
On November 20, 1972 the Queen and Prince Philip celebrate their 25th Wedding Anniversary. To mark this very royal occasion, as many as 35 countries and territories will be issuing celebration stamps.

This is the second time ever that a Royal Silver Wedding has been 'stamped' by the British Post Office. The first time was in 1948 for the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Silver Wedding.

It's fitting that the occasion should be marked in this way for the Queen inherited the world's finest and most

valuable stamp collection

-the Royal Collection-which was started by her grandfather King George V. The collection is considered to be the most comprehensive and valuable of its kind.





George Best may be the pride of Old Trafford, but RODNEY MARSH (below, right) is rapidly winning the respect and admiration of Manchester City fans. His delicate footwork

and ball control hide the fact that he is a dangerous and determined player, ready to invite and resist the fiercest of challenges.

Marsh is at his best by the far post, waiting for the cross, when he times his jump to perfection. He's still going up when the rest are on the way down! On the other hand, MARTIN CHIVERS (above) would probably admit that he is weakest going for centres on the far post. He prefers the ball played short to the near post where he can try a shot at goal.

Big 'Chiv' has a strong physique and power to fight his way through defences; with an explosive shot in both feet and skilful in the air, he is one of our finest all-round players. CHARLIE GEORGE (left) still to reach his peak. burst upon the soccer scene in 1969 and, ever since, his uncanny knack of being in the right place at the right time, knowing what to do with the ball even before he gets it, and his supreme confidence in his own ability make him a constant threat.

Whereas Charlie is direct and aggressive, it is ALLAN CLARKE's (right) positional sense, his ghosting into empty spaces and his immaculate ball control which make him such a prolific scorer. With 100 League goals to his credit before joining Leeds Utd., he formed a quick understanding with twin striker Mick Jones and dramatically changed the team's style of play.

Like George, MIKE CHANNON (right) is a oneclub player, signing for Southampton in 1964 and taking over the main striking rôle when Chivers moved to Spurs. This season his skills both in the air and on the ground are being fully recognized. The near perfect player off the ball, he teamed up fluently with Joe Royle in the England v. Yugoslavia match at Wembley recently.

These, and players like them, can be relied upon to do the unexpected and add excitement and atmosphere to our national game.

# **GRILLED CUTLETS**

8 lamb cutlets 1 large packet of instant potato 8 cutlet frills 4 large tomatoes

Wipe the cutlets then arrange them on the grid of the grill-pan. Grill the cutlets for about 10 minutes. Turn them over once or twice during the cooking and if, after 10 minutes, they're not done as well as you would like, cook them for 2 or 4 minutes more.

You can grill the tomatoes at the same time. Wash the tomatoes and cut them in half. Brush them with a little of the fat from the cutlets and put them on the grill-pan to grill. Make up the instant potato according to the instructions on the packet and make a mound of it in the centre of a hot oval serving dish.

Arrange the cutlets around the potato with the bones standing up. Put one cutlet frill on each lamb bone. Add the grilled tomato halves. Enough for four people.




# STAR LETTER



**BIG STICK** 



Today, hockey is played both by men and women.





Weather-wise ... and foolish

If you're planning to spend a day outdoors, how do you check on what weather you're likely to have? Do you study the colour of the evening sky: finger the piece of seaweed hanging outside the back door: rush to the

nearest field to see if the cattle are standing in corners with their backs to the wind; or, if it's the right time of year, count the number of days since St. Swithin's? Jack Hargreaves, like most countrymen, has a less picturesque method than any of these: he switches on the radio for the Meteorological Office's forecast.

Mind you, not all the tradi-

tional methods of foretelling the weather, and not all the old 'weather-wise' sayings, are wrong. "Red sky at night, shepherd's delight" is often a good guide, for clear skies mean fair weather, just as a 'halo' or misty ring around the moon

Cirrus

—caused by the refraction of frozen crystals of moisture in high cirrus cloud formations—is a reliable omen of rain. And "Rain before seven, fine before eleven" often proves true as well, if only because local weather conditions tend to alter in four-to-six hour cycles.


Rain of displeasure

Poor old Saint Swithin, whom the proverb holds responsible for inflicting forty days' rain on us if it should happen to rain on his festival day of July 15, has been treated unfairly for almost exactly one thousand years: although perhaps the dedication of a new shrine to him at Winchester in 1962 makes up for it.

Swithin, who was Bishop of Winchester, died in the year 862, and is said to have asked to be buried outside the cathedral so that the "sweet rain of heaven might fall on his grave". In 964, when he was canonized and made a saint, the monks of Winchester decided that the body of so holy a man ought to lie inside the

cathedral. The removal was to take place on July 15, but it rained so hard on that day and for the next forty days, as a sign of the saint's displeasure, the ceremony had to be put off. At least, that's the legend.

Weathercocks, which can help amateur weather-forecasters by showing the wind direction, date from about the same time as Saint Swithin. In the mid-



ninth century, the Pope ordered that every church should set up the image of a cock on its steeple. This was intended to remind men of their weakness by recalling the story of how Saint Peter denied Christ three times before the cock crowed thrice.

XXI: And Then There Was Television


This series has covered the important developments in the movie world from the very beginning to the coming of 'talkies' and colour films. Now, to round the story off, we take a look at the future of the movies.
