How did Superflop come to be created? We'll let Les answer for himself.


"It all started when I was messing around in the garden at home with my kids and one of them suddenly said I was a super flop!"

Additionally he told them what a big flop he was.

The result? Not 'boos' but the roar of hilarious laughter. The audience believed Les was being funny! The style stuck and with it Les climbed to the top—renowned as the dead-pan comic with an air of down-trodden desperation about him.


Les is also more than keen to make a 'big screen' film—'a cod-Western, taking the Micky out of the west'.





The way in which 'Europa' took off was very interesting: several men pulled the gondola (the cabin beneath the airship, in which passengers travel) downwards and then gave it a sharp push upwards, while the pilot, Mr. Dick Widdicombe, throttled open the two engines. As the airship rose, the noise of its engines could be heard for three miles or more.



He was later taken to Santos, the famous Brazilian club, for which he has played ever since.


Pele lists Uwe Seeler of West Germany and England's Bobby Moore among his personal friends.

NATURE NOTES

August is the breeding month for both grasssnake and adder. The eggs of the grass-snake may be found on manure heaps, sometimes in large numbers. The transparent eggs of the adder hatch at—or before— A grass-snake (above)

birth. These may number twelve and the baby adders (about four to eight inches in length) go straight off into the world, fully-equipped

with tiny fangs and minute amounts of poison to arm them! Adders are also called vipers and can be identified by the "V" on their heads.


















That Terrible Tudor






This splendid symbol of Paris, capital of France, was built in 1889 for an exhibition in the city by an engineer named Monsieur Eiffel. It is 985 feet high and, until New York started sprouting skyscrapers, it was the world's tallest building or structure. At first, many Parisians hated the giant, claiming it was ugly and saying it ruined their beautiful city. Now all Paris is proud of it.

did cheques originate?

Cheques started being used in Britain in the 18th century and are now used in many parts of the world, though, oddly, far more in Britain and America than in Europe. The idea dates back to earlier times when merchants began to give written notes to their creditors—the people to whom they owed money—which said that the bank would make good their debts. Modern cheques do the same on special bank forms.

did Greenland get its name?

It received its name for a reason which we can only describe as a confidence trick! Those mighty mariners and menof-war, the Vikings, or Norsemen, who first landed there, gave it that name to attract settlers to it. The actual confidence trick-ster seems to have been Erik the Red, who landed on the vast island around the year 982 and spotted a place he thought ideal for a settlement.

do earthworms manage to dig into hard earth?

The answer is quite surprising, Lilian: they eat their way through it! The soil passes into their special digestive systems, passes out of their bodies, and is left in small heaps which are known as castings. The worms do a marvellous job of ventilating the soil and the castings help make it fertile.

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
