





Filmed on location in the 'dark continent' Chuck and his partner are always involved with some sort of drama-either with man, animal or Africa's untamed and menacing terrain.



Chuck Connors-as he appeared in the 'Rifleman' series







She has ended her successful partnership with writer/producer Kenny Young and is hoping to get away from the 'pop' image created for her by her hits such as



'Shake Me, Wake Me'. Clodagh doesn't want to alienate her pop fans but feels that it would be a logical extension to her career to sing more mature songs.





that performance being used to help the Fund's charitable work. The first 'Royal' film, in 1946, was A MATTER OF LIFE AND DEATH, starring David Niven.

This year, the Fund's choice (now on general release) was MARY, QUEEN OF SCOTS, a historical spectacular set in Tudor times and telling the tragic story of Mary Stuart, who met her death under the executioner's axe at the command of her cousin, Queen Elizabeth I. Vanessa Redgrave plays Mary, Glenda Jackson is Elizabeth, and among a star-studded cast, Patrick McGoohan - star of TV's Danger Man and The Prisoner is outstanding as James, Earl of Moray, Mary's treacherous half-brother.

TELL ME...

A few week's ago, LOOK-IN examined the career of Diana Rigg, former star of 'The Avengers'. Diana has since appeared in 'Tell Me...' and, as usual, LOOK-IN prints some of the questions there was no time to ask on the programme.

When you were a child, were you interested in acting and did you want to be an actress?

Yes, I did, very much. I really began wanting to be an actress when I was about seven or eight. I think most kids like to dress up, and I used to. Then, when I was about 11, I began to be interested in poetry—the normal kind of poetry that kids read, Kipling for instance. And I went to a school that was very good about school plays.

How long did it take to make a single episode of 'The Avengers'?

It should have taken us ten



days, but because we were always behind schedule it used to take between twelve and thirteen—or sometimes fifteen days, by which time the producers were chewing on their fingernails.

How did you manage all that fighting in 'The Avengers'?

With a lot of help! First, we had stunt men—and they are the bravest and best people you can possibly work with. All I had to do was poke one—and he'd turn a somersault and make it look as if I'd knocked him out!


What was it like filming 'On Her Majesty's Secret Service'?

It was great fun. I love doing location filming, because it's about the smartest way to travel—all first class, and the best hotels—and you see countries. And filming is a form of madness: film moguls live grandly, and it was quite interesting to watch this madness and even take part in it for a while.

Do you prefer to work in films, on television or on the stage?

I like the stage best because I like people best—and the stage has most to do with people.






did the pomegranate get its

L. Jones, Bethel Drive, Gedling, Notts.

It literally means 'an apple which has many grains or seeds', though 'pome' in botany includes other similar fruits, like pears and quinces. Pomegranates grow on shrubs or bushy trees and were originally found in the Mediterranean area and southern Asia. It takes quite a time to eat one as there are so many seeds. Its flowers are beautiful.



Until around the 18th century, nearly everyone believed in witches and witchcraft, and a very good way to fend them off was thought to be with a piece of clover! Better still was a four-leaf clover, which is rare. Armed with a bit of this you could see fairies, spot any evil spirits that were lurking near you, and detect a witch, however well disguised. If you wore the

special clover, you were safe. Legend has it that if a girl wore a leaf in her right shoe, the first man she met on her first outing of the day would become her husband. Superstitions die hard, so today, long after the age of belief in witches, the four-leaf clover is still thought to be very lucky.

No soldier who fought there could forget those flowers. And, of course, the colour of poppies is sadly suitable for remembering the fallen.

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
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


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
