
Most of all, though, I'll be looking forward to swimming in the blue seas around Italy, in August.

Like a shark, SUPER-STEW skims through the water after the evil Doctor Minestrone—and with a flash of his SUPERFIN ...


Sorry, I got a bit carried away. Think I'll go for my morning bath in the horsetrough before the stampede starts!

PARDON MY GENIE

How would you like to have a genie at your command—a powerful sorcerer, able to make your every wish come true? You think it would be marvellous? Then you can't have been watching Thames Television's hilarious series Pardon My Genie over the last few weeks.

The trouble with the genie that young Hal Adden discovered when he tried to polish the old watering can in Mister Cobbledick's shop is that he's four thousand years old—and his magic, like the watering can, is a bit rusty. Not only that: he's inclined to take everything Hal says at face value. You know how often we say things we don't really mean, exclamations like 'Strike Me Pink!' or 'Stone Me!' Well, say that kind of thing when you have a genie under your control, and you're likely to find yourself the colour of a raspberry yoghurt and being bombarded with boulders!

PARDON MY GENIE

If we can believe the genie's story, he was once the slave of the magic lamp owned by Aladdin, Prince of China. Over the centuries, the metal of the lamp has been used to make all sorts of things—including a plough, a drainpipe and a back door key—but the genie has remained bound to serve the owner of whatever object is made from the magical metal.

Genie or Jinee

What is a genie, anyway? Well, in Arabic legend there were powerful spirits, some good and some evil, who lived in the mountains of Kâf, at the edge of the earth. (When the legends were first told, most people believed that the earth was flat, and that there were mountains around the edge to stop unwary travellers from falling off!) These spirits were called jinn, the singular of which is jinee, or 'genie'.

You'll find lots of stories about jinn in the collection of Eastern legends called The Arabian Nights Entertainments or The Thousand and One Nights. These stories, which include such familiar tales as those of 'Aladdin', 'Sinbad the Sailor' and 'Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves', were first written down in Egypt, about six hundred years ago. They are supposed to have been told by the beautiful princess Scheherazade to the cruel Sultan Schahriah, who had condemned her to death. But Scheherazade told such exciting stories every night, that the Sultan kept putting off the execution in order to hear more.

You've probably seen the pantomime version of 'Aladdin', in which he is the son of a poor Chinese washerwoman, the comical Widow Twankey. In the Arabian Nights, he is an Arabic boy who, because of the riches he gains through the magic lamp, is able to marry the daughter of the Sultan of China.

Long-lost lamp

The idea of Aladdin's lamp turning up centuries later in England was used by the famous Victorian writer, F. E. Anstey, in his book *The Brass Bottle*. He tells how the genie was let out From Aladdin's lamp to rusty watering-can: genie, Hugh Paddick. production of My in 19th-century London by a

in 19th-century London by a young architect, whose life was made a misery by the genie's blundering attempts to reward him. Although *The Brass Bottle* was written about eighty years ago, it's still as funny as ever; your local library will probably have a copy.

Now, in Pardon My Genie, writer Bob Block has brought us up to date on the wanderings of Aladdin's faithful servant. Hugh Paddick, who plays the well-meaning genie, is one of the fine all-rounders of British acting. His successes range from leading rôles in revue and musical comedy—he spent over three years as 'Colonel Pickering' in the London stage

production of My Fair Lady — to important parts in Shakesperian productions, television and movies. He revealed himself as a man of many voices, all of them funny, in such radio series as Stop Messing About.

Hal Adden ('Al-Addin, get it?) is played by twenty-eight-year-old Ellis Jones, his first leading rôle on television. Both Ellis and Roy Barraclough (Mister Cobbledick) came up the hard way in the acting profession, with long years of solid work in provincial repertory theatres.

Will the genie get his sorcery straightened out in time to help Hal win the hand of the lovely Patricia Cobbledick? Or will this magical misfit and cock-eyed conjurer drive Hal and Mister Cobbledick—who is so often the victim of his mistakes—up the wall first? Keep watching—and you may find out.

Fitting the faces below will be easy to regular viewers of ATV's currently-running thriller series. And with the final episode 'on air' next Wednesday, it's time to present the players behind the parts . . .

EATE HONGH

VIKKI CHAMBERS

Marianne Austen is played by eleven-year - old VIKKI CHAMBERS from Solihull, Warwickshire. Vikki's only previous acting experience has been in drama at school, though she made her debut on TV last Boxing Day—as a programme announcer!

This was the result of her enquiry to ATV, the previous summer, which led to



a screen test.

When the programme's producer Alan Coleman picked Vikki from the numerous other applicants he had no idea that she had been involved in TV already. Vikki attends Tudor Grange Grammar School for Girls.

STEVEN IONES

STEVEN JONES stars as Mark—the boy who shares adventures with co-star Marianne. At thirteen he attends Moseley Mixed Secondary School, after moving from Acocks Green in Birmingham, four



years ago. Needless to say, Steven is the envy of his schoolmates. But although he was very excited about winning the role of 'Mark' he still spares a thought for the others who weren't so lucky. "I feel sorry for the boys who didn't get the part-I know how I would have felt," he says. Steven enjoys acting immensely, but in the long term thinks he would like to join the Navy. Steven can expect an exciting future.

