



### FROM TIME

### Spencer Banks talks about his latest TV role

ARTIN CLIFFORD is no ordinary schoolboy. He is studying for his 'A'-levels during his final year, like many another pupil. But once you know that Martin is actually young actor Spencer Banks, therein lies the first major difference.

The second point is that Martin's school is close to an American Airforce base involved in N.A.T.O. exercises.

The third-which sets the story rolling for ATV's spythriller series Tightrope - is that Forrester, from British Intelligence suspects there are spies in the nearby village who will attempt to sabotage the base. Needless to say, it is Martin whom Forrester calls upon to work with him against the enemy.

The thirteen-week programme started on January 19 - and for Spencer it offered the beginning of a new TV image, over and above his well-known part as Simon Randall in Timeslip.

Recently, Spencer spoke to LOOK-IN during a telephone interview, to discuss his rôle in Tightrope.

Q: How does the part of Martin Clifford compare to that of Simon Randall?

A. It's completely different. You can't really compare the two. For a start the age of each character varies quite considerably.

Q: Which character did you prefer playing?

A: I couldn't really say. I enjoyed each one as much as the other.

Q. Do you feel that your present rôle requires more acting

A. Yes, it does. The character is older-in fact, about seven-

teen to eighteen and is rather more complicated.

Q. Is this your first major part since Timeslip?

A: I played Four Eyes in Alexander The Greatest - a comedy rôle. But that was all.

Q. Do you prefer serious parts?

A. Yes, I do. I prefer drama to comedy. Good comedy is very difficult and exacting.

Q. Do you find serious acting easier than comedy?

A: No. They are a technique in themselves. It's just that I'd rather choose straight


Q. Cheryl Burfield starred as Liz Skinner with you in Timeslip. Do you hope to co-star with her again?



I am now going to get on to my hobby horse and no doubt some of you will say, 'a bit late' — because the album I'm going to talk




about has been out since Christmas. But in this case, a late review is better than no review.

Magpie's Peter Fairley now comes to LOOK-IN with more details on what's happening in the space race.

American scientists are now preparing to launch the first spacecraft to Jupiter. It should blast off later this month.

The 550-pound robot called 'Pioneer P-will take nearly two years to reach the planet, which is the largest in our Solar System (more than 300 times bigger than the Earth).


To get to Jupiter, the little, insect-like craft will have to travel through the Asteroid Belt-a trail of broken-up rocks which circle around the Solar System between 180,000,000 and 350,000,000 miles out. Scientists calculate that there could be as many as 50,000 asteroids ranging in size from one mile to 480 miles across. They are believed to be the debris from a planet which broke up.

To reach Jupiter, 'Pioneer P' has to journey about 500 million miles. So the Atlas-Centaur rocket that will launch it from Cape Kennedy has been fitted with an extra, third stage. This rocket motor will boost it away from Earth at 32,400 m.p.h.

On reaching Jupiter, 'Pioneer F will swing around behind the planet, coming to within 100,000 miles of its surface. It will take pictures—pictures that should be far better than any taken through telescopes from Earth-and also perform 12 other experiments, including several to find out what sort of an atmosphere the planet has.

Jupiter is always hidden by a dense layer of clouds which form pale, grey-blue and salmon pink bands around the planet. Scientists are not yet sure whether it is solid-like the Earth — liquid or just a mass of gas. 'Pioneer P should find out, as it goes past.

After passing by Jupiter, the spacecraft will streak on out into space to become the first object to leave our Solar System.



Jack Wild appeared on Magpie's 'Tell me' spot to answer viewers' questions. Here are some of those which there was not time for him to answer 'on air'.

### What was it like in America when you were doing your TV shows?

I've been to the States quite a number of times and travelled to most of the major cities. I was mainly doing record promotion and appearing on talk and variety shows. It was very interesting going to places like New York, Houston and Philadelphia; oddly enough, I really felt as though I was in England most of the time, except that the pace of life was much faster.

### Which comedians and singers do you admire most?

I think Peter Sellers is hilarious. Then I also admire Marty Feldman, Terry Scott and Elton John. But it's best, if possible, not to base your style on people you admire and to be original.

### Was it very difficult for you when your voice broke?

Well, it wasn't really, at all, because whereas most people's voices break over a fairly short period, mine broke very gradually. So I hardly noticed it happening. And, anyway, my voice has always been a bit husky, so it didn't make that much difference. After playing in Oliver on the stage my voice wasn't normal for about two years and even now after a recording session, I can't speak!

