















needing the helping hand.

Harry Worth has always known exactly where he's headed. Even from the time he left school at fourteen to become a miner in his home village of Tankersley, Yorkshire, he realized he wanted to become an entertainer.

Starting as an amateur, he bought himself a cheap doll and developed a ventriloquist act. "It was the only way of getting on," he recalls. "You had to

have an act in those days.'

After spending six years in the R.A.F., and appearing in a Gang Show abroad, he left the forces to take a job with a beach concert party at Southport. It was a start to the show business career he sought.

In 1947, Harry married a pantomime Principal Girl who persuaded him to write to the famous Windmill Theatre, a launching 'stage' for so many stars, such as Tony Hancock and Kenneth More. Upon making the trip to London for his audition, Harry was in for a shock. He was only one among forty others! But his luck held-and he was booked to perform six times a day.

Harry's own particular brand of ham-handed humour has brought him recognition in a big way. Having starred at all the leading theatres throughout the country—including the Palladium—he can now be seen on screen in the Thames

TV series: 'Thirty Minutes' Worth'.


His ambition, though, is to make a film. It's probably not surprising when Harry explains that he used to take a trip to the cinema about three times a week.



'The Man Who Haunted Himself' (1969) gave Roger the chance to play a 'scruffy' part for once. Two parts, in fact, for he played a 'Jekyll and Hyde' character.



And so, Ten Years Later ...

One of the biggest showbiz stories of 1972 was that Roger Moore was to take over the part of 'James Bond', formerly played by Sean Connery (and in one film, 'On Her Majesty's Secret Service' (1969), by George Lazenby). But to Roger Moore, himself, the news came ten years later than it might have done.

Harry Saltzman, co-producer of the 'Bond' films, is now one of my closest friends. I didn't know it at the time, but back in 1961-62, when the film series began, I was suggested for the part -only Sean got it.

Shooting of Roger's first '007' movie has now begun in New Orleans, 18 U.S.A. Roger is certainly tough

enough for the 'Licensed to Kill' part - he's expert at boxing, judo and karate. But he's had to change his looks a little:

I've slimmed down to twelve-and a-half stone - and I must have lost at least a stone when they chopped my hair off!

'Live and Let Die', Roger's début as 'Bond', will cost about £5 million to make. Roger's part will earn him around £1 million. Doesn't that suggest he's being unduly modest when he declares:

Of course I'm not a great actor. I just use what talent I have to the best of my ability.

"You ain't heard nothing yet, folks!"
Those words, spoken on the moviescreen by Al Jolson (above), the popular 'minstrel' singer, heralded a revolution in the film industry: the coming of the 'talkies'. No longer need audiences rely on printed captions, flashed on the screen between action sequences, to give

them some idea of the words the actors were mouthing on the silent screen.

In 1923, an American wireless expert called Lee DeForest patented his Phonofilm System, a technique which allowed sound and action to be recorded at the same time, as parts of a single process. With this early 'sound-camera', DeForest made several short movies featuring popular music-hall entertainers. His films attracted audiences and made money; but the major moviestudios showed little interest.

# 'SONNY BOY' SOUND

Then Warner Brothers—a little-known company which was to become one of the Hollywood giants—decided to take a chance. Late in 1927 they produced THE JAZZ SINGER, in which only Al Jolson's musical sequences were filmed with the sound-camera. Within a year, the success of this movie—and a second, THE SINGING FOOL, in which Jolson sang his famous 'Sonny Boy'—had proved that the silent cinema was dead.

# STAR SWITCH

The changeover to sound caused a few heartbreaks. Some super-stars of the silent screen found themselves out of work because they had ugly accents. Additionally, writers who had earned big money turning out story-lines for silent films were paid off: their studios needed the cash to lure best-selling novelists to write for Hollywood.



# On the Trail of the Giant Rat!

PROBABLY A LOT of us think of shooting as a sport limited to a few very rich men, who pay huge sums every year to shoot over Scottish grouse moors or at



rel's tail is larger and bushier than that of the grey.

carefully reared pheasants. That's one side of it—and many people wouldn't call it 'sport' at all. But the countryman who goes out with his shotgun and dog—like Jack Hargreaves, with his black Labrador 'Bess'—is probably combining sport with a necessary job of work. He's after pests like the greedy woodpigeon or the grey squirrel.

# PEST PROBLEM

It has been estimated that at the end of every breeding season there are around ten million woodpigeons in Britain. They have enormous appetites (try feeding the pigeons in your local

park!) so it's obvious that their numbers must be kept down if crops are not to suffer. As for the grey squirrel, he harms more attractive forms of wildlife: he eats birds' eggs and nestlings, and makes life harder for the remaining red squirrels, an animal native to Britain.

The grey squirrel was introduced into Britain, as a domestic pet, from Canada in the nineteenth century. Its 'population explosion' in the wild state began in Woburn Park (where the famous nature reserve now is) around 1900. It isn't always easy to tell red and grey squirrels apart at a distance, for both are about eighteen inches long and the grey squirrel's fur often has reddish tint. The best guide is that the red squirrel's tail is larger and bushier (the name 'squirrel' means



Shadow-tail', because the animal can raise its tail to cover its back and head) and that it has prominent tufts of fur on its ears.



# RIVER RODENT

A more spectacular pest, but mainly limited to East Anglia, is the coypu, a really impressive rodent that grows up to forty-two inches long (including a sixteen-inch, hairless tail) and may weigh up to twenty pounds. Before the coypu was generally known in Britain—it was introduced from its native South America around 1930—the occasional specimen was exhibited at fairs, with suit-

ably horrific pictures of men being attacked by it, as a 'Giant Sewer Rat'. It is bred for its fur, called 'Nutria' in the fur-trade, but individuals which have escaped from ranches now breed in the wild on the Norfolk Broads and along East Anglian rivers. Because of its size and its fast breeding—one pair may produce up to three litters of between three and twelve young yearly—it could become a serious pest.


