On April 24, 1961—incidentally, a day after my birthday—the 17th-century Swedish warship *Wasa* broke surface in Stockholm harbour after 333 years on the seabed.


Following a period in dry dock, the Wasa was towed on a special platform to a more permanent site, where restoration work was begun and the ship was opened for public viewing.

Airfix, the great kit company, has produced a replica of the Wasa that you can build.

During the last eleven months, Airfix designers and draughtsmen have been working in close co-operation with the Wasa Museum in Stockholm to ensure that complete authenticity has been achieved with the 227 part kit.

The model is 19 inches long and stands nearly 15 inches high on its display stand and the main deck detail includes a longboat, capstan, hatches, 15 cannons and other ancillary equipment. It sells at £1.35.

She has only recently returned from America, where she has been filming in 'The Bugaloos', a new series made by the team which produced the 'H.R. Pufnstuf' series with Jack Wild.



It was this music that prompted me to find out about its composer, Isaac Hayes.

I had previously heard his L.P. Hot Buttered Soul' (which is on the Stax label in England) and thought him a promising newcomer. But how wrong can you be?

Isaac Hayes is the other half of the fantastic Hayes and Porter songwriting and record producing partnership, who were responsible for the Soul classics by Sam and Dave, such as 'Hold On I'm Comin' and 'Soul Man'.

If you like Soul music and are too young to remember these recordsthey were made nearly six years ago —then try to get copies, because they are where Soul really began. I then discovered that Isaac

appeared in Hollywood as a guest with the Los Angeles Symphony Orchestra—and is now starting a ries of personal appearances. Because his early attempts at series of

recording artist were being a mediocre, his advisers were un-willing to let him abandon his successful career, until after a Christmas party at the Stax Record office in New York.

Isaac drifted to the studios and producer Al Bell said: "Come on, Isaac, I'm going to record you!" The result has been a great success for everyone concerned, and Isaac Hayes will be much more than just a name on a record label to me in the future.

Boulton had his own mint, where he struck Great Britain's copper coinage in 1797, and was also James Watt's partner in the development of the steam engine.





Great Britain's Greatest Leader

A magnificent new film, YOUNG WINSTON, brilliantly portrays the childhood and early life of the late Sir Winston Churchill in the last years of Queen Victoria's reign. The picture of Victorian "high society", in which Winston's brilliant father and beautiful mother were leading figures, is fascinating enough—but for most of us the high-spots of the film will be the action-packed sequences dealing with Winston's war-time experiences.

Before World War One introduced new and terrible weapons like aircraft and poison gas, war could still sometimes be a great adventure, a wonderful game of soldiers played with real bullets and cannons, for young officers like Winston. It's difficult to remember, as you watch on the screen the Lancers thunder into the charge at the battle of Omdurman in the Sudan, or an armoured train steaming into action in the Boer War, that war isn't all splendid uniforms and high heroics.

In YOUNG WINSTON, writer-producer Carl Foreman and director Richard Attenborough, assisted by a cast crammed with stars, have created a movie which will surely rank as a "classic". And in putting on the screen the early life of the man who was to become Great Britain's greatest war-time leader, they have given us an enthralling picture of a young soldier bound to preserve the "Empire on which the sun never sets".

did the words "Ich Dien" come to be on the front of the new 2p piece, and from what country do the words come?

David Thompson, Greenhill, Yorkshire.

They are the motto of the Prince of Wales and the ostrich feathers are his badge, as they have been the badges of other Princes of Wales down the centuries. They are almost certainly German words meaning "I serve", and for many years it was believed that Edward the Black Prince, Prince of Wales and son of Edward III, having killed John, King of Bohemia, at the Battle of Crecy in 1346, took over his emblem and motto. But the emblem had been used by English royalty before that, and, though the story of how the motto came to be used may be true, there is another, equally interesting explanation.

A Welsh story goes that Edward I promised Wales a prince who could speak not a word of English. When his second son Edward, first Prince of Wales, was born, he was presented to Welshmen at Caernarvon by his father with the words (in Welsh) "Eich dyn"—"Behold the man". However, as "Ich Dien" are definitely German words, this would seem a good place to pass on to another question..!



were sandwiches invented, and how did they get their name? Julie Seabridge, Ilford, Essex.

They are named after their inventor, Julie, who was the fourth Earl of Sandwich (1718-92). He was a very keen gambler and invented the sandwich so as to save himself the trouble of having to leave the gaming table in the middle of a game. He was a dishonest and incompetent politician, as well as being a gambler, and did the Royal Navy a lot of harm. We can't resist printing a couplet about him:

The great game's origins are a mystery, Bettina. Some say it began in the Netherlands in the Middle Ages, others in Denmark, but as far as we are concerned it is a Scottish game through and through! The Scots were even banning it back in 1457 because it interfered with archery practice! Early feather-filled balls were succeeded by ones of gutta-percha in 1848, then rubber-cored balls came in in 1902. The famous British Open Championship dates from 1860, the American Open from 1894.

did the Earth get its name?

The word is a very ancient one, Bruce. Variations of it were used in the languages spoken in Northern Europe over a thousand years ago, including the Anglo-Saxon tongue, which is an ancestor of English. The word was being used to describe our world at least 600 years ago, probably earlier. And how suitable a word it is! Many people have worshipped Mother Earth down the centuries: after all the Earth gives life!