### What is your next film?

The Pied Piper of Hamelin, which is opening in London at Easter. Donovan plays the piper and I am the crippled boy. It was fun making the film—we went to a little village in Germany which looks the same now as it did in the fifteenth century, and all the rats had to be imported from England.

### WE'RE JUST WILD ABOUT...

ONCE UPON A TIME (seven years ago, actually) Jack Wild lay in a heap at the side of the road trying to catch his breath. He had been playing football with his friends and was exhausted. There

happened to be passing by a theatrical agent who was on the look-out for chorus boys to appear in the stage version of 'Oliver'. When she asked the boy if he would like a job, he said: "No, thanks. I've got one helping the milkman."

Nevertheless, Jack was persuaded to leave his yoghurts. He stepped into a fairy tale of fame and fortune that became a reality, and made Jack Wild one of the most popular young entertainers of the 70s.

Jack was born in Royton near Manchester, but moved to Hounslow with his family when he was eight. His school friends teased him about his strange Northern accent, so Jack gradually changed his speech into a cross breed of Mancunian and Cockney.

After the stage production of 'Oliver' came the film version where he met and made friends with Mark Lester. They appeared together in a later film 'S.W.A.L.K.'. Jack had his own television show (Junior Show-


time) and later the fantastically popular 'H. R. Pufnstuf'. He's made tours of America and done guest appearances on numerous shows both here and across the Atlantic. He's also made seven records (including the sound track of 'Oliver'). All in all, it's a far cry from his work on the milkround!

TAKING A TRIP TO ALL SORTS OF FASCINATING PLACES is just part of the job as far as Magpie is concerned. Whether it is Switzerland or Somerset, doesn't really matter-provided the researchers come up, with something new to

present to the viewers.

A few weeks ago, if you remember, it was Switzerland and LOOK-IN's Editor, Alan Fennell, went along to tell you about the Lost Valley. This time, we turn with Tony Bastable to Somerset-and for him, his second journey to the famous city of Bath.

Many of you may recall that last time he went there, he actually took a bath-Georgian style-in the naturally warm

waters of their spa.

On his latest trip, he 'went under' again-one-hundredfeet down, to be precise. The reason? He was investigating a 'mine in a million'—Monks Park Mine-which is probably the only one of its kind still working in England. It provides 'dressed' Bath Stone for buildings.

If you watch the programme next week, you'll find that Tony discovered many other intriguing facts about the mine.

Until the beginning of the last war, up to 1,000 men were employed in a complex of mines at Monks Park. Now, just one remains and there are only two teams of three men working it.

Up to 1952, horses were

used to excavate the stone. They have now been replaced by machinery. When the stone is cut underground it is tested




Tony Bastable (right) chats with some workers—one-hundredfeet down at Monks Park Mine near Bath, Somerset.

for faults and squared off. It is finally sent to merchants and used mainly for facing buildings. The tragedy is that the mining of this stone is a dying trade. Though far less attractive, concrete, being cheaper and easier to use, is the modern replacement.

And what did Tony have to


say about it all? "I found it extremely cold and damp down there-but very interesting." To end on a note of humour, Tony said: "the Bath Stone was beautiful and it resembled huge blocks of Wensleydale cheese. You never know-perhaps they'll find the Moon is made of Bath Stone one day!"


There are several ways, Ivan. First there are fold or folded mountains, like the Himalayas and Alps. They have been thrown up into huge 'folds' or ridges by movements of the Earth's crust. In the same category are block mountains, masses formed by land subsiding or by rocks breaking and tilting. Mountains are also formed by erosion, the tougher rocks being left while the softer rocks alongside are worn away, often by rivers.

The third category comprises those formed by volcanic explosions, with the lava and ash piling up round an opening in the Earth's crust. These can be very high: typical examples can be found in the mighty Rockies of North America and the Andes of South America.

does a Venus Fly Trap plant eat flies and how does it give off an odour? Sheryl Ellerington Yorkshire.

This amazing plant is a native of swampy parts of North and South Carolina and Florida in the United States. Each of its leaves has two halves which are hinged together and have bristles on their edges. On the inner surfaces of the leaves are very sensitive hairs which, even if they are touched lightly, make the two halves of the leaf snap firmly together. The victim is usually a fly. It takes about ten days as a rule for the plant to digest the fly which it does by special digestive juices. The Venus Fly Trap gives off no special smell. Insect-eating plants usually grow on boggy soil which does not give them all the nourishment they need, especially nitrogen. This is why they make up for the lack in such an extraordinary way.