SONIA GRAHAM

Marianne's mother, Mrs. Austen, is played by SONIA GRA-HAM who appeared in ATV's 'Crimebuster' series. Born at Croydon, Surrey, she originally studied at the Guildhall for a career in ballet. Sonia has done a lot of repertory work around the country, but this is her first TV appearance in Birmingham. Her stage appearances include 'The Wind In The Sassa-



fras Tree' with comedian Frankie Howerd. In real life, a very calm person, although she is playing an excitable character. Sonia enjoys both drama and comedy, but thinks comedy has the edge; as she says: "It's so super to hear people laugh!"

EDMUND PEGGE

The only connection between EDMUND PEGGE and real-life doctors (he plays Dr. Burton in the series) is that so far he has managed to avoid them for most of his life. Born at Old Windsor in Berkshire,



Edmund went to Australia with his parents when he was fourteen. He took up amateur theatricals in Adelaide and, at twenty-one, won a scholarship to the National Institute of Dramatic Art in Sydney. After eventually returning to England he appeared with repertory companies in many leading towns around the country. Unmarried and currently living in Barnes, London, Edmund's hobbies are cricket, soccer, golf and tennis.

PATRICIA MAYNARD

Actress PATRICIA MAYNARD has led a rather varied life for a governess, as she appears in 'Escape Into Night'. After first appearing on TV in 'Happy Ever After', in 1969, she joined the cast of ATV's 'Crossroads' the following year and has even played a part in 'The Last Of The Mohicans' based upon the book by James Fenimore Cooper. Patricia has



also appeared with Charlie Drake in 'The Worker'. Born in Beighton, near Sheffield, she was brought up in London and studied acting at Guildhall. She took a secretarial course as well as drama studies but luckily has not needed to use it.



Ring and String Mystery

Tie a loop in a length of string, using a reef knot, (ask any Boy Scout!) Then thread a finger ring on to one of the ends and tie both ends together so that it looks like figure 1. The trick is to get the ring from the top circle of string to the bottom one, without untying the knots or cutting the string.

Ask someone to hold the top knot-'to prevent any jiggerypokery'-and cover the whole thing with a cloth 'to keep the secret dark'. Under cover of the cloth you loosen the lower knot as shown in figure 2, then slide the ring around the loops and on to the lower circle of string. Tighten the knots once more, and you can unveil the mystery, successfully accomplished.

Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star . . .!

☆ If you listen to enough disc-jockey shows on the radio, sooner or later you'll probably hear a tinkly tune, sung in a giggly little girl's voice, called 'On the Good Ship Lollipop'. But the chances are that this simple, attractive little ditty is being played for a listener old enough to be your grandad for it was recorded nearly forty years ago by a wonder girl called Shirley Temple.

When six-year-old Shirley hit the movie screens in the mid-1930s, the 'child star' was some-

thing new. But grown-up screen stars soon found to their cost that a kid with a cheeky smile could be guaranteed to steal a scene from the most accomplished actor - and win the hearts of audiences all over the world.

This week, Granada Television's Clapperboard series looks at the great child stars, from curlytopped Shirley to a present-day favourite, Jack Wild. Jack will be in the studio to talk about his film career, and you can see clips from OLIVER, FLIGHT OF THE DOVES and lack's very first film, DANNY THE DRAGON.

The Movie-Makers-II: The First 'Cinema'

*** Having invented a movie camera, William Kennedy Dixon set to work on a 'projector', so that pictures could be thrown upon a screen and viewed by more than one person at a time. He came up with what he called the 'kinetoscope'.

By 1894, the first 'kinetoscope parlour', ancestor of the modern cinema, had opened in New York. Dixon set up the first American film studio -the Black Maria Studio, New Jersey-to supply it with films. His early films, showing famous entertainers of the time like Buffalo Bill and sharp-shooting Annie Oakley, only lasted for about fifteen seconds each.

Meanwhile, inventors in other countries had been working along the same lines. In France, the Lumière brothers improved on Dixon's process by reducing the number of 'frames' that needed to pass through the projector every second. This made it possible to show longer movies while still only using the same 'footage', or length of film.

Saturday Morning Special

If you are among the more than 400,000 children who go to the special Saturday morning shows that many cinemas run for young audiences, then you may have seen Jack Wild's screen début. For DANNY THE DRAGON was made by the Children's Film Foundation as a ten-part serial for Saturday morning audiences.

Special film shows for children were pioneered by Granada Cinemas as long ago as 1927. Later, J. Arthur Rank set up a special department within the Rank Organisation to make films for children. Then, in 1951, all branches of the British film industry agreed to finance the Children's Film Foundation (CFF).

To date, the CFF has produced nearly one hundred feature films, thirty serials and many 'shorts'. Among the CCF's discoveries-like Jack Wild-are Francesca Annis, Michael Crawford, Susan George, Olivia Hussey and Carol White.
