





by the Wars of the Roses, a time when hatreds ran high and human lives were cheap.





# ROCK BUNS

milk to mix

1/2 lb. self raising flour pinch of salt 4 oz. butter pinch of mixed spice 4 oz. currants 1 oz. chopped mixed peel 4 oz. caster sugar 1 large egg



Turn on the oven and set the regulo at mark 7. Sift the flour and salt into a bowl, then rub in the butter until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs. Stir in the spice, currants, peel and sugar. Lightly beat the egg

and add it to the mixture with enough milk to make a very stiff dough.

Use a fork to mix the dough. Place the mixture in small, rock-like mounds on a greased baking sheet and bake in the centre of the oven for 10 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. Sprinkle the buns with a little caster sugar before serving. Makes about 12 buns.

Ian Dessent, Norwich, Norfolk. Boxing really dates from the eighteenth century, Ian, although the ancient Greeks and Romans fought with their fists for sport. In 1719, a fighter named James Figg announced that he was 'Champion', and offered to teach pupils how to fight with bare fists.

In 1743, Jack Broughton, Champion of England in 1729-50, drew up simple rules and introduced boxing 'gloves'. But gloves were not used in fights until the 1860s. Early fights were murderous affairs; one in 1825 lasted 278 rounds! A round only ended when one pugilist was knocked or thrown down-and was then given half-a-minute to recover. The rules of modern boxing date from 1867 and are called 'Queensberry Rules', after the Marquess of Queensberry, who helped to draw them up. draw them up.





# The Long Sleep

As you've probably noticed, a lot of creatures are missing from the country-side at this time of year. Many British insects, amphibia and mammals spend all or part of the winter months in hibernation—the long sleep. Among the creatures that go into full or part-hibernation are butterflies and moths, wasps, snails, frogs and toads, snakes, mice and voles, moles, hedgehogs, squirrels and bats.

Some, like the dormouse, sleep very deeply. The dormouse's metabolism

(the bodily processes that produce energy) drops to almost nothing: if you find a dormouse in its winter nest, it will probably appear to be dead — but don't hold a funeral, it'll be alive and kicking come spring!


Other mammals, like squirrels and moles, will leave their winter retreats on sunny days to search for food. Insects do the same; it's not unusual to see a butterfly on a mild mid-

winter day. Bees, which don't hibernate but stay in their hives during winter, are often tempted out by a spell of sunshine—only to die if frost catches them too far from home.

# Egg Thief

If you look along the dry bottoms of hedgerows, you may find a hibernating hedgehog in a deep bed of leaves (although this creature's favourite winter-quarters is

a disused rabbithole). Don't disturb him: he's a welcome visitor to gardens in summer, for his diet consists largely of snails, slugs and insect pests. It's true that he will take eggs when he can get them—but sucking milk from

around ten inches long and weighs up to one-and-a-half pounds. He lives for about six years, hibernating each winter from October to April. Two country names for him are 'hedgepig', because of his pig-like snout and grunting, snuffling voice, and 'urchin'. The second is very old: it comes from the Middle English (English written in this country between the twelfth and fifteenth centuries) word herichon, a hedgehog.

# Do Not Disturb

We all know how the hedgehog protects himself by raising his prickles and then rolling into a spiky ball. This doesn't do him much good against his worst enemy, the badger, whose paws and jaws make short work of such an obstacle. However, it's a good defence against weaker hunters, although it's said that foxes have been known to make hedgehogs uncurl by rolling them into water. The hedgehog hates water, although strangely enough he's a good swimmer (and a good climber, too).

Remember, if you come across a hedgehog-or any other creature — taking its winter sleep, don't disturb it. It is tempting to break this rule for the queen wasp; but although wasps are the worst thing at a picnic, they have an important part to play in the cycle of insect life-so let 'em alone!


