteen years' hard work.

He commenced his career studying music at the Westlake College, in Los Angeles. He then began to play in clubs and was greatly influenced by Bob Dylan.

He started to write his own songs and was lucky enough to have several recorded by such stars as Peter, Paul and Mary, Judy Collins and Johnny Cash.

At this time he wrote the now



folk-standard 'Early Morning Rain' which many of you may have heard sung on 'Lift Off' by a folk group called The Dalies.

In 1970, shortly after signing with Reprise Records, he released an L.P. called 'Sit Down Young Stranger' which has recently been re-released. With the title track a huge hit, the album now takes its name 'If You Could Read My Mind' (Reprise No. K44091).

Although it's not music for a party, if you felt like a little bit of relaxation-you couldn't do better than to settle down and listen to this great L.P.

NATURE NOTES

This week, I'd like us all to take a closer look at one of our most common animals—the hedgehog.

This creature is found in fields, scrub, open woodland and heathland, and in gardens (often under sheds) almost everywhere throughout the British Isles.

During the winter months, they hibernate beneath such places as hedges

and piles of leaves.

Hedgehogs mainly eat insects, but their diet also includes slugs, snails, worms, frogs, lizards and even snakes (includ-

The hedgehog—very common. ing adders!). They are good swimmers, can run surprisingly fast, and can even climb walls. When threatened, they roll into a tight ball, protected by a coat of about sixteen thousand stiff prickles.

Hedgehogs breed during May to June, producing between three and seven young in each litter, and they live for about six years. They grow to approximately nine inches and weigh up to one-and-a-half pounds.


Primitive gongs are hollow sound-producing instruments and have been

known to almost all people of all ages. Sometimes, they took the shape of a large hollowed-out tree-trunk, as shown here. They were often made in pairs, however, and were used for signalling. Fine bronze gongs were made in China, Japan and Java.

ENDOF THE LINE

When the famous 'Brighton Belle' makes its last run from London's Victoria Station to Brighton on April 30th, it will mark the end of

a tradition that has lasted for nearly a century. For it was in 1875 that the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway Company introduced luxurious Pullman cars on the Brighton line, for the benefit of aristocratic passengers travelling from their London mansions to the fashionable seaside resort.

The Pullman Car Company was founded in 1867. George M. Pullman, an American, had such an uncomfortable journey in the 'sleeping car' of one of the rough-andready railway carriages of those days, that he decided to build really comfortable carriages, well lit and heated, with their own kitchens, and hire them out to railroads. Now, Pullman cars are in operation all over the world, and passengers pay an extra charge on top of the normal fare for Pullman luxury.

Electric 'Belle'

In 1881, the London-Brighton Pullman became the first train in the world to be lit by electricity. On the first run, many seats were filled by officials of gas companies—all hoping that the newfangled electric lighting system would break down! The first 'named' train on the line, the 'Southern Belle', was introduced in 1908, when the first-class fare from London

to Brighton was one shilling.

The Brighton line was electrified in 1933, and in June 1934 the train became the 'Brighton Belle'. Except during the war years of 1939-45, it has made four runs daily in each direction, earning a magnificent reputation for its time-keeping over the sixty-minute journey—as well as for the excellent food and wine served in its dining cars.

Dramatic Victory!

One of the most famous of the 'Belle's' regular passengers is Lord Olivier, Britain's greatest actor. In 1970, when the succulent kippers for which the train's dining cars are famous were dropped from the breakfast menu, Lord Olivier protested. After a letter from His Lordship had appeared in The Times, kippers made a reappearance. With press photographers and reporters waiting to record his victory, Lord Olivier entered the dining car - and ordered scrambled eggs!

But now the Brighton Belle' itself is to disappear. British Rail explains that the present coaches are worn out and would cost too much to replace. Now that ordinary carriages are so comfortable, say railway officials, passengers are not willing to pay extra for a Pullman. The famous coaches will go up for




An artist's impression showing the interior of the Pullman car 'Belgravia' on the 'Southern Belle'.


Belle' consists of two five-car units, each holding forty first-class and one-hundred-and-fifty-two second-class passengers. Each unit is powered by four motor-bogies, with two 225 - horse - power motors mounted on each. The tradition of 'naming' Pullman cars—back in 1875, the first Pullmans on the line included 'Louise', 'Adonis' and 'Maud'—is maintained in the kitchen cars, which carry the name-plaques of 'Hazel', 'Doris',


sale—and will probably follow London Bridge and the liner *Queen Mary* to the United States.

The 'Brighton Belle' was given her famous name in the year 1934. One year before this, the Brighton line was electrified to begin the second phase of the 'Belle' legend.







HOW markings?

do butterflies get their lovely

Not all of them have beautiful markings—though many, of course, do. The colours act as protection from their enemies, just as a green caterpillar is protected by its colour in the grass. Some butterflies look like dead leaves when their wings are together. Nature's camouflage is one of life's miracles, developed over scores of centuries and enabling some species to survive.

Of course, the markings of some butterflies are so incredibly vivid that they stand out even against the brightest flowers. No enemy could miss them. In the case of those, it seems that once a bird had tasted one of them it is off that particular dish, as the butterfly has—for birds—a very nasty taste! Again Nature has provided one of its creatures with a built-in aid to survival!

mare icebergs formed?



These ocean giants, which are mainly found off Greenland and Antarctica, are great masses of land ice which have either broken off from the end of glaciers, or from ice shelves—sheets of floating ice on the edge of coastlines. Glacier icebergs—the ones that come from Greenland—are irregular and jagged in shape. They break off easily from glaciers when they enter the sea, which buoys them up.

As the glacier continues its slow progress the next piece breaks off. Icebergs from ice sheets—the ones in Antarctica—are flat and

did the saying 'You've let the cat out of the bag' originate? Gillian Faulding, Tonbridge, Kent.

rectangular and may be as long as forty miles and over three-hundred feet above the water's surface. Greenland icebergs may be as high as that, but are rarely as much as a mile across, usually only a few hundred yards.

Far more of an iceberg is below the surface than above it. Normally between one-ninth and one-sixth shows. Icebergs are still a menace in the North Atlantic in summer months, though radar, special ice-patrol ships and careful navigation now ensure that there will be no more disasters like the sinking of the *Titanic*. This great liner—believed to be unsinkable—went down in 1912 after striking an iceberg, taking with her more than one-thousand-five-hundred people.

old is the oldest building in the world?

Andrew Davies, Glamorgan. There is a wooden temple at Nara, Japan, which dates from about A.D. 710, and a church in Syria dating back to A.D. 232. Even earlier is a castle at Gomdan in the Yemen, which is at least 1,870 years old and once had twenty storeys. But a circle of stones—which were once some sort of dwelling—at Olduvai Gorge, Tanganyika, in Africa, dates back 1,750,000 years!






